CHARLES O. LONG rented this same box on February 13, 1934, apparently left Sarasota, Florida, for parts unknown, and again rented this same box on October 30,, 1934. As far as the records are concerned this box has been rented in the same name since October 30, 1934. However, Mr. Knight is positive that Charles O. Long has not been in garasota all of this time, noting that he would be gone for two or three months at a time, but always receiving mail in said post office box. Jack Knight knows Charles 0. Long, his wife and associates in and about Sarasota, Florida, and identified the photograph of Long as a close resemblance. Er. Knight then stated that Lirs. Long's maiden name was Louise E. Stibbs, and that she was presently residing in Sarasota, Florida, with her mother and father at what is known at the Littlefield Home on Siesta Beach, which he understood had been purchased by Charles O. Long, but the details thereof were not known to Mr. |Knight. During any absence of Long from Sarasota, Florida, one Taylor C. Scott, Kanager of the Peninsular Telephone Co., in Sarasota, took charge of Long's mail, that is, he would secure the mail and if it was forwarded he did so, Long never leaving a forwarding address with the Post Office authorities at any time. According to Jack Knight, Long was "accepted socially" in and about Sarasota, and apparently always had plenty of money as he would entertain lavishly at his beach home, and also at the exclusive beach clubs in and about Sarasota, having no apparent work or business in this community. Further, he was also known as a "Sportsman", spending a great deal of his time fishing, etc., with well respected residents of the community. At no time has Jack Knight ever observed Charles C. Long with anyone resembling LEAD, Knight being familiar with read's description, photograph, etc., as he supplied information some time ago in connection with investigation at Sarasota, looking toward the location of Mead, and added that if Mead has been in Sarasota he has not frequented the streets or public places.

Further information concerning Long was not available from this source, that is, his business, Chicago address, associates outside Sarasota, make of car, license, etc. However, at the time of Agent's inquiry, there was a letter in Post Office Box 1303 addressed to THOLAS C. STIBBS, 941 Columbian Ave., Oak Park, Ill., with a return address from Consolidated Oil Corp., 630 5th Ave., New York City. This letter was postmarked April 11, 1936, Madison Square Station, New York, New York.

Mr. R. Tittlefield, President of the Hazzard Shoe Co., of Gardiner, Maine, residing at 421 Hawthorne Avenue, Sarasota, Florida, confirmed the sale of his beach home to Charles O. Long, but was unable to supply any detailed information as the sale had been handled by Ray Richardson, real estate broker, 316 Main Street, Sarasota, Florida. Mr. Littlefield did state that Charles O. Long was apparently a man of leisure, interested in sports, fishing, etc., and that he entertained lavishly at the exclusive beach clubs in and about Sarasota. However, he

had never attended any of such entertainments, and knew very little concerning Charles O. Long, and nothing of his associates, contacts, business, etc., adding that he had never had any direct dealings with Long, or any social contacts to the best of his recollection.

Mr. Ray Richardson, above mentioned, advised Agent, from his records, that he sold the Littlefield Home to Charles O. Long on May 11, 1933, for a cash consideration of \$5,250.00. According to Mr. Richardson, Charles O. Long appeared at his office seeking to purchase a nice home in a good residential section, and was shown the Littlefield Home, during which display it was stated that some other party was interested in the home. whereupon Long took from a money belt a \$1,000.00 bill and handed it to Richardson to bind the bargain. A short time thereafter Long gave Richardson another \$1,000.00 to cover repairs, etc., as michardson was getting the place ready for occupancy. The residence is now insured by Long with the New York Title and Mortgage Co., of New York City for the sum of \$5,000.00. hr. Richardson insisted that he had no other dealings with Long, that is, in addition to this real estate transaction, the repair of the house and the employment of some one to look after same during Long's absence right after he came to Sarasota and apparently returned to Chicago, Illinois, or vicinity. This absence was in 1933 and Mr. Richardson has several letters from Long written upon the stationery of the Twin Cities Chevrolet, Inc., Benton Harbor, Michigan, all concerning the above noted property, one of which is dated August 2, 1933, and refers to a house boy to care for the property. This letter was secured by Agent for possible hendwriting value and is herewith transhitted to the office of origin. Wr. Richardson stated that the house boy, whose name he does not know and of whom he has no record, did not remain at the Long home when they were present, but only in their absence.

Mr. Richardson insisted that he had never associated with the Longs socially at all, and had never observed any one by the name of Mead (or any of his aliases) with Long or at the Long home, and further he had never observed anyone who resembled the photograph or description of Mead with the Longs or in or about Sarasota, Florida.

Mr. Richardson stated that at no time did Long ever mention to Richardson any of his friends or contacts outside of Sarasota, Florida. In fact, Richardson at no time ever observed any strangers with the Longs and does not believe they were ever visited by friends from Chicago, Ill., or other such points. Long at no time discussed or even mentioned the nature of his business, work, etc., but always had plenty of cash money and apparently came from Chicago, Ill. However, he used the above noted stationery for correspondence at times, which led Mr. Richardson to assume he was engaged in the automobile business at Benton Harbor, Michigan. Mr. Richardson confirmed the fact that apparently the Longs were accepted socially in Sarasota, as they entertained frequently and lavishly at the exclusive

beach clubs in and about Sarasota, which entertainments were attended by the better class of people from the community.

Mr. Taylor C. Scott, Manager of the Peninsular Telephone company, Sarasota, Florida, advised Agent that he had been an associate of Long's since a short time after they, the Longs, came to garasota, Florida, and he had attended various social functions in Sarasota given by the Longs, and also attended other such functions in company of both kir. and Mrs. Long. According to Mr. Scott, he has never seen a man resembling the photograph or description of Mead in or about Sarasota, plorida, or in the company of the Longs, and further, at no time has either Mr. or Mrs. Long mentioned the name of Mead or any of his aliases to him. It is the opinion of Mr. Scott that Kead has not been in contact with the Longs in or about Sarasota, but he admitted that Long at no time ever discussed his contacts, friends, business, and other personal matters with him, hence such a contact could have taken place and he would not have known of it. Mr. Scott then stated that his contact with the Longs had dropped off about one year ago, since which time he has not at all talked with kr. Long, in fact he has feared him as Long believes that the Scotts have had something to do with his domestic troubles. This is due, according to Scott, to the fact that on several occasions when Long would beat his wife she would come to the Scott home for protection, and received same. As a result of this, Mr. Scott has secured a permit to carry a gun.

Ar. Scott further related that he has not seen Long since about the last Christmas Holidays when he was in sarasota, Florida, for possibly two weeks, but not staying at his home. During this time Long did not contact Mr. Scott. Mr. Scott admitted that his contact with the Longs was, until a year ago, quite intimate, and that when the Longs went to Chicago in 1934, between May and October, he took care of their home and mail and would call for the mail and forward it to Long in chicago, Ill., the address not being recalled and a record thereof could not be located. However, Mr. Scott seems to think it was somewhere on state Street. Mr. Scott insisted that he does not know the present whereabouts of Long, and is not communicating with him, but in the event he sees him in Sarasota he will observe him and his contacts closely and advise Deputy Sheriff Ed Garner, Sarasota, Florida, who will be referred to subsequently herein.

Concerning long distance telephone calls made by the Longs, Mr. Scott stated that if such calls were made they were not from the residence as he has observed their telephone bills for some time and noted that there was nothing unusual about them, this being done as some time ago (July, 1935) Deputy Sheriff Garner advised that the photograph of Long had appeared in an unrecalled detective magazine as being a wanted man at which time he, Scott, broke off association gradually and took advantage of his office records to learn as much as possible concerning the Longs.

When Charles O. Long was in Sarasota, Florida, during the recent holidays he was driving a Buick sedan automobile, the make (year) or the license number not recalled, but it is thought that the license was an Illinois license. During this last visit Long was in company of the State's Attorney, Henry Williford, Sarasota, Florida, and the two of them drank together a great deal. However, prior to this time these two people had little use for each other and never associated together.

It is recalled that Charles O. Long was alleged to have a bank account in Sarasota, Florida, and in this connection H. W. Whitman, Vice-President, Palmer National Bank, the only bank in Sarasqta, advised Agent that he knows Charles O. Long on sight, as well as his wife, and has often wondered about just what his business might be, etc., noting that he has apparently been accepted in Sarasota as a respectable person, but he does not appear to be a person of good background, is rather suspicious in his actions and peculiar generally. This feeling toward Long was aggravated when R. J. Kauffman, a bank auditor associated with Howard-Kroehl Co., 105 West Adams St., Chicago, Ill., was making an audit of the Palmer National Bank in Sarasota back in 1934 and met Long on the street, addressing him by his correct name, which name is not now recalled by Mr. Whitman, at which time Long told Kauffman not to call him by that name but to call him Mr. Long in Sarasota, adding that his name had been changed. According to Mr. Whitman, Kauffman and Long were boyhood friends, went to school together in Chicago and knew each other well, but Kauffman had not seen Long for possibly fifteen years, and could not understand in what manner Long had become wealthy and successful, apparently. During the time that Lr. and Lrs. Kauffman were in Sarasota, Florida, it is believed they visited the Longs in their home. However, further information was not available from Lir. Whitmen, except that the Longs had apparently been accepted socially, were flush with money and had no apparent means of livelihood, their actions indicating that they were wealthy as they entertained lavishly at the exclusive beach clubs in the community.

lr. Whitman advised that he had never observed Mr. Long with anyone resembling the photograph or description of Mead. In fact, he had never seen him with any strangers. Further, that he had never heard mentioned the name of Mead or any of the aliases of Mead in connection with the Longs, and had never seen such a man in sarasota. According to Mr. Whitman, Long has not been in Sarasota for about one year, that is, he has not observed him. However, upon checking his bank account Mr. Whitman stated that apparently Long had been in Sarasota as late as January 31, 1936, as a deposit to the account had been made on that date.

An examination of this account reflected that same was not unusual, no deposits over \$1200.00 being made. A transcript of the account was made and is retained in the Jacksonville file for possible future use.

