Kindly refer to letter from this office to the St. Paul office under date of September 13, 1934, in the above captioned case, relative to Carllee Sisler Dial, now allegedly married to Mark Belan, this women being an alleged acqueintance of Subject Alvin Karpis. Reference is also made to Division letter dated October 3, 1934, to the Kensas City office.

From recent reports submitted by this office in this case, particularly the report of Special Agent M. C. Spear dated at Kansas City, Missouri, September 27, 1934, it will be noted that further investigation is being made in an endeavor to again locate this woman for further interview relative to Karpis and members of his mob, her location being unknown since she was last interviewed by the Kansas City office. There is being transmitted herewith a photostatic copy of the fingerprints of Carllee Sisler Dial which were obtained from the Kenses City, Missouri, Police Department, she having been arrested by that department on August 5, 1933, on a charge of investigation and released on August 6, 1933, as reflected on page two of the above described letter from this office to St. Paul. There is also transmitted a photostatic copy of the fingerprints of George H. Dial, who was arrested and released with this women under the same circumstances as herself.

It is respectfully requested that this office be envised in wit criminal record on file for Cerllee Sisler Dial at the Identification Unit and, if so, whether a photograph of her is evailable. In the event such a photograph is evailable, it is desired that several copies thereof be required the Kansas City office in order that investigation mey be requested of Pittsburgh

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office at Shepherdstown, West Virginia, based upon information appearing in the last peragraph of page seven of the memorandum of Special Agent W. E.

Miller, which was attached to copies of the report of Agent Miller dated at Kansas City, Missouri, June 12, 1934. In view of this woman's denial of any acquaintance with members of the Karpis-Barker bang, it is purposed, in the event a photograph of her is available, to have the same exhibited at Shepherdstown to see if she can be identified as having been with Subject Karpis at that point during December, 1932. If it appears that as a matter of fact she was there with him at that time, efforts are to be continued by this office to again locate her in order that she may be further vigorously questioned relative to my information about the Karpis-Barker gang and the present location of its members.

In the event a photograph of this women is not available, it is suggested that a wanted notice be placed against her attached prints in order that in the event of her subsequent arrest she may then be further questioned along the lines suggested above.

Pursuant to Division letter of October 3, 1934, there is also transmitted herewith a photograph of Peggy Asher standing beside the Chevrolet Sedan of George E. Barker, Subjects Barker's father.

#### MEMORIADEM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Cowley telephoned and advised that they are planning an sending the latest report in the Kanses City Massacre case to all affices, including these streaments, indicating that the information is confidentially that he noticed a letter from the Kanses City office to the effect that we should hold confidential the fact that Richetti is impliented in this case. I stated that was O.K. as we talked before about the desirability of issuing an identification Order on Richetti indicating that he was wanted in this case and that is what it was referring to. I advised Mr. Cowley that a write was served on Vetterli and the Attorney General withregard to Binaggies that, of course, the writ is only operative in the district in which it is served and consequently it is served on Vetterli. Reference is made to your letter dated at Chicago, Illinois on September 14, 1934, transmitting a Thompson sub-machine gun, Model 1921, a 100-round fully loaded machine gun drum, a .52 calibre Colt automatie revolver with extra loaded clip, and two .45 calibre Colt automatic revolvers with four extra loaded clips, in connection with the case entitled Alvin Karpis with aliases, et al; Edward George Bremer - Victim; Kie-🔊 🧢 maping.

Numerous very fragmentary latent fingerprints were developed on the above guns and bullets. However, the only latent fingerprints of value appeared on two of the cartridge clips for the .45 calibre revolver. These two latent impressions have been compared with the fingerprints of the following members of the Dillinger-Karpis gang, with megative results:

Alvin Karpis, our \$199217 Fred Barker, our #59165 Volney Davis, our #400441 Harry Savyer, our #421555 Bernard Phillips, our #328905 George Nelson, our #542742 Marian Marr, our \$782267 Myrtle Baton, our #337474

In addition, one of the latent fingerprints has been searched through the single fingerprint file, but no identification was effected. It is now being placed in the unidentified section of this file with a view to identification at a subsequent time as additional fingerprints of are absorbed therein.

with the undersigned on this date, and stated that he had received information from a confidential source to the effect that HARRY SANTER is somewhere in Northern Wisconsin. In the source of the conversation with BRENER, upon being assured that the source of his information would not be made known to other persons, he stated that his friend HARRY MILLER, who operates a recreation parlor in the Hamm Building in St.Paril, had informed him that he, MILLER, had received a long distance telephone call from HARRY SAWYER on the evening of September 25, 1934, wherein SAWYER requested MILLER to ask BRENER to use his political influence to secure the release of CLADYS SAWYER, wife of HARRY SAWYER; that in this telephone conversation MILLER asked SAWYER where he was calling from, and SAWYER stated that he was in Northern Wisconsin. BRENER stated that MILLER did not believe this, and he, BREMER, did not wish to press.

