(I) INS (NEW) LOOKOUT SYSTEM -- Reference Bureau Bulletin No. 11, Series 1952, dated March 20, 1952, under title (A) Field Office Procedures - Placing of Stops Along the Mexican Border.

Augmenting the foregoing, your attention is directed to the installation of a new lookout system by the Immigration and Naturalization Service. This lookout system will be maintained in a loose leaf book form, the names being inserted according to the Soundex System, rather than alphabetically. Because certain names will not be of value to all districts of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, separate books will be issued for use by Seaports, the Canadian Border, and the Mexican Border. Some names will, of course, appear in all books. Then monthly, or more often if necessary, a supplemental list of new lookouts will be issued and distributed, incorporating all of the names contained in the previously issued supplements. All names marked for purging will

be removed at the time a book is reissued.

Each lookout will be issued for 2, 4, 6, 8, or 10 years. Lookouts relating to subversives will be issued for a period of ten years and at the expiration of that time, the case will be re-examined to determine whether or not the lookout should be continued in effect and if so, for how long. Lookouts relating to other persons will be issued to expire when subjects reach the age of 70, except subversives or other exceptional cases. Lookouts issued at the request of another agency will be issued for a period of two years unless cancelled by such agency. However, before purging, inquiry will be made of the interested agency whether longer retention of the lookout is desired.

Emergent lookouts will continue to be issued by the District Offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and by the Central Office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service for temporary use in cases where time is insufficient to include the lookout in the regular system and will be placed in the current supplement. If it is decided that the lookout should remain in effect, the name will be included in the next supplement published by the Central Office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The above instructions were issued by the Central Office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to its various District Offices and are being furnished to you for your information and guidance.

This informant advised that the objective of the Partido Popular as made manifest at the convention, referred to above, is to avoid using any of the procedures or formulas which are well known and which have been previously used by the Commumist Party, but instead to change even the manner of speaking to the people, avoiding use of the expressions commonly used by the Communist Party. He repeated and emphasized the intentions of the Partido Popular to use even the services of priests, along with other types and classes of persons, to assist in attracting membership to the Partido Popular without the people recognizing the true nature and significance of that party. This meeting was reportedly called to plan Party strategy.

A source considered reliable has advised this meeting (termed the Second Special Council) was held July 25-26, 1952. at the hall of "RL Angel." Thread and Cloth Laborers Union (Sindicato de Hilados y Tejidos "El Angel"), Calle Doctor Olvera 159. Mexico City. The neeting was attended by special delegates sent from each state and territory of the Republic of Mexico. At least one delegate attended from each state or territory and from some states there were two delegates.

It was stated the purpose of the meeting was to orient the delegates with regard to the "Party line" to be followed, and to organize the FF more and mere strongly until it becames sufficiently powerful to seize a great part of the executive and legislative branches of the Moxican Covernment. Lombardo (Toledane) was further alleged to have stated that as far as outward appearances were concerned, Communism is going to be left to die in Mexico and the Communist Party will be left to receive the "peltings" of public opinion in Mexico, while the PP seeks to entrench itself in power.

The source stated there are very powerful forces in Mexico which Lombardo (Toledano) is able to manage at his will, including very capable persons holding positions within the Government. According to the source, one such individual who will likely remain in the Federal Government and the Cabinet of Ruiz Cortines is the engineer, Oribe Alba (apparently having reference to Adolfo Orive Alba, Secretary of Hydraulic Resources) who is well-known for his "leftist" tendencies. The source added that through the influence of Lombardo (Toledano) over Oribe Alba, the majority of the engineers of the Recursos Hidraulicos (Water Resources) are Communists.

Continuing, the source added that Lombarde (Teledano) was alleged to have stated a great part of Communism in Guatemala depended directly on Communist developments in Mexico. In explanation, Lombardo (Teledano) allegedly added there is to be carried out in Guatemala a redistribution of lands to be patterned after what has been effected in Mexico, which program Lombarde (Teledano) claimed to have instigated. The source added that on June 17, 1952, the President of Guatemala, Colonel Jacobo Arbens, and his Secretary of Ecomony, Roberto Franjil, signed a law of

Your attention is invited in this connection to the correspondence previously submitted by the Legal Attache relative to the reporting of information concerning Lombardo Toledano and his group, as well as information concerning the Mexican Communist Party in which it was pointed out that for reporting purposes Vicente Lombardo Toledano and his Popular Party should not be confused with the Mexican Communist Party. Your attention is also called to the fact that the Bureau has no file "Subversive Activities in Mexico" the caption which was used on the memorandum which accompanied your letter of reference.

