MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Jess Doyle and Edna Murray

(Bremer Case)

Mr. R. B. Nathan telephoned and stated that he had just received a call from the Agents at Pittsburg, Kansas stating that the two above named persons had come to the home of one Stanley down there; that Agents Bryce and O'Mahoney, who were stationed there, had a gun battle with Doyle, at which time Agent Bryce claims to have shot Doyle pretty badly. Mr. Nathan stated that he does not know whether the police at Pittsburg participated in this battle or not, but stated that Doyle got away; however, the Agents are now making efforts to find him. Mr. Nathan stated that they succeeded in apprehending Edna Murray and she is now in custody at Pittsburg, and Mr. Nathan has instructed the Agents to give out no publicity about this affair at all. I instructed Mr. Nathan to send a couple more Agents to Pittsburg to assist in the situation down there.

Mr. Nathan stated that he has informed the Oklahoma City Office of the above so that they might be advised.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: EDWARD GEORGE BREMER, Victim - Kidnaping.

On the morning of February 7, 1935, Special Agents D. A. Bryce and V. R. Clary, who were conducting investigation at Pittsburg, Kansas, looking to the location and apprehension of Jess Doyle and Edna Murray, were advised that the car reported to be in the possession of Doyle was parked in the rear of the home of Harry C. Stanley, brother of Edna Murray. The Agents, together with Chief of Police Ross Armstrong of Pittsburg, Kansas, proceeded to this address, and while awaiting the arrival of other members of the Pittsburg Police Department, observed the Buick automobile belonging to Stanley leave the premises. A Chevrolet occupied by Doyle followed. The Agents, accompanied by Chief Armstrong, trailed both of these cars until they drove into a blind street. Both cars turned around and the Buick belonging to Stanley was permitted to pass. The blind street was then blocked with the Bureau Hudson, and Special Agent Bryce left the car with a machine gun. Subject Doyle drove over the curb on to the lawn and circled around the Hudson, at the same time reaching for a gun on the seat. After ordering him to stop, Agent Bryce opened fire with the machine gun, firing 14 shots, nine of which were later found to have struck the car, four of these lodging in a gun case containing several guns located immediately behind Doyle's head. Doyle apparently fell over at the time of the shooting, but righted himself and continued in flight, disappearing from sight before the Bureau Hudson could be turned around. Chief Armstrong also fired five shots at Doyle's car with a rifle, one shot taking effect in the car. Agent Clary was driving the Bureau Hudson and was unable to participate in the shooting.

Following this shooting, the Agents and members of the local police department returned to the home of Stanley where Edna Murray was taken into custody. Later, Doyle surrendered by telephoning the Sheriff at Girard, Kansas. The car in which he had fled from Pittsburg, Kansas became mired, and when he observed the bullet holes in the car, advised that he lost his nerve and decided to surrender.

published an item in his paper to the effect that KARPIS, in December of 1932 had been at Shepherdstown and while there visited with his aunt, Mrs. William Rutherford. The matter was reported at that time to the wife of Sheriff Kelly at West Plains, Missouri, who forwarded a telegram to Mr. Musser, advising him that KARPIS was wanted for the murder of her husband and requested that he be taken into custody. This information was transmitted to the West Virginia State Police and they proceeded to Shepherdstown on December 31, 1932 but KARPIS, accompanied by a young woman, had left Shepherdstown.

Mr. Musser further informed the Agent that Mrs. William Rutherford had a sister residing in Shepherdstown by the name of Mrs. J. L. McCahn, and it was learned through William Musser, clerk at the Shepherdstown Post Office, that on February 11, 1935 between one and two o'clock in the afternoon Mrs. McCahn called at the Post Office and requested Musser, the clerk, to address an envelope for her on the typewriter, the addressee being Mrs. E. A. England, Westmoreland Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee.

After the envelope had been addressed by Musser he returned it to Mrs. McCahn who volunteered the information that the address was supposed to be that of KARPIS. Mr. Musser does not believe this information to be reliable but thought there may be some possibility of KARPIS' having connections at the Memphis address.

Musser advised that he would watch the mail of Mrs. Rutherford, as well as that of Mrs. McCahn, and inform the Pittsburgh Office of any developments.

It was also developed that KARPIS has a relative by the name of George Sissler, operating a gasoline station at Massillon, Ohio. Clifford Musser positively identified the photograph of KARPIS as being the individual who visited Shepherdstown in 1932.

On February 15, 1935 a tracing was received from the Postmaster at Erie, Pa., from an envelope addressed at Philadelphia to Arthur Burdette, 709 French St., Erie, Pa. It is possible that Winona Burdette is corresponding with him but this tracing is forwarded to the Philadelphia Office with copies of this report for such action as in its discretion may be deemed appropriate.

On February 12, 1935 the Kansas City, Detroit, and Nashville Offices were telegraphically advised of the information developed as set forth above.

The temporary wanted notices on FRED BARKER were removed from the files of the Pittsburgh Police Department by Special Agent J. C. Rider and Agent H. A. Bangert at Wheeling, W. Va. removed the temporary wanted notices which had been placed in the files of the Police Department at that point.

THE DETROIT DIVISION OFFICE at MASSILLON, OHIO will locate George Sissler, brother of Mrs. William Rutherford, for any information which he may have indicating that any of the Subjects in this case contacted him.

THE NASHVILLE OFFICE at MEMPHIS, TENNESSEE will endeavor to locate Mrs. E. A. England, Westmoreland Avenue, and conduct an investigation to determine whether KARPIS has contacted her.

THE KANSAS CITY OFFICE at WEST PLAINS, MISSOURI; - It is presumed that this office has obtained any information in the possession of Mrs. Kelly, wife of the former Sheriff, but if she has not been interviewed it is suggested that this be done so that if there is any information of assistance in her possession it may be obtained.

THE PHILADELPHIA OFFICE at PHILADELPHIA; - In connection with the tracing which was forwarded to this office it is suggested that appropriate inquiry be made to determine whether Winona Burdette is corresponding with her brother, Arthur Burdette. If so, the Pittsburgh Office will reinterview him for any information which she may have divulged to him.

Mr. Coulter telephoned from the St. Paul Office with reference to the plant which was established in the apartment of the Conrad woman in Minneapolis on the 12th, stating that he has received a wire from the Chicago Office to the effect that they had located the Conrad woman there. He stated that the only occupants of the place in Minneapolis are an old man and an old woman, and since they have to use six men on this plant, which almost paralyzes the office, he wanted to know if it might be advisable to take the men off after midnight. He stated that they have tried to make arrangements to watch the apartment from a room close by, but since there are no vacancies around there, this has been impossible.

I informed Mr. Coulter that under the circumstances, he could discontinue a continual surveillance of the place; that, however, frequent checks should be made of the place to see if they are there. 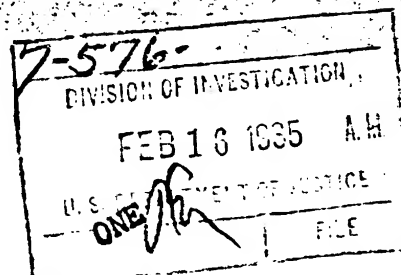
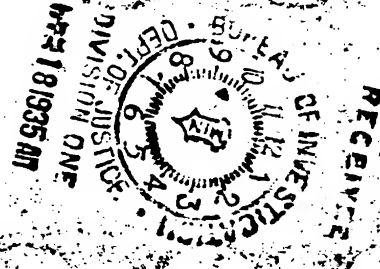

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer Case.

I telephoned Mr. Nathan at the Kansas City Office with reference to his telegram received this morning at the Bureau regarding the finding in the ice box in the apartment of Jess Doyle of the bonds stolen from the bank at Drexel, Missouri. I advised him that it was the desire of the Director to be advised as to why the ice box was not searched by the Bureau representatives. Mr. Nathan said, "Well, I haven't any explanation, Mr. Tamm, it just wasn't done." He stated that the place was thoroughly searched with the exception of the food compartments.

Mr. Nathan stated that the following Agents participated in the first search of this place: Mr. Nathan, Trainor, Shanahan, Dietz and Parry. After a somewhat hurried search, Mr. Nathan left the last three named Agents at the place with instructions that they were to make a thorough search. Later in the afternoon, Agent Miller was sent out there, and Agents Miller, Trainor and Dietz remained in the apartment for the remainder of the night. They could conduct no search, however, for the reason that they were instructed to remain in the apartment with the lights out anticipating the return of Jess Doyle. I informed Mr. Nathan that in any event it was the responsibility of the Special Agent in Charge to see that a thorough search in instances of this kind is conducted. Mr. Nathan stated that he is aware of this responsibility.

I instructed Mr. Nathan to prepare at once a complete memorandum covering the above matter in which the full details concerning the names of the Agents participating, under whose supervision, and the procedure, etc., were to be set forth. I further instructed him to send this by special delivery to the Bureau after a telegraphic summary had first been submitted.

I am furnishing you herewith with the contents of a memorandum submitted under date of January 22, 1935, by a New York City Postal Inspector to his Inspector in Charge:

"1. I beg to submit the following data for the information of the Attorney General in connection with his investigation of kidnaping and ransom cases.

"2. About \$100,000 in U.S. currency, in \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$20 denominations was exchanged at Havana, Cuba, in September 1934 for gold and the latter immediately sold at a lesser price to obtain American currency of large denominations, and there was a loss on every transaction.

"3. This operation was conducted by Cassius M. McDonald, who gave 711 Hammond Bldg., Detroit, Michigan, as his address. During the winter season 1933-34 he is said to have stopped at the Roney Plaza Hotel, Miami Beach, Florida. He is a well-known "fixer" of Detroit, where he is said to enjoy the favor of police and other officials. He has long been reputed to have an interest in confidence pay-off swindles at Detroit, Michigan, and Hollywood, Florida, and he has frequently acted as bondsman for underworld characters of Detroit. At Havana he reported he was 48 years old and weighed 184 pounds, and was born in Chicago, Illinois.

4. McDonald was accompanied by a man of gangster type, who called himself W. J. Harrison and who gave a St. Louis address. This man was about 33 years old, 5'8" tall, weighed 145 pounds, a blond, wore clothing of poor appearance, and always stayed in the background as if he might be acting as a bodyguard for McDonald.

