And who should you put next to whom at dinner? Who should be kept apart at all costs? Whose word can be trusted? Who loves to tease? Don't ask any more if people were born under a lucky star: ask were they born under a good or a bad Moon!

It's science fiction become science fact, in fact - the discovery of the Moon.

# Were You Born Under a Good Moon?

#### Were You Born Under a Good Moon?

Necromancers in the Asiatic countries, instead of relying on the Sun, as we do with our signs of the Zodiac, base their calculations on the Moon – or rather on lunar years. The question is: are you the child of a good Moon or a bad one?

The lunar year comprises twelve New Moons, with a thirteenth added every dozen years – which is why New Year in the East never falls on the same date.

As with our signs of the Zodiac, the cycle is a series of twelve – but twelve years instead of twelve months. The signs follow each other always in the same order. Each year of the cycle is represented by an animal, and this animal exercises an influence on the lives, destiny, and character of the human beings born that year.

There is of course a symbolic significance in the choice of animals: the rat is destined for the trap, the rooster has to scratch about with his beak and his claws to find his food, the goat bleats when there is not enough grass, the cat always falls on his feet, and so on. The actual choice (so the story goes) was made by Buddha, who had summoned all the beasts in creation before him one New Year, with the promise of a reward if they obeyed.

Only twelve animals turned up at this strange rendezvous, and to each of them Buddha offered a year which was to bear its name. They accepted, and the years ran, and still run, in the order in which the animals arrived: first the Rat, then the Buffalo, and then the Tiger, the Cat, the Dragon, the Snake, the Horse, the Goat, the Monkey, the Rooster, the Dog, and finally the Pig.

Nineteen-seventy was therefore the year of the Dog, 1971 the year of the Pig, 1972 the year of the Rat, and so on. And we can expect them to exercise their influence in several ways, for each animal affects not only the people born in its year but also the year itself...

So much for the legend.

It remains true in the East, nevertheless, that these signs bear an importance so crucial in the worlds of business, politics, and personal relationships, that nobody makes a move without consulting them. The year of the Fire Horse, for example (a special category occurring only once in sixty years), is reputed to be so bad for the family of a child born in it that many Asiatic women resorted to abortions in 1966 rather than bear an infant under its sign! This may seem extreme, but it must be remembered that the Moon has always been credited with an influence on human affairs – and there are certainly coincidences in this connexion that cannot be explained in scientific terms.

The man born under the sign of one of these twelve beasts will owe his strength or his weakness, his pride or his modesty, his aggressiveness or his passivity, his naïveté or his malice, to the influence of the animal controlling his life. There will of course be individual differences: from the moment of birth other in-

fluences, opposing factors, are warring with his destiny – the kind of life into which he is born, the financial status of his family, whether or not his parents were born under signs favourable to his advancement. But whether he is lapdog or hound, carthorse or racehorse, fireside tabby or alley cat, the broad sweep of his destiny will be the same and the main traits of his character will correspond.

It should be added that great differences can occur according to the season, the month, and the hour of birth, and according to whether it was a hot day or a cold one. Those born on the first day of their year will have its characteristics most marked and will have the greatest chance of success in life. This day, called the Jour du Têt in Vietnam, is the most important fête of the year, and people hang catherine wheels and firecrackers under their porches or among the branches of the biggest tree in the garden to chase away bad spirits from the house. Popular superstition has it that whatever happens to you on that day risks repeating itself throughout the year! It is recommended, therefore, not to work too hard, not to quarrel, to avoid creditors, and to keep out of the way of the Law!

This Asiatic New Year begins a little later than our own. It's a question of phases of the Moon, the cycle of years, 'extra' days to make the calendar come 'right', and so on. It would take too long to explain it here, but broadly speaking the year begins in January or February, and those born in these months may properly be either under the sign of the current Christian year or under that of the previous

one. For the rest, there is no problem: the Christian year in which they were born is the one to determine their sign.

The information on which the calculations in this book are based came to the author through the courtesy of the Vietnam embassy in Paris in 1949. Through them, M. Hoang-Xuan-Han, a professor at the Lycée Albert Sarraut in Hanoi, was kind enough to furnish the relevant dates in our calendar of the various Jours du Têt since the Christian year 1900.

But the old traditions are dying. The Japanese embassy, replying with great civility to the author's questions, pointed out that the January New Moon no longer counted in the matter of making calendars, and that, to simplify matters, the Japanese New Year was now considered to fall on the Occidental January 1st... which leaves our Capricorns and Aquarius sneatly between two stools! So far as this book is concerned, we will give the exact dates of each Asiatic year affecting them as it comes up. And in the meantime, simplified according to the Japanese system, we can say that – given 1900 as the Year of the Rat – it is easy enough for anyone (except those born in January or February) to calculate his own sign.

It is to be hoped that the study of these Oriental signs will prove interesting, and that readers may amuse themselves 'conjugating' them with our own signs of the Zodiac – for a Tiger born under the Western sign of Leo is likely to be more of a handful than one born under Pisces, and so on.

All that remains now is to hope that you, the reader, were born 'under a good Moon' – though in truth each one of these Oriental signs can carry within it the seeds of success.

The Rat is born under the sign of charm and aggression. At first sight, he seems to be calm, well balanced, gay – but watch out! Beneath this placid exterior there is hidden systematic aggression linked to constant restlessness. Stick around with the Rat for a little while, and you will soon find evidence of his anxiety, his nervousness, his quick temper.

The Rat is a creator of embarrassing situations, a niggler, sometimes a neurotic. He is always the first to grumble.

The Rat likes to be part of an in-group. He is a great party-goer and clubman, but because he enjoys gossip and scandal, he usually has more acquaintances than real friends. The fact that he himself never confides in anyone has something to do with this too: he is a self-contained man and he keeps his problems to himself.

Above all, though, the Rat is an opportunist. All

his life, he profits from everything around him: from his parents, from his friends, from his relations, from his own money as well as from that of others, from his charm...Oh, that charm! He uses it and abuses it without stopping to think.

Gambler and glutton, he does not know how to - does not wish to - deny himself anything. Paradoxically, he is always frightened of failure and afraid that he may lack the basic necessities; while living intensely in the present, he dreams of saving to assure security for his old age! The female Rat, for the same reasons, stocks up her cupboards with unnecessary provisions . . . which she proceeds to eat right away! She's the one you see at the Sales, busy buying things she doesn't need, in the hope of finding a good bargain!

The Rat, imaginative in the extreme, is sometimes a creator – but it is as a critic that he excels, and one is well advised to listen to his advice. Carried to excess, this quality can become a defect and there are certain Rats who go so far as to criticize to the point of destruction, just for pleasure.

Sometimes mean, narrow-minded, and suburban in outlook, the Rat is nevertheless honest. He has the faculty of following through anything he undertakes to the bitter end – even if the undertaking is doomed to failure! He can always make a success of his life so long as he manages to master his perpetual discontent and his insistence on living for the present.

Whatever he does, the Rat prefers to live by his wits rather than by his work. He is happier making a living by the sweat of other people's brows than by the sweat of his own. Unfortunately, though, as

soon as the Rat earns money, he spends it. He denies himself nothing – and if he ever lends money, he'll want interest on it!

At the worst, he becomes a spiv, an engaging parasite, a moneylender perhaps, or a pawnbroker. A certain laziness, a fondness for the soft life, acts as a kind of cushion for some Rats. Perhaps this is why he makes a good businessman or politician. At the same time, the Rat is able to follow an artistic course with success. He is oriented more towards the intellectual than the manual.

Profiteer though he is, the Rat is nevertheless sentimental. He can be enormously generous to the person he loves – even though his love is not reciprocated. For it is in affairs of the heart that the Rat fulfils himself. The gambler Rat, the drinker Rat, the hell-raising Rat, the greedy Rat, is also the sentimental Rat.

From the point of view of romance, the Rat would be well advised to link up with someone born under the sign of the Dragon – someone who would bring to the partnership the Dragon's strength and equilibrium, but who would benefit from the Rat's critical faculty. The Buffalo, too, makes a good partner for the Rat. With the Buffalo the Rat finds a sense of security and feels the reassurance he needs.

The Monkey truly casts a spell over the Rat – even if the Rat isn't prepared to admit it. Mr Rat will fall hopelessly, madly, head over heels in love with Miss Monkey . . . and Miss Monkey will find that great fun!

The one sign the Rat must at all costs avoid is that of the Horse. Individualistic and independent, the


Horse will not tolerate the Rat's profiteer attitude. Above all, it is catastrophic for a Rat man to marry a Fire Horse woman. Fortunately the year of the Fire Horse (1906–1966–2026) occurs only once every sixty years, which limits the damage!

Rats should also be wary of those born under the sign of the Cat, for obvious reasons!

The Rat will have a happy childhood and a carefree youth. The second part of his life, however, may be stormy and troublesome. He may lose his money in a bad business deal, or his happiness in an unfortunate love affair. The third part of his life will be comfortable, and his old age as peaceful as he could wish.

For the Rat, however, everything varies according to whether he was born in the summer or the winter of his year. In summer the lofts and granaries are full... but in winter he will be obliged to go out and forage for his food, and he must watch out for the traps set along the route. In human terms, this could mean the risk of prison or an accidental death.

Quiet and patient, diffident and slow, precise and methodical, balanced and self-effacing, the Buffalo hides an original and intelligent nature behind a façade that is downright homely. He has the gift of inspiring confidences, which is the trump card of his success.

The Buffalo is a contemplative – which is probably why he likes to be alone so often. He can pursue an ideal to the point of fanaticism. He is often a chauvinist, sometimes a bigot – one of the reasons why he is often criticized.

Despite his appearance of tranquillity, however, the Buffalo is in fact swayed by a choleric – sometimes a violent – nature. Although he is usually self-contained and introspective, the Buffalo can in times of need command a formidable eloquence. Although rare, his rages are none the less frightening for that.