This matter should be handled promptly and the information should be properly resubmitted at an early date. You should also have the Agents assigned to the border coverage project again review the instructions contained in the border coverage file in order to make sure that they understand the procedures to be followed in handling this project.

Copies of this letter are being furnished to the El Paso, Phoenix, and San Antonio Offices which received copies of the San Diego letter of reference. Those offices should file their copies of relet in their border-coverage files and the San Diego Office should furnish those offices copies of the new report which is to be prepared covering the investigative information developed in accordance with the instructions in this letter, which copies can be filed in the appropriate investigative files in the El Paso, Phoenix, and San Antonio Field Divisions.

SURVEY OF CIUDAD CHETUMAL, TERRITORY OF QUINTANA ROO, MEXICO

Reason for Survey

A survey of Ciudad Chetumal, commonly referred to as Chetumal, Territory of Quintana Roo. Mexico, was made inasmuch as FRANS BLOM,

Cristobal las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico, on numerous occasions has stated that entry and exit into and from Mexico respectively is accomplished with ease at Chetumal because of the attitude of the Mexican Immigration officials there.

- of the territory of Quintana Roo, Mexico is located 945 miles east of Mexico City, D.F., on the border of British Honduras. Quintana Roo is the only division of the Republic of Mexico which has a territorial status and continues to retain this status because of inadequate population and inadequate economic income.
- 2. History: Mr. ERNESTO CASTILLO CASARES, Chief of Mexican Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated on January 5, 1953, that Chetumal was founded as a frontier military post in 1810, the year in which Mexico gained its independence. Chetumal is strictly a product of Mexico as an independent nation, exhibits no Spanish influence, complete absence of cathedrals and over 20 per cent of its population is Spanish-English speaking because of its location on the frontier of British Honduras, an English-speaking colony.
- 3. Climate: Mrs. ETHEL WILLIAMS, Manager, Hotel Chetumal, Chetumal, Quintana Roo, stated on January 6, 1953, that the average rainfall in Chetumal is 75 inches and the average daily temperature is 72 degrees Fahrenheit. The Compania Mexicana de Aviacion 1953 office manual reflects that Chetumal is 7 feet above sea level and has a tropical climate with continued rainfall throughout the year.
- 4. Population: Mrs. ETHEL WILLIAMS stated that the population of Chetumal is 7,200 at the present and that the population, due to adverse economic circumstances, has decreased during the last three years. Formerly Chetumal had a population of 10,000.

5. Industry: ADONY TEJANO,

Merida, Yucatan, Mexico, samill installation supervisor,
and ANTONIO AGUIRRE, Manager, Chicle Producers Cooperative,
Chetumal, Quintana Roo,

stated on January 7, 1953, that the only industries are cedar and mahogany lumber (See Photograph #1) and chicle (chewing gum) production. There is one lumber mill, the property of the Mexican Government, located in Chetumal the entire production of which is exported to the U.S.A. by the Freiberg Mahogany Company, New Orleans, Louisiana, U.S.A. The entire chicle (chewing gum) production at the present time is being purchased by the Wrigley Company of Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. Mr. AGUIRRE stated that the local chicle industry has suffered very severly because the U.S.A. price has dropped 20 per cent during the last year and that the demand in the U.S.A. has decreased by over 50 per cent during the last two years because of the application of synthetic resins.

- 6. Agriculture: Agriculture does not prevail in the area of Chetumal because of the swampy condition of the soil.
- 7. Educational Institutions: Chetumal, Quintana Roo, has one primary school (grades 1 to 6) and one secondary school (grades 7 to 9). Mrs. ETHEL WILLIAMS stated that most students for further education attend preparatory schools (grades 10 to 12) in Belize, British Honduras, which is 68 miles from Chetumal by highway.

8. Systems of Communications

A. Highways: Chetumal has no highway connections with any cities in the Republic of Mexico. Chetumal is located on the end of a 68 mile long highway connecting Belize, British Honduras with Chetumal. Highway traffic from Chetumal enters British Honduras at Santa Elena, British Honduras (See Photograph #2). The highway is hard surfaced but only one vehicle wide in British Honduras.

