advised that he had been manager for the past year and that during this period no one by the name of head had resided there. He stated that the registration records prior to that time had been destroyed. According to Mr. Hernes this hotel is owned by Dr. A. E. JOHNSON, 424 South Broadway, Los Angeles, and that the hotel has been the property of the Johnson family for many years.

Inquiry was made of several old men who it was reported by Mr. Hermes had lived at the hotel for the past several years, but none of them could recall anyone by the name of Lead.

JACK CLANCY, Manager of the hotel at 228 East SECOND Street, Ios Angeles, advised that he had been manager of the hotel for the past eighteen months, and that no party by the name of Mead had resided there during that period, and that the registration records prior to that time have been destroyed so far as he has any knowledge. He referred agent to PERRY JOHNSON and JIM HOWARD, both of whom reside at 332 East Second Street, who previously resided at this hotel. Both of these men stated that they were residing at 228 East Second Street during the period from 1923 to 1925, but that they could not recall a party by the name of Mead. C. N. ROSS, an oldtiner who lives at 230 East Second Street, which is another hotel of the same cheracter as those mentioned above, advised that he recalls a PAT MEAD, whose initials he believes were P. G. and who was about 71 years of age, who resided at this address for several years but left about three years ago for San Francisco, California, and that it is his understanding that Pat Mead is presently residing at the Colton House in San Francisco. Mr. Ross could give no information regarding the Colton House, but stated that it was a hotel patronized exclusively by pensioners and men on relief.

DR. A. E. JOHNSON, 424 South Broadway, Ios Angeles, edvised that his brother, JOE JOHNSON, who died approximately one year ago, had previously had control of the hotel at 228 Kast Second Street, Ios Angeles, but after his death all records pertaining to tenents at the hotel had been destroyed. He could not furnish the name of enyone who would be familiar with the tenants during the period in question. He advised further that M. (FRANK) WATANABE, presently manager of the Wawana Hotel, 535 Wall Street, Ios Angeles, previously managed the hotel at 123 North San Pedro and could probably furnish information regarding parties who resided there during the period from 1923 to 1925. Mr. Watanabe was interviewed and produced the register for the hotel at 123 North San Pedro for 1927. This was checked but no registration was found for anyone by the name of Mead. Mr. Watanabe could not advise as to the whereabouts of other registers of the hotel and he could not recall any tenent at the hotel by the name of Mead.

Inquiry was made at the Main Post Office, Los Angeles, and at was ascertained that the removal orders for the period in question had been destroyed and no removal order was found on file for a party by the name of Mead from 228 East Second Street or 123 North San Pedro, Los Angeles.

Reference reports also show that William Elmer Mead, while at the Colorado State Penitentiary, corresponded with KATIE NYBURGER, 171 South Hosier Street, Los Angeles, California. Inasmuch as there is no "Hosier" Street in Los Angeles, it was assumed that this was probably "Hoover" Street.

JOHN T. LECNARD, carrier, Fost Office Substation located at Third Street and Vermont Avenue, Ios Angeles, advised that J. C. VAN TREES and family have resided for many years at 171 South Hoover Street and he could not recall delivering mail for anyone by the name of Nyburger. According to Pr. Leonard, Van Trees is employed as a cameramen for Paramount Studios. HAROLD YOUNG, Assistant Director, Paramount Studios, advised that he is personally acquainted with J. C. Van Trees who was previously employed at the studios as a cameraman but who is presently employed by Technicolor Studios. Pr. Young stated that Van Trees was a reliable man and he was certain that he could be approached in confidence.

DON VAN TREES, 171 South Hoover, Ios Angeles, advised that he is the son of J. C. Van Trees and that his mother and father were out of the city for several weeks. He recalled that several years ago his grandmother employed a maid by the name of CATHERINE NYBERGER, but stated that his grandmother has been deed for the past three years and that neither he nor his parents could furnish any information regarding the present whereabouts of Mrs. Nyberger. The 1936 City Directory of Los Angeles lists Mrs. Catherine Nyberger, Maid, as residing at 1039 South Berendo, Ios Angeles. It is believed that this party is the same party as was employed at 171 South Hoover Street as a maid, and further investigation regarding her will be conducted.

Some time ago a letter was received from F. F. LABRUM, Chief Criminal Deputy, Sheriff's Office, Riverside, California, advising that a party had reported that he had information regarding W. E. LEAD who was reported to have made certain negotiations in the Bremer kidnaping case and who was supposed to be a member of the Dillinger gang. Ir. Labrum further advised that his informant had stated that lead was known as the "CHRISTIAN KID."

AT RIVERSIDE, CALIFORNIA.

Inquiry was made at the Sheriff's Office and agent was advised that Mr. Labrum is presently stationed at Palm Springs, California. Agent telephonically communicated with Mr. Labrum who advised that he could not recall the identity of the party referred to in his letter but did recall that the party resided at Corona, California, which is located in Riverside County. He stated that he had made certain notes regarding this matter at the time the letter was written to this office, but that these notes had now been destroyed.

W. W. WAIRATH, Undersheriff, advised that he recalled someone coming to the office and furnishing information regarding a W. E. Mead, but he could not recall any of the particulars except that it was his recollection that the informant resided at Corona, California.

LISS RUTH CLARK, Clerk in the Sheriff's Office, searched the files and located a copy of the letter addressed to this office but could find no further information regarding the particular matter.

AT CORONA, CALIFORNIA.

At Corena, California, Chief of Police ELIAS GARTER, who is the only police officer of the town except the traffic officer, Edvised that he faintly recalls some citizen of the town reporting that he had information regarding W. E. Mead, but he could not advise as to the identity of this individual. Both Chief Garner and Deputy Sheriff Labrum advised that they would make further efforts to determine the identity of informent and would immediately communicate with this office.

In accordance with the letter from Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, addressed to the Cincinnati office under date of January 27, 1936, Special Agent James G. Findlay of this office contected Captain WALLACE and Detective DANIEL LUNG of the Fresno Police Department, Fresno, Calif., as well as O. J. KING, Investigator for the County Attorney's office, and furnished them identification orders as well as additional photographs on William Elmer Mead, requesting their cooperation in locating Mead in connection with their investigations of confidence schemes within their territories. Special Agent A. B. Leckie contacted the Chief of Detectives, Glendale Police Department, Glendale, Calif., and furnished him with identification orders and photographs of William Elmer Mead with a request similar to that outlined above

The bunco details of other principal police departments in this territory are being contacted from time to time regarding Mead.

UNDEVELOPED LEAD:

THE SAN FRANCISCO OFFICE, at San Francisco, California, will endeavor to locate PAT READ at the Colton House and ascertain whether he is the father of William Elmer Mead.

THE LOS ANGERES OFFICE, at Los Angeles, California, will conduct appropriate discreet investigation to determine if MRS. CATHERINE NYBERGER, 1039 South Berendo, is acquainted with William Elmer Mead, and will determine if he has contacted her in the recent past and will make arrangements to be advised should he contact her at any time in the future.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Morningside State Bank, Morningside,
Lowe held up and robbed by four
unknown, unmasked white men at 2:30
P.M., April 20, 1936. Information
communicated to this office that one
of bandits had been identified as
Alvin Karpis. Subsequent investigation
disclosed that in all probability it
was not Karpis. Local law enforcement officers have no information as
to the identity of the bandits and
have no leads on which to work.

DETAILS:

This investigation is based upon a telephonic report to this office by Paul Gruber, Investigator for the Iowa State Bureau of Investigation, under date of April 23, 1936 at which time Gruber informed Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt that from his, Gruber's investigation of the robbery of the Morningside State Bank at Sioux City, Iowa on April 20, 1936, that it was his belief that Alvin Karpis was one of the bandits, his belief being based upon the fact that two of the bank employees, Mrs. Hubbard and James David had identified the photograph of Karpis; further that the car used in the robbery

was supposed to have been stolen in Minneapolis about one week prior to the robbery and also that Karpis was in Minneapolis about twelve days prior to the robbery. Gruber further advised that Indiana license plates # 545-087 were used on the bandit car and said plates were stolen from a car at Logansport, Indiana; Gruber further states that a garage attendant in Siour City where the bandits had the brakes on their car adjusted a short time prior to the robbery had been unable to identify any of the men in the car as being Karpis.

Mr. Gruber in concluding his conversation inquired of Mr. Alt whether he would have any objection to giving publicity to the rumor or allegation that Karpis was one of the robbers in instant case. Mr. Gruber was informed that investigation of this robbery was, of course, his responsibility and that he, Alt had no comments to make concerning any publicity given this case, however, he did not desire to have any Bureau connection shown or indicated in the investigation of this case.

Mr. Alt telephonically communicated the above mentioned fact to Mr. Temm of the Bureau and was advised by Mr. Temm that the Bureau had no information whatsoever as to the location of Karpis and it was possible that Karpis could have been one of the robbers in this case, and to obtain all information possible to determine if Karpis was one of the perpetrators, accordingly the following investigation was conducted.

W. L. Ayers, is cashier of the Morningside State Bank. He was informed by Agent that this Bureau had no jurisdiction in the matter whatsoever, but in view of the fact that we had received word that possibly Alvin Kurpis was one of the bandits, or had been identified as such, that this Bureau was interested in that angle of the case.

Mr. Lyers advised that at about noon on April 80, 1936 some unknown party had called the bank and wanted to know what time the bank closed in the afternoon and that this unknown party had been advised that the bank closed promptly at 2:30 P.M. Mr. Ayers stated that at the time this inquiry was made he did not think anything about it, because inquiries of that kind were not unusual, however, after the bank had been held up, he remembered of this incident and it is his opinion that the call came from one of the bank robbers.