MILLER for further information as to where the call was received, etc., as he did not wish MILLER to conclude that he was particularly interested in the whereabouts of SAWYER.

ERECER has, since the time he was released by the Eldnapers, expressed great confidence in HARRY MILLER, and stated that MILLER mas perted HARRY SLAYER of being in some manner lavolved in the bidnaping from the time EREMER was kidnaped, and he appeared to desire to have it understood that MILLER was in no way involved, although MILLER has, by reason of his associations with persons frequenting his recreation parlor, apparently procured the confidence of a number of thieves, and would not furnish any information to any law enforcement authorities for fear of revenge on the part of associates of those concerning whom he might be able to furnish information. BREMER stated that he is going on a hunting trip over the weekend with MILLER and others, and any further information he may procure relative to SANYER he will furnish the undersigned, with the understanding that should SANYER or his associates be located that MILLER'S name will not be mentioned.

SAWYER has or might furnish the location of the place where he was held, it was left to his conclusion that the hideout has been, or shortly would be, found, and the remark was made that he might be surprised to find that the place was somewhat different than as he had imagined it to be or had described it. He still insisted, however, that the sounds previously described such as the siren, church bells, etc., were exactly as he had always said they were; that the only thing he was not sure of was the distance the house was from the railroad.

Dear Bir:

It has been brought to my attention, in connection with the Bremer and Kansas City Massacre cases, that undeveloped leads are being set out by various offices for the obtaining of evidence which is already contained in the file of the office requesting such investigation. Obviously such requests can only emanate from a field office when the Special Agent in Charge of that field office is not familiar with the contents of the investigative file contained in his office. This situation is a serious reflection not only upon the administrative ability of the Special Agents in Charge of the various field offices but also upon their interest in the Division's welfare and the successful conclusion of these cases.

The Division can not minutely supervise the development of each and every lead in each field office throughout the country but must depend in a large measure upon the discretion and intelligence of its Special Agents in Charge. The Bremer and Kansas City Massacre cases are among the most important cases now pending in the Division and I have previously indicated my desire that these cases should receive very close attention and supervision in all Division offices.

I desire that you immediately review the files on these cases in your office and arrange hereafter to personally supervise all investigative activity on these cases.



I called Mr. Cowley and advised him that I sent a memorand to the Director on our talk about Bonasio which contained my comments about the raid that Nethen was going to make on his bouse out there for the last month; that the Director asks, in a notation, that I find out from Mr. Cowley whether the place should be reided. I asked Mr. Cowley that he thought of raiding the place end stated my first thought would be that we do not have very such to substantiate Needles' statements; that while we have Bonasie in custody, we can pretty well determine whether we should or should not raid it. Hr. Cowley stated that he talked to Mr. Mathan a short while age and teld him to go up there with Bash and Bash had proviously received the same information that Mathan got and had requested that he be allowed to go slong; that he, Cowley, told Nethan to make the raid last night but Bash was out of town; therefore, in view of this, it will be conducted when Besh gets back and Besh will be back this afternoon. 


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

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### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

On Monday, August 27, 1934, at the conference of Special Agents if Tamm. Charge concerning the present status of the Bremer case, I discussed it in Special Agents in Charge Ladd, Vetterli, Hanni, Brantley, Bruce Nathan and Mr. Couley all leads outstanding at the present time in the various districts together with leads looking to the apprehension of some 23 individuals being sought in connection with this case. Various suggestions for additional investigation were offered and appropriate memoranda prepared so that the Division may follow up the various offices in connection with these investigations.

In the event the Barkers, Karpis or Volney Davis are apprehended, it is suggested that Mr. Newby of the Division, Mr. D. L. Nicholson of St. Paul and Mr. R.D. Brown of Chicago be dispatched to the point of apprehension immediately in order to question these individuals.

