I called Mr. Alt in connection with the Bremer case He advised that you had told him about Hanson, Stapleton and another Agent coming down there and stated that he is going to meet them at Jacksonville and give them additional instructions. He advised that you had mentioned the advisability of taking tracer ammunition with them, but that Connelley did not seem to think they wanted it. Alt stated he was sending additional tracer ammunition, and I suggested that he send additional gas and somefield lights in the event this thing goes on into the night. Alt stated that the Chief of Police had advised him that from his information there had been no shooting from within but that the boys have been shooting from without and the place is completely barricaded and the Sheriff is out there with a couple of deputies. I requested that some sort of contact be made with the Agents at the place so that they will recognize the additional men when they arrive, and Alt stated this would be done, and that he would keep me advised of developments.

Mr. Snydam telephoned and stated that it had been indicated that there was about \$10,000 found in the possession of Mrs. Barker at the time she was killed. I told him that this was true; that the sum of money found in the possession of Fred Barker and Mrs. Barker was somewhat in excess of \$10,000, and it was all right to state this to the press.

Mr. Suydam further stated that the Attorney General had handled the press conference in a very good manner; that the story had been broken about Dec Barker, but pertinent details as to his present whereabouts, etc., were not divulged to the press.



EMORANDO

Fred Barker is a member of the notorious family of criminals and is reputed to be the leader of the so-called Barker-Karpis gange He is a brother of Arthur R. Barker, who is maned in the indictment returned at St. Paul, Minnesota by the Federal Grand Jury on project May 4, 1934, charged, together with several others, with violating the Federal Kidnaping Statute dated June 22, 1932, arising out of the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, President of the Commercial State Bank, St. Paul, Minnesota, on January 17, 1934. Fred Barker was also one of the kidnapers of Bremer. The elder brother of the Berkers, Berman Barker, was a member of the motorious Kimes-Inman-Terrill gang of outlaws who operated throughout the Middle West during the late twentians Herman Barker committed suicide at Wichita, Kansas, on August 29, 1927, during a gun battle with police rather than submit to arrest A third brother, Lloyd Barker, is presently serving a sentence at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, charged with assembt ing a mail custodian. The mother of the Barker brothers, known as "Kate" or "Nother" Barker, travelled with them and is reported to have been a participant in their neferious crimes.

According to the records of the Identification Unit of the Division of Investigation Fred Barker has an extensive criminal record.

He was first arrested by the Police Department, Missi, Oklahoma, September 5, 1922 as Fred Barker, alias Gus Barker, on a charge of investigation, and was released.

On October 5, 1922 he was next arrested by the Pelice Department, Tulsa, Oklahoma, as Fred Barker, \$3204 on a charge of vagrancy, and sentenced to thirty days in the City Jail.

On December 19, 1925 he was arrested by the Police Department, Okmulgee, Oklahoma, as J. Darrows, #293 charge, investigation - bank robbery; released December 23, 1925.

The Police Department at Little Rock, Arkensas, on May 28, 1926 arrested him as Fred Barker alias T. B. Clang, #3575, on charges of being a fugitive from justice. He was immediately released to the Fort Smith, Arkensas, authorities under bond of \$1,000, on charges of burglary and grand larceny. This bond was later forfeited.

The Police Department at Ponca Sity, Oklahoma, July 25, 1926 arrested Barker as F. G. Ward on a burglary charge and delivered him to the Police Department at Minfield, Kansas.

On November 8, 1926, as Ted Murphy, he was tried and convicted by the Winfield, Kansas, authorities on charges of burglary and larceny and sentenced to serve from 5 to 10 years in the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, where he was received as Fred Barker, alias Ted Murray, \$9856, on March 12, 1927.

He was arrested by the Police Pepartment at Tulsa, Oklahoma, on June 10, 1951 as Fred Barker, \$5204, Oklahoma, on June 10, 1951 as Fred Barker, \$5204, charged with investigation — burglary and car theft. Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis are wanted by the authorities at West Plains, Missouri, where on December 11, 1951 they killed Sheriff Charles R. Kelly.

Considerable information has been gathered by Special agents of the Division of Investigation showing that Fred Barker and his gang were closely associated with members of the Keating-Holden-Nash gang, having participated with members of the this gang in numerous bank robberies. MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Ladd called and stated that the Chicago American carries Mr. Tracy to the effect that Doc Barker was secretly held by the II. S. for one week; that the papers have been calling him and he has been denying the story. The papers, according to Mr. Ladd, state he was held secretly in Chicago by the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department. "He was arrested as he left the North Side Apartment with a woman. At almost the same moment another group of Federal Agents raided an apartment at 3920 Pine Grove, killing Russell Gibson. On the day following the shooting, one of the newspaper men asked if it was not true that someone else had been taken in the near vicinity of the raid on the Pine Grove Avenue apartment. Ladd said no at that time, of course. After consulting you, I advised Mr. Ladd to inform that we had no comments to make on the subject. Mr. Ladd seems to think the information was received by the newspapers during their inquiry around the neighborhood after they had found some man and woman were taken.

Mr. Ladd stated he had taken signed statements from the people living in the hideout and had sent them home, there being nothing to indicate that they were mixed up in the activities. They are still holding Elmer Fermer, there was no record in the Veterans Administration of Herold I advised which is the latest spelling of the name given by Mr. Ledd. He stated that they had an 18-page statement from Elmer Farmer, which was not as yet signed, but it is believed that it will be in a few moments, in which he admits that Goetz asked him to get a house where he wanted to keep a few men for a week or ten days; that he acted as a guard around town for the gang while they had Bremer in the house; that he tried to find out if any investigation was being made and reported to the gang; that the second day Bremer was kept at the hideout Alderton told him that it was Bremer who was held there for ransom. Elmer Farmer knows all of the gang and can identify their photographs and states that a few days after Bremer was released, Goetz gave him \$1000. I stated he had better be included in the indictment.

In connection with Monte Carter, Mr. Ladd stated he did not believe he was directly in on the kidneping but obtained approximately \$3000 from Goetz afterwards. He steyed with Mrs. Goetz most of the time during Goetz's absence. It is believed Carter should be indicted and held as a witness, and that we should endeavor to have him placed on probation; that if we released him the police would probably pick him up and charge him with participation in the St. Valentine's Day Massacre. Mr. Ladd stated Farmer will identify both of the Barkers as being present at the hideout.



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TANK

I telephoned the Jacksonville Office and talked to Agent Lacour in the absence of Mr. Alt. He stated Mr. Alt had been informed by the Associated Press that a report was received from the representative of that association at Ocala, Florida, to the effect that a battle had been raging since day-break or 7 o'clock this morning. I inquired as to whether Mr. Connelley had made any effort to arrange for telephonic contact during the course of the battle. Ocala is 107 miles from Jacksonville, and Mr. Lacour surmised that it would take less than two hours to reach there from Jacksonville via plane.

Mr. Lacour further advised that the point at which the igents are now operating is about 13 miles from Ocala, which means is is about 120 miles from Jacksonville. Mr. Lacour stated he has been through the section of Florida surrounding Ocala, and it is not a thickly populated section. The house in which the members of the gang are located is situated on a lake, and although there are quite a few small towns in the vicinity, Ocala is the nearest town of any size. Upon further consideration, Mr. Lacour stated that he felt they could reach Ocala in one hour travelling by plane, and it would possibly take half an hour to reach the scene of the battle by automobile.