It is best not to try to cross him – for he can become dangerous. And notwithstanding his placid appearance he is a stubborn beast and hates to be thwarted in anything he undertakes. It's too bad for anyone who stands in his way: he can be very mean and he spares nobody. He is a leader of men and nothing can stop him . . .

He detests anything new-fangled: it upsets the even tenor of his way. You will find him, therefore, among those railing against Picasso, modern jazz, miniskirts, and long hair for men. He will never tolerate anything like that in his family...

The Buffalo is an authoritarian. His family, in the broad sense of the word, plays one of the most important roles in his existence. But his conventionality, his sense of the traditional, forbids any innovations. Females born under this sign can be relied on to cook dutiful pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and dress exactly in the way expected of them. It's no good whatever waiting for them to display any sense of sartorial imagination.

The Buffalo is a hard worker who can produce a great output and bring prosperity to those near to him. For the Vietnamese peasant, the possession of a buffalo is a sign of wealth – but the wealth benefits nobody but the owner's immediate family.

In the home, the Buffalo is a great guy to have around, providing he is doing his own thing. In business, he can succeed in the arts, or as the brains behind a garage, a contractor's, or an estate. As he is intelligent and good with his hands at the same time, he can make a good surgeon. But, above all, he is destined for agriculture.

He should avoid trade and public service, for his relations with other people are difficult. It is desirable, too, for him to keep off professions requiring him to travel, for this upsets his inner balance and his health.

The female Buffalo wants nothing better than to stay at home. She makes a perfect housewife and a splendid hostess. She's the one, more often than not, who wears the trousers.

Unhappily, the Buffalo finds all too often that those nearest to him fail to understand him. Although he is stubborn and dogmatic, he is deeply fond of his family and proud of his children. But he requires from them a total obedience and brings them up strictly: he's the boss and his word is law! In return, he is prepared to make any sacrifice for his family. For the Buffalo, more's the pity, love is nothing

For the Buffalo, more's the pity, love is nothing more than an agreeable charade. He can be tender, devoted, sensual even – but he is never romantic. He distrusts the dalliance of lovers and is bored by the problems of passion. This materialistic attitude lies at the root of most of his disappointments in love and marriage.

People born under the sign of the Buffalo will never be jealous of their husbands or wives. But they will be jealous of their rights . . . and the fidelity of a husband or a wife is one of their rights! For their own part, they will be sentimentally faithful – but they won't attach much importance to it.

The Buffalo's childhood and youth will generally be without incident. It is in the second part of his life that he will encounter difficulties, to do with his marriage. His partner may well take offence at his

apparent indifference and seek consolation elsewhere in an attempt to find the romance so conspicuously absent at home. In such a case, if the Buffalo cannot put things right by the exercise of his intelligence, he will become so bloody-minded that he risks the ruin of his entire family. The worker, the family man, has no time for a deviation he is unable to understand. During the third part of his life, the Buffalo will suffer enormous difficulties, but if he can manage to smooth them out, his old age will be peaceful.

The Buffalo can make an ideal marriage or a perfect alliance with the Rooster – whom he will allow to shine undisturbed. The *rapport* between these two conservatives will be perfect!

All should go well with the Rat. Besotted by the Buffalo, the Rat will remain faithful until death. The Snake too, although frequently unfaithful, is wise enough to dissimulate its feelings and sentiments. In any case, the Snake will never forsake its family.

Like the Rat, the Buffalo is fascinated by the Monkey. To succeed in life, he needs the Monkey's genius for fantasy and imagination. But alas! – it will never work! The Buffalo and the Monkey will never settle down together.


Beware of the Goat, too, for different reasons. Capricious and fickle, the Goat can set the scene for a big drama because of her inconstancy.

Popular belief is adamant that the Buffalo should under no circumstances set up house with the Tiger. Such a partnership would inevitably end in strife – a battle that could terminate only with the departure or the disappearance of the Tiger: the Buffalo, the stronger of the two, would keep on charging until

the Tiger was destroyed. A Buffalo mother could never, never get on with a Tiger child. Better for the latter to leave home!

Finally, it should be said that a Buffalo born in winter will be happier than a Buffalo born in summer . . . if only because there is less work to do in the rice-fields! The summer Buffalo, poor beast, is fated to go on working doggedly throughout the year.

The Tiger is a fault-finder and a rebel. He's a hothead always revolting against authority and his superiors . . . the stuff of which revolutionaries are made. He's the ringleader type – but unfortunately, as so often happens with leaders, he doesn't always merit the confidence placed in him! He's the one who's the first to cry 'Let's go!' – but in business, as in love and war, the prudent will think a little before following him. And sometimes they will be well advised to hold him back.

For those who follow the Tiger may find themselves heading for catastrophe. He's the all-time brinkman, and sometimes he pursues his taste for foolhardiness and risk to the limits of recklessness and irresponsibility.

It is difficult, all the same, to resist him, for he is a magnetic character and his natural air of authority confers a certain prestige on him. People automatically respect him – even those working against him. Which is just as well, for the Tiger likes being obeyed but hates himself to obey. Nobody dares to tell him where to get of !!

But if ever he manages to think before he acts, if he can bring himself to listen to good advice, the Tiger can become an enormous success.

A fighter, violent and daring, he is capable of standing up for what he thinks is right – to the bitter end. He is obstinate and stubborn, contentious, and often mean, always quarrelling with someone. But although he is selfish in the little things, he is capable of great generosity, even of altruism, in the larger. Within his own terms, he is narrow-minded, and he trusts nobody.

The Tiger is always in the lead. He distrusts the status quo, he is against established authority, he is contemptuous of those who play it safe. Paradoxically, though, he can sometimes draw back when he is faced with an important decision and hesitate until it is too late.

Admirably suited to be an Army chief or a captain of industry, the Tiger will also make a redoubtable gangster, for he adores any profession that involves risks. Lady Tigers are the same in their way: they are always the first to launch a new idea, to take up arms against convention, to fight for what they believe is right.

Although the Tiger is not directly interested in money, it can happen that he makes a lot. He is above all the man of action, the man thrust by destiny into the limelight (nobody dreamed when Queen Elizabeth II was born in 1926, the year of

the Tiger, that she would one day sit upon the Throne).

In fact this warrior is sensitive, emotional, and drawn towards introspection. He is capable of great love, but he becomes too intense about it and his affairs are rarely happy. The female Tiger will have numerous adventures – and all too often they will end badly.

The Tiger can spend his life with the honest Horse, with the Dragon – who brings to the partnership strength and prudence – or with the Dog, who will stick by him through thick and thin in defence of his ideals.

The Tiger should avoid the Snake, who is too wise for him, and the Monkey, who is too mischievous. In love, as in business, the bad faith of the Monkey, so skilful at fooling him, can do a lot of harm to the Tiger.

Buffaloes, too, are out. The Buffalo is stronger than the Tiger and will keep on attacking him until he is destroyed. If there is a Tiger and a Buffalo under the same roof, the Tiger will have to quit before he is annihilated (see The Buffalo, p 25).

As for the Cat, he never succeeds in making a home with the Tiger. The popular Eastern legend has it that the Cat, to annoy the Tiger, climbs higher up a tree than the heavier Tiger can manage – from which position he carries out his business (there is a franker word but I can hardly use it in a book that children may see!) on the Tiger's muzzle. But they understand themselves just the same, for they are after all of the same feline race.

The first phase of the Tiger's life will be smooth

and without any difficulties. The second will be violent and passionate. There will be problems of all kinds to solve – money troubles, family troubles, marriage troubles, troubles in romance, nothing will be spared him! And if these problems are not handled skilfully, there may be repercussions in the third stage – which can still bring him peace and tranquillity if in fact he does reach an old age!


The life of the Tiger can be completely different according to whether he was born by night or by day. Night Tigers, especially those born around midnight, will be sheltered from the snares of life a little and their path will be less hectic than that of Tigers born after dawn, and above all those around midday. It will be a stormy life, in any case, full of dangers – but the Tiger will never be bored: night Tiger or day Tiger, he is destined to bypass the easy life!

Not that he would have it any other way. Varied, thrilling, passionate, it's the life that he wants and the life that he gets. And his love of taking risks leads him to gamble with it time after time. The Tiger is the man of sudden and violent death . . .

But he is also the man of good luck: nobody enjoys luck like the Tiger. For the people of Asia, the sign of the Tiger is a good sign. It represents the greatest power on earth and it's an emblem of protection for human life. A Tiger in the house minimizes the three great risks – thieves, fire, and evil spirits.

If there are two Tigers in the house, though, one of them has got to go!

This sign, symbolized by the Cat to the people of Vietnam, is represented by a Rabbit to the Japanese. But Cat or Rabbit, it is the animal that falls always on its feet. Cat people are the happiest, the people most certain to be happy; they are gifted, nice to be with, discreet, refined, reserved, ambitious but not too much so – and virtuous into the bargain. Nobody ignores them, for they are good company and know how to make the best of themselves.

But surely there must be a defect to go with such a deluge of good qualities?

There is, of course, and it is no less grave for being a minor one.

Those born under the sign of the Cat are superficial. And that means in its turn that the good qualities are superficial too.

The Cat loves company and company loves the

Cat. Cat people are great mixers and they adore social gatherings. The Cat is sometimes a gossip and a scandalmonger, but always with tact and discretion – which means in fact that he finds it difficult when there is something genuinely unpleasant that's got to be said.

Cats love to entertain and their homes are often beautiful for they have excellent taste. They are men of the world, sometimes snobs, perhaps, and the female Cat loves to show off her intellectuality and culture – usually newly acquired. They will study a subject in depth with the sole object of shining at it ... and ignore at the same time other things that are far more important.