Ers. Charles C. Long, nee Louise Esther Stibbs, was interviewed at her home at Siesta Beach, Sarasota, Florida, and stated that she married Charles O. Long October 11, 1928, at Oak Park, Ill. she is the mother of one child, a girl aged nineteen months, and presently her parents, I.r. and Mrs. Thomas C. Stibbs, reside with her at this address, and have been there since September, 1935, and have not occupied their home at 941 Columbia Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois, since that time. yrs. Long insisted that her husband had not been in Sarasota, Florida, for the past year, except for a short time during the recent Christmas holidays to see his daughter, adding that she does not know where he now could be located, and insisting that if she did know she would not inform Agent, or any other law enforcement officer as she knows he is wanted, and for things other than questioning. Lrs. Long insisted that she knew no one by the name of Mead or by the name of any of his aliases, and further that she did not know Mead by his photograph or description, stating that if her husband knew him he had never mentioned such fact to her.

It was apparent that Mrs. Long, regardless of her feeling toward her husband, was not going to supply any information of value to this or any other matter, as she appeared to have no use for law enforcement officers, and obviously was afraid of her husband or his contacts should she divulge information of value. The stated that she knew her husband had a criminal record when she married him, and that she had been accused of being a "stool".

Agent spent considerable time with Mrs. Long, attempting to secure some information of value, but she would not divulge such and sated that if she had such information she would not divulge it. She then stated that there was only one law enforcement officer that she had any faith in and that was Ed Garner of the Sheriff's Office in garasota. However, upon Agent's suggestion that Ed Garner be requested to come to the Long home, Mrs. Long did not want this done. Mrs. Long did admit that at one time her husband operated the Twin Cities Chevrolet, Inc., at Benton Harbor, Michigan, but stated that he did not now operate this concern. All efforts to secure information concerning the possible whereabouts of Mead, his activities, connections with Mr. Long, associates, etc., from Mrs. Long met with negative results, it being apparent that she was concealing, and would not supply, any such information.

Subsequent to Agent's interview with Mrs. Long, and on the following day, she contacted Deputy Sheriff Ed Garner at the Sheriff's Office in Sarasota, and admitted she had lied to Agent, and informed him that she did know both Mr. and Mrs. William Elmer Mead, as did her husband, and that during the latter part of February or the early part of March, 1936, she had seen the Meads at the George Washington Hotel in West Palm Beach, Florida, and that Meads were then living in Vero Beach, Florida, and that Mead had a bank account in some bank in Orlando, Florida, under the name of NULSS. Further that

Lead was driving a new 1936 Ford V-8 coach, bearing 1956 Florida license, the first three numbers thereof being "211". According to Ed Carner, whom agent has found to be reliable in the past, this is the only information supplied by Lrs. Long concerning Mead. However, Carner will keep in touch with her and immediately report any additional information available from her to the Jacksonville Office direct, which was done by Lr. Carner in this instance, it being confirmed by Agent by telephone immediately thereafter. Lrs. Long also informed Lr. Carner that her husband had talked with her by telephone from Chicago, Ill., about two weeks ago, but she did not know where he could be located in Chicago.

While Agent was in Sarasota, and before krs. Long contacted peputy Sheriff Garner, the latter was interviewed and advised that he knew both kr. and krs. Charles O. Long well, and had aided krs. Long in her domestic troubles with long, adding that he knew krs. Long was afraid of her husband and worried for fear that he would cause her trouble if she caused him any trouble of any kind, which was probably the reason she would not supply Agent with any information. Mr. Garner stated that he did not believe mead had been in or about Sarasota, Florida, at least he had not observed anyone resembling the photograph of Mead, or corresponding to his description, or using the name of Mead or his aliases, in or about sarasota, and had no such person reported as being there. Garner feels that had such a person been in contact with Long in Sarasota, kr. T. C. Scott would have known about it due to his contact with krs. Long, adding that T. C. Scott would have reported any strangers with Long to him, Ed Garner.

It is also noted that Mead is alleged to have secured a hunting dog in Florida during 1935, and in this connection Mrs. Long mentioned that they had attempted to raise hunting dogs in Florida, but it could not be done due to the ticks, fleas, etc. She was not further questioned on this point as she had declined to furnish other information and it was not felt advisable to do so at this time.

Henry Williford, State's Attorney, 6th Floor, palmer National Bank Building, Sarasota, Florida, was interviewed, and admitted associating with Long during the recent Christmas holidays, drinking with him at the Tropical Gardens, but denied that he knew the present whereabouts of Long, his business connections, contacts, friends, etc., except those in Sarasota, and also that he had ever seen anyone with Long who resembled Lead by photograph or description, and that the name of Mead or any of the aliases used by Mead were never mentioned by Long as a friend, associate or contact. The other information set forth in this report concerning the Longs was confirmed by Mr. Williford, who is a close friend of Deputy Sheriff Garner, and who will contact Garner if and when Long again appears in Sarasota, and Garner will immediately notify the Jacksonville Office.

It is recalled that previous investigation has been made in Sarasota, Florida, relative to Ruth and Ada Potts being possible contacts for the subjects of this case, as reflected in the reports of Agent dated at Jacksonville, Florida, November 23, 1935 and October 19, 1935, and in this connection Jack Knight, Post Office Clerk, Sarasota, advised that he has not observed anyone in or about the Potts residence who resembled Mead or the subjects of this case. In fact, no strangers or out-of-State autos have been observed. Further, that he has been keeping a close watch on all mail addressed to the Potts women, and has observed nothing of possible value to the instant matter. Further, that Carrier Williams has not reported anything unusual in or about the Potts residence. Jack Knight them advised that on April 11, 1936, Ruth and Ada Potts moved to the central Park Manor Hotel, which is not a good class hotel, and that all their mail has been sent there since that date, but he does not think Ruth Potts is living there, as mail has been received from her by Ada Potts recently from Chicago, Ill., the return address not now being known. At such time as this address is available, Jack Knight will supply same to the jacksonville Office.


Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Bright, 137 5th Street, garasota, Florida, advised Agent that about the middle of March, 1936, Ruth Potts left suddenly for Chicago, Ill., in a car bearing Indiana license, the make of the car being unknown, but she stated she was going to visit her brother, who was visiting in Sarasota during the past season, and reported in Agent's reports above referred to. This automobile was occupied by a man and a women but the man did not resemble the subjects of this case. This man and woman had visited at the Potts home before this departure, but their identity was never determined. Ada Potts informed Mr. and Mrs. Bright that her sister Ruth was going to Chicago, Ill., to visit a brother and may come back soon. In any event, shelleft the child's toys with the Brights. According to the Brights krs. E. A. Lead, of Sarasota, Florida, and Chicago, Ill., ceased visiting the Potts women several months ago and little is known about her at the present. However, it has been established that she is not the wife of William Elmer Mead, and this angle of the matter is not being considered further.

A cover was placed upon the mail of Mrs. charles O. Long for a period of thirty days, and the tracings are being forwarded to the Jackson-ville Office.

At the present time Mrs. Long is attempting to dispose of her home through Mr. Richardson, but he stated it would be impossible to sell same as Charles O. Long would have to sign the deed. However, if a sale can be made and Mrs. Long will produce Long to sign the deed, he will handle the matter and advise the Jacksonville Office immediately.

Deputy Sheriff Ed Garner also advised Agent that sometime in July,

1935, one aller Clark, employed by the west coast Lumber Co., sarasota, Florida, observed the photograph of Charles O. Long in a detective magazine as being wanted and identified same, bringing the matter to the attention of the Sheriff's Office, and immediately the Bureau was requested to supply any and all information concerning LCNG, and as a result thereof the Bureau supplied the following criminal record:



At the time of ascertaining that Long was in Sarasota, Florida, the Sheriff's Office communicated with the above noted points where Long was alleged to be wanted, and they all stated that they would not come for him; hence he was not arrested by the Sheriff's Office at Sarasota, Florida.

AT XORLANDO, FLORIDA:

The following is the result of investigation at Orlando, Florida, by the writer on April 21 and 22, 1936,

The records of new, closed and inactive accounts of the Florida Lational Bank at Orlando were checked by this Agent for the name of Niles, or Miles, Giles and all variations of those names, without result. Also these names were checked as possible renters of safety deposit boxes, without result. Also Savings Department accounts in the above names were checked, without result. Photographs of william Elmer Mead were displayed to the employees of this bank and, while some claimed that they believed they had seen him, no definite information was obtainable.

Asst. to the President, I. L. Cook, First National Bank, Orlando, was very cooperative in this investigation, and every available record in his bank was checked on April 21 and 22nd without locating any account which might have been Villiam Elmer Mead's in any of his known aliases, and particularly Niles, Miles and Giles, and their variations. This search included savings accounts, closed, inactive and active accounts and safety deposit box renters. Photographs of Mead were displayed to the employees of that bank also. Both Mr. E. E. Leggett, Assistant Cashier and Mr. I. L. Cook, Assistant to the President of this bank, stated that they are almost positive they have seen Mead in that bank firing the vacation period just closed in Florida, but they never could recember under what circumstances or why they remembered it. None of the employees could recall having handled a check for Mead.

AT VERO BEACH, FLORIDA:

Inquiry of Postmaster Joe Schumann and Mrs. Phyllis M. Deppen at Vero Beach resulted in no information concerning Mead at the Post Office; but by displaying his photographs to the Clerks in the Post Office, General Delivery Clerk Howard Ingalls recalled that during the past season, dates not recalled, several pieces of mail had been received at the Vero Beach Post Office addressed to --- Niles, all of which mail had remained in the Post Office for a period of time and was then returned to the senders, except one postal card which was destroyed. Mr. Ingalls stated that he could not recall at what places this mail had originated, nor from what places it had been forwarded to Vero Beach. Mr. Ingalls could not recall what initials had been used preceding the name Niles.

AT FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA:

It was ascertained by Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan that 1936 Florida license platesbeginning with the numerals two hundred elever

thousand are issued in St. Lucie County, Florida, of which Fort Pierce is the courty scat, Fert Pierce being only fourteen miles from Verc Beach. That a portion of the two hundred eleven thousand series of Florida license plates are assigned to Santa Rosa County, which is in the western part of the State. Tax Collector Orris Nobles, of St. Lucie County, at Fort Pierce, assisted Agent in checking his records of automobile license plates issued. The records disclosed that on January 15, 1936, tag number 211,000 was issued to 1r. Nobles himself, and that the tags in this series have been issued subsequent to that up to 211,700. Agent and Mr. Nobles checked the record of each and every license in this series issued for St. Lucie County but none appeared to have been issued in any name known to have been used by Mead.