Some apprehension was expressed over possible inability of the Division to obtain telephone taps because the N.R.A. code prohibits such taps. No specific difficulty has as yet been encountered in this regard and accordingly no action will be taken toward taking the matter up with the N.R.A. code authorities until a situation actually arises where we are unable to place a tap.

A suggestion was offered that the Division prepare for issuance to all Special Agents in the service a bulletin listing the names, descriptions, criminal records and other identifying data of all individuals being sought in connection with the Bremer case. I believe this is a meritorious idea and a proposed bulletin will be prepared and submitted to you for your approval.

The Special Agent in Charge of the St. Paul Office advises that are Hall of St. Paul is a known contact for hoodlums in that vicinity; that the doctor's daughter recently disappeared and is reported to be operating with a gang of shoplifters some place outside of St. Paul; that Dr. Hall is very anxious to ascertain the location of his daughter and in the event this Decision can excertain her location, Dr. Hall will upon his own initiative and at his own appears and extension, the backers keepis, Volney Davis, et al. Specific inquiries were made of sack special Agent in Charge as to the contacts that he had in the various principal cities in his district and, while no

All Special Agents in Charge were emphatically informed that additional contacts must be made, particularly in underworld circles. Mr. Vetterli indicated that he had received some fair leads while he was assigned to San Francisco through a Secret Service operative named in Salt Lake City. Appropriate instructions will be issued to the Special Agent in Charge of the Salt Lake City Office to contact and attempt to obtain from him information or sources of information which may be of assistance in this case.

Because of Dewey's connections at Des Moines, I believe it would be desirable to have him suspend his examination of the court records about twice a month for a period of 24 to 36 hours to enable him to contact his informant in Des Moines for information concerning the location of Myrtle Eaton. If you approve of this suggestion, appropriate instructions will be issued.

A suggestion was made and was considered practical and desirable by all of the Special Agents in Charge that an under cover agent be placed in Kansas City to live at the Majestic Hotel for a period of several weeks for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Barkers, Karpis, Pretty Boy Floyd or other Division fugitives ever come to that place. This is a "hot spot" frequented by gangsters, racketeers and criminals of all types and calibre. The under cover agent who takes this assignment should be able to gamble, particularly to play black jack and shoot craps as well as play poker. The individual assigned to this place should not be conspicuous in appearance, build or otherwise and, of course, could not be any agent who has ever worked in the Kansas City, Oklahoma City or St. Louis districts. I am endeavoring to locate some agent who appears desirable for this assignment and will recommend his dispatch to Kansas City as soon as a satisfactory man can be found. Consideration is being given among others to the following agents named by the Special Agents in Charge who were present:-

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

With reference to letter to the Division dated September 26, 1934, letter to the Kansas City office dated October 5, 1934 and Division telegram dated September 25, 1934, the following memorandum dated September 27, 1934 has been submitted by Special Agent O. G. Hall:

Con September 24, 1934 I received a 'phone call from Coffeyville, Kansas from an informant to the effect that on Friday, September 21, 1934, he had seen Jess Doyle in South Coffeyville, Oklas

"Jess Doyle is a bank robber and brother of Earl Doyle who is now in Jackson, Mich., as a result of being caught in the Grand Haven, Mich., bank job. Hazel Doyle, reputed contact for the remnants of the Dillinger mob, is his wife. She has a joint in South Coffeyvilly, temporarily closed. The Doyles robbed banks with the Barkers and Karpis, as well as with Keating and Holden, Frisco Dutch and the Phieffers of St. Penl. Hasel and Earl lived in St. Penl in 1951, as I recall, with Sec. Kally and Bailey and that cutfit at the Admiral Hotel (Minneapolis) and an apartment house of Grand ive. I believe in St. Paul. It any rate they for together with Barkers and the Mash outfit. At the present time we have some information that \$10,000,00 is going to come out of St. Paul to get Earl Doyle out of Jackson and there is a letter in the file regarding this.

The anformant knows Jess Doyle well, having been raised with him of some town mear Coffeyville. He states positively that it was Jess Doyle he saw. Saturday night a mail truck was robbed at South Coffeyville but the look was negligible as far as I can learn. No one seems to know who pulled that job, as far as I have heard.

was told by Tommy Hill that Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis had been with Jess Doyle in So. Coffeyville Friday and Saturday and had left after midnight Saturday, stating they were going to Tulsa but Tommy Hill had stated that he thought they were actually going to Kansas City, Mod as they had more reason to go there and had a Ford VS Sedan or Coach, Black, with Kansas Wyandotte County tags.

