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

Dear Sir:

On September 19th, 1935 Mr. J. S. Hindman, Assistant Chief Special Agent of the Northern Pacific Railway at Scattle, and Washington turned over to Special Agent A. T. Deere a cheap metal eigarette case which had been found by a truck driver for the railroad on a side track in the railroad yards not far from the "skid row" section and of Scattle. This signrette case had apparently been dropped by some transient who had been sleeping in a box car and it was found to contain various cards, papers, notes, diagrams and receipts, the receipts indicating that the eigerette case was apparently lost by one Fatrick J. Lyons, who appears to have two addresses, namely 1662 Tioga Street, Special Company Shamokin, Fennsylvania and 1032 Oliver Avenue, Indianapolis, Indiana. One paper found in the case bore the following printed notations: "Dr. John Terick, Roodstock, Illinois, dops peddler, hangout for Karpis, Campbell and Mahan. Dr. I. C. Hollingers Sanitarius, Newburgh, Indiana, & dope and white slave hideout. Old Army Fort, ten miles from Evensville, Indiana. Er. Miger, Coschocton, Ohio, hangout for crime, John Hamilton hideout".

The above information was furnished by teletype to the Eureau and Chicago, Cincinnati, Philadelphia and Indinapolis offices on September 20, 1925, the various Bureau offices being requested to check this information in their respective districts. A teletype was received from the Indianapolis Bureau office on September 21st, 1935 edvising that the mother of Fatrick J. Lyons resides at 1032 Oliver Street, Indianapolis; that Lyons married a girl by the name of Hellie Novack, Shemokin, Pennsylvania and has been away from Indianapolis for several years. He has no criminal record; also, that Iyons is a World War Veteran drawing compensation and has recently

been in the Government Hospital at Sawtelle, California. Indianapolis office further advised that Dr. Hollinger, mentioned above, had conducted a sanitarium at Newburgh up to six or eight years ago but that he subsequently moved to Boonville, Indiana where he died about two years ago; that Dr. Hollinger bore an excellent reputation.

It was also determined by the Indianapolis office that the Old Fort, indicated in the above notes, is merely a small hill: where some frontier fort is alleged to have existed.

Inquiry at the address for Lyons in Shamokin, Pennsylvania by the Philadelphia office corroborated the information obtained by the Indianapolis office in that the wife of Lyons was located living at 1662 Tioga Street, but that she has not seen him for the last five years. There is no criminal record on Lyons at Shamokin.

His description as furnished by his wife is as follows:

It is requested that inquiry be made at the Veterans. Hospital at Sawtelle, California for the purpose of ascertaining any information concerning his recent activities and his present whereabouts.

Dear Sir:

Please refer to copy of the letter of this office dated September 18, 1935, to the Detroit Office, and to the letter of the Detroit Office dated September 25, 1935, to this office, concerning the return to Mrs. Gladys Sawyer of certain property as is described in the letter of the St. Paul Office dated September 4, 1935 to this office, and advise whether it is the Bureau's desire that this office should proceed with an inquiry to locate the said property with a view to transmitting it to her at St. Paul through the St. Paul Office.

The writer believes that it might not be desirable for the Bureau to place itself in a position of accepting responsibility for the property of Gladys Sawyer, or of any of the other subjects involved in this case which did not come into the hands of Bureau representatives, and which was seized without its consent and prior to the arrival of Bureau representatives at the place where the seizure was made. The apartment of Gladys Sawyer in Cleveland was in the hands of the local police several days before the arrival of Bureau representatives. It is the writer's thought that the Bureau should not place itself in a position of accepting responsibility or liability for the seizures made by the police, nor have it appear, by assuming the task of returning the property in question, that the property seized by the police, some of which, Agent Hopton advises, cannot now be accounted for, is constructively in the possession of the Bureau by police custody thereof.

Colonel Gates called me on at least a dozen occasions yesterday and I finally talked to him. He said that he had considerable pressure on him from the "newspaper boys" for information concerning the apprehension of CASSIUS McDONALD.

I told Colonel Gates that all I knew about the matter is what I had read in the morning papers; namely, that Cassius McDonald had been arrested at Detroit, Michigan, by Agents of the Bureau upon a complaint charging participation in the distribution of the Bremer ransom money, and was being held in default of bond.

Colonel Gates asked where Cassius McDonald is from, and I told him I thought he was from the vicinity of Detroit, and when he asked concerning Identification Orders, I told him that none had been issued.

Subsequently, Mr. Carusi called me regarding the same matter and I also informed him that from the newspapers I had gleaned what information in my possession. Mr. Carusi was particularly desirous of knowing whether there had been any shooting or "fire works", and I told him the Bureau had not been informed.



Dear Sir:-Ыc On September 20th, pursuant to your telephonic instructions I contacted Noel C Scaffa as to the matter concerning b7d which Mr. Charles Pettijohn of New York had telephoned you. Scaffa stated that on September 19th, an informant , called him on the telephone, exof his, named pressed regret at the trouble in which Scaffa found himself, and claimed a desire to be of any possible assistance to Scaffa. ALCE THE PROPERTY CHARACTER STATE Scaffa stated he had not heard from this informant previously for about a year, but that was formerly quite a valuable informant as to the hijacking of trucks between New England and New York, and previously had lived in New York, Brooklyn, Port Chester; Norwalk and Bridgeport, Conn. Scaffa stated that while told him that he had talking to him over the telephone picked up a lead on Karpis and had not intended to say anything about the information, but would furnish the same to Scaffa, if the latter thought he might use it in any way to his advantage. then told him that the previous day, Scaffa stated that while on his way down to New York from Bridgeport, he had run into a former associate of his up in Connecticut, and had procured COPIES DESTROYED 848 MAR 24 1965

from this party information to the effect that Karpis and three other men, names unknown, were living in a bungalow which they had rented in Cos Cob, Conn., between Greenwich and Stamford; that Karpis had his hair dyed and was wearing dark glasses; that he and his companions go once or twice a week to a black and tan joint on the road east out of Stamford. Scaffa further stated that this informant, in the years gone by, has not always been found to be reliable, but has on occasion furnished highly valuable and accurate information, as to hijackings and bank robberies. Scaffa agreed to get in touch with this informant as soon as possible, and bring him to me, in order that further and more accurate details might be procured. Scaffa stated that he had no way of getting in touch with this informant, except through the residence of the informant's sister, who lives in Brooklyn. He furnished information that this sister is

Scarra thought the informant is now living in but he did not know where. Scaffa further stated that the informant is a former operator of a speakeasy and a bootlegger, and usually has one or two women around his places, who practice prostitution.

I proceeded immediately to the vicinity of Cos Cob and Stamford, Conn., where, as the result of a confidential inquiry, I learned that Mr. Tammany, the Postmaster at Cos Cob, is entirely reliable and has lived in that community all his life; in fact, his family has resided in Cos Cob for several generations. After laying this ground work, I approached the Postmaster without revealing the identities of the persons whom we were seeking, and through him and certain of his carriers, learned that most of the residents in Cos Cob are home owners and are known to him, and to his carriers; in fact, he pointed out practically all of the places in Cos Cob which are for rent, and was able to say of his own knowledge that no bungalow had recently been rented in that vicinity by any party of four men or other suspicious The only possibility of which he knew was the occupants of No. 98 River Road, Cos Cob, Com. This is a red bungalow with a garage in the rear, and is known as the Old Swezy Place. About two months ago, this place was rented by a Mrs. James Wishrod, who formerly lived in New York, or who at

least receives considerable mail forwarded from New York. Arrangements were made to procure the New York address from which this imail was being forwarded, and a cover was placed on the same for possible future reference. The Post-Office carrier who covers this address stated that he has occasionally seen around this bungalow a young man about 22 years of age, by the name of James Maher. He was shown unlabeled photographs of Karpis and Campbell, and was quite certain that he had not seen either of them at this place. He claims that on one or two occasions he noticed another strange man at this address, but has not noticed any automobile or suspicious activity of any kind. The carrier usually visits this place for the purpose of delivering mail at about 9:30 A. M.

Confidential inquiries were next made as to any possible "black and tan joints" on roads east of Stamford. No such places could be found. The Darien Tavern, the Green Pasture, the Open Door and Leighton's Half Way House were the only places located which might possibly have been referred to by the informant and of these Leighton's was the only one having an orchestra or other entertainment. The waiters at Leighton's are colored, but the orchestra is white, and this place has no floor show. It apparently is not the type of place which Karpis and his mob would frequent.

I kept in touch with Scaffa and finally today, September 25th, he was able to get in touch with his informent, and he persuaded the latter to talk with me in formerly did some work a hotel room. It develops that for one Palmer, the Borough leader in Brooklyn, and is apparently a very cheap type of racketeer and hoodlum. he is now living with his sister in Brooklyn, at the address above mentioned, and can only be reached through that address. He stated that he previously had a speakeasy at N. Y., where he "did business" with the then Chief of Police. He stated that he has not lived in for some time, for the reason that the present Chief of Police ran him out of town, or rather told him that he could not have a license to operate any more. The present Chief of Police, he says, knew or suspected his corrupt relationship with the

was questioned closely as to the location of the "black and tan joint" which was being visited by Karpis, according to Richey, but he could furnish no information as to its location except that it was in or near Stamford, Conn., and he believes Richey said, on the road east of Stamford.

agreed to see Richey again either tonight or tomorrow to buy him a few drinks and to see if he could develop further information as to how Richey procured the above information and the exact location of the bungalow in which the Karpis mob is alleged to be staying, but he immediately started dickering for expense money. He was told that any money paid to him would have to be on a C. O. D. basis, and that the government would not indiscriminately furnish him with expense money. He asked how much there would be in it for him if he could deliver Karpis

and I asked him how much he wanted. He said he would expect as much as \$1,000. if he "delivered the goods." He was told that if he could find out where Karpis is staying and furnish the information to me in such fashion as to enable the government to arrest Karpis and those with him, that he would be paid \$1,000. To this he agreed. He claimed not to have any carfare with which to get to Stamford and I gave him \$10.00 with the understanding that no more money would be forthcoming, unless he could produce results.

I personally am doubtful that this tip is accurate s to Karpis. Attention is invited to Scaffa's statement that had told him Karpis and three other men were occupying a bungalow at Cos Cob. I am rather certain from my investigation at Cos Cob that no four strange men are at the present time or have recently occupied a bungalow in that town; also, attention is invited to the discrepancy in statement to me and to Scaffa. He told me after Scaffa had left that Richey said two fellows from the west, one of them Karpis, had this bungalow; also, it seems that if there were a "black and tan joint" near Stamford, I would have learned of it from my guarded inquiries in that vicinity. However, it is a fact that the Schultz mob and other New York gangsters have in recent months been hanging out around Norwalk, in the vicinity of Cos Cob, Greenwich and Stamford. There are, of course, hundreds of bungalows which might be rented in this general locality. The Boston Post Road runs through all these towns and they are practically continuous. Cos Cob, for instance, which is just 32 miles from downtown New York on the Boston Post Road, is not marked as a separate town; in fact it is more or less a suburb of Greenwich, and it is difficult to tell where the one begins and the other ends.

The informant furnished me with the telephone number Evergreen 8-7620, and was given my New York telephone number, with instructions that he should call me immediately from a pay station if he is able to develop any further information. He seemed especially interested in the \$1,000. promised him if he delivers the goods, and if there is anything to this lead.

It is also desired it be ascertained if this person is competent to produce the personal history data records taken at the time these passengers purchased their tickets. If not, secure the name of the person and his address, who is competent to produce and testify as to these latter records.

Kindly ascertain at Miami, Flörida, the location of the registration cards, bell-boy records, and arrival and departure book of the El Commodorce Hotel concerning the various Subjects of this file, in order that this information might be available for use of the United States Attorney at St. Paul, Minnesota, in issuing subposnas. It is possible that these records are in possession of the United States Attorney in Miami or in the Jacksonville Bureau Office.

It is also requested that your office forward to the St. Paul Office all of the personal property taken from Subject CASSIUS McDCNALD at the time of his arrest, which included two small zipper brief cases; also an unused portion of a Pan American plane ticket, as well as a Cuban immigration card.

In the event these articles have been returned to McDONALD, kindly forward the receipt given by him at the time. Also the various photostatic copies of the articles contained in his sipper cases.

It is also requested that you forward to the St. Paul Office, copy of the letter prepared by Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson at Miami, Floridg, at the time he transmitted all of this material to the United States Attorney in Miami.







With further reference to Bureau letter dated September 19, 1935 (7-576), in this matter instructing that a summary report be prepared concerning activities of Eyrtle Satem in the Jacksonville District, and also my letter of the 20th instant requesting all available data not beretofore supplied the Jacksonville Office.

Please be advised that the matter has been submitted to the United States Attorney, Jacksonville, Florida, who is very agreeable to prosecuting Nyrtle Saton in this district on a charge of harboring Sillian Meaver. He does not look with particular favor on the other possible methods of prosecution as outlined in the Bureau letter, in view of the fact that considerable trouble was experienced with similar indictments at Mismi, Florida, which were eventually overruled by the court.

It is the intention of the United States Attorney here to submit the matter to a Grand Jury convening at Orlando, Florida, October 7, 1935. He has requested that a certified copy of any indictments against weaver returned at St. Paul in connection with this case be forwarded by the Clerk of the Court at that place to the Clerk of the Court, Jacksonville, Florida. This procedure will tend to simplify the proper identification, et cetera, of the indictments when used in this district before the Grand Jury, and possibly at the time of trial.

