Reference is made to Bureau letter dated April 28, 1936, transmitting copy of a letter dated April 17, 1936, received from the Oklahoma City Office, in which the informant mentioned that while in the hotel room of Sarakoker he noticed a quantity of money in Coker's bag, some of which was in long sheets of several bills to a sheet and was principally in twenty dollar bills.

For the information of the Bureau and interested offices, a confidential inquiry was made by Special Agent R. P. Burruss, without mentioning the nature of the investigation, of Mr. Alvin Hall, Director, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, as to whether national bank notes were still being issued to the national banks in sheets containing four notes each, as was the practice for some years. Mr. Hall stated that this procedure was discontinued in August, 1935, and that all outstanding national bank notes in sheet form are being redeemed by the Treasury Department. He stated that national bank notes are generally signed by the proper official of the bank when they are received from the Treasury Department in sheet form and are immediately cut to individual notes for proper distribution.

Mr. Hans Ireland, Assistant Treasurer, American Security and Trust Commany, Washington, D. C., also informed Agent Burruss that when national banks receive sheets containing four national bank notes from the Treasury Department, they sign the notes, cut the sheets and issue the single bills without holding them for any length of time. Mr. Ireland took occasion to advise agent Burruss that sheets containing four notes each more usually distributed by counterfeiters and he stated that about ninety-eight per cent of such notes are usually counterfeit.

Inasmuch as the Treasury Department has not issued any notes in sheet form containing four notes each since August, 1935, and further in view of the fact that national banks customerily sign, cut and distribute these sheets of four notes shortly after their receipt from the Treasury Department, the possibility exists that if the notes referred to in the Oklahoma City Office letter are not counterfeit, they were probably obtained during a bank robbery which took place prior to August, 1935.



Morris and Grace Goldstein which appeared in the newspaper, Akers admitted to me that he had furmished the reporter the photograph of Connie Morris, but that he had not furnished the photograph of Grace Goldstein, it being his impression that this photograph had been ebtained by the reporter from the listerie listel and that it had been given to the reporter by one of Grace Goldstein's girls. This in my opinion is a deliberate lie, as Akers no doubt had in his possession the same photograph that we had of Grace Goldstein and possibly secured this photograph through the Post Office Inspectors. As ... you will recall the photograph I refer to is the one of Grace sitting on the bumper of an mutomobile and while the outomobile does not - / appear in the newspaper, the pose of Greec is identical with that in the photograph we have,

During my conversation with Akers he stated that it was his opinion Grace Coldstein had been "snatched" by our agents and that she had been held until such time as we had secured from her information as to the whereabouts of Karpis and Freddie Hunter. I said to Akers in this semmestion that I felt, and that certain of the Bureau efficials who were well aware of the activities

of certain parties at Hot Springs also felt, that
there were persons at Hot Springs who would be
far more interested in having Grace Goldstein leave
Hot Springs than would the agents of this Bureau and
that it was entirely possible that those persons
had been responsible for her leaving, through the

might possibly question her, in which event she
might furnish information as to the activities

I further informed Wakelin that Bureau officials were firmly convinced that certain persons in Hot Springs were well aware of the fact that Karpis and Hunter were in Hot Springs for a considerable time before the raid at the Moodcook house near Ymplyorn and that it was not at all unlikely that those persons would be called upon to explain just may they had not given the Bureau the benefit of this knowledge. While I have not had previous occasion to talk with makelin I am convinced that he was much disturbed and during our conversation shawed vigorously upon a siger and at no time did he look me in the face. 

MEMORANDUM FOR FILES

Re: BREKID.

In accordance with the instructions of Mr. Counciley on May 4, 1936, the writer called at the Hot Springs Police Department and engaged in conversation with Chief of Police Jon Takelin and Chief of Detectives Herbert Akers. At the time of this visit the writer had another official matter to cover, i.e. the identification and location of a megro memod Jon Noble, with aliance, subject of an W. M. V. T. A. case. The following is the substance of that took place on this occasion:

As I entered the alley or driveway leading to the police station, I noticed Chief Makelin sitting on a beach outside the station. He did not speak to me until I sat down beside him and, apparently, he was very uneasy and was wondering what my mission was. We spoke of the weather and I asked him several questions about Joe Moble. He did not mention the Brokid case at all.