The Cat is not easily provoked. He is calm, placid, pacific. Sentimental rather than truly sensitive, he is more easily moved by personal problems than by the great wrongs of the world. Famine, warfare, and other global catastrophes leave him unmoved unless his own life is touched by them – and then he is so hard hit that he finds his position intolerable and allows himself to die.

This animal cries easily – but is as quickly consoled. The wistfulness and melancholy of the females born under this sign is one of the main weapons in their armoury of charm.

Cats are conservative, hating anything that disturbs their quiet life or poses problems for them to solve. More than anyone else, they need to keep their comfort and their security.

As the Cat is cautious – perhaps even a little timid – he will undertake nothing before he has weighed the pros and cons and examined the deal

from every angle. As a result, people admire him and take him into their confidence.

Politics, diplomacy, the law all offer him equally good opportunities – provided always that he can live the tranquil life he craves within their orbit.

The females of this sign shine in all careers demanding taste, a social sense, and a flair for 'window-dressing'. A politician would be well advised to choose a wife born under the sign of the Cat: sophisticated yet discreet, she will make a marvel-lous hostess, add greatly to his lustre by being at his side – and revel in the limelight while she is there!


It seems, however, that this bad reputation is undeserved. Certainly the ancient Egyptians worshipped the Cat as if it were a god.


The sign of the Dragon brings the Four Benedictions of the East: wealth, virtue, harmony, and long life.

Snake or Serpent, he has a bad reputation in Christian countries – but in the East, on the contrary, he is well thought of, even venerated, for his wisdom, his sagacity, and his good-will.

So far as those born under his sign go, the Snake man is romantic and charming. He has a sense of humour. And the woman is usually beautiful, and successful because of it (Jacqueline Kennedy, Princess Grace of Monaco, and Queen Farah were all born under the sign of the Snake).

In Japan, those wishing to pay a woman a compliment and acknowledge her beauty are accustomed to say: 'My dear, you are a real snake!' – a pleasantry liable to be misinterpreted in the West!

The Snake dresses with a great deal of affectation and even a certain ostentation: men born under the sign always have a bit of the dandy about them, and Serpent women rave, for example, over smart accessories.

The Snake never wastes time in idle gossip. He thinks often and deeply. He is an intellectual, a philosopher, a cerebral person. Yet he could in fact dispense with his acquired wisdom, for he has an intuition that is quite remarkable – an intuition that could become, if cultivated, something very like clairvoyance. Similarly, he relies often on first impressions, on his own feelings, on his sympathies, rather than on facts, on the advice and opinions of others, or on the experience of himself and his colleagues. He seems to have a kind of sixth sense in this way.

Determined to follow through anything he undertakes to the bitter end, the Snake detests being left as it were in mid-air, and he makes his decisions quickly and firmly. The battle between the Snake and the Rooster – if they are married or associated in business or friendship – will work towards the elimination of their mutual faults.







sense and his clear-sightedness combine to cool off his ardour all too quickly. But his sense of humour saves him from disaster. Luckily for him, he knows more than anyone how to laugh at his own misfortunes and draw the necessary conclusions from them . . .



The people of Vietnam prefer to term this sign 'the Chicken' – which doesn't always meet with the approval of the boastful people born under it! That's why, along with the Japanese, we shall keep to the word Rooster, for this dreamer takes himself very seriously and he does like to be flattered . . .

The Rooster speaks his mind – he makes a virtue of it – to the point of aggressiveness. And this brutal attitude will not be without its casualties unless the offended victims overlook the rudeness deliberately on the grounds of 'frankness' or 'eccentricity'.

The victims who do this are wrong, though. Frank, the Rooster certainly is. He says what he thinks, as he thinks it, without beating about the bush – Bang! Just like that. But this frankness, far from being a desirable trait, is more than anything a kind of selfishness: the Rooster couldn't care less about other people or their feelings, and he doesn't

sec why he should take any account of them at all. Which means that there's one career barred to him for a start: diplomacy!

As for his 'eccentricity', this is only an illusion. Certainly he likes to be noticed, and he may dress a little flashily with this in mind. But at heart he is absolutely, completely, profoundly conservative – in the political as well as in the general sense.

The Rooster is convinced that he is always right and that he knows what he is doing. He confides in nobody and relies on no one but himself. He is most generous, on the other hand, with his own (unasked for) advice!

The Rooster appears to be bold, adventurous, and reckless. Don't believe a word of it! It's just that he is full to bursting with absurd and grandiose ideas that haven't a hope of being realized. He loves to dream, to meditate, to build castles in the air, to imagine himself a hero – but he is really an armchair warrior: he dreams, meditates, builds, imagines in the comfort of his home. He is an adventurer in carpet slippers, a short-sighted philosopher who isn't really equipped to improvise at all!

Don't think that this means he's a coward, though, or shy. In fact he really can be daring, given the right circumstances ... and even brave when it's absolutely necessary. He is sometimes a prey, due to his dreams of being a hero, to the kind of foolhardy courage that risks death with a smile on the lips. For this reason alone, the Rooster can make a fine soldier.

People in general find him stimulating company, but if he doesn't take care he risks unwittingly disappointing them: being something of a boaster, he always promises more than he can in fact achieve. Often brilliant, he is at his best in the crowded room and shines more in company than he does in the intimate situation.

Because he loves to dream, the Rooster risks falling at times into laziness – though his nature is to give everything to the job in hand once he starts it, and he has the reputation of being a hard worker. But he's for ever biting off more than he can chew, undertaking tasks that are beyond his strength . . . and if, after all his efforts, he still can't make it, nobody is more disappointed than he.

The Rooster is right to bustle about like this. Money isn't going to fall into his lap and he has to work for a living. But if he can control his dreaming and the cards are right, he can become rich. He has in fact the reputation of finding money in the most unlikely places, of drawing, as it were, blood from a stone. In Vietnam, they say that, thanks to the strength of his beak and claws, the Rooster can find a worm in a desert! - a simile that goes a long way to explain the continual and restless activity that characterizes him. But if by chance a Rooster allows himself to dream or idle away his time as he would like, he can easily become one of those picturesque tramps, the philosophers of the open road, that we see occasionally asleep on a bench or rooting about among the dustbins. After all, it's one way of making yourself noticed . . .

The Rooster is particularly suited to agriculture and to those professions which keep him constantly in touch with others, for he adores putting on a bit of a show. In any case, with his extravagant nature, he's going to spend anything he makes as and when he gets it. He will be likely, too, to run great risks financially, advancing all too often to the brink of bankruptcy, ruin, and disaster because he has dreamed too much. This is no opener of a savings account; he simply doesn't know how to economize!

In love, he will often do himself harm to gain or to keep the affection of the loved one. He will disappoint her often, too, for the reality will never match up to the dreams he would so much like to share with her. There's one thing in his favour, though: he really is sincere about those dreams . . .

The Rooster man likes to be in the company of women, among whom he can show off, shine, swagger, and generally demonstrate what a clever fellow he is. But he stops at women: he very rarely goes out for a 'night with the boys'. Men bore him to extinction.

The Rooster woman likes the company of other women too (though that's not to say that men bore her!), and she chooses those professions which keep her constantly in touch with them.

The Rooster will be happy with the Buffalo, so family-minded and conservative. With the Snake, he can play philosophers. In love as in business, the Snake will bring to the partnership some much-needed wisdom . . . but he'd better be careful not to shine too brightly, or the Rooster might turn on him and destroy him!

With the Dragon, a Rooster will be perfectly satisfied to bask in reflected brilliance, especially in the case of female Roosters.

As a partner, the Cat is absolutely out! He won't put up for an instant with the boasting or the gaudy raiment. He doesn't trust the Rooster an inch.

The Rooster will touch the heights and the depths during the three phases of his life, business-wise as well as romantically. He will go from poverty to riches, from ideal love to the most sordid of emotional tangles. His old age will be happy, however.

Legend has it in the East that two Roosters under the same roof make life intolerable for everyone else. As 1969 was the Year of the Rooster, let us hope that those wives with one Cock already in the yard remembered about the Pill...

# THE DOG - man of the Left in the right

The Dog is a worrier. Always on the defensive, he never lets up for an instant . . . there he is, on guard, at the alert, watching.

The Dog is an introvert. He rarely shows his feelings, and when he does it's only because he thinks it's absolutely necessary. He's stubborn in the extreme and he knows what he wants. Frequently cynical, he is feared for his sharp tongue and his acid and disagreeable remarks.

The Dog is the original character who couldn't see the wood for the trees: he has a tendency to drown himself in details, to criticize things out of turn – and at every turn! He gives the impression of looking systematically for faults in everything he touches. This is because in reality he is the world's biggest pessimist and he expects nothing out of life.

He's always the first to speak out against injustice, often in circumstances requiring courage to do so.

He's perhaps a little blasé, but his critical spirit, his sense of ridicule, and his undeniable grandeur of soul save him from any accusation of small-mindedness.

At heart, the Dog is anti-social and he loathes crowds and all kinds of gatherings. Romantically, he gives the impression of being a cold fish (if you'll excuse the expression!) but this appearance is misleading: it's just that he's anxious and he doubts his own feelings as he does those of others. Despite all these faults, however, it is in the Dog that we find united all the noblest traits of human nature. Loyal, faithful, honest, he has the most profound sense of duty. You can count on him and he'll never let you down. He knows better than anyone how to keep a secret, for his discretion is complete. In fact, he detests confidences at any price, whether he's giving them or receiving them.

The Dog's conversation tends to be banal and sometimes he expresses himself badly. He rarely shines in company – but his intelligence is profound for all that, and nobody knows how to listen as he does . . .

As a character, the Dog inspires confidence in others – and the confidence is justified. He will always do his utmost for them, and his dedication can go to the point of sacrifice. People as a rule hold him in the highest esteem, and they're right, for he deserves it!