It is also requested that two good photographs of both William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, of very recent date, be secured so that same may be used in the further investigation in this district, and also at the time of trial. In connection with forwarding these photographs, the Jacksonville Office should be advised as to the mame and address of the person who took same and developed the film so that he may be brought here as a witness, if mecessary to properly identify the photograph of Weaver.

The Jacksonville Office should be immediately supplied with the name of at least one competent witness who testified before the Grand Jury at St. Paul, and whose testimony related particularly to Weaver. We would also like, if possible, to have the photographs which are being requested above shown to the suggested witness prior to the transmission of the photographs to this district.

The matter of suggesting the name of a competent witness who gave testimony to indict Weaver is left to the discretion of the St. Paul Office.

Attention is again called to the fact that we desire to present this case to a Grand Jury October 7, 1935, which will require prompt compliance with this request so that subpoenss may be issued in this district in due time.

Reference is made to the teletype from the St. Paul Bureau office dated September 28, 1935 requesting that all available information relative to admissions on the part of Oliver A. Berg to Special Agents of this Bureau, contained in the Chicago Bureau office files, relative to his past criminal activities and associates, be furnished your office to be used by the United States Attorney at St. Paul, Minnesota in combating Berg's petition for reduction of sentence.

Berg was taken into Federal custody by Special Agents R. L. Jones, J. L. Madala and R. D. Brown at Chicago, Illinois on the night of August 22, 1934 at a rooming house at 5248 minthrop Avenue. At the time of his apprehension some difficulty was experienced in causing his arrest due to Berg's failure to immediately submit to arrest at the first instance. In a desk drawer located near the point where Berg was sitting in his room at this rooming house at the time of his arrest were two .38 calibre loaded revolvers and Berg's actions at the time of his arrest indicated that he desired the opportunity to reach for these guns in order to avoid apprehension.

Berg was taken to the Chicago Bureau office by the above named Agents where he was questioned on the late evening of August 22, 1934 until the morning of August 25, 1934, when he was taken to the City Jail at Minnetka, Illinois for safe keeping. He remained in the said jail at Minnetka until the morning of August 30, 1934, when he was removed by Special Agents of the Chicago office to the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois where he was turned over to the warden of that institution where he was wanted on a charge of technical escape from that institution to complete a sentence of from ten years to life on a charge of robbery, armed. A criminal record, known to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which will be listed at the end of this letter, will show the date of his arrest on this charge for which he received the last sentence.

Various interviews had been had with Berg by Special Agents of the Chicago Bureau office and the information furnished by him relative to his past criminal associations and activities, as contained in official reports of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, is furnished herewith.

The report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, dated at Chicago. Illinois, September 1, 1934, starting with Page 22, records the details of Berg's apprehension. During the period covering the dates August 22, 23, 24, 1934, Berg was interviewed by Special Agents J. L. Madala, C. C. Campbell, Bt D. Brown and J. R. Welles. Berg informed these Agents that he had been living, since his release on a habeas corpus from the Illinois State Penitentiary, at 5248 North Minthrop Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, under the name of Oliver Bennett: that his true came is Oliver A. Berg but is known to his friends generally as Cllie. He stated he was born at South Chicago, Illinois on April 3, 1880; that he is an American citizen of Hungarian ancestry; that his only living relatives are his sisters, Florence Gonda, Budapost, Hungary and Mrs. Armin Kubn. 5248 North Winthrop Avenue. Chicago. Ill. Berry stated he is a tool maker by trade and worked at this occupation until he became 51 years of age, after which period he sold real estate for Chicago concerns, doing this type of work for approximately ton years, after which he purchased a small cigar stand in Chicago. operating this business for approximately a year, after which be again engaged in real estate for a short time. He stated that shortly after the entrance of the prohibition era he became associated with Louis Varian, alias Louis Alterie, Doan O'Banion, Johnny Shey, Johnny Phillips. Karl wise, and others who were engaged in the liquor racket in Chicago, Illinois and vicinity. He admitted that O'Banion, Shey, Phillips and hise were subsequently killed in gangland fashion by mobaters of the notorious Al Capone syndicate. It should be brought to the attention of the court that Louis Varian, alias Louis Alterie, notorious hoad of the Chicago Motion Picture Operators Union, who ruled that union with an iron hand using gangland tactics, was murdored in gangland fushion by persons unknown to the Chicago Police during the surmor of 1935. It is common knowledge among law enforcement agencies at Chicago, Illinois that Varian, for many years before his death, traveled throughout Chicago in a bullet proof limousine always accompanied by bodyguards and Herg has admitted on several occasions to both Special Agent R. D. Brown and Special Agent J. L. Endala that he has, on occasions, acted as bodyguard for Varian.

Berg advised he was first arrested at Chicago, Illinois in 1924 for violation of the National Prohibition Act. At this time he served 5 months in the County Jail at Hoodstock, Illinois; that

in 1926 he, together with one Hymie Dickholtz and Milne Mendolsoehn, was arrested in Champaign County, Illinois for robbery of a jewalry 🗟 solesman with a gun; that in making their getaway he, Berg, was shot just above the heart by a deputy sheriff; that he subsequently pleaded guilty to this charge and was sentenced to serve the remainder of his natural life in the penitentiary at Menard, Illinois; that he was later transferred to the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois, entering that institution on December 15, 1928 and serving until Kovember of 1931, at which time he was released under a writ of habous corpus and immediately thereafter be served four months in the Cook County Jeil at Chicago, Illinois and finally in Farch of 1932 his case was dismissed and he was discharged. Powever, it later developed that Berg was not actually discharged by the Court as his case was taken to the Supreme Court for the State of Illinois, which Court affirmed the judgment of the lower court and on May 17, 1933 the Chicago, Illinois Police Depurtment was requested to cause Berg's apprehension and return to the Illinois State Penitentiary at Jolist. Illinois, the following notation appearing on his eriminal record "manted as Cliver Berg, Fugitive, from Joliet penitentiary; notify Police Department, Chicago, Illinois per instructions received therefrom 5-17-33 - disappeared while on writ of supersaedeas from State Prison, Joliet, Illinois."

while in the Illinois State Penitentiary Borg Advised he first met Dr. Joseph P. Moran, a defendant in the above captioned case, who, according to Berg, performed a delicate operation surrounding the bullet which was imbedded just below his heart, received during the robbery at Champaign, Illinois, saving his life. He informed that after his technical release from the Illinois State Fenitentiary on the writ of supersaedeas, he contacted Joseph P. Moran at his office in Chicago, Illinois, obtaining medical treatment from him and also associated with him socially.

Berg admitted to the above named Special Agents that shortly after his release from the Illinois State Penitentiary he met one Russell Gibson, who he knew as Ray Evans in Chicago, Illinois. It will be noted that Russell Gibson is also a defendant in the above captioned case and is now deceased, having been killed by Special Agents of the Chicago Bureau office in attempting to avoid arrest at Chicago, Illinois in January, 1935. Gibson also has a long arrest record and was wanted for bank robbery in the State of Oklahoma in addition to the instant charge of kidnaping. Berg admitted associating with Gibson from the period shortly after his release from the Illinois State Penitentiary up until the time of his arrest.

Berg further admitted to the above named agents that he had done no work since his release from the Illinois State Penitentiary and had been living in comparative security at 5848 North Minthrop Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, knowing that his return to the Illinois State Penitentiary was desired. Berg's associations with the other defendants in this case, beginning with January, 1934 to the date of his arrest at Chicago, Illinois, Toledo, Chic and other points in the middle west, was brought out fully during the trial of some of the defendants in this case, including himself, during the spring, 1935, term of Federal Court at St. Paul, Minnesota.

On the occasion of the removal of Berg from the Chicago Bureau office, 1900 Bankers Building, to the City Jail at Minnetka, Illinois, on the morning of August 25, 1934, via Bureau owned automobile, he was escorted by Special Agent J. L. Hadala and former Special Agent T. C. Connor. Special Agent J. L. Madala telephonically advised Special Agent R. D. Brown on September 28, 1935 that while engaged in this travel, the conversation between the two Agents and Borg was with reference to various Chicago gang killings and the persons implicated therein. Berg then made this statement to Agents Madala and Connor: "I killed a couple of guys one time". Berg refused to go into this admission further although diplomatic attempts were made by Agents Madala and Connor to solicit further admissions.

During a conversation with Berg with the above named Agents he admitted he accompanied Louis Varian from Chicago, Illinois to Mannibal, Missouri during the spring of 1934 where Varian was interested financially in the Moulin Rouge Tavern for the purpose of installing slot machines in this tavern and other taverns in the vicinity. Berg admitted that Varian was in the slot machine racket in addition to being connected with the above named labor organization and that although he, merg, was not interested in this racket he frequently acted as Varian's bodyguard when making trips in and about Chicago and to other points where Varian had slot machine interests.

The report of Special Agent R. D. Brown dated Jenuary 8, 1935, starting with Page 48, records a further interview with Berg by Special Agent John L. Madala on Movember 22, 23 and on December 12, 1934 at the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois. On the above dated interviews Berg made additional admissions relative to his political and criminal associates. Berg advised Agent Madala that a few months after the release of Dr. Joseph P. Moran from the penitentiary, Moran opened an office in Maywood, Illinois; that Foran met with some difficulty in obtaining a license to practice medicine in view of his previous criminal record and in this connection Berg advised he was

successful, through his influence with political friends, in securing the said license for Dr. Moran; that when Dr. Moran opened his office at Maywood, Illinois, he, Berg, loaned him a considerable amount of money.

It will be recalled by the U.S. Attorney at St. Penl.
Minnesota that certain evidence was admitted during the trial of this
cese at St. Paul, Minnesota during the spring, 1935, term, to show
that John J. (Boss) McLaughlin, a defendant in this case, who was
shown to have been a powerful political figure in Chicago, had assisted
Dr. Moran in securing a license to practice medicine after his release
from the Illinois state Penitentiary. Although Berg has never admitted
he secured the services of Boss McLaughlin on behalf of Dr. Moran, it
appears reasonable that Berg accomplished his purpose in aiding Noran
through Boss McLaughlin.

The following criminal record of Diver A. Berg is on file with the Federal Buroau of Investigation:



The foregoing information is all that 15 contained in the Chicago Bureau office files relative to Berg's past criminal associates and record. The only information not contained in the reports before designated is the information furnished by Special Agent J. L. Madala with reference to the admission made by Berg to Madala and Special Agent Connor while en route from Chicago, Ill. to Minnetka, Ill. on August 25, 1934, as is stated above.



Pomerene, 144 Sixth St., and Mr. Dan Meek, 550 Chestnut St., would be two good contacts. He further advised that Mr. Meek was a Christian Scientist and had little use for doctors and he thought that these two would give different view-points about Mr. Miser.

Mr. Dan Meek lives in a very fine home, immediately across from the Sanitorium and has lived in this neighborhood for over 35 years. Mr. Meek is the owner of a printing shop and calendar business and is a prominent man of Coshocton, Ohio. Mr. Meek advised agent that he has known Mr. Mizer all of his life and regards him very highly; that Mizer caters to drug addicts, although he does not think that Mr. Mizer really tries to actually cure drug addicts but tries to get them on their feet so that they are improved enough to go home. In other words Mr. Meek thinks that he (Mizer) has a good racket and is shrewd enough to take care of it. Mr. Meek advised agent that Mizer caters to wealthy people and has had some very well known people at the sanitorium and named among some of the people Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, who is supposed to have been at the institution for cures at several different times.

Dr. Lister Pomerene, 144 Sixth St., is a retired doctor and apparently is well off financially. He advised agent that he has lived across the street from the sanitorium for over fifteen years and that he has known a pro-French Mizer for many years. Dr. Pomerene frankly advised agent that he had very little respect for Mizer as he regards him as a faker and stated that Mizer did not speak to him for years and only "grunts" now when he meets him as he (Dr. Pomerene) refused to recommend the sanitorium or the cure and refused to take a position as a physician on call for the institution. Dr. Pomerene advised that the sanitorium was started over twenty-five years ago by Blake Mizer, a brother of French Mizer, and that Blake Mizer is now deceased. Dr. Pomerene stated that in years past the sanitorium paid very well as each patient had to pay the sumof \$500.00 upon entrance and that Mizer insisted that it always be paid in advance, and that years ago that he had all of the patients that he could care for, but that at the present time he has only about three patients. Dr. Pomerene stated that he did not know anything that could be said against French Mizer that could be proved but that he could not say anything about him that was good and that he would not trust him and would not be surprised at anything that he would do. Dr. Pomerene stated that he did not understand how French Mizer could afford to put some of the improvements on the plac e that he has done and is doing at the present time.

Harry Davis, Acting Chief of Police, advised that he has known Mizer for many years and regards him very highly and that he has never had a complaint concerning him in all the years that he has operated this sanitorium. No one by the name of Miger is known to Mr. Davis.

Sheriff J. Abbott advised agent that he has known Mixer for years and that so far as he knows that Mizer is on the square and has always been an upright citizen.

The sanitorium is located in the very heart of the residential district of Coshocton, Ohio and one could not suspect that it was an institution as there is nothing to mark it or designate it as one in any manner. It is a very large brick home of old type architecture and surrounded by a large yard that is very well kept, and appears to be an old private residence. Agent noticed that an orderly was working out in the yeard most of the day. This orderly, according to Dr. Pomerene, aids in odd jobs around the house and often cares for the patients. Mr. Mizer makes no claim to be a doctor and only manages the place.