I then inquired of Chief Febelin if Chief Abers was in and if he was busy. He stated he was in and was not busy. I then welled back to his office but he was not there. Upon returning to the front of the station, I saw Abers, who was sitting in a shair reading the newspapers. Abors then inquired as to what the hell I was doing there and what did I want, but before I could answer, he said he would see me in a few minutes as he tax reading about "Dillinger".

I then went outside and set foun and shortly he came out and invited me beek to the office, stating he would give me about three minutes. Apparently, he was kidding. Wakelin, Akors and I then yent back to the private effice.

I then asked Akers several questions about Joe Hoble and he then brought up the Brekid matter. His first question was, "Where have you got Grace". I told him I didn't know where Grace was and he continued by asking if I picked her up or knew who picked her up.

I sold him I did not pick her up and knew nothing about her disappearance as I had been in attendance of sourt. He said he thought I was lying and that we could save him about forty-eight hours of work if we did tell him where she was as he intended to find out about her disappearance. I again told him I had been in court and knew nothing of what had transpired in Hot Springs. He then asked we if it was possible that some of the boys had picked her up and I didn't know about it. I told him it was possible. He then said he was going to catch me in a lie and asked me for the office telsphone number. I gave it to him and he then called and talked to Mr. Pletcher. During the conversation between Mr. Pletcher and Akers Esveral suggestions were made by Chief Wakelin as to the details of Orace's disappearance.

3 . Subsequent to the convergation between Akers and Mr. Plotcher, Akors then stated he guessed I was telling him the truth. Thereupon he told me the details of the disappearance of Grace. He stated he received information that Grace had been away from the elly for several weeks and when she returned she went to the Best Tourist Court instead of the Hatterie Rotel; that on last Tuesday, April Esth, Grace went to the Hatterie and entered the front door, after which she called and said she was back and would be up in a few minutes; that thereafter one of the girls saw her cross Central Avenue with a man and enter a ear which drove away very fast; that apparently Grace was going against her will and the man with her was tall, dressed in grey -suit and grey hat and had a mistache; (This may have been some more -"hidding" as the writer was dresped in a grey suit and a grey hat at the time) and that Grace has not been heard from since that time. I'm asked Akers what make of ear she left in and he said a ford, Chevrolet or Oldsmobile, he did not know which. I then told him it was all news to me. Bekelin then stated that it might have been one of the Karpis

Abore then asked me if any of our men had been in Not Springs recently and I told him I didn't know but probably someone had. He then said that someone called the Hatterie Retal by telephone and inquired for Grace stating that they had been in touch with Connie and had a message to deliver.

Akers then told me that several nights previous some man, the thought it was a drunk, called the Entterie Botel and after inquiring for Grace said he was going to blow her to he with dynamite because she put those boys on the spot.

Akers then told me of the efforts he made to apprehend some man, (he referred to him an O'Connell) at the Seat Tourist Camp; that he received information as to the location of this man and relayed the same to Special Agent Frank S. Smith and Post Office Inspector Haynes.



IN VANISHING OF MRS. GOLDSTEIN

Friend of Girl Held In New Orleans.

Special to the Gasette.

Hot Springs, May 4.-As Mrs. Grace Goldstein continued absent today from the rooming house that she has conducted here, belief grew among her friends that "something must have happened to her." They were certain that she would have communicated with them if possible.

There are many things that might indicate that, somehow or other, she may have had a part in the capture of Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, in New Orleans Friday night.

She is said to have been a friend of Connie" Robbins of Hot Springs with said to have been with Karpis and red Hunter when they were arreste in New Orleans.

The last seen of Mrs. Goldstein here was on Monday, April 27 a week ago. She had driven to Little Rock and when she returned; she went to the foot of the stairs leading up to her rooming house and called to her housekeeper up-stairs. She said that she had just got-ten back from Little Rock and would return and come upstairs in a few minutes. She was seen to cross Cen-

minutes. She was seen to cross Central avenue and get into a ear which was driven away rapidly.