Throughout history, the champions of justice have always been born under the sign of the Dog. Every kind of injustice sickens the Dog, and he won't rest until he's done everything he possibly can to right it. (Brigitte Bardot, born in 1934, once ran a single-

handed campaign to alleviate conditions for animals in slaughterhouses.) The Dog suffers for the sins of others. He suffers when there are wars, when there are disasters, when there are breakdowns of any kind, when there are unemployed; he suffers with the hungry of the world; he suffers for what's happened, for what's happening now, and for what may happen tomorrow. Luckily, it's not often that the Dog champions an unworthy cause – for thanks to his very doggedness (if you'll excuse us again!) he almost always gets what he wants.

Philosopher, moralist, man of the Left, the Dog couldn't care less about money. When he has it, he's generous with it and detached about it. It really doesn't interest him. Whether he's a lapdog or a stray, there's always a touch of the hippy about him, and it doesn't worry him at all to be without the material comforts. Even if he's in the money, his tastes are simple enough. (But if by any chance he should suddenly and urgently need money, nobody is better equipped than he is to get it!)

The loyal Dog makes a splendid captain of in-

The loyal Dog makes a splendid captain of industry, an active trade union leader, a priest, an educator. But whatever his career, it will have in him a spokesman whose ideals will be profound and often original. He can handle men if necessary, too—and nations would do well to follow such champions, for under no other sign do we find united in the same person such uprightness, rectitude, and passion for work allied to so little personal ambition.

In love, too, the Dog is honest and straightforward. But he will have romantic problems all his life . . . it's his own fault, really: he provokes them himself by his emotional instability and his eternal anxiety. Like we said - he's a worrier.

The Dog can be happy with the Horse, who will let him get on with his Causes in exchange for a little independence. With the Tiger, life becomes a battle – the two of them against the rest of the world. United, they will adventure together in the name of truth and justice. The Dog in fact, in the nature of things, often finds himself teamed with the Tiger – and he'll play a very able second fiddle to the Tiger while remaining himself in the shade. But it is with the placid and serene Cat that the Dog has his biggest chance of finding peace and quiet if he wants it.


The Dragon is too proud to accept the Dog's caustic comments and critical approach. And as for the Goat – it's the Dog himself who won't tolerate people born under *that* sign! He's no time for her whims and he finds her selfish and superficial.

Chivalrous (and that's the bitter end for a Pig, let's face it!), gallant, obliging, scrupulous to a fault, the Pig flourishes day and night the banner of correctitude and purity. Put your trust in him: he won't let you down and he'll never try to. He is naïve, innocent, confident, defenceless – a bit of a mug, in fact, if you want to be brutal about it.

To tell the truth, the Pig allows himself to be duped easily, accepts his own faults calmly, and those of others with tolerant understanding. Always the best of sports, he can never summon up a true competitive spirit himself. He's much too impartial to be sure that he's right himself, and he will keep on asking himself questions about the honesty (or loyalty) of what he can do and what he ought to do. He is incredibly sincere (to the point, sometimes, of doing himself harm) and the bad faith of others is always disarming him. He himself lies rarely – and

then only to defend himself. Though he is intelligent he is a bit of a dunce about money, and as often as not he is downright clumsy in financial matters. Powerless against hypocrisy, he will often crucify himself in an attempt to justify his actions. He is an absolutely straight dealer and it's very rarely that he will accept a compromise.

Ironically he, who believes without question whatever anyone tells him, is always finding it necessary to produce proof of what he himself asserts!

The Pig's a splendid companion (often, strangely enough, sailing pretty near the wind, and game for a risqué evening!). He doesn't say much – but when he does decide to speak, suddenly the barriers are down and nothing can stop him until the subject's exhausted . . .

Like the Monkey, the Pig is intellectual – a character with a great thirst for knowledge. He reads a lot ... but he reads anything that happens to be around. He appears to be well read, but in fact most of his knowledge is only superficial. If you were to test the depth of his understanding, you would soon find that it didn't go very deep. A Japanese proverb says that the Pig is 'wide of face but narrow in the back'.

He's a materialist for all that – a good-liver and often a sensualist.

Under his deceptive air of sweet reasonableness, the Pig hides plenty of will-power and authority.

Whatever his ambitions may be, whatever the tasks and the goals he has set himself, he will do his duty with all the strength he is capable of – and that same strength can be an inner force to be reckoned

with, a force that nothing can oppose. Once a Pig has come to a decision, nothing can stop him carrying it out ... but before he arrives at it, he spends ages weighing the pros and cons – which sometimes gives the impression that he is indecisive and doesn't know what he wants. Nothing could be farther from the truth, but to make quite sure that he is avoiding any possible complications, he will sometimes ponder for so long that he destroys his own case.

Don't ever count on the apparent weakness of a Pig, though: it's just that he's a pacifist at heart!

The Pig has few friends, but those he does have he keeps all his life; for them, he is capable of the greatest sacrifices. He is extremely considerate of the chosen few who do merit his affection. The women of this sign like nothing better than to make presents for people and organize parties. They are marvellous hostesses.

The Pig's character, despite all this talk of impartiality, is a lively one and he would flare up often enough – if he didn't hate so much to quarrel (or even have a discussion!). As a rule, he prefers to give way in an argument, or pretend to change his views, rather than thrash it out. He won't even talk unless he likes you, and it's an honour if he condescends to argue!

One consequence of this is that the Pig, less than anybody, indulges in court cases. He's right too, because no matter how good his case is, his impulsiveness and honesty will always work against him to the advantage of those less scrupulous (we will leave to certain Asiatics the cynical reflection that, in order to win a court case, it is better to throw

honesty, scrupulousness, and spontaneity out the window!).

The Pig can work in any walk of life, where his conscientiousness and aptitude for hard work will make him a success. Thanks to his basic sensitivity, he can do equally well in the arts – poetry, for example, or literature.

He can just as easily go to the dogs, however. One of his least sympathetic traits is that, once he does begin to take a turn for the worse, he'll end up wallowing in the mud and indulging in excesses of every kind.

From a material point of view, the Pig will always find, no matter what career he has chosen, that he's not short of the necessities of life. Work and money in sufficient quantities seem to gravitate towards him without his having to make any particular effort. People will help him all his life – and thanks to this help he will be able, if he wishes, to reach the highest spheres in the financial world.

Popular superstition says in the East that people help him thus – bringing him his daily bread, as it were – just to fatten him up so that he will make a better meal over the New Year! They say that because of this he is over-wary and trusts nobody. Be that as it may, people certainly tend to take advantage of his credulity . . .

Much the same may be said for his love life. He will often be deceived, often disappointed, often made a fool of . . . and often loved. The female Pig will make a good mother.

Pigs would be well advised to share their lives with those born under the sign of the Cat: for them, that's the surest way of avoiding discussion!

They must keep out of the clutches of the Snake. A Snake will make a complete slave out of a Pig in no time, enmeshing the Pig in his coils to the extent that the poor Pig loses all power of movement!

The Goat will take advantage of him.

The first phase of the Pig's life will be relatively calm. During the second, every conceivable conjugal problem will be visited on him. But whatever his troubles, the Pig, discreet and shy, will never ask anybody else for help; he'll try to get out of the mess by himself. In fact this reluctance to wear his heart on his sleeve may do him positive harm, for nobody will even suspect the hell he's going through . . .

If his birth-date is a long time before the traditional feasts, he will escape a lot of the disappointments in store for him – but the closer it is to the Asiatic New Year, the more he will be betrayed, ridiculed, duped, and perhaps, in the long run . . . eaten!

Perhaps that's the secret of the famous story of the three little pigs!

# Blue Moons and Red Moons

#### Blue Moons and Red Moons

We have taken the trouble to investigate the signs of a number of famous people, following our establishment of the various characteristics of each sign. The results, at times surprising and at times unexpected gave us food for thought. The fact remains that one must always take into account, when dealing with such men and women, the exceptional nature of their characters – which may sometimes underline the broader qualities associated with their particular sign, and at other times exaggerate the faults of the sign to the point where they become destructive.

#### THE RAT

The first fact that emerged was the great number of famous writers born under this sign. Without even pausing to look them up, we can quote you some off the cuff: Shakespeare, Racine, George Sand, Tolstoy, Defoe, Jules Verne, Daudet, Katherine Mansfield, Charlotte Brontë, Antoine de St Exupéry, Eugene Ionesco. No other sign offers such a starstudded selection of men and women of letters (except possibly the Snake, but then those are all specialists in philosophy) – which must be encouraging for would-be writer Rats!

More surprising among these rodents is the pre-More surprising among these rodents is the presence of Mozart, Louis Armstrong, and Maurice Chevalier. We should have been happier, too, putting Charlotte Corday and Mata Hari among the Tigers – but they are Rats. And like Rats, they have fallen into the traps laid for them ... Lucrezia Borgia, on the other hand, was a Rat exemplifying the negative aspects of this sign.

Other Rats: Winston Churchill, Pablo Casals, the painter Toulouse-Lautree Himmler Enoch

the painter Toulouse-Lautrec, Himmler, Enoch Powell.

#### THE BUFFALO

Buffalo people never belie their reputation for authority and sectarianism. So far as famous Buffalo are concerned, all we have to do is replace the word 'family' in our appreciation with the word 'nation'. Statesmen, war leaders, and dictators all find themselves under this sign that is at the same time authoritarian yet paternalist. They include Hitler, Zapata, Geronimo, Clemenceau, Vercingetorix, and Napoleon (whose brothers and sisters were aptly enough under the opportunist, profiteer signs of the Rat or the Goat!). Beside them, more on the side of the angels, Lafayette, Nchru, Louis XIII, and Richard the Lionheart.

Among the women of this sign, the Marquise de Pompadour seems to be a typical Buffalo. She had the reputation of being able to keep her house in order!