5. They were also accompanied by a Cuban named Rene Bolivar, who at one time was considered a man of means but more recently is said to have indulged in questionable enterprises.

6. McDonald was introduced on September 7, 1934 to Conrad Eisner, Assistant Manager, Exchange Department, National City Bank, at Havana, by one Fernando Rodriguez, of La Duhoza, said to be a dealer in gold and Government lottery tickets, and who reported to the bank that he had given gold to McDonald in exchange for a large number of \$10 bills of American currency, and that McDonald wished to sell the gold and obtain American currency for it. Eisner reported this to Mr. S. C. Pena, U. S. Treasury Agent in Havana.

7. McDonald left Havana on September 8th on the Pan-American Airways at 3 p.m., returned on September 9th, and again left on September 11th, it is reported.

8. Knowing that McDonald has long been connected with the passing of stolen securities and money obtained in confidence deals, I believe that in this instance the low denominations of the bills, the method of exchange and the use of a far base for the operation all signify the disposition of proceeds of a kidnapping case and not of a confidence 'score'.

9. It is believed that the results of my investigation of this matter should be furnished the U.S. Internal Revenue Bureau for consideration in connection with the income tax returns of this racketeer at Detroit, Michigan,

examination of which seems to indicate that he may be reporting only a small part of his reputed income.

Mr. Quinn telephoned Mr. Hoover at New York and advised him of the escape of Volney Davis from the custody of Agents Trainor and Stakem; that these two agents were occupied in bringing Davis into Chicago from Kansas City by plane; that the plane had been forced to make a landing about forty miles from Chicago near Yorkville, Illinois, and that Davis had escaped at this point. Mr. Quinn stated that the details are not very clear as yet but it appears that the Agents removed the leg irons and handcuffs from Davis in order that he would not be conspicuous and that he managed to escape in an automobile. Mr. Hoover stated that it was outrageous to let this man escape; that in the first place it was extremely unwise and inadvisable to only have two agents accompany a man of Davis' character and that, of course, the removing of the leg irons and handcuffs could not be excused. Mr. Hoover stated that Agents Trainor and Stakem should be ordered suspended without pay pending an investigation into the matter; that they should be ordered to return to Kansas City immediately and upon their arrival there they should submit a full and detailed explanation for their actions and a detailed report of the whole matter. Mr. Hoover further instructed Mr. Quinn to obtain all of the facts possible from Mr. Nathan at Kansas City concerning the orders he gave concerning the transportation of this man.

Mr. Quinn further advised Mr. Hoover that Mr. Connelley is on his way to the place where the escape took place and is taking with him a large squad of men in the hope of being able to round Davis up. Mr. Hoover stated that all men available should be furnished to Mr. Connelley if he needs them.

Mr. Hoover then talked to Mr. Tamm and instructed him also to see that Mr. Connelley was given sufficient men to take care of the situation; and not to contact the local officers. Mr. Tamm advised Mr. Hoover that Agent Trainor had already contacted the Sheriff and advised him that a dangerous criminal had escaped and the information was subsequently broadcasted to nearby officers. Mr. Hoover instructed Mr. Tamm to have Mr. Connelley, when the latter contacts the Division, secure a full statement from Agents Trainor and Stakem before they return to Kansas City and transmit it along with other facts concerning the break to the Division by telephone; that definite orders should be issued to Agents Trainor and Stakem to return to Kansas City after this statement is secured. Mr. Tamm stated that the plane secured was the only one available. Mr. Hoover stated that this was no excuse; that there were no orders issued to go by plane; that in his opinion, two men were insufficient to serve as a guard for such a dangerous criminal as in all other instances

when such dangerous men as Barker, Chase, Alcorn and others were transferred to other points a guard of at least four or five agents went along. Mr. Tamm stated that he had communicated with Mr. Nathan at Kansas City regarding the transportation of Davis and had approved the use of the plane and two agents as guards, as, in Mr. Tamm's opinion, two men would be sufficient guards if the prisoner were shackled with leg irons and handcuffed securely, as the weather was reported clear and it was only about three hours flying time. Mr. Hoover stated that regardless, this was, in his opinion, an error in judgment and could not be excused. Mr. Tamm advised Mr. Hoover of a few further details in regard to the escape, stating that when the plane was forced down it landed in a corn field near a small town in Illinois; that the Agents took off the leg irons and handcuffs from Davis in order that he would not be conspicuous; that they then proceeded to a small restaurant or hotel where Agent Trainor went into a telephone booth, leaving Davis with Agent Stakem and hearing a scuffle, looked around in time to see Davis hit Stakem and dive through a window, where he took an automobile and escaped. Mr. Tamm stated that they should, of course, handcuff Davis to themselves as handcuffs are not conspicuous.

Mr. Hoover stated that Mr. Tamm should advise Mr. Connelley as soon as the latter calls in that Mr. Connelley should advise Agents Trainor and Stakem that they are suspended without pay and to obtain a full and detailed from them as to what happened and then these two agents are to return to Headquarters. Mr. Hoover stated that he would get in touch with Mr. Nathan and express to him also his displeasure at the manner in which the matter was handled. Mr. Hoover stated that he desired to be informed if anything turned up on the case; that if the press makes any inquiries about the matter, and they probably will learn of it because of the fact that it has been broadcast, they should be informed that he, Mr. Hoover, was handling the matter, and he was in New York.

Time 10:00 PM

Mr. Quinn telephoned Mr. Ladd at Chicago and instructed him to advise Mr. Connelley as soon as possible to have Agents Trainor and Stakem submit to him a verbal statement regarding the escape of Davis and that these two agents should then be instructed to return to Kansas City immediately; that he, Mr. Ladd, should provide sufficient agents for Mr. Connelley to conduct an intensive investigation to try to apprehend Davis. Mr. Ladd stated that he is calling men in and organizing them in squads for this purpose.

Time 10:15 PM

Mr. Quinn telephoned Mr. Nathan at Kansas City and advised him that Agents Trainor and Stakem are being instructed to return to Kansas City and are being suspended without pay; that he should secure their property.

Mr. Nathan advised that Mr. Hoover had already telephoned him from New York and advised him of this. Mr. Quinn instructed Mr. Nathan to secure a full and detailed statement from each of these two agents and forward it to the Division; that he, Mr. Nathan, should prepare a night letter tonight and forward it to the Division giving in detail the instructions issued to these two agents in regard to guarding Davis.

She stated that she filed the required

Miss Kermish stated that she did not write to any of the men appearing on the list but that shortly after she became a member of the club she received a letter from Thomas Logan, a 38 year old man, residing on West 12th St., N. Y. C., New York, the number not being readily remembered; that thereafter she received a communication from Wallace Peterson, R.F.D., Shisheo, Minnesota, one from Richard Griffith, of Plains, Virginia, and one from Milton Morris of 1034 Fifth Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa., all of whom had read her name, so they stated, in a list of girls furnished them by "The Get Acquainted Correspondence Club", they, the said men, being members of the said club.

Katherine Kermish stated that she replied to the letters of the aforementioned individuals and as a matter of fact she has been since steadily corresponding with Thomas Logan of New York City; that she received a second letter from Wallace Peterson but did not receive replies from either Griffith or Morris.

Miss Kermish stated that Thomas Logan of New York City, who, according to his letter to her, was at one time a resident of Pittsburgh, furnished her his photograph which she has in her possession now.

In reply to questions Katherine Kermish stated that she never received any communication from GEORGE LAWRENCE HARPER nor did she receive any communication from anyone residing in Raytown, Missouri. She stated that HARPER never communicated with her by telephone and that HARPER at no time visited her [REDACTED]

Upon being exhibited the photograph of VOLNEY DAVIS she stated that she never saw the man and that the said photograph is not a likeness of Thomas Logan of New York City.

Katherine Kermish, [REDACTED] realizing the seriousness of the matter, has volunteered the information that should she receive any communication from HARPER she would immediately communicate with the Pittsburgh Office, the address of which was furnished her.

Miss McKui, hereinreferred to, was exhibited the photograph of VOLNEY DAVIS. She stated that she at no time saw a man resembling the one portrayed on the photograph [REDACTED]

During the course of the conversation with Miss McKui the latter suggested that the one used by the criminals of the type of VOLNEY DAVIS is a novel idea, she stating that in all possibility the said criminals, by becoming members of correspondence clubs, such as the one referred to in the matter, become acquainted with girls throughout the country to whom they may go to be harbored, subsequent to becoming fugitives. She suggested that the acquaintanceship with a nurse might be particularly significant inasmuch as they, the criminals, may go to the known nurse after a possible gun fight to have the wounds dressed.

Milton Morris of 1034 Fifth Ave., Pittsburgh, Pa., has not been interviewed, nor have interviews been requested with Wallace Peterson of Shisheo, Minnesota, Thomas Logan of New York City, or Richard Griffith of Plains, Virginia. Should that action be desired by the office of origin or Mr. Connelley at Chicago, arrangements will be made to comply.

He stated that they kept that building under surveillance last evening and ascertained that it is the residence of Alice Conrad, who is a contact for Sawyer. In this connection, Mr. Coulter stated that on January 3rd, Sawyer left his car in a garage in Omaha, Nebraska, and about the 20th of January, Alice Conrad telephoned from some town in Iowa about the car. She was informed at that time that she would have to have the check before she could get the car. She advised that she would get the check from Mrs. Sawyer as she did not have it at that time. On January 23rd, a man from a little town in Iowa came and got the car. Mr. Coulter stated that this information has been furnished the Bureau in report form.

Mr. Coulter stated that Alice Conrad at the present time is in Peoria, Illinois, and is getting her mail care of general delivery; that he is confident that she is in contact with these people and can furnish the desired information.

Mr. Nathan telephoned from the Kansas City Office in regard to Jess Doyle and Edna Murray and advised that the judge has returned to the district, signed the order of removal, and the United States Marshal plans to leave with the prisoners for St. Paul this afternoon.

With reference to the robbery of the bank at Drexel, Missouri, Mr. Nathan stated that while witnesses from Drexel have failed to make a positive identification of Doyle as participating in this robbery, Doyle himself admits that he was a participant; that in this connection, what action should be taken relative to this phase of the matter. I instructed Mr. Nathan to have these people removed to St. Paul to answer the charges preferred against them by the Government, after which the local police at Drexel might interview him with a view to getting a signed statement from him relative to the above named robbery.