It was not deemed advisable to contact Mr. Mizer at this time and if it is necessary in the future to do more work on this angle it is believed that Dr. Pomerene will be a good contact as he has no respect for Mr. Mizer and since he lives immediately across the street from the institution he will know just what goes on in the future as he is home most of the day.

Dearest Mother

Just got your letter and was so happy to get it. I was rather worried - wondering whether you had received my last letter or not. You see, letters are not supposed to be sent to Gen. Del. and I wasn't sure if mine had been mailed.

Yes, Mumsy, it's just as well that you don't know what it's like to be in prison and I hope you never find out. Mugs probably thinks she knows what it's like but the place she was in is more like a boarding school than anything else. It's kinda tough here but a person gets used to it and I guess I can do these years easy enough - ha - I'm laughing now - but I'm not tickled.

Yes, I received those snaps and they made me feel so funny. It seems impossible to think that I once looked like that. I think there's a mistake somewhere. Sure that's not some other girl in them? I guess those were happy days but I don't remember much about them. I remember that house in Aberdeen pretty well though. You could have sent them to medirect - but of course you couldn't send me more than one letter in the month. Those snaps you sent me last were nice - but, gee, darling, I can't even see your face in them and I do so want to see if you have changed. Please send the enlargement soon, won't you? Just why should I laugh at you in breeches and boots? I think you would look lots nicer in them than a lot of other women do all dolled up.

I sure will be glad when you get to Chicago and see Ray. You needn't buy anything for him tho' Mummy, 'cause from what I hear he has everything he needs. They are pretty crazy about him and keep him pretty well supplied with everything.

Honey, I don't understand how the "G" can keep Mugs from going to see Ray when she wants to. Her probation has been up for quite sometime, so she's a free woman. They have no right to keep her from going where she wants to now. Look into it and see - I'll bet it's a stall.

I don't think you can do anything about the baby's things, Mom, Mr. & Mrs. Karpis and Emily did everything under the sun and couldn't get them so I guess we're just S.O.L. My clothes will be okay I'm sure and I'll probably get them some time or other. They are holding them at the Marshall's office in Miami now.

I'll just bet the G. men gave you a fit. I'd sure liked to have seen you talking to them. Did they ever question you about me before I was arrested? Did you ever give them any pictures of me? They

had one and I was wondering if they got it from you. I guess the G. are all pretty polite but you couldn't expect anything from the cops there. I have my first time to have one of them treat me with any courtesy. Just how would you expect me to get my mind off of the things that's happened? even if I wanted to? - which I don't. I'll remember those things 'till the last day I live.

Darling, don't try to send me anything for my hair 'cause' they won't let me have it. I have a hair brush and it's a good one. I had it in my bags when I came here and they let me have it. The doctor has promised to do something about my hair. He may and then again he may not. Whether he does or doesn't matter much 'cause when I get out I can wear a wig. Won't that be sweet? I message my scalp once in awhile but usually by the time I get into my cell at night I'm so tired I don't want to do a thing but sleep. No, I haven't had what you would call a physical exam yet but who know's - I may have one someday. My leg doesn't bother me except in damp or cold weather - which has been everyday lately - I'm not feeling so bad tho - considering everything.

Don't feel that way about the food, honey. Why - it's not so bad. On Sundays we have a pretty good dinner - no fooling. Anyway what's food - not a thing in my young life. And as you say - It wont always be like this and God is good - I'll never make a good Christian I guess, but anyway I do believe in God and that's a little bit in my favor - don't you think so?

Gee, Mummy, it made me feel good to know that you saved those pieces of furniture I liked so well. I had my own furniture twice - but you know - I never could find any pieces I liked as well as those. It seems strange to think of me in my own house, with my own furniture and everything, doesn't it? I had one house that I was just wild about and I furnished it real cute. When I was buying my things I wished you could have been with me to help me. I had six rooms, two bedrooms, a sun parlor, living room, dining room, a great big kitchen and also a little tiny dinette - it was as cute as it could be. I think about it an awful lot. I wonder if I'll ever have enything like it again. Maybe not - but then I've been just as happy if not happier, when I've been so broke I've had to pawn jewelery so as to have enough to live on. Remember how we had to pinch to make things last 'till the next pay day. I really learned something from that - Alvin used to tell me I could do more on less than any one he ever saw - except maybe his mother. I always told him he ought to mest you then 'cause you sure know how to make one dollar do the work of ten. I used to try to be so careful when we :: were short - many a time I've done our own washing and ironing and if

you ever saw the size of it you would say that it was a big enough Job for anyone. I always did most of my housework too, except just before Raymond came I had a girl to cook and clean and another one for my laundry. I just hated to have someone else around getting into my things but Alvin insisted. He said he didn't want me over-doing or hurting myself at such a time and I don't care what anyone says to the contrary I believe every woman likes to be babied. I know I do in fact I love it.

I had a letter from Mugs this month and Babe wrote a few 3 lines it it, too, also a letter from Mr. & Mrs. Karpis but Bud hasn't written yet tho! I expect one from him most any day. He is pretty. good about things like that. He forgets once in awhile but I have bawled him out a little the next time I write to him and he's so sweet the about it that I just can't be mad at him. Whenever he writes he says he wishes you would hurry and move to Chicago - he want's to see you so he wishes you would hurry and move to onloans - I will, too, be-badly. He will sure be tickled when you get there. I will, too, because that means you will be near enough so that you can come and see me pretty often and I do so want to see you. Do you know it's been over two years since I last saw you? That's quite a long time but I can see you just as plain now as the day I last saw you, Remember you welked downstairs and out in front with Babe and me and kissed me goodbye. I looked back when I got to the corner and you were still there. I've looked back when I got to the corner and you were still there. I ve carried that pictute of you with me everywhere I've gone since then. I often wanted to see you again but I just couldn't - you understand, don't you mumsy? Well, darling, as three sheets are all I'm allowed to write I'll have to say goodbye. Loads of love from your baby -Dolores. Write real soon.

P. S. Who are you living with in Chicago, anyway, & what kind of a place are you in? That's not such a swell address from what I know of Chicago. Write and tell me all about it.

Various reports of gold occurrences in the Lower Peninsula have reached his office during the past ten years, but these reports have never been substantiated and geographical conditions in the Peninsula are such that the Geographical Survey Division does not look for the discovery of commercial deposits; that there certainly have been no developments which would merit the development of a town as a result thereof.

In addition to the letter of reference from the Cleveland office which referred to the Bureau letter dated September 21, 1935, a telephone call was received on the evening of September 25, 1935, from Special Agent in Charge Andersen of the St. Paul Bureau Office, advising that on the afternoon of September 23, 1935, a complaint had been filed before United States Commissioner Howard Abbott at Minneapolis, Minnesota, charging Cassius McDonald with conspiracy to violate the act of June 22, 1932, in that he had on September 10, 1934, exchanged \$72,000 of rensom money; that Subject Mc Donald's apprehension was desired and his bond had been suggested in the amount of \$100,000 returnable at Minneapolis, Minnesota, forthwith.

On the evening of September 25, 1935, Special Agent L. C. Rumsey end the writer located Subject McDonald at his residence, 500 Trombley Road, Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan. He accompanied Agents to the Detroit Bureau office. He was placed under arrest by Deputy United States Marshal Pierce and was arraigned before United States Commissioner Frank Q. Quinn, based upon a fugitive complaint which had been filed on September 26, 1935, by Assistant United States Attorney William G. Comb. Subject McDonald was represented by his attorneys, Edward N. Barnard and former Judge Charles Bartlett, Subject's preliminary United States Commissioner's hearing set for 2 P.M. October 8, 1935, and his bond was set by Commissioner Quinnat \$100,000, in default of which Subject Mc-Donald was remanded to the Wayne County Jail.

The Bureau and St. Paul offices were notified by teletype of the action taken at the arraignment, fixing bond, and setting of date of McDonald's preliminary hearing.

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

I also advised the Oklahoma City office that local papers reflected that the bodies would be interred in a small cemetery near Miami, Oklahoma, during the afternoon of Saturday, September 28, 1935.

By telegram during the morning of September 28th I informed the Oklahoma City office that it appeared that all arrangements were in charge of an undertaker by the name of Woodward from Joplin, Missouri.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to Bureau letters dated September 4 and 19, 1935 (62-28539) directing the Jacksonville Office to dispose of the Buick Coupe, Motor Number 2884746. This car is the one recovered in the possession of Fred Barker at Oklawaha, Florida, January 16, 1935, at which time he was killed.

Special Agent R. B. Donaldson has conferred with Sheriff S. C. M. Thomas, at Ocala, Florida, and Circuit Court Judge L. E. Futch, who is also judge of Probate Court at the same place.

Sheriff Thomas states that he is not interested in assuming custody of this automobile, and will have nothing to do with it; first, because it was not turned over to him at the time it was located and taken by the Bureau, which he states was the proper time it should have been given into his custody; and, secondly, because of the fact that the estate of the Barkers has now been settled as far as court officials of Marion County, Florida, are concerned.

Judge L. E. Futch stated that he would not assume custody of the car or have anything to do with it for the reason that the estate is settled as far as his court is concerned and all the assets have been turned over to the duly qualified administrators.

The administrators for the estate are George Barker and Frank Dixon. Their address is listed as c/o Probate Court, Joplin, Missouri. These administrators appeared at Ocala, Florida, and by due process of law assumed custody of the estate, as also the bodies of Fred and Kate Barker. All local bills were paid, and the bodies were called for by a funeral coach of the Woodward Parlors, of Joplin, Missouri, and left Ocala on the morning of September 25, 1935, presumably for Joplin, Missouri; and the administrators at the same time assumed custody of all money, jewelry, clothing and other

personal property which was then under custody and control of the Probate Court for Marion County, Florida and being held by the Commercial Bank & Trust Company of Ocala, curator appointed by the Court.

I must advise the Bureau, therefore, that it is useless to attempt further negotiations with the Marion County, Florida, Court officials for disposition of this automobile.

It is my suggestion that the St. Louis Office might properly take the matter up with the administrators of the estates at Joplin, Missouri, with a view of perfecting arrangements whereby said administrators will accept delivery and custody of this automobile.

It should be stated, however, for the benefit of the St. Louis Office, that this Buick coupe is not in running condition by reason of a burned out bearing, and the estimated cost of repairing same so that it could operate under its own power is at least \$100.00.

The car is presently in storage in Bureau rented space at Jacksonville, Florida.



On the morning of September 30, 1935, an attempt was made to rob the University State Bank, 1345 East 55th Street, Chicago, Illinois. On the same day Chicago newspapers carried stories to the effect that Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell and Henry J. "Midget" Fernekes had been identified as participants in the attempted robbery.

Interview by Special Agent S. K. McKee with R. O. Byerrum, Vice President of the Bank, revealed that the attempted robbery took place at about 9:45 a.m., September 30, 1935, and was frustrated through use of Federal Cas Apparatus with which his bank is equipped. According to Mr. Byerrum none of the bank employees, with the exception of Officer William Fleming, saw the robbers, the reason being that they only came into the building for a distance of possibly ten feet at which time they encountered Officer Fleming and at which time the gas apparatus was set off and some shooting occurred. Several persons were wounded, but none of them fatally. Mr. Byerrum furnished the names of Mrs. E. W. Keefrey, 1345 East 55th Street, H. J. Thieret, 810 Hyde Park Boulevard and Officer William Fleming, presently a patient at the Illinois Central Hospital, as persons who should

be able to identify photographs of participants in the attempted robbery. The University State Bank is not a member bank of the Federal Reserve System.

Interviews were had with Mrs. E. W. Keefrey, 1545 East 55th Street, Sol/Levenson, 6147 Eberhart Street, H. J. Thieret, 810 Hyde Park Boulevard and Louis Ja Patkus, 810 Hyde Park Boulevard. Following the attempted robbery Mrs. Keefrey saw one of the participants in front of her drug store which is located directly acorss the street from the bank. Sol Levenson was standing on the corner of 55th Street and Kenwood Avenue, which is one half block distant from the bank and saw seven different men who were using two different automobiles. Thieret had been driven to the bank by Patkus to cash a check and at the time of the attempted robbery was inside the bank. He saw only one man, this man being in the bank. Patkus informed that he saw three different automobiles, two of which were Ford four-door sedans, and that each car had several men in it. He stated that all of the men he saw were wearing khaki colored jumpers buttoned closely around their necks, gogles and cloths over the lower portions of their faces. All of the above persons with the exception of Levenson state the various men they saw were carrying long barrelled revolvers. Levenson informed that he saw several men with Thompson sub-machine guns.

All of the photographs appearing in the bank robbery album as maintained in this Office were displayed to the above persons with the result that Levenson positively identified the photograph of McCarllus Harper, Indiana State Prison No. 14492, as being one of the participants and Thieret hesitated over the picture of Harper, stating that his face is the same type of face as the man he saw. Levenson also picked out the photograph of Alvin Karpis and stated it was the type of face of one of the men he saw. When asked for a detailed description of this individual he described him as being five feet, eight inches in height; age, about 35 years; weight, about 140 pounds; hair, dark; build, thin; \_scars, one inch cut scar over right eye.

After the above witnesses had carefully examined all of the pictures appearing in the bank robbery album with the result as noted above, the photographs of Karpis, Campbell and Fernekes were particularly called to their attention, but none of them could make any further statement.

What I feared most was that Mr. Connelley might engage himself in the regular supervision of the Cincinnati Office, to the detriment of his work on the special cases with to which he is assigned. I made it plain to Mr. Connelley that these special cases are his specific responsibility, and that the routine work of the Cincinnati Office should be handled by the #1 man.