The only reason that I can think of for Tommy Hill telling the informant is either to mislead him as to the true identity of the mail truck robbers or because he is mad at Fred Barker. I have heard that several years ago Freddie Barker sold Tommy Hill a quantity of stolen eigarettes, Tommy to sell them to someone else, which he did, the buyer opening the carton and finding excelsior and bricks but no eigarettes. Tommy had to make this good. This came to me from some source a long time ago and I can't now remember who told

"A few minutes later I got & telephone well from Felix Altaffer, Tulsa Deta Sgt. that a man had been robbed, probably by a con game, of \$1000.00 in Tulsa Saturday night by a man identified as Jess Doyle. There were two men with him, no good descriptions. This seems way out of line with what Jess Doyla would So.

"At any rate that evening I and George Stewart drove to Clarence Smith's the place, Sand Springs (reputed harborer of Barkers) and woke them up. At first Clarence and his wife denied they had ever kept the Barkers. Finally

"We then went to the Buckhorn, another joint operated by the Mewtons, bank robbers. Hothing was seen there

"Early in the day I maked Altaffer, Field Sgt. for necessary Police assistance and he later told me nothing had some of the information. me to the transfer of the second seco

"My personal opinion is that Tommy Hill was trying to throw the informant off. as to the true identity of the mail truck robbers. Hill would probably know the job was going to be pulled."

Post Office Inspector George Hill, Tulsa, Oklahoma, who made the investigation of the mail truck robbery at Coffeyville, Kansas and South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, said that he had displayed photographs of Fred and Doc Barker, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Volney Davis and Jess Doyle to the driver of the mail truck and he had been unable to identify any of these persons as the participants in this robbery; in fact, Mr. Hill says that this Postal employee is positive that none of these suspects is implicated in that robbery, which conclusion be reached after viewing the photographs shown him. Mr. Hill was given some more recent photographs of members of this mob and he will exhibit them to this withese and return them to the writer together with what information he has obtained. It was suggested to Mr. Hill that the No. 5 man mentioned in the letter from the Kansas City office dated October 8, 1934 fairly well fitted the description of my "Baby Face" Helson, who is probably out of money and may resort to a small robbery job as that pulled in Coffeyville. Mr. Hill was given a photograph of Welson and will display this to the driver of this mail truck and then return it to the writer with what information he is able to obtain in doing so. Mr. Hill said that

he is quite sure that none of the members of the Barker gang was implicated in this robbery, although he had heard from three different sources in the vicinity of Coffeyville that Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and another was see the ones who had performed this robbery! "will remain information he says was obtained from "tips" and he does not think the ingit formation is reliable, although he says there is a mere possibility that is in the right information.

George Hill said that he had received confidentful information from at least two different sources that an prohestra leader, name unknown, she is presently staying at the St. Francis Hotel in St. Joseph, Missouri, and who was formerly connected in some way with Johnnie Lamia, deceased gangeter at Managa City, Missouri, is a friend of several of the members of the Barker mee and has several dancers and entertainers who entertain some of the members of this mob upon different occasions. It is suggested that the Kansas City effice make some inquiries along this line.

On September 27, 1934 George Coker, a brother of San Coker, a benk robber, told George Stewart, former Captain of Detectives at Tules, Oklahoma, that he knew a man who had a sontact with Fred Barker and that Alvin Karpis was in Tules at that time. He agreed to tell George Stewart any information he obtained regarding the location of Karpis or his associates.