Mr. Ayers further advised that at exactly 2:50 P.M. that afternoon when the bank was just ready to close the doors, four men entered the bank, all together; that the first one in the bank had yelled "stick them

up, this is a stick-up; " further that one of the bank employees, a Mr. C.D. Nissen who was behind the cages had made a run for the basement door and the first bundit again yelled "dom't run" but Nissen had kept on going towards the door and the bandit had fired at him, however, the bullet had struck one of the iron bars in front of the cage and was deflected, no one being hit by the bullet, and Mr. Nissen succeeded in getting into the besement and stayed there during the entire robbery. Mr. Ayers further stated that one of the bank employees who was working in one of the cages just off the main work room of the bank, ducked down behind the counter when the bandit fired at Nissen and this employee was not found by the bandits at all, in fact the bandits did not even enter her cage to get what money there was in it. Mr. Ayers advised that after the bandit fired at Nissen, two of the other bandits vaulted over the low counter at the front part of the bank and one of them had come into his office and forced him and Mr. Scott, President of the bank to come out into the lobby of the bank where they were kept covered by the bendit during the robbery; the other bandit covered the other bank employees who were behind the counter, making them back up against the wall and the third bandit came back behind the cages and gathered up all the currency and silver that was in the cages in the main work room of the bank, however, this bandit did not go into the cage that was just around the end of the counter, nor did he go into the wault which was open and did not ask any of the employees if there was any more money. This bandit did not have a sack to put the money in, but stuffed it in his pockets. Mr. Ayers advised that none of the employees were forced to lie on the floor or to turn their faces to the wall, nor were they all forced to congregate together, but were left standing in two groups, each group guarded by a bandit. Mr. Avers advised that when the bendit had all the money in eight, that the leader said "lets go" and "take them with us", meaning the bank employees. They all left the bank together and the bendits got into their car which was perked about two doors down the street from the bank entrance, and made two bank employees stand on each running board of the car; that the driver of the car had the ignition key in his pocket and had trouble getting the ear started, however, when he did get it started he drove away very slow and did not drive over 55 or 40 miles an hour until after the hostages were released near the edge of the city. Mr. Ayers advised that he noticed two guns lying on the floor of the car and they appeared to be shot guns; further that the only guns used by the bandits in the bank were all large caliber revolvers, either .38 or .45 caliber.

The following descriptions of the bandits is a composite description, furnished by the various bank employees, and is about as accurate as it will be possible to obtain:

Tulsa Oklahoma Police photograph of Alvin Karpis #8008 along with a number of other photographs which were in possession of Triter were exhibited to Mr. Avers, but he was unable to make any identification of any of them and when he came to the photograph of Karpis, he picked it out and said, "that is the one the other employees had picked, but he could not identify it." Mr. Avers advised that the bandit who resembled the photograph of Karpis was up in the back part of the lobby during the robbery and he, Avers, did not get a chance to see him, not even when they were in the get—away car.

The same photographs were exhibited to John Scott, President of the Morningside State Bank and he also picked out the photograph of Karpis and advised Agent that it resembled one bandit very much, but he would not state positively that it was he, and when Mr. Scott was questioned as to the position this particular bandit took in the bank during the robbery he was unable to say whether this bandit was the one in the lobby of the bank, the one who gathered up the money or one of the bankits who had guarded the employees, neither could Mr. Scott state whether this particular bandit drove the gat—away car, set with the driver, or set in the back seat. Mr. Scott's demeanor while being questioned was very uncooperative and gave the writer the opinion that he, Scott, did not have a very clear recollection what did take place during the robbery and would not be able to make any identification of any of the bandits.

The photographs were exhibited to James David, bookkeeper and he also selected the photograph of Karpis as resembling the bandit that stood in the lobby of the bank and the one that had shot at C. D.Nissen, assistant cashier, however, Mr. David when questioned would not make any positive statement that it was Karpis and when questioned as to the physical description of this bandit, Mr. David furnished the following description: - 35 years,

5° 8", 150 lbs., slender build and dark shining eyes, but could not say what color hair he had. Mr. David advised that he had not made any positive identification of this man to any other officer, but merely told them that the photograph resembled the one bandit.

The photographs were exhibited to C. D. Nissen, Assistant Cashier, who was shot at. He picked the photograph of Karpis and at first stated that it was the bandit who had shot at him, however, when questioned as to what particular facial features he made his identification on, he was unable to say, except that the eyes looked the same. Mr. Nissen was asked in what manner he had selected the photograph of Karpis when he had first seen it, also who had first exhibited the photograph of Karpis to him and he advised that the first person to show him this particular photograph was a man from the Burns Detective Agency; that this man showed him the photograph of Karpis and stated "now this could be one of them." Mr. Nissen also advised that the Burns man and also the State men had seemed very pleased when he had selected the photograph of Karpis as resembling one of the bandits.

The photographs were exhibited to Mrs. Ive Hubbard, Stenographer and she also selected the photograph of Karpis as resembling the bandit who stood in the lobby of the bank and the one who shot at Nissen, however, she would not state positively that it was he, nor could she pick out any particular characteristic by which she made her selection of this particular photograph.

Rose Bagby, bookkeeper, and the employee who ducked down behind the counter when the bendit fired at Nissen also selected the photograph of Karpis as resembling the one bandit, but advised Agent that it was only a general facial resemblance and she was not at all positive.

From the above investigation, it is not believed that Alvin Karpis was one of the bandits in instant robbery and the identification of his photograph by the various employees was in all probability made on the power of suggestion which it is evident was used by some of the investigating officers in this case.

Willis Thrall, employee of the Bendix Brake Service Station, 307 West Seventh Street, Sioux City, Iowa, the garage where the bandit car is alleged to have had their brakes adjusted was interviewed and the above mentioned photographs were exhibited to him and he was unable to make any selection of any of them. Then Agent selected the photograph of Karpis from the group and asked Mr. Thrall if that looked like any of the men that were in the car and he stated that it did NOT.

Gruber, Special Agent of the Iowa State Department of Justice and without advising Mr. Gruber that the Writer had made any investigation in the matter whatsoever, questioned Mr. Gruber for any and all information he could furnish. Mr. Gruber advised Agent that four of the bank employees had positively identified the photograph of Karpis as being one of the bandits. Mr. Gruber advised that he had taken a bunch of photographs to the bank and four of the employees picked out the photograph of Karpis without any hesitation, however, Mr. Gruber admitted that this was after the Burns Detective Agency Operative had previously shown the photograph of Karpis at the bank. Mr. Gruber advised that he had checked up on the car used by the bandits and had found that it had been stolen out of a garage at St. Paul, Minnesota at the point of a gun on April 20. Mr. Gruber when questioned how he knew it was the same car advised "well it was the same kind as the one described by the bank employees and the garage man where they had their brakes fixed."

Tom Farley, Chief of Detectives, Sioux City, Iowa Police Department was interviewed relative to whether or not he had any information that Karpis was one of the robbers in this case and he advised Agent that he had no information to that effect; that the Police Department had been conducting their own investigation in this case and had not worked in conjunction with either the State agents or the Sheriff's office and to date there had been nothing that would indicate to him that Karpis was one of the bandits.

The Writer learned through various contacts with the local law enforcement officers who are investigating the above mentioned robbery, that they had no idea who the perpetrators of this crime may be, and they have no leads on which to work.

Bank Robbery Modus Operandi Report of instant bank robbery is being furnished the Bureau with their copies of this report.

MEMORANDUM

Fred Hunter is about thirty-five years of age, having spent a considerable portion of his life in the vicinity of Warren and Leavittsburg, Ohio. At an early age he became known as a high class gambler. He has been employed as a card dealer and a "stick-man" in dice games and as a selesman of gambling equipment. He was at one time employed as a card dealer for the Harvard Club, Cleveland, Ohio, where he was employed by James "Shimmy" Patton and Arthur Hebebrand. It was undoubtedly through this employment that he became acquainted with Milton Lett, Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell. Hunter is also a cock fighting enthusiast and has appeared at cock fighting carnivals in various parts of the United States.

Investigation disclosed that Hunter joined up with Karpis as early as March of 1935, it being recalled that Karpis escaped from the Danmor Hotel in Atlantic City on January 20, 1935. Hunter has continued his association with Karpis since that time. The paramour and associate of Hunter is one Connie Morris, alias Ruth Hamm. The paramour and associate of Alvin Karpis has been one Grace Goldstein, who is now a confidential informant of this Bureau. Hunter associated with Karpis, Connie Morris and Grace Goldstein at the cottage at Potash, Sulphur Springs, near Hot Springs, Arkansas and on Thursday, March 26, 1956, Fred Hunter, Alvin Karpis and Connie Morris fled from the said cottage just prior to the raid made at that point by Bureau Agents.

The Garrettsville mail robbery occurred during the afternoon of November 7, 1935. Investigation disclosed that the following persons participated in the holdup - Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Fred Hunter, John Brock and Sam, believed to be identical with Burrhead Keady. Investigation further strongly indicates that this holdup was financed by Joe Roscoe, a Toledo gambler, and proprietor of houses of prostitution and that the loot was taken immediately to the home of John Zetzer, where it was distributed as follows:

It is indicated that a total of \$34,000 was the actual loot taken in this robbery.

On the night of November 6, 1935 numerous members of this gang remained at the home of Clyde Rochat, near Newton Falls, Ohio. On November 7, 1935, these persons were driven by Clyde Rochat to a point nearby, where they were picked up by Alvin Karpis and Fred Hunter, who were driving a Plymouth sedan. According to John Brock, one of the actual participants in this crime, the Garrettsville robbery was cased by Alvin Karpis and Fred Hunter, Hunter having knowledge as to when employees were paid in the mills at Warren, Ohio. Karpis and Hunter went over the road at least three times in preparing the getaway charts.

Re: Bremer Case.

SAC Fletcher telephoned me from the Little Rock Office where he has been in conference with Grace Goldstein concerning this matter. Grace has now agreed to tell all she knows about this matter, but she wants to tell it to Mr. Connelley and no one else, since Mr. Connelley told her on a previous occasion that he was the head men on the situation down there. In this regard, Mr. Fletcher said he wanted Bureau authority to proceed immediately to Jackson, Mississippi in an sutomobile with Grace Goldstein, and there meet Mr. Connelley who will come up from New Orleans. Jackson is about half way between New Orleans and Little Rock and is a desirable place for this interview between Mr. Connelley and Grace Goldstein to take place. I told Mr. Fletcher that we would authorize his taking this woman down there all right, but that it would be our recommendation that he take along a couple of Agents during the trip. Mr. Fletcher said that this Grace Goldstein is about the most delicate person to deal with he has ever seen; that at first she wanted Mr. Fletcher to take her alone, but finally consented to his taking another Agent along; however, he did not know whether he could persuade her to go with two more Agents or not. In view of this, I told Mr. Fletcher the Bureau would defer to his judgment in the situation, pointing out to him that our recommendation would be to take at least two more Agents along on the trip. but if it can't be worked out that way, his best judgment should be used, and we would abide by the same.

Mr. Fletcher said he plans to leave within 30 minutes for Jackson, and would try to get two Agents to go along.

I talked with Mr. Connelley concerning this matter, and he said when he talked with Mr. Fletcher the first time about the matter, he wanted to bring her down to Jackson by himself, but Mr. Connelley said he told Fletcher to tell Grace that his, Connelley's, instructions were that two Agents should come with her. I pointed out to Mr. Connelley that I frankly do not have a lot of confidence in Mr. Fletcher in a situation such as this, and that I am somewhat concerned over this trip. Mr. Connelley suggested that possibly we could have another Agent or two follow the car in which Mr. Fletcher and Grace are in order to take care of any emergencies which might arise. This appears to be a good idea, and I told Mr. Connelley to call Fletcher at once and make arrangements in this regard.