I told Mr. Connelley that he could travel to any section of the country on any special lead in these cases which seemed to be important, and that, as a matter of fact, if I were he I would personally supervise in any section of the country, other than Chicago, the development of any seemingly important lead.

I advised Mr. Connelley that it was your desire that he devote all of his time and attention to these special cases, in order that they might be successfully consummated at the earliest practicable date.



D Mr. Quinn OCT 3 1935 FILE Special Agent in Charge Jones telephoned me from the San Antonio Office with reference to Bureau letter which he had just received instructing that Special Agents Winstead and Davis proceed to Guadalapia, Mexico, for the purpose of following out a lead in the above case that possibly DocjMoran is in that place. Mr. Jones said that there is no such place as Guadalapia, Mexico; that, however, there are two towns in Mexico similar in name to this one, these being Guadalupe, about 25 miles from Mexico City, and Guadalajaria, about 200 miles from Mexico City. The former of these two places is only a small village, while the latter is about the fourth largest city in Mexico with a population of about 200,000. Mr. Jones said that the question is which of these two places is referred to by the informant. I told Mr. Jones I believed the informant referred to the place which is nearer Mexico City, this being Guadalupe. Mr. Jones said that he is familiar with this place, having been there on many occasions; that the place is a small village and there is hardly a place for an American to live there, especially one who does not speak Spanish. However, Mr. Jones said that Guadalajaria is more or less of a resort town, being near a beautiful lake, and it is entirely possible for Moran to be in this place, and to escape detection there. In the former town, Mr. Jones said that an American would stand out "like a red flag". In view of this, I told Mr. Jones to hold this matter in abeyance until the Bureau has had a chance to check up on the same with the informant. I explained that the informant got the information second-hand, and it is entirely possible for him to have gotten misinformation. Mr. Jones said that one reason why he would like to hold this matter in abeyance for the present at least is the fact that the San Antonio Office has just broken a case down there involving the theft of quite a large quantity of gasoline from Brooks Field down there. Agent Davis is working on this case, and is tied up on the same. Mr. Jones said they have arrested some people on this case, and expect to arrest some more in the near fiture.

I pointed out to Mr. Jones that when the Agents of his office do cover this investigation, it was the opinion of the Bureau that they should spend at least a day or so in Mexico City to see if any information can be obtained relative to Thomas H. Robinson, Jr. Mr. Jones concurred in this and said that inquiries would also be conducted relative to fugitive George Wilbur Hawkins and to fugitive Sid Norwood.

Mr. Jones said that if Doc Moran is in one of these two cities, there was not any doubt in his mind but that he would be arrested by the Agents. In this connection, he said that what he would be particularly concerned about is how to get Moran out of Mexico after he is arrested. He said that in looking the file over, it appears that Moran is under indictment for conspiracy to violate the Kidnaping Statute, and in this connection, Mr. Jones does not believe that such an offense would serve as a sufficient basis for extradition, since he does not believe Mexico even has a kidnaping law. He further said that it would not do any good to get a waiver of removal for the reason that it would be of no value in a foreign country. He suggested, however, that it might be possible to muse a little diplomacy and get the Mexican Government to deport this man, as an undesirable alien entering the country illegally. I told him we might do this, or if necessary, we could file charges of actual kidnaping against him.


I told Mr. Jones, however, that the Bureau would bear this in mind, and would give further consideration to the same when and if Doc Moran is taken into custody in Mexico.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Attorney Joseph O. Ewing, Atlanta, admitted representing William Ex Meade on several occasions but claims he has not seen or heard from him since about 1930 or 1931. Attorney Ewing was informed that Meade was being sought by this Bureau in connection with instant case and was likewise informed of the fact that Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell were under Federal indictment and were fugitives from Justice. An Identification Order on each of the above mentioned subjects was furnished to Attorney Ewing on this date.

Report of Special Agent P. M. Plunkett, Boston, August 15, 1935.

DETAILS:

AT ATLANTA, GEORGIA.

On September 28, 1935, Agent accompanied by Special Agent Robert C. Hendon interviewed Attorney Joseph O. Ewing at his office in the Peters Building, Atlanta, Georgia, and he stated that he had never actually represented William E. Meade in the court room, but that he had been approached by Meade and had made arrangements for Meade so that he could be released on bond pending trial. Attorney Ewing stated that to the best of his knowledge it was approximately in the year 1923 when Meade and his wife were living in Atlanta, Georgia; that both were arrested by the Police Department of this City on a charge of Disorderly Sonduct and Shop Lifting. At the time Meade approached Attorney Ewing and through him it was arranged that Meade and his wife be released on a

For this reason Attorney Ewing stated he never had an opportunity to represent him in any court was trial on this occasion. He further stated that sometime later, he believes it was in about, 1930 or 1931 he had met William E. Meade in Chicago, Illinois, at which time Meade informed him that he had just skipped out on a bond of \$10,000.00, returnable in Jacksonville, Florida on a con game charge. Ewing stated that he was not familiar with all the facts of the case at the present time but the purpose for which he was approached by Meade was that Meade wished him to go to Jacksonville, Florida, and see whether or not he could get a suspended sentence placed against him of the same nature as was placed against his confederate in this particular charge. Ewing stated that as he recalled, an attorney by the name of Myerson of Jacksonville, Florida, and some ex-city Judge in that city had represented Meade in the case and that after Meade had been placed under the \$10,000.00 bond, Meade had skipped out. Subsequent to his departure from Jacksonville, Meade's confederate who was indicted for the same offense was brought to trial and received a suspended sentence. Ewing, according to the request of Meade, approached the Judge of the Federal Court in Florida, whose name he believed to be Judge Stromm, and asked whether or not he could get a suspended sentence for Meade. However, the Judge declined this primarily due to the fact that Meade had forfeited his bond. Attorney Ewing informed Agent that he believed the \$10,000.00 had been paid in by the parties who had signed the bond for Meade but that he was not positive of this fact.

Attorney Ewing denied knowing any definite information whatsoever relative to the present whereabouts of William E. Meade and stated that he had neither seen nor heard from hin since the last time he was contacted by him in Chicago. However, he stated that he believed Postal Inspector Graham, whom he had seen very recently, is in receipt of more information concerning this man. He stated that he had informed Graham that he had heard Meade was at the present time living in Chicago, Illinois, some place on Sheridan Road.

At the same time Agents questioned Attorney Ewing relative to William E. Meade, he was informed by them that Meade was being sought by the Federal Government and it was requested of him that he immediately notify the Bureau in the event he should receive any information as to his whereabouts. He was likewise informed in very definite terms that Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell had been indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in St. Paul for the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer of St. Paul, and that both of these parties were at the present time fugitives from Justice. In addition, a copy of Identification Order # 1218 and Identification Order # 1236 were furnished to him and it was requested that he keep these so that he would notify the Bureau if either of the subjects attempted to contact him in the future. It is noted here that this information relative to Karpis and Campbell was given to Attorney Ewing due to the fact that he has the reputation of handling the criminal cases for fugitives so that in the future he may not be able to avail himself of the defense that he had no knowledge concerning the fact that these two men were under indictment and were being sought as fugitives from Justice.

### UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

The Jacksonville Office will attempt to ascertain the full name and location of Attorney Myerson who is mentioned in the body of this report as having represented William E. Meade in Jacksonville, Florida, and will question him as well as any others that it may be ascertained represented him in that case, relative to any recent information they may have as to the whereabouts of William E. Meade.

# TRIAL OF ADAMS AS KARPIS AID HELD UNLIKELY

Government Case Against
Miami Man Declared
Too Weak

By FRANK A. RENNEDY
WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—The department of justice is reluctant to proceed against Joe Adams of Miami, who was indicted encharges of harboring Alvin Karpis last spring.

This conviction was expressed here today by attorneys familia: with the case, but who declined the use of their names. The Dall: News informants were not connect.

According to the legal view, the governmen realizes its case in weak and is unprepared to go too trial at the fall term of federal court in Miami. It was indicated a continuance will be asked, or the case will be nolle prossed outright.

Weakness of the government's case was based on the proposition that federal prosecutors must prove conclusively that Adams was aware of the gangster chieftain's identity and possessed actual knowledge that Karpis was a fugitive from federal justice. It was stressed that no federal agent had placed Adams on knowledge that Karpis was in Miami, and that no evidence was at hand showing the gangster to have been secretive in his movements before his flight from Miami.

The Daily News informants also expressed the view the government is embarrassed with the manner in which the Adams indictments were drawn. They pointed out that the charges were not prepared under the recent statutes expressly prepared to break up racketeering, but under a law 100 years old, originally intended to restrict the importation of slaves. It was said successful prosecutions under this statute have been extremely rare. Every element of circumstantial evidence must be proven conclusively.



From other sources it was learned several investigators of the justice department here reported separately upon the Adams case and each expressed the opinion that insufficient evidence existed.

Dear Sir:

During the afternoon of September 50, 1935, Special Agent A. Paul Kitchin, working in the vicinity of Tulsa, called me by tele-phone and stated that Earl Gardner, Lieutenant of the Tulsa Police Department, came to him with a story, the substance of which is as follows:

Gardner has been conducting an investigation into some crimes that have been committed in Oklahoma. He interviewed one Jim Lawson, an inmate of the Kansas Penitentiary, at this time, and Lawson made a statement to the effect that he, Lawson, one Nelson Brooks, now serving a 90 day jail term at Tulsa; Cary Strickland, a person by the name of Carpenter, Glen Roy Wright, now in the Oklahoma Penitentiary, and Harry Campbell, about three years ago robbed a jewelry store in Sedan, Kansas, and committed about three other store robberies in that vicinity the same night, kidnaping and tying up the City Marshal, who since has died.

Gardner also related to Mr. Kitchin that in January, 1933, according to statements made by Lawson, this same crowd robbed the Chevrolet Motor Company at Viuskogee, Oklahoma, of approximately \$200.00.

Gardner proposes to get the jail sentence of Nelson Brooks commuted in Tulsa and by trickery entice him to go to Kansas with him where he will have charges filed against Brooks, as extradition is impossible due to the fact that the identifying witness is dead, and after the charges are filed against Brooks he will "put the heat" on Brooks and he feels confident he will be able to obtain some information as to the whereabouts of Karpis and Campbell and of other crimes.

Gardner told Mr. Kitchin that he desires an agent accompany him on this trip which will require approximately four or five days and that he believes we would be interested in view of the likelihood of obtaining information as to Karpis and Campbell.

I informed Agent Kitchin that I viewed, with some suspicion, the proposition put to him by Gardner, but that I would take it up with the Bureau officials and inform him of the Bureau's decision. I therefore called Mr. Tamm, who stated that the Bureau would not authorize an agent to accompany Gardner on such a trip but that if Gardner or any of the persons named by him furnished the Bureau information concerning Karpis and Campbell they would be adequately compensated.

I very promptly contacted Mr. Kitchin and told him to inform Mr. Gardner accordingly.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Bobby Kerrigan, unknown at Hutchinson, Kansas. Dorris Kerrigan of Omaha, Nebraska, taken into custody on 7-22-34, at Hutchinson, Kansas, but not fingerprinted or photographed before being released, answers description of Bobby Kerrigan.

Report of Special Agent F. J. Blake, Dallas, Texas, dated 9-3-35

Agent contacted Chief of Police Louis D. White and Captain of Police Sloan, at Hutchinson, Kansas, and a complete search of all their criminal records was searched for a person by the name of Bobby Kerrigan, but with negative results. A complete search of the names of all known prostitutes and persons who had been known to frequent such places was made. The city directory was searched for the past five years as was the telephone directory, likewise without results. Neither of these men could recall the names of any women who corresponded with that of Bobby Kerrigan.

It is to be noted that Chief of Police White is personally well acquainted with Subject Karpis, inasmuch as he was an employee of the Kansas State Industrial Reformatory during the time that Karpis was serving time at that institution. He stated that he had frequent contact with him and that it was very likely that Karpis had picked up with some girl that he had become acquainted with during his stay around Eutchinson. Chief White further advised that he was attempting to obtain an informant through some of the inmates that had served with Karpis, in order to learn his present whereabouts. He likewise stated that he expected to contact a man, who was at the present time in Arkansas,

This individual had stayed at the Hutchinson County Jail until she received money from her family in Omaha, Nebraska. No charge was placed against her and she was not fingerprinted nor photographed.



Officer Alvin Stuckey, Hutchinson Police Department, advised Agent that he had picked up Dorris Kerrigan on the above mentioned date when she was abandoned without funds by a boy friend of hers whose name she could not recall: that he had taken her to the County Jail and that she had phoned from there for money, and had been allowed to remain there until she received this money. He stated that she was a rather pretty girl but that she impressed him as being a girl who would pick up with anyone who would furnish her with a livelihood. No further informatic was obtainable from this officer.

Agent contacted Ben L. Jones at the Santa Fe Railroad Station, where he is employed as a Special Agent of that railroad, he having been the former Captain of Detectives at Hutchinson, and the source of much valuable information, and was advised that he did not know of any person by the name of Bobby Kerrigan, but that would make a diligent effort to ascertain whether or not she had ever lived in that city under that name and would immediately notify the Kansas City Bureau office of any information which he might obtain.

Reference is made to your letter of the 27th instant requesting certain evidence and data in connection with the prosecution of this case at St. Paul, Minnesota.