At the Post Office in Fort Pierce, Florida, none of the clerks could recognize Kead from his photograph as any person they could recall seeing during the past season.

AT VERO BEACH, FLORIDA:

On April 22, 1936, Agent contacted Mr. g. A. Helseth, proprietor of the Ford Agency, and from his records nothing could be determined as to either repair work or automobiles sold to William Extend. Mr. Helseth, however, after viewing Head's photograph, stated that in some ways the photograph resembled an old man who was there during the season and who passed by his agency; that this man had a shaggy dog of some kind, but drove a 1934 Ford coach; that he never paid any particular attention to him as he assumed he was a tourist.

Agent then checked apartment houses in Vero Beach, and none of the Lianagers thereof contacted could identify Mead as having been a tenant during the season.

Vero Beach could not recall ever having seen Mead, after viewing his photographs, and stated that he has no such name as Niles, Miles, or variations thereof, in his records as a customer of that bank.

Miss Catherine D Ricks, Real Estate Agent, Helen Luly, and other real estate agents, and their employees, at Vero Beach, were contacted, and none could recall having rented an apartment to Mead during the past season.

Mr. Hoover telephoned from New York City and Mr. Hoover stated that he had reservations on the night plane for New Orleans; that Mr. Whitley is trying to make arrangements for a chartered plane which will probably leave within the next hour. It will be observed in the letters of reference that efforts were made at St. Louis, Missouri and East St. Louis, Illinois to ascertain whether Grace Goldstein was known at these places and efforts were also made to determine whether Grace Goldstein, the black Great Dane dog, or anyone else connected with this case had been observed at 4450 Peansylvania Ave., St. Louis, Missouri which is the residence of M. W. Cummings, who is employed by the Missouri Pacific Railroad. It will be recalled that a long distance telephone call was made from Telephone 3421 listed in the name of the Hatterie Hotel, Hot Springs, Arkansas to telephone number Riverside 3809 located in the Cummings home at 4450 Pennsylvania Ave., St. Louis at 11:52 P.E. on March 10, 1936. A surveillance of the premises at 4450 Peansylvania Ave. has been maintained from time to time by agents of this office since April 11, 1936, however no suspicious persons or cars have been observed in the neighborhood and there is nothing to indicate that persons at that address are any way connected with the individuals involved in this case.

It was ascertained from Mr. H. C. Nouss, Special Agent of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, St. Louis, Missouri that the following were the only long distant telephone calls made from telephone Riverside 3809 during the months of February and March, 1936:

One call to DeSoto, Missouri telephone number 722 which is listed in the name of E. C. Armbruster who resides on a rural route near DeSoto, Missouri.

One call to Collinaville, Illinois telephone number 91.

(Agent ascertained at the telephone office in Collinsville, Illinois that this telephone is listed in the name of Dr. J. H. Siegel who resides at 302 South Morrison St., Collinsville, Illinois and maintains an office at 1134 West Main St., Collinsville, Illinois.)

One call was made to telephone number Tri-City 597W.

(It was ascertained by agent at Granite City, Illinois that this telephone is listed in the name of Miss Alice M. Noon who resides in an apartment at 1415 Neidringhaus St., Granite City, Illinois and is employed as a cooking instructor by the Illinois Light and Power Company, Granite City, Illinois.)

It was ascertained from Officers of the Morality Squad of the St. Louis Police Department as well as from George Byrnes the Chief of Detectives, East St. Louis, Illinois Police Department, that they had never known anyone named Grace Goldstein nor had they known of a Jewess in St. Louis, Missouri or East St. Louis, Illinois who had operated a house of prostitution or who had been in any way connected with a place of this type.

It is observed in report of reference that long distance telephone calls were made to the Hatterie Hotel in Hot Springs, Arkansas from telephones 61 and 346 located at DeSoto, Missouri.

It was ascertained through Special Agent Nouss of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, St. Louis, Missouri that telephone number 346 in DeScto, Missouri is a three-party line, the telephones being listed and identified as follows:

346 Red - George Blank; 346 White - W. L. Whaley; 346 Blue - Forrest Mountford.

It was also ascertained from Mr. Nouss that telephone number 61 in DeSoto, Missouri is listed in the name of the Wall Motor Company, DeSoto, Missouri.

AT DE SOTO, MISSOURI

The following information was procured by agent from Mr. W. Ames, a clerk in the Post Office, who has resided in DeSoto all of his life and from other postal employees:

George Blank is 45 years of age, has resided in DeSoto all of his life, was never involved in trouble of any kind, is presently a city alderman and is amployed at the local factory of the International Shoe Company as a shoe worker.

W. L. Whaley is 50 years of age, has resided at DeSoto for approximately 20 years, enjoys a good reputation and is employed as a car repairman in the local Missouri Pacific Railmoad Shops.

Forrest Mountford is 65 years of age, enjoys a good reputation and is employed as a maintenance man in the local Missouri Pactific Railroad Shops.

The Wall Motor Company is owned by Frank Wall who is approximately 45 years of age and has resided at DeSoto for a number of years. Wall has the agency for Plymouth and DeSoto automobiles in DeSoto.

With reference to E. C. Armbruster, it will be noted in the foregoing that a telephone call was made from the Cummings residence in St. Louis to the Armbruster telephone DeSoto number 722. Armbruster is a fermer approximately 50 years of age and resides on a farm 2 3/4 miles east of town with his wife and a small child which they have adopted. Mrs. Armbruster is a sister of Mrs. M. W. Cummings of 4450 Pennsylvania Ave., St. Louis, therefore it would appear that the call made from the Cummings residence in St. Louis to the Armbruster residence in DeSoto probably had nothing to do with persons involved in this case. Armbruster is also a pleaterer and worked at various places throughout the State of Arkansas during the past winter, therefore, it would appear possible that the call from the Hatterie Hotel in Hot Springs, Arkansas to the Cummings home in St. Louis could have been made by Armbruster in view of the fact that Mr. Ames stated that Mrs. Cummings of St. Louis is an invalid and Mrs. Armbruster of DeSoto visits Mrs. Cummings frequently. Mr. Ames stated that M. W. Cummings and his wife who formerly resided at DeSoto, Missouri enjoyed good reputations there as do Armbruster and his wife. He further stated that Armbruster formerly resided at Granite City, Illinois and that possibly Armbruster and the Cummings have relatives at Granite City Illinois, however he did not know whether Miss Alice M. Noon of Granite City, Illinois who received a telephone call from the Cummings residence, as indicated in the foregoing, is connected with either one of these families. Armbruster is a native of DeSoto, Missouri and his daughter Hester Armbruster formerly taught in the public schools there.

DeSote, Missouri is a town of only 5,000 population and neither Mr. Ames nor any of the other Post Office emplyees, all of whom had resided in DeSote for a great number of years, had known anyone named Barbara Bradley. With the assistance of Mr. Ames, agent conducted an extensive investigation of persons employed at the Wall Motor Company and persons residing in the vicinity of the party line 346; also in connection with various girls named Barbara residing at DeSote however, no information of value was procured regarding anyone who possibly had connections at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Upon checking the records at the local temephone office, of all of the calls made during the latter part of March, 1936, it was ascertained that on March 30, 1936 a call was made from telephone number

246, which is a public booth located in the office of the telephone company, to telephone number 38 Hot Springs, Arkanses, also to telephone number 3421 Hot Springs, Arkanses, however the parties did not talk, owing to the fact that the Hot Springs party refused to accept the charges. Further examination of the records in the office of the telephone company revealed the following information:

One Barbara Bradley placed a call at public telephone booth 246 to one McLochlon room #180 Kingsway Hotel, Hot Springs, Arkansas telephone number 38 sometime after 6:00 P.M. on March 30, 1936, however either McLochlon or the person answering the telephone number 38, refused to accept the charge and the parties did not talk.

At 2:35 P.M. on March 30, 1936 Barbara Bradley placed a call at telephone number 246 to telephone number 3421 Hot Springs, Arkansas asking for Grace Goldstein. She was advised that Grace was out. She then asked for Mary of Pauline but the person at Hot Springs refused to accept the charge and no conversation took place.

Barbara Bradley then endeavored to reach one Joe Binder at telephone number 1412 Hot Springs, Arkansas but he likewise refused to accept the charge and no conversation occurred.

A further exemination of the records revealed that although Barbara Bradley did not succeed in talking to anyone from telephone number 246, she did talk to Grace Goldstein at telephone 3421 Hot Springs from telephone number 61 located in the office of the Wall Motor Company in DeSoto at 7:10 P.M. on March 30, 1936 at which time Berbara paid eighty cents for the call plus ten cents tax.

Miss Iva Bush, the telephone operator on duty when sttempts were made by Barbara Bradley to communicate with persons in Hot Springs from telephone number 246, was interviewed and stated she remembered the incident well and that the best description she could furnish of the girl giving the name Barbara Bradley is that she is about 20 years of age (it was subsequently ascertained that Barbara Bradley is 18 years of age), has red hair, is small and well built, probably has blue eyes, wears heavy make-up, was well dressed in a gray suit and spoke of having a small child which she left with a Mrs. Maniss while she was at the telephone office. In explanation of her attempts to reach the persons at Hot Springs, Barbara Pradley told Miss Bush that she did not have a cent and wanted to go to Hot Springs. Miss Bush stated that Barbara Bradley, in her opinion, had not resided at DeSoto for any length of time as she, Miss Bush, knows virtually everyone residing in DeSoto.

Thereafter, agent interviewed Mrs. T. B. Maniss and Mrs. John Maniss of DeSoto who stated they had never heard of Barbara Bradley and had kept no children for anyone on March 30, 1936.

Mr. Frank Wall and several employees of the Wall Motor Company were interviewed and it was ascertained that the person giving the name Barbara Bradley had called someone in Hot Springs, Arkansas on March 30, 1936 at which time she peid for the call as indicated in the foregoing; that very little of the conversation was heard by persons in the office of the Wall Motor Company, however it was believed that Barbara Bradley was endeavoring to induce the person in Hot Springs to accommodate her in some manner or deliver a message, owing to the fact that the conversation ended when Barbara Bradley said "So, you won't do it then".