More surprising is the presence of Van Gogh, Jean Cocteau, Rubens - though to be sure there do exist reasons for believing them in some respects to be conservative . . .

Other Buffalo: Aristotle, Charlie Chaplin, Archbishop Makarios, Dante, the painter Auguste Renoir, Peter Sellers, Richard Burton, Johann Sebastian Bach.

#### THE TIGER

We can only bow down before the exceptional character of the men and women whose lives were ruled by this sign. Among the latter we find Lola Montez, Isadora Duncan, Emily Brontë, Marilyn Monroe – all of them women who died young in dramatic circumstances. Among the men are Robespierre, Bayard (the 'gentil parfitt knight'), and St Francis Xavier (there are a number of saints among the Tigers; others among the Dogs, the Dragons, the Pigs; few among Snakes, Cats, or Horses; none that we know of among Buffaloes, Rats, Goats, or Monkeys).

Beside those whose lives were accidentally or unexpectedly cut short, there are several great fighters – Mahommed, Molotov, Ho Chi Minh, Louis XIV, Karl Marx, Eisenhower, Bolivar, and De Gaulle – and a few passionate natures including Beethoven. Other Tigers: Marco Polo, Tiberius Caesar,

Other Tigers: Marco Polo, Tiberius Caesar, Charles Lindbergh, St Dominique, and Alec Guinness.

#### THE CAT

Cats get their big opportunity in politics: Fidel Castro (of whom one can hardly say that he cannot cope with unusual situations!), President Trujillo, Queen Victoria, Stalin, Catherine de Medici, President Bourguiba. They can also be philosophers of a kind, or theologians, such as Martin Luther or Confucius or Malcolm Muggeridge.

But can we say that Marie-Antoinette, Anne Boleyn, Eva Perón, or Garibaldi did a particularly good job of coping with exceptional circumstances? Certainly we can surmise that, born under another sign, they might well have enjoyed a destiny different and more advantageous than the one they drew ...

Other Cats: Pirandello, Einstein, Orson Welles, Toscanini, Field Marshal Slim, Arthur Miller, Stendhal, and the creator of Maigret, Georges Simenon.

#### THE DRAGON

There is always something a little too bright, something of the conjuring trick, about our Dragon. The great actresses of the past – Bernhardt, Rachel, Mary Pickford – were Dragons. Beside them, grasping their success with both hands: Salvador Dali, Freud, Rostand, Edward Heath and Harold Wilson, Joan of Arc. And in all these cases, if you want to find it, you can see something a little larger than life, a little too loud, a little too exaggerated – something that makes us think of that carnival beast that we burn at the New Year . . .

Among the Dragons, we are astonished to discover ... Jesus Christ! But maybe, as some people say, he was actually born in 4 BC ...

Other Dragons: Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Barbara Cartland, John Gielgud, Bernard Shaw, Danton, Marshal Tito, Ste Bernadette, Napoleon III, Marshal Pétain.

#### THE SNAKE

It's among the Snakes that we find the savants, the philosophers, the wise men, the thinkers – Darwin, Montaigne, Copernicus, Calvin, Gandhi, Mao Tsetung, Arthur C. Clarke, Montesquieu – and the idealists such as Kennedy, Louis Braille, Lincoln, and Baden-Powell. Here, too, are beautiful women like Mme de Montespan and Queen Astrid, and writers of romances such as André Gide, Flaubert, Edgar Allan Poe.

But you have to know their intimate as well as their public lives to decide whether they are true to their sign or not. One question certainly prompts itself in respect of the above list: were Kennedy and Queen Astrid born on a stormy day?

Other Snakes: Picasso, Schubert, Nasser, Baudelaire, Brahms.

#### THE HORSE

First of all the Fire Horse – and here the list includes Cicero, Rembrandt, Corneille . . . and Davy Crockett!

Charlemagne, Roosevelt, Kruschev, Huxley,

Herzog – all of them workers, popular, full-blooded, egotistical – were born under the sign of the Horse. At their side, surprisingly: Pasteur.

It is said that the Horse will jeopardize his life for love. Mme de Brinvilliers poisoned for love. Edward VIII abdicated . . .

Other Horses: Delacroix, Newton, Georges Braque, Buffalo Bill, King Baudouin.

#### THE GOAT

Plenty of actors and artists among the capricious, temperamental Goats: Douglas Fairbanks, Sir Malcolm Sargent, Rudolph Valentino, Tino Rossi, Françoise Arnoul, Laurence Olivier . . . and then Michelangelo succeeded thanks to his patrons, and Balzac very often through the generosity of his mother. Diane de Poitiers became a courtesan . . .

We find under this sign too (a little more subtly): John Ford, Mussolini, Claudette Colbert, Cesare Borgia.

Other Goats: Théophile Gautier, Cervantes, the film director H. G. Clouzot.

#### THE MONKEY

We have to admit that the majority of men in politics were born under the sign of the Monkey. For instance: Lyndon Johnson, Poincaré, Daladier, Truman, Julius Caesar, Chamberlain.

Under the same sign we find three painters -Leonardo da Vinci, Modigliani, Gauguin - and several poets or writers - Milton, Byron, Dickens and Alexandre Dumas.

We also find the Marquis de Sade . . .

Did they all have a fantastic memory, incredible charm, and a conscience that was 'elastic'? Maybe ... but what we can say is that most of them did in fact die solitary deaths.

Other Monkeys: Buster Keaton, Captain Cook, Michèle Morgan, Elizabeth Taylor, the great documentary film-maker Robert Flaherty.

#### THE ROOSTER

Roosters, it is well known, like to strut about and wear uniform – and so we are not surprised to find under this sign Richelieu, Goebbels, Kléber, and Raymond Oliver. Other characteristics of the Rooster are exemplified in Maria de Medici and Paul VI.

Other Roosters: François Mauriac, André Maurois, William Faulkner, Wagner, Descartes, Kipling, La Fontaine, the authoress Colette, and Clyde (of Bonnie and Clyde, perhaps the most typical of all).

#### THE DOG

It's under this sign that we find all the champions of justice, as we might expect. Here are Bertolt Brecht, Lenin, Voltaire, Socrates, Molière, Léon Blum . . .

What else can we say? Anxiety, cynicism, lucidity, detachment, acid comments – they are all there in one guise or another. It's true that the presence of

Rasputin among the Dogs is a surprise - but what do we know of a man's inner character . . .?

Other Dogs: Proust, Yuri Gagarin, Feydeau, de Maupassant, Louis XVI.

#### THE PIG

As for the good old Pig, he doesn't belie his reputation of never being in need: the first Rothschild, the first Rockefeller, and the first Ford were all Pigs! So, for that matter, was St Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits...

By their sides we find Federico Garcia Lorca, François Villon, Dr Albert Schweitzer – all of them men of good-will, all of them to some extent dupes or scapegoats, all of them in a way losers. We find firm and authoritarian men like Pascal, Le Corbusier, Field-Marshal Montgomery, Marshal Foch, and Georges Pompidou; we find those like Henry VIII and Bismarck, who roll about in the mud to besmirch themselves. None of them were ever in need...

Other Pigs: Oliver Cromwell, Mme de Maintenon, Françoise Sagan.

We leave you the result of this small piece of research in the hope that it will make you think – and that it will inspire you to look up the birthdates of your own idols, your friends and relations, and those famous men and women whom you most admire.

Try to find out more about the examples we have given in the previous pages. Think, too, of their month of birth – for even in the Eastern horoscope the sun has his say. And you can cross-check with our own Zodiacal signs through the chart at the end of the book.

Enjoy yourself, anyway! The Sun has a date with the Moon!

#### Conclusion

These Asiatic horoscopes are as old as our own and enjoy the same reputation in the countries of the East as those based on the monthly signs of the Zodiac do in the West.

For centuries, seven hundred millions of Chinese built their lives around the forecasts of their particular horoscope, especially those given in the so-called Imperial Almanac. In this publication, each year specialized and detailed predictions forecast the future for each sign and for the year as a whole. Alongside these were long-range meteorological forecasts, formulae for conciliating the spirits, lists of forbidden things to do in that year, and recipes for medicine, magic, and . . . the kitchen!

It was in any case well known that certain signs were absolutely incompatible one with another, and the 'forbidden things' lists were explicit in their refusal to tolerate the marriage of a Tiger with a Buffalo, a Horse with a Rat, and so on.

Such beliefs would have repercussions on family life, on friendships, on business, and in politics. Who knows what broken romances, what ruined business deals, what political careers compromised were the result of consulting these horoscopes!

But what is their position in present-day China, the land of the Five-Year Plan and the Red Guard? Mao has forbidden them; the fact that he was

born under the sign of the Snake leaves us wondering . . .

But since we are not Chinese, there is nothing to stop us amusing ourselves with this age-old game which has, it seems, a great deal of truth in it.

Don't do any business, don't begin any friendships or adventures, without consulting these tables and charts – but don't take it too seriously either: it is only a game, and it's not going to affect your destiny!

But if you attach an equal importance to the signs of the Zodiac, as we have already said, there is nothing to stop you 'conjugating' the two horoscopes and making a cross-reference between them.

Perhaps you will, between the two of them, recognize yourself!

# Appendices

#### THE VIETNAMESE CALENDAR

The year 1970 is the 4607th year of the lunar calendar adopted in 2637 BC by the Sino-Vietnamese races. This calendar is calculated in sixty-year cycles and is now in its 77th cycle – which started in 1924 and will end in 1984. Every year of 355 days is placed under the sign of one of the twelve animals of the oriental 'zodiac'. At the same time, each cycle is further subdivided into six series of ten years each.

Take, for example, the Christian year 1900, the first in the tables over the page. The day in our calendar corresponding to the New Year Jour du Têt in the cyclic calendar – last column: Cauh-Ti': 7th Rat in the cycle of 60, divided into six series of 10, ie, No 37 in the cycle – is January 31st.