B. Railroad Service: Chetumal, Quintana Roo has no railroad service.

C. Bus Service: Between Belize, British Honduras, and Chetumal, Quintana Roo, there is a daily buscargo service. These buscargo vehicles do not operate on schedule and are not equipped with seats. Passengers sit on

boards which are placed over cargo (See Photograph #3).

Taxis are available at Belize, British
Honduras, and at Chetumal, Quintana Roo, for service between
these points. Price per passenger is approximately \$6.50
(U.S. currency).

D. Airline Service: Compania Mexicana de
Aviacion has airplane service between Chetumal, Quintana Roo,
and Mexico, D.F., three times each week, to Chetumal on
Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and from Chetumal to Mexico,
D.F., on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Transportes Aereos Mexicanos, S.A. (TAMSA) has round trip flights between Merida, Yucatan, Mexico, and Chetumal, Quintana Roo, on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday of each week.

British Colonial Airlines (See Photograph #4)
has one round trip flight between Belize, British Honduras,
and Chetumal, Quintana Roo, on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday
of each week which plane makes connections with the TAMSA
plane from Merida, Yucatan, Mexico.

The airport building (See Photograph #5) is a small wooden structure. The landing strip is all weather surfaced.

E. Maritime Service: There are numerous small coastal sailing vessels (See Photograph #6) which cross the Rio Honda from Chetumal to the British Honduras side and vice versa. These vessels do not operate on schedule.

There is one 160 ton Diesel powered vessel "La Ciudad de Chetumal" which sails between Veracruz, Veracruz, Mexico, and Chetumal every fifteen days and the voyage in each direction requires seven days. This vessel is second class only and accommodates 20 passengers.

F. Telephone Service: Chetumal, Quintana Roo, has no telephone facilities.

Roo, through Telegrafos Nacionales has telegraph service with Mexico, D. F., and all telegraph stations in Mexico. Through its Mexico, D.F., office international service may be had. The Telegrafos Nacionales service does not provide a radio telephone service from or to Chetumal. The Chetumal telegraph office is open from 8:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

H. Public Utilities: Chetumal, Quintana Roo, has no public water or drainage system. Chetumal has an electric power service which operates from 6:00 P.M. to midnight daily.

- a three street town. Avenida 22 de Enero runs east and west (See Photograph #7) and passes by the government palace and the municipal pier. Calle 22 de Marzo (See Photograph #8) is the main east-west thoroughfare. Avenida de los Heroes (See Photograph #9) is the main north-south thoroughfare and is a continuation of the Belize, British Honduras Chetumal, Quintana Roo, Mexico, highway. Most of the streets are wide and paved with concrete.
- 9. Tourist Trade: Mrs. ETHEL WILLIAMS stated that seldom do any U.S. tourists spend any time in Chetumal. Due to the inadequacy of the hotel facilities, Chetumal has not become a tourist attraction. Mrs. WILLIAMS stated that a number of U.S. tourists from time to time have come through Chetumal for the purpose of going to the British Honduras and Guatemala, because of the adequate transporation facilities.
- observation it was determined that there is only one hotel, Hotel Chetumal, in Chetumal, Quintana Roo (See Photograph #10). This hotel, although extremely inadequate, is the best in Chetumal, keeps no guest registration records and is owned by ERNESTOCASTILLO CASARES, Chief of the Mexican Immigration and Naturalization Service at Chetumal. The hotel has 12 rooms and one bath room.
- 11. Americans Residing in Chetumal: ERNESTO CASTILEO CASARES and GIL AGUILAR, Manager, Freiberg Mahogany Company, Chetumal, Quintana Roo, stated on January 8, 1953, that there are no Americans residing in Chetumal or vicinity.
- On January 6, 1953, While the writer was in the office of ERNESTO CASTILLO CASARES, Chief of the Mexican Immigration and Naturalization Service, Chetumal, Quintana Roo, Mexico, it was observed that CASTILLO, for a price ranging from 50 to 100 Mexican pesos, issues to American tourists 10-day permits to enter British Honduras. In these permits CASTILLO indicates that the American is a permanent resident of Mexico and not a tourist. CASTILLO stated that according to the laws of Mexico the permit to enter British Honduras can only be obtained

by presenting a valid U.S.A. passport. CASTILLO does not require compliance with this stipulation. CASTILLO also instructs the U.S.A. tourist that since the permit to enter British Honduras indicates that the U.S.A. tourist in question is a "permanent resident," a Guatemala visitors card may be obtained on the basis of the permit to enter British Honduras from any Guatemalan consul in British Honduras. CASTILLO instructs the tourists to destroy the permit to enter British Honduras immediately after entering Guatemala in the event the British authorities did not take it up on the departure from British Honduras. These permits to enter British Honduras are checked at the British Honduras Immigration and Customs station, Santa Elena, British Honduras (See Photograph #11) which is located on the Hondo River, the boundary of Mexico and British Honduras. CASTILLO instructs the U.S.A. tourists when entering British Honduras with a permit issued by him not to go to the Mexican consul in British Honduras to obtain a tourist card to return to Mexico inasmuch as the Mexican consul in British Honduras will not accept the permits issued by CASTILLO:

