Re: Alvin Karpis, with aliases, I.O. #1218, Arthur Ra Barker, with aliases, I.O. #1219, et al; Edward George Bremer - Victim. Kidnaping.

Reference is made to Division letter dated June 16, 1934, in the above titled matter.

Please be advised that Special Agents Frank Smith and Paul Hansen called upon Mr. C. B. Cutler, Pardon and Parole Attorney, at the State House, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, June 18, 1934, and discussed with him the wishes of the Division in arranging for a personal appearance of Volney Davis with some official of the Parole Board at which time an Agent of this Division could question Davis concerning his knowledge of the activities of members of the Barker-Karpis gang. Judge Cutler said that he had been trying to obtain some information regarding the location of Arthur R. Barker and Volney Davis that would be of some value to this Division. He seid that he is going to see Barker's father personally and talk with him about his son. He also said that he has a certain confidential informant through whom he believes he can contact Volney Davis, and that he is going to require some tangible information that Davis is not "crooked" at present before a parole will be granted him. When asked concerning the above mentioned set-up, Cutler said, "Oh, yes, I'll tell you all about it". When advised that it is the desire of the Division that an Agent be present to discuss certain cases and men with Davis, Cutler said, "Sure, I'll help you every way I can". He said, however, that he did not know when he would be able to make any contact with Davis, but thought he would do so within the next few days, and when he does so or obtains any information about where he is or where he or any other person will be able to contact Davis, he will call the Special Agent in Charge of the Oklahoma City office or either Agent Smith or Agent Hansen.

It is the belief of Agents Smith and Hansen that Cutler can not be relied upon to arrange this desired meeting with Davis, as the thought left with these Agents by Cutler was, "I am not ready to die, and I don't want to get put on the spot." It is possible, however, that Cutler will

communicate with the Oklahoma City office regarding information that he receives concerning Davis, though this even is felt doubtful.

It has been learned recently that Ted Bentz, alias Ted Benz, is receiving milest P.U. Box 2417, Reno, Mevada, which box is listed in the name of Harry Swanson, an attorney of doubtful reputation. The location of Ted Bentz has been desired by the Division for a long period of time for the purpose of determining if he played any part in the instant case and also for the purpose of determining thru him if he knows the whereabouts of the subjects in this case.

Ted Bentz is a hardened criminal and a skilled benk robber. He Federal process is outstanding against him but he is wented by O.B. Plowman, Special Agent of the American Express Company, 58 East Mashington Street, Chicago, Ill., for criminal charges pending in several places and he is also wanted by the State Police at East Lansing, Michigan, for bank robbery and by the police at San Francisco for auto theft. If Ted Bentz is located his apprehension should be arranged for and one or all of the above-named law enforcement units advised immediately.

Liquor Dealers Supply at 2211 South LaSalls, to determine why Mr. Crosscurth stored the Auburn "12" automobile, apparently the property of Alvin Karpis in the Club Garage, 7115 Exchange Avenue.

Mr. Grosscurth said that he was asked to take custody of , the Auburn "12" car by one Fred C. Goetz. He stated that Goetz and his wife were very good friends of him and Mrs. Grossourth. He knew Goetz as a Mr. George Ziegler and understood that Goetz occupation was that of a landscape gardener. He stated he had never met any of Mr. Goetz' friends and did not know that Goetz was a gangster until . his picture appeared in the paper the day following his slaying. Mr. Grosscurth said that Goetz told him he had an Auburn "12" Sedan stored in the Maxfield Garage at 6919 Stony Island Avenue, and that he wanted Mr. Grosscurth to go and get this car and store it elsewhere. Mr. Grosscurth went to the Maxfield Garage in his Buick car and left the Buick car there for repairs. At this time there were no license plates on the Auburn car so he transferred the license plates of his Buick to the Auburn. He was storing his Buick car in the Club Garage at 7115 Exchange Avenue and it was at this time that he stored the Auburn in the same garage. The records of the Club Garage are not very complete but show the Auburn as having been stored there by Mr. Grosscurth from about March 22, 1934, to May 14, 1934, when, according to the employees of the Club Garage, the car was delivered at 6:30 a.m. to an unknown (9 person at 67th and East End Avenue. Agent felt that Mr. Grosscurth had been ordering this ear delivered to Karpis or some member of his gang as at one time it was delivered by a garage employee to 67th and East End Avenue to some person unknown; as shown above. However, Mr. Grosscurth stated emphatically that the Auburn had never been delivered by his orders or his wife's orders to anyone except him or his wife at 6930 South Shore Drive. He stated that Goetz had given him some money sufficient to pay the garage bill on the Auburn and that he had paid the bill. About the second week in May Mrs. Goetz asked Grosscurth for the car. Knowing that Goetz was dead and presuming that the car belonged to him, according to his statement, he turned it over to Mrs. Goetz who said she was going to go to Rochester, Minnesota, for treatments at Mayo Brothers and expected to then proceed West, probably to SanFrancisco. Mrs. Grosscurth had a letter from Mrs. Goetz from Rochester, Minnesota, but no addresses were mentioned and they have not corresponded since. It should be noted that Mr. Grosscurth has been employed by the Liquor Dealers Supply Company, 2211 South LaSalle Street since January, 1934. In the past he was known as a bootlegger but had never been connected with any other law violations so far as this office knows. Mr. Grosscurth said that Goetz and his wife seemed to be very fine people. He was