The Jacksonville office does not have custody or possession of the pocketbook belonging to Kate Barker in which the sum of \$10,000.00 was found at Oklawaha, Florida. This pocketbook, together with other personal effects of the Barkers found at Oklawaha, Florida, was on March 7, 1935, in accordance with Eureau instructions, forwarded to the Judge of Probate, L. E. Futch, at Ocala, Florida. This preperty, we have learned, has been turned over to administrators for the estate of the Barkers, who carried same presumably to Joplin, Missouri, about September 24, 1935, George Barker is administrator for this estate, which is carried in the probate sourt at Joplin, Missouri.

The original Western-Union telegram dated December 29, 1934, addressed to T. C. Blackburn, e/o Carson Bradford, Oklawaha, Florida, and signed "Cosh", is believed to be presently in custody and control of the Clerk of the United States Court at Miemi, Florida, it having been secured by a court order. Agent B. F. Fitzsimons at Miemi is being requested to inquire into this and to determine whether or not, under the circumstances, the Clerk at Miemi will forward same to St. Paul. You will be advised.

Agent Fitzsimons is also being instructed to immediately check up to ascertain the necessary witnesses to be subpossed from the Pan American Airways in Miami to produce passenger records and other data pertaining to trips of Cassius McDoneld, William J. Harrison and Alvin Karpis between Miami and Cuba.

I am enclosing herewith all of the registration cards which were obtained from the El Comodoro Hotel showing registrations of these subjects. You will note that a number of these cards have been forwarded to the Bureau for handwriting comparisons in the Technical Laboratory and attached to these are proper identifying labels placed thereon in the Laboratory, which should not be removed.

Reference is made to your letter of September 14, 1935, addressed to Mr. J. K. Kenneson, 3419 - 17th Avenue, South, Seattle, Washington, in the above-entitled case, your file number 7-576.

Please be advised that Special Agent W. K. Bowling has conducted investigation at 3419 - 17th Avenue, South, Seattle, Washington; but was unable to locate Mr. Kenneson. Agent Bowling, however, did locate Mrs. A. M. Wingate, a woman possibly 70 years of age, who upon interview advised that her grandson, J. K. Kenneson, who resides at 707 or 407 South Queen Street, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and is 18 years of age, came to Seattle about two weeks ago. Kenneson told Mrs. Wingate that he had come from the East with a caravan of new cars driven West, and also told her that he was now employed by the Government as a "G" man. Kenneson remained with Mrs. Wingate until Monday, September 23, 1935, when he disappeared, and she has not heard from him since. Mrs. Wingate believes that Kenneson has returned to his home in Penne sylvania; as when he appeared in Seattle a couple of weeks ago, he brought no clothes with him, which she thought very strange. She thought, however, that he was just a boy full of wild ideas, and paid little attention to what he had to say.

Mrs. Wingate further advised Agent Bowling that J. K. Kenneson's father is one, Charles Kenneson, a jeweler presently employed by the A. W. Gholson jewelry company at Henderson, North Carolina, and that her daughter, the mother of J. K. Kenneson, was at the family home, 707 or 407 South Queen Street, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. Agent Bowling was unable to develop information that J. K. Kenneson had represented himself as a federal officer or "G" man to anyone other than his

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

Reference is had to teletype messages from the Fortland office on Cotober 1 and 2, 1930, in the above entitled case.

In this connection, attention is invited to my confidential letter to the Eureau under date of September 28, 1935, entitled Alvin Karpis, w.a. I. G. 1218, Fugitive; Dr. Joseph P. Moran, w.a. fugitive, I.O. 1252, Edward George Dremer, Victim, Kidnaping, concerning the situation in Mexico relative to the location of fugitives in connection with the Karpis and Dainard cases.

In order that the offices making requests and the Bureau may fully understand the situation relative to possibilities of successful checks being made of any American entering Mexico from the United States, the following facts are submitted:

OCT 21 1935 A. The Mexican government has for the past wear instituted a compaign to obtain all of the tourist business possible. They have recently completed ICE automobile highways in the Republic and taking their cue from Cuba they are offering every inducement for tourist travel. At the present time on Americanic may obtain a tourist card permitting him to enter Maxico through any of the border ports and remain in the Republic as long as six months, enturing, of course as a touriet. All this card bears is his nume, home address, business or occupation, and a very brief physical description. No photograph is required. These cards may be obtained from any Maxican Consulate in the United States, at the time the tourist specifies what port of entry be intende entering the Republic. The American Imagration or Customs authorities have nothing whatever to do with Americans traveling to Mexico. They are not even questioned and there is no record whatever made at the border of their departure. If the tourist is travoling by train he can enter Mexico in the San Antonio District at Eagle Pass, Laredo, or Brownsville. At the time of entry the train is boarded on the Kexican side by Kexican Imaigration and Customs authorities. The tourist is required to remain on the train, his tourist eard is examined, and a brief record is made by the Mexican Insignation authorities from this eard. It is then stamped with a rubber stamp by the Imaigration authorities showing the tourist as "admitted." The eard is then returned to the traveler.

In the case of train entries at Eagle Pass and Brownsville, Texas, a

record is kept by the Mexican Immigration authorities on the Mexican side.

This data consists of the data that was on the tourist eard. This is supposed to be filed alphabetically, however, from past experience in shooking it was found that the Mexican authorities are sometimes many weeks behind in filing these cards and they are filed by dates instead of by individual names.

In the case of travel by train through the port of Laredo, Texas, the Mexican Immigration authorities board the train at Laredo and in order not to delay the train conduct their inspection work between Musvo Laredo, Mexico, and Monterrey, Mexico. Monterrey is the capitol of the State of Musvo Leon and is located 120 miles below the border.

The records taken from the eards of tourists entering through the port of Laredo by train are filed in the office of the Emmigration Service at Monterrey, Mexico. It is conservatively estimated that 90% of the traval to the interior of Mexico, both by train and automobile, is through the port of Laredo, Texas, consequently, in order to check the tourist cards covering traval through that port it will be necessary to make this check at Monterrey, Mexico. As before stated, those records are supposed to be filed alphabetically at Monterrey.

In entering Mexico by automobile, in addition to obtaining a tourist eard the traveler must bond his automobile at the Bonding Office on the Mexican side of the border. The fee varies according to the model and value of the ear and the length of time the tourist intends to remain in Mexico.

If, for instance, the tourist indicates a period of 30 days the car must be checked back into the United States through the same port of entry within the 30 day period and the bond cancelled. In case of default the bond is forfeited to the Essican government and it is up to the Bonding Company to locate the ear in Mexica and if located it is subject to seizure by the Mexican government as amugaled merchandise.

It is not a difficult problem to check travel into Mexico by automobile as the bonding records are kept fairly accurate.

In the matter of checking us to whether or not Dr. Jos. Poweran, fugitive, I. O. 1832, mentioned in my letter of reference, and filliam Lainerd, and his supposed to be companion Eduard liss, entered Mexico, and without any definite information as to what alieses they may have used, or if they traveled by automobile and a description of the car used, the only check possible would be to check the known elieses of these man against the tourist card and automobile bonding records.

It is to be realized that this is a difficult proposition and will take the time of at least four agents for two or three days with little chance of any information worth while of being developed.

Hundreds of Identification Orders on Dainard and Moran have been placed in the hands of the American Immigration and Customs authorities on the American side and I have personally seen that every border patrolman of these two services has been personally furnished with copies of these Identification Orders.

The only air travel from the San Antonio District to Mexico and South American countries is via the Pan American Air Ways from Brownsville, Texas. It will not be a difficult matter to check this mode of travel through that port. Four Agents are at the present time assigned and are actively making the check cutlined harein at the ports of Del Rio, Eagle Pass, Laredo, and Brownsville, Texas, covering train, automobile, and air plane travel.

To show what we are up against in making this check it is conservatively estimated that the American tourist travel into Mexico through the port of Laredo, Texas, alone during the months of June and July was over 20,000. This travel of course was due to the Motary International and Lione International conventions held in Mexico City during those months.

Under the laws of Mexico on American, or any other foreigner, whe establishes a domicile in Mexico must register with the "Presidente Municipal" or "Kayor" of the district in which he resides and the Mexican authorities have the right to question any foreigner and if he can not show a tourist card indicating that he is in Mexico as a tourist for a temporary period he must then depart from the country or register as a foreigner who has established a residence in that country. The foreigners who establish a residence must file with the Presidente Eunicipal a card bearing their photograph, physical description, and fingerprints. This record is in triplicate. One copy is maintained in the office of the Presidente Municipal, one copy is sent to the capitol of the State, and one copy is sent to Mexico City. This would appear to be a simple record to check up foreigners who have established a domicile in Kexico, however, from actual experience, it has developed that the central office of the Imaigration Service in Mexico City has not as yet established a filing system to properly record these records and it is a very difficult proposition to ascertain if any certain individual has registered as a domiciled foreigner in the Republic. Of course, if it is known in what municipality the individual resided it is quite possible that the records of the Presidente Eunicipal in that district are in such shape that an accurate check could be made.

In other words, it appears that the Central Government in Mexico City is depending upon the different heads of the municipalities to keep this record and to enforce the provisions of the law pertaining thereto.

Any foreigner found in Mexico without a tourist permit eard or a domiciled foreigner's registration eard is subject to deportation by the Mexican lumigration authorities or if found with a tourist permit eard that has been ob-

teined through fraud, that is, by giving an assumed name, or a domiciled foreigner's registration eard that has been obtained through fraud in the same menmer that individual is also subject to deportation under the Maxisan Issuigration laws.

If the offense for which Dr. Moran and Dainard are indicted in the United States comes within the treaty provisions between the United States and Mexico. I do not think any great difficulty would be experienced in bringing about their extradition if they are located and apprehended in Mexico. If the offense does not come within the treaty and they are located in Mexico and have in their possession a tourist or foreigner's registration card that has been obtained under an assumed name, it is believed that arrangements could be made for their deportation by the Mexican Immigration authorities.

It is the humble judgment of the writer that if it is suspected that either Moran, Dainard, or any other notorious fugitive is thought to be in any certain section of Maxico, it would not be advisable for Special Agents of the Bureau to themselves conduct an injury in that section regarding the individual sought.

The writer has a standing arrangement with "exicum officials that would enable agents of this Bureau to at any time proceed to Mexico and conduct any investigation desired, however, the local situation is always such that there could be no assurance that the individuals sought would not be tipped off by local Mexican officials or some other person contacted if it became known that an American officer, and especially an agent from this Bureau, was making inquiry concerning the particular individual.

It is believed that agents of this Eureau could go to Mexico and supervise such an investigation, however, the services of some trusted Mexican Informants should be utilized, under suitable pretext, to make the sctual inquiries looking to the location of the particular individual sought. An agent could of course visit the locality, under cover, using some suitable pretext, and identify the individual. After he is located and when such identification is thought to be positive, I am sure that arrangements could be made to cause the person's temporary detention and his fingerprints taken in order to establish positive identification. Then this is done than either extractition proceedings could be instituted or the proper cooperation could be obtained from the lexican lumigration authorities to handle the individual as being in Mexico in violation of the Immigration Laws of that country.

If an agent should locate a wanted fugitive is kexico and obtain a signed waiver from the fugitive it would be a dangerous proceeding to attempt to travel across the keyublic of Mexico to the United States with the fugitive and without the knowledge or consent of the kexican Government. It might not only bring about diplometic representations to the United States from Mexico but there would be the possibility of the actual arrest of the agent and in a case of that kind it would possibly prevent any further sperations in Mexico

Attention is respectfully invited to your communication of July 16th last; advising concerning an inquiry being conducted by the New York City Office as to the possible source of machine guns and other types of weapons which have been rebuilt or have number removed, duplicated, and the like, and making inquiry concerning a .351 calibre Winchester Rifle, expertly converted into an Automatic Rifle, found in a raid conducted at Warwick, Rhode Island several months ago, by Post Office Inspectors, resulting in the capture of Carl Rettich, John McGlone, Charles Harrigan, Thomas Dugan, Herbert Hornstein, and Joseph Fisher, in connection with a mail robbery of \$129,000, which occurred at Fall River, Massachusetts.

Transmitted herewith will be found copies of report of C. J. Van Amburgh of the Bureau of Ballitics, Massachusetts State Police, dated May 6, 1935, reporting concerning Winchester Automatic Rifle, 22 calibre, equipped with a silencer, and the .351 calibre Rifle in question, together with an inventory of all of the firearms that were seized by the Post Office Inspectors at Warwick, Rhode Island. A copy of this report is also being transmitted to New York City Office together with a copy of this letter.

Through the courtesy of Mr. John J. Breslin, Post Office. Inspector in Charge, Boston, Massachusetts, and the permission of Honorable Francis J. W. Ford, United States Attorney at Boston, the writer has obtained a loan of these two rifles and they are being shipped today to the Bureau, under Government Bill-of-Lading J-69515, by Railway Express.

A copy of this communication is enclosed in the box containing the Rifles, in order that the Laboratory may identify them upon their greceipt.

Attached to these Rifles will be found a tag, detailing the finding of the firearm, and it is requested that these tags be retained and properly attached when the guns are returned.



Referring to your confidential letter received last; evening and concerning which I talked to Mr. Tamm over the telephone this morning, I think it advisable to give you some details concerning the situation

Your letter stated that Dr. Moran was thought to be at Guadalapaia, Mexico, a small town in the mountains near Mexico City. There is no such town in Mexico. There is a small village named Guadalupe about twenty-five miles from Mexico City, however, it would be most improbable that an American, would be in this village as there is no hotel, or a place where an American could stay. In fact all there is to the village is the Church of Guadalupe and the houses of native Indians who reside there.