It was ascertained from Mr. Wall that Barbara Bradley whom he knew by the name of Grace Voisey, had left DeSoto when she was a small child, with her mother who at that time was Mrs. Ernest Voisey and that Grace Voisey had visited DeSoto only occasionally since she left and on such occasions she visited Mrs. Grace Manning, wife of Bob Manning, 812 South Main St.; that it was Mrs. Manning and not Mrs. Maniss who kept the small child for Grace Voisey on March 30, 1936. Mr. Wall further stated that Grace Voisey's mother had re-married a number of years ago and he knew nothing regarding her present husband, however Ernest Voisey presently resides at DeSoto, Missouri. Mr. Wall advised agent not to contact Ernest Voisey as he probably would furnish no information of value regarding Grace Voisey, her mother or their associates. Mr. Wall also stated that the telephone call was made from his place of business on Sunday and on the following Wednesday Grace Voisey borrowed \$1.75 from him and supposedly left that night on a Missouri Pacific Train for Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Mr. Wall stated that Grace Voisey had been in his place of business on one or two occasions since January 1, 1936, with an individual who was unknown to Mr. Wall or his employees, for minor repairs and parts on a 1935 model black Ford Coach bearing Indiana license plates, number unknown, the only information available being

that a door handle had been installed on the Ford Coach and no records were kept of the motor number owing to the fact that it was a cash sale; however, it was ascertained that the individual known as Joe Binder represented himself to Mr. Wall as a salesman for Star Novelties and that cardboards or paper stickers on the rear side windows of the Ford Coach bore either the lettering "Star Novelties" or Star Merchandise". It was also ascertained that Binder had a supply of rezor blades, handkerchiefs and other miscellaneous small articles. Binder indicated to Mr. Mall that he would like to rent some cabins which Mr. Wall owns near DeSoto and open a gambling house near the cabins, stating that he was also a fight promoter and specifically mentioned that he promoted chieken fights, according to Mr. Wall, and endeavored to interest Mr. Wall in the gembling house proposition, however, Mr. Wall manifested no interest in the proposition and Binder left DeSoto efter having been there three or four days. Mr. Wall stated he was suspicious of Binder owing to the fact that he did not attempt to sell any of his merchandise in DeSoto and on the occasion when he paid for the door handle he wrote a check on the American Bank of DeSoto, but on the following day brought in cash for the door handle and destroyed the check. Agent subsequently ascertained at the American Bank, which is the only bank in DeSoto, that Binder hed never had an account there under any of his aliases and was unknown at the bank. Mr. Wall also advised agent that Binder appeared to be well supplied with money and was well dressed.

Photographs of Milton Lett, Sam Coker, Grace Goldstein, Fred Hunter, Karpis and Campbell were exhibited to Mr. Wall and his shop amployees and they immediately stated that the photograph of Fred Hunter bears a strong resemblance to Joe Binder, however that Joe Binder appeared somewhat older than the photograph of Fred Hunter, also that Binder looks more "slicked up" than the photograph of Fred Hunter. The shop foreman as well as another shop employee at the Wall Motor Company, stated, upon observing the photograph of Fred Hunter "If that's not Joe Binder, it must be his twin brother".

Mr. Wall, who is well acquainted with Mrs. Grace Manning, wife of Bob Manning, accompanied agent to the Manning residence where Mrs. Manning was interviewed. Mr. Wall had previously a dvised agent that Mrs. Manning was employed in the home of Grace Voisey's mother a number of years ago when Grace Voisey was a small child.

Mrs. Manning stated that she had never seen the individual known to her as Joe Binder and the busband of Grace Voisey until sometime during the month of January or February, 1936 when he

arrived in DeSoto in the aforementioned automobile with Grace Voisey. She also stated that she had not seen Grace Voisey for a period of approximately two or three years prior to that time; that on the first occasion when Binder and Grace Voisey came to DeSoto, they stopped for a day at some rooms located above the Theodoro Cafe in DeSoto and from the conversations she had with them, they claimed that they had come from some place in Indiana and were on their way to visit some of Binder's relatives in California, but upon leaving DeSoto, they stopped at Hot Springs, Arkansas because they were broke. Mrs. Manning seemed to be unable to approximate the dates on which these individuals were in DeSoto but stated that, to the best of her recollection, they were in DeSoto on the Sunday before Easter at which time they stopped for two or three nights at the Theodoro Rooms, after which Binder went back to Hot Springs, Arkansas in his automobile and Grace Voisey went by way of bus to some point in Indiana where her mother Mrs. Pearl Eahler resides. She stated that two or three days leter, Grace Voisey returned by bus from the place in Indiana bringing with her a baby boy approximately 2 g years of age which, according to the story told by Grace Voisey, is Grace Voisey's child and the son of Joe Binder. She stated that Grace Voisey said this child's name is Harold Joseph Binder and that Grace Voisey and her mother, Mrs. Pearl Mahler, had quite a fight over the custody of the child and that Grace Voisey forcibly took the child from Mrs. Mahler and returned it to DeSoto on the aforementioned occasion. Mrs. Manning stated that she indicated to Grace Voisey that she did not believe Grace and Joe were married whereupon Grace exhibited to her a marriage license, but she, Mrs. Manning, was "so taken off my feet to see the marriage license" that she did not notice the names on the marriage license or the name of the State where it was issued. Grace Voisey told Mrs. Manning that she and Joe Binder had been married three or four years and Joe Binder indicated to Mrs. Manning that he was from Chicago, Illinois but furnished no information regarding his occupation or connections except to state that he was planning on renting some cabins near DeSoto and also indicated to Mrs. Manning that he was selling the merchandise referred to in the foregoing. Mrs. Manning had never heard Grace Voisey using the name Barbara Bradley but exhibited to agent a letter which she had received from Grace Voisey postmarked "Hot Springs, Arkansas, March 6, 1936" and bearing the return address "Mrs. Grace Binder, Hot Springs, Arkansas". She also had told Mrs. Manning on another occasion that her mail should be addressed to Mrs. Grace Binder, c/o Barbara Bradley, 511 Quapaw St., Hot Springs, Arkansas, however, Mrs. Manning assumed that Berbara Bradley was an associate of Grace Yoisey at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Mrs. Manning stated that prior to the time Grace left DeSoto with the eforementioned child for Hot Springs, Arkansas, which, to the best of her recollection was on Wednesday night, April 1, 1936, Joe

Binder had left for Hot Springs, Arkansas in the Ford automobile and Grace had indicated to Mrs. Manning that Joe had gotten into trouble at Hot Springs, and was in jail. She stated that she had been unable to determine what the nature of the trouble was but remembered that upon receipt of a telegram from Joe Binder, Grace had wept until she was almost hysterical. In this connection, Mrs. Manning stated that Grace had told her she had Joe "wrapped around her finger" and that he would immediately return to DeSoto if she sent him a telegram to do so, however Grace Voisey had sent him a telegram at Hot Springs, Arkansas on March 28, 1936 telling him that she was sick and requesting that he return to DeSoto but that he refused to do so stating that he had no money. Mrs. Manning exhibited to agent a copy of this telegram which will be hereinefter mentioned.

Photographs of the individuals which were exhibited to the employees of the Wall Motor Company were also exhibited to Mrs. Menning but she stated that none of these photographs bore a resemblence to Joe Binder, adding that although the description of Fred _Hunter is somewhat similar to that of Joe Binder, Fred Hunter has gray eyes whereas she is positive that Joe Binder has dark brown eyes. Krs. Memning stated that she did not know what type of work Joe Binder is engaged in at Hot Springs, Arkansas and has not heard from them since they left DeSoto, however she became quite attached to Grace Voisey's child and is anxious to have Grace Voisey and particularly the child returned to DeSoto, Missouri. She stated that Grace Voisey manifested very little affection for the child while she was in DeSoto and it is Mrs. Manning's opinion that Grace Voisey took the child away from her mother "for spite only". Mrs. Manning stated that she would assist agent in any way possible in an effort to locate Grace Voisey and ascertain what disposition she made of the child and furnished agent with a photograph of Grace Voisey and another girl, name unknown, which was taken in front of a log cabin in Hot Springs, Arkansas bearing the following lettering: "Our Summer Home in Hot Springs, 216 Central Ave. This photograph is being forwarded to the Little Rock Office and it is requested that it be returned to the St. Louis Office immediately upon completion of investigation, as Mrs. Manning insisted that the photograph be returned to here

Mrs. Manning stated she knew nothing whatever regarding Joe Binder or his connections but is now of the opinion that Grace Voisey should not associate with him any longer and assured agent that she will communicate with this office immediately upon receipt of information concerning their present whereabouts and indicated that she believes they will return to DeSoto, Missouri sometime within the .

next month or so.

It was ascertained from Mr. W. O. Chalk at the office of the Western Union Telegraph Company located in the Missouri Pacific Railroad station that at 8:12 P.M. on March 27, 1936 the following telegram was sent to Joe Binder, Lane Apartments, Hot Springs, Arkansas:

*COME AT ONCE YOUR WIFE IS SICK

(signed) BOB MANNING

Mr. Chalk stated that this telegram apparently was delivered to the telegraph office but knew nothing with reference to the identity of the persons who delivered the telegram to that office.

At 2:25 P.M. on March 28, 1936 another telegram was telephoned to the Western Union Telegraph office to be sent to Joe Binder at the same address at Hot Springs, Arkansas as follows:

"YOU MUST COME INMEDIATELY

(signed) BOB

At 1:20 P.M. on March 28, 1936 the following telegram was received by the Western Union Telegraph Company at DeSoto from Hot Springs, Arkansas:

"BOB MANNING c/o WESTEPN UNION, DE SOTO, MISSOURI

CANNOT COME HAVE NO MONEY SHE CAN GET WELL LOVE

JOE

It was ascertained from Mrs. Menning that Grace Voisey had not been sick at all during the time she was in DeSoto and Mrs. Manning did not know why she wanted Binder to return to DeSoto but stated it was her impression that Grace Voisey merely wanted to show the Mannings that "she had Joe wrapped around her finger".

Mrs. Manning stated that she did not know the name of the place where Grace Voisey's mother resides in Indiana but stated that

possibly Mr. Wall could procure this information from Grace Voisey's grandmother who resides with Ernest Voisey, therefore Mr. Wall made discreet inquiry of Mrs. Voisey, the grandmother and ascertained that the address of Grace Voisey's mother is as follows:

Mrs. Pearl Mahler 1333 East Sireon St., South Bend, Indiana.