very much surprised to find that Goetz was a gangster and said that if there was any way in which he could aid the Division he would be very glad to do so. It is agent's belief that Mr. Grosseurth knows more than he has told and is not a very reliable informant,

E. R. Maxfield, Manager of the Maxfield Garage at 6919 Stony Island Avenue, was interviewed concerning the storing of the Anburn "12" car for Goetz. He stated that Fred Goets brought this car in to his garage on February 11, 1934; that the car was washed and the upholstering cleaned and Goetz told him that he owned the car. Goets gave the address of 40 Chicago Avenue. This is a filling station where Goetz was getting his mail, as shown in previous reports. Er. Maxfield said that Goetz removed the California license plates from the Auburn himself about two days after he brought it to the garage. He said that Goetz was an exceptionally good customer and that they had done work on a Buick, 1932, black standard coups, on a Chevrolet 1932 dark colored coupe, standard, and on a 1931 or 1932 Ford Coupe, dark green color, as well as the Auburn, and that Goetz had paid for all of this work. On March 20, 1934, Goetz told Mr. Maxfield that he had sold the car to one Charles Grosscurth and on March 21, 1934, Mr. Grosscurth removed the Auburn from the Maxfield Garage. He has not seen the Auburn or any of the other three cars mentioned since that time but stated he did see in the paper that the Buick Coupe was recovered at the scene of the slaying of Goetz in Cicero. It is agent's belief that the cars mentioned herein, with the exception of the Buick Coupe, were the property of members of the Karpis-Barker gang and that Goetz was merely having work done for them.

Mr. Charles A. Reagen, Manager of the Yates Apartments at 7133-37 Yates Avenue was interviewed and stated that no attempt has been made by anyone to recover the furniture left at apartment 9-1, 7137 Yates Avenue by Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney.

Mr. Louis Gottleib, proprietor of the Gottleib Furniture & Carpet Company, 2241 South 52nd Avenue, Cicero, Illinois, was contacted by telephone. He stated that neither Dolores Delaney or Alvin Karpis or any other persons had been to him again to request that he try to recover the furniture for them. He stated that should anyone do so he would immediately call the Division. It should be noted that Mr. Gottleib, as shown in the report of reference, tried at one time to get custody of this furniture by stating that he had a mortgage on same. Future investigation proved this to be untrue, as Mr. Gottleib sold the furniture to Alvin Karpis, who was then using the name of William B. Lohman, for cash.

On page six of reference report it is shown that one of the references given by Alvin Karpis, when he rented the apartment at 7137 Yates Street, was Anna Moran, Box 17, Oak Park, Illinois. This same 😸 report shows an investigation at Oak Park resulting in a failure to Los cate Anna Moran. However, she did rent box \$17 at Oak Park and at that time gave as references Mr. Oliver Carter, 5554 Maple Avenue, Chicago, . Illinois, and B. Whalen, 644 Diversey Parkway. An investigation was made at both these places. It was found that Oliver Carter did live at 3354 Maple Avenue from August 15 to September 21, 1953. Mrs. C. Fern, Manager of this apartment house, was shown pictures of the Karpis-Barker gang but failed to identify any of them as being Oliver Carter. She said that the man living there named Oliver Carter was about 52 years of age, tall and slender, being about 5*11" and weighing about 135 pounds. He had a smooth face, dark eyes and dark hair and was very attractive. He had a girl about seven years old and a boy about ten years eld. She did not know where he worked but said that he and his wife and children all seemed to be very fine people.