Mr. Lacour stated that only he and Mr. Alt are left at Jacksonville. Se will call immediately upon receipt of further information.

MINDEANDUM FOR MR. TES

Mr. Alt telephoned from Jacksonville, Florida, and stated he had just returned from the Associated Press headquarters, in accordance with your instructions. He learned a bulletin was received to the effect that a group of about fifteen Agents and an undetermined number of ach from Chicago were engaged in a gum battle at Oklawaha, about fifteen miles from Ocala; that the firing had been continuing since 7 o'clock this morning; that the gangsters are berricaded in a deserted house; that there are no casualties on either side, although machine gum fire was coming from both sides.

I stated that I want to be certain Mr. Connelley has sufficient munition in gas and guns. Mr. Alt advised that a group of Agents left Jacksonwille this morning at 1:00 o'clock, at which time they had plenty of equipment. Mr. Alt was deeply concerned because he had not been able to contact any one in Ocala in order to get information. He places no confidence in the sheriff at Ocals. I told him I had in mind having either him or Mr. Lacour proceed to Ocals by chartered plane to make contact if it could be done safely, without becoming involved in the firing. I remarked that of course the members of the Karpis-Barker gang are the worst criminals in the entire country, and particularly not knowing the extent of their equipment and assumition, I am deeply concerned lest our Agents exhaust their supply of equipment. Mr. Alt said he insisted last i.e night that the Agents take shields with them, and although they were reluctant to do so because they felt they were not adequate to resist bullets; they did take them along; that the Agents were equipped with high-powered rifles and & .351 guns. Mr. Alt stated that he had left in the office a couple of Moniters, a rifle and one machine gum. He did not believe they would need more gums, but it is now rather a question of ammunition.

Mr. Alt inquired has be advisability of trying to contact somebody in Ocala. He stated he has heard favorable comments concerning the new Chief of Police at Ocala. Mr. Alt estimated that it would require approximately an Nr. Nathbour and a half to reach Ocala by plane. I expressed concern over the fact that the press representatives will now interfere with the situation in the vicinity of Clerof Ocala; that I have confidence in our Agents being able to handle situation of Bauriffothere is no interference of this type. Mr. Alt did not feel that we need that Clerof Cleanticipate such interference due to the fact that they are located at an isolated of Spot and there had been no leak until this morning. I stated that no doubt the Edwinews reel and movietone representatives will rush in as soon as they learn there

he take with him additional high-powered rifles and ammunition. Mr. Alt said he would arrange immediately for Mr. Lacour to proceed to Ocala by the fastest plane available. I instructed that Mr. Lacour proceed by automobile from Ocala to the scene of the battle, taking with him the guns and ammunition, and them arrange to get in touch with us to inform as to the status of the situation.

Mr. Alt stated that in the meantime, he would also attempt to make contact at Ocala by telephone.

Mr. Connelley telephoned from Florida and stated that the parties in the house opened fire on them first, whereupon the Agents returned the fire with the result that both Mrs. Barker and Fred Barker were killed; that Mrs. Barker had in her hand at the time of her death at machine gun, and Fred had apparently emptied a machine gun and had started to use his automatic at the time he was killed by a shot from a 30.06 rifle. They found four \$1000 bills in Fred Barker's money belt, in addition to two machine guns, four bullet-proof vests, a Harlin rifle, two shot guns, a .22 rifle, some old shot guns and quite an amount of ammunition which was found at various places in the house.

· . Mr. Connelley stated that he has to appear tomorrow at 11:00 A.M., before the coroner's jury. Mr. Connelley stated that he would limit his 🗈 testimony to the fact of their identity, their connection with the Karpis-Barker gang and the Bremer kidnaping, and their past criminal record. Hr. Connelley stated that he antitipated no trouble in this inquest as the people and officers down there were very cooperative.. He stated that while he has not as yet contacted the United States Attorney, there may be some question as to whether or not we were authorised to take the money and guns out of 🤭 the house, and if such a question does come up, he will then contact the; United States Attorney.

Mr. Connelley stated that in view of the availability of numerous Agents in that particular section of the country at the present time, he is deemed it advisable for him to personally proceed to Miami, Florida just as soon as possible and there conduct an investigation to find Karpis and Campbell, who are believed to be in that vicinity. I told him that I concurred in this, and just as soon as the Coroner's jury inquest is over, he should then proceed to Miami.

Hr. Connelley stated that the newspaper men and the movietone men have been swarning around the place, but they have been allowed to photograph enly the outside of the house; that as a matter of fact, no one has been allowed to enter the house; that they are not being allowed to photograph our men.

Mr. Connelley stated that the man who owns the house is coming up tonight, and Mr. Connelley is going to tell him just exactly where he stands in this matter; that this man is a member of that crowd who runs the various race tracks, etc., in end around Miami, and it is possible that he is implicated.

Mr. Connelley stated that the very best of cooperation has been extended by the county officers down there; that after the bettle they came around and congratulated him and the Agents on their work. I teld Mr. Connelley that he should make a note of the names of any of these men who were of particular assistance and I would in the due course of time drop them a personal note of thanks. Mr. Connelley stated that there are a couple of the men who he thinks should be paid \$50,000 of \$100,000 for their services. I teld him that we would certainly approve any such just payments to parties deserving the same. I teld him to also make a note of the mames of the Agents who were of particular service in this matter.

Reference is made to our conversation concerning the <u>Identification</u>
Order and temporary wanted notice situation

I am informed that an Identification Order was issued with respect to Doc Barker because he was definitely identified as being connected with the Bremer kidnaping. This participation was predicated upon fingerprints developed from a gasoline can used by the kidnapers of Mr. Bremer. Barker and Alvin Karpis had been indicted for conspiracy to kidnap, Karpis having been identified as the person who purchased flashlight batteries which were identified in connection with the case.

I am informed by Mr. Tamm and Mr. Newby that Fred Barker was not made the subject of an Identification Order because there was not sufficient evidence upon which to base an I. O. However, the Division knew that Fred Barker was a member of the Barker-Karpis mob and on this basis issued what is called a temporary wanted notice requesting all offices to personally call upon the Chief of Police or the person in charge of the identification bureau in the larger cities of the districts for the surpose of requesting that any information concerning the whereabouts of Fred Barker be promptly reported to the field office. Other temporary wanted notices were issued with respect to Harry Campbell, Volney Davis, Charles J. Fitzgerald, Jess Doyle, Clyde Nimerick, Harry Sawyer, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver. Copies of these wanted notices are attached and I am informed that these are the only wanted notices ever issued by the Division.

Mr. Tamm and Mr. Newby inform me that no Identification Order was issued on Maw Barker because there was no evidence of her actual participation in the kidnaping. They state that no temporary wanted notice was issued with respect to her because her fingerprints were not available. She has no criminal record apparently.