Mr. Nathan further stated that Doyle denies being involved in the robbery of the banks at Okemah, Oklahoma, and also denies being involved in the Bremer Case. Doyle also admits being in the robbery of the bank in South St. Paul, Minnesota as well as some other robberies.

Mr. Nathan assured me that the Marshal is fully informed of the dangerous character of this man and is further informed that the Bureau is going to have nothing to do with the removal of these people.

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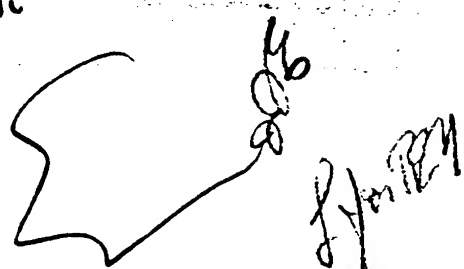

I am transmitting herewith copies of a memorandum submitted to me by Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons, Resident Agent at Miami, relative to conditions at the Dade County Jail. This is to confirm telephone conversation which I had yesterday with Mr. Behrends, in Mr. Tamm's office, in which I suggested that the matter be referred to the Attorney General and to Mr. Sanford Bates of the Bureau of Prisons, in order to properly safe-guard these important prisoners. It is believed that if authority is given to the United States Marshal in Jacksonville, to employ guards to serve during the visiting hours when tourists and sight-seers go through the corridors on the twenty-fourth floor, that they will be able to prevent communication with these women.

It might be possible for Mr. Bates to communicate with the Dade County Commissioners and Sheriff at Miami, relative to closing this gallery on the twenty-fourth floor to visitors for a certain period; however, this is the tourist season at Miami and this gallery or balcony is as popular in Miami as the observation tower of the Empire State Building in New York City and I am sure that the Dade County authorities will not wish to close it to visitors.

Another possible alternative as to these prisoners might be the removing of them to the County Jail at Orlando, Florida, or to the Duval County Jail at Jacksonville, where I understand facilities can be provided for their separation and remove all possibility of their communication with persons on the outside.

In confirmation of my telephone conversation with Acting Special Agent in Charge L. E. Kingman on this date, concerning the above-entitled matter, please be advised that the Deputy United States Marshal, Miami, Florida, informed Assistant United States Attorney W. Sanders Gramling this morning that Dolores Delaney and Wynona Burdette were not separated at the Dade County Jail; that, because of existing conditions, it was impossible to separate them and that in their present location they are in a position to communicate with, and receive communications from outsiders.

Upon receipt of the above information I contacted Sheriff Coleman at the Dade County Jail and he stated that conditions at the jail, especially for the accommodations of women prisoners, are inadequate. Women prisoners are assigned to the twenty-fifth floor of the Dade County Building. The twenty-fourth floor, next below, is given to sightseers who are permitted to wander about, without guards, and may very easily communicate with prisoners on the twenty-fifth floor. Sheriff Coleman stated that insofar as the safe-keeping of prisoners on the twenty-fifth floor is concerned there might as well be no bars, for, if outsiders desire to communicate with prisoners on that floor they may easily do so by going to the twenty-fourth floor under the guise of sightseers. An iron grill has been erected for the purpose of thwarting communication between prisoners and outsiders on the balcony on the twenty-fourth floor. However, it is of no value and any one desirous of passing notes or prohibited articles to prisoners on the twenty-fifth floor could easily do so. Sheriff Coleman stated that he has repeatedly requested that the County Commissioners close the sight-seeing balcony to outsiders, inasmuch as it invites communication between prisoners and outsiders.

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However, the County Commissioners have refused to act on his plea. Sheriff Coleman suggested that agent make such request of the Commissioners, and the matter was then referred to Assistant United States Attorney Gramling who stated that he would have to take the matter up with United States Attorney Holland at Jacksonville before making a decision concerning request upon County Commissioners for assistance.

Mr. Gramling was advised by Mr. Holland that he desired to discuss the matter with representatives of the United States Marshal's Office at Jacksonville and that he would then inform Mr. Gramling as to what action should be taken. Mr. Holland subsequently advised Mr. Gramling that the matter was being referred to Washington for action.

For your information it may be stated that the present situation is most inadequate and dangerous. Any one knowing the location of the prisoners could very easily communicate with them and receive messages from them for transmittal to confederates; they could also pass prohibited articles to them without detection. From the attached newspaper photograph and account it will be noted that publicity has been given to the arrival of the prisoners. I am not informed as to the leak in this instance, but believe it was furnished to the press either through the Office of the United States Marshal or the Clerk of the Court. I am positive that neither Special Agent Nichols or myself had any communication with any one concerning the arrival of the prisoners. We merely appeared at the railway station on the arrival of the train for the purpose of observing and assisting the marshal. Arrangements for the Marshal's presence had been previously made through the office of the United States Attorney at Miami.

'PUBLIC ENEMY' GIRLS RETURNED TO FACE COURT

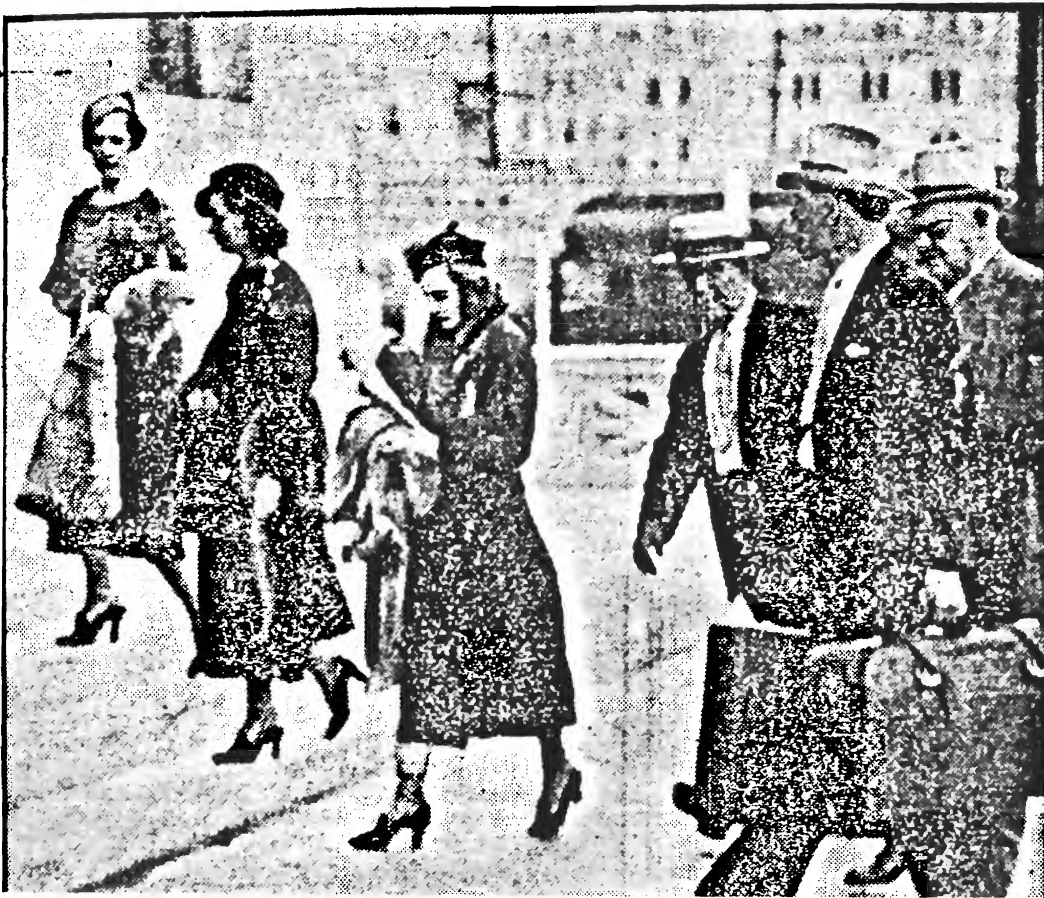
**Dolores Delaney and Winona Burdette Put

Unless they seek a hearing to have their bond reduced, the girls will remain in jail until April, when they will face trial together with Joe Adams, manager of El Comodore hotel; Henry "Duke" Randall, employe of Adams; Nathan Heller, manager of the Park View hotel, Havana, and E. G. McDonald, West Palm Beach, promoter.

The girls stepped from a Florida East Coast train here shortly after 3:30 p. m. yesterday. They were met by Frank Edwards, deputy U.

MR. WILLIAM STANLEY.

In connection with the holding of Dolores Delaney and Wynona Burdette in the Dade County Jail, Miami, Florida to await their being tried on charges of harboring some of the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, the Division has been advised that conditions are such that these important prisoners are not properly safeguarded. They are presently confined to the same cell which is located on the twenty-fifth floor of the Dade County Building. The twenty-fourth floor of this building is given over to sightseers who are permitted to wander about, without guards, and may very easily communicate with prisoners on the floor above. I, therefore, suggest that the United States Marshal or his Deputy at Miami, Florida be instructed to remove these prisoners to some other jail, preferably to the Duval County Jail at Jacksonville or the Orange County Jail at Orlando where better facilities are afforded. The trial of these prisoners is set for April 4, 1935.

It will be appreciated if this matter can be given immediate attention.

On or about December 23rd or 24th, Thomas C. Williams, charged here with harboring Lester M. Gillis and others, received a telegram from Toledo, Ohio, wishing him a Merry Christmas, etc. We have reason to believe that this telegram was sent by C. J. Fitzgerald, alias C. J. Murphy, mentioned in the Brekid case. Fitzgerald was a patient during part of August, September and part of November, 1934, at the Vallejo General Hospital, Vallejo, California, which is owned and operated by Thomas C. Williams, alias "Tobe" Williams.

During the interview had with Thomas C. Williams in January of this year, he mentioned the fact that he could possibly cooperate in the apprehension of members of the Brekid gang and stated at that time that he would probably have to wait until Spring to do it; that he had a contact in the east, either around Cleveland or Toledo, Ohio; that he was constantly in touch at all times with various members of this gang.

An investigation was made during the time Fitzgerald, or Murphy, was a patient at the Vallejo General Hospital and found that

Fitzgerald, or Murphy, is due to return to this Hospital sometime in February or March of 1935 to have some silver spikes removed from his hip bones which were put in there during the operation, and it is evident that when "Tobe" Williams referred to his contact in the east that he would not be able to do anything until Spring on this case, it clearly indicates that Fitzgerald, or Murphy, is the contact to whom he refers.