Relative to the question of manpower in this matter, Mr. Connelley is of the opinion he should make arrangements as to sending Agents to the place where the affair will take place as soon as he confers with Grace at Jackson. Of course, we do not know at this time just where they are — they may be in New Orleans, or on the other hand, they may be in Paris, Texas and it would not be desirable to bring the men down into New Orleans before we know definitely where the subjects are. Thus, as soon as Mr. Connelley finds out from Grace where they are, he will get in touch with Mr. Brantley, have him get Agent Buchanan and go by Dallas and get Mr. Hurt and then proceed to a point of concentration.

The conference between Mr. Connelley and Grace will not take place before one or two o'clock in the morning, and the Bureau will be kept advised in the premises.

Referring to your letter dated April 27, 1956 to the effect that Paul/Hayes of Chapman Ranch, Texas originated at Randlett, Oklahoma, inquiry was conducted at Randlett, Oklahoma by Special Agent W. A. Giddens on April 27, 1956, who ascertained that Paul Hayes is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Hayes, residing at Rural Route #4, Randlett, Oklahoma. According to Mr. H. C. ACarroll, rural mail carrier at Randlett, the Hayes family has resided in that community for at least the past twenty-five years, Mr. Hayes being a farmer with a fair reputation. According to Carroll, the Hayes family is composed of Mr. and Mrs. Hayes, Paul, Mabel, age about mineteen or twenty, and possibly one or two younger boys. From Investigation conducted, it appears that Paul Hayes was born at Randlett, Oklahoma and lived there all of his life until a few months ago when he moved to Texas, with the exception of a period of approximately two years (1923-55) when he served a sentence in the Oklahoma State Reformatory at Granite, Oklahoma.

Mr. Carroll further advised that he knows of no connection that Paul Hayes might have at Davidson, Oklahom, except that he may have met some sirl there when he visited Davidson, Oklahoma with a friend of his, Raymond Martin. Carroll explained that Martin, a close associate of Hayes, used to associate with a girl at Randlett and that this girl moved to Davidson, following which Martin and Hayes made several trips to Davidson. It is quite probable that on these trips Hayes met some girls at Davidson.

The records of the Court Clerk for Cotton County, Walters, Oklahoms, reflect that on June 1, 1932 Paul Hayes was sentenced to serve two years in the Granite Reformatory upon conviction of burglery.

A copy of Hayes photograph has been obtained from the Oklahoma State Reformatory, which is being transmitted herewith for the use of the San Antonio Office. He is described as follows:

the Post Office Inspectors have filed on Alvin Karrie, Harry Cempbell, John Crock and Milton Lett in connection with the mail train robbery at Cerrettsville. The Post Office Inspectors propose to go into Toledo and pick up our informant there, one Edith Barry, and hold her for questioning or for investigation. In this connection, Mr. MacFarland said he has talked with Mr. Connelley, and Mr. Connelley suggested that we pick Edith Barry up and hide her away until this thing blows over. Mr. MacFarland said that Edith Barry is of prime importance in the investigation at Toledo, and if she is picked up by the Post Office Inspectors and that fact gets into the papers, her value to us is gone. It is believed by Mr. MacFarland that she has played square with us in this matter with the possible exception of giving us the exact address where Campbell is at this time, and they propose to bring her to Cleveland and hold her voluntarily and with her consent in the office.

I discussed this situation with you, explaining my fears in the matter, and then told Mr. MacFarland that it would be all right with the Bureau for him to pick this woman up and bring her to Cleveland for questioning, provided she is not told she is being picked up to keep the Post Office Inspectors from getting custody of her. I pointed out to Mr. MacFarland that this woman is evidently tied up pretty well with the police out there, and the situation will have to be handled very carefully to prevent a "squawk" being sent up as a result of her disappearance.

The Director said that the raid worked out perfectly; that they found subjects in the house, in the ground floor apartment, about noon on l'ay 1st; that subjects left immediately thereafter, driving two autos and later returned with only one car. There were two men and one woman in the party. The raiding party went to the place about 5:15 P.M. which was the busiest time of the day, at the corner of Canal Street and Jeff Davis Boulevard. The raid was carefully planned. A group consisting of Connelley, Brantley, Hurt, Buchanan and . Er. Hoover were to go in the front door, where any firing was likely to take place. The other squads were deployed in the rear and on both sides of the place. Just as the agents were ready to move the car down into that block, a policeman came along the Eoulevard on a horse, and the raid had to be delayed until he had passed. As the agents were about to pass the house (having planned to park the cars in the next block and come back with the guns, on foot) the two men came out and entered their car. Just at that time a little boy on a bicycle came between Karpis' car and the Director's car. Mr. Ecover became alarmed inasmuch as the child would be caught in the cross fire if any shooting started. The agents, led by Mr. Hoover, jumped out of their car and demanded their surrender just as Karpis, Hunter and the woman were about to enter their auto. This they did without protest. Two rifles were in Karpis' car. Karpis was badly frightened, saying to Mr. Hoover that he, Karpis, never thought the Bureau would take him alive. Hunter was scared to death. The Director stated that Hunter would be left in New Orleans; that he would be turned over to the Post Office, since they want him for the Garrettsville, Ohio, train robbery; that the Bureau will, of course, charge Aunter with harboring but that he will have to be tried on that charge in New Orleans.

Agent Hurt, Mr. Hoover, the girl and Karpis got in the Bureau car and started back to the office. It all happened within three minutes and approximately a thousand people gathered. The other agents searched the house, and found one of the windows barricaded for firing purposes. If the Agents had arrived one minute sooner or later, there would have been gun-play.

The Director stated that Karpis is a very dangerous, masty sort of individual, but is acting all right now. He mentioned that Karpis is freezing to death in Kansas City as he only wore a pair of palm beach trousers and no coat when apprehended. The temperature in New Orleans was about 87 degrees but had drop ed to 40 degrees in Kansas City. Mr. Hoover stated that Karpis was handcuffed and shackled and was being kept in the plane.

In conclusion the Director advised that he would leave Kansas City enroute to St. Paul about 7:00 A.M., EST.

Re: Adams.

During the early afternoon of January 25th Nichols. Jones and I went to the El Comodoro Hotel. I found Adams and introduced and identified myself and the agents. I told him that we were investigating the Karpis matter, that we wanted to check some records and to look around a bit. I then asked if we might talk to him privately and he took Jones and me and Nichols into his private office. I told him that we wanted to check the manner in which his hotel kept the valuables for the guests, and that we also wanted to check the arrival and departure records. He assigned Sandercock to assist Nichols and the search was started by Nichols. We then told Adams that we wanted to see the room on the 2nd floor which he had used temporarily for an office. He showed it to us and in answer to our question stated that he used to keep the golf bag in a closet in this room. From there we went to the parcel or baggage check room on the main floor where Agent Jones hurriedly checked the baggage. Also asked Adams if the gang had any stuff stored there. There was a leather golf bag standing in the corner which he admitted was his, that he had not used it for a long time and, upon being asked, stated that we could take the bag. We then asked him if he had any other place in the building where stuff was stored. He said he had a place on the 10th floor so the three of us went up there and looked the place over. Adams had much of his own stuff there which consisted mainly of wedding presents. At that time I told Adams that we were checking very thoroughly the activities of the Karpis-Barker gang down here, and of Adams connection with them; that in that connection, it was our duty as officers to report everything and to testify to everything that he might tell us; that it was his privilege not to talk to us, but that anything that he might tell us could and would be used in a criminal action against him. He said that he understood that and then we asked him to tell us everything that he knew about Larpis, the Barkers and any of their friends who might have stopped at the hotel. We also asked him if he had any of their property at the hotel or at any other place at that time, and if he knew where Karpis was at that time. He replied that the Blackburns and the Greens had stopped at the hotel as guests, that they were just the same as any other guests, that he knew nothing about them, and that he did not have any of their property there at that time. Not being satisfied that he was telling the truth

I told him that I doubted him and stated that I presumed that he would have no objections to putting down in writing just what he had told me. He demurred and stated that he was without experience in matters of this kind, that we Agents seemed to think that he knew something else, and that he did not wish to talk any further, and that he did not wish to write anything down, until he had had the benefit of the advice of an attorney and his friends. We informed him that that was agreeable and that we would be glad to see him on the following day after he had talked to these people. We told him, however, that in as much as our investigation indicated that he was implicated in this matter that we would like to have a copy of his fingerprints. He made no objection and the prints were taken up in that room. We then returned to the ground floor where we picked up his golf bag and departed with Agent Nichols. On the following day, January 26, 1935, while we were supposed to meet Adams at 10:00 A. M., we, Jones and I, got word from Agent Michols that Adams wanted to see us right may so we drove over to the hotel where we met Adams in the lobby and within a few moments the three of us drove to the Halcyon Hotel, Adams having stated that he wanted to tell everything that he knew about Karpis and the Barkers. On getting to the room in the Halcyon, Adams stated that on the previous day he had not told us the truth but that he had now decided to do so and that "the chips would have to fall where they would." He than wo began his story about having had William Harrison, Samver and icDonald at the hotel. Shortly after we began talking the room and on one occasion while I was talking on the telephone Jones and Adams stepped out of the room. On one of those occasions while I was away from Jones and Adams, I returned and found a one thousand dollar bill on the table and Jones informed me that Adams had stated that this was some of the money that had been left at the hotel by Karpis. I then asked Adams if that was correct and he explained the manner in which this bill came into his possession in much the same manner as is seen in the signed statement which Adams gave to me. We talked to Adams for several hours. During lunch hour Adams and Jones went out and had lunch together and late in the afternoon he left to go back to his hotel. He at no time was told that he was not going to be arrested. I saw him late that night at his hotel and inquired of him about Cassius McDonald. At

least it's my best recollection that it was that night. We didn't see Adams on Sunday, January 27, but we did see him on Yonday and Tuesday, January 28 and 29. On these days we arranged to have Adams meet us at the cortez Hotel in Miami and on the 29th, after he had told his entire story, his signed statement was prepared. After it had been written he was asked to read it for accuracy; he stated that he had confidence in me and that it would not be necessary for him to read it. Since he declined to read the statement, I read it to him, he suggested that the last two paragraphs be added to the statement, which was done, and thereafter he signed the statement - every page of it. While I was talking to him that day getting the statement, I recall Knight called asking if Adams were under arrest; that the papers had been calling him to that effect. I informed Knight that Adams was not arrested and that it was never stated to Adams that the latter was not to be arrested. After Adams had signed the statement, I informed him that it would be necessary for him to go over to the Commissioner's office, that a warrant had been issued for him. He was given the opportunity to call his Tather-in-law, Mr. Knight, in order that the bond could be arranged. We then proceeded to the office of the Assistant U. S. Attorney, where the hearing was held. Thereafter I saw him on several occasions and he never voiced any objection to having given the statement. On or about April 3, 1935, I saw him in the office of the U.S. Attorney in Miami and he told Mr. Barlow in my presence that he had told the Agents everything that he knew about the case. At that time he made no objection or comment on the manner in which his signed statement had been secured. I also saw him in St. Paul, Kinnesota during September of 1935 and January, 1936, at which time he made no objection to the manner in which his statement had been obtained. His attitude was always one of affability and pleasantness.