Your attention is invited to the fact that Fred Barker was wented by the Police Department and Sheriff's Office at West Plains, Missouri, and that he was wanted for escape and assault with intent to kill by the Police Department of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and the Sheriff's Office of Claremore, Oklahoma. Mr. Newby further informs me that at the recent conference at Chicago, he argued very strongly in favor of re-indicting all of the Karpis-Barker gang for the kidnaping of Mr. Bremer for the Division's protection in the event of killing of any of these individuals. He stated that he was alone in his position concerning this matter and that the other officials and Agents in attendance felt no good purpose would be served by this action. I would have been inclined to favor Mr. Newby's suggestion. I think that in all of these cases

wherein there is sufficient evidence to justify an indictment, such an indictment would serve as protection to the Division in the event these individuals were subsequently killed or in the event any persons were killed in connection with efforts to apprehend and capture such persons. I am not at all sure that Mr. Tamm agrees with this viewpoint as he seems rather inclined to the view that efforts to apprehend individuals in such instances may be circumvented by publicity which usually results from the issuance of an Identification Order. While the Division Agents clearly were fully justified in killing Fred Barker and Maw Barker in that they resisted arrest when they were being sought for questioning, there is no indictment of record specifically charging them with participation in the kidnaping. Of course, it is true that Fred Barker was wanted for murder but there is no criminal record of Maw Barker.



MENORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNET GENERAL

With further reference to the investigative activity of this Division in the Edgard G. Bremer kidnaping case on January 8, 1935, Special Agents of this Division took into custody Arthur R. Barker, alias "Dock" Barker, alias Bob Barker, alias Claude Dale. Barker was apprehended in the city of Chicago coincident with the fatal shooting of Russell Gibson, one of his associates, in another section of the city of Chicago, while resisting arrest being made by Special Agents of this Division. Arthur R. Barker was named along with several others as one of the defendants in an indictment returned by the Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota, on May 4, 1934, charged with violating the Federal Kidnaping Statute, in that on January 17, 1934, he and the other defendants kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, President of the Commercial State Bank of St. Paul, Minnesota.

Arthur R. Barker is a member of the notorious Karpis-Barker gang. Fred Barker, his brother, and Kate Barker, his mother, were killed in gun battle with Special Agents of this Division in the vicinity of Ocala, Florida, yesterday morning. Arthur R. Barker was convicted of the murder of Thomas J. Sherrill, an aged night watchman at the St. Johns Hospital, Tulsa, Oklahoma, on August 26, 1921. He was sentenced to life in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, but was paroled from that institution on September 10, 1932.

Barker has been removed to St. Paul, Minnesota, where he will be arraigned under the indictment charging him as one of the participants in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer.

HEJORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

I am attaching hereto a memorandum covering the arrest of Arthur G. Barker, otherwise known as "Dock" Barker. He is a brother of the Fred Barker whom we killed near Ocala, Florida yesterday. You will note that we arrested this man on January 8, 1935, at Chicago, Illinois. At the present moment, he is being removed from Chicago to St. Paul. He has not as yet reached St. Paul, and will not reach St. Paul until some time late this afternoon. I do not know whether you desire to make formal announcement of this arrest until he has reached St. Paul. I would see no objection to announcing that we have in custody Arthur Barker, but I do not believe it would be wise to indicate that he is being taken to St. Paul until he has actually reached the city of St. Paul. The Barkers have many underworld friends and it is within the reals of possibility, though not probability, that some effort might be made to release him from the custody of our Agents upon their arrival at St. Paul. There have been a number of newspaper stories published in the Chicago papers, indicating that Barker was in our custody, but there has been no confirmation from official sources of this fact. Of course, he is and has been in our custody since January 8, 1935.







These photographs were forwarded to this office with your letter of December 19, 1934, reletive to a possible connection these men might have had with a bankrobbery reported to have occurred recently in Missouri and possibly near St. Joseph. You will recall that it was also pointed out in the shore letter that Myrtle Eaton was thought to be associating with one Ollie Eheridan, who during the surmer of 1934 married Gray, who in turn leter met his death in the above mentioned robbery. Inquiries were made by this office at the Kensas City, Missouri, and the Kansas City, Kansas, Police Departments, as well as the Kansas City office of the Mm. J. Burns Detective Agency. In the first two instances, the search of the files revealed no information concerning these men, nor were there any facts forthcoming re-Intive to a bankrobbery in Missouri during which the above mentioned Enlier Gray was killed; it was likewise impossible to determine whether or not Wolker and Gates were associates of the latter. In like manner, the files of the Rm. J. Burns Detective Agency revealed no information concerning any of these men, nor could they advise this office of any recent bankrobbery in Missouri in which any of the perticipants had been killed.

On 1-11-35, the records of the St. Joseph, Missouri, Police Department at St. Joseph were examined, and it was ascertained there that Walter Gray, St. Joseph Police Department Mo. 1852, had a record on file dating as far back as 11-15-1915. A review of the same with particular emphasis being pleced upon his physical description and peculiar characteristics made it apparent that this person is identical with the one whose photograph was sent to this office as stated above. However, it will be noted that the fingerprint classification obtained from the St. Joseph, Missouri, Police Department is

Inquiries of the above bureau further developed the fact that the criminal record of Gray had been sent by the Division to the Sheriff's office at Cedar Rapids, Towa, under date of 2-6-29, a copy of which had been forwarded to the St. Joseph, Mo., Police Department. Furthermore, there was also a remard notice of \$50.00 in the files of the St. Joseph, Mo., Police Department, which had been posted by the Sheriff's office of Polk County, Osceola, Nebraske, offered for the return of Walter Gray, with aliases, for excape from the Polk County Jail.

As regards recent bank robberies in the vicinity of St. Joseph, however, Mr. W. W. Davis and Mr. B. T. Andrews, who are in charge of the records of that Bureau, stated that Bo one had been killed in recent offenses of thet nature, adding that the only fatality of that kind which had been brought to their notice was the one following the robbery of a bank sometime last November at Kinney, Nebraska. On that occasion, a man by the name of Brodell was killed. It is thought in this connection that Brodell is identical with Karl Keeling, who met his death following participation in a recent bank robbery at Kinney, Nebraska.

Apart from the above information obtained from the St. Joseph, Missouri, Police Department, no further facts relative to any of the individuals whose photographs were transmitted to this office is available; accordingly, they are being returned herewith.

Inasmuch as the Division is anxious to cause indictments to be returned at the earliest possible time, I agreed to this, and under the circumstances I hope you will see fit to comply with the request of the United States Attorney.







MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Pursuant to your instructions, I telephoned Special Agent K. R. KcIntire, presently at the St Paul Office, for the purpose of assisting in the preparation of a new indictment in the Bremer Kidnaping Case. I instructed him to have included in the indictment the names of the following individuals:

Fred Barker Arthur R. Barker Kate Barker Alvin Karpis Volney Davis Harry Campbell William (Weaver Jess Doyle Edna Lurray Myrtle Eaton Harry Sawyer Joseph P. Moran George Zeigler alias Fred Goetz Byron Bolton alias Lionte Carter Elmer Farmer Harold Allerton RECORDED J. J. McLeughlin, Sr William E. Vidler Philip J. Delaney Russell Gibson alias "Slim" Oliver A. Berg alias "Izzy" Willie Harrison



I inquired of Mr. McIntire whether investigation in the Chicago Office had disclosed the names of any additional individuals who should be included in the new indictment. He stated that he did not have the list before him but that he recalled the name of James Wilson as being considered as one of the defendants, inasmuch as Wilson had furnished a lengthy signed statement, and, therefore, in order to hold him to this statement, it is their intention to include his name in the indictment.