It is not believed at this time that Fitzgerald will return to the Vallejo General Hospital due to the fact that a thorough investigation has been made as to the patients who have formerly frequented this hospital and no doubt Fitzgerald is aware of this.

It is suggested that your office made a check at the Western Union Telegraph office at Toledo to see whether or not a copy of this telegram could be obtained, addressed to Thomas C. Williams, Vallejo General Hospital, at Vallejo, California. It is thought that it will not be necessary to check this at the Postal Telegraph Company, as the Postal Telegraph Company does not have an office at Vallejo, California. In doing this it may be possible to locate the address of the sender of this telegram, which is undoubtedly C. J. Fitzgerald mentioned in the Brekid case.

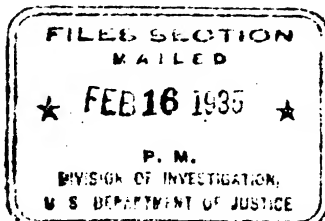
Dear Sir:

I have reviewed your telegraphic summary outlining the investigative activities of various Special Agents in searching the premises formerly occupied and abandoned by Jess Doyle at Kansas City. Obviously the search conducted by the Bureau Agents under your supervision was grossly incomplete and inadequate, since this search failed to disclose the whereabouts of the thousand dollar bond of the City of Peabody, Kansas, and the Mellon National Bank travelers' checks, which constituted a part of the loot obtained in the robbery of National Banks in Okemah, Oklahoma. Such loose, slipshod and careless tactics on the part of Bureau Agents will not be tolerated. It is your responsibility as Agent in Charge to properly organize, supervise and direct the investigative activities of your agents, and consequently, the improper functioning of these Agents is attributable to your inefficiency. A recurrence of similar errors in your district will of necessity result in administrative action.

1935. Devoe was subsequently released and Pope made bond in the sum of \$2500.00. Agent was informed that Pope had in his possession a 1935 Plymouth Sedan bearing 1935 Indiana license plates #90267, which plates had been issued to him for the car in question, and he had Indiana Title to the car.

The stop order card which Agent had placed with the State Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Indianapolis, Indiana sometime ago on Ford car, motor number 899365, has been withdrawn by this Agent and destroyed.

Reference telegram from Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley advised that the Lafayette, Indiana Police Department were of the opinion that the men involved in the hold-up of Mrs. Goll, were the Cox brothers of Terre Haute, and requested that photographs be obtained.

In the absence of an Agent at Terre Haute, Chief of Detectives Mitchell was contacted by long distance telephone. He advised that the only Cox brothers known to him were Carl and Alvan Cox of Lawrenceville, Illinois, who were suspected of various hold-up jobs in Terre Haute, and Indianapolis. However, no photographs of them are available at either place.

A resume of the above was supplied to Mr. Connelley by telegram on February 14, 1935.

CLOSING IN ON THEM

FEDERAL agents closed in Wednesday on two members of the gang charged with the Bremer and, probably, the Hamm kidnapping.

As a result Fred Barker and "Ma" Barker, his mother and reputed "brains" of the notorious Barker-Karpis mob, are no more. The closing-in took the form of a six-hour siege and machine-gun battle in Florida where these members of the gang were living in ease and fancied security. "Ma" Barker, formerly a resident of West St. Paul, supplied additional excitement and color by operating a machine gun herself until a bullet reached her.

There is hope now that the trail will soon lead to the capture of Arthur (Doc) Barker, another member of this notorious family, and Alvin Karpis, said to be the actual kidnapers of Mr. Bremer and, probably, Mr. Hamm. Both are reported to have been visitors at the Florida house within the past two weeks, according to photographic identification by residents in the vicinity. There is also a report that Doc Barker is now under secret arrest in Chicago.

The northwest mounted police of Canada have a widespread reputation for "getting their man" but recent events have shown they have nothing on the United States department of justice. When Uncle Sam takes up the trail of gangsters and crooks, he, too, never stops until he "gets his man." The Florida battle with the Barker gang is the latest instance.

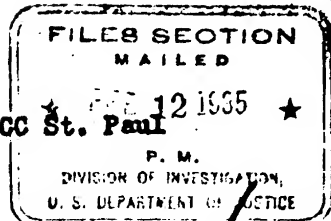

However, upon receipt of this information, a telegram was sent to the San Francisco office, requesting that the license number reported, be checked. Efforts will be made through the Police Department to obtain additional information, and if possible to establish the source of this report.

Recently the Associated Press printed the photograph of Alvin Karpis in the local Salt Lake City newspapers and numerous reports have since been received by the various law enforcement agencies, that Karpis had been seen in Salt Lake City. The attention of this Office has been directed to certain damage done to two apartments located at 3920 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, on the night of January 8, 1935, when the apartment of Russell Gibson was raided.

Mr. Lenco, the Janitor, who also acts as Manager of the apartments located at 3920 Pine Grove Avenue, has submitted to this Office an itemized statement of damages and necessary repairs and cleaning which had to be taken care of at said apartment building after the raid, which is as follows:

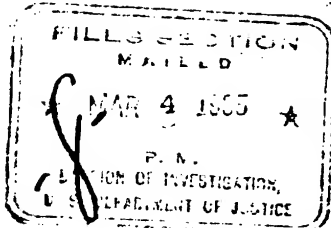

Under date of February 11, 1935 it was ascertained through a garage at 142 North Broad Street, Philadelphia, in close proximity of the Hahnemann Hospital, that Illinois license plates #522096 were the property of Mr. John Karpavicz. Inquiry at this storage garage ascertained that Mr. and Mrs. John Karpavicz had arrived on the above date and made an inquiry as to where the Hahnemann Hospital was located. Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz were questioned by Special Agent McCarthy and the writer, and the following information was gleaned from the conversation which ensued: that they left Chicago, Ill. three days prior to their arrival in Philadelphia, travelling in the automobile mentioned; that they arrived in Philadelphia on February 11, 1935, in the early morning, and stopped at the Y. M. C. A.; that their sole intention in coming to Philadelphia was for the purpose of obtaining custody of what they thought to be the illegitimate son of their boy, Alvin Karpis, having read in the Chicago papers that Dolores Delaney was anxious to place this child in a home (this, of course, being untrue, and probably only newspaper gossip.)

They were brought immediately to the Philadelphia office and interrogated as to their knowledge of their son and they maintained that they had not seen him for three years, and emphatically denied ever making any contacts with him. They answered questions freely and stated that they would be only too glad if he should surrender, because they were apprized by Agents in the Chicago office that if he would put up any resistance the same would result in injury, or probably death, to their boy. They further informed us that they had already placed notices with the Lithuanian papers in Chicago asking him to surrender to the authorities to face charges preferred against him.

The Special Agent in Charge, R. G. Harvey, gave Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz permission to see Dolores Delaney, but instructed them that an Agent must be present at all times when any conversation was entered into. They were also instructed to report to the Philadelphia office if they saw fit to do so before leaving Philadelphia. In this connection a telephone call was made to the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington and Mr. Edward Tamm instructed that surveillance be made at all times upon Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz. It was ascertained that they were stopping at Room 1028, Y.M.C.A., Broad and Arch Streets, Philadelphia. Accordingly, several Agents were instructed to keep them under observation at all times.

Dolores Delaney gave Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz permission to take her child and they were entrusted with it, but no papers or agree-

ment were signed, and under date of February 15, 1935 Mrs. Karpavicz, after receiving permission from the doctor in charge of the Maternity Ward of the Hahnemann Hospital, departed on the B. & O. train at 5:13 P.M. The B. & O. officials informed us that they would have one of their Special Agents enter the train at all important stops to see that no contact was made with Mrs. Karpavicz, although the Philadelphia office informed these officials it was not their desire, as Mrs. Karpavicz was not under observation or arrest by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In accordance with the departure the Chicago office was informed by wire under the same date.

On February 14, 1935 the Hon. George Welsh at Philadelphia signed the removal papers for Wynona Burdett and Dolores Delaney, the same being that they were to be removed to the Southern District of Florida in the near future. Mr. Tamm of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, instructed Mr. Harvey that no agents would accompany Dolores Delaney or Wynona Burdett to Miami, Florida. The U. S. Marshal, under date of February 16, 1935, departed from Broad Street Station, Philadelphia, Pa. at 12:31 P.M. having in his custody Dolores Delaney and Wynona Burdett, bound for Miami, Florida.

The car in which Mr. Karpavicz was travelling was searched by Agents, permission to do so having been obtained from Mr. Karpavicz, and a note book was found therein with several telephone numbers. The telephone numbers were copied and forwarded to the Chicago office by letter.

The effects of Miss Burdett were turned over to her under date of February 16, 1935, and a receipt taken of same, signed by Miss Burdett, and is at present in the Philadelphia file. The effects of Dolores Delaney, as well as the clothes that were found in Atlantic City, N.J., were turned over to her on February 11, 1935, receipt taken therefor, a copy forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, as well as a copy to the Chicago office, and one copy was retained for the file of the Philadelphia office.

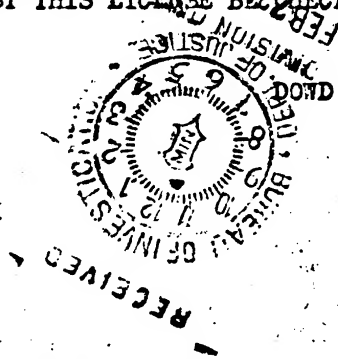

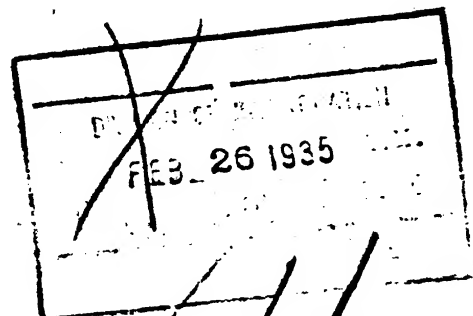

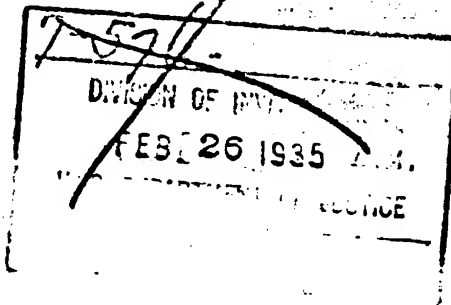

Dear Mr. Hoover:

May I take this opportunity of calling your attention to a matter of vital importance to the identification profession. By this I mean a unified system of classification.