J. H. HANSON

Re: Randall

This witness will state that at about 8:00 or 9:00 A.M. on January 21, 1935, he, together with Jones, Dunne and a couple of officers of the Miami Police Department proceeded to the Javiami Hotel, where Hanson and one of the officers proceeded to the room of Randall. Jones and officer Shanahan joined them and the four of them proceeded into the room where Randall and Codomo were in bed. Introduced ourselves. Told him that we were investigating the Karpis case and that we wanted to talk to him about it. He said it would be all right and permitted Agents to search the room saying "Go right ahead, Gentlemen." After mentioning the Karpis case Randall said that he had been getting ready to go down and tell the Police all about it. It is my recollection that he mentioned that his name had appeared in the paper in connection with having sent pelaney and Burdette to Atlantic City where the shooting occurred.

I told Randall that we would like him to come over to our hotel for questioning. He said it was O.K. and that he would be glad to go along. He was not told that he was under arrest at that time. Jones and Shanahan took Randall over to the Alcasar Hotel. Codomo was taken to the Miami Colonial Hotel for questioning by myself, officer Howard and Agent Dunne. After taking him over there, I returned to the Alcasar Hotel where Randall had been taken. Randall was not handcuffed when I got over to the room. He was being treated fairly in all respects. After we had talked to Randall for a time he told us some things about the part Adams had played in this thing, so Jones suggested to them that they leave, in view of the fact that Adams and Knight had some influence on the Police Department. Jones and I interviewed Randall intermittently during the day of January 21, 1935, and several times during the day I had to leave and go out on some leads, during which time either Agents Going or Stone would be left to guard Randall. Randall was not handcuffed at any time when I was talking to him but

when he was being guarded he was handcuffed to prevent an escape. We offered Randall food soon after he was brought to the Alcazar Hotel but he insisted that he never ate breakfast so we waited until lunch time. At that time arrangements were made for food to be sent up from the Coffee Shop of the said hotel.

When I first started discussing this matter with Randall I explained to him that he would not have to make a statement and that anything he might say would be used against him. I told him that a complaint would have to be filed. After these warnings he willingly furnished me the information which was later incorporated in his signed statement. It is my best recollection, and on this I am almost positive that on the evening of the first day he was in custody we had his evening meal brought up to him from the Coffee Shop.

Prior to the arrest of Randall I had used Room 611 of the Alcazar Hotel as my headquarters. We had a large number of guns which we had brought over from Birmingham and before Randall's arrest, we had securely locked said guns in the closet of this room for safe keeping and to have them ready at any time. At no time was there any unnecessary display of firearms. The Agents carried their side arms and frequently took them off placing them in the dresser drawer for their comfort, but they were always cautioned against leaving them out in the open. Randall was questioned intermittently until about midnight of January 21, 1935. He was then permitted to go to sleep. This room was also occupied by Agent Jones.

I returned to Randall's room on January 22, 1935, some time between 9:00 and 10:00 A.M., and commenced interviewing him again. He was not handcuffed at that time. About a half hour after we had talked he asked me to take him to a private room where he could tell the whole story, that he didn't want the other Agents around. Jones and I took him over to former Agent Roger Mains' room. Randall was unemotional during the entire time he was giving us his story. On January 22nd, we secured information with regard to the Browning automatic rifle and in view of the fact that he had not yet told us this part of the story we questioned him

courteously concerning it. He then commenced to cry. It was during this time that we were securing a signed statement from him. Having obtained this information re the rifle he told us that part of the story, and it was incorporated in his signed statement. He was told that he did not have to make a signed statement, but expressed a willingness to make such a statement. Having obtained the information about the rifle we showed him the gun and he said it looked like the gun which he had gotten from Adams. This is the only display of firearms which was made to him up to that time.

At the close of January 21, 1935, I told Randall that we could take him to fail and have a complaint filed against him, but he stated that he would rather stay with Agents having a feeling that he would be safer with Agents, that he would receive better treatment at the hands of the Agents than in the County Jail, and that he did not desire his name to be mentioned in the papers since he did not want his family and friends to learn of the trouble he was in.

When Randall's statement was completed he was given an opportunity to read it and did read it and expressed an understanding of the contents, whereupon he signed it freely and voluntarily.

On January 24th Agent Tollett secured information to the effect that an unknown airplane carrying men and heavy arms had landed in the Everglades. In the thought that Karpis and Campbell were in that vicinity and planning a delivery of Duke Randall, I, together with Agents Tollett, Jones and Metcalf went to the Everglades to investigate, leaving Agents Michols and Dunne at the hotel with Randall to guard him. On leaving we removed our arms from the closet, all of the guns being kept in carrying cases similar to suit cases. Only one gun was removed from its case by Agent Jones, and this for the purpose of inspection, it being a gun which had been seized from members of the Karpis-Barker gang in Chicago, and he wanted to be sure that it was in good order before using it. Wo other guns were removed from their cases and there was no unnecessary talk of firearms at that time nor was any warning given to Randall as to what his conduct should be during our absence nor were any threats made to him.

At about 8:00 P. M. on January 25, 1935, Agents
Metcalf, Nichols and I took Randall to the U. S. Commissioner
in Miami, Florida, where a complaint was filed and Pandall was
delivered to the U. S. Marshal. I distinctly recall that after
the hearing Randall took the floor and told Assistant U. S.
Attorney Gramling, the Commissioner and the Agents present that
he had been treated very well by the Agents and that he wanted
to thank them.

On April 3, 1935, I again interviewed Duke Randall, this time he having made the request to interview Messrs.

Gramling and Barlow. At this time Randall again declared that all the information contained in his statement was the truth.

Re: Randall

At about 8:50 A.K. on January 21, this Agent, together with Hanson, Jones and two city detectives, proceeded to the Tamiami Hotel. I sayed in the car while the others went upstairs to get Codomo and Randall for questioning. Hanson and I then took Codomo over to the Miami Colonial Hotel for questioning, where I had a room. Soon thereafter we released Codomo. That evening about 8:30 P.M. I went to Randall's room. He was not handcuffed at this time. Hanson was questioning him. No harsh methods were being used in the interrogation. I remained only a few moments, and then went out on other matters.

During the next two or three days I saw Randall occasionally each day and guarded him a few times for only a few moments at a time. Randall always maintained a friendly and courteous attitude toward the Agents and was always treated well. He never complained about being kept in the hotel room. Randall constantly reminded the Agents that he enjoyed their company very much. At times when coming to Randall's room I put my side arm in the dresser drawer but this was not for the purpose of intimidating Randall, rather for the convenience and comfort of the Agent.

On the afternoon of January 24 we received information that a questionable plane had landed in the Everglades, and that two men heavily armed had gotten out of the plane. Nichols and I were instructed to remain in Randall's room to do guard duty while other Agents went to the Everglades to make the investigation. We were instructed to use proper precautions to prevent a delivery of Randall in case his associates should put in their appearance. Michols and I assembled a Colt Fonitor and a shotgum and laid these guns on the bed so that they would be available in case of emergency. The muzzles of the guns were ... turned away from Randall and nothing was done which would in any way give him cause to fear us. At the time we got the guns together Randall said to me, "Hell's fire, give me one of those guns. I'll help you out. I don't want to sit here empty handed". Randall had previously expressed fear that the gang might try to do away with him. We told Randall not to worry, that no harm would come to him because we were there to help him. - 2 -

At about 5:00 P.E. that afternoon Hanson and the other Agents returned, so I went out on other matters.

On the afternoon of January 25 Metcalf and I took a statement from Randall in the said hotel room, relative to a phone call he had received at the Bowery Night Club, which call advised him to get out of town after the shooting at Atlantic City. This statement was secured from Randall without any threats being employed, in the absence of any promises, and without any duress of any kind. During the taking of this statement there was no display of firearms nor was any effort made to intimidate him in order to influence the character of the admissions which were made by him.

At about 4:00 P.M. on January 26 Metealf and I took another free and voluntary statement from Randall, this time at the Dade County Jail. This statement concerned a trip which he had taken to Etowah, Tennessee, for Adams in order to have Harry R. Cook for et about having purchased the license plates for Adams. He was interviewed in the Warden's office. This statement was likewise free and voluntary. On several occasions I accompanied Randall and Jones to the Coffee Shop of the Aleazar Hotel for noon lunch and evening dinner. He was treated the same as any other person, was not handcuffed nor encumbered in any way.

Re: Randall

I had very little to do with the questioning of
Randall. However, I acted in guard duty on several occasions
during the time he was being held. On January 21st, I was in
his room, and recall seeing him handouffed to the bed. I
recall seeing him every day during the time he was held, but
it is my recollection that he was handouffed only on the first
day, with the exception of one occasion on January 24th, when
I came into his room where he was being guarded by Agents
Nichols and Dunne. The other Agents had left for the Everglades,
and it was my understanding that there was some danger of a
delivery or attempted slaying of Randall for which reason he was
handouffed to the chair. I recall, however, that the handouffs were
removed only a few moments after they had been put on.

At no time did I see Randall mistreated in any way. I recall that he was permitted to accompany agents for his meals, and I believe that it was only on the first day of his incarceration that his meals were brought to him in the room. During the time Randall was held he told me that he had heard a great deal about the "Third Degree" methods employed by Agents, but that he was agreeably surprised to have received such splen id treatment.

On January 29th, Going and I took a free and voluntary statement from Randall at the Dade County Jail. This statement consisted generally of his denials of having ever been in any trouble before. The relations were pleasant during this interview, that he would like to have his bond reduced if possible, so that he could get out of jail. He said that he was going nuts in jail, and that he would rather have stayed in the hotel roum with the agents than to be in jail.

On February 1st, Going and I again obtained a free and voluntary statement from Randall at the Dade County Jail. This statement consisted of information relative to the Browning Automatic Rifle which Randall had gotten from Adams. At the conclusion of this interview Randall shook hands with both of us, stating that he would like to meet us under more favorable circumstances at a later date, and that he would like to have us consider him as a friend, and not as having been mixed up in instant trouble. He also expressed appreciation for the treatment accorded him by the agents.