W. J. Pottorff, 252 East 14th Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, told Agent an informant previously mentioned in this case at Tulsa, Birch that Oklahoma, had told him that Alvin Karpis was in Tulsa and that he was trying paroled from the Oklahos to get Q. P. Nochee, represented to Pottorff that he was a contact State Penitentiary. for Karpis and he asked postorff what he could do to get McChee paroled. Pottorff advised that the reason had contacted him is because he, Pottorff, secured a parole for Louis scholey, who is an acquaintance of the Barker mob. Pottorff agreed, according to his story, to assist obtain McGhee's parole for Karpis. This information furnished by rottorff is not thought to be reliable. He has endeavored to furnish information before to the writer and to Special Agent in Charge Colvin, while he was at the Oklahoma City office, but has never given any information of value. This story told by Pottorff also does not seem consistent with the opinion expressed by Q. P. McChes to the writer wherein he said that he is satisfied that he call sould be paroled for \$500.00 and that he is sure that he sould obtain this \$500.00 from either of the Barker brothers or from Tom Hill of South Coffeyville Oklahoma for the more asking, but that as he is through with representing oriminals and does not wish to have any more contact with them, he does not want to become obligated to them and therefore will not ask for their money to secure his parole and, in fact, will not take it. Pottorff, however, has agreed to supply any information that he receives along this line to George Stewart at Mincks Hotel in Tulsa, to Agent Birch or to the writer.

On September 26, 1934 Special Agent O. G. Hall submitted the following memorandum:

"With reference to your request that I interview Jim Patton, ex-police officer, Tulsa, presently employed as guard at the Nat'l. Bank of Tulsa; please be advised that an 9-84-54 I talked to him and he stated that his him friend, Ed Ervin, Bailiff in District Court, Tulsa, and Miso as an police officer of Tulsa, had some information concerning this case, particularly as to the location of Fred Barker. He gave me a note to Ervin (1)

on 9-26-54 Agent Hensen and I interviewed Ervin. He stated that Police officer he shot and apprehended Fred Barker; that he knows hos barker; does not know Alvin Karpis for sure; knows Volney Davis. That after shoeting Fred Barker in the hand he chased him, catching him in a rooming house under a bed. Barker has since, according to Ervin, sent word to him a few \$11 that he was going to kill him, etc. Sometime ago he did a ravor for a and about two weeks ago she came to him and stated that Fred Barker had been in town, Tulsa, to see his girl; that this girl lived in an apartment house, location not given. The reason this women came to him with this story is that Fred Barker had made some threat to kill Ervin. The name of the woman was not disclosed. Ervin got the impression that Fred had been in Tules on the 16th of September. This as I remember is in conflict with the information from Chicago. Ervin will attempt to arrange an interview with the woman and will let me know. He has my 'phone number and address. At the present stage this looks like an attempt on the part of Ervin's informant to get the friendship of Ervin by being concerned about his welfare. I will let you know of any, further developments.

on October 1, 1934 Special Igent D. B. Hall received information to the effect that a day or so previous G. E. Campbell, the father of Harry Campbell, purchased a ticket by bus for Electra, Texas. It will be recalled that Harry Campbell has previously been reported to have resided there with Tynona Burdette at R.F.D. 4, Hox 136. In view of this information, having in mind the possibility that G. E. Campbell may have proceeded to Electra to contact his son, the Dallas office was advised by telephone and requested to cover that point in an effort to apprehend Harry Campbell.

Inasmuch as the inquiry was requested of the Dallas office by telephone, no further leads are being set out for that office in this report and only one copy of same is being furnished the Dallas office.

With reference to Division telegram dated September 25, 1934, the description of the automobiles furnished in this wire was immediately given to some of the reliable Tulsa Police officers and scatacts in Tulsa, Oklahoma with a request that a close lookent be kept for these automobiles, and several of the old contacts and hangouts of this mob were visited and checked but he information was obtained indicating that these persons came through Oklahoma, as they were supposed to according to informant

On the night of September 38, 1934 Mack Story, a scandal sheet writer, at Tules, Oklahoms, called George Stewart, previously mentioned in this case as a close contact between the Oklahoma City effice and sontacts that have been made in Tules, Oklahoms, and advised that Harry Campbell and a woman companion were at that time sitting in a booth in the Midway Cafe, a joint la Tules. This place was immediately covered and Harry Campbell was not there. Story claims that he is personally acquainted with Harry Campbell and that he left before the attempt was made to cause his arrest. The manager of this safe was asked if Mack Story had been in there to determine if Story had some reason for having this joint raided and the manager said he did not know Mack Story and also said that there had been no trouble at his place that day. Mack Story has agreed to furnish any other information he might receive about Campball by his associates to George Stewart, who will in turn advise the writers.