It was ascertained from Jim Theodore who operates the Theodoro Cafe, that Binder and Grace Voisey had rented rooms above this cafe during February, 1936 and again in March, 1936 using different names on each occasion and on the last occasion Theodore stated that Binder left without paying his room rent. Theodore permitted agent to examine his register which indicates that on February 19, 1936 Binder and Grace Voisey registered as Mr. and Mrs. I. Chipman and remained at that address until February 24, 1936 at which time they apparently left town.

On March 23, 1936 they again registered at the rooms as Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Sinder from Little Rock, Arkenses and according to Theodore on the last occasion they remained only one night at the rooms. Theodore, as well as the girl who works in the restaurant and who witnessed the registrations, said that Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Shipman and Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Binder are identical and that the girl actually wrote the names in the register on each occasion. They stated that Binder associated with no one while he was around the restaurant except that he occasionally talked to Theodore at which time he said that he was a salesman for ballgame machines and that he was attempting to sell one of these machines to Bill Christopher who operates a tavern in DeSoto. It was the opinion of Theodore as well as the girl employed in the restaurant, that the photograph of Fred Hunter bears a resemblance to Binder, however they could not state positively that Binder and Hunter are identical. The photograph of Hunter was exhibited to Bill Christopher who as indicated in the foregoing, operates a tavern in DeSoto and he stated that, positively, Hunter and Binder are not identical. Christopher stated that Binder had been in his place on one or two occasions while he was in DeSoto and attempted to sell him a baseball machine, the name of which he did not remember, and that he actually left one of these machines in the tavern for two or three days after which he took it away in the aforementioned Ford Coach. In this connection, Christopher, whose eyesight is poor, admitted that he did not even know whether Joe Binder is

identical with the individual who left the machine at his place as he did not know this individual and had never seen him before.

Mr. Wall and other amployees at his place of business describe Joe Binder as fitting the description of Fred Hunter set forth in the letter from the Cleveland Office to the St. Louis Office dated April 10, 1956, however Mrs. Manning described Binder as follows:

Age Approximately 30
Height 5 feet V
Weight approximately 150
Eyes Dark brown
Hair Black
Complexion Fair
Dress Fairly Well dressed.

She could furnish no additional information with reference to his description or clothing.

It was ascertained at the Theodoro Cafe that Binder and Grace Voisey had two or three traveling bags, however no one at that address could furnish any information with reference to the contents of these bags.

Photographs of the aforementioned individuals including Grace Goldstein, were exhibited to the several persons interviewed at DeSoto, however they had never seen any of these individuals.

In view of the information developed at DeSoto with reference to telephone number 246, and also in view of the information received from the telephone company of DeSoto to the effect that no telephone calls had been made to Hot Springs, Arkansas from telephone number 346 in DeSoto, it is believed that the telephone company at Hot Springs, Arkansas probably furnished the agent from the Little Rock Office with the wrong telephone number and that in fact all calls were made over DeSoto telephone number 246.

With reference to the 1936 model four-door marcon Buick Sedan motor #63052198 serial #2895972, a letter was addressed to the office of the Secretary of State at Springfield, Illinois and on April 9, 1936 this office received a letter from the office of the Secretary of State, Springfield, Illinois to the effect that a search of the records failed to disclose any information regarding this automobile. Thereafter, Special Agent V. J. Wolfe of this office personally placed a stop notice on this automobile in the files of the office of the Secretary of State, Springfield, Illinois.

With reference to the teletype message from the Kansas City Office to the St. Louis Office dated April 7, 1936 to the effect that information had been received from the Missouri State Highway Patrol that a marcon Buick bearing Arkansas license plates had been seen at Carthage, Missouri proceeding on Highway 66 in the direction of St. Louis and requesting a check of tourist camps, a careful surveillence was maintained along Highway 66 at St. Clair, Missouri from 6:30 P.M. on April 7, 1936 to 1:00 A.M. April 8, 1936 and tourist camps, taverns and readhouses from St. Louis, Missouri to Sullivan, Missouri along Highway 66 were also checked but no information was obtained regarding the automobile or the persons mentioned. A telegram was also received from the Kansas City Office during the night of April 7, 1936 advising it had been ascertained that the automobile referred to was blue in color instead of marcon and contained six men but no guns had been observed in the possession of these men.

On April 25, 1936 a letter was received from Postmaster, Urbana, Illinois furnishing the following information with reference to mail received by Mrs. Hill, however he did not submit tracings on this mail:

With reference to the mail cover placed upon the mail of M. W. Cummings, 4450 Pennsylvania Ave., St. Louis, Missouri several mail tracings have been received bearing the return address of the local light and power and telephone companies and one of two tracings from letters addressed to the Cummings family by insurance companies, however the only letters received from points outside of the City of St. Louis are as follows:

Letter from J. 1. White, 124 North 7th St., Poplar Bluff, Missouri addressed to M. W. Cummings;

Letter postmerked "Tiff, Missouri, April 15, 1936" addressed to Mrs. & Mrs. M. H. Cummings bearing me return address.

The tracings from the two letters received by the Cummings family from Tiff, Missouri and Poplar Bluff, Missouri are likewise being transmitted herewith to the office of origin.

On April 23, 1936 Acting Chief of Police Kly Sliger, Poplar Bluff, Missouri telephonically advised this office that he had just learned through a cab driver that on April 17, 18, 19 and 20, 1936 two men, one of whom was 25 to 27 years of age and the other 30 to 35 years of age, stopped at a tourist camp on the outskirts of Poplar Bluff, at which time they had in their possession a 1936 model blue terraplane coupe bearing Hebraska license, the first three numbers of which it was believed, were "157". Mr. Sliger stated that he had no photograph of Harry Campbell, however the cab driver and others had stated that the photograph of Karpis bore a strong resemblance to the younger individual and that one of these individuals had registered at the tourist camp as W. Wich. He stated that during the late afternoon of April 20, 1936, these individuals left the tourist camp proceeding in the direction of Arkansas and advised persons at the tourist camp that they were going to Hot Springs, Arkansas. He further stated that persons at the tourist camp had advised him that these individuals had parked their car in the woods near the tourist camp during

their stay there and did not leave the tourist camp except at night while they were stopping there. One of the individuals had told persons at the tourist camp that he had lost \$1,500 gambling while in St. Louis and also had been robbed of \$700 in St. Louis. Mr. Sliger stated that he had been unable to procure any additional information with reference to the destination of these individuals but that he would be glad to investigate the matter thoroughly with an agent from this office.

The reporting agent immediately proceeded to Poplar Bluff and in company with Mr. Sliger, exhibited photographs of Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Sam Coker, Milton Lettand Fred Funter to Tom Craft who operates the dance hall and tourist camp, as well as to several girls and other employees at the dance hall. All of the persons interviewed, stated that the individual who used the name James Strong bore a resemblance to Karpis and Tom Craft stated that the other individual who used the name W. Wich resembled Harry Campbell, however, it was ascertained that Strong and Wich danced every night at the dance hall and mixed freely with the growds. It was ascertained from Mr. Sliger that James Strong sent a telegram to a bank in North Platte, Nebraska on April 20, 1936 and that he subsequently received some money by telegram from that bank. Therefore, Mr. C. V. Harris of the Western Union Telegraph Company was interviewed and stated that on April 20, 1936 one James Strong had sent a telegram to the First National Bank of North Platte, Nebraska requesting that all the money which he had on deposit at that bank be forwarded to him by Western Union Telegraph. On the same date the First National Bank of North Platte, Nebraska wired him \$21.85 which, apparently, was all the money he had on deposit in that bank in view of the fact that no message was sent to Strong by the bank. Mr. Harris wrote out the message to the First National Bank at North Platte, Nebraska for Strong at the latter's request and stated that in view of the fact that Strong was a stranger to him and the First National Bank of North Platte, Nebraska did not waive identity of the person to whom the money was sent, it was necessary for him to ask Strong to identify himself. He stated that Strong produced a North Ph tte, Nebraska Driver's license bearing his name and that he, Mr. Harris, was satisfied with the identification, therefore he delivered the money to Strong. The following descriptions of Strong and Wich were procured from Mr. Harris, Tom Craft and other persons interviewed at the Tourist Camp:

Mr. Craft stated that these individuals ate nothing but hamburgers while they were at the tourist camp and in view of the telegram to the bank in North Platte, Nebraska, it is believed they had very little money. It was also ascertained from Mr. Craft and others at the tourist samp, that since the matter was originally reported to Mr. Sliger, the witnesses have decided that the automobile in which these individuals were riding, was a blue Oldsmobile Coupe and not a blue Terraplane Coupe.

A thorough examination was made by agent of the two cabins occupied by these individuals in an effort to locate latent finger-prints or other evidence of their identities, however the cabins had been cleaned up since they left and it was ascertained that no newspapers, magazines or other items were left in the cabins by Wich and Strong. A fruit jar which was used by Strong and Wich to take water to the cabins at night, was procured and returned to the St. Louis Office of the Bureau and efforts are being made to develop latent fingerprints thereon.

In view of the manner in which these individuals mingled with the crowds at the dances, it does not appear that they are idensitical with Karpis and Campbell, however the Omaha Office is being requested to ascertain the identity of James Strong through the First National Bank of North Platte, Mebraska.

On April 25, 1936, Special Agent R. C. Suran of the Chicago Office telephonically advised Special Agent G. B. Norris of the St. Louis Office that information had been received indicating that Grace Goldstein had sent a letter from Springfield, Illinois on April 15, 1936 to her brother. Special Agent Suran requested that this office conduct

appropriate investigation at Springfield, Illinois and suggested that possibly the Post Office Inspectors had been actively engaged in the investigation of this phase of the case at Springfield, Illinois.