Much as we boast of the unity on this subject in reality this is not true. Only yesterday I received a circular in which one of the patterns was a distinct tented arch but the bureau sending it out had given it an arch, represented by the letter a.

In this morning's mail I received your circular on Volney Davis, wanted by your Department on a kidnapping charge. His left little finger was shown a loop of 1 ridge count, but I found it filed in this Bureau as an arch of the exceptional arch type. These are the things that cause a failure to identify from classification data sent in to your Bureau.

The plan I have in mind is for you to devote some space in your monthly book of fugitives to the classification of difficult patterns printing cuts of same and explain how they are handled by your experts. This would tend to unify the classification of these difficult patterns by identification experts throughout the country.

I should like to hear from you at your convenience in these premises.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

I have noted the letter addressed by the Bureau on February 12, 1935, to Mr. W. H. Morgan, Superintendent, Identification and Records, Police Department, Tulsa, Oklahoma, with reference to an apparent violation in pattern interpretations by this Bureau when contrasted to the more standardized interpretations included in various books relative to fingerprints.

It will be recalled that recently we have considered the sending of invitations to identification officers to participate in conferences here. I have included the Tulsa Police Department as one of the agencies to participate in these conferences as I am aware of Mr. Morgan's interest in this field. However, I am inclined to the opinion that it is possibly would be advisable for the Bureau to publish a booklet outlining its fingerprint classification procedure and policies, for the information of identification officers novices, as well as the more experienced ones. I appreciate that this booklet of itself would be in the nature of a fingerprinting course but it seems to me it would do a large amount of good in the identification field. It would entail a great amount of work in its preparation. However, I think that the results to be obtained through such a publication would amply justify the labor involved therein. Meanwhile, of course, we have published and will continue to publish announcements in the fugitive bulletin, explaining our classification procedure. These announcements, however, are "scattered" and I really think that in one booklet the Bureau should indicate its opinions concerning these questionable patterns which are never properly defined in any of the standard books. In fact, illustrations in such books usually are confined to the ideal types of patterns which experts "dream about" but rarely see.

In the event the Bureau so desires, I would be glad to try to initiate the preparation of a booklet explaining the fingerprint classification system in toto.

Dear Mr. Morgan:

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of February 8, 1935, in which you refer to differences in the classification methods used in various identification bureaus and suggest the possibility of making the interpretation of doubtful patterns more uniform by the publication of explanatory articles in the bulletin "Fugitives Wanted by Police."

Your reference to the Identification Order for Volney Davis has been noted particularly and I believe there is considerable merit in the suggestion that greater uniformity in classification among the various identification officers might be attained through an understanding of the principles underlying the classification methods utilized in the Division. The left little finger of Volney Davis is classified in the Division as a loop in accordance with the rule requiring that whenever an impression shows a single recurve one side of which bifurcates so as to join the delta or to go outside the delta, the impression must be classified as a loop if the single curve ridge appears to flow more naturally inside the delta than outside. If the curved ridge appears to flow naturally outside the delta the pattern is classified as an exceptional arch. Where both forking ridges in question appear to be equally natural ridges proceeding from the point of bifurcation the impression is given the preferred classification of loop, of course, such impressions are always referenced into any other possible classifications. A slight change of pressure or inking at the time an impression is taken will seriously affect the appearance of a single ridge and if the variation of this ridge will control the interpretation a referencing is of course necessary. It will be noted that on the Identification Order issued for Volney Davis the reference classification indicated that the left little finger is questionable as an exceptional arch. Exceptional arches are at present filed for convenience with the tented arches.

Your suggestion that the classification methods used in the Division be explained in the bulletin "Fugitives Wanted by Police" will be carefully considered.

Mr. Snyder telephoned and said that the Detroit News had inquired whether Cassius McDonald, who was under arrest in Miami, Florida, had anything to do with the slaying of Jerry Buckley, the radio man in Detroit. I stated that I recalled the case; but that the Bureau did not enter into the investigation; that Cassius McDonald had been arrested in Miami in connection with the Bremer Kidnaping Case by our men; but that we had not interrogated him along the line of this slaying as we had received no request from the Detroit Police Department.

Mr. Snyder also inquired if we would permit a photograph to be taken of McDonald. I stated that we would not; that he had been arrested but hadn't made bond as yet, neither had he been arraigned in court; that when these things were done, of course, photographs would no doubt be made.

Report of Special Agent K. R. McIntire, Chicago, Illinois, dated January 25, 1935; Report of Special Agent J. E. Brennan, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated February 7, 1935, and letter from St. Paul Office to Chicago Office dated February 7, 1935.

DETAILS:

The title in this case is being changed in the first instance to compare favorably with the changed title in the report of Special Agent J. E. Brennan, St. Paul, Minnesota dated February 7, 1935. It is also being changed to include the aliases J. A. Ware and Buck for William Weaver, to include Whittie, Whitey and Curly for Volney Davis, to include the I.O. for Harry Campbell, and to add the names of Myrtle Eaton, with aliases, Jess Doyle, with aliases, Edna Murray, with aliases, John Doe and John Roe as new subjects. The names and aliases of Fred Barker, Fred Goetz, and Russell Gibson are being dropped from the title because of their death. The name of John Joseph McLaughlin, Jr. is

being dropped from the title since the United States Attorney at St. Paul has declined prosecution and the Grand Jury did not indict John Joseph McLaughlin, Jr., also to add the correct name and aliases of Whitle.

It is to be noted that the indictment of Whitle along with other subjects in this case at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 22, 1935 for conspiracy to transport Victim Bremer in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 Stat. 526, 18 U.S. Code, 408a, the details of which indictment is set forth in report of Special Agent J. E. Brennan, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated February 7, 1935, was based on the information furnished by Clara Gray, whose statement appears in the reference report of Special Agent K. R. McIntire, Chicago, Illinois, dated January 25, 1935. Whitle is described in the indictment as being 25 or 26 years of age, height 5 feet 10 inches, weight 170 or 180 pounds, slender built, blonde hair, blue eyes, even teeth, Lithuanian extraction.

On the morning of January 17, 1935 a telephone call was received from a Mr. Scholz, Night Clerk at the Irving Hotel, 4859 Irving Park Boulevard, Chicago, Illinois, to the effect that he desired to furnish some information in regard to Alvin Karpis. Mr. Scholz was immediately interviewed by Special Agents J. J. Metcalfe, L. V. Boardman, and J. H. Kenney, at which time Mr. Scholz stated that he been suspicious of a certain woman guest as having a connection with Karpis; that this woman was occupying Room 319 at the Irving Hotel under the name of Marcella Keller and that she had been a guest since December 6, 1934. He stated that her true name was thought to be Majowski or some such Polish name and that he had been informed that her husband is presently serving time in the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois.

Mr. Scholz stated further that she is employed as a hostess at the Oriole Gardens on Irving Park Boulevard and River Grove, telephone River Grove 883. Mr. Scholz stated that on several occasions Mrs. Keller had made remarks about the "damn 'G' men" and to the effect that she was being followed and that things were getting too hot for her; that during the few days previous to the interview she had been using the telephone in the hotel lobby instead of placing her calls from her room; that early the previous morning she had stopped at the hotel desk on her way in after working and upon opening her purse to take out a cigarette, a newspaper clipping and picture of Alvin Karpis fell out. At this time she stated to Mr. Scholz that if anyone ever "got him", presumably meaning Karpis, she would get the party who was responsible. As to further suspicious actions by Mrs. Keller, Scholz stated that on January 16, 1935 she had telephoned for a Western Union messenger boy and declined to give the message over the phone and that on another occasion when a girl friend called for her at the hotel, and upon not

finding her at home had called her on the phone at her place of business from the hotel lobby, Mrs. Keller became very annoyed and told the girl that if she called again to call from a drug store booth.

The following list of telephone calls made by Mrs. Keller was furnished to agents at this time by Mr. Scholz:

Mr. Scholz at this time advised that Mrs. Keller stated that she intended to move from the Irving Hotel as it was getting too hot for her. He stated that he would keep a close watch on Mrs. Keller to ascertain if she had any definite connection with Alvin Karpis, and would immediately notify the Chicago Office, also when she moved.

It will be noted that on December 14, 1934 Mrs. Keller made a telephone call to Bensenville 113R, which is the residence of E. C. Bartholmey, York Road, Bensenville, Illinois. On January 21, 1935 Chief Deputy United States Marshal Tobin furnished the Chicago Office with a copy of an anonymous letter received by the United States Marshal's office relating to the Bremer kidnaping case. This letter is quoted as follows:

January 21, 1935

In regard to the EDWARD G. BREMER case.

Check one Edward C. Bartholmey of South York Street Bensenville and you may learn something of the case. Bartholmey and Mochell were very friendly and much in Company with each other particularly during Jan 1934.

Bartholmey conferred with Mochel at night during that time.

Yours Anonymus.

Bartholmey is a favorite associate with the hoodlum element."

With further reference to Bartholmey, on February 1, 1935 Mr. F. K. Butterfield, Investigator for the Western Union Telegraph Company advised Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd telephonically that he had heard that one Bartholmey at Bensenville had something to do with the Bremer case. Butterfield said that he understood that Bartholmey had conducted a newspaper of some kind in Bensenville.

On February 1, 1935 Special Agent R. L. Jones contacted Mr. Scholz at the Irving Hotel in regard to the possibility of Agent looking over the letters and papers contained in the room occupied by Mrs. Keller. Mr. Scholz advised Agent Jones that Mrs. Keller had a five year old son, who lives in the room with her and who is in the room practically all the time; that Mrs. Keller leaves the hotel about 9 P.M. each night and returns about three or five in the morning, but that the boy is in the room while she is away. Mr. Scholz agreed to try to get the boy out of the room and stated that if Agent would return about 10 P.M. he thought he would be able to let agents in the room at that time.