As there seemed to be a possiblity that Harry Campbell was in Tules, several of the night clubs in Tules were visited several times by the writer, George Stewart, Bill Wood, Burns representative in Tules, and Agents 6. 6. Hall and Tyler Birch, but no further information was obtained and Harry Campbell or any of his associates were not observed. The following places were contacted: The Midway Cafe; Buckhorn Inn, which is operated by two notorious brothers, Willis and Tom Newton, Tormer bank robbers; a filling station and bootlegging joint operated by Bob Parker on East 11th Street, which is frequented by gangsters more than any other night club in Tules; and the Osage Country Club, located in Osage Country near Tules.

with further reference to the letter from the Oklahoma City office to Inspector S. P. Cowley at Chicago, dated October 5, 1934, it might be stated that several days ago Mark Whinnery called George Stewart, former Captain of Detectives at Tulsa, and said that he had some information which might lead to the apprehension of Harry Campbell and asked about the reward for him. He also inquired if one of the girls who were arrested at Uleveland, Ohio and reported in the press as associates of the Barker gang was Mynona Burdette, his sister-in-law. George Stewart communicated this information to the Oklascity office and Mr. Brantley advised him that he had no information as to the identity of the persons arrested in Cleveland, but to obtain all information possible from Whinnery. Stewart later advised the writer that he had done this and that Whinnery had been unable to furnish him any information of value. He has promised, however, to give any information he receives to Stewart, who will in turn communicate it to the writer or to the Oklahoma City Division effice.

Phinney to proceed to Cardin, Oklahoma and make an investigation with respect to the parents of Edna Murray, On October 5th Agent Phinney called the Oklahoma City office and advised that Mina Murray's mother is Inelia Stanley and that she resides at Cardin, Oklahoma

This information was obtained by Agent Phinaey from D. Security of the Peace at Cardin. Ho information was obtained regarding the whereabouts of Edna Murray and Agent Phinney was instructed to said the Cardin make arrangements with the telegraph office and with his contact in Cardin that the Oklahoma City office be notified immediately should any information be obtained regarding the location of this woman. Felix Al'taffer, Police Sergeant at Tulsa, Oklahoma, who was furnished with the information contained in wire from the Division dated September 25, 1954, advised that the Chief of Police at Howata, Oklahoma had furnished the Tulsa Police Department with the information that "Blackies Thompson, a notorious Oklahoma outlaw, was living with Ophelia Anderson, wife of Charlie Staleup a bank robber, in a house near Sapulpa, Oklahoma, Al'taffer thought that then might be a possible connection with this information and that furnished by from El Paso by the woman companion of Thompson using the name of Anderson and the fact that she, the Anderson woman, and Sharlie Staleup were at one time alleged to have been connected with this Barker mob. been previously mentioned as an informant in this case, was interviewed by the writer and advised that he had received no further definite information regarding the operations of this mob. One bit of information, however, which he thinks may be worth something is the escape of Howard Kilmer, Ho. 25000; from the sub-prison on August 50, 1954. Kilmer, he said, has never been implicated with any gang but has been in jail practically all of his life, being now 25 years old. While Arthur R. 

## MEMORANDUM POR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Cowley telephoned and advised that he had just talked Guiname and Mr. Guiname advised him that the woman they have out there will protect Chase in any way possible but she does not feel this way about Melson; that Guinane believes she might be utilized to some advantage by letting her go and see if she will put Welson on the spot, which she says she will do. Mr. Cowley stated that he told Mr. Guinane to proceed with this plan. I stated that I thought this was all right. I asked if they had heard anything from Butte on the Belens leed and Mr. Cowley stated that Dickason apparently, as soon as he got this information, salled the Sheriff's office up there and the Sheriff's office advised him that Chase laft there on Sanday that Dicksson is on route to Helens but he, Cowley, told Guiname to send eneth wan there from San Frencisco. Mr. Cowley stated that if this was a good lead... Mr. Dicksson gave it to the sheriff's office. I told Mr. Cowley that, if possible, we would like to establish the fact that he left there and if a man goes up from San Francisco, it will take a couple of days and the lead will be cold. Mr. Cowley stated that the reports are that he is going back and will be back within a week and in addition to that, it was not known yesterday whether he had received that package but if he left Sunday, the chances are that he probably has not received it. I stated that it was mailed on Saturday and would take several days.

Mr. Cowley advised that he is leaving at 4100 o'clock this afternoon for Los Angeles. I told Mr. Cowley that I was there when the Director talked to him last night and the Director was quite interested in the Montana angle.