Special Agent Hayne A. Thompson and Special Agent (A) G. A. Stevens were immediately dispatched to Springfield, Illinois to conduct investigation there and subsequently submitted the following memorandum:

At Springfield, Illinois on April 25, 1936 in response te a telephone call received by Special Agent G. M. Norris, Special Agent Thompson and the writer contacted Mrs. J. A. Thompson in the absence of her husband, Post Office Inspector, 1340 South Walnut Street, Springfield, Illinois. Mrs. Thompson stated that her husband had left Springfield on April 24 in a considerable hurry and told her that he was going to Chicago and would probably proceed from there to Wisconsin. He did not tell her the case he was working on and she had no idea as to what it might be and could only state that he left in a big hurry. She did not know of any other Post Office Inspectors having been or then working in Springfield on special assignment and had not heard of envone named Goldstein.

E. F. Money, 3220 South Third Street, Springfield, Illinois stated that he is an assistant of Thompson; that he knew that Thompson departed on April 24 for Wisconsin to work on a case in that state and that it was not in regard to the mail robbery in Ohio and had nothing to do with Goldstein. That he had never heard of the said Grace Goldstein and that his office had not received any information to the effect that she was in Springfield.

Grace Goldstein was not known or registered at the leading hotels in Springfield, -- St. Kicholas Hotel, Abraham Lincoln Hotel, Leland Hotel.

At this point, information was received from Mr. Morris that it had been reported that Goldstein was probably back in the State of Arkansas and the investigation was discontinued.

On April 19, 1936 Mr. Thomas Narcrosse, 6352 Clayton Road, Richmond Haights, Missouri, Deputy Constable #31 of that city, came to the

St. Louis Office and requested that he be shown photographs of Karpis and Campbell. All of the various photographs of the subjects in this case were exhibited to Mr. Narcrosse who stated that a confidential informant whose name he refused to disclose told him that he had seen Karpis and Campbell at a particular place in St. Louis County within the last two weeks. He further stated that this informant has proved reliable in the past and that he, Narcrosse, was attempting to procure additional information, but that he is working independently as he fears a leak through local officials in Richmond Heights. He further stated that crime detection is his hobby and that he not be contacted through the Richmond Heights Police. He also requested that he not be called at his home, stating that if nothing developed from his investigation he would come to the St. Louis Office and discuss the matter with Special Agent in Charge Jay C. Newman.

Mr. Narcrosse was subsequently interviewed by Special Agent in Cherge Newman, Special Agent G. B. Norris and reporting agent and it was ascertained that the place to which he had reference in St. Louis County is known as little creve Coeur Lake and that the roadhouse or hotel where Karpis and Campbell were supposed to have been seen, is operated by one Duffy. Investigation was subsequently made at Little Creve Coeur Lake by Special Agent H. F. Small and Special Agent (A) C. M. Tyner who submitted a memorandum which is being incorporated herein as follows:

In view of the above information it was ascertained by Agent D. W. Keher that the particular places referred to by Marcrosse in his statement, was a place known as Duffy's Hotel and a tavern operated by Dar Zimmer both places being operated about 13 miles north of St. Louis in a recreational district named Creve Coeur Lake both places being well known in the vicinity and jointly operated by Duffy and Zimmer, agent Maher further ascertained from Harry Newbold, Deputy Sheriff, St. Louis County that both Duffy and Zimmer bear unsavory reputations and that both places had been raided several times for illicit liquor and also for gambling.

On Saturday night, April 25, 1936, Special Agent C. M. Tyner and the writer visited the above mentioned places arriving at the Duffy establishment at 10 P.M.

It might be mentioned that both places are situated about 5 miles from the main Creve Coeur road and in an easterly direction from the last mentioned road. There are ample signs along the road to easily guide a person not familiar with the section to the respective places.

Before entering the grounds on which the Duffy hotel is located, the road passes the Dan Zimmer tavern and both places are within close proximity being not more than a quarter of a mile apart.

The Duffy hotel is a large white frame establishment situated in the center of a large picnic ground. The hotel has twenty two rooms and did not give the appearance that any permanent guests were residing there.

Dinners were ordered at this hotel and during the course the writer became quite friendly with Mrs. Michael J. Duffy, wife of the proprietor end a bartender named Alfred, the only bartender at the place. During the conversation with Mrs. Duffy opportunity was had to inspect the kitchen, the bar, and the main dining room. The Duffys have a Negress about 20 years of age cooking for the place and she was the only one observed in the kitchen.

Mrs. Duffy informed that her husband Michael J. Duffy had been ill with influenza the past five days and had been confined to his bed in the upsteirs portion of the hotel. Consequently it was impossible to view him.

Mrs. Duffy stated that she and her husband have operated the Duffy hotel the past fifteen years end that Dan Zimmer had also operated the Zimmer tavern for about the same length of time; that during the winter months their business was very poor but during the summer months, many St. Louis people come to spend the week end and enjoy the change from city life; that the large picnic grounds in the summer is used a great deal by picnicers and that it was a favorite place for young people to have weiner and marsh-mallow roasts, at night.

Mrs. Duffy further advised that on Saturday and Sunday nights commencing May 1, 1936, that dances would be held during the summer which is quite an attraction and financially successful for the establishment.

It might be mentioned that there are not any tourist cabins on the ground and that no gambling was being conducted, Mrs. Duffy advising that there was not sufficient trade to warrant the same.

During the course of the night or from 10 P.M. to 1:00 A.M. there were not more than 15 people visiting the Duffy place and these had all the indications of being local people, most of them being of high school

age who had been having weiner roasts on the grounds.

During the entire time there was no one that came to the place that appeared the least suspicious and there was mothing about the place that would leave the impression that it would be a rendezvous for criminals.

Due to the fact that it is somewhat isolated it could undoubtedly be used for an excellent hide-out, as there is a large heavily
wooded area surrounding the place. But without the customary attractions
it is doubtful that the Barker-Karpis mob would frequent such a place unless it would be a case of dire necessity.

Although Agent Tyner and the writer beceme quite friendly with Mrs. Duffy and could again visit the place without creating any suspicion, it was not considered feasible to exhibit any photographs of the Barker-Karpis gang to her at this time. Mrs. Duffy left the impression that she would cooperate with the Bureau as there is nothing about her that would appear the least deceptive.

Mrs. Duffy advised the writer that she had been in Mismi, Fla. this winter on a short visit with her husband, Michael Duffy, but that due to the inclement weather and poor drinking water she became very sick which necessitated her return to St. Louis, before the time expired that she had planned on their visit. On leaving Duffys at 1:00 A.M., the Den Zimmer tavern was visited until 2 A.M. This is a small tavern having a bar and dispensing short orders. This tavern is passed on approaching Duffy's place and it does not appear that it is a favorite place for the night life public, as there are no attractions outside of the bar.

With the exception of Dan Zimmer and a bar tender, the only ones to come to this tavern was a blonde woman about 30 years of age and her companion, who in no manner resembled any of the Barker-Karpis mob. These parties with Zimmer & the bar tender engaged in a conversation for a considerable length of time at the bar, which conversation contained no information of value relative to this case.

There were not any tourist cabins on the Zimmer premises observed which would indicate that tourists could stay in such manner at this place.

In view of the fact that there was nothing the least bit suspicious about this place, agents departed from this place shortly after 2 A.M.



Reference is made to the telephone conversation on this date between Mr. Newman, of the Supply Division, and Special agent A. Schroeder, of this office, relative to the 50,000 circulars of Mahan which were requested by this office, 16,000 of which have already been received.

As explained to Mr. Newman, I have presently on hand 50,000 addressed envelopes awaiting distribution in this district, and maturally, in order to save time, labor, and expense, I believe it expedient to wait until the 34,000 circulars of Mahan arrive in order that those of Mahan, Karpis, and Campbell may be distributed simultaneously. Mr. Newman stated that the remaining 54,000 circulars of Mahan would be forwarded to this office at an early date, and that the Bureau would fold the same. You can readily appreciate that if these circulars are received at this office in a folded condition, it would greatly facilitate the distribution inasmuch as at the present time it will be necessary to distribute 150,000 circulars, all told, of Mahan, Karpis, and Campbell. I believe it would be highly feasible if the Bureau would immediately forward to this office 34,000 folded circulars each of Campbell and Karpis, and have this office return the circulars which ere in an unfolded condition.

For your information, 16,000 circulars each of Karpis and Campbell will have been folded by the office personnel by Sunday, May 3rd, which will leave a balance of 54,000 unfolded circulars each of Campbell and Karpis. It is believed, and I am confident that you will agree with me, that it will be of material assistance to this office if the Bureau will forward immediately the 34,000 folded circulars each of Campbell and Karpis, and allow me to return to the Bureau the 54,000 unfolded circulars each of Campbell and Karpis.

A career of plunder, pillage and despoliation, which was first earmarked by an arrest on February R5, 1976, initiated the long criminal record of Alvin Karpis, who was received on this date at the State Industrial Reformatory, Hutchinson, Kansas, on a charge of second degree murder, to which he was sentenced to serve a term of ten years in this Institution.

Born in Montreel, Canada on August 10, 1907 of immigrant parents sho resided in that portion of Ru sia which is now Lithuania, Alvia Karpis, christened Alvin Karpavics, was taken by his family which migrated to the United States and settled in Topeka, Kansas when Karpis was about two years old. His father was employed by the Santa Fe railroad for a number of years as a painter. In 1925 the Karpavics family moved to Chicago, Illinois and it was at this point that Alvin began his employment in various bakery shops, where he continued working for a period of over a year. Not being strong physically and advised by his doctor of a defective heart, which condition required complete rest, Alvin Karpis wont back to Topeka, Kansas, where he remided with his eldest sister. It was during this period that he became involved in his first difficulty with law enforcement officers. Having received the sentence previously mention. Larpis escaped from the Institution wherein he was confined on March &, 1929 and joined his parents in Chicago, Ill nois, during which time he remained at home for a period less than a year, being employed by a medical concern.

On March 25, 1930, a little over a year after his escape from the State Industrial Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas where he was sentenced on February 25, 1925, he was arrested in Kansas City, Missouri for auto largeny and safe blowing and was returned to the State Industrial Reformatory at Mutchinson, Kansas as an escaped prisoner, being transferred on May 19, 1930 to the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lensing, Kansas to serve the balance of his term.