Since there is no Mexican Immigration stop on the highway leading into Chetumal from British Honduras, one can return to Chetumal without a Mexican tourist card.

According to Mexican law, there is no charge for a permit to enter British Honduras.

If the U.S.A. tourist does not desire to enter British Honduras or Guatemala with a permit issued by CASTILLO and return for the purpose of obtaining a new Mexican tourist card, then CASTILLO, for a price ranging from 50 to 100 Mexican pesos will issue a new Mexican tourist card valid for six months to the tourist. In the event the U.S.A. tourist has no Mexican tourist card in his possession and is illegally in Mexico, then CASTILLO, for a price ranging from 200 pesos and up, will issue a Mexican tourist card valid for six months to the tourist and will indicate on the card that the tourist arrived by plane from British Honduras. It is essential to indicate that the tourist arrived by plane inasmuch as there is a Mexican Immigration officer at the airport to check incoming passengers and thus the improperly issued Mexican tourist card appears bona fide on its face.

has been able to accumulate considerable funds through his

Photograph #10), two taxi automobiles which operate between

Chetumal, Quintana Roo, and Belize, British Honduras, and

various parcels of land in the city of Chetumal.

13. Local Publications: PETRONA ZETINA stated on January 5, 1953, that there are no local publications in Chetumal. Air express editions of daily newspapers published in Mexico City arrive at Chetumal on the same date of publication on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday of each week. A limited number of English language daily publications arrive in Chetumal from Belize, British Honduras, on the same date of publication.

According to the source, Montenegro Paniagua allegedly stated he has 70,000 followers in Guatemala ready for a revolt and he considers the time ripe for such an attempt. It was further indicated he lacks arms for 300 in Guatemala city and has been trying to secure financial assistance from Samuel Zemurray, an official of the United Fruit Company, Boston, Massachusette, but has been unsuccessful in making contact with Zemurray. The source was informed the present plot against the government in Guatemala was planned by Guatemalan refugees in Honduras and, should the necessary arms and funds be secured, a revolution will take place in Guotemala in the near future. As you are aware, when the Communist coverage along the Mexican border project was first organized in 1948 on the Director's instructions, the border offices were instructed to make every effort to protect the secrecy of our operations on the Mexican side of the border. Reports prepared as a result Hill of our investigations on the Hexican side of the border were not disseminated to other agencies in order not to disclose the extent of our interest in Communist matters along the border or to reveal our operations. Only the most important information developed was disseminated to other agencies and was handled at the Seat of Government in memorandum form.

As you are also aware, it has become necessary for the Bureau to disseminate more and more information and it is incumbent upon the Bureau to furnish other agencies information coming within their purview. We, therefore, now disseminate most of the information developed concerning the Communist Party of Mexico through the Border Coverage Project but the actual.reports on the Communist Party of Mexico have not been disseminated. Dissemination has continued to be made on a memorandum basis, a procedure which involves a large amount of Agent and stenographic work in order to transform the reports into memoranda for dissemination.

In order to eliminate this duplication of effort at the Seat of Government, it is believed that we could now satisfactorily disseminate the reports prepared by the border offices on the Communist Party of Mexico, at the same time protecting the secrecy of this project and without disclosing the fact that we are actually conducting Communist investigations on the Mexican side of the border or jeopardizing our informant coverage. The dissemination of reports would, of course, show that we have an interest in Communist activities along the Mexican border, but we have very sound reasons for that interest and it is not thought that the dissemination of these reports would jeopardize our relations with other ugencies or disclose the fact that we are operating informants on the Mexican side of the border. It is thought that by this time the border offices are sufficiently aware of the problems involved and are capable of preparing reports suitable for all the ination.