The central column marked with an 'm' indicates if the relevant cyclic year is with or without an intercalary month. Where this is so marked, the number in the column refers to the month affected.

problems enough to keep the Horse in love, and the Goat will enjoy the security.

#### ... and he's a Goat:

A beatnik's life! What will they live on while they wait for a rich patron or the bailiffs? Lassitude, luckily!

### ... and he's a Monkey:

If the Monkey is loaded, why not? She'll keep him amused, after all!

#### ... and he's a Rooster:

No. The Goat isn't used to living off love and water. Working's not her business - and watching him work just bores her.

### ... and he's a Dog:

No! Which of them would have the first nervous breakdown?

## ... and he's a Pig:

As the Pig often enough has plenty of money, the Goat's happy. But how long will it be before he can get her under control?

# If she's a Monkey . . .

#### ... and he's a Rat:

The Monkey will be happy with the Rat. The

Rat is fascinated by the Monkey and will forgive her anything.

#### ... and he's a Buffalo:

The Buffalo loves the Monkey. He, too, will make plenty of concessions – but although he forgives, he will suffer.

### ... and he's a Tiger:

Difficult ... but it might work if the Tiger goes off on his adventures. She will always know how to charm him back.

#### ... and he's a Cat:

Amusing – though often at other people's expense. They find great pleasure in each other.

### ... and he's a Dragon:

Good. The Monkey will always have good advice for the over-confident Dragon – and in exchange, the Dragon will protect her.

#### ... and he's a Snake:

Only intelligence and cleverness could save such a union. And even then . . .

#### ... and he's a Horse:

Not advised. They'll never understand each other.

### ... and he's a Goat:

The Monkey could probably get away with

it. But would she ever have the idiocv to contemplate teaming up with a Goat?

## ... and he's a Monkey:

Total complicity here. They could go far.

#### ... and he's a Rooster:

The Monkey can get a lot from the Rooster, but the bird will be unhappy – and the Monkey will remain unsatisfied.

## ... and he's a Dog:

Maybe ... with reservations. They are both cynical and without illusion.

## ... and he's a Pig:

Why ever not? The Monkey admires the Pig.

## If she's a Rooster . .

### ... and he's a Rat:

M'hm'n...But the amorous Rat is patient, and though she's a spendthrift Madam Rooster has some good qualities.

### ... and he's a Buffalo:

Perfect accord. The Rooster scintillates in peace – at the heart of her family!

## ... and he's a Tiger:

Lady bird will be outshone by her Tiger. She'll not know what to do.

#### ... and he's a Cat:

The Cat won't want to put up with the Rooster's air in 'his' house. And the lady will make scenes because she likes to go out.

### ... and he's a Dragon:

Good. The Rooster profits from the Dragon's success – which becomes hers!

#### . . . and he's a Snake:

Omens favourable. They'll play philosophers together. And one complements the other.

#### ... and he's a Horse:

If they must ... but not for always. The Rooster will get hurt.

### ... and he's a Goat:

Not advised. They'll both be unhappy. . . even if they pretend.

### ... and he's a Monkey:

The Monkey can make fun of the Rooster all the time – and the Rooster will never catch on. That's what's important!

### ... and he's a Rooster:

Life would be impossible! Scenes and tantrums guaranteed all the time.

### ... and he's a Dog:

Only if it's absolutely necessary. Let the lady organize tea parties and bridge games, and all may be well!

## ... and he's a Pig:

The Pig is patient, tolerant, even indulgent. It could work.

# If she's a Dog . . .

### ... and he's a Rat:

Interesting. It could work if the Rat is not too often at home. The female Dog will hover if he is.

### ... and he's a Buffalo:

Some difficulty here. The Dog is a rebel and the Buffalo a reactionary. They don't think the same way about things.

## ... and he's a Tiger:

This could be good. They would share the same ideals, fight the same battles. But they might forget to love each other.

### ... and he's a Cat:

Fine, as long as they keep it cool. But every time the Dog devotes herself to a Cause, life will become impossible for the Cat.

## ... and he's a Dragon:

The Dog, too much of a realist, will see the proud Dragon as he really is. And will discourage him. So they'll both be unhappy.

### ... and he's a Snake:

The Snake can do his own thing. And if the Dog is enslaved by him, she won't care anyway.

### ... and he's a Horse:

Yes, why not? Preoccupied with her ideals, the Dog will gladly give her independence to the Horse . . . and she's not jealous.

### ... and he's a Goat:

No! This would be too much! They're both too pessimistic. It would be sad.

### ... and he's a Monkey:

Not advised. The Dog would suffer. She's too much of an idealist.

### ... and he's a Rooster:

No. The Dog's not very good at suffering fools. Her cynicism would out.

## ... and he's a Dog:

Yes ... but they're too cool altogether, and they'd have money troubles.

### ... and he's a Pig:

Great. Love based on mutual understanding and esteem.

# If she's a Pig . . .

### ... and he's a Rat:

Good. Gamblers and intellectuals at the same time, the Rat and the Pig could be happy together.

### ... and he's a Buffalo:

The Pig will put up with anything . . . except austerity. And, in the long run, she's always the courage to start again.

### ... and he's a Tiger:

The Pig understands and esteems the Tiger. The Tiger risks exhausting her, but she's big enough to look after herself.

#### ... and he's a Cat:

Good, very good – as long as the Pig controls that love of low life!

## ... and he's a Dragon:

Yes. The Pig knows how to flatter and charm. She's so nice, and she wants so much to please!

### ... and he's a Snake:

Good old Pig! Poor old Pig! She'll end up by being suffocated.

### ... and he's a Horse:

The Horse, egoist that he is, takes advantage of the Pig. She'll be unhappy.

#### ... and he's a Goat:

As long as he doesn't go beyond all bounds, the Pig will put up with the Goat. The Goat, thus, will become impossible.

### ... and he's a Monkey:

This could work. It's so easy to put one over on a Pig that the Monkey can't be bothered: it would give him no pleasure. Besides, he thinks a lot of the Pig.

#### ... and he's a Rooster:

Too forceful, the Rooster tires the Pig out. They're not well matched.

## ... and he's a Dog:

Good. The Pig's love of living balances the Dog's asceticism. Both of them are generous – and, as we know, the Pig is often rich.

## ... and he's a Pig:

A good match. They'll both make concessions – and they'll get on famously.

## How they get on if the parent is a Rat . . .

### ... and the child's a Rat:

A few disputes of little account – but all's well that ends well!

#### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

Okay. Whatever the Rat says, the Buffalo will lend an ear.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

Father Rat can contribute nothing at all for Baby Tiger.

### ... and the child's a Cat:

The Rat parents are frightened of their Cat child - with reason!

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

The Rats will be outshone; the Dragon will be condescending.

### ... and the child's a Snake:

The Snake will have it all his own way – but so nicely and with such charm.

#### ... and the child's a Horse:

The Horse will rear up in the shafts. He'll leave home very young because Father (or Mother) Rat gets on his nerves so much.

#### ... and the child's a Goat:

Oh-oh!... But Father Rat can always see the point of view of a Goat daughter.

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

Baby Monkey will be adored and spoiled, especially if the child is a boy and it's the Mother who is a Rat. But is this a good thing?

... and the child's a Rooster:

H'mn . . . Lots of arguments here. But they'll get there in the end. That Rooster's *such* a nice boy

... and the child's a Dog:

Incomprehension! There's not a single idea in common. The Dog will do his duty, nevertheless, as always.

... and the child's a Pig:

They could be accomplices – especially Father and Daughter. And the Rat's aggression falls a bit flat!

## If the parent is a Buffalo . . .

. . . and the child's a Rat:

The Buffalo is bossy and the Rat's aggressive – but they get on famously.

... and the child's a Buffalo:

Problems of authority here! The child revolts, but ends by obeying!

... and the child's a Tiger:

Impossible! The Tiger must get out as soon as possible, or the Buffalo – Mother or Father – will destroy him.

... and the child's a Cat:

The Cat's a diplomat. It laughs at authority but pretends to obey!

... and the child's a Dragon:

No – the Dragon tends to regard those responsible for his existence as idiots (especially if it's the Father who is a Buffalo).

... and the child's a Snake:

The Snake is smart enough to do what he's told - or seem to.

... and the child's a Horse:

No! The Horse can't stand being told what to do. He'll be off – for ever!

... and the child's a Goat:

A hundred times no! Discontented Buffalo plus unhappy Goat equals a mess!

... and the child's a Monkey:

Yes – the Buffalo allows himself to be twisted around the Monkey's finger.

... and the child's a Rooster:

Yes - the Rooster will put up with authority if he's allowed to strut.

... and the child's a Dog:

No. They will get on each other's nerves. The Buffalo cannot tolerate people who stand up to him and argue.

### ... and the child's a Pig:

The Pig likes to help – but he's not very good at putting up with a higher authority that must be blindly obeyed. He'll rebel.

## If the parent is a Tiger . . .

### ... and the child's a Rat:

The Tiger couldn't care less what the Rat does.

### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

Better for the Tiger to arrange to get rid of the Buffalo who will destroy him (boarding school? relatives?). The Tiger will suffer.

## ... and the child's a Tiger:

Two Tigers cannot live under the same roof! (Tiger parents are advised to think seriously about The Pill in the Year of the Tiger).

### ... and the child's a Cat:

The obedient-seeming Cat will in reality be sticking up two fingers!

# ... and the child's a Dragon:

Everything in favour of this combination for bringing out the best in the child!

... and the child's a Snake:

Total misunderstanding, though the Snake makes praiseworthy efforts.

... and the child's a Horse:

Sparks fly between these two headstrong types – but there's plenty of love and respect as well.

... and the child's a Goat:

The Goat, too often punished, will be unable to flourish in such a strict atmosphere.