I am constrained to believe that your letter refers to Guadalajara, the fourth largest city in Mexico, which is located some three hundred miles northwest of Mexico City.

As I mentioned to Mr. Temm, I believe it should be immediately determined whether or not the offense for which Dr. Moran is indicted comes within the Extradition Treaty with Mexico. If it does not, then confidential arrangement's will have to be made to have Moran deported from Mexico by the Immigration Service as an undesirable foreigner. The fact that, if located, Moran signs a waiver would not be sufficient to remove him across and out of the Republic of Mexico. Any Agent or Agents who attempted to do this would, no doubt, get in trouble with certain Mexican officials and result in the subject being released and destroy any chance of obtaining his deportation. If the offense is extraditable, I believe the matter can be successfully and expeditiously handled. If it is not, it will necessitate some diplomatic engineering to bring shout his deportation under the Mexican Immigration Laws. RECORDED & INDEXED

If the latter course is necessary the State Repartment Embassy in Mexico will probably have to be kept out of the

is my understanding that it is the policy of the State Department that they will not ask for the deportation of an American citizen from any foreign country. If it is determined that Moran is at Guadalajara, it is my judgment that a preliminary confidential investigation should be conducted by Agents without taking into their confidence over one or two certain high Mexican officials. It would be very dangerous to enlist the aid of any local officer in Guadalajara, in fact there are very few in Mexico at the present time who can be absolutely trusted in a matter of this kind.

If it is definitely determined that Moran is in Guadalajara, and after being personally observed by Agents, they are confident of his identity, I believe that arrangements could be made through Francisco P. Jimenez, Director of Immigration, Mexico City, to have him picked up by Immigration authorities, and if he does not possess a card showing him registered as a domiciled American in Mexico, or does not possess proper credentials showing his admission to Mexico (which, of course, he will not have if he entered under an assumed name), it is believed that an order for his deportation can be obtained and arrangements made that Agents of this Bureau can be present at the port through which he is deported and take him into custody. Great care must be taken in conducting the investigation to locate this man as there are so many chances of his being advised that inquiries are being made concerning him by Americans.

There will be no difficulty whatever in obtaining proper permission for Agents of this Bureau to visit Mexico City, Guadalajara, or any other point, in an attempt to locate and identify Moran. Of course, it should be taken into consideration that any inquiries to be made concerning this man should possibly be made by a Mexican. The situation is such in Mexico that if a strenge American drops into any town and makes any inquiry concerning any American domiciled in that town the word quickly spreads. It is my judgment that this matter is of sufficient importance that the services of a confidential Mexican informant should be utilized, and in this concerning the past fifteen years in Mexico, and in whom I place explicit trust.

quested by me. I have ascertained that he is at the present time in San Antonio, Texas, and I know that he will accompany any Agent or Agents designated to Mexico City, or Guadalajara, and I believe that this man could positively locate Moran, or any other fugitive thought to be in that section, in a much quicker time and with less chance of a slip-up than any number of our Agents attempting to personally make the necessary inquiries themselves.

If Moran has any amount of money in his possession that is another thing that should be guarded against as there are very few minor officials in Mexico who would not "play ball" with him for a monetary consideration.

If Moran is to be located and successfully removed to the United States the matter will have to be handled with the greatest care.

I thought it advisable to furnish you at this time with this brief detailed statement concerning the situation in Mexico at the present time.



About January 13, 1935, Special Agent T. M. McDade in company with other agents from the Chicago Office proceeded from Chicago, Illinois, to Jacksonville, Flordia, to apprehend Fred and Kate Barker, subjects in the Ridnaping of Edward Bremer. This trip was made by train and Agent McDade used a transportation request to purchase a compartment for himself and Agent S. K. Mc-Kee, and to accommodate firesrms to be used by nine agents in the party.

In the audit of Agent McDade's expense voucher for January, 1935, the sum of \$6.50 was suspended because a compartment was used instead of two lower berths. Acting upon authority from the Bureau, Agent McDade submitted a special voucher in February, 1935, in the amount of \$6.50 to recover the amount expended for official business and was further advised that if the Comptroller General would not approve this voucher, the sum should be submitted as a confidential item, as the sole purpose of the compartment was to conceal firearms being transported by agents for their use.

Since the submission of this last voucher Agent Mc-Dade has not received payment of this item nor has he been informed whether the voucher was approved or disapproved.

It is respectfully requested that you determine the status of this voucher and inform this office accordingly.

### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Karpis and Campbell.

Special Agent in Charge Brantley telephoned me from the Oklahoma City Office and said that he wanted to discuss with the Bureau a matter which had been called to his attention by Special Agent A. Paul Kitchin at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Harold Gardner, a lieutenant on the Tulsa Police Department, came to Agent Kitchin today and told him that during the course of certain investigation which the lieutenant has been conducting, a man by the name of M. Lawson, a convict in the Kansas State Penitentiary has made a statement to Gardner that he, Nelson/Brooks (now in jail in Tulsa), Clary Ficklin, one Carpenter, Glenn Roy Fright and Harry Campbell, about three years ago robbed affewelry store in Sedan, Kansas; that they committed three other robberies the same night, during the course of which they kidnaped and tied up the tity Marshal. In January of 1933, the same gang robbed the Chevrolet Motor Company in Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Lieutenant Gardner advises Mr. Kitchin that he is going to try to get Nelson Brooks up into Kansas, possibly through trickery of some kind, and file charges against him. The witness who was kidnaped and tied up by this gang during their escapades three years ago in Sedan, Kensas, has since died, but Gardner says he is pretty certain that through this situation information can be developed relative to the whereabouts of Karpis and Campbell. In this connection, Gardner wants an Agent to go along with him, stating that it will require about four or five days! investigative work.

Mr. Brantley frankly said that he is opposed to this, to which I concurred. I pointed out that we won't send an Agent up into Kansas with this police officer on a wild goose chase; that if Gardner develops any information which would be of value to the Bureau, we will compensate him for it. DETAILS:

B. E. Bracher, rental agent, 131 W. 70th Street, this City, on being further interviewed in this matter, advised that the fourth floor apartment was still unoccupied and that Gene Bowers and Dorothy Kaye were still maintaining an apartment at the instant premises. The cover which was placed on the mail of Bowers and Maye failed to reflect that they had been in receipt of any mail from Chicago, Ill. The carrier delivering mail at 131 W. 70th Street does not recall handling any mail from Chicago for any of the other tenants at that address.

At 1120 Fifth Avenue, New York City, a fashionable apartment house, it was learned through discreet interviews with the doorman and the servants in the employ of Mrs. Graham Youngs, who resides at that address, that the latter's son by a former marriage, Theodore Peck, had taken up permanent residence at Aiken, S.C., in the early part of this year. In view of the foregoing and the further fact that the description of Peck as obtained from those interviewed closely corresponds with the description of Theodore Peck as set out in the reference report of Special Agent A. B. Leckis, it is believed that the party now residing at Aiken, S.C., is the son of Mrs. Graham Youngs of this City.

During the evening of August 6, 1935, a party who identified himself as George Riley, telephone Newtown 9-1543, advised Special Agent in Charge Whitley, of this office, that during the latter part of July he was at Lake Mahopac, New York, and while there he met an individual who was known to him as Jack Palton; that this party informed him that he was at one time connected with the Department of Commerce: that he is a golf player and presently selling golf sticks. Riley advised he thought nothing more about the individual until August 5th when he was reading the September issue of the Startling Detective magazine: that in this magazine he saw a picture of Willie Harrison; wanted in connection with the Bremer kidnaping, and that he believes the party with whom he had a talk at Lake Mahopac was Willie Harrison. Riley promised to call at the New York office the following day. August 7th, for the purpose of furnishing fuller details concerning the matter. It might be stated that Riley's conversation over the telephone was very incoherent and disconnected and it was extremely difficult to secure any definite information from him.

Riley again contacted the New York Bureau office by phone on August 10th and stated he would visit Mr. Whitley in the course of the next few days. Mr. Riley having failed to make his appearance at this office as promised, the writer, after learning that the subscriber to telephone Newtown 9-1543 was William F. Mackin, 40-54 Case-6tt, Elmhurst, Long Island, discreetly interviewed Mrs. Mackin, in the presence of Walter Lee, owner of the premises at 40-54 Case-6tt, Mrs. Mackin advised that George Riley and his mother, now deceased, resided at her

house for a period of about eight months, Riley having moved about three weeks previously for parts unknown, leaving no forwarding address. Mrs. Eackin stated that Riley was a heavy drinker, never worked, was unreliable and of the braggadocia type, constantly imagining things. She advised further that she would put no faith in anything Riley might state or claim. Mrs. Mackin and Mr. Lee seemed to be acquainted with the fact that Mr. Riley had been in touch with the New York Bureau office and they both seemed to be of the opinion that he was just "kidding the office along". In view of the foregoing no further investigation will be conducted by this office with a view to locating George Riley for interview.

In an attempt to locate Andrew Gurante, who, when interviewed by Assistant Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson, as referred to in the report of the latter dated at New York City August 26, 1935, gave his address as 2808 35th Street, Astoria, Long Island, the writer proceeded to the aforesaid address and interviewed Albert Gurante, PWA worker who resides with his wife in apartment \$1. Mr. Albert Gurante stated his brother Andrew had departed for Florida on the evening of August 30, 1935; that he was at the time holding mail for him, believing it would be only a matter of a short time before he would be advised as to his brother's address at Florida. Albert Gurante stated that it might be possible that his brother might be reached in care of General Delivery, Migril Florida, as it was at the latter address he corresponded with him during the winter season of 1934-35.

In compliance with the request set out in Bureau letter of September 7, 1935, Agent contacted Bernard Devy at his residence 35-11 Leavitt Street, Flushing, New York. Mr. Levy stated that he has been a private detective all his life and at the present time is operating under the name "National Detective Agency", having a New York State license, the office for such agency being at his residence in Flushing. Mr. Levy stated that on August 30, 1935 he proceeded alone from New York via train to Saratoga Springs, New York, arriving there at about 3:30 P.M. that day, for the purpose of attending the Jewish War Veterans convention which had its headquarters at the Grand Union Hotel; that on leaving the railroad station at Saratoga Springs, he met a young lady by the name of Mrs. Rae Levin, whom he had not seen in over, twenty five years and on the recommendation of Lrs. Levin, he registered at the Greenland House, 60 Franklin St., Saratoga, being introduced to the proprietress, Mrs. Wolf, by Mrs. Levin, who was also a guest at the Greenland House but who departed that same evening for Troy. New York, after which he saw no more of Mrs. Levin.

Levy stated further that on Mrs. Wolf's learning that one of the guests whose name he recalls as "Bray", a Greek or Jew, who was then recovering from an operation for appendicitis. Bray during the conversation stated he formerly had a concession at thereto an employe of Riley's gambling house in Saratoga and that on a day or two prior that Karpis was at Riley's about eight house had advised him, Bray, police officers having visited Riley's on information they had that

Labor Day morning, went to the railroad station about 9 A.M., checked his grip and then attended the Jewish War Veterans convention at the Grand Union Hotel; that about 3:15 P.M. he returned to the railroad station to get a train to New York and while in the railroad station he saw an individual who looked exactly like Karpis and who entered a Pullman car marked #30, the train being headed in a Northerly he claims resembled Karpis and stated that his attention was directed to this individual by his clothes which were very "snappy". Levy of the person who was alleged to resemble Karpis, except the suit he wore, which was a gray sway-back model.

In connection with the interview with Levy, reference should be made to the letter from Special Agent in Charge Whitley to the Bureau under date of September 9, 1935, which reflects a call at the New York office by Mr. Levy, at which time he requested a photom graph of Karpis as he was going to Saratoga Springs, a copy of the Identification Order for Karpis being furnished him; also a call by Er. Levy at the New York office on September 6th, at which time he inquired whether this Bureau was interested in Communistic activities. At this meeting he was accompanied by his son for whom Levy hoped to be able to obtain a position as a Special Agent in this Pureau. It will be noted that when Levy called at the office on September 6th, he made no reference to the fact that he had heard Karpis was at Saratoga Springs nor as to his having seen an individual who resembled Karpis. Levy when questioned as to same stated that he made no reference to it when interviewed by Mr. Hanson at the New York office on September 6, 1935, due to the fact that it was his opinion that if the Bureau was not interested in Communistic matters, they would not be interested in the locating of Karpis.

In connection with the interviews with Levy, see the report of Special Agent Joseph G. Tucker, dated at New York City, July 7, 1926, in the case entitled Bernard or Benjamin Levy, Confidential Investigation, New York File 62-604, which reflects that Levy had been arrested in 1922 charged with burglary and felonious assault

and was acquitted; that he was then out on bail in Kings County in connection with the shooting of one Harry Marks; that he was implicated in the presentation of false claims to his superiors in the firm of Jones & Whitlock, by whom he was employed from 1921 to 1924 and that his general reputation in the police department was not so good. The file also reflects that Levy had prior thereto made numerous applications for a position with this Bureau. The New York office miscellaneous file reflects that on August 3, 1933 and April 16, 1935, Bernard Levy endeavored to interest the New York Bureau office in violations which did not come within the jurisdiction of this Bureau.