Re: Randall

I was in Randall's room in the Alcazar Hotel off and on several times during the first day he was held by the Agents, namely, January 21st. It is my recollection that during the time I guarded him on this day he was handouffed, but as to any of the other times I am not certain. During January 22nd when Randall was removed to Roger Main's room I was present guarding him for about 15 minutes. He was not handouffed on this occasion. I saw no display of firearms on the above two occasions. I was back in room 611, the one in which Randall was being held, during the greater part of the afternoon of January 22nd, while Mr. Hanson was taking the statement from Randall. Randall was treated fairly at all times. There was no attempt to intimidate him, or to force him to make his statement. No promises were made to him, nor was any duress of any kind employed. Randall appeared very willing at all times to make all of his admissions, and maintained a good spirit of cooperation. I do not recall being present when the statement was signed. It is my recollection that Nichols came in and took my place about that time, and I went out on other matters. From that time on until Randall was placed in jail I was in and out of his room. At no time did I see any display of firearms, with the exception of occasions when other agents or I entering the room would remove our side arms and place them in the drawer of the dresser. During these times I was with Randall, he often expressed the thought that he was pleased to be with the agents rather than be in jail, and that he was anxious to keep the matter out of the papers.

Reference should now be had to the statement of Stone with regard to obtaining the two signed statements from Randall at the County Jail in Miami. My testimony with regard to that matter will be the same.

Re: Adams

The only time I saw Adams was in the Cortez Hotel on January 29th, when he was being questioned by Hanson. He was giving the information freely and voluntarily. I noted no efforts by Hanson to trick him into any admissions. They were maintaining only normal conversation. I heard nothing concerning an arrest. I was in the room only about three minutes. I was present at the commissioner's office when Adams was arraigned. This was on the evening of January 29th. He was very friendly and shook hands with Hanson and others.

Stone and I were registered in the El Comodoro on January 17th. At about 1:30 P.M. of January 18th Knight came over to Stone and me, and said he didn't know whether we were Federal men or not, but that if we were Federal men he would help us all he ould because he didn't want to see his place shot up. He didn't indicate that he had any information to give, but that if he could help us he would do so.

On the morning of January 19th, while sitting in the lobby of the El Comodore, Knight came over and sat down beside me and stated that he was sure that he had seen Karpis from a picture of him that appeared in a Miami paper, but that at the time, he was registered in the name of Green and wearing glasses. (None of the registrations at the hotel show that Karpis was registered in the name of Green).

L. B. NICHOLS

Re: Randall

On the afternoon of January 21st I reported to the room in the Alcazar Hotel where Randall was being held. I was there for only about 15 minutes. It is not my recollection that he was handcuffed at that time, nor at any time that I was there during that day. I believe that he was being questioned by Jones and Hanson at that time. At about noon of the second day, January 22, 1935, Jones and I went over to Miami Beach to recover from the possession of Codomo, a Ford sedan which Randall had told the Agents he had gotten from Wynona Burdette. After obtaining the sedan Jones and I returned to the Room of Randall, and it was at this time that Hanson was completing the signed statement. Randall was not handcuffed, and he was being questioned in a very normal manner. No duress nor force nor promises nor threats were made to him. I saw Hanson complete the statement, and have Randall read it for accuracy. Randall did read it, and Hanson said, "Now is that just as you told it to me," and Randall answered, "Yes".

It is my recollection that after the statement was completed Hanson, Jones, Randall and I had dinner in the Coffee Shop of the Alcazar Hotel. After eating I left the said parties.

I saw Randall every day for a short time each day. The Agents would come in to report the results of their investigations to Hanson, and upon arriving at the room we would be asked to guard Randall for a time while one of the other Agents did something else. I at no time saw any handouffs on Randall, except as will be shown hereinafter; he was treated cordially and fairly at all times, nor was there any display of firearms. It was my custom upon arriving in the room to take off my gun and place it in the dresser drawer, but there was never any attempt at intimidation, and this was done only for the convenience and comfort of the Agent.

At about noon of January 24th, I returned to Randall's room to see the boys about going to lunch. It was then that Hanson learned that a questionable plane had alighted in the Everglades, carrying men and heavy arms. Hanson instructed Dunne and myself to remain in the room to guard Randall, while he and Agents Tollett, Jones and Metcalf went to the Everglades. Dunne and I were instructed to assemble the proper arms for our protection and to prevent a delivery of Randall, should such an attempt be made. While Dunne and I were setting up the guns, Randall advised me in substance to set up one of the guns for him. Randall had expressed fear on several occasions that members of the gang might try to put him on the spot because of

information he had given to the Agents. Dunne and I set up a Colt Monitor and a shotgun. The reason for using such a big gun as the Monitor was because all of the smaller and more appropriate guns had been taken by the other Agents. When we set these guns up we specifically informed him that we were doing so in order to prevent a delivery, and he knew that it was for his own protection. We did not want a recurrence of the Kansas City Massacre. For our further protection and the security of Randall we handcuffed Randall to the chair in which he was sitting, while Dunne went downstairs for some food. When Dunne returned to the room with the food, the handcuffs were immediately removed from Randall.

The guns at no time were placed across the knees of either myself or Dunne, but were left on the bed where they would be handy. At no time during the exposure of the guns was there any unnecessary display of the guns in order to intimidate Randall. It should be noted that Randall's statement had been secured a couple of days earlier, for which reason Agents would certainly have no motive in trying to intimidate Randall.

The other agents returned late that afternoon, whereupon I was relieved, and I left the room after the guns had been properly put away in their cases and locked in the closet as it was our custom.

At the time Agents left for the Everglades, Jones mentioned that it would be a good idea to put Randall in jail so that the Agents could be rid of him and would be unencumbered. At this time I distinctly recall Randall expressed his displeasure at being removed to the jail, stating that he would rather remain with Agents, thinking he would be safer and would be better cared for. For this reason we did not take him to jail.

On the evening of January 25th, I was called over to Randall's room to assist in removing him to the office of the U. S. Attorney where a complaint was filed against Randall. Randall was then taken before the Commissioner, at which time Randall was instructed as to his rights. After that Randall took the floor and stated that he had been well treated, and that he wanted to thank the Agents, and that he appreciated the many kindnesses shown him by the Agents.

L. B. NICHOLS

Re: Adams

Shortly after lunch on January 25th, I accompanied Hanson and Jones to the El Comodoro for the purpose of interviewing Adams. Hanson introduced himself and ourselves to Adams, telling him of our identity, stating that he desired to talk to Adams about a matter. Adams invited us to his back office and Hanson told him that we were checking on some people, Karpis, Barkers, et al, who had lived at the hotel. I checked the arrival and departure records, also "safe keeping" envelopes, for the remainder of the afternoon, with the assistance of Sandercock. Late in the afternoon we left. I did not accompany Hanson and Jones when they went upstairs with Adams, and know nothing of any conversation which they had with him.

I returned to the El Comodoro to further check the records. I was cordially greeted by Joe Adams, who stated that he desired to talk to Hanson and Jones as soon as possible. I called Hanson and told him and he said that they would come around. I gave this message to Adams, to which he said, "Well, I'm free now." Then I went around and checked records and saw Hanson and Jones come around about an hour later. In the middle of the afternoon I went over to Hanson's room in the Halcyon Hotel and saw Adams there with Hanson. I stayed there for about 15 minutes, heard Adams being questioned, and did not observe any evidence of trickery or deceit being used during the course of the questioning. Adams asked me if I had found any records that I was looking for. I said "Yee", and Adams said that he had been taken by them, that he was telling the truth and was letting the chips fall where they may.

Late in the afternoon of January 29th, I went to Hanson's room in the Cortez Hotel, where Hanson was taking Adams' statement. I saw the statement completed, saw Adams acknowledge its correctness, and heard Hanson ask him if he wished to sign it, after reading the statement to him, advising Adams that the statement could be used against him, whereupon Adams signed it after acknowledging its voluntary character. At the time the statement was finished, Adams was asked to read it, but he said he had confidence in Hanson and wanted the latter to read it. This was done and at Adams' request another paragraph or two were added to the statement after which Adams signed it.

R. L. JONES

Re: Randall

Jones will testify to much the same information as that contained in the statement of Hanson, re the arrest and the questioning of Randall at the Alcazar Hotel. He will state that on the first day Randall's meals were brought to him, but that on the succeeding days Randall was taken to the Coffee Shop of the said hotel for his meals; that Randall was never threatened with a gun but was merely reminded in a courteous manner that Jones was armed, and he did not want Randall to make a break for his liberty. He will state that on the first day, January 21, he told Randall that he could be taken to the jail instead of being held by the Agents, but Randall preferred to remain with the Agents. Jones will state that the heavy arms were kept securely locked in the closet at all times and that there was never any undue display of firearms, certainly not for the purpose of intimidating Randall or putting him in fear. He will state that Randall was handcuffed for a short time during the first day, January 21, but was unencumbered thereafter; that he was so handouffed the first day because Jones was not familiar with Randall and because he was left alone with Going and did not know what Randall might do. He will state that at night he slept in the same room with Randall, and for precaution he used two handcuffs in securing Randall to the bed, so that Randall would have plenty of room in which to move about during his sleep. He will state that he was present when the written statement was taken by Hanson from Randall, that the same was given freely and voluntarily, and with every apparent desire to cooperate, that no duress was employed in obtaining this statement, and that no form of intimidation was employed. He will state that Randall read the statement after it was written, attested to its accuracy and correctness, and then freely and voluntarily signed same, after having been advised that the admissions contained therein could be used against him.

He will state that on January 24 the Agents received information to the effect that a strange airplane had landed in the Everglades, earrying two strange men heavily armed; that

he, together with Hanson, Metcalf and Tollett, proceeded to the Everglades to make the investigation, fearing said parties might be Karpis and Campbell; that before leaving said Agents removed from the closet the arms which were in cases, no exposure being given to any arms except the gum which Jones was to use; that this was a 351 ealiber rifle which had been confiscated from Russell Gibson in Chicago only a few days earlier (January 8) and that he wanted to be sure that it was in good working order before taking it with him; that he had no intention of intimidating Randall or putting him in fear by such conduct.

Morley is the other co-owner of this hotel, and it occurred to Mr. Richmond this matter ought to be brought to the attention of Mr. Barlow in the Department so that he might decide what he wants to do under these circumstances.

This information is being incorporated in a letter to the Bureau with a copy for the Philadelphia Office asking that office to determine the present condition of Mr. Young and what the facts are in this matter.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Motion to Suppress Statements of Joseph H. Adams and Henry "Duke" Randall.