Mr. Cowley stated that when he gets to Los Angeles, if this looks good, he will go up to Glasgow and them to San Francisco; otherwise he will go to San Francisco first and then to Glasgow. Mr. Cowley stated that they know that this contact is there and he has indicated that he would be there for

the opening date of the gambling house which is the 15th. Mr. Cowley stated that the crowd is evidently up there. Mr. Cowley stated that if they can get Volney Davis, this will be very good as he will talk and he, Cowley, is banking on his pointing out the hideout.

Mr. Cowley asked about Vivian Mathis and stated that she has given us all she has. I told Mr. Cowley to remove her if we have everything we can get from her; that they should file on her.

Mr. Cowley asked if the release had been made and I told him that it was made at 12:00 o'clock and is on the front pages of the paper here and was given out at New Orleans at 12:10.

I teld Mr. Cowley that I saw a letter from Mr. Ledd to the # effect that the United States Attorney at St. Paul is going to molle pross the McLaughlin indictment and Mr. Ladd suggests that they be indicted in Chicago. Mr. Cowley stated that he has not taken this up but if they can get a continuation on it and we can locate the hideout, it will be very encouraging and will bolster up the case as a whole and if we see get a bunch of the subjects by them, they will probably be able to convict the whole bunch together. I told Mr. Cowley that we did not have a prayer to get into Court on in this case. Mr. Cowley stated that if we can find the hideout or get one or two of the subjects, we will have. I stated that a continuence would not make much difference; that we will get these things eventually and then we can go shead and indict them. Mr. Cowley stated that he did not think they could be indicted in Chicago and I stated that I did not think the continuation or keeping alive this indictment is particularly important now as we have a couple of years before the statute rans and they sen always be reindicted.

Mr. Gowley stated that he will leave at 4:00 unless he advises to the contrary and he is sending in a teletype message to this effect.

Carter and two companions who were alleged to have been with him in El Pasa,
Texas, in April or May, 1955. It appears that O. B. Carter is well known to
the Caskey family. The letter stated that Agent Gore was particularly excious
to learn the identity of the persons who were with Carter at that time.

Agent checked the hotels at Kl Paso, Texas, with the following results at the Bussmann Hotel: On May 16, 1935 at 5:16 P.M., O.B.Garter of 40 Chicago Ave., Chicago, Ill., R. Shellenberger of Chicago and J.G.Zeigler of S141 Gunderson, Oak Park, Ill., checked into Room 439 at the Massmann Hotel, their registration eards being Nos. 8510B, 6516B and 8517B. They checked out on May 17.

O. B. Carter and R. Shellenberger again registered into Room 830 at the Busmann at 2:59 P.M., May 18, their registration eards being 8365 and 8364B, respectively. They checked out on the morning of the 19th at 6:80. There were no long distance calls charged to their rooms. Clarks at the hotel of course had no recollection of the individuals who had registered there on the above occasions more than sixteen months ago.

Mr. Caskey also informed the writer that he believed the persons who were with Carter at that time to have been one William Feaver and George Zeigler, although he did not see them and he was vague as to why he thought those were the parties. He remarked that Agent Gore had told Caskey's mother they had the case all seved up with the exception of William Feaver and George Zeigler.

The handwriting of the signature on the typewritten letter addressed to J. L. Hess & Company is identical with that of the letter addressed to the Warden, Tulsa, Oklahona, and dated August 8, 1929, and signed Mrs. G. E. Barker. This letter contains the statement that the writer is "Freddies mother".

The letter was written with an Underwood typewriter equipped with Pica type, the letters being spaced ten to the inch. Machines were equipped with this type as far back as 1922. This typing has been compared with that of all of the typewritten letters in the Bremer Case and with the extortion letters in the Hamm Kidnaping Case and with that of the Underwood Portable typewriter No. 596064 which was found in Cleveland, Ohio, at maddress which is thought to have been occupied by Alvin Karpis, but no identification has been made. In this connection attention is called to the fact that the extortion notes in both the Bremer and Hamm Cases were written with a Corona typewriter.

In the letter to the Warden signed by lirs. G. E. Barker the word "writing" was spelled "riting" in two instances, whereas, in the typewritten letter to J. L. Hess & Company this word is spelled correctly. This suggests the possibility that the letter to the J. L. Hess & Company was typed for lirs.