Mr. McIntire also advised me that he obtained an eighteen page signed statement from Elmer Farmer, implicating himself, in that he received \$1,000. for his part in the kidnaping, and setting out that on the second day after Bremer's arrival at the hideout, he was advised by allerton that Bremer was being held in the back room. It was also Farmer's duty to seek information relative to any investigations being made at the time Bremer was being held. Farmer includes in his statement the fact that he observed at the hideout Fred Barker, Arthur Barker, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, William Weaver, George Zeigler and Byron Bolton. He cannot identify Volney Davis as being present at the hideout, although he has since become acquainted with Davis who is known to him as "Cotton". Lr. McIntire advised that a copy of the statement obtained from Farmer would, no doubt, reach Washington some time this morning.

Mr. McIntire also advised that at the time he received my 'phone call he was on his way to the United States Attorney's Office, and that after conferring with the United States Attorney, he will again call the Division, advising of the results of the conference.

Agent has contacted Micky McCard who is caddy master for Harrison brothers, Walter Elmer and "onald at Algonquin Country Club, St. Louis Mo. Daskalos family are very close friends of the Harrison family and visit quite often in their home. Agent has also contacted A. A. Ruddick a roomer at Daskelos home who has met Willie Harrison) Investigation previously conducted by agents of this Div ision reveal Mr. W. J. Harrison, who lives at 4539 Gibson Ave. Qt. Louis, Missouri, has a son whose name is William J. Harrison, who is supposed to be living in Chicago, Illinois and has been reported a companion of st Mrs. Kate Barker, a subject in the above entitled case. In addition 🕏 to the above information, it has also been ascertained that this son Willie has recently made several visits to his parents' home in St. Louis. In view of the above circumstance, this agent was instructed on November 18, 1934 to secure a room in the neighborhood as close as possible to the Herrison home for the purpose of securing information as to Willie Herrison's whereabouts or any visits he might pay his parents in the near 3 Division 2 St. Paul 2 Chicago (E. J. 2 St. Louis COPIES DESTROYEL 11 MAR 22 1965

Agent secured a room at 4541 Gibson Ave., the same being next door to the Harrison home. This place is occupied and owned by one George Daskelos, a Greek, who is partly paralyzed, and lives with his wife and small son. In addition to Daskalos family agent ascertained that there were three other roomers living at this address; that one of these roomers whose first name is George, age about 20, is now working as caddy at the Algonquin Country Club near St. Louis; that Willie Harrison has three brothes, Elmer, Donald and Walter who are golf professionals and are also the proprietors of the supply store at this club. Agent deemed it advisable to tell the Daskalos family that he was a ranger from Texas and had recently sold some cattle, and was intending to remain in St. Louis for a few weeks' visit. Inasmuch es agent is acqueinted with Texas and had his own automobile bearing Texas license plates, it was deemed appropriate to use the above plan in this investigation. The first few days was spent in attempting to gain the friendship of the Daskalos family.

On December 3, 1934 agent had general conversation with Mr. Ruddick who mentioned knowing Willie Harrison; that he had met him on the porch of Daskelos' home during the summer; that he seemed to be a sport or a gambler but did not know of his own knowledge, what business he was in.

On December 4, 1934, agent had lunch with Daskalos' family. Mrs. Daskalos mentioned that Mr. Herrison was subject to fainting spells and his doctor had ordered him not to leave home alone; that he had low blood pressure and might drop dead at any time.

On December 5, 1934 while in general conversation with George, the ceddy boy, who rooms with Daskalos' family, George stated that he was sure Willie Herrison would visit his perents' during the Christmas holidays; that he was well acquainted with Willie and that Willie had asked him to visit him if he would ever come to Chicago. At this point of the conversation, agent expressed his desire to visit Chicago and would like to have someone who was acquainted with Chicago, show him around while there. George fur ther stated he would like to accompany agent on this trip for a few days but that he did not think he could get off from his work but would try and secure Willie's address from his brother Elmer and give it to agent if he was unable to get off. At this time agent stated his desire to visit Chicago while the weather was good but deemed it inadvisable to press George in getting Willie's address, as George questioned agent very closely as to what business he was in and how long he intended to visit in St. Louis.

On December 6, 1934 while driving through Forest Park, St. Louis, Missouri with George the caddy boy, agent mentioned again his desire to visit Chicago and George stated he would get Millie's address

as soon as possible and give same to agent. On arriving home at 4541 Gibson Ave., agent met Mr. William Harrison, Sr. who was walking from Kingshighway St. car line to his home at 4539 Gibson Ave. George introduced Mr. Harrison to agent. At this time, George asked Mr. Harrison for Willie's address at Chicago and Mr. Harrison stated he did not know his address; that Willie ran around all over the country; one timehe would hear from him in Havana and the next, somewhere else, but he would get his address as soon as he heard from him and give it to agent; that Willie was well acquainted with Chicago and he was sure Willie would be glad to show this agent around in Chicago.

At this time, Mr. Harrison excused himself, stating he had told his wife he was going around the block for a walk but had been downtown at Union Station instead; that he had fainting spells and his wife would "raise Cain" with him if she found out he had been downtown. He further stated that his family treated him as if he were a small child; that he had four boys and he was in as good physical condition as any of them. It should be noted, at this time, that Mr. Harrison is 83 years old.

On December 7, 1934 while in general conversation with the Daskelos family during the afternoon, Mr. Harrison came in and stated during his visit that he was the father of five boys, one deceased and four living; that three of his sons lived in St. Louis. Walter and Elmer living with him and Donald living with his wife a few blocks away, and that Willie was supposed to live in Chicago but did not stay there much of the time; that he traveled all over the world; that he had heard from him once during the summer in . Havana and another time in Florida; that he did not know what kind of business Willie was in, but seemed to make a good living and lots of money. Mr. Harrison further stated that Willie usually visited him on July 4 and Christmas and that he was sure he would come home during the Christmas holidays; that he did not have any idea where. Willie was at the present time but would probably hear from him in the near future. Mr. Harrison further stated he would like to show agent around St. Louis as he had lived here eighty years and had watched the city grow from a smell village to its present size; that as soon as the snowmelted, he would be glad to show agent the places of interest.

On December 18, 1934 while in general conversation with the Daskalos femily and while standing on the porch about 9:30 P.M. Elmer Harrison arrived home, welking. Daskalos invited him to come over and have a drink. A few minutes later, Elmer arrived and rang the doorbell at the Daskalos home. Agent was introduced to him. While in general conversation with Daskalos, Ruddick, Mrs. Daskalos and Elmer, Daskalos asked Elmer if Willie was coming home for Christmas. Elmer stated that he did not know whether Willie was coming

home or not; that he did not now where he was at this time and the family had not heard from him lately; that he might "blow in" at any time; that he usually came home some time during the Christmas holidays. During this conversation, Elmer asked agent what business he was in and how long he intended staying in St. Louis, and if he could play golf, and on being informed that agent did not know how to play golf, Elmer offered to instruct agent as soon as the weather would permit. Elmer further stated that he usually took a trip to California every year, leaving St. Louis the day after Christmas; that the family tried to be together on Christmas day; that he did not know whether he would go this year or not. About 1:00 A.M. Elmer stated he was going home, that he needed a little sleep and would have to get up early and go to the club, but would come back during the following afternoon and bring Daskalos a drink if he wanted it; that he had bought a large supply of whiskey for Christmas.