Please be informed that the motion in this matter came on for a hearing on Saturday, April 25, 1936 before Judge A. V. Long at Miami, Floridg. After the motion and the answer thereto had been read, the Court stated that while the motion to suppress was properly brought, it should be heard before the Judge who is to hear the actual trial of the case against Adams and Randall. He stated that this is a matter of evidence; that all of the evidence in the case should be considered by one Judge and that he would not take it upon himself to bind the conduct of the trial Judge by any decision which he might make prior to the actual trial of the case. Mr. Walter L. Barlow, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, advised the Court that he had made an extensive search for authorities on the subject of suppression of statements and had found that there had never been a case decided in the United States bearing upon a situation similar to this. He stated, however, that the English decisions indicate the motion to suppress will lie, but that it is in the discretion of the Court as to whether it will hear such a motion prior to trial, or will deny the motion until it can be heard by the trial Judge.

I believe that Judge Long decided properly in this matter. If he had decided that he was the proper party to hear such a motion before the actual trial in the matter, a precedent would have been established which would have made it necessary for Agents to travel all over the country in answer to such a motion in any case in which the defense had made a motion to suppress.

Who will be in Miami, Florida on May 18, 1936 and Judge Long indicated that this matter would probably come on for a hearing on that date.

Nothing definite, however, has been decided and I will keep in close touch with Mr. Barlow, so that our Agents can be informed as to the time they will have to be present for a hearing on these motions. I might suggest that it is quite possible these motions will not be heard prior to the trial, but that they may be heard on the collateral hearing during the course of the trial, at which time the jury is excluded and the Judge then decides upon the admissibility of the statements after hearing the evidence produced by both sides. Such was the situation during the course

of the first Bremer trial in St. Paul, when the defense alleged that the statements made by Jimmie Milson were of an involuntary character and were obtained through force and violence. You will recall that the Court in that instance was highly indignant over such allegations made by the defense and was completely satisfied that the statements of Wilson were of a voluntary character and, therefore, admitted them to the jury.

The allegations of Bart A. Riley, attorney for the defendants, with regard to the conduct of Agents in extorting a statement from Randall, were very strongly worded and he went so far as to allege that the Agents used inquisitarial methods. I was somewhat disturbed over the language used in these allegations, fearing that the reaction upon the public would be highly unfavorable to the Bureau. It is interesting to note, however, that newspaper articles relating the facts concerning this motion have disregarded the strong language used by Riley and have given a very fair disclosure of the incident. In connection with this matter, I am attaching hereto a clipping from the Miami Daily News, dated April 25, 1936. It will be interesting for you to note that the earlier edition of this paper carried the same item on the frong page as headlines.

I wish to confidentially advise you that Mr. Walter L. Barlow, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, has furnished me the following information - that on Saturday afternoon, April 25, 1936, he entertained Bart Riley, Attorney for Adams and Randall, and Judge A. V. Long in his hotel room; that Riley and Long proceeded to become highly intoxicated, as a result of which it was necessary for Mr. Barlow to arrange to get the Judge out of the hotel and to his home without anyone knowing of his condition. It was also necessary for Mr. Barlow to call Mr. Riley's wife and have Riley taken to his home because of his condition. Mr. Barlow has informed me that prior to the said parties becoming so thoroughly intoxicated, they discussed the merits of the motions made by Mr. Riley to suppress the statements of Adams and Randall, at which time the Judge told Riley something to this effect -

"Riley, I have known you for a good many years.
I have learned to admire and respect you and I really love you, but your motion was very poorly taken".

At that time, the Judge told Riley that his only allegation of any substance was that "Duke" Randall had been illegally held by the Agents and that that alone was not conclusive of the involuntary character of Randall's statements and that if he had nothing more upon which to stand, the statements would certainly be admissible. Mr. Barlow informed me that the Judge went on to elaborate upon the law and gave a very strong indication that upon a satisfactory showing on the part of the Government that no force had been used by the Agents, the statements of Randall would be admissible in spite of his not having been taken before a Committing Magistrate.

F. McCollum, 1528 West Jackson Street, Spokene, Washington. McCollum holds an amateur pilot license, No. 34300. He was born at Devol, Oklahoma, March 16, 1911, and the records of the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Aeronautics, disclose that he is described as follows: Weight, 175 pounds; height, 6 feet; hair, dark brown, and eyes, blue. A photograph of McCollum is available in the Department of Commerce files.

Inquiry at the Bureau of Aeronautics disclosed that Mr. Crisp Sox, Sheriff of El Paso, Texas, on the night of May 1,=1936, made a telegraphic inquiry of the Department of Commerce, concerning this plane, the inquiry being much the same as that which the Bureau had made.

The records of the Department of Commerce further disclose that C. T. Potter, 1915 Crescent Drive, Seattle, Washington, helds a lien on said plane.

Mr. Connelley telephoned me from New Orleans and said he had just returned from Jackson, Mississippi, where he had conferred with Grace Goldstein, our informant in this case. Mr. Connelley said that after about three hours' questioning and conference, she finally gave us the exact address in New Orleans where the subjects are. He said all they recommended to her was that we would definitely and conclusively recommend to the United States Attorney that she and Connie Morris would not be prosecuted for harboring Karpis. Grace also made Mr. Connelley promise he would not harm her family. In this regard, he said we have no reason to harm her family, and it was ascertained during the conference that the Post Office Inspectors, contrary to Mr. Connelley's instructions, apparently went up there and interviewed Grace's mother.

Mr. Connelley said after he returned to New Orleans this morning, he had occasion to look the place over, which is located on a boulevard and on a very busy corner, and there definitely is someone there. He said he is, of course, going to make a survey of the situation and get them all in there and then hit the place, the raid probably taking place tomorrow morning. The place in question is the bottom floor of a three-story apartment house, with only one apartment for a family on each floor of the building.

SAC Brantley and Agent Buchanan are now on their way to New Orleans, and are going by Dallas and pick up Agent Hurt. With these three men, Mr. Connelley and the 12 Agents, it is believed the situation will be very well covered. Mr. Connelley said they are going to have to get in pretty close for the reason that the situation of the place necessitates it. Additional equipment is being brought by the Agents who are coming down from Dallas. Mr. Connelley said they are going to survey the place further today, and the Bureau will be kept advised of the plans and arrangements.

DETAILS:

The reference report of Special Agent O'Mahoney requests investigation at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel regarding CARLOTTA M. LYCNS who registered Hudson Convertible Coupe, motor #58242, in Ohio for 1935 under suspicious eircumstances. Mr. PAUL ROY, Manager, Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel, Hollywood, California, cooperated with agent in checking the registries of the hotel for 1935 and 1936, but no registration was located for a Carlotta M. Lyons or a C. M. Lyons; however, on June 22, 1935, a MISS C. LYONS of Boston, Massachusetts, registered at the hotel and remained until June 29, 1936. No other information was available at the hotel regarding this party, and she was not recalled by Mr. Roy or the other employees of the hotel. Inquiry was made of all employees by Mr. Roy, but none of them could recall a Carlotta Lyons. No forwarding order was found at the hotel or at the Hollywood Substation Post Office for Carlotta M. Lyons or C. M. Lyons from the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel.

Faulkner, inquiry was made of GEORGE DENT, Secretary G. Brishears & Company, investments and securities, 501 Security Building, 510 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, Calif., who advised that on March 25, 1936, a letter was received from MRS. MADELINE ODELL giving her address as e/o LEO F., SMITH, Hot Springs, N. M., making inquiry regarding assessments on a paving bond of the City of Los Angeles which she held. Mr. Dent advised that inquiry was made of the Bureau of Assessments where it was ascertained that the bond was number 38 covering Lot 12, Block 36, of Tract 7264, in Los Angeles, California, and that the name of the owner of the bond was shown as Madeline Odell, but that no further information appeared in the records of the Bureau of Assessments. Mr. Dent exhibited to agent the file on this matter, including a copy of their reply of recent date to Madeline Odell, and it was found that no information of value looking to the location of Madeline Odell was contained in said file.

It will be noted in reference report of Special Agent Dorwart that LOUIS WAXENEURG, alias JEW KID, alias HARRY WISHERD, alias GEORGE HORERT, and other aliases, was known to be a former pal of WILLIAM ELMER MEAD and a known contact of confidence men on the West Goast, and further that he is reported as residing at the Biltmore Hotel in Los Angeles. Agent made inquiry the captain and all officers assigned to the Bunco Detail of the Los Angeles Police Department and none of them had any information regarding Louis Waxenburg with aliases. A record was found on Waxenburg at the Bureau of Identification, Los Angeles Police Department, where it was reported that Waxenburg, according to a circular issued by Bougherty's Detective Bureau and Military Police, 51 Broadway, New York City, under date of November 8, 1915, was wanted by the New York City Police Department for bond jumping and grand larceny, am a reward of \$500.00 was offered for his apprehension. This information was found on

a fingerprint eard received from San Francisco (#24583) dated December 14, 1918, and which showed Waxenburg's fingerprint classification as 1 R 00 17 17 R 00 17. No description

was found on the fingerprint eard of Waxenburg.

Inquiry was made of EDWARD ROBINSON, Assistant Manager, Biltmore Hotel, who has ecoperated on numerous occasions in the past with this office, and he advised that Waxenburg was unknown to him, and after checking the registries of the hotel he advised that Waxenburg was not presently registered at the hotel and no record of a past registration could be found. Waxenburg's name and various aliases were supplied to Mr. Robinson, as well as to the Captain of the Bunco Detail of the Los Angeles Police Department, and they advised that they would communicate with this office in the event information was secured regarding Waxenburg.

The reference report of Special Agent C. D. White reports investigation conducted regarding the sale of .52 Calibre Automatic Colt Pistol #404724, which is referred to in the report of Special Agent Lee F. Malone, New York City, dated 4-12-55. Agent White's report states that this gun was sold or sent to the Fifth Street Loan Office at San Diego, California.

Special Agent E. G. O'Brien of this office contacted R. FLIESCHMAN, 624
Fifth Avenue, San Diego, California, who is the present owner of the Fifth Street
Loan Office, and was informed that all sales were kept in a regular record book.
This record book was examined and it was ascertained that the gun in question was
sold on April 1, 1922, to L. A. WELLS of 760 Fifth Avenue, San Diego, Calif. Wells'
description was given as 24 years of age, 5' 8" tall, white reco, medium complexion,
and a garage man by occupation. The sale was made by CHARLES WEINHERG who was owner
of the store at that time. Mr. Weinberg, who resides at 1445 Fourth Evenue, San
Diego, advised Agent O'Brien that he could not recall L. A. Wells, nor could he give
any further information regarding him. The records of the San Diego Police Department and Sheriff's Office were chacked and failed to reveal any information regarding
Wells. The address of 760 Fifth Avenue is occupied by an old hotel which is now
patronized by colored people. Inquiry was made of the manager and several of the
patrons without securing any information regarding Wells.