At 644 Diversey Parkway it was learned that a man by the name of B. Whalen rented an apartment on June 11, 1935. The deak clerk at this place, Miss A. Parker, was unable to determine from their records when Mr. Whalen checked out but she stated that she remembered his being there until sometime in the early Fall of 1933. Miss Parker was shown pictures of the Karpis-Barker gang but failed to identify any of them as being Mr. Whalen. Mr. Whalen left no forwarding address.

In furtherance of the investigation made by Agent Welles at 2141 Gunderson Avenue, Berwyn, Illinois, as reported in reference report, page sixteen, pictures of the Karpis-Barker gang, the Dillinger gang, and all Kanmo suspects were shown to Kaviar Rymkiewicz, janitor at 2141 Gunderson Avenue and also to John S. Sprague, the mail carrier on this route. Neither of them identified any of the pictures as being persons who had called at the Fred Goetz apartment. Mr. Rymkiewicz again said that Goetz had a great many men callers in his apartment and quite after had women there too. He said that he was sure that if he was shown a picture of the person who was living with Goetz at this address and posing as Goetz' brother, he would be able to identify him. Mail carrier John S. Sprague said he never saw any of the occupants of Apartment 208 and did not even know what Goetz looked like.

In talking with Agent R. C. Suran of the Chicago Office, who is working on the Kammo case, it was learned that Mrs. Goetz is now being kept under surveillance in San Francisco. It is suggested that the San Francisco Office may wish to make an investigation relative to the Auburn "12" mentioned in this report to determine whether Mrs. Goetz drove this car to California or whether she turned it over to some member of the Karpis-Barker gang.

In the apartment occupied by Alvin Karpis and Bolores Delaney at 7137 Yates Avenue a receipt was found from the Women's Home Companion, 205 West Wacker Drive, telephone, Dearborn 8146. Mr. P. W. Sherwin, head of the sales force of the Women's Home Companion, was contacted and he ascertained that his collector had reported that persons were still living in this apartment but were not present and he has been unable to collect for the magazine for the last month. Mr. Sherwin seemed very anxious to cooperate with the Bivisian and agent asked him if he would take all the aliases of Alvin Karpis and have them checked to see if Mrs. Karpis, or Dolores Delaney, had subscribed to the magazine at some other address subsequent to leaving the above mentioned apartment. Mr. Sherwin said that if he found smything recent or any subscription should come in in the future he would immediately notify this office.

A contact will be kept with Mr. Gottleib, Mr. Reagan, and Mr. Grosscurth by the Chicago Office in an endeavor to get further information concerning the whereabouts of Alvin Karpis or Dolores Delaney, bearing in mind that the Yates Apartments, managed by Mr. Reagan, still have possession of a great deal of very valuable furniture belonging to Alvin Karpis.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE:

RE: ALVIN KARPIS, with eliases, I.O. 1218, RT AL EDVARD GEORGE BRENER - VICTIM KIDRAPING

On June 13, 1934, in accordance with information contained in letter from the Chicago Office dated May 25, 1934, relative to instant ease, Agent contacted Mrs. Catherine Randall, telephone operator at Strasburg, Missouri, and ascertained that the telephone number 1212 is located on a farm four miles southeast of Strasburg, Missouri, owned by Fry & Pringle, Livestock Commission Merchants, located on the 7th Floor of the Livestock Exchange Building, telephone Main 5215, and presently occupied by a tenant named Herbert Wamsley who has occupied this farm for the past year, and about whom little is known.

Because of the smallness of the town Agent deemed it inadvisable to make further inquiries. Accordingly, Sheriff Glan Reaver, at Harrisonville, was contacted by Agent and he put Agent in Touch with P. J. Yenney, of the Farm Hog & Corn Crop Reduction Committee of Cass County. Rr. Yenney is a resident and leading citizen of the Strasburg vicinity.

Mr. Yenney advised he knew the Wamsleys had occupied the farm in question but that he knew very little about them. He stated that he has a sister who is on the same telephone line and that his mephew had worked for Wamsley for a short while; that the Wamsleys have a number of children; that this section of the country has produced some "tough characters" in the past, particularly the Stevens Brothers.