On December 20, 1934 while in general conversation with Mr. Harrison who was visiting the Daskalos family, Mr. Harrison stated that they were going to have a Christmas dinner and that they were expecting Willie home most any day; that Willie was a good sport and he was very anxious for agent to meet him; that if agent still wanted to visit Chicago, he would try to have Willie accompany him on this trip; that he was sure Willie would be glad to do this. Mr. Harrison further stated that he wanted to show agent Shaw's Garden (a botanical garden in St. Louis) as soon as the weather would permit.

On December 21, 1934 while in conversation with Daskalos family, Walter Herrison came in for a visit. Daskalos asked Walter if they were expecting Willie home for Christmas and Stated that they were expecting him most any day; that they had not heard from him but he always came home on Christmas; that sometimes he would just drop in unexpectedly without writing or wiring.

On December 24 Elmer Harrison visited with the Daskalos family. While in general conversation, Daskalos asked Elmer if they had heard from Willie and if he knew whether or not he was coming for Christmas. Elmer stated that they had not heard from Willie but was sure he would come home; that Willie thought too much of his mother not to come home. At this time, Elmer stated he was going to a party and would have to leave, and regretted it very much stating he would like to show agent a good time; that he would give a party for agent during the holidays.

On December 28, 1934 Mr. Herrison accompanied agent on a four-hour ride through the city. While in general conversation, Mr. Herrison stated that they had received a package from Willie who was in Chicago at this time but would be home in the next few days; that Willie always came home for Christmas. While driving, Mr. Harrison

remarked that agent was a good driver; that two of his sons Walter and Willie were very good drivers especially Willie; that Willie drove a rich elderly lady from Chicago to Kansas City during the summer and stopped by home for a few hours. It should be noted that this woman is thought to have been Kate Barker a subject in this case.

....

On December 31, 1934 Daskalos' family gave a New Year's Dinner for agent and the Harrison boys. Elmer and Walter Harrison were present and a place was set for Willie as he was expected home most any time. While in general conversation with Walter, he stated he was sure Willie would come home during the night or next day. Walter further stated that he had rooms 506 and 508 rented at Claridge Hotel, 18th and Locust St., St. Louis, Missouri and invited agent to come up during the night; that he had invited several of his friends to come up and wanted agent to meet them; that if Willie arrived during the night, he would also be there. Agent proceeded to rooms 506 and 508 and met several young couples who were attending a New year's eve party and dance given by the hotel. Agent stayed around the hotel until 3:00 A.M. with the rest of the party until it broke up, but Willie never appeared.

On January 1, 1935 agent had a conversation with Mr. Harrison who wished agent a happy New Year; that he was very anxious for agent to meet Willie before he departed for Texas; that they had been expecting Willie home all during the holidays and did not know why he failed to come but was sure they would hear from him in the next few days either by wire or letter.

On January 6, 1935 while in conversation with the Daskalos family, agent remarked that he was going to Chicago in the next few days. Mrs. Daskalos stated she would go next door and see Mrs. Herrison, mother of Willie Harrison, and secure his address, as agent might call on him while in Chicago. At this time, Mrs. Daskalos left to see Mrs. Harrison. About thirty minutes later, she returned stating that Mrs. Harrison informed her she did not know Willie's address; that she tried to locate him several days ago, as his insurance was about to lapse and she wanted to notify him about it, but was unable to locate him; that they had been expecting him home all during the holidays and now as he had failed to come, she was of the opinion he was in some other part of the country but could not understand why he had not communicated with her; that if she should receive word from him, she would be gled to give agent him address.

On Jenuary 8, 1935 Mr. Harrison visited agent at the Daskalos home during the afternoon. While in general conversation, Mr. Harrison stated they had not heard a word from Willie; that he and

Mrs. Harrison were worried about him; that he was very fond of his mother and always remembered her on Christmas by sending flowers but this was the first time he had failed to come home Christmas; that if agent would delay his trip to Chicago a few days, he was sure they would he ar from him. At this time agent made a date with Mr. Harrisonfor the following day to take a ride to Lambert Flying Field which is about twelve miles from St. Louis.

On January 9, 1935 about 1:00 P.M. agent, on company with Mr. Harrison drove to University City, Clayton, Missouri and onto Lambert Field. On arriving at Lambert Field a mail plane was leaving for Kansas City. Mr. Harrison stated that he had never been close to a plane and stated his desire to climb into one and examine it. Agent secured permission from a mechanic to look at several planes in the hangars. Mr. Herrison climbed into a plane and examined it from one end to another, stating that none of his boys had ever been up in a plane except Willie; that Willie came from California by plane during the summer and topped off at home for three or four days and caught another plane to Chicago; that Willie seemed to like flying and he had told him of taking several trips by air. At this time, egent stated his desire to visit Chicago and Mr. Harrison suggested that agent go by air and leave his car in his, Harrison's, garage, ... that he would be glad to take care of the car, that he hoped Willie would come home before agent departed so that he could tell agent all about flying. It should be noted at this time that the St. Louis morning papers carried a story about Russell Gibson one of the subjects in this case having been killed by Federal agents in Chicago and Willie Harrison, a St. Louis golf professional was being held with two women. During the entire afternoon, Mr. Earrison never mentioned reading this story and agent deemed it advisable not to mention subject. About 7:30 P.M., while in general conversation with Micky McCard, who is caddy master at Algonquin Club and works for the Harrison brothers, Walter Donald and Elmer, McCard stated that he was going downtown and agent offered to give him a ride as he does not have acar. While driving to town, McCard stated that Walter and Elmer had read the story in the morning papers about Willie and had destroyed the paper, so that their parents could not read it; that on account of their age, and extreme nervousness, they were afraid they could? not understand how Willie could have gotten mixed up with a gank of kidnapers; that Willie did not come home Christmas and they did not know what to think. McCard further stated that he had known Willie several years; that he was a heavy drinker and ran around with a wild crowd and that he was not a bit surprised to hear of him doing anything; that he hoped Mr. and Mrs. Harrison did not hear about it and asked agent not to mention anything bout it to Mr. Harrison; that he was sure Willie would communicate with Elmer in the next few days.

On January 15, 1935 while in conversation with Micky McCard, agent asked if the Harrison boys had heard from Willie. Micky stated that they had not and seemed to be worried; that they had no idea where he was at this time and that they were afraid he was mixed up with a bad gang since reading the story in the St. Louis papers but was sure he would communicate with them in the near future.







Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanehan, Kensas City, Mo., January 4, 1935, requesting that the New Orleans file 31-1845, in which Rex Reisner, with aliases, is the Subject, and Mrs. Elizabeth Allen is the Victim, be reviewed. This file has been heretofore reviewed at the New Orleans office but it contains only four serials which are reports in possession of the Kansas City office, the office of origin. This file contains no information relating to former home addresses of Rex Reisner but it did contain information regarding the criminal record of this individual. All of these records of arrest at New Orleans have been reviewed at the Police Department, New Orleans, and the information procured from the police files was checked and the result set out in the report of this agent dated December 20, 1934, at New Orleans. A review of the file at the office of the Secret Bervice at New Orleans indicated that in November, 1924, Edward L. Reisner, the father of Rex Reisner, resided at 8000 Independence Road, Kansas City, Missouri.

Maurice Woulfe, attorney, Balter Building, New Orleans, who represented Rex Reisner in a case involving violation of the National Automobile Theft Act, New Orleans file 26-4, which is mentioned in the report of Special Agent J. M. McGrath, New Orleans, La., December 20, 1934, was interviewed and stated that he was on the bond of Rex Reisner in that case and Reisner jumped the bond and was later apprehended by the Secret Service at the home of his father at Kansas City, Mo., some time in 1924. Mr. Woulfe said he has had no contact with Reisner since then and is unfriendly to him because Reisner skipped his bond. Mr. Woulfe said that Rose Chandler was a narcotic addict and a former associate of Reisner but he does not know where she is located and has not heard anything of her for a number of years. He said that he heard about four years ago that Lucille Houston, who has been mentioned as a former associate of Rex Reisner, and Doris O'Connor, is dead.

Special Agent Nottel was conducting investigation at Not Springs, trioners today, and incidental to other investigation, contacted T. T. FITZAH, Goneral Dolivery Clerk, United States Post Office, Hot Springs, Arkanses, Fittenn stated that a man giving the name of J. BATCS resided in Not Springs. Arkansas for a period of two resks prior to January 13, 1935, at which time he departed. Each day that J Bates was in Bot Springs, he received a special delivery letter bearing the return address of 448 St. Peter St. St. Yeul, Minnesota. One J. E. BATRE of Hot Springs, Wanses, operates the Terminal Hotel at that place. On or about January 12, 1935, a letter intended for J. Bates, proviously referred to, was delivered to the Terminal Hotel to J. Z. Bates, the proprietor of said hotel. Hrs. J. E. Dotes opened the letter, insteach as the bolieved that it was intended for her. The letter contained the calutation of "Dear Ed":. A large part of the letter was disguised so that anyone reading it who wasnot familiar with the contents of γ_{ij} saws would not be able to decipher its monaing. Individuals referred to in the letter were mentioned by initials, for exemple: It was stated that the writer of the letter had soon F; J; and V. The letter appeared to have been written by a woman. Some reference was made in the letter to the Braver kidnening case, and it stated in substance: "If you were to come in and give up it would not amin you envitting". The letter was signed "Joe". On the day following, four St. Faul newspapers, also amparently intended for J. Bates were dolivered to the J. T. Batos family at the Terminal Hotel in Hot Springs. The newspagers contained several Brower kidnaping articles off of which were marked by the person who sont them. In the day the nowspapers were received, which was about January 13, 1935, they wore returned by J. K. Bates, proprietor of the Terminal Hotel, Bot Oprings, to the Postmaster. Kr. Bates discussed them with the Postal Clerk, T. W. Pittman, and he failed to mention it to the Postmaster. After they were returned to the Fost Office, T. W. Pittwan give then to J. Bord, for show they sere originally intended. J. RATES apporently beredictely left Hot Aprings, and in a latter dated Jenuary 14, 1935, midressed to the Fostmuster, be instructed that all mail for J. Bates

should be forwarded to 448 St. Peter St. 3t. Paul, Minnesota. This letter was signed J. E. BATES. On January 17, 1935, a telegram was received by the Postmaster at Hot Springs, requesting the Postmaster to forward all mail for J. Bates to General Delivery, Kansas City, Missouri. The telegram was signed J. BATES. According to T. W. Pittman two girls were apparently in the sompany of J. Bates.

Special agent in Charge R. E. Conroy communicated by telephone with Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan, Kansas City, Missouri, and the Kansas City office is conducting appropriate investigation at that place.

It is requested that the St.Paul office immediately initiate investigation with reference to the address of 448 St.Peter St.St.Paul, Kinn. It should be borne in mind that from the nature of the correspondence which was observed by the hotel keeper and his wife, at Hot Springs, the individual known as J. Bates may be a subject in this case. Special Agent in Charge Conroy is proceeding immediately to Hot Springs, Arkeness for the purpose of attempting to develop further information in this matter, and the St.Paul and Kansas City offices, as well as the Division, will be kept advised as to the developments.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ASSISTANT TO THE ATTORNET GENERAL MR. WILLIAM STANLEY

As you know, "Doc" Barker, one of the perticipants in the Bremer kidnaping, has been taken into custody and is presently incarcerated in the County Jail at St. Paul, Minnesota. I feel that "Doc" Barker is one of the most dangerous criminals in the country today and accordingly, every precaution should be taken, not only to prevent his escape, from the county jail, but also to prevent Barker's committing suicide. When Barker was placed in the County Jail yesterday, arrangements were made with the Sheriff to employ three special deputy sheriffs, so that one man will constantly remain in front of Barker's cell, keeping him under constant surveillance. The Sheriff's Office is unable to pay the expense of maintaining these three extra guards and accordingly, I recommend that the United States Marshal at St. Paul be instructed to employ three additional deputy mershals to maintain this constant guard of "Doc" Barker. Since the Sheriff at St. Paul has already employed three individuals known by him to be trustworthy, it is suggested that the Marshal at.St. Paul be instructed to employ as deputy United States Marshals those individuals who have already been employed by the Sheriff. In view of the urgency of this situation, it is requested that if you approve this suggestion, telegraphic instructions be issued to the United States Marshal at St. Paul this morning, authorizing the employment of these additional deputy United States Marshals.



Hemorandum for the File

At about 6:15 All a code wire was received from the Division re Alvin Karpis, Harry Arrival and Delores Delaney, requesting us to be on the lookout for 1935 two-door Buick Sedan, motor No. 4949155, serial No. 2783525, last seen with Florida license No. D-5306, that his Delaney is in a pregnant condition on verge of childhood. Also that all law enforcement offices should be notified by radio broadcast and teletype.

After de-coding the telegram this information was relayed to the Pennsylvania State Police, Philadelphia Police, Atlantic City Police, for radio and teletype, besides notifying the various bridge and ferry companies in the Philadelphia District.

At about 7:15 AM, Agent was advised that at about 6:50 AM, the Atlantic City Police had had a gun fight with Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, that they had taken a LaBalle Car and thinks that three men were in the car. The information with reference to the LaBalle car later proved to be false and is disregarded at this time.

Agent proceeded to call in the various agents, also notifying Mr. E. A. Them of the Division and Mr. Fierstone of the New York Office. Agents Sharp, Hiller, Meekins and Wills were sent to Atlantic City with Sharp in charge, upon advice from Captain Highy of the Atlantic City Police that Delores Delaney and Winonak Burdette had been captured after the gun fight, these two being girl friends of Marpis and Campbell.