Special Agent R. L. Jones returned to the Irving Hotel at 10 P.M., accompanied by Special Agent K. R. McIntire, at which time Mr. Scholz advised that Mrs. Keller's son was asleep in the room. Mr. Scholz then went to the room occupied by Mrs. Keller and obtained therefrom a box containing numerous letters and clippings which he brought to the lobby of the hotel and allowed agents to look through. Among the effects in this box were several newspaper photographs of Alvin Karpis, together with numerous newspaper clippings containing the photograph of one Bruno Austin, and the newspaper articles relating to the story of his arrest on January 20, 1935 while leaving the Russian Holy Trinity Cathedral, 1121 North Levitt Street, Chicago, Illinois, after having been married to Miss Marie Brenke, 2332 Augusta Boulevard; a newspaper article with reference to Bruno Austin stated that he was arrested for bond jumping and auto larceny. Agents carefully examined the effects of Mrs. Keller contained in the box, but nothing was found

therein to indicate any connection of Mrs. Keller with Alvin Karpis or other members of the Karpis-Barker gang, except the newspaper photographs of Alvin Karpis.

Mr. Scholz advised Agent that he had learned that Marcella Keller formerly lived with Bruno Austin and that he had also learned that Mrs. Keller's former husband's name was Kotowski and not Majowski and that he is at present an inmate at Joliet, Illinois, on a murder charge.

On January 30, 1935 the St. Paul Office was advised by letter of the contents of the anonymous letter received by the United States Marshal concerning Bartholmey at Bensenville and was requested to interview Elmer Farmer at the Ramsay County Jail in regard to this individual.

On the evening of February 1, 1935, Special Agent R. C. Coulter of the St. Paul Office advised telephonically that Elmer Farmer, Harold Allderton and Bryan Bolton had been interviewed and admitted knowing Bartholmey, but stated that he had nothing to do with the Bremer kidnaping.

On the morning of February 2, 1935, the writer and Special Agent R. L. Jones proceeded to Bensenville, Illinois to locate Edward C. Bartholmey and bring him to the Chicago Office for questioning. Since information had been received from Mr. Butterfield of the Western Union that Bartholmey might have some newspaper connections, Agents contacted Mr. G. H. Warnecke, Postmaster, Bensenville, in regard to this person. Mr. Warnecke advised that Bartholmey has been a resident of Bensenville approximately twelve or fourteen years; that his home is located at 222 York Street, Bensenville. He stated that Bartholmey was formerly employed by the Chicago, Milwaukee, & St. Paul & Pacific Railroad, but that he had lost his position with this company through his radical activities; that Bartholmey was supposed to have been the editor of a radical newspaper which he distributed among the employees of that railroad. He stated that Bartholmey does not now have any newspaper connections and it was his information that Bartholmey is now on charity and that he is supposed to work for the state on the highway. He also stated that Bartholmey is a democratic committeeman in Bensenville.

Agents then proceeded to the home of Edward C. Bartholmey, 222 South York Street, and brought him to the Chicago Bureau Office for questioning. Before questioning Bartholmey the writer and Special Agent Jones proceeded to the Irving Hotel, 4859 Irving Park Boulevard, and brought Mrs. Marcella Keller to the Chicago Office for questioning and also brought along with Mrs. Keller newspaper clippings concerning

Alvin Karpis and Bruno Austin, as well as numerous letters and effects containing telephone numbers and addresses found in her room.

Edward C. Bartholmey was interviewed by Special Agent K. R. McIntire and R. L. Jones, and he advised that he has been residing in Bensenville for approximately fifteen years; that he was formerly employed by the Chicago, Milwaukee, & St. Paul Railroad, but lost his position there several years ago due to the fact that he was accused of having caused unrest among the employees by radical activities. Bartholmey claimed that this accusation against him was false. He advised that for the past several years he has been unemployed, but has recently obtained part-time employment with the U.S. Bureau of Census in making a check of farm property for the purpose of estimating the value thereof. He stated that he has been acquainted with Elmer Farmer since he first came to Bensenville, but that he did not know of any irregular activities of Farmer except that he was formerly in the bootlegging business and at the present time was supposed to be operating a number of slot machines in the vicinity of Bensenville. When questioned concerning any parties whom Farmer might have brought to his house for the purpose of having him give lodging, he stated that Farmer had been in the habit the past several years of bringing individuals to him as roomers. He stated that in most instances these parties stayed only a short while and he did not ascertain much concerning their past history. When questioned closely concerning the identity of some of the individuals brought him by Farmer, he stated that some time around the early part of September Farmer brought an individual to his home whom he introduced as Andrew Allen; that this party stayed with him about a month, and that this person was supposed to be connected with Farmer in the slot machine business. Bartholmey identified a photograph of Bryan Bolton as being identical with the party known as Allen. He stated that shortly after Allen left Farmer brought another individual to him whom he introduced as Bill Larson. He stated that Bill Larson stayed at his home for about one month, during which time he seldom left the house.

Bartholmey was exhibited a newspaper clipping of Bruno Austin and he identified Austin as being identical with Bill Larson. Bartholmey claimed that he knew nothing of the true identity of either Allen or Bill Larson, but that from their actions at his home they appeared to be hiding from something and that he presumed they were wanted for some offense. He stated that Farmer at no time advised him of the true identity of these persons. He also said that while Allen and Bill Larson were at his home they received no visitors with the exception of Farmer. Bartholmey was shown the photographs of all members of the Barker-Karpis gang and their associates, but he denied ever having seen any of these with the exception of Bolton. He also denied any of the gang visited his home while either Allen or Bill Larson were there and that any of the photographs exhibited to him were likenesses of persons formerly brought to his home by Farmer. He denied that he knew anything of the location of the Bremer hideout prior to the time it was discovered by agents of this office, or that he had any occasion to visit the home of Harold Allderton during January or February of 1934, although he knew Allderton.

Marcelle Keller was interviewed by the writer and she advised that her correct name is Olga Podsada; that she was born in Chicago on November 3, 1903; that her parents Mr. and Mrs. John Podsada reside at 2135 Chicago Avenue, Chicago, Illinois; that she has two sisters and three brothers. She stated that when she was seventeen years of age she married John Duszynsky, who three months after her marriage to him was arrested for burglary and sentenced to serve from one to ten years in the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois; that while Duszynsky was in the penitentiary she lived with Stanley Ginskus; that she later divorced Duszynsky and married Adold Spars; that she became separated from Spars and began living with Ed Kotowski, who is now serving a sentence of from one to fourteen years for manslaughter in the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois, his number being 5654; that in January of 1931 she met Bruno Austin, whom she states is generally known under the name of "Whitie"; that she has lived with Bruno Austin practically since that time, although there have been numerous instances when they were separated, due to arguments between them. She stated that in September, 1934 Bruno Austin jumped his bond after having been arrested on a larceny charge of some kind; that Bruno left town and was living somewhere near Chicago, but that she did not know where he was living, although he came in to see her at intervals, but sometime during October of 1934 he came to see her at the Oriole Gardens where she was then working, accompanied by a man whom he referred to as "Bart" (who was undoubtedly Bartholmey). She further advised that about the first part of November 1934 Bruno Austin gave her \$55.00 to rent an apartment which she did at 143 North Parkside Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, and that Bruno then came and lived with her at that place until about the first part of December, at which time he again left her; that while she was living with Bruno at 143 North Parkside, he told her that he had been living at the home of E. C. Bartholmey in Bensenville prior to coming to live with her, and that while there he became intimate with Mary Jane, the daughter of Bartholmey and that he thought he might get into trouble through it. She further stated that Bruno asked her to write a letter to Mary Jane Bartholmey for him, which she did and that following the writing of this letter, Mary Jane made several phone calls to her, and that she later called Mary Jane Bartholmey from the Irving Hotel to which place she moved after Bruno had left her. She stated that the only person she had met through Bruno while he was living at Bensenville was the person named "Bart", whom he brought to the Oriole Gardens.

When questioned concerning the newspaper photographs of Alvin Karpis contained in her room, she gave the following explanation. She stated that on January 20, 1935, when the newspapers carried the story of the arrest of Bruno Austin while being married, that she first saw this

in the papers while she was at work at the Oriole Gardens and that she became greatly excited and burst into tears; that one of the patrons of the Oriole Gardens asked her to dance and that while dancing with her noticed she was crying and asked her what the trouble was and she stated that she had just seen some bad news in the newspaper. In the same newspaper which carried the story of Bruno's arrest there was a large article concerning the escape of Alvin Karpis from a hotel in Atlantic City, New Jersey and that upon explaining to the man with whom she was dancing that a boy friend of hers had gotten into trouble, the man asked her if she meant Karpis, to which she stated she replied she did, as she did not want to discuss with the man her affair with Bruno Austin. She further stated that in order to cover up her feelings in regard to Bruno Austin she clipped the photograph of Karpis from the newspaper along with those of Bruno Austin, which was the reason for her having Karpis' picture in her possession. She denied emphatically that she had ever seen Alvin Karpis or that she had ever heard Bruno Austin mention him.

She was questioned concerning the associates of Bruno Austin but could furnish no information to indicate that she knew Austin was connected with members of the Karpis and Barker gang. She was also questioned concerning the whereabouts of Bruno Austin from December 1, 1933 to March 1, 1934 and she stated that during this period Bruno Austin was living with his parents at 1543 South Sawyer Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, and that he was during that time driving a coal truck for his brother-in-law Angelo and that she saw him at frequent intervals at this time. She denied ever having been in Bensenville to see Bruno Austin while he was living there and stated that she has never seen any of the Bartholmey family, having only corresponded with Mary Jane Bartholmey for Bruno and that she had called her on the telephone on one occasion; that she is not positive about the Bartholmey's telephone number, but remembers it as Bensenville 113R.

She was questioned concerning the remarks made by her to the effect that she would get any 'G' man who was responsible for getting Alvin Karpis and she stated that she could not remember having made any such remark, but if she did, she must have done so while she was drunk and then only as a blind to cover up her feelings concerning Bruno Austin.