A communication dated September 13, 1935 was received by the New York Bureau office from United States Attorney F. W. H. Adams, Southern District of New York, advising that Mrs. Charles Gould residing at the Tudor Hotel, Room 431, 304 E. 42nd Street, New York City, had telephoned him that one of the three librarians employed at the Womrath's library at 8th and McDougall Streets, this city, had informed her of knowing the whereabouts of Karpis; that the libfarian to whom she referred is married to an Italian. Mrs. Gould further stated that she was leaving for Europe on the S/S Conte Grande on Saturday, September 14, 1935.

In accordance with the foregoing information, investigation at Womrath's library, 32 W. 8th Street, New York City, reflected that Mrs. M. Potenza, residence 18 W. 16th Street, whose husband is a jewelry manufacturer at 65 Nassau Street, was the individual who had informed Mrs. Gould that she had information pertaining to Karpis. Mrs. Potenza, who has been in the employ of Womrath's for the past two years, stated that a Miss M. Rose, employed by H. Stanley Hillyer, Inc., real estate, 21 University Place, New York City, and a subscriber to the Womrath's library, had informed her in the course of a general conversation during that week that the local police had visited the offices of her employer, Hillyer, Inc., relative to Karpis and that the only person to whom she mentioned the aforesaid information was her husband and Mrs. Charles Gould, who she stated was abroad.

At the offices of H. Stenley Hillyer, Inc., real estate, which is a reputable concern and handles properties mostly in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, the writer interviewed Mrs. Frances Sterns, who stated that about September 1st two New York City detectives, the names of whom she does not recall, advised her they had information to the effect that Karpis was residing at 21 University Place, New York City; that they displayed to her a photograph of Karpis (Identification Order) and from her examination of same she stated she had never seen a person resembling the photograph thereon; that the officers also displayed this photograph to the superintendent of the premises at 21 University Place, Pat Finnegan, and he also failed to recognize the photograph.

At this time it should be noted that the premises at 21 University Place are situated at the Northeast corner of 8th Street and University Place, New York, the ground floor being stores, the second floor occupied by the real estate office of H. Stanley Hillyer, and the third and fourth floors containing fourteen apartments, of one, two, three and fourtrooms, unfurnished. Ers. Sterns stated the occupants of these apartments have resided thereat for over a year, are mostly business people and when renting same all furnished references which upon being checked by Hillyer, Inc., were satisfactory.

Superintendent Pat Finnegan, who has acted in this capacity at 21 University Place for the past five years, confirmed the statements of Mrs. Sterns and could give no additional information of value.

Further investigation pertaining to this angle of the case reflected that Detectives John O'Neill and H. Roge of the 8th Squad, New York City Police Department, Mercer Street Station, had received an anonymous telephone call on September 3, 1935, to the effect that Karpis had been residing at 21 University Place, New York City and that the said detectives had visited the premises at that address and made appropriate investigation, interviewing Mrs. Sterns and Pat Finnegan.

On September 11, 1935, Special Agent in Charge C. D. McKean, Boston, Mass., communicated with the New York office by telephone and advised that the police at Bath, Maine were holding in custody an individual who gave his name as Edward L. Kennedy, 6551, 77th Street, Middle Village, Long Island, New York; that Kennedy was at the time driving a 1934 Plymouth automobile bearing New York 1935 license plates N 4884; that police authorities of Bath were of the opinion that Kennedy was Karpis. Mr. McKean requested that the identity of Kennedy be established.

Motor Vehicle records for the State of New York reflect that 1934 Plymouth coupe motor PE 133033, serial number 230613, was registered in the name of Edward L. Kennedy, 6551 77th Street, Middle Village, Long Island, and bore 1935 license plates number N 4884, which were issued to Kennedy for the instant car on December 28, 1934.

L. Kennedy, Middle Village, Long Island, a one family house in a strictly residential section, no one was home and inquiries in the immediate vicinity developed the fact that Kennedy was at the time vacationing at Bath, Maine and had been employed in the City of New York Tenement House Bureau for a number of years. The foregoing information relative to Kennedy was teletyped to the Boston office on September 11, 1935 and on the same date teletype was received from the Boston Bureau office to the effect that investigation by that office reflected that Kennedy was not Karpis.

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Agent interviewed Post Office Inspector Herbert Graham at New York City, pertaining to persons mentioned in an anonymous communication received at the Bureau on July 20, 1935. He advised that the Fred Condorf mentioned therein is an international confidence man known to the police of practically every large city here and abroad, and the information he gathers from his informants is to the effect that Gondorf is now at Boston or in that vicinity. It is the personal opinion of Inspector Graham that Gondorf as well as Meade and O'Dell, mentioned in the anonymous communication, are known to Herbie Callahan, lawyer of Boston, previously referred to in the reference report of Special Agent P.M. Plunkett dated August 15, 1935. Further, that Gondorf is known to spend his winters at Florida and is known to the local police detectives who handle the confidence violations. He stated that Gondorf as well as Meade. O'Dell and Upshaw, also mentioned in the anonymous letter, were known to him to be known to Frankie Puris, a bootlegger of Boston, Mass., and who resides with his wife at the Westminster Hotel, that city, where Duris is very favorably regarded by the management.

THE STATE OF THE STATE OF \* TOTA : 1 With reference to William E. Meade, whom the Bureau is desirous of locating in order to question him in connection with this case and in connection with the confidence game that he praction ticed on a contractor in St. Paul, Minn., namely one Wunderlich, who had been swindled out of \$100,000, which money Wunderlich had borrowed from Bremer, Mr. Graham stated that his department had issued a fugitive bulletin as of July 7, 1934, bearing case #34837-E, seeking the apprehension of Meade, which is more particularly referred to in Agent Plunkett's report of August 15, 1935; that Meade, as far as he knows; was born at Cedar Falls, Iowa; that he is not known to have any living relatives other than his wife and that he is said to have been friendly with Louis Nathan, who resided and ran a handbook on the 600 block on . South Wabash Avenue, Chicago, Ill.; that Meade when visiting Chicago was known to have contacted Nathan; that during the years 1928-1934, Meade was known to have resided at 1533 Fargo Avenue, Chicago; that Meade was also known to be friendly with a family by the name of Wheeler at Glendale, California, operators of a hotel in that city, the reputation of which is questionable; that Meade's wife's maiden name was Kate Schmitt; that she corresponds with her sister, Mrs. C. A. (Mary) Baxter, 1437 Polk St., San Francisco, Calif.; also her brother - John A. Schmitt, 369 N. 23rd Street, Portland, Oregon.

Inspector Graham further stated that to his knowledge, Meade is very friendly with Thomas J. O'Dell, whose parents originally came from New Britain, Conn.; that O'Dell is also known to him, Graham, as a confidence man; that O'Dell married a girl by the name of Madeline Cuvotas or Calcutta,

whose mother, Mrs. Leo F. Smith, resides at Hot Springs, New Mexico. Inspector Graham stated that Krs. O'Dell was a former burlesque actress, and is alleged to be singing over the radio at the present time and to be a friend of Molly Weingarten, whose husband Max is a dealer in narcotics, residing at the Whitehall Hotel, 250 W. 100th Street, this city; that she is also friendly with "Frankie", manager of Linsky's Burlesque House, who resides at the Hotel Whitby, 325 W. 45th Street; that O'Dell had issued to him a passport on July 19, 1935 and gave as reference Julian Kaufman, 25 E. 86th Street, Kaufman claiming to know O'Dell for twenty years; that Kaufman originally came from Chicago; that he is a gambler known as "Potatoes", a former memper of the Capone gang and is known to have been questioned in connection with the murder of Arthur Langdon; that Kaufman makes his headquarters at the Piccadilly Hotel, 227 W. 45th Street; that he is a member of the Maxie Greenberg crowd.

With reference to Bruce Upshaw, Fred Flowers alias.
Farrell and Charlie Mitchell alias Fatty, also mentioned in the anonymous letter, Inspector Graham could give no additional information than that already contained in the New York file.

As to Eddie Hayes, George W. Ferry alias Mile a Minute, George Kennedy and Fifky, Inspector Graham stated that these individuals were known as confidence men although he was not in a position to give any definite information as to their whereabouts.

Relative to Tom Coffey and Pretty Sid, he recalls he has heard these names in an offhand way but can furnish no information relative thereto.


With further reference to Thomas J. O'Dell, investigation at the office of R. W. Rosebury Publishing Company, 469 Fifth Avenue, New York City, developed the fact that an Edward O'Dell, married, who resided in Lowell, Mass., post office address - Route 1, Box 189, had formerly resided at New Britain, Conn., and investigation at the latter city, through interview with the police authorities thereat, revealed that Edward O'Dell was a brother of Thomas J. O'Dell.

Based on information received from Lt. McCue, Bolice Department, New Britain, Conn., that O'Dell had communicated with his family at New Britain on the stationery of William Wellach, 30 W. 57th Street, New York City, investigation was made at the latter address, where it was established that Wallach was a very fashionable men's tailor and had been located at 30 W. 57th Street for the past twenty years. The postal carrier for this address stated that Wallach was an individual who could be approached and trusted.

Mr. Wallach on being interviewed stated that the prices of his clothes ranged from \$150 to \$200 per suit and that his customers consisted of Supreme Court Judges and other prominent persons of New York, including Al Smith, former Governor of the State; Jimmy Hinds, Democratic leader of the upper West Side; also Nicky Arnstein, former husband of Fanny Brice, and known as a confidence man and gambler; numerous other gamblers of the City, and he also mentioned the name of Johnny Factor of Chicago. When Mr. Wallach was questioned as to whether he was acquainted with 0'Dell he stated he was and that in the past ten days O'Dell had received a letter at his office, which was called for by O'Dell's wife; that he formerly made clothes for O'Dell; that he had met him about the City of New York at numerous times and also met him at Florida last year; that he did not know anything about O'Dell's personal life, his occupation, and so forth, and stated that it was over two years since he had made a suit of clothes for O'Dell, the records in connection with same having been destroyed; that he has no idea at this time as to where O'Dell could be reached. From the interview with Wallach it was quite evident that he would not cooperate with the Bureau fully, having advised that from now on he will return to the sender all mail which may come addressed to him for O'Dell.

Make appropriate investigation at the General Delivery window at Miemi, Fla., as to whether Andrew Gurante is receiving mail there. In connection therewith the Bureau is desirous that Gurante's address be ascertained as he probably will be required as a witness in the trial of this case.

#### BOSTON OFFICE

Conduct discreet interview with Herbert Callehan, lawyer, and Frankie Duris at the Westminster Hotel, who it will be noted, Inspector Graham believes know Fred Gondorf, notorious confidence man and his associates, namely, Meade, O'Dell, Upshaw, et al.

Make appropriate investigation at the residence of Edward O'Dell, route 1, box 189, Lowell, Mass., with a view to ascertaining the whereabouts of Thomas O'Dell, who is the brother of Edward O'Dell, employed as a salesman in the New England district for the R. W. Rosebury Publishing Company, 469 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

In connection with the investigation to be conducted by the Boston office, photographs of Gondorf and O'Dell are being attached to copies of this report for that office.

#### CHICAGO OFFICE

Make appropriate investigation at 1533 Fargo Ave., Chicago, the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Meade from 1928 to 1934, with a view to ascertaining the present whereabouts of Meade.

Discreetly contact Louis Nathan, who resides and operates a handbook on the 600 block of South Wabash Avenue, Chicago, as Leade is known to have contacted Nathan when visiting Chicago.

Cobtain all information possible with reference to Julian Kaufman, former resident of Chicago, who is a gambler, known as "Potatoes" and a member of the Capone gang. Kaufman is also known to be closely associated with Meade.

#### NEW YORK OFFICE

Keep in touch with Post Office Inspector Herbert Graham with a view to obtaining any information he may develop which would assist in the location of William Meade.

Discreetly interview Julian Kaufman, 25 E. 86th Street, reported to be a questionable character and a confidente of Thomas J. 0'Dell and Meade, in an effort to ascertain the present whereabouts of either of the latter two. Kaufman is also known to make his head-quarters at the Piccadilly Hotel, where he is known to associate with the Max Greenberg crowd.

Ascertain, if possible, the whereabouts of O'Dell's wife, from Mr. and Mrs. Maxie Weingarten (of questionable character) residing at the Whitehall Hotel, 250 W. 100th Street.

Establish the true name of "Frankie", manager of Minsky's Burlesque, who resides at the Hotel Whitby, 325 W. 45th Street, New York City. This individual is known to be friendly with Mrs. 0'Dell.

AT HARTFORD, CONN., furnish Joe Harrison, Aetha Life Insurance Co., 151 Farmington Ave., with specimen of the handwriting of William Meade, and re-interview him with regard to any information developed by a more thorough search of the Aetha Life Insurance Co. files.

Interview Regional Director Hoffman, State Capitol Building, relative to whether a PWA auditor called upon the firm of Oneglia & Gervasini on or about July 31, 1935, and whether he fits the description of William Meade.

AT TORRINGTON, CONN., re-interview Hugh E. Meade, Chief of Police, relative to further information he may have concerning William Meade.

Contact Romeo Gervasini and exhibit photograph of William Meade for possible identification.

Make further investigation among building contractors in the vicinity as further developments may justify.



He said that the woman informant in this matter has and he believes she is waiting until she gets something definite before she answers his letter. Mr. Connelley said he did not believe we should push this metter too far at the present time, and if we do not get anything eventually, however, we should go over at Toledo and pick the whole gang up. I told him that I believed this is what we will have to do ultimately. In the meantime, however, Mr. Connelley said he believed the least possible effort. would serve the best purpose at this time. He said that he has some Agents planted over there on a telephone tap, and they have secured the location in the Negro district where they can watch the place in question at night. Certain interesting episodes have developed in connection with recent investigations in the above entitled case which are outlined below and may be of special interest to the Bureau in the future.