It was said that previously Mrs.

Goldstein had taken Connie Robbins in her car to a point south of the city where the Robbins girl transferred to another car that headed in the direction

of Arkadelphia. Had Been Questioned.

Hot Springs police officers say that they know that Department of Justice agents questioned Mrs. Goldstein several times while they were seeking trace of Karpis here before and after they raided a cottage on Lake Hamilton. Friends of Mrs. Goldstein also expressed belief that she had been questioned. by government agents several times.

They also say that she was "shadow-They also say that she was "shadow-ed" everywhere she went for some time before her disappearance. They say that they are convined that if government agents do not have her in custiody, it is quite-possible that she is being held by friends of Karpis.

While it is quite vertain that Mrs. Goldstein knew Karpis, there is no evilance that she knew his increase.

With reference to the report of Special Agent To Bo Billings, Los Angeles, California, dated March 12, 1936, relative to a tracing received as a result of a cover on the mail of Mro and Mrs. Ray Huntsman, Los Angeles, California, it was ascertained by the writer there is no street in Kansas City known as "Cardesty" or "Gardesty". However, there is a North Hardesty in Kansas City, Missouri. The 1935 directory lists Harry A. Arthur as residing at 321 North Hardesty.

At the Northeast Sub-station, United States Post Office Department, the writer interviewed Mr. V. E. Ford, mail carrier on the route which covers 321 North Hardesty. He advised that Harry A. Arthur has resided at the above address for a number of years and owns his home; that to his knowledge he is retired and was formerly a detective on the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. Mr. Ford suggested that the writer interview Mr. H. M. Carroll, 313 North Hardesty, who is a reliable individual and who would probably know Mr. Arthur.

Accordingly, Mr. H. M. Carroll, 313 North Hardesty, Kansas City, Missouri, upon interview advised that he is acquainted with Harry A. Arthur, and that Mr. Arthur has lived at his present address for many years; that he was formerly a detective of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department, and that his wife's name, prior to her marriage, was Huntsman and that she has a son living in Los Angeles by the name of Ray. He stated he does not recall seeing Ray or any other individuals visiting with the Arthurs in recent months.

With reference to the teletype message received from the Los Angeles Office dated March 27, 1936, relative to J. B. Frozier, Agent interviewed Mr. C. H. Philgreen at the Westport Sub-station, United States Post Office Department, who stated that he carries mail to 4550 Mill Creek, at which place is located the Sunset Lodge Apartments; that Mr. J. B. Crozier resides in the Sunset Lodge Apartments and that at the present time he is out of the city. He advised Mrs. Jane Johnston, manager of these apartments, is a reputable individual.

Mrs. Jane Johnston, Apartment number 1, 4550 Mill Creek, was interviewed by the writer, at which time she advised that Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Crozier rented Apartment 209 in her building on February 1, 1936, and that about March 1, 1936, they left for Florida and were expected to return to Kamsas City about April 1, 1936. She stated that when she rented the apartment to Mr. Crozier he stated he was associated with Mr. Anderson in the Greyhound Breeding and Racing business and that he gave as a reference Mr. McPherson and Mr. Kopp of the City Bank in Kansas City, Missouri. Miss Johnston

advised that inasmuch as the City Bank owns the Sunset Lodge
Apartments she called Mr. Duffin, employed therein, and verified
the report. She advised that Mrs. Enyard, who lives across the
hall from the Croziers, received a posteard from Mrs. Crosier
which was postmarked Tampa, Florida, in which they stated they
were leaving the following day for Miami, Florida. She stated
Mr. Crozier advised her he had come to Kansas City from Los Angeles,

On April 7, 1936, Mrs. Jane Johnston, Manager of the Sunset Lodge Apartments, telephoned the Kansas City Office and advised that Mr. Crozier had returned to the apartment on the evening of April 4, 1936.