Captain Highy later divised that the car in which Karpis and Campbell were last seen was a Contiac Coach pea-green color, 1935, New Jersey License A-3073, engine No. 1639382, Serial No. 887386, property of one Harold Brand.

This information was is mediately relayed to the various interested parties countermanding the request for a search for the LaSalle Sedan.

Memorandum for File

Mr. Tanm of the Division advised that the Division desired form waivers on both Winonah Burdette and Delores Delaney in order that they might be transferred from atlantic City, N. J. to our custody in Philadelphia. This office was advised also by Special Agent in Charge R. G. Harvey that in order to protect ourselves it was well to receive a doctor's certificate stating that Delores Delaney was in good enough condition to be removed to Philadelphia without any possible serious consequences.

Arrangements were made with Miss Woods of the Hahnemann Hospital, Broad & Race Sts., Philadelphia, to have Delores Delaney placed in a private room, No. 1018, under constant attendance of a special nurse and under the surveillance of two Special Agents at all times. This has been done.

Agent Gerdes proceeded to Atlantic City with waiver forms to be signed by lisses Burdette and Delaney. This office was advised at 5:00 PM by Mr. Sharp from Atlantic City that both girls had signed waivers and were willing to be transferred to Philadelphia, also that Dr. James H. Mason, 1616 Pacific Ave., Atlantic City, M. J. certified in writing that in his opinion Delores Delaney's condition would not be endangered by removing her to Philadelphia and this was substantiated by a written notification of Dr. Carl A. Surran, Surgeon, Department of Public Safety, Atlantic City, N. J.

At 5:00 PM Agent Sharp advised this office that Misses Burdette and Delaney were proceeding to Philadelphia, accompanied by Special Agents U. J. Gerdes and Ross Miller, of the Philadelphia Office, besides Dr. Surran and four Atlantic City police and County Sheriff Born of Atlantic City. The names of the city policeman were not obtained.

The parties arrived in Philadelphia at approximately 7:30 and Miss Delaney was immediately taken to her private room 1018 Hahnemann Hospital and is under the constant care of a nurse and at the time of this memorandum is being kept under the constant surveillance of Special Agents Fay and Knittle of this office.

Miss Burdette was taken into the Philadelphia Division Office awaiting such time when she can be placed in an apartment. Both she and Liss Delaney are being constantly questioned and as of 11:20 PM agents Ross, Miller, Townsend and Thompson are in the process of obtaining a written statement from her.

Hemorandum on Call from Agent Sharp, from Atlantic City, 11:00 A. H., 1-20-35

After conferring with the Atlantic City, N. J. P. D. Agent Sharp relayed the following information:

On the strength of the teletype sent by the Miami, Fla. P. D. the Buick Sedan, Florida license D-5306, was located in the Coast Garage on South Mentucky Ave., Atlantic City, at about 3:30 AM by Atlantic City Detectives Eddie Mulhern, George Brennan and Archie Whitham and Officers McGaffney and Morinelli, that they also had located the occupants of the car at the Hotel Danmore, 123 S. Kentucky Ave., Atlantic City, although this was about two hours later due to having some difficulty with a bell hop.

After a gum battle with two individuals who escaped, these officers arrested Winonah Burdette and Delores Delaney, the latter having been shot in the leg presumably by Karpis during the gum battle. Winonah Burdette stated that she and Delores Delaney had been staying at the Danmore Hotel, Atlantic City, with Alvin Karpis and Harry Carpbell.

The police pursued Karpis and Campbell who escaped in a Pontiac Coach color pea-green, 1935 New Jersey license A-3073, engine No. 1039382, Serial 887386, the car being the property of one Harold Brand. The police pursued them down Pacific Ave., Atlantic City, but lost sight of them and are not in a position to tell which way they are headed. The Buick is in the New Deal Garage, N. South Carolina Ave., Atlantic City.

A 0.22 Colt revolver and a 0.22 rifle were found in the car. Winonah Burdette believed that Campbell was shot in the scuffle and may be dead. Harpis had registered in the hotel under the name of Carson and Campbell registered under the name of Cameron.

Lr. Sharp advised that he would relay addition information as he received it.

Memorandum of Telephone Conversation with SA Sharp, 11:40 AM, 1-20-35 from Atlantic City.

Mr. Sharp advised that after the conversation with Winonah Burdette at the Atlantic City Detective Headquarters that she stated she had been picked up in Ponca City, Oklahoma, by Harry Campbell on or about 11-21-34 and taken by him in a Ford car to Florida. While in Ponca City she had been living at a place on South Elm Street and had been broadcasting over Station WHEZ with Jimmie and Eunice Burdette, her sisters.

She stopped at Lake Oklahawa with Fred and Kate Barker remaining there from about November 27, 1934, to last Sunday, January 15, 1935.

On January 9 Alvin Karpis visited them, coming from Miami. On January 13, she and Harry Campbell left for Miami, going to a house in Miami maintained by Marpis. At this place she met Delores Delaney for the first time. They stayed there until wednesday, January 16, 1935, at which time Karpis and Campbell left in the aforementioned Buick at that time giving the girls a slip of paper with the name Danmore Hotel, Atlantic City, advising them that they would meet them there.

The girls left by train on that date, transferred in Philadelphia, and arrived at Atlantic City about 2:15 PM, Friday, January 18, 1935. They were registered under the name of the Graham sisters.

The men arrived Saturday morning, about 1:00 Am. The men were registered in room 403 and the girls in room 400.

Morley, proprietor of the Danmore Hotel, Atlantic City, advising him that he was sending some friends and that he should see that these parties are referred to a good doctor. That they had been referred to Dr. Carl A. Surran who, incidently, is the Surgeon of the Department of Public Safety in Atlantic City, they having no knowledge that he held that position. This letter was presumed to have come from Randall at the Talliami Hotel, Miami, Fla. Morley was of the opinion that Randall could be located in Newark, N. J.

Note: SAC Connelly of the Cincinnati, Ohio, Office spoke with agent from the Jacksonville Office and advised that it was not necessary to attempt to locate Duke Randall in Newark, N. J. since he had an agent keeping Randall under constant surveillance at the Takiami Hotel, Liami, Fla.; that Duke Randall was employed by the Biscayne Dog Track at Riami, Fla. and in the event there was any possibility that Duke Randall would attempt to leave town he would immediately be picked up.

Summary Memorandum Telephonically Submitted by Agent Sharp from Atlantic City, N. J. 7:00 P. M. 1-20-35.

Notes were found in the clothing of Alvin Karpis and in the pocketbook of Delores Delaney indicating that Duke Randall had sent these parties to the Danmore Hotel in Atlantic City to contact Mr. Korley. Duke Randall was known to have lived at the Grant Hotel, Newark, N. J. last October. Ascertained from Morley of the Danmore Hotel that he had received a letter several days ago from Duke Randall on the stationery of the Talliami Hotel, Miami, Fla. stating that he was sending some friends to the hotel and that Morley should recommend them to a good doctor.

Pictures of Randall were obtained from Robert Brown, 137 S. Massaschusettes Ave., Atlantic City, who stated that he played in an orchestra managed by Randall in Atlantic City last year. Randall apparently stayed at the Danmore Hotel while in Atlantic City and is now working for the Biscayne Dog Track in Miami. Copies of these pictures had been sent to the Philadelphia Office by agent Miller to be used for identification of Randall who is known to have used the alias of Henry Stern.