The report of Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, Chicago, dated 2-17-36, reports that WILEY ROHERTS, who resides at 450 East 51st Street, Los Angeles, was a former immate of the County Jail at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and is an acquaintance of the Barker brothers as well as HARRY CAMPRELL. Mr. J. W. PATTERSON, Carrier, Post Office Substation K, 1046 East Vernon Avenue, advised that Wiley Roberts and his family, sonsisting of his wife and two or three small children, resided for a period of two or three months at 415 East 51st Street, and that a forwarding order was left for 422-B East Newmark Street, Monterey Park, California. Patterson was unable to recall any visitors the Roberts family might have had, and he could not recall that any out-of-state automobiles were parked at this residence during the time the Roberts lived there.

D. D. SUMMERAL, Carrier of Mail at Monterey Park, California, advised that Wiley Roberts resides at 440 East Newmark Street, having moved from the above address recently. He could furnish no information regarding mail received by the Roberts, nor could be advise as to whether they had had visitors recently. When questioned regarding the character of people in the neighborhood of the Roberts residence, Mr. Summeral advised that it is a rather poor neighborhood and he could not advise at that time as to the reliability of any parties in that vicinity. He stated that if he were contacted at a later date he would endeavor to secure information regarding some of the neighbors who might be in a position to watch the Roberts residence. Identification Orders on subjects KARPIS and CAMPRELL were furnished Mr. Summeral and he advised that he would closely observe the Roberts residence each day and would immediately telephone this office in the event strangers were found to be visiting there, or in the event automobiles without-of-state licenses were found to be parked at this address.

Identification Orders on subjects Karpis and Campbell have been furnished the managers of the following mineral springs located in this territory:-

Matilija Hot Springs;

The manager of each of these establishments advised that no one resembling Karpis or Campbell had been a patron recently. Identification Orders will be furnished the remaining hot springs and mineral baths in this territory in the near future.

Today the writer had a conference with United States Emerach B. Freed of Cleveland, Ohio, at which time he specifically requested that he be advised as to the present whereabouts of Fred Hunter, whom the U.S. Attorney is desirous of removing to this district for prosecution in connection with the Garretts-ville mail train robbery.

It was mentioned by Mr. Freed that he wanted it definitely understood that in making this request he, of course, had in mind that he was not desirous of effecting the removal of subject Hunter until such time as the Bureau representatives at New Orleans had completely interviewed him relative to his knowledge of the Brekid case and the Carrettsville mail train robbery; in other words. Mr. Freed's attitude was one indicative of a desire to fully cooperate with the Bureau by not wishing to interfere in effecting the removal of Hunter until the Bureau had fully interrogated Hunter. Mr. Freed also mentioned that he believed that Hunter should be removed to this district, because of the fact that he, Hunter, can possibly clear up the so-called Warren mail job in which two other persons have been previously convicted. He mentioned that he was especially desirous of having Hunter interviewed in regard to the Warren mail job, so that he could initiate action looking toward the release of the two men now serving time for that job.

The writer informed Mr. Freed that he believed that Hunter was being held in New Orleans and that he, the writer, was not aware of any action that was contemplated to be taken at New Orleans with reference to Hunter.



MELIORANDUM

On January 17, 1934, Edward G. Bremer, President of the Commercial State Bank, St. Paul, Minnesota, was kidnaped between 8:15 and 8:45 A.M., immediately after he had driven his daughter to the Summit School. He was taken to a hide-out where he was held until February 7, 1934, when he was released near Rochester, Minnesota after the payment of \$200,000 in ransom money by Walter McGee, who was named by Bremer as the contact man.

In effecting the payment of ransom the kidnapers used four flashlights as signals. A member of the Barker-Karpis gang was identified as the purchaser of three flashlights similar to the ones used in connection with the ransom pay-off.

Although the place where Eremer was held was not immediately identified, he advised that the car in which he was returned contained a number of gasoline cans used for the purpose of refueling the gasoline tank. He stated that at a point about half way between the place where he was held and Rochester, Minnesota, the kidnapers stopped and filled the gasoline tank with gasoline from these cans. Four gasoline cans, similar to those described by Bremer, were located shortly after Bremer's release and from these cans there has been developed in the Technical Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, a latent fingerprint found to be identical with another member of the Berker-Karpis gang. Upon identifying two members of the Barker-Karpis gang as participants in this kidnaping, the Bureau commenced an intensive investigation with a view to the location and apprehension of members of this gang.

This gang is known to be composed of numerous persons, the more notorious of whom are the following: Alvin Karpis, Arthur R. Barker, Harry Campbell, Volney Davis, William Weaver, Harry Sawyer, William Bryan Bolton, James J. Wilson, Dr. Joseph P. Moran, William Edward Vidler, Philip J. Delaney, John Joseph McLaughlin, Sr., Elmer Farmer, Harold V. Allderton, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton, William J. Harrison, Oliver A. Berg, Bruno Austin, Joseph H. Adams, Duke Randall, Nathaniel Heller, Cassius McDonald, Paula Harmon, Fred Barker (deceased), Kate Barker (deceased), Fred Goetz (deceased), Dolores Delaney, Wynona Burdette and Russell Gibson, (deceased) These individuals are known to be desperate criminals. Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker have been sought by the Sheriff's office at West Plains, Missouri, for the murder of Sheriff C. R. Kelly, during December, 1931. Arthur R. Barker was paroled from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, on September 10, 1932, where he was under sentence of life for the crime of murder. Volney Davis was also serving a life*sentence at the same institu-

tion for the crime of murder and was granted leave of absence November 3, 1932, which leave of absence was extended on June 30, 1933 to July 1, 1934.

On March 22, 1934, the Attorney General announced that Alvin Karpis and Arthur R. Barker had been definitely identified by the Federal Bureau of Investigation of the United States Department of Justice as two of the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer.

Prior to the payment of the ransom, a list of all serial numbers of the money used in the payment was obtained. Printed copies of this list were made by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and distributed to all banks in the United States. As a result of this distribution, the officials of a bank at Chicago, Illinois, on April 23, 1934, notified the Chicago office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that an individual had that day presented \$900.00 consisting of currency which had been identified as a part of the Bremer ransom money. All banks in Chicago and vicinity were immediately contacted and their attention was directed to the list of ransom bills previously furnished them with the requests that the Chicago Bureau office be immediately advised in the event an attempt was made to exchange this money.

On April 23, 1934, representatives of a large bank in the loop district, Chicago, Illinois, reported that an individual had exchanged some of the Bremer ransom money and this individual was identified as William E. Vidler, who was found to frequent a certain address of questionable reputation. As a result of the information furnished by the officials of this bank, Vidler was taken into custody and there was found on his person \$3,185.00, \$2,625.00 of which was identified as a part of the Bremer ransom money. Upon being questioned, Vidler advised that he had obtained the money from one John J. McLaughlin, Sr., known to him as "Boss" McLaughlin. On April 27, 1934, McLaughlin was taken into custody and at first stated that he knew nothing concerning the Bremer case, but when advised that his son, John J. McLaughlin, Jr., had also been taken into custody, confessed to representatives of the Bureau his participation in the exchanging of Bremer ransom money at various Chicago banks assisted by William E. Vidler and Philip J. Delaney.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation after a short period of surveillance approached John J. McLaughlin, Jr., at his place of employment. He was requested by Special Agents to accompany them to the Chicago Bureau office for questioning in connection with this case

*

and in acceding to the request, denied that he had worn a hat that morning. It was pointed out to him that he had been observed that morning wearing a hat and, therefore, was requested to obtain it. There was found located in his hat band a sum of \$300.00, including \$85.00 identified as part of the Bremer ransom money.

John J. McLaughlin, Sr., in confessing his part in the Bremer case, stated that he first negotiated with one Frankie Wright in the lobby of the Sherman Hotel and was later introduced by Wright to individuals known as "Izzy" and "Slim"; that he agreed to exchange the money on a 5% cut basis and understood from information furnished by "Izzy" and "Slim" that the first \$100,000 to be exchanged was the "Hamm" ransom money paid by William Hamm, Jr., of St. Paul to effect his release from a gang of kidnapers, and that \$200,000 paid by Edward G. Bremer would be forthcoming at a later date. None of the Hamm money has been located, however.

There was returned at St. Paul, Minnesota, on May 4, 1934, an indictment charging Arthur R. Barker, Alvin Karpis, John J. McLaughlin, Sr., John J. McLaughlin, Jr., William E. Vidler, Philip J. Delaney, "Slim", "Izzy", Frankie Wright, John Doe and Richard Roe with violation of the Federal Kidnaping Statute dated June 22, 1932. On June 16, 1934, Vidler, Delaney and the senior McLaughlin entered pleas of not guilty in the United States District Court at St. Paul, Minnesota, and were held in default of bonds set at \$30,000.00 each. McLaughlin, Jr. had previously been released at Chicago, Illinois on May 21, 1934, under bond of \$5,000 calling for his appearance before the United States District Court at St. Paul whenever his presence was desired. On August 14, 1934, McLaughlin, Sr., having successfully petitioned the Court for a reduction of bond was released under bond of \$15,000.00

Through investigative efforts, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation located Oliver A. Berg in Chicago, Illinois on August 22, 1934, where he has been identified as "Izzy". Pending prosecution of this case, Berg has been returned to the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois, from which institution he was classed as an escape, having failed to return after the Illinois State Appellate Court sustained the sentence of ten years to life imprisonment imposed by a lower Court after conviction on a charge of robbery with a gun.

On October 31, 1934 a continuance was granted to William Vidler and Phillip Delaney from the November Term of Court and their bond was reduced to \$5,000.00 each. They were released on the same date.

į

On November 2, 1934 a nolle prosequi was entered by the Federal Court at St. Paul, Minnesota, as to the indictment pending against McLaughlin, Jr.

On January 8, 1935, Arthur R. Barker was apprehended with his paramour, Mildred Kuhlman, by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation as he was leaving his apartment at 432 Surf Street, Chicago, Illinois. Coincident with the apprehension of Barker, Russell Gibson was located in another section of the city by Special Agents of the Bureau and killed while resisting arrest. His wife, Clara Gibson, Bryan Bolton alias Monte Carter, and Ruth Heidt were taken into custody for questioning in connection with the case.

On January 16, 1935, Fred Barker and his mother, Kate Barker, were located in a house on Lake Weir, Oklawaha, Florida and after a gum battle with representatives of the Bureau lasting several hours, were killed while resisting arrest. On the same date, the hide-out where victim Bremer was held by his kidnapers was located at Bensenville, Illinois. Elmer Farmer and Harold Allderton were taken into custody January 16 and 17, 1935, respectively, as aiders and abettors in the kidnaping.