During the trial of subjects Arthur R. Barker, Elmer Farmer, Harold Allderton, Oliver A. Berg, et al, at St. Paul, Minnesota, during April and May of this year, Oliver Berg took the witness stand in an attempt to explain his activities in connection with the exchanging of the ransom money at Chicago, Illinois. Berg informed the Court that after a considerable amount of the money had been exchanged at Chicago Illinois, he was approached by other members of the gang with a proposition whereby he, Berg, was to take a portion of the money to Louisville, Kentucky, for changing. Berg informed the Court that he stoutly refused to take this money to Louisville, giving as his reason for refusing that the movement of this money across a State line constituted a Federal offense, and that he did not want, under any circumstances to become involved with the Federal Government. This episode is thought to be rather interesting, as it shows the criminal's fear of the Bureau and also their ignorance of the substance of the kid naping statute. RECORDED & INDEXED

As a result of the investigation surrounding the appropriation hension of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton at Fort Allendale, Florida, it developed that a certain citizen of Daytona Beach Colorida, in diced

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the Identification Order on William Weaver posted on the bulletin board in the Daytona Beach Post Office. This citizen noted the apparent likeness of this photograph to William Weaver, whom he knew as J. W. Osborne. He called this to the attention of a friend, also a resident of Daytona Beach, who is a local merchant and who had had considerable dealing with Weaver, but the merchant, upon viewing the photograph, exclaimed "Aw no, this picture doesn't resemble Osborne in any way", whereupon the matter was dropped.

William Weaver, upon being questioned, informed Agent that he had seen his photograph appearing on the Bureau's Identification Order in the Post Office at Daytona Beach and had noted that same, with many other Identification Orders, was posted inside a glass bulletin container. He informed he often called at the Post Office to view his photograph and had wondered how he could remove the Identification Order without breaking the glass, and had finally come to the decision, just previous to his apprehension, that he would break the glass when the occasion presented itself and remove all the Identification Orders, in order that he would not be suspicioned should he remove only his own. He remarked also that wherever he traveled he nearly always called at the local Post Office to determine whether or not his Identification Order was posted.

This episode is being reported because it shows the concern on the part of badly wanted criminals over the posting of wanted notices on them.

During the recent investigation at Toledo, Ohio,

and an informant of the Chicago Eureau office who has been approached by one Edith Barry, a notorious politician and prostitute at Toledo, called at the house of Edith Barry in Toledo for the purpose of making contact with the remaining fugitives in this case, Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell,

that Edith Barry showed him a typewritten article by a famous author, by whose name is unable to recall, dealing with the criminal life of Alvin Karpis, his many successful evasions of capture by Government Agents, especially his escape from Atlantic City, New Jersey and from Miami, Florida. He stated the article criticised the Federal Bureau of Investigation not only for its failure to apprehend Karpis, but also because of the unfair methods used in attempting to capture him. These articles and the book entitled "Ten Thousand Public Enemies" will undoubtedly be located in Edith Barry's home when Special Agents take her into custody in the near future.

This instance is believed to be of interest to the Bureau, as it shows that important fugitives are ever anxious to obtain newspaper articles, magazine articles and books dealing with their lives and criminal careers.

This information is being submitted to the Bureau under personal and confidential cover as a precautionary measure for the protection of and these articles will undoubtedly be found in the home of Edith Barry when she is apprehended and it will then be unnecessary to withhold this interesting data.

Special Agents of the Chicago Bureau office and Agents from other offices who have worked and who are now working on this case, will be asked to attempt to recall additional instances of interesting episodes in connection with this investigation, many of which are probably not reported in the investigative file, due to the fact that they may have had no direct bearing upon the investigation.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent A. J. Norstrom, dated at Kansas City, Missouri, September 26, 1935, in wich reference is made to the information furnished by informants and Gus part to the effect that Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell have not split-up and that both of said parties have been in Joplin, Missouri within recent months.

The Kansas City Office is requested to make every effort to secure further information as to the possible location of Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis in the vicinity of Joplin, Missouri. It will be recalled that the information furnished by and Hart to the effect that Karpis and Campbell have split-up is in keeping with information which was obtained by the Oklahoma City Office through a confidential informant in Tulsa, Oklahoma. The above referred to report indicates that Hart is considered a "windy" individual and there is some tendency to place little credence in his statements. RECORDED & INDEXED

Reference is made to page eight of the above mentioned report. It is noted that Hart stated he was incarcerated in the Aokidional Etate Panilun tentiary at KcAlester, Oklahoma in 1915 and that he is well acquainted with the Barkers, Karpis, Davis, Campbell and others. In order to determine the truthfulness of the statements of Hart, the Oklahoma City, Diffice of graquested to conduct proper investigation at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, Echlester Oklahoma, to determine the period in which Hart was incarcerated therein and to notal account sopies of his photograph.

MAILED If Hart is, in fact, well acquainted with those persons listed on page eight of the reference report, it is believed that he will prove a Of valuable informant, but before extensive leads are set out on the basis of information furnished by him, it is believed that his photograph should be obtained and presented to Jess Doyle, Rebraska State Penitentiary, Lincoln, u. S. Difference and to Volney Davis, United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Laneas, to determine whether, in fact, Hart is known to members of the Barker Karpis gang. If it is determined that Hart is, in fact, known to this gang,

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every effort should be unde by the Kanses City Office to enlist his cooperation to the end of locating Karpis and Campbelle

Reference is now made to page nine of the report of Special Agent Borstrom, on which it is stated that Bart informed Karpis has a sister nesser Opal living with one "Charlie" near dummison, Colorado. An extensive investigation by the Bureau has failed to disclose that Kerpis has a sister by the name of Opal and this is believed to be misinformation; however, it is significant to note this the person mentioned as "Charlie" may possibly he identical with Charles Pitagerald. Hart has also informed that one Bill flich, residing in the vicinity of Cunnison, Colorado, is known to be a post office for "hoodlung" all over the country. In view of the fact that Hart has stated Alvin Karpis is personally known to him, it is believed that a copy of the report of Epocial Agent Moretros should be immediately forwarded to the Denver Office, with the request that a very discreet investigation be undertaken in the vicinity of Cummison, Coloredo to determine the identity of the parties known as Opel, "Charlie" and Bill Rich. The Eureeu has come into possession of information from time to time to the effect that Alvin Kurpis has contacts from coast to coast and it is believed possible that he may boo have contacts in the vicinity of Cunnison, Colorado.

This woman is apparently in a good position to furnish information of value to the Eureau. It is noted that the sequential with members of the Karpis-Eurker gang and their contacts in that Earl Morris was friendly with Jimmy Murphy Thite; that during the spring of 1925 White visited Al Cherwood in Coffeyville, Kansas and that when White departed therefrom, Earl Morris also left. It appears, however, that Earl Morris has now returned to Coffeyville, Kansas.

With further reference to your letter of the 27th ultimo requesting data from the Jacksonville files to be used as evidence in St. Paul in this matter, please be advised that additional effort to comply therewith has been made at Mismi, Florida, by Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons. As a result thereof he advises me as follows:

"The original Western Union telegram dated at Kismi, December 29, 1954, addressed to T. C. Blackburn, care Carson Bradford, Oklawaha, Florida, and signed "Cash" is in possession of the Clerk, United States District Court, Miami, and will be produced, upon issuance of subpoens duces tecum served on Felmer Rosemond, Chief Deputy Clark in Charge, United States District Court, Mismi, Florida, who has custody of it under order impounding it issued by United States District Judge Helsted L. Ritter. Joseph E. Johnson, Office Kanager, Western Union Telegraph Company, Fiami, is competent to testify concerning the receipt and authenticity of the telegram.

Through inquiry of officials of the Pan American Airways. Coconut Grove, Kismi, Florida, it was ascertained that F. L. Culhan, Ticket Auditor, Pan American Airways, Aviation Building, Coconut Grove, Liami, Florida, is competent to produce, upon issuance of subposna duces tecum, the original "going portions" of tickets issued to Cassius McDonald, William J. Harris and E. N. Wagner (Alvin Karpis). Since the return portions of said tickets are retained in Havana, it will be necessary for Fan American officials to request authority of the Guban Government to obtain them and they will do so on request. Mr. Culhan, above mentioned, is competent to produce and to testify concerning the authenticity of these tickets. However, in the event the United States Attorney at St. Paul may desire the testimony of other officials mentioned in the report of Special Agent J. H. Barson, Jacksonville, Florida, dated February 20, 1935, particularly on pages 114, 115 and 116, there is set forth the correct mames of those individuals as follows:

Special Agent in Charge, St. Paul, Kinnesota.

> J. T. Aguirre (not Aquine), Pan American Airways, Aviation Building, Coconut Grove, Miami, Florida.

Porter Horris, Pan American Airways, Aviation Building, Coconut Grove, Mismi, Florida.

M. A. Rodriguez, Jr., Pan American Airways, Havana, Guba.

G. D. Grosman (not Grosmar), Pan American Airways, Aviation Building, Cosonut Grove, Limi, Florida.

Antonio kontero (not Montens), Pan American Airways, Havana, Cuba. This individual may be reached through Pan American Airways, Mismi, Florida, during the month of October since he is on vacation in Mismi and will return to Havana on November 1, 1935.

The original passenger records, Form PAA T. F., as mentioned on page 116 of Agent Hanson's report above referred to, have been destroyed according to officials of the Pan American Airways. However, duplicate copies of same, submitted to the Immigration Service, Fiami, Florida, at the time passage was taken by the individuals herein involved, are in possession of the District Director of Immigration, Jacksonville, Florida, who is competent to produce same if desired.

The Combined Manifest and Passenger List, Outward and Inward Foreign Manifest, prepared by the Customs Agency, are in possession of John Klein, Deputy Collector of Customs in Charge, Mismi, Florida, who is competent to produce the originals and testify as to their authenticity, if desired.

The original Bell Boy Records and Arrival and Departure Book of the Kl Comodoro Hotel, which the St. Paul Office desired, cannot be located. Joe Adams, Kanager of the Kl Comodoro Hotel, claims that Special Agent Hanson obtained those original records, and he further claims that he was not given a receipt when he relinquished their possession. The United States Attorney, the United States Marshal and the Clerk of the District Court, Kiemi, deny the receipt of those particular records. I personally examined every thing in possession of the United States Marshal; made a search of the United States Attorney's office, and inquired of the Clerk of

the United States District Court, but the records mentioned are not located in these offices."

It appears, however, from the report of Special Agent J. H. Hanson dated at Jackson-sonville, Florida, April 23, 1935, on page & thereof, that these records were left with the United States Attorney at Mismi, Florida.

If, after reading this letter, Special Agent Henson has any further suggestions as to where these documents may be located in this district we should be immediately advised.





Dear Dolores:-

We received your letter regarding that car. We can't do anything about it. I have no lawyer and haven't the money to hire one. When you were in Philadelphia I was trying to get in touch with you through a lawyer, he charged me \$25 for writing two letters. You can imagine what it would cost to have him deal with another country. I also asked this same lawyer what it would be if he went to Philadelphia with me and it would have been a mere \$50 a day for his time and also all of his expenses. So as you can see, we really can't do anything for you about it and if you can have anyone else handle it for you, the best thing would be to write to them.

When I got to Philedelphia and reached government men, I did more with 57 than I would have if I'd paid \$500 to a lawyer. In this case it is the same. I am going to see the federal men and see what they can do for you. They will probably charge storage down there for the car for a year and we can't tell how much that will be. Another thing to ship it here would probably cost more than it is worth. The car probably isn't worth more than \$500 after standing all that time. It is up to you to do what you think best.

Raymond has suffered quite a bit cutting his teeth. His first teeth came through with no trouble but the last few caused him a lot of trouble. He hasn't been gaining but he is alright now. He weighs  $20\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. He got all his winter clothes already including an big overcoat. He says he's going to stay out all winter like he did all summer. He has everything he needs now. He outgrew all his other things. He has a bed and a high chair and lots of toys. And he is enclosing a \$5.00 money order.

Reference is made to the long distance telephone call from Special Agent K. R. McIntire at the Bureau yesterday afternoon inquiring whether or not his presence would be necessary before the grand jury at Orlando, Florida, in connection with presenting the case against Myrtle Eaton for harboring William Weaver.

All aspects of this case were discussed several days ago with Assistant United States Attorney William A. Paisley at Jacksonville, Florida, at the time arrangements were being made to secure proper witnesses. It was the opinion of Mr. Paisley at that time that the mere presentation of the case before the grand jury at Orlando would not necessitate the presence of a witness who had testified before the grand jury upon the occasion of the returning of the indictment against Weaver. He felt that the introduction of a certified copy of the indictment from St. Paul by the proper Assistant United States Attorney to the grand jury, together with witnesses who could testify as to locating Lyrtle Eaton and William Weaver as living together at Port Orange, Florida, and also testimony of an Agent who had interviewed Lyrtle Eaton and had obtained oral admission from her that she knew of the exact status of Weaver with regard to his being indicted at St. Paul, being a fugitive, et cetera, would be sufficient evidence upon which to obtain the desired indictment.

01-INDEXED DATE: 12-8-65 The matter was again taken up with Mr. Paisley, who stated that he was of the opinion that Agent McIntire would not be a necessary witness before the grand jury. When the case comes to trial he will desire the presence of this Agent. The Bureau was accordingly wired as to this conclusion this morning.