Among the effects of Mrs. Keller was found several letters which she had written to Bruno Austin, but which she had not mailed. These were more or less epistles on her love or hate for Bruno. One of the letters contained the following statement, "E.F. had to give M.J. \$40.00 to cure her". When questioned concerning the identity of E.F. and M.J., Mrs. Keller stated that she did not know who E.F. was, but that

M.J. meant Mary Jane and that Mary Jane had told her to give this message to Bruno. (E.F. apparently refers to Elmer Farmer)

Mrs. Keller was shown photographs of all of the members of the Karpis-Barker gang and their associates, but she denied ever having seen any of these individuals. She stated that Bruno while she was living with him did not take her to visit any of his friends and that between the time she left him in the early part of December, 1934 and the time of his arrest on January 20, 1935, she saw him only once and that was on January 18, 1935 when he called on her at the Irving Hotel. The description of Bruno Austin as furnished by Mrs. Keller corresponded almost identically with the description of "Whitie" as given by Clara Gray, which description appears in the indictment against "Whitie" at St. Paul, Minnesota.

The following description of Mrs. Keller was obtained for possible future use through observation of Agent and information furnished by herself:

On February 4, 1935 a photograph of Bruno Austin, Chicago Police Department #C41940 was obtained from the Bureau of Identification, Chicago Police Department and on February 6, 1935 this photograph was exhibited to Clara Gray in the Chicago Bureau Office and she stated that he is identical with the "Whitie" who frequented the apartments occupied by her husband and other members of the gang at 432 Surf Street, Chicago, and 3912 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

At the office of the States Attorney, Chicago, Illinois, on February 6, 1935, Special Agent K. R. McIntire and the writer interviewed Sergeant Thomas Donnelley, States Attorney Police, who advised that he had apprehended Bruno Austin on January 20, 1935 while he, Austin, was being married and that Austin had been wanted by his office since September of 1934 for jumping a bond of \$10,000 under which he was at liberty in connection with the robbery and shooting of a theater owner in Chicago, Illinois. Sergeant Donnelley advised that the case against Austin on the robbery charge seemed to be a fairly good one inasmuch as the Victim had identified Austin, but that since the time Austin was first arrested on the charge numerous friends had tried to intimidate the victim as well as all the prosecuting witnesses and for this reason it had been necessary to place a police guard with all the prosecuting witnesses. He stated that he had found Austin a pretty hard character and that Austin was apparently connected with a pretty tough bunch of criminals in Chicago. Sergeant Donnelley further stated that Austin was still incarcerated in the Cook County Jail and that the trial of this case in the State Court had been set for February 20, 1935.

Agents then interviewed Bruno Austin at the Cook County Jail. He was first reluctant to talk with Agents, but upon being questioned concerning his activities in Bensenville, Illinois, he stated that he had lived there only about a month during October and November 1934 at the home of Edward C. Bartholmey and that while there he had met through Elmer Farmer parties known to him only as Slim, Shorty, and Andy, and that he had only seen them two or three times while he was living in Bensenville, but never associated with them otherwise. He denied at first having visited the apartments in the City of Chicago which were occupied by Slim, Shorty and Andy, but upon being advised of the fact that he was under indictment in connection with the Bremer kidnaping at St. Paul, Minnesota, he stated that he would be glad to relate all he knew concerning his acquaintanceship with members of the gang at Bensenville. The following information was obtained from him while questioning him on February 6 and later on February 11, 1935.

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He stated that his correct name is Bruno Putis; that he was born in Chicago, Illinois on October 3, 1908; that he resides with his mother, Victoria Putis or Austin at 6959 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, that he has two sisters Stella Austin and Mrs. Nellie Adochio. He stated that his mother has been married the second time and that she uses the names of Putis and Austin interchangeably, but that he himself has generally used the name of Bruno Austin, but that he is known to his friends mostly as "Whitie". He stated that on September 28, 1934 he jumped bond of \$10,000 on which he had been at liberty on a robbery charge; that on that date he went to the Pioneer Tavern located at Grand and Western Avenues in Chicago, Illinois in order to secure a hiding place where the police could not find him; that one Mickey, a bartender at the Pioneer Tavern took him to see Tony Capezio, one of the members of the Capone Syndicate, but that Capezio stated that the only place he could place him was Melrose Park, Illinois, but that things were too hot there at the present time. Bruno stated that Mickey then took him to the Hi-Lo Club located at 22nd Street and Cicero Avenue in Cicero, Illinois, where Joe O'Brien, one of the owners of the club was contacted; that Joe O'Brien and Mickey took him out to Bensenville where they introduced him to Elmer Farmer; that in meeting Elmer Farmer he used the name of Bill Larson. He said that Elmer Farmer then took him to Kahn's Tavern, located on North Avenue, just west of the city limits of Elmhurst, Illinois, on the left hand side of the road where Farmer arranged with Kahn for him to stay.

Bruno stated that Kahn's Tavern was operated by a Mr. and Mrs. Kahn and their two daughters. He stated that he remained at Kahns for two days, living in one of the small cottages adjacent to the tavern; that after two days Elmer Farmer came to Kahns and took him to the home of Edward C. Bartholmey at which place he remained for approximately a month; that about a week after Farmer took him to Bartholmeys, Farmer came there one evening accompanied by two individuals whom he referred to as Slim and Shorty. Putis identified the photographs of Russell Gibson and Doc Barker as being identical with Slim and Shorty, respectively. He advised that Shorty came to his, Bruno's, room and asked him if he was Jimmie, to which Bruno stated he replied in the negative; that Shorty then said there must be some mistake and told him that he should not worry about talking to him because he was with Elmer and that it would be all right to talk.

About a week later Bruno stated he went to Elmer's Tavern in Bensenville and again met Slim and Shorty, who were there drinking at the bar. He stated that he tried to borrow some money from Elmer Farmer, but that Elmer claimed he was broke and asked Slim and Shorty whether or not they could get something for him, Bruno, to do so that he could make himself some money; that Slim then gave Elmer Farmer

\$70.00 which Elmer gave to him, Bruno, and that Slim and Shorty then left the tavern; that before leaving Slim had told him he would try and fix him up on a score, meaning a job, they had in mind; that about a week and a half later he, Bruno, went to Kahns Tavern and upon entering, found Slim and Shorty at the counter and that there was a third party with them whom he met as Blackie, but who was later referred to by Slim and Shorty as Andy. Bruno identified a photograph of Bryan Bolton as being identical with Andy or Blackie. On this occasion Bruno said that Slim, Shorty, and Andy took him for a drive in a Ford V-8 sedan which they were using and that they rode around the vicinity of Elmhurst, Illinois, and they asked him, Bruno, all about himself, inquiring as to the nature of the charge for which he was wanted. Slim also on this occasion said he would keep him in mind and try to place him in the next job they pulled. Bruno said he questioned Elmer Farmer concerning the identity of these parties, but Farmer told him not to worry, that they were just as hot as he was. Bruno further stated that about the first week of November, 1934, he moved into Chicago and went to live with Olga Petroff at 143 North Parkside Street; that shortly after moving into Chicago he drove back out to Bensenville to see if he could borrow some money from Elmer Farmer; that upon arriving at Elmer's place, he found Shorty, Slim, and Andy there; that Slim asked him if he wanted to go for a ride with them and he stated he did, and they drove into Chicago to an apartment located on Surf Street near the Outer Drive. He stated that the apartment building to which they went was located about three or four doors from the corner of the drive and that it was a U-shaped building; that the apartment to which he went was on the third floor of the building and was rented under the name of Roberts, as he saw this name on the mail box. Bruno said they he did not see anyone else at the apartment and that they stayed for only a few minutes and then drove back to Bensenville.

Bruno further advised that about a week later he again went to Elmer's place in Bensenville and that upon arriving there Elmer Farmer asked him to drive him to see Slim and Andy in Chicago; that he drove Elmer Farmer to the apartment on Surf Street and there Elmer Spoke with Slim and Andy; that they remained for about twenty minutes and then returned to Bensenville. Bruno stated that at this time he saw no one except Slim and Andy. About four or five days after this visit with Elmer Farmer, he stated that he drove in his own car to Surf Street to visit Slim and Andy; that on this occasion Slim, Andy and Shorty were present in the apartment as well as another man whose name he learned to be Willie. Bruno identified the photograph of Willie Harrison as being the same person as the Willie he met. He said that there were also two women present in the apartment on this occasion, one of whom he learned was named Ruth, but that he could

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not recall the name of the other, although he understood she was the wife of Andy. He described the second woman as 29 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches in height, and dark hair. The woman whose name he knew to be Ruth he identified from a photograph as being Ruth Heidt. Bruno said that he ate dinner at the apartment on this day and that shortly after eating dinner, two men came to the apartment, one of whom he was previously acquainted with; that this man is known by the name of Mibs, but that his correct name is Joe Galliachio, and that he formerly hung around the corner of Elburne and Ashland Avenues, Chicago, Illinois. The other party was Sam Mano, whom he knew from having seen him with Mibs on numerous occasions. He described Mibs as being about 24 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches in height, weight-160 pounds, stocky build, dark hair, very thin on top, dark complexion, nationality-Italian. He stated that Mibs has served time in the Bridewell in Chicago and has a long police record; that at the present Mibs frequents the neighborhood of Paullina and Roosevelt Road in Chicago. He described Mano as being 22 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches in height, 140 pounds in weight, slender build, dark hair, dark complexion, nationality-Italian. He stated that Mano has been arrested on several occasions with Mibs.

Bruno stated that Mibs and Mano appeared to be very friendly with Slim and that he later learned from Slim that Mibs was the man who furnished guns for Slim, inasmuch as Slim told him that Mibs had furnished him with heaters, meaning guns. Bruno also advised that he learned that Mibs was the man who picked up Andy's children for him shortly before Thanksgiving in 1934 and arranged to bring Andy and his children together. Bruno also stated that on the evening of this same visit he played cards with the man and woman at the Surf Street apartment and that while they were playing cards Andy and Shorty talked considerably about a fellow to whom they referred as Cotton; that he recalls Shorty said that Cotton was a little bit crazy and that he was always buying new cars and driving wild and wrecking them and that Cotton was running around with a woman by the name of Rabbit and who was about as crazy as he was and was always getting drunk with him.