Following his release from the Kansas State Penitentiary on May \$1, 1981, Karpis immediately associated himself with such persons as Frank Mash, Francis Keating, Thomas Holden, Arthur R. "Doe" Barker, Vernon C. Miller, Fred and Kate Barker and many others. He engaged in numerous bank robberies in the middle west. His apprehension was sought by the Cheriff's Office in West Plains, Missouri for the murder of Sheriff C. R. Kelley on December 19, 1951. Thereefter Karpis allied himself with a gang of midwestern desparadoes which has since become known as the "Karpis-Barker" gang. This gang has been responsible for many of the major bank robberies in the middle western states which occurred subsequent to

his release from the Kansas State Penitentiary and his arrest on June 10, 1951 at Tulse, Oklahoma on a charge of burglary, where he was delivered to the authorities at Oksulgee, Oklahoma and paroled from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary to which he was sentenced on September 11, 1951 for a term of four years.

On March 2:, 1934 the Attorney General of the United States announced that Karpis had been identified as one of the kidnepers of Edward George Bremer, President of the Commercial State Bank at St. Paul, Minnesota, who was kidnaped on the morning of January 17, 1934 at the intersection of Lexington and Goodrich Avenues, St. Paul, Minnesota, shortly after he had taken his little daughter to school. This abduction was effected by several members of the Karpis-Barker gang, many of whom have already been prosecuted. Among those who had been prosecuted in the Bremer case are Arthur R. Doo' Barker, Elmer Farmer and Bryan Bolton, who are also implicated in the abduction of Milliam A. Hamm, Jr., President of the Theodore Hamm Brewing Company, a wealthy resident of St. Paul, Minnesota, who was kidnaped about 12:45 P.M. on Thursday, June 15, 1933, immediately after he had departed from his office at the brewery for lumeheem.

On January 22, 1935 a Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota returned indictments against several members of the Karpis-Barker gang. Karpis was named in two indictments, the first charging his and others with the substantive offense of kidnaping Mr. Bremer, the second charging him and others with conspiracy to kidnap Mr. Bremer.

On April 22, 1956 a Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota returned indictments against Alvin Karpis and others, charging these persons with conspiracy to kidnap Mr. Haam and also charging them with the substantive offense of kidnaping. On this same date, Homer S. Cummings, Attorney General of the United States, under the authority vested in him by an Act of Congress approved June 6, 1934, offered a reward of \$5,000 for information furnished to a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, which results in the apprehension of Alvin Karpis.

According to the records of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Karpis, as Bo. 7071, was received at the State Industrial Reformatory, Butchinson, Kansas, on February 25, 1916, for the crime of burglary—second degree, to serve a sentence of ten years. He escaped on March 9, 1919 and was returned to the reformatory on March 25, 1950, having been arrested as Raymond Hadley, Bo. 17902, by the Kansas City, Misrouri Police Department on March 25, 1950, on charges of larceny—auto, and safeblowing. Karpis was transferred to the State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, on May 19, 1950, under his correct name,

as Ho. 1559, to sorve the balance of his sentence for the crime of burglary, second degree. As George Haller, No. 8008, Karpis was arrested by the Police Department at Tules, Oklahoma, on June 10, 1931, on charges of investigation—burglary. He was surrendered to the Police Department at Okmulgee, Oklahoma, where, as A. Korpis, No. 1609, he was charged with burglary. On September 11, 1931, Karpis was found guilty of the burglary charges and was sentenced to four years and immediately placed on percle by the Court.

Arthur RJ Barker and Volney Davis are serving life sentences at Alcatras Island Penitentiary, as a result of their participating in the Bremer kidnaping. Bryan Bolton was convicted on April 15, 1935 for his participation in this kidnaping, (and at the present time is under indictment in connection with the kidnaping of Mr. Hama) Elmer Farmer, who is presently confined in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, where he is serving a twenty-year sentence for his participation in the Bremer kidnaping, has also been indicted in the Hamm kidnaping. Fred Barker and Fred Goets are deceased.

Bryan Bolton, Arthur R. Barker and Elmer Farmer, who were members of the Karpis-Barker gang and are presently serving sentences imposed as a result of their participation in the Bremer kidnaping case, have been indicted, together with Alvin Karpis, John P. Peifer, Edmund C. Bartholmey and Charles J. Fitzgerald, for their participation in the kidnaping of William A. Hamm, Jr., at St. Paul, Minnesota, on June 15, 1933.

Confirming our telephone conversation of last might. please be advised that in accordance with your instructions, together with Agents John Madels, W. J. McNulty, and C. A. sanan, left Little Rock about midnight and proceeded to Hot Springs. under the name of Joe Harris has established Arkansas, where himself at the Best Tourist Camp for the purpose of contacting Grace Goldstein if and when she returns. Just prior to the departure of I talked with him at some length and he is very confident that if he is able to make this contact with Grace that he will experience little difficulty in securing from her information as to the whereabouts of Karpis and to ther members of the gang, if such information is known to Grace. is also of the opinion that in the event Grace has not returned to Hot Springs, and for that reason he is not able to contact her, that he will be able to ascertain through the prostitute Mary, who is in charge of the Hatterie Hotel during the absence of Grace, information sufficiently definite to enable him to locate Grace for the desired contact.

Special Agent W. J. Echulty, who accompanied Springs, is presently registered at the Howe Hotel which is situated close to the Hatterie Hotel where he will be able to observe in some measure the activities at the Hatterie Hotel and can be in Contact with at reasonable intervals.

RECORDED & INDEXED Special Agent John Madala, who accompanied CAST INVESTIGATIO Eprings, is registered at the Naukesha Hotel which is closely situated to the Hatterie Hotel and he has been instructed to keep Acareful 350 watch on the Hatterie Hotel, especially for the purpose, of learning whether any effort is made by the Post Office Inspectors to cause the OF JUSTICE apprehension of Grace Goldstein should she return to Hot Springs, he being instructed to communicate with me at once in the event any unusual activity is observed at the Hatterie Hotel, or should be learn ... that Grace has returned.

Temporarily, Special Agent C. A. Mahan of this office is registered at the Marquette Hotel where he is working on general assignment, the real purpose, however, being that he should be available with his personally owned Ford automobile in the event it should be necessary for Agents Medala and Moliulty to hurriedly leave Hot Springs.

Agent Damron who is, of course, the more familiar with this metter is presently tied up in Court at El Dorado but it is expected that I can have him released early tomorrow morning in order that he may them proceed to Hot Springs and be available in connection with this matter.

I will, of course, keep you fully advised of all developments at Hot Springs.

According to Casey, the Port Office Inspectors at the present time have a confidential fund of \$2,000 to spend in connection with the recent Carretsville mail train robbery.





memorandum for the director

This will record the conference this morning which you held with Mr. William Lundell, Mr. Carlton Smith and Mr. Johnson of the National Broadcasting Company. These gentlemen presented three proposed plans as follows:

They have in mind a half hour radio dramatisation with regard to Alvin Karpis, this show to be placed on the air following the Karpis apprehension. Mr. Lundell indicated that it is proposed that Hr. Wade arnold of the New York City offices of the National Broadcasting Company will prepare the dramatisation phraseology. The question was raised in connection with this satter as to whether Mr. Courtney Ryley Cooper would assist in preparing the material in view of the fact that he has covered the Bremer and Hamm kidnaping cases rather completely in his book "Ten Thousand Public Enemies, and Mr. Lundell indicated that he might arrange for Mr. Arnold to get in touch with Mr. Cooper to see whether they could work out the continuity rather than to have Mr. Arnold receive detailed material from the Bureau or to come to Washington in connection with the matter. It was indicated that the dramatisation would feature Alvin Larpis although, of necessity, it would include considerable information with regard to the Bremer and Hamm kidnaping Edwys.

A one hour broadcast tour was discussed for presentation possibly on the night of Sunday, July 26th, to be in the nature of of an anniversary presentation as the Bureau was initially started on July 26, 1906.

It is proposed that Mr. Courtney Ryley Cooper will be contacted by the National Broadcasting Company to prepare the material for this broadcast show which will pertain primarily to interesting developments in hypothetical and actual cases with regard to scientific crime detection methods.

RECORDED & INDEXED Mr. Lundell stated that at 1- P.W. on Sunday, May 17th, on the RC A Magic Key Hour, time will be devoted to the use of Which radio in police and law enforcement work, and We asked whether four minutes of the program might be devoted to the Bureau. He has

mind that the Director will make a one minute statement concerning the use of radio in connection with the Bureau's work and that three minutes will be given over to some type of actual radio demonstration, possibly utilizing the two-way radio as used by the Bureau in extertion and similar cases.

It was agreed that Mr. Johnson of the Washington office of the National Broadcasting Company would communicate with the Bureau and would discuss this entire matter with Hr. Coffey so that the technical details might be carefully worked out some days in advance of the program. I have spoken to Mr. Coffey concerning this matter so that he is in a position to discuss this matter with Er. Johnson, after which he will advise definitely as to the set-up for this program.

Mr. Lundell also mentioned two matters about which I told Mr. Coffey so that he might make appropriate inquiries to determine whether they have any pertinency to the work of the Bureau; manely, the preparation during the past year of an R C & portable transmission set weighing approximately 400 pounds which will give voice coverage to twenty-eight miles, and a small personal transmission set which can be carried by an individual without being noticed. Mr. Coffey will look into these matters and will submit a report concerning them.

I have prepared the attached memorandum for Mr. Surdam with regard to the May 17th Eagle Key program.







Reference is made to the Bureau's letter of April 22d, enclosing photostatic copies of an undated anonymous communication postmarked at Los Gatos, California, April 5, 1936, concerning the possible location of Alvin Karpis and William Dainard.

Attention of the Bureau is invited to the fact that the only suggested investigation concerning this anonymous communication would lie at Los Gatos, Santa Cruz, and Holy City, California, which towns are within the jurisdiction of the San Francisco Bureau office.

However, examination of the anonymous communication reflects that the perty who is alleged to be harboring Karpis and Mahan is named as one "Denegri". The writer of the anonymous communication unquestionably had in mind Joseph Raymond Wegri, alias Fatso Wegri as being the man who harbored Baby Face Nelson and presently harboring Karpis and Mahan. It is also noted that the writer claimed that Karpis, apparently wearing a shawl, and Mahan were together and that the man "Lenegri" has been seen going back and forth in the vicinity of Santa Cruz and Los Gatos.