COMMUNIST COVERAGE ALONG THE MEXICAN BORDER

For your information, the Bureau has been advised that the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service recently held a conference at Washington for their investigators working on the Mexican and Canadian borders. According to Mr. Ray Farrell, Assistant Commissioner, Investigations Division, Immigration and Naturalization Service, the primary concern of that organization is with the Mexican border in view of allegations of large numbers of Communists residing in Mexico who can allegedly enter the United States undetected. Mr. Farrell has stated that INShave received considerable pressure from the Bureau of the Budget and other sources inquiring as to what they are doing in connection with the illegal entry of aliens on the Mexican and Canadian borders. pointed out that INS have the responsibility of excluding present or former alien members of the Communist Party under the McCarran Immigration and Nationality Act. He feels, therefore, that it is necessary for INS to step, up their coverage in border areas in order to detect the entry of subversive aliens.

Mr. Farrell has pointed out that the El Paso Office of INS has developed some fairly good coverage in that area and that the coordination with the local FBI office there has been excellent. He stated that they have recently instituted a similar program in their Los Angeles Office in the vicinity of the border between California and Lower California and that they have instructed their investigators in the Los Angeles Office to coordinate their afforts very closely with the FBI office at San Diego in order to avoid disturbing any security programs of the FBI in that area. He stated that their San Antonio Office has so far done very little in this regard, but that they have been instructed to attempt to develop some coverage along the border in the area covered by that office. He stated that they have also been instructed to closely coordinate their efforts with the FBI office at San Antonio.

Mr. Farrell further stated that he has made every effort to attempt to closely coordinate these activities with the FBI offices on a local level and he wishes to be advised immediately if there is any indication of a lack of cooperation or lack of coordination on the part of these investigators. It is noted that he stated that according to his investigators, the Bureau is extending excellent cooperation to the INS in these areas.

The above information is being brought to your attention inasmuch as the INS will step up their activities along the Mexican border, and it is desired that each office establish and maintain close enough relations with the local INS officials so that they will be able to protect the border coverage program from being inadvertently prejudiced by INS activity. Whenever any situation arises which might result in an informant's being excluded by INS for Communist membership or affiliation on the Mexican side of the border, you should promptly bring this matter to the Bureau's attention and submit your recommendations for the best means of handling the situation without uncovering the informant to INS. At the same time, each Office must be most careful to avoid any situation wherein the INS might be able to pass the responsibility to the Bureau for any failure on their part to discharge their own obligations along the border. INS have been specifically advised that the Bureau does not want to interfere in any way with any efforts on their part to fulfill their responsibilities in the border areas but it has been made clear that close coordination in those areas is necessary between the Bureau and INS.

RECORDED - 76 Reference is made to your letter dated April 13, 1954, in which you advise of a meeting held with representatives of Fix. - 107 the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service at San Yaidro on April 6, 1954, to discuss some of the problems which have arisen regarding the dissemination of reports by your office to INS.

> It is noted that during the course of the meeting the matter of informants came up and Inspector Truman L. LeFors of INS specifically stated that he had orders from his superiors to develop informants in Lower California. It is noted that you brought this matter to the Bureau's attention since there appeared to be some variance between the instructions furnished the INS locally in California and the statements of Assistant Commissioner Ray Farrell of INS set forth in the Bureau's letter of March 23, 1954, to the San Antonio Office to the effect that their investigators have been warned not to attempt to develop confidential informants in Mexico. It is further noted that you suggest that the Bureau may wish to take this matter up with INS at the Seat of Government through Liaison channels in order to clarify that organization's plans with reference to the

COMM Estallopment of confidential informants.

MAY 5 - 1954 In accordance with your suggestion, contact has been MAILEMOEnthined with Mr. Farrell on this matter, and he advised on tay 5, 1954, that he is cognizant of the fact that INS is attempting to develop informants below the border in Lower California. Farrell stated that he tealizes that INS representatives in the San Diego area are developing informants below the bordens and he is interposing no objection so long as they handle the program with discretion and avoid confusion. He stressed the fact that he has instructed INS representatives in that areas to coordinate, their work with the FBI very closelymen - 2008

The Bureau is not in a position to object in principle to the development of informants in Mexico by INS since that organization has responsibilities to fulfill which would be difficult to discharge withoute informant sources along the Mexican border. You should, of course, bring to the Bureau's attention any failure on the part of INS to maintain close liaison with your office or any instance in which the methods employed by that agency to develop informants interfere with or prejudice your investigations or your sources.