Agent interviewed Mr. George Kopp, Vice-President, and Mr. James F. McPherson, Cashier, City National Bank & Trust Company, 1801 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, at which time they advised they made the acquaintance of Mr. J. B. Crosier through Mr. Vernon D. Andrews, President of the National Coursing Association; that Mr. Andrews was considered a very reputable individual and that from their dealings with Mr. Crosier they considered him a person of good reputation. In this connection they advised that J. B. Cresier is Secretary and Treasurer of the National Greyhound Breeding and Racing Association, with offices at 202 Whitten Manor Building, 1550 Main Street, Kansas City, Missourie

The writer interviewed Mr. J. B. Crozier at the Whitton Manor Building, 4550 Main Street, Kansas City, Missouri, at which time he advised that he has been connected with the racing business for a number of years and formerly was employed at the Santa Anita Race Track near Los Angeles. About a year ago he became associated with the National Greyhound Breeding and Racing Association and several months ago was elected Secretary and Treasurer of this organisation.

Photographs of William Elmer Mead and Leon Felix were exhibited to Mr. Crozier, who, after examining same, stated he does not recall ever having seen Leon Felix, but it was his opinion that he had seen William Elmer Mead about a year ago at the Santa Anita Race Track. He was unable to furnish any information, however, as to the associates of Mead at that time. He stated he has known Mr. Ray Huntsman, Los Angeles, California, for about fifteen years, having made his acquaintance by reason of the fact he, Huntsman, had rented an apartment from him while they were living in California

and were neighbors for a number of years.

Mr. Crozier expressed a desire to cooperate fully with the F.B.I. and in this connection stated that he would attempt to secure, in a diplomatic manner, the present location of Leon Felix through Ray Huntsman after which he would advise the Kansas City Office.

During the course of the conversation it was noted by the writer that Mr. Crosier is very well asquainted with the various race tracks throughout the United States. In this connection he mentioned a number of the tracks and mentioned reliable individuals connected with them who, in his opinion, could be trusted in the event the Bureau ever wished to conduct investigation at any of the race tracks.

He mentioned that the Bainbridge Track near Cleveland, Ohio, will open its spring meeting within the next week or two and that on Decoration Day the dog racing will be opened at Bainbridge Track, following the horse racing. He stated that an individual by the name of Arthur Blood is, in his opinion, a reputable individual and would cooperate fully with the Bureau in the event that it is desirable to conduct any investigation at that place. This is being set out for the information of the Cleveland Office inasmuch as previous investigation by the Detroit Office in this connection has indicated that members of the Barker-Karpis gang frequented the Bainbridge track in the year 1934.

He stated also that the Euffolk-Downs race track and the Monderland Park Greyhound Track at Ravere, Massachusetts would be a likely place for confidence men to frequent when the weather is warm. He stated these tracks will open some time in May and that a good contact at that place is Paul Mulligan, 3 Cushman Avenue, Ravere, Massachusetts.

He stated also that the dog racing at Baden Kennel Club at South City, California, and horse racing in that vicinity would also be a good place for confidence men. He mentioned that Mr. L. C. Commins, 3529A Mission Street, San Francisco, is well acquainted with horse racing and dog racing in the vicinity of San Francisco, California, and would be an excellent contact for the Bureau.

In the event Mr. Crozier is unable to ascertain the location of Leon Felix the Kansas City Office will consider the advisability of interviewing Mr. Harry A. Arthur for this purpose.



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAME

, RB: Al¥in Karpis.

Mr. Stanley Carroll of the Universal News Service telephoned and inquired if Karpis had admitted any other crimes than the two kidmapings. Istated that Karpis had talked about various robberies and crimes; that he had not made a full admission concerning these jobs but he seems to have been involved in about thirteen to fifteen bank robberies, about three train robberies, three kidnapings, and although he has admitted no surders evidence indicates he has been involved in the killing of three or four men. I stated that Karnis expected to receive a life sentence; that the third kilmaping was the abduction of a doctor in Pennsylvania whom Karpis took with him for medical treatment following his Atlantic City flight. Mr. Carroll inquired about any money that Karpis might have hidden. I stated that I had questioned Karpis about any money and guns but that he would not reveal where he had deposited any money although in icating that he had made provision for the care of the Delaney woman and her baby and that he would say only that he had guns hidden in *Ohio, refusing to reveal additional details for fear of getting his friends into trouble. I stated that Karpis would not talk about anyone whom he felt was his friend. I stated that Karpis had had a face lifting operation but that it was a very crude job. I stated that some photographs had been made of the results of the operation and when the photographs were reselved at the Buresu I would furnish Mr. Carroll with sopies; that the operation had been performed by a Dr. Joseph P. Moran. Er. Carroll inquired if the Bureau had been able to get a line on Harry Campbell. I stated that no comment could be sinds on this as it was under active investigation. I stated that the Bureau was conducting an intensive fawestigation to bring up for prosecution all persons who have aided or harbored