For the information of the Bureau, Negri has been residing at Portland for nearly a year and I have occasion to personally see him quite frequently. On receipt of the Bureau's letter on this date, I called Negri to the office and determined definitely that he has not been in the vicinity of the above

I telephoned SAC MacFarland at the Cleveland Office quire as to the developments in the situation involving the activiti of the Post Office Inspectors in that district. This is the situation in which the Post Office Inspectors have filed complaints against the subjects of the above entitled case for the Garrettsville train robbery, and about which Mr. MacFarland and I had a telephonic discussion yesterday at which time it was decided we would pick up our informant in Toledo, Edith Barry, in order that we could protect our interests. Mr. MacFarland said that they did not pick this woman up for the reason that the necessity therefor evidently did not exist. He said they had quite a conference about this matter with Mr. Hettick, who is in charge of the Post Office Inspectors' investigation in that district, and Mr. Hettrick informed they did not anticipate going into Toledo to apprehend anyone. Mr. MacFarland said he indicated to Mr. Hettrick in view of the setup which the Bureau has in Toledo that if there was any undue activity by the Post Office Inspectors, it might ruin all of our carefully planned plans. Mr. Hettrick indicated he was well aware of our setup there, and said he did not intend to go into Toledo and do anything without first notifying the Cleveland Office

ali I telephoned SAC Reinecke at the Detroit Office with refer ence to the lead on Karpis at Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan, and told him that during the course of the day, I was going to discuss this situation with Mr. Connelley to get his reaction and suggestions. Mr. Reinecke mentioned, incidentally, that the Sheriff who is a party to this identification of Karpis is the same Sheriff who assisted us in the investigation of the Dillinger matter!

Mr. Reinecke said that he has instructed the Agents who are up there checking on this matter to call himas soon as they are able to evaluate the situation as it stands at this time, and when he hears from them, he will immediately telephone me.

ル Time - 10:20 A.M.

I contacted Mr. Connelley at New Orleans and read to him in its entirety the telegram which the Bureau received last night from Mr. Reinecke. With reference to that portion thereof which states that the person identified as Karpis is a little fleshier than the photograph of Karpis, Mr. Connelley said that this becomes a very important point when one considers the fact that the clothes of Karpis which we recovered in the house near Hot Springs, Arkansas, especially the breeches, had a waist measurement of about 26 inches. -

As a matter of fact, Mr. Connelley said he does not believe Karpis is in the vicinity of Sault Sainte Marie for the reason that he believes he is right there in New Orleans at this time. He said that they picked Grace Goldstein up on the street yesterday, and no one knows we have her. Mr. Connelley said that he does not know whether this woman is weakening or not, but she did make somemention of what happened to Anna Sage, etc. He said that he somehow does not believe she is weakening much on account of the associations which she has had with Joe Wakelin, the Chief of Police at Hot Springs. Mr. Connelley said apparently Joe Wakelin and Dutch Mckers, Chief of Detectives, have gotten together and are trying to work out something

whereby they can get the \$5,000 reward and still save Joe Wakelin from prosecution.

With reference to Informant his benefit down in that vicinity is over, and he is accordingly going to be sent back to Youngstown and Toledo. He says he may be able to find Campbell for us if he is sent back into that vicinity, and he is to be used for this purpose.

Concerning the investigation in New Orleans, Mr. Connelley said it is going to be more or less a process of elimination until we find the doctor who is treating Connie. After we do this, we can put a plant on there, and possibly a couple of other plants if the situation works that way, and then we will be able to find outwhere this girl lives.

Relative to the subject of manpower in this investigation in New Orleans, Mr. Connelley said that there are, according to Mr. Magee, six good men in the New Orleans Office who are available. Then, too, SAC Brantley, Special Agents Hurt and Buchanan can proceed to Dallas and get an airplane out of there to New Orleans and be there within three or four hours. Mr. Connelley believes the situation will shape up in such a manner that he will have sufficient time to bring some additional men in there if they will be needed.

Time - 1:30 P.M.

Mr. Reinecke telephoned me from the Detroit Office with reference to the lead in Sault Sainte Marie in this case and said the situation briefly is this: Francis McDougall, a postal clerk, yesterday in a casual conversation with Sheriff Welch mentioned that during the past three weeks two men had been coming to the Post Office and the taller of the two had been calling for mail general delivery from Toledo and Cleveland, and had received a few letters from those points. The shorter of the two men, he thought, had the features of Alvin Karpis. McDougall at the time had an I.O. and a circular on Karpis in front of him at the office, which made him realize the features of the two persons were very similar. The Agents have talked with this man for some time, and the more he looks at the pictures of Karpis the less he is sure that the two persons are identical. These two persons apparently are still in Sault Sainte Marie, and the postal clerk says he believes he can take the Agents out and find the automobile in which the two men are traveling so that the license number can be obtained and checked.

I told Mr. Reinecke this phase of the investigation should go forward by all means and an effort made to determine who these parties are and where they reside. I suggested that if they are located and it is determined they are not as a matter of fact the subjects of this case, they should be discreetly interviewed under suitable pretext to see just who they are.

The developments and results of this investigation will be furnished to the Bureau as they occur.



Eddie Brennam is a close associate of Joe Rich. As previously indicated in this investigation. Archie Reglemen claims that Joe Fich and Eddie Bronnan were involved in the robbery of a bank at Connecutville, Pennsylvenie, and investigation is order to establish their identities in connection with this particular job is now being conducted. It is suggested that photographs of Rich and Brennan be developed and supplied to each office receiving a copy of this letter.

Also enclosed are photographs of Edward Siemand and Jake Gilmore of Canton, Ohio. It is to be recalled that Archie Heglemen stated that he met Harry Campbell in Toledo in company with Edward Siemund. Elemand and Gilmore have been associated in the past in hi-jackings and it is thought that they are both in Toledo at the present time, although investigation has failed to locate them there. Edith Barry stated that this individual called at her house and advised bor that he was acquainted with Karpis and Campbell and knew that the last two mentioned individuals had frequented her bouse in the past, and during the course of conversation with Edith Barry, Tonny advised her, among other things, that he had served ten or eleven years in the Oklahoma State Femitentiary of McAlester, Oklahoma, having been released in the late summer or early fall of 1936; that he was intimetely acquainted with Karpis and Campbell, and as a matter of fact Karpis was instrumental in securing his release from the Oklahoma State Fenitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoms and he further advised Edith Barry that Barry Campboll had married some young unsophisticated girl in the sumper of 1935, indicating that this girl was the daughter of some farmer in the state of Michigan, and that Possibly the marriage took place in Michigan; that Harry Campbell, some time during the summer of 1935, was arrested in Detroit for running through

a red light and paid a fine; that there was some difficulty experienced in securing Towny's release from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, it appearing that the president of some bank was actively engaged in protesting his release. However, this difficulty was overcome. Upon his release he allegedly joined Karpis some place in the southwest at a place near a lake, shortly before a raid was conducted on the premises abandoned by Karpis.

Edith Berry further stated that on one occasion Tommy celled her house on the telephone and requested that she sent a prostitute to the home of Edward McGraw, who resides at 2011. Adams Street, Toledo, Ohio, with his wife, Clera McGraw. The present indications are that this house is a house of assignation and is possibly frequented by criminals, and further that Campbell may have met the woman to whom he is alleged to be married, at this address, mamely, one Gladys, last mame unknown.

It appears, according to Edith Barry, that since first appearing in Toledo in the fall of 1935, Towny has been more or less a frequent
visitor at her home, and on occasions she has gone out with him, and at
such times as he was intoxicated he would give her information, however,
she stated that he has not been to her home since shortly after the
newspaper accounts of the raid in Hot Springs, Arkensas,

For the benefit of the New Orleans and St. Faul offices conducting interrogation of Fred Sunter, it will be well to bear in mind that Edith Barry recently identified photograph of Fred Sunter as an individual known to her as Freddy, who appeared at her home in Toledo with Kerpis on the occasion of the latter's last visit to her home in the full of 1935; that Fred Sunter at that time was apparently acting as chauffour for Karpis, and at the time he colled at her home they both came in, but Freddy stayed but a few minutes and left, later celling for Karpis at her place. She was particularly impressed with the fact that Fred Sunter had a slight impediment in his speech.

One Archie Megleman, a bootlegger who is now serving a sentence at the Mortheastern Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Fennsylvania, has apparently in the past had some contact with Karpis, or at least some contact with JoéfRich, Eddie Brennen and Edward Siemund of Canton, Ohio, who are thought to have at some time or another been associated with Karpis. According to Megleman he pat Campbell in Toledo on one or more eccasions at the premises of Edward Siemund. Siemund at the present time is a fugitive from Canton, Ohio, as is his partner Jake Gilmore and they are both thought to be in Toledo, however, their whereabouts in that city has not been ascertained.

Recent indications have pointed to the fact that undoubtedly Earry Campbell is located at Toledo at the present time.

The Chicago office will please refer to letter from the Gleveland office deted May 1, 1936, forwarding to that office photographs of Siemund and Gilmore, and will immediately forward photographs of these two individuals to the New Orleans and St. Paul offices,

The office conducting the interrogation of Fred Hunter should consider the advisability of ascertaining from him information with reference to the possible identification of Tommy referred to by Edith Barry, and also whether or not he is acquainted with Ridie Siemund and Jake Gilmore, and if so their present whereabouts, as this information may furnish a clue as to the present whereabouts of Campbell.

The Oklahoma City office will please conduct appropriate investigation at Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, for the purpose of securing identification of Tomay referred to by Mith Barry, furnishing the Cleveland and interested offices with full information, together with photographs.







On April 24, 1936, one Ed Kushmer, who resides at \$239 Bouglas Boulevard, Chic.go, Illinois telephoned the Chic.go office that he had information of value concerning the location of Alvin Okarpis. Kushner was at one time employed in the capacity of a confidential informant by former Special Agent in Charge F.E. Parvis, and of far as known no information of value was ever obtained from this individual. Eusliner was at that time associated with John Hages and Ruby Base, both of whom were known to your office.

Rushner when interviewed advised Special agent R.C. Suren of this office that about three or four weeks ago he car John Hagen in the 700 block on West Madigon Street, Chic.go, Illinois & t which time Hagan was accompanied by a man described as follows: Age approximately 40 years; height 5 feetl0 inches; heir dark; complexion dark; beard heavy; peculiarities limps with the right leg.