INS in other areas along the border has been developing informants and the close liaison which has been maintained in the El Paso area has resulted in the El Paso Office of INS furnishing the El Paso Field Division a list of their informants on the Vexican side of the border. This information has been of assistance to the El Paso Office and at the same time it has been possible to follow INS activities closely enough to protect the confidential informants handled by the El Paso Field Division under the border coverage program. Inasmuch as a similar problem exists in your office in protecting your border coverage informants from being recognized as such by INS and at the same time not to create suspicion on the part of informants' Communist contacts through special favors granted to the informants, it will be necessary for you to maintain close liaison with the local INS office in order to coordinate your activities with those of INS.

With respect to the anticipated increased activity on the part of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service along the Mexican-United States Border covered by the San Diego Division regarding the above-captioned program, the following is being brought to the attention of the Bureau.

Page two of referenced letter reflects that Mr. RAY FARRELL, Assistant Commissioner, Investigations Division, Immigration and Naturalization Service has stated he has warned his group of investigators not to attempt to develop confidential informants in Mexico but to confine their activities to the United States side of the border.

In accordance with the wishes of the Bureau, as set forth in referenced letter regarding the establishing of relations with the Immigration and Naturalization Service so that the border coverage program could be protected, a meeting was held with the representatives of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service at San Ysidro on April 6, 1954. This meeting was called primarily for the purpose of resolving some of the problems which have arisen with respect to the dissemination of reports by this office to Immigration and Naturalization Service. For the information of the Bureau, the District Headquarters of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service are located in

Los Angeles. The United States Immigration and Naturalization Service also has offices at the Ports of Entry in Calexico, California and San Ysidro, California. Heretofore it had been the practice for the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service offices at San Ysidro and Calexico to write directly to the San Diego FBI Office requesting information regarding certain individuals without going through their District Office in Los Angeles. Inasmuch as the Border Coverage Program, insofar as Immigration and Naturalization Service is concerned, is being coordinated through the Los Angeles Office of that service, it was decided at the meeting that all correspondence between Immigration and Naturalization Service and the San Diego Office of the FBI should go through the Los Angeles Office.

In view of the fact that three offices of Immigration and Naturalization Service are involved in connection with this program, the following individuals from Immigration and Naturalization Service were present:

Mr. R. L. WILLIAMS, Officer in Charge, United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, Port of Entry, Calexico, California.

Mr. EWELL PRESS, Officer in Charge, United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, Port of Entry, San Ysidro, California.

Mr. TRUMAN L. LeFORS - and Mr. MILTON BELL - United States Immigration and Naturalization Service Inspectors, and apparent coordinators of this program from the Security Section, United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, District Office, Los Angeles.

During the course of the meeting the question of informants was brought up. The representatives of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service office in Los Angeles were specifically asked whether or not they intended to attempt to develop informants in Lower California, Mexico. Mr. Lefors specifically advised that he had orders from his superiors to develop informants in Lower California.

The above matter is being brought to the attention of the Bureau inasmuch as there appears to be some variance in

It is also suggested that the Bureau may wish to take this matter up with Immigration and Naturalization Service at the Seat of Government through liaison channels, in order to clarify Immigration and Naturalization Service plans with reference to this matter.

The large lists of names are submitted by the INS to your office for name checks and there is insufficient identifying data included, you may feel free to discuss the matter with INS and point out to them the difficulties involved in attempting to determine if the subject of the name check is identical with an inalvidual of the same name in Bureau files. Under no circumstances should you cisseminate information to another government a ency as a result of a name check unless you are sure that the information pertains to the same individual, in accordance with Section 54 of the Manuel of Rules and Regulations.

It appears when INS submits lists of names to you containing all members of a particular organization in the area they are actually conducting a "fishing expedition" in order to determine if any of these inclutavals are deportable aliens or naturalized citizens who can be denaturalized and deported. In theevent you find in handling such name checks that subjects of your investigations are native born and thus are not within the jurisdiction of INS you may so advise them and it is not necessary to furnish them with information from your files in those cases. In the event INS is considering an individual as an informant or a witness, this should be clearly indicated at the time of their request for information and in this case it is permissable to furnish them with information regarding native-born citizens.

There is no objection to your handliny all INS name checks through their Phoenix Office if such appears desirable.

In view of the information submitted by El Paso indicating the excellent cooperation received from INS, it is not believed necessary for El Paso to discuss this matter with the INS District Director. However, if you still feel—that such a discussion would assist you in the handling of this work, the sureau has no observer.