On January 22, 1935, the Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota returned indictments superseding the indictment returned on May 4, 1934. The new indictments charged Arthur R. Barker, Alvin Karpis, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell, Elmer Farmer, Harold Allderton, William Weaver, Harry Sawyer, William J. Harrison, Bryan Bolton, John Doe and Richard Roe with the kidnaping in violation of Section 408a, Title 18, of the United States Code. A conspiracy indictment was also returned on the same date naming, in addition to those mentioned above, Joseph P. Moran, Oliver A. Berg, John J. McLaughlin, William E. Vidler, Philip J. Delaney, James J. Wilson, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton and one "Whitie".

The trial commenced at St. Paul, Minnesota, on April 15, 1935. Bryan Bolton entered a plea of guilty and sentence was deferred. On May 6, 1935, the charges against Jess Doyle and Edna Murray were dismissed. Bruno Austin was discharged from custody on the same date, May 6, 1935. Elmer Farmer, on May 13, 1935, during the course of the trial, entered a plea of guilty and sentence was deferred. The trial was concluded on May 16, 1935, and the following day, May 17, 1935, the jury returned a verdict of guilty as to Arthur R. Barker, Qliver A. Berg, James J. Wilson,

John J. McLaughlin, Sr., and Harold Allderton. On May 17, 1935, Barker and Berg were sentenced to life imprisonment. On June 7, 1935 Farmer was sentenced to serve 20 years; Harold Allderton was sentenced to serve 20 years; McLaughlin and Wilson were sentenced to serve 5 years. Sentence as to Bolton has been deferred. Vidler and Delaney were acquitted by the jury on May 17, 1935. Edna Murray was returned to the Missouri State Penitentiary, from which institution she was an escape, to serve the remainder of a 25-year sentence on the charge of highway robbery. Jess Doyle was delivered to county authorities at Fairbury, Nebraska, and on August 24, 1935 was sentenced to serve 10 years in the Nebraska State Penitentiary on the charge of bank robbery.

On May 3, 1935, Harry Sawyer was taken into custody by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation with the cooperation of local officers at Pass Christian, Mississippi, and was removed to St. Paul, Minnesota to be held in Ramsey County Jail awaiting trial. On June 1, 1935, Volney Davis was taken into custody by Special Agents of the Bureau at Chicago, Illinois, and on the following day was removed to St. Paul to await his trial. On June 7, 1935 Davis was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Special Agents of the Bureau learned the true identity of "Whitie" and found him in the custody of the Chicago, Illinois Police Department under the name of Bruno Austin alias Putis. Austin had been taken into custody on January 20, 1935, just as he was leaving a church in Chicago, Illinois immediately following his wedding. He was wanted by the State's Attorney, Cook County, Illinois on charges of robbery and bond jumping. Austin was removed to St. Paul, Minnesota to face trial, charged with conspiracy to kidnap Edward George Bremer. On May 6, 1935 he was discharged by order of the Court. He was later arrested by the Chicago Police Department and has now pleaded guilty on the charge of murder.

After the raid at Oklawaha, Florida, which resulted in the death of Fred Barker and his mother, Special Agents conducted considerable investigation at Miami, Florida and Havana, Cuba and developed evidence to show that the fugitive, Alvin Karpis, had been concealed and harbored. On February 7, 1935 the Federal Grand Jury at Jacksonville, Florida returned sixteen indictments charging Joseph H. Adams, manager of the El Commodoro Hotel, Miami, Florida, Nathaniel Heller, manager of the Park View Hotel, Havana, Cuba, Henry "Duke" Randall, an orchestra leader, Cassius M. McDonald, a confidence man, Wynona Burdette, paramour of Harry Campbell, and Dolores Delaney, paramour of Alvin Karpis, with harboring, conspiracy to harbor,

misprision felony and conspiracy to commit misprision felony. Adams and Randall were also charged with unlawful possession of a machine gun in violation of the National Firearms Act.

Each of the four men named as defendants in the indictments returned at Jacksonville, Florida on February 7, 1935 were taken into custody and later released on bond. Wynona Burdette and Dolores Delaney were taken into custody on January 20, 1935 at Atlantic City, New Jersey, removed to Miami, Florida where they entered pleas of guilty on March 25, 1935, to charges contained in the respective indictments and were sentenced on that date to terms aggregating five years, to be served by each. The two women were committed to the United States Detention Farm, Milan, Michigan.

Subsequent investigation disclosed the presence of Jess Doyle at Pittsburg, Kansas where he engaged Special Agents of the Bureau in a gun battle on the morning of February 7, 1935. Doyle proceeded to Girard, Kansas, surrendered to the Sheriff and was removed to St. Paul, Minnesota on February 11, 1935 with Edna Murray, paramour of Volney Davis, who had been taken into custody at Pittsburg, Kansas. Harry C. Stanley, brother of Edna Murray and his wife, Mary Stanley, were taken into custody February 7, 1935 at Pittsburg, Kansas and on March 12, 1935, both entered pleas of guilty, at Wichita, Kansas to an information filed by the United States Attorney charging them with harboring. Stanley was thereupon sentenced to serve six months in the Sedgwick County Jail, Wichita, Kansas and was fined \$1,000.00. Sentence of Mary Stanley was suspended for a period of five years.

On September 1, 1935, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice located the home of William Weaver and Nyrtle Eaton. This home is situated about two miles south of Allandale, Florida on U. S. Highway #1. At this point Weaver and Eaton had been living as man and wife using the name of J. W. Osborne. They had been operating a small chicken ranch. Weaver and Eaton were taken into custody on September 1, 1935 without any struggle, and on September 2, 1935, after signing waivers of removal, were removed to St. Paul, Minnesota, where they are under indictment.

On January 6, 1935, the body of an unidentified man was recovered from a burned barn in Contarioville, DuPage County, Illinois, by the Sheriff's Office in Wheaton, Illinois. This fire had occurred on the evening of January 5, 1935. There was found near the body a pair of Octagonal shaped glasses. Harrison is known to have worn octagon glasses. There was also found near the body a wrist watch containing Elgin works, Serial #32166666, Case #0211813, size 6-0, grade 428.

TO SECURE OF THE PROPERTY OF T

Investigation by Special Agents of this Bureau disclosed that the body recovered was that of William J. Harrison. Agents on September 6, 1935 succeeded in tracing this watch to the possession of Harrison, and have ascertained that on August 21, 1933, he had this watch repaired through a jeweler friend, William T. Crosby, at 56 Clinton Street, Hammond, Indiana. Crosby's records disclosed that Crosby had referred familiarly to his friend and patron as Billie Harrison. Harrison had been known to Crosby for the past six or seven years as a bootlegger operating in Hammond and Gary, Indiana and Calumet City, Illinois.

On September 27, 1935, a Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Minnesota, indicted William Weaver, Cassius McDonald and Harry Sawyer, together with the following persons: Alvin Karpis, Arthur "Doc" Barker, Harry Campbell, William J. Harrison, Bryan Bolton, Elmer Farmer and Harold Allderton, charging them with having conspired between September 15, 1933 and January 15, 1935, to violate the Kidnaping law in connection with the abduction of Edward George Bremer at St. Paul, Minnesota, on January 17, 1934.

Myrtle Eaton, although removed to St. Paul on September 2, 1935, after her arrest near Allandale, Florida, was not reindicted at St. Paul on September 27, 1935. It is noted that she is already under an indictment which was returned against her at St. Paul, Minnesota, on January 22, 1935, charging her with conspiracy to kidnap and transport Mr. Bremer in interstate commerce.

Myrtle Eaton was indicted on two counts at Orlando, Florida, on October 9, 1935, the indictment being filed at Jacksonville, Florida. The indictment charged her with harboring William Weaver on or about September 1, 1935, and in the second count charged her with conspiracy to violate Section 141 of the Criminal Code. Her bond was set at \$25,000 returnable at Jacksonville forthwith.

On October 11, 1935, Bruno Austin, who was previously a suspect in the Bremer case, was tried in the State Courts in Chicago, Illinois, charged with murder. On October 11, 1935, he was found guilty, and on the same date was sentenced to serve life imprisonment in the Illinois State Penitentiary.

Cassius McDonald was arrested by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Detroit, Michigan on September 26, 1935. On September 27, 1935 a Federal Grand Jury, sitting at St. Paul, Minnesota returned an indictment against Cassius McDonald, as noted above, charging him with conspiracy to kidnap. McDonald was arraigned before the United

States Commissioner at Detroit, Michigan on September 26, 1935, at which time he stood mute. His bond was ultimately fixed at \$25,000, in default of which he was remanded to the Wayne County Jail, Detroit, Michigan. On November 4, 1935 the United States District Court at Detroit, Michigan signed an order of removal to become effective on November 9, 1935. On November 9, 1935 McDonald was removed from Detroit, Michigan to St. Paul, Minnesota and in default of bond he was remanded to the Ramsey County Jail at St. Paul, Minnesota to await trial on January 6, 1936.

The trial of Harry Sawyer, William Weaver and Cassius McDonald commenced at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 6, 1936 and on January 24, 1936 the jury returned a verdict of guilty as to all. Harry Sawyer and William Weaver were given life sentences. Cassius McDonald, his sentence being deferred until February 1, 1936, was on that date sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment.

On February 26, 1936, a Grand Jury at Tampa, Florida, returned two indictments, to be substituted for the indictment returned on October 9, 1935, filed at Jacksonville, Florida, against Myrtle Eaton, charging her in one indictment with conspiracy, together with William Weaver, to harbor and conceal him, and in the other indictment charging her in five counts with harboring and concealing William Weaver.

On April 22, 1936, Homer S. Curmings, Attorney General of the United States, under the authority vested in him by an Act of Congress approved June 6, 1934, offered a reward of \$5,000.00 for information furnished to a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, which results in the apprehension of Alvin Karpis, and a reward of \$2,500.00 for information furnished to a representative of this Bureau which results in the apprehension of Harry Campbell.

At about 5:30 P. M. on May 1, 1936, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation apprehended Alvin Karpis in New Orleans, Louisiana. Fred Hunter and a woman were likewise arrested at the same time, both being in company with Karpis. This woman has for several months been the paramour and companion of Fred Hunter. The latter is presently charged with having participated with Karpis, Campbell and others in the Garrettsville, Ohio, mail train robbery which occurred on November 7, 1935. Immediately after the apprehension of Karpis, he was removed to St. Paul, Minnesota, where he is under indictment in the Hamm and Bremer kidnaping cases.
