TWO TO HAN度 FOR B.G.-BONBING. Georgetown: Two members of a youth organisation, Abdoo Hamid, 19, and Babu Mohammed 21 , were recently sentenced to death byr Mr. Justice Bollers for the terrorist murder of a schoolboy,Godfrey Texeira, aged ll. A schoolbus was dropping children from school on March 23, when Hamid and Hohammed crashed a "pine -apple" bomb through a window, killing the boy and injuring several others on an East Coast Road. It was the first conviction for terrorist murder in 24 cases. The judge said there was no doubt that Hamid and Mirhamed found therselves part of a "diabolical plot and comitted a nost atrocious murder on a young, innocent child." The jury of 4 women and eight men took nearly four hours to reach their verdict and the convicted men screaned as the judge donned the black cap before imposing the death sentence. The defence which was conducted by Ir. Oscan Haynes QC, was an alibi. The nurder was one of the first to toke place during the 5months Guyana tragedy of carlicr/last year when nore than 200 died in industrial and racial "wars". Sone 100 persons are in prison awaiting trial for terrorists murders in that period.

SIR GRANTLEY ADANS ACGUSED OF INSULTING SPTAKER.

Bridgetown, Barbados: Fomer Prine Minister of the Wost Indies Federation, Sir Grantley Adans, 68, has been sunnoned to appear before a court here to answer charges brought against hin by the Director of Public Prosecutions. The charge claims the statement was made by Sir Grantley at a public meeting, suggesting that the Speaker, Mr. J.I.T. Branker, took sides in discharging his duties as Speaker.

BLAIZIL PRAYS FOR SOLUTION.
St. George's Grenada: Grenada's Chief

Minister, Mr. Herbert Blaize, said in a Christmas message that his Government looked forward with fervent hope to a settlement of the constitutional problems of the Eastern Caribbean and Grenada. He said that his Government prayed that "our neighbours and friends in the islands to the north of us will speedily settle their own, while we equally pray and look to the fulfilment of our desire for union with Trinidad and Tobego".

HOPE BRIGHTENS FOR VICTIMS OF HEART DISEASES.
There is great hope that the incidence of strokes and healt attacks will be considerably reduced, even up to the point of beinc eradicated entirely. This was disclosed by Dr. Murray Israel, Director of the Vascular Research Found -ation, of New York who was on a short holiday in Trinidad with Mrs. Israel. Dr. Israel stated that his foubdation had been actively engaged in the fight to eliminate these illnesses for the past 15 years, and that within the very near future, it was hoped that the final phase of research work would be reached. He said that it has already been established that strokes were a result of failure or insufficient secretion of the thyroid gland, which occurs in every -body with increase in age. He said that the theory on which the foundation had been working was based on the use of the natural substance to which doctors always havw access, but the underlying problen all along had been to have the substance in the correct conbination. Results at the foundation, he said, had alnost reached the point of success. Dr. Israel said that many prad -titioners still held the belief that thyroxin, when administered was dancer -ous, but he explained that research had shown othervise.

GRENADIAN IS NOW A JUDGE IN NEV YORK. He defeated his opponent by more than half a million votes to be elected judge of the New York Supreme Court. PRIEST HITS AT RACIAL SCANDAL. Chicago: The Rev. John Coffield, came to Chicago rocentiy to start his selfinposed"exilc" fren the Los Angeles Roman Catholic Archdiocese in protest against what ho termed a "scandalous" racial situation. Father Cofficld, aged 50, a priest in Los Angeles for 24 years, said in a brief statement:"It would be extrenely bad taste for a priest to publicly disagree with his Cardinal, except that the position of Negroes in Los Angeles is so scandalous that I stand by the statement I nade there". Father Cofficld had said in Los Angeles that he obtained a three -year leave of absence in protest against California's abolition of antidiscrininatory housing laws and as̃ainst his silcncing by his Cardinal on the race issue, He said that Janex Francis Cardinal McIntyre, Archbishop of Los Angwles, told him "I should not speak on racc".

THOIASON TALKS OF PRESS RESTRICTIOINS. Hamilton, Canade: Lord Thonson said here that he would continue to publish newspapers he had in Africa as long as Press consorship and restraint did not becone unbearable. The Canadian born publisher told a neeting of delegates from Canadian University newspapers that he had had trouble printing fair coment about African leaders and grovernnents in sone Countries. He did not amplify beyond adding:"African
: politicions are peculiar people. Unless you have their name in large type on the front page every day they think you are against then! Lord Thomson said that poople responsible for the Press in mawy new African countries lacked the necessary training and background to be pemitted free use of the Press. This resulted in much unreasonable
and irresponsible criticism in local African newspapers of the Governments. He said thst in such cases the Press should be prepared to accont sone restrictions on freedon, provided that newspapers had reasonable rights in reporting and interpreting world news.

WLST INDIAN WOIIAN STRANGLED.
London: The body of a West Indian wonan, her two children crying beside her, tras found by detectives. A nan is holping police with their investigations. Police said irs. Nimy Reed, aged 26, of Montserrat, nay have been strangled. They are treating the case as murder.

SYNOD TO IEET IN ST. LUCIA.
The annual Synod of the Barbados and Trinidad District of the Mothodist Church, takes place in St. Lucia this nonth for the first tine in the history of the Mothodist Church in the Bastern Caribbean. In St. Luwia, there is one Methodist Church, in Castries, and there is a Methødist Mission to the East Indians at Forestiere, the Rev. E.L. Swanston is Superintendent of the St. Lucia circuit. The Barbados and Trinidad ......... District of the Wethodist Ohurch conprises the territories of Trinidad and Tobago, Barbados, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, and Grenada. Each circuit sends to the Synod the ministers stationed in the circuit and an equal number of lay representatives.