On June 14, 1924, with the aid of Kr. Yenney, this Agent, accompanied by Special Agent Simons, contacted Herbert Wamsley and one or two other farmers in the vicinity in the guise of farm agents making inquiries about farm statistics. Agents were met by Herbert Wamsley in the barn lot of this farm and it was impossible to assertain whether any other persons were on the farm at the time, although it was noticed that some woman at the farm house scrutenized the Agents closely from the kitchen door.

The farm itself is very much above the average Kissouri farm as to buildings and equipment and is in very good condition. Tamsley stated that the farm contains 514 acres and that most of it is grazing

land on which cattle are fed. He stated that his family consisted of himself, his wife and his son 18 years old, although he stated he had four boys and five girls, none of whom were living at home. He incidentally mentioned that his daughter from Chicago was visiting with him at the present time.

Agents noted that there is an entrance to the farm from the road running east and west, the house being south of this road and facing north and is back from the road about 1/4th mile. There is also another road which leads to the farmhouse from the north and south road going westward towards the farmhouse. In the event this farmhouse were raided it would be necessary to cover beth of these points of ingress and agress. A complete circle of the section on which this farm is located was made and no other lanes leading to the farmhouse were noted, although there were several other farmhouses on this section, and it might be possible for small lanes leading from one or more of these farmhouses to the Wamsley farm to exist. A heavy rain made it possible to determine that no cars apparently had left the Wamsley farm prior to agents' arrival. The only car on the place was seen in the driveway of the barn and appeared to be a Chevrolet or Ford, although this sould not be determined.

While Agents were talking to Namsley several shots were heard behind the barn, appearntly a .22 rifle or small bore shotgun, and Special Agent Simons, without exciting suspicion, endeavored to accertain where this shooting came from but was unable to do so. It sounded as if shooting were taking place in a ravine about two or three blocks behind the barn. Ho other activity about the place was noted and it is assumed that Mamsley's daughter from Chicago is now in Excelsior Springs in view of the fact that Tenney advised that this daughter had gone to Excelsior Springs, Missouri two days before.

Subsequently Mr. Yenney was reinterviewed at Earrisonville and Strasburg, and he arranged for photograph of Roy Grey, alies Rustie Gibson, alies "Slim" to be viewed by his nephew, Earnest Cates, and reported that Cates advised he had seen this individual at the farm and that he was the husband of one of the daughters but that he had not been around recently. Er. Yenney advised that Wahsley gets mail from Kingsville, and that William Feisel is the rural route carrier who delivers the mail to the farm.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I telephoned Mr. Cowley at Chicago this morning and inquired as to the reason for his desire to substitute Agent Brown for Agent McIntire on the Bremer case. He stated he understood that Agent Brown had made a personal study of this case as well as Agent McIntire; that no change has been made as yet, and there probably will be none if there is any objection here. I told him there were no objections here, and that it was not your idea to indicate from here who should be placed on these assignments since he, Mr. Cowley, is charged with the entire responsibility, and if he had any reason for making the change it would be all right. Mr. Cowley said he just felt Mr. Brown is better fitted for this assignment, except for the fact that Mr. McIntire is better acquainted with the details, although he felt Mr. Brown could become entirely familiar with the case in a short time. He stated the question is whether the best man should be at the office or out investigating. I told him this would be left entirely to his judgment, and if he feels the change is justified, it will be all right.

I asked Mr. Cowley upon what he bases his belief that F. J. Bombard will furnish any information of value concerning Karpis and Barker. He stated that since he sent in the teletype message relative to this man, he had seen him several times, and in fact has paid him money. He had just gotten out of Cook County Jail when he came up the first time, and stated that he had served time with both Karpis and Barker, and was acquainted with the brother; that he could locate them within 48 hours. ifr. Cowley stated that this man has served about half of his life in jail, and is very sure that he can pick up a contact in Chicago. Mr. Cowley had given him \$25, but when he came in last night, after working on the matter for a couple of days, he was broke and had no information, stating that it could not be obtained in Chicago. He then stated that by going to Kansas City he could get some information there, but that it would cost a lot of money. Everything he represented on the first occasion proved to be without basis. Mr. Cowley told him to go back out, and if he got any information at all, we would be glad to pay him for it. I told Mr. Cowley I felt this would be the better approach - to make it a "C.O.D." proposition. Mr. Cowley stated he now personelly believes that this informant is of no value to us, although he didn't know this in the first place, of course. Upon my inquiry, Mr. Cowley stated that he desired no answer to his teletype message now.