... and the child's a Monkey:

The Tiger will often be made fun of – but the Monkey had better watch out that it doesn't go too far!

... and the child's a Rooster:

This baby chick doesn't make too much impression on the Tiger – but the Tiger makes plenty on the young Rooster!

... and the child's a Dog:

Ideal! Idyllic! A perfect accord that will last through ruin, disaster, and even until death if necessary.

... and the child's a Pig:

Even if the Tiger is pig-headed, the Pig will forgive a lot because he is so generous.

# If the parent is a Cat . . .

#### ... and the child's a Rat:

The Cat plays with the mouse. And while the Cat's away ...! So the chances of success are (shall we say?) slim.

#### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

The Cat regards this strange child with astonishment – and anxiety. In fact the Cat can't stop teasing the child.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

Not too bad. A sense of humour – even if it does mean wounding the Tiger in his self-respect – will go a long way!

#### ... and the Child's a Cat:

How well they'll get on together! No problems here!

## ... and the child's a Dragon:

On one condition (that the Dragon leaves well enough alone at home and doesn't fuss), the Cat is prepared to tolerate the brilliance of its child.

#### ... and the child's a Snake:

It'll do. There'll be a lot of talk and they'll end up friends. These fraternal relations will please the Cat.

... and the child's a Horse:

The Cat is known for his peaceful nature. Why can't he let the Horse have his own way?

... and the child's a Goat:

Good for the Goat! The Cat helps, understands – and admires!

... and the child's a Monkey:

Baby Monkey knows who to talk to now. (It's difficult to deceive a Cat!)

... and the child's a Rooster:

The Cat never takes the Rooster seriously. It likes the fine feathers as little as the crowing.

... and the child's a Dog:

Calm and peaceful Pussy makes the Dog very happy. Excellent if Mum is a Cat.

... and the child's a Pig:

Perhaps – but the sentimental Pig suffers from the Cat's indifference.

## If the parent is a Dragon . . .

... and the child's a Rat:

The Dragon asks a little too much of its children. But, one way or another, it all ends up working well enough.

... and the child's a Buffalo:

The Buffalo does its best to satisfy the Dragon – but it's difficult. The Dragon likes a bit of a show, and the Buffalo, let's face it, is an introvert and a bit of a dull dog!

... and the child's a Tiger:

Good. The Dragon enjoys a bit of prestige in the world of the Tiger – so the Tiger will listen to him.

... and the child's a Cat:

The Dragon may be a little disappointed by the apparent lack of ambition in the Cat, but there will be no problems.

... and the child's a Dragon:

Very good! Each will be proud of the other!

... and the child's a Snake:

Yes. The Snake is wise to the Dragon and understands him – even though he's not going to be taken in himself!

... and the child's a Horse:

Certain problems – but all's well that ends well.

... and the child's a Goat:

Proud of junior's artistic nature, the Dragon will help the Goat a lot.

... and the child's a Monkey:

Good relationship. The Dragon brings to the

Monkey its wisdom and experience if the Monkey needs any!

### ... and the child's a Rooster:

The Rooster obeys blindly, so the Dragon is happy! Very good!

### ... and the child's a Dog:

No – the Dog doesn't have for the Dragon the admiration that the latter considers to be his due.

### ... and the child's a Pig:

Yes. The Dragon can be useful to the Pig. doing everything in its power to assure Master P's success.

## If the parent is a Snake . . .

### ... and the child's a Rat:

The Snake loves his family – and the Rat is far from displeasing him!

### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

Wisely, the Snake does all he can. But it's a hard life!

## ... and the child's a Tiger:

Problems here for the Snake: all that serpen-

tine intelligence is needed if we're going to find out how the Tiger ticks!

#### ... and the child's a Cat:

Yes – but watch out! Mum's possessive, and Dad keeps to himself!

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

Yes. The Snake understands the Dragon.

## ... and the child's a Snake:

Which one ensnares the other? Better for the young Snake to get married as early as possible. Afterwards, it'll be too late!

#### ... and the child's a Horse:

The Horse's independence poses problems for both sides!

### ... and the child's a Goat:

Fair enough, providing the family is comfortably off.

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

Huh! It's going to be 'Right, Monkey!' again – as it always is.

#### ... and the child's a Rooster:

They understand each other very well. The Rooster is flattered to consider himself indispensable – even at the price of his own liberty.

### ... and the child's a Dog:

They're no earthly use to each other.

### ... and the child's a Pig:

The Pig has to take great care not to find himself immobilized!

## If the parent is a Horse . . .

### ... and the Child's a Rat:

Catastrophic! Especially if the mother is a Horse. Storm in the family!

### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

No! When mama and papa Horse insist on having their way, baby Buffalo never forgives them. He doesn't understand.

## ... and the child's a Tiger:

Fair enough. The Horse leaves his little Tiger some independence and loves him too.

### ... and the child's a Cat:

The Horse has other fish to fry – the kittens will be left in peace!

## ... and the child's a Dragon:

Whatever happens, all will be well. Each will live his own life.

### ... and the child's a Snake:

Baby Snake will judge his father or mother

severely – and put them in the wrong in case of conflict.

#### ... and the child's a Horse:

They understand each other so well that it could mean trouble: each counts on the other too much, perhaps.

#### ... and the child's a Goat:

Okay. The kid will be happy - but he won't get much help!

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

Nobody could care less! No problems here, then.

### ... and the child's a Rooster:

The baby chick will be disappointed and will find wanting his father or mother. And they'll just laugh at him.

### ... and the child's a Dog:

The Dog finds it hard to understand egoism. But he doesn't need the Horse anyway.

### ... and the child's a Pig:

Not the best. The piglet finds it hard to bear the egoism of the Horse, and the Horse understands nothing. But neither loses any sleep over it!

## If the parent is a Goat . . .

#### ... and the child's a Rat:

What on earth can be done here? (If mama is the Goat the damage is less).

#### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

Worlds apart. They're no good to each other at all.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

There'll be no peace here! The Tiger risks devouring the Goat . . . heedlessly.

### ... and the child's a Cat:

Yes – apart from the fact that the kitten cannot rely on the Goat.

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

A lovely picture! If the mother is a Goat and the Dragon a son, it's perfect.

#### ... and the child's a Snake:

The Goat allows herself, willingly, to be monopolized by her child – on condition that he reciprocates.

### ... and the child's a Horse:

Yes, as long as the Goat doesn't count on the Horse too much to look after her in her declining years!

... and the child's a Goat:

Could be amusing – if unconstructive. When the two signs are mother and daughter, there will be a terrific 'togetherness'.

... and the child's a Monkey:

Bizarre! Parents like this could amuse the Monkey!

... and the child's a Rooster:

Mutual exasperation! There's no common ground here at all.

... and the child's a Dog:

The Dog will take his distance very early – but he'll never let the Goat down.

... and the child's a Pig:

Hah! Finally, it's the piglet who comes to the Goat's rescue. He loves her!

## If the parent is a Monkey . . .

... and the child's a Rat:

This works. The Monkey can do what he likes with the children.

... and the child's a Buffalo:

The Monkey always has a bit of glamour in

comparison with the Bussalo - and he knows how to capitalize on it.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

Not so bad, really. The Monkey's cunning balances the strength of the Tiger. They'll work it out between them.

### ... and the child's a Cat:

Great! This is a bit of good luck for the Cat!

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

This is good, too. The Monkey can give a lot to a Dragon who's too confident and a little precocious.

### ... and the child's a Snake:

Not too bad – guile and wisdom can make perfect bedfellows.

### ... and the child's a Horse:

Hm'n . . . Horse junior – although he's clever enough – mistrusts the cunning to which, perhaps, he'll fall a victim.

### ... and the child's a Goat:

Better make the best of this, for our she-devil is devilishly devoted!

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

Perfect accomplices! Mischief becomes mischief-and-a-half!

... and the child's a Rooster:

The Monkey, subtly, pokes fun at the Rooster. The bird does what he can to please – but he's going to get hurt.

... and the child's a Dog:

Difficult ... the Monkey finds that his offspring takes life far too seriously – and from this springs teasing that the Dog cannot stand.

... and the child's a Pig:

Excellent. The Monkey is very fond of his piglet. He'll teach him to be less gullible.

## If the parent is a Rooster . .

... and the child's a Rat:

Little arguments. Bickering. Nothing serious – but nothing warm either.

... and the child's a Buffalo:

Yes. Despite an occasional peck at random, the Rooster will allow himself to be led up the garden path.

... and the child's a Tiger:

The Rooster will be systematically opposed.

... and the child's a Cat:

The Cat will let the cock crow – but follow his own inclinations!

... and the child's a Dragon:

Agreement possible. The Rooster admires his baby Dragon a little too much – and that can mean trouble.

... and the child's a Snake:

They'll talk a lot – but the laziness they share may be increased.

... and the child's a Horse:

The Horse will never submit to the Rooster's authority ... and the Rooster won't know what to do about it.

... and the child's a Goat:

The Rooster will have the impression of having hatched a duck!

... and the child's a Monkey:

The Rooster will be beaten on all sides – but quite happy about it.

... and the child's a Rooster:

A cock-fight! To be avoided at all costs under the same roof!

... and the child's a Dog:

The Rooster won't know where he is. A dialogue of deaf men!

### ... and the child's a Pig:

The Pig is patient – but he'll act according to his lights. And don't let the Rooster think he's leading him by the snout!

## If the parent is a Dog...

### ... and the child's a Rat:

Despite his sense of duty and good-will, the Dog is not too keen on the Rat.

### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

No. Complete and total incomprehension on both sides! They judge one another – and find each other wanting.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

Good. The Dog will give a lot to his child, of whom he will be very proud.

### ... and the child's a Cat:

They get on famously together - especially papa Dog and Cat daughter.

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

These two do not get on at all. The Dragon cannot bear the criticisms which the Dog, with his clear mind, continuously aims at him.