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American Legion for the past 10 years; that he is a member of tall sommittee at the present time, having been elected to same last year; that he has officially represented the Matichal Department for several years; however, he has never received any salary in connection therewith; that Hall was in Washington, D. C., about two or three weeks ago and stated at that time that he had two or three concessions at the World Fair in Chicago; however, Mr. Tolson did not learn the nature of these concessions.

Mr. Tolson further advised that Hall has attended the conventions for the past several years wherein he has assisted in the election of the National Commander of the American Legion; that he has a forceful personality and is a very good mixer; that he is considered a politician of no mean ability; that Hall has many potent contacts in political circles and has the ability to gain an audience with most anyone he desires at any time; that he is in line for a political appointment in Puerto Rico; that he is at the present time stopping at the Medinah Athletic Club in Chicago, Illinois; that Hall also has a local address of 518 Bond. Building, which is the National Headquarters of the American Legion.

Mr. Tolson stated that he believes that Hall can be trusted in connection with a confidential contact in the events the information desired from him would not involve himself in any respect.

Agent contacted the Veterans Administration, Perconnel Division, and there reviewed the file on Harry L. Hall, Hall was recommended by Department Commander Mamoy of the Puerto Rice American Legion and the Governor of Puerto Rico for a position as member of a special board of review in cases outside of the continental United States.

In an interview had with Veterans Administration officials, Hell gave his age as 53 years in July of 1955. He stated that he graduated from Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana; that

he is a railroad executive, real estate sperator and a member of Congress Post #12, American Legion, Puerto Rice, and gave this address at that time as Landover (Cheverly), Maryland, fall was also recommended by Lewis Johnson, Mational Commander of the American Legion.

On August 34, 1935, Hall was given an appointment alternate member of a special board review at a salary of \$15.00 per diem while in active duty, and \$5.00 additional per diem while in travel status. He was discharged November 22, 1935 without projudice and on January 8, 1934 was appointed as Control Officer and Junior Investigator in Grade Caf 11 at a sqlary of \$2800 per annum for a period not to exceed 120 days. In connection with this application, Hall advised that he finished high school at Walcottville, Indiana in 1912; that he attended the Valparaise University from 1918 to 1915 taking a general business course; that in 1915 the began as a telegraph operator and agent for the Alto Railroad, and later chief dispatcher with the Seaborn Airline Railway until 1925. with the exception of the year 1918 when he was a Sergeant Majer with the Ellth Field Signal Battalion during the World War; that he entered the real estate and building business in 1925 and during 1924 and 1925 was engaged in that business at Puerto Rico; that i has been married 18 years with no childrens 

Hall further stated that he was Chairman of the Merican Legion and had been in their caucas for the past six or eight years; that he has special knowledge of insular and foreign departments, and has made a complete study of the American Legion in connection with foreign matters. Hall was given an appointment on January 8, 1934 as Control Officer and sent to Puerto Rico for a survey and investigation of the conditions there for a period of two months for the Veterans Administration and was given a discharge without prejudice May 7, 1934.

In May or June of 1934, William Stern of the American Legion Headquarters at Indianapolis, Indiana wired General Hines requesting that Hall be given a new appointment with the Veterans Administration as Control Officer. Mr. Stern was advised, however that there was no opening.

In June of 1954, Senator David L. Reed of Pennsylvania forwarded a letter to the General urging the reappointment of Hall as Control Officer. He was likewise advised that there was no opening.

On Amgust 28, 1954 Representative Jemes J. Langetta of New York City wrote in behalf of Hall for reappointment as Control Officer. He was also advised that there was no opening.

On July 12, 1954 while Hall was stopping at the Hotel Morrison, Edward Borof, supervisor of collections for that hotel wrote the Veterans Administration desiring information as to whether Hall was still connected with the Veterans Administration or if he was on leave of absence at that time; that Hall had made several statements to him to the affect that he was expecting as check each month from the Veterans Administration.

On July 9, 1934, Raymond N. Cuevas, Box 5696, Sentures, Puerto Rico addressed a letter to the Veterans Administration of vising that Hall hired a ear from him while Control Officer for the Administration on January 50, 1934 for a period of three weeks at \$25.00 per week, and that he had failed to pay the bill.

On August 15, 1954, the West-Indian Gil Company, San Juan, Puerto Rice, billed the Veterans Administration for gasoline and eil used by Hall in February of 1934 in the sum of \$29.65.