The Pontiac Sedan, Motor No. 1039382, serial No. 887386, bearing New Jersey License, 1935, A-3073, which was stolen by Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis at the time of their escape from Atlantic City at the Coast Garage, 173 S. Kentucky Ave., was owned by Mrs. Elsie Brand, 44 S. Plaza Place, Atlantic City. He made his escape 5:50 AM after a gun battle with Atlantic City Police, both in the Hotel Danmore and in the streets in the immediate vicinity. The Atlantic City Police took into custody Winonah Burdette and Delores Delaney in room 400 of the Danmore Hotel.

These girls arrived in Atlantic City by train at 2:15 PM, Friday, January 18, 1935, from Miami, Fla. where they had been staying in an apartment with Karpis and Campbell. Winonah Burdette stated she had left Fonca City, Oklahoma, about Movember 21, 1934, where she had been living on Elm Street with her sister Jimmie Burdette and Eunice Burdette. They were broadcasting from Station WEBZ in Ponca City, Oklahoma. She proceeded with Harry Campbell from Ponca City to the house of Fred and Kate Barker at Okaholawolla, Fla., where she was from approximately Movember 28, 1934, until last Sunday, January 13, 1935.

ily name is Myone Burdett. I am El years of age. My parents are deed and when I am home I stay with my sisters Jinmie and Eunice Burdett on South Elm Street, Ponce City, Oklahoma. After I was released by the Division Agents in Chicago, Mrs. Samyor, Paula Marmon and myself went to Cleveland, Chic, and got our personal effects from the Lawyor there. Paula went to Beaumont, Texas from Cheveland and I accommanded Mrs. Samyor to St. Paul where I stayed at her friend's home whose name I do not recomber. Mrs. Danyor gave me \$100 and Paula Harmon had given me \$100. I took a train for Tulsa, Oklahoma, and I stayed with my sister Buth Minmery on East Second Ut. one might and then I went to Hominy, Okla. and stayed one might with another sister Eather Wilson and then I went to Jones City and started living with my other two sisters Jirmie and Dunice. I lived with them approximately aix weeks or two months and started to work at the Radio Station Web.B.Z. at Fonce City as an entertainer.

During the time I was in Penca I received no word or communication from Harry Compbell by letter or otherwise until one evening a few days before Thankagiving Day Harry Campboll came to my sister's home and I decided to go away with him again. Darry was driving a 1934 Ford Sedan and it had Florida license plates on it the numbers now being unknown to no. We drove to Oklamake Lake, Flo. where Fred Barker and his nother Eate Barker had a large house there on the lake. Harry and I lived here with Kate and Fred Barker until about January 13 when we left in Harry's Ford, each of us taking a suit-case for the purpose of visiting alvin Darpis and Dolores Delensy who were living in a house in Mari, The. During the time we lived in Oklawska I saw Dos Parior there only once and that was New Year's Day 1935. Slim Grey was with him. They stayed all day New Year's and left that night. They were alone. Harry and I left bunday the 13th and got in Bland, Flo. that night. I did not know the address where Ihrpis and belores lived but Harry know it. We stayed there Sunday night and Honday night, Tuesday and Wednesday the 16th. So board about the shooting at Oklammia on Hednosday morning over the redio. Doloros and I were at home alone on Hednosday A. H. and Harry and Earple were out fishing some place. They got in about 7:00 P. He made plans for Dolores and I to go to Atlantic City on the train and Harry and Earpis were to drive up and meet us. Harry and Harpis told Dolores and I to register at the Danmore lioted and and for a live liveloy at this hotel. Harry and Thryda laft sednesday night the 16th, driving for Atlantic City, and were to meet them at the hotel whore we would register under the name of lire. Greaten and sister. The boys did not tell us under what name they were going to register at the hotel. I do not know what therry did with his Ford our because they ours to Atlantic Sity in Earpis' Buick. So come to Buildelphia, Pa. by train and then transferred to another train for atlantic City. We arrived

in Atlantic City on Friday, January 19th, at about 2 R: and registered at the Damore Hotel and received room 400. I was not present when Dolores talked to either in. or ins. Horley and do not know what arrangements were made by her with them.

Karpis and Carpbell got in Saturday morning about 1:00 at and they came to our room. They told us the next sorning that they were eccupying room 405. Dolores and I did some shopping Saturday morning. We went to bed saturday night, I sleeping in room 403 with Harry and Earpie storing in room 400 with Dolores. I was in room 400 when I was awakened by Harry who was walking around in the room. It was some time before 6 o'clock in the morning because it was still dark. Harry told no to go down to room 400 and get Earpis. .. Herry soted sort of posuliar at thin time like he was having a nightrare. I ran out of 403 and down the hall to 400. I thought I saw a seem on the 3rd floor and I heard voices and I thought it was the officers coming. I knocked on the door at 400 and yelled at him and I said something was wrong and that the cops were coming. He opened the door and ran out of 400 in his unferwear and sont into roon 403. The hall was lighted and I stayed by the door of my room and watched. I now after a while Karpis in his underwoon headed for our room on the run and the cops who were in the hall were shooting at him. I did not see any gun in his hand when he ran toward our room. He almost pushed me over getting into the room. He grabbed his trousers put them on and then run back down the hall away from our door. I saw both Harry and Earpin disappear down the stops at the other end of the hall. This was the last time I saw either of them. Delores was hit by one of the bullets fired by the police as I did not see Harry or Alvin shoot at anyone. I do not recall hearing over three shots although there night have been more fired. Delores and I put on our coats irradiately after this and started down the ball in the same direction in which the boys had run. We were in our bare feet with nothing on under our coats but our night gome. We ren down the steps and out into the street and up the alley. The alley was full of water and gravel and finally Doloros who had been shot in the leg and who was also about roady to give birth to a child said she was getting week so I said let's go back to the hotel. We then went on back to the hotel to room 400. Deleres went to bed and I dresped. It's livrley had called the doctor and he care soon after. The officers were also there as soon as the doctor arrived. Dolores was taken to the hospital and I was taken to the City Jail. I went to add that after Dolores and I same down the stops and out of the hotel in trying to make our escape there was a lot of shooting around the corner from us.

I have known Harry Campbell for about four years. I know that both he and Alvin Karpis were bodly wonted by the Federal Government for crime charged against them particularly the Brower Eddauping at St. Paul, Him. I was conscious of this when I lived with Harry Campbell in Florida and also conscious of it when I agreed to meet him and Alvin Harpis at Atlantic City. M. J. having been advised of the fact by the Chicago Office of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, to which organization I previously made a statement concerning my impuledge of the activities of the so-called Eurpis-Borker gang. With this knowledge I knowingly told Alvin Eurpis that the cops were after him in Atlantic City, N. J. on Sumlay morning. January 20, 1935. At the time of my errest I had two (50 bills in my possession which Harry had given no. At the time of Harry's escape I believe he had

\$500. I do not know how much money Karpis had.

I have read this statement consisting of three typewritten pages and the same is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief.