#### ... and the child's a Snake:

For the Dog, this is almost as though he had unwittingly flushed a viper! He's not fond of the contemplative kind of intelligence.

#### ... and the child's a Horse:

It's not just that the Horse wants his own way – it's his selfishness that worries and disappoints the Dog.

#### ... and the child's a Goat:

Difficult. Discouraged, the Dog may end up by washing his hands of the Goat.

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

The Dog won't take the Monkey seriously – and it's mutual!

#### ... and the child's a Rooster:

They avoid one another. They have nothing in common. The Dog is irritated by the fine feathers the Rooster insists on wearing.

### ... and the child's a Dog:

A great togetherness here. It's a little dangerous for the rest of the family, though: they might carry it too far!

### ... and the child's a Pig:

Yes, although the cruder side of the Pig puts the Dog's back up.

## If the parent is a Pig...

### ... and the child's a Rat:

Fine. They'll have a lot of laughs together - and if the Rat does take advantage a bit, who cares?

#### ... and the child's a Buffalo:

Perhaps, even though the Buffalo is a little reserved.

### ... and the child's a Tiger:

Yes. But the Tiger will remain unsatisfied: he's always expecting something more.

#### ... and the child's a Cat:

Very good, but the Pig will be upset by the Cat's unusual indifference towards family things.

### ... and the child's a Dragon:

Good. The Pig can even be useful to the Dragon.

### .. and the child's a Snake:

This will work – at the Pig's expense. A mother Pig can become a complete slave to a Snake child.

### ... and the child's a Horse:

The inevitable departure from home of the Horse will upset the Pig – especially as it's always earlier than expected.

### ... and the child's a Goat:

Lucky Dog! The Goat will be helped all his life by the Pig. They love each other.

### ... and the child's a Monkey:

Great! The Monkey is constantly surprising and amusing the Pig – whom he respects, surprisingly!

#### ... and the child's a Rooster:

Lucky Rooster! The Pig will do everything to understand him and make him happy.

### ... and the child's a Dog:

They get on well. The Pig will always back up the Dog in his Causes, but he'll make himself unhappy quite often.

### ... and the child's a Pig:

Yes. A pair of real friends. They'll take great pleasure in each other's company and often go out together.

What kind of business relationship can there be between . . .

### ... Rat and Rat:

Where is the working capital? This could end up at the moneylender's or in the bankruptcy courts!

#### ... Rat and Buffalo:

The Buffalo is no businessman – but he is in a sense the working capital: it's enough that he gives the orders!

### ... Rat and Tiger:

Luckily for the Tiger, the Rat – although a profiteer – is honest. Otherwise the Tiger might regret it!

#### ... Rat and Cat:

The Cat's terrific in business, especially for the Rat

### ... Rat and Dragon:

A marvellous association, as long as it's the Dragon who's the boss.

### ... Rat and Snake:

Interesting to watch from the outside!

### ... Rat and Horse:

An impossible pairing! They don't like each other and will do anything they can to harm one another.

#### ... Rat and Goat:

The Goat can bring his artistic approach to the Rat – but does the Rat know how to make use of it!

### ... Rat and Monkey:

Yes - but the Rat must curb his blind adulation of the Monkey.

#### ... Rat and Rooster:

Reckless! They make very bad business together

### ... Rat and Dog:

The Dog, although he is a realist, is too idealistic for the mercenary Rat.

## ... Rat and Pig:

The Rat will try to trick the Pig, to put one over on him – but the Pig is so lucky in money matters!

### ... Buffalo and Buffalo:

They'd be better off buying a farm!

### ... Buffalo and Tiger:

A disastrous association: the Buffalo would try to put the Tiger out of business!

### ... Buffalo and Cat:

Poor Buffalo! The Cat will take advantage of his acumen. But the Cat had better watch out, just the same!

## ... Buffalo and Dragon:

Who's going to be boss here? And the Buffalo will seem to everyone to be playing stooge to our Mister Big!

### ... Buffalo and Snake:

They'd better not . . .

#### ... Buffalo and Horse:

If they must! They're such hard workers, and the Horse is as honest as the Buffalo (although much smarter).

#### ... Buffalo and Goat:

Out of the question. They can do nothing for each other.

### ... Buffalo and Monkey:

No! The Buffalo would be all the more hurt because he's fond of the Monkey!

#### ... Buffalo and Rooster:

Lots of work, little profit – and the Buffalo is unable to appreciate the Rooster's good points: he finds him lazy!

### ... Buffalo and Dog:

They haven't a single idea in common! How could it work?

### ... Buffalo and Pig:

The Pig could be very useful to the Buffalo, whom he esteems for his output.

## ... Tiger and Tiger:

Not advised. They would take too many risks and should be kept apart!

#### ... Tiger and Cat:

Possible. The Cat can be useful to the Tiger, and they complement one another: one being cautious, the other bold.

## ... Tiger and Dragon:

A worthwhile association of two go-getters. The Dragon can shine for both.

### ... Tiger and Snake:

No. They could never agree.

### ... Tiger and Horse:

Yes. The relationship will be complicated, violent – but profitable.

### ... Tiger and Goat:

# ... Tiger and Pig:

#### ... Cat and Cat:

A congress of lawyers, a party of professors! Open an antique shop. In fact yes, yes, and yes!

### ... Cat and Dragon:

Yes. The Cat will let the Dragon make the decisions – but he will give a lot of good advice first

#### ... Cat and Snake:

Yes. They will do good business (as long as they stop talking and work!).

#### ... Cat and Horse:

Good sport here! The Cat will be mischievous but the Horse is big enough to look after himself. And what a social life!

#### . . . Cat and Goat:

The Cat has taste and knows how to choose. He can make the Goat productive. A profitable association.

### ... Cat and Monkey:

A pointless exercise. Each is big enough to look after himself against the other – but neither is a creator!

#### ... Cat and Rooster:

The Rooster had better be careful: the fact that the Cat wants to do business with him conceals something.

## ... Cat and Dog:

The Cat will be useful to the Dog through his cleverness and objectivity; the Dog to the Cat through his loyalty and materialism.

## ... Cat and Pig:

Yes. The Cat is smart and the Pig has unbelievable luck. They can make a lot of money together.

## ... Dragon and Dragon:

Problems of prestige here. Not advised.

### ... Dragon and Snake:

Possible – but if the Snake allows the Dragon to do all the work, there could be fireworks!

# ... Dragon and Horse:

It could work all right over single deals – but never for a long time.

# ... Dragon and Goat:

The Goat could make it in a big way in some artistic enterprise, associated with a Dragon director, producer, or impresario.

## ... Dragon and Monkey:

Great! Craftiness allied to power can hardly fail. They must stick together!

### ... Dragon and Rooster:

If the Dragon pulls the strings, the Rooster could make a great public showing.

### ... Dragon and Dog:

No. The Dog sees through the Dragon – and Dragons don't like that!

### ... Dragon and Pig:

A surefire success! Especially as the Pig is relatively modest.

### ... Snake and Snake:

All planning and no action will make the business totter.

#### ... Snake and Horse:

This could work: the Snake will think; the Horse will work.

#### ... Snake and Goat:

Maybe. The Snake has the know-how – but he's hopeless at running the show. And the Goat makes mistakes.

# ... Snake and Monkey:

Headaches for the Snake here: the Monkey is a real smart alec.

#### ... Snake and Rooster:

Talk talk, talk . . . this business could sink in a sea of words!

### ... Snake and Pig:

The Pig has no need of wisdom and the Snake risks harm to himself.

### ... Dragon and Dog:

No. The Dog sees through the Dragon – and Dragons don't like that!

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#### ... Snake and Rooster:

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### ... Snake and Pig:

The Pig has no need of wisdom and the Snake risks harm to himself.

## ... Goat and Monkey:

The Goat has nothing to lose and the Monkey recognizes his talents enough to capitalize on them.

#### ... Goat and Rooster:

No good. The Rooster finds the Goat exasperating and useless. He simply doesn't understand Goats.

### ... Goat and Dog:

No - the Dog is busy with more serious things. At least, he thinks so.

## ... Goat and Pig:

They will be useful to each other. And the Goat – even the Goat! – can help the Pig.

# ... Monkey and Monkey:

If they keep on playing I'm-smarter-than-you, there could be trouble ahead.

### ... Monkey and Rooster:

Poor Rooster! He's going to find himself plucked!

### ... Monkey and Dog:

Nothing for either side here. The Monkey is afraid of the Dog, who won't let him get away with anything.

### ... Monkey and Pig:

The Monkey has every reason to team up with

the Pig and he knows it. It'll be in his interest. But the Monkey will be generous (that's in his interest, too!).

#### ... Rooster and Rooster:

This way to bankruptcy!

### ... Rooster and Dog:

No, no! They don't have a single idea in common. It would be a disaster.

### ... Rooster and Pig:

The Pig has no confidence in the Rooster as a businessman, so he'll hold back.

# ... Dog and Dog:

They are not really interested enough. They'd be ruined because they couldn't care less!

# ... Dog and Pig:

Yes, but the Pig won't get out of the affair scot-free, because the Dog is too generous. They'll bamboozle the others, though.

### ... Pig and Pig:

They could make a fortune together. Let them have a go, in any case, for luck will be with them!

# If the Rat is . . .

## ... Capricorn:

A severe Rat. Difficult to trap.

### ... Aquarius:

Intellectual Rat. A writer of authority?

#### ... Pisces:

Imaginative Rat. Can do everything – including make mistakes!

#### ... Aries:

Cornered Rat! Lots of aggressiveness here.

#### ... Taurus:

Rat the Charmer! (Something between Mickey Mouse and Ferdinand the Bull!)

#### . . . Gemini:

Super-Rat! Escapes all the traps!

### ...Leo:

Bizarre Rat. Contradicting himself, he should pay attention!
