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
















































WIN, LOSE OR HAW!



LAST ONE WINS

Western rodeos and fairs sometimes stage a horse race in which the last animal to finish, not the first, is the winner. It is one race that cannot be fixed because the jockeys do not ride their own horses, being assigned a different one a moment before going to the post. Each man rides as fast as he can, as in regular races, so he will keep well ahead of his own horse and not endanger its chances of winning.

MRS. SURE SHOT

A female resident of Seattle, Washington, would be a tough person to tangle with so long as she could lay hands on a gun. Known as the National Small-Bore Champion, this modern version of Annie Oakley holds 32 national records. Her prize souvenirs to date, which incidentally require a special room to house them, include 464 medals, 48 brassards and 54 trophies.

A FIERY SHOT

An Atherstone, England, sportsman had always dreamed of being a red-hot cricket player and one day during a game he had his chance. A hard-hit cricket ball struck a box of matches in his pocket. Pants afire, the fielder completed the play and dashed from the game in a blaze of glory. It proved to be the bottest one he ever participated in (1948).



BASEBALL EDEN

A foot long black snake was blamed for the loss of a baseball league title by the Salem Athletic Club of New Hampshire in 1949. The team lost the Lawrence (Mass.) Suburban Twilight League title to St. Michael's because the snake crawled into the shortstop's glove. The player had missed an easy grounder when he felt something in his glove. He ripped it off and discovered the snake. The resulting error set up four runs and allowed St. Michael's to come from behind and win, 6-4.

NO RIDERS NEEDED

A rare occurrence in horse racing is the walkover, a race in which all but one of the horses entered fail to appear and the single starter "walks over" the course in order to be declared the winner and awarded the purse. Since 1910, eighteen have taken place, the last being the Pimlico Special in 1942 when Whirlaway, the only one of nine entries to show up, shadow-raced himself and received the sum of \$10,000.



FOULING UP THE WORKS

All nine players of a Springfield, Missouri, high school basketball squad fouled out of a game in the semi-finals of a tournament and the officials had to declare a forfeit. Only a few seconds remained in the game when a total of forty-five personal fouls had been called on the Springfield team. Its opponent was ahead 76 to 62 at the time (January 26, 1952).

THIRD MAN OUT

Abe Attell, king of the little men some forty five years ago, once kayoed the referree of a bout in which he was participating, then stood by while his opponent counted out the ref. The incident happened on a hot July night in 1913, when Abe was battling Willie Beecher at Arverne, New York. During a flurry of infighting Beecher moved his head and the ref received one of Attell's rights squarely on the nose. He hit the canvas and Beecher counted him out.


OVERCOMING THE HURDLES