Bruno stated that about five or six days after this visit he again drove to the apartment on Surf Street and that Andy and Slim were there, also the two women who were there on his previous visit. Bruno said that on this occasion he drove with Andy to Bensenville to visit Elmer Farmer; that Andy wanted to see Farmer with reference to getting some money as he, Bruno, understood that Andy was in the slot machine business with Farmer. He stated that they stayed at Farmer's only a short time and then drove back to the apartment, but that he

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did not go in the apartment, but drove immediately home. About four or five days later Bruno again visited the apartment on Surf Street and found Andy, Shorty, Slim, and Willie present, as well as the same two women previously mentioned. Bruno stated Mibs, and Sam Mano were also present at the apartment on the occasion of this visit and that they seemed to have quite a lot of business to do with Slim. On the occasion of this visit Bruno advised that he drove with Shorty to an apartment located at 3912 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, to bring a couple of suitcases to that address; that they went to an apartment located on the first floor which was rented in the name of Bolton and that while at this Pine Grove apartment he saw a woman he understood was Shorty's woman, but stated that he did not know the name of this woman but he identified a photograph of Mildred Kuhlman as being the woman seen by him there. Bruno stated that a few days later, or about the end of November, 1934, he drove to the apartment at 3912 Pine Grove and found Shorty alone and with Mildred; that shortly after he arrived Slim came in and that he, Bruno, endeavored to borrow some money from Slim, but that Slim did not give him any as he stated he was broke. On this occasion Bruno said that Slim and Shorty stated that they were going out of town along with Andy and Willie and that they would not be back to Chicago until about January 15, and that while he was still at the apartment they loaded a number of suitcases in their Ford V-8 sedan and drove away. Bruno states that he did not visit the apartments or see any of the gang after they left on this trip about the middle of November.

He states that the only reason he kept hanging around with these fellows was in the hopes of getting some money from them and that Slim was continually promising to get him in on a job which they were supposed to be planning. He stated they never divulged to him any of their business nor did they indicate to him they were wanted by the Government. He stated that he had asked Elmer Farmer on a number of occasions about the members of the gang, but that Elmer stated that they were hot and that they were all right.

Bruno said that he continued to visit Farmer after the gang left Chicago and that on one occasion when he visited Farmer, Farmer told him that in the event he saw any of the boys to tell them that Cotton wanted to get in touch with them as he wanted to get some money they owed him and a machine gun from them; that Farmer also told him that Cotton had stayed at Bartholmey's house on one occasion while Andy was staying there. He stated further that during the time he was visiting the gang on Surf Street that on several occasions

Shorty and Willie would pack up suitcases and leave in their automobile, apparently to be out of town for a few days, but that they never indicated where they were going.

Bruno said that Joe Galliachio and Sam Mano seemed to be very closely associated with Slim and the rest of the boys; that he understood that Slim used to pal around with Joe and Sam for a number of years. He stated that he himself was never taken into the gang's confidence at all and that he always felt they allowed him to come to their apartments, but that they did not particularly care to have him around. He denied that he had ever made any trips out of town with any of the boys, nor did he get any idea from them as to where they went or who they went to see when they made trips out of town. Bruno said that the first indication he had of any of this gang's identity was the day following the killing of Slim Gray in Chicago; that when he saw this article in the newspaper he recognized the Slim Gray as being the same Slim that he knew; that he went to see Elmer Farmer and asked him why he did not advise him of the identity of these parties, and that Elmer Farmer merely advised that he thought he could find out for himself who they were. He stated that the only one of these individuals that he ever did definitely find out about was Slim Gray and that he has not yet learned the identity of the other members of the gang except by knowing them by their nick names. He stated that at no time did they ever discuss the kidnaping of Edward Bremer, nor did they indicate that they had ever held any kidnap victim in Bensenville. He also said that the only places he had ever been with them were apartments on Surf Street and Pine Grove Avenue, and that they had never taken him to any other spots frequented by them in this vicinity.

Bruno refused to give a signed statement covering his association with members of the gang, but stated that he would be willing to answer any questions asked him about them truthfully.

Bruno further advised that approximately the first of December, 1934, and up until the time of his arrest he resided with the family of Marie Erenke, his wife, at 2657 Division Street, Chicago, Illinois.

When questioned concerning his activities from December 1, 1933 to March 1, 1934, Bruno stated that he was working during this time for his brother-in-law Angelo Adochio, who is in the coal and ice business; that he was driving a truck for him and that he was then residing with his parents, who at that time lived at 1600 South Kedzie Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

The following additional information was obtained from Bruno Austin by Special Agent K. R. McIntire. Bruno stated that on one occasion Slim Gray had told him that Farmer had put in a good word for him and stated that he was okay, and that Slim and Shorty had both told him that Joe O'Brien of the Hy-Ho Club and Mickey from the Pioneer Tavern had told them that he, Bruno, was all right. Bruno furnished the following descriptions of Mickey and Joe O'Brien.

Bruno stated that from his conversation with Slim and Shorty he gathered that Slim Gray and Joe O'Brien were pretty close friends. Bruno also advised that on one occasion while visiting the apartment occupied by the boys, he ascertained that Shorty and Cotton had had an argument of some kind which was apparently very trivial as the boys indicated that it was all over nothing. Also during one of his visits Shorty mentioned having taken a "jug", meaning a bank next to a town where a sheriff had an aeroplane; that Shorty had told him on another occasion that he had had his face lifted, his nose fixed up and his fingerprints changed. Bruno stated that during the time he saw Shorty he had a scar on his nose and two large scars on his neck below his ears. Bruno also stated that the boys on numerous occasions referred to Willie as Elmer and addressed him by that name frequently. He said that Willie sometimes carries a cane and is constantly smoking cigars and that he invariably wears a camels hair coat.

The following is a description of Bruno Putis as obtained from the records of the Chicago Police Department and information furnished by himself.

Criminal record as obtained from the Bureau of Identification, Chicago Police Department--

As Bruno Austin, C41940, sentenced to 6 months in the House of Correction and \$100 fine on November 28, 1932, charge--auto larceny.

As Bruno Austin, arrested Police Department, Berwyn, Illinois, April 16, 1934, charge--assault to kill, disposition--dismissed.

Disposition sheet covering arrest of Austin being attached.

The following additional arrest was admitted by Bruno Austin:

As Bruno Austin arrested Chicago Police Department, June 9, 1934, charge--robbery with gun; released on \$10,000 bond.

Bruno states that the last mentioned is the instance in which he jumped bond on September 28, 1934.

On February 7, 1935 the St. Paul Bureau Office was advised by telegram the facts concerning the arrest and identification of Subject Whitie and were requested to furnish the United States Attorney, Chicago, Illinois with certified copies of the indictment and bench warrant in order that a detainer might be filed at the Cook County Jail against the release of Austin. On February 8, 1935 certified copies of the indictment in which Whitie and others are charged with conspiracy to kidnap in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 Stat. 326, 18 U.S. Code, 408a, and warrant were received by the United States Attorney at Chicago, Illinois from the United States Attorney at St. Paul, Minnesota, and on February 9, 1935 a fugitive complaint was sworn to by the writer before the United States Commissioner Edwin K. Falker against Whitie, whose true name is now known to be Bruno Putis, alias Bruno Austin, alias "Whitie", and a fugitive warrant was issued and the warrant and a copy of the complaint was delivered by the writer to Deputy United States Marshal, W. Schuhknecht, who advised that this warrant and complaint would be lodged against Bruno Putis at the Cook County Jail on the same day.

On February 11, 1935 the writer interviewed Assistant States Attorney Richard Devine concerning the state case pending against Bruno Putis, at which time Mr. Devine advised that the trial date of this case is set for February 20, 1935; that Bruno is to be tried for the robbery of a theater owner, who the state alleges was shot several times by Bruno during the robbery. Mr. Devine advised that the state case was not particularly strong in view of the fact that all of the prosecuting witnesses had been intimidated in one way or another so that it was necessary to have police guards with them until the case is disposed of; that the theater owner who had been robbed by Bruno has since had his theater bombed in an apparent effort to intimidate him, for which reason he, Devine, thinks he may hedge on his testimony. Nevertheless Mr. Devine stated that his office intends to prosecute this case on the date set. He further stated that the offense with which Austin is charged carries a penalty of from one year to life if he is convicted. He was advised by Agent that prosecution of Bruno on the state charge would in no way interfere with the case which this office has against him in connection with the Bremer kidnaping and he was also informed that it was not the intention of

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this office to interfere with the state case and request that Bruno be turned over to the Federal Government for prosecution.

At the Cook County Jail on the same date the writer ascertained that the warrant and complaint has been duly lodged as detainer against the release of Bruno Putis, alias Bruno Austin.

On February 11, 1935 a photostatic copy of the fingerprints of Bruno Austin, Chicago P.D. #C41940 was obtained by the writer and the same were forwarded on February 12, 1935 to the Bureau with the request that these fingerprints be compared with all latent prints developed in this case, and that the Chicago and St. Paul offices be furnished with a complete criminal record of Subject.

Two copies of the photograph of Subject are furnished the Bureau with copies of this report and two copies of this photograph is being furnished the St. Paul Bureau office to be used in further questioning Subjects Allderton, Farmer and Bolton. Two copies of the photograph of Subject are also being furnished the Detroit Office for use in the investigation conducted by that office in Detroit, Cleveland, and Toledo, with the view of having Subject Whitie possibly identified in those places, and two copies of this photograph are also being furnished the Jacksonville Bureau Office for use in the investigation being conducted at Miami, Florida with the view of possibly identifying Whitie there.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS

The CHICAGO BUREAU OFFICE at CHICAGO will follow the prosecution of the case against Bruno Austin in the State Court on February 20, 1935.

The CHICAGO OFFICE will interview Clara Gray further concerning the association of Sam Mano and Joe Galliachio with Slim Gray and other members of the gang and ascertain from her if possible if they have any connection with the instant case.

The CHICAGO OFFICE will conduct investigation at 3912 Pine Grove Avenue and 432 Surf Street to ascertain if any person living at that address can identify Bruno Putis as having frequented the apartments occupied by members of the gang at those addresses.

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The CHICAGO OFFICE will secure the photograph and fingerprints of Joe Galliachio and Sam Mano from the Chicago Police Department as well as their criminal records and conduct further investigation regarding these individuals.

The ST. PAUL OFFICE will through interview with Elmer Farmer, Bryan Bolton and Harold Allderton endeavor to ascertain further information concerning the connection of Bruno Putis in this case and will also interview the above parties concerning Sam Mano and Joe Galliachio as to their having furnished guns for the gang.

The ST. PAUL OFFICE will discuss with the United States Attorney at St. Paul the probability of prosecution of Bruno Putis, but this lead should be in abeyance until the termination of the trial of Putis in the State Court at Chicago, Illinois.

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