Mr. Stanley Carroll of Universal News Service telephoned and thanked me for the Karpis photographs. In answer to his Inquiry soncerning further developments in the Karpis case I stated that Gunter had been arraigned in New Orleans and charged with harboring Karpis, bond being set at \$207,000. I stated that Karpis was to be placed in the jail at St. Paul by tomorrow but that this fact was not made public as yet; that the United States Attorney will then determine the proceedure to be followed; and that Karpis had been held in the Bureau for interrogation.

Mr. Cerroll inquired as to the progress of investigations being code concerning police office who may have harbored Karpis. I stated that an intensive investigat! was being made but that it was not known when something would brook in regard to this angle.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: BREKID.

At this time I talked to Mr. Magee and Mr. McIntire with reference to the releasing of Ruth Mobinson. Mr. Magee stated that Mr. Connelley had suggested that the girl be sent to San Antonio, Texas. He advised, however, that she is wanted in Texas by the Post Office Inspectors; that her brother is a taxi driver and fairly well acquainted with detectives and the police; that she would have to stay with her sister in San Antonio and is afraid the brother would find out about it. Mr. Magee stated that the girl herself is unable to offer any suggestions. I asked about the possibility of sending her to Tulsa, Oklahoma, but Mr. Magee advised that she is also wanted there.

I then talked with Mr. McIntire who stated that he had questioned the girl all afternoon and that if she were released there were only three possibilities. One is Davidson, Oklahoma, where her parents live, another is San Antonio where her sister lives, and the third is Weatherford, Oklahoma, where she has an Aunt. Mr. McIntire stated that the girl does not know her aunt very well and isn't sure she could stay with her. He also advised that the newspapers have discovered that Ruth is from Davidson and have even given her correct name; that the newspaper reporters are around the office both day and night and that in case Ruth were sent to San Antonio it would be necessary to take her away secretly. I advised Mr. McIntire that San Antonio appeared to be the best possibility and that she should be given a ticket and expenses to her destination. Mr. McIntire stated that they would get her on the train by tomorrow night after taking her up the State about fifty miles in order to avoid the newspaper men.

and says he will be convicted even though he is innocent. Mr. Mc-Intire advised that Hunter stated that he and Karpis were in Little Rock just after the job had been pulled and that the two of them would go down to the Post Office at night to see if any Post Office Inspectors were in town. I inquired as to how this could be ascertained and Mr. McIntire stated that they would check cars and find out from various sources whether or not there were any Inspectors around. He also stated that Hunter was practically willing to plead guilty to a harboring case but that he (Mr. McIntire) believes sufficient information has been obtained in Hunter's testimony to convict him of actual participation.

He further advised that Hunter stated that in case he decides to talk it will be to the Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and not to the Post Office Inspectors since they put his father in prison and he is pretty mad about it.

I asked whether or not we would have any difficulty arraigning Hunter and Mr. McIntire stated that in case the P. O. gets out a warrant and tries to execute it that something will have to be done. I advised him that we could deal with that exigency when it arises. Mr. McIntire stated that the Karpis pictures should arrive by tomorrow morning.

This is a joint investigation conducted by Agents J. C. White and

Agents contacted J. B. Rhodes, Sales Manager of the Roy Murray Motors Inco. Chapparal and Mesquite Streets, Corpus Christi, Texas, and a thorough check was made of all cash sales during the month of March, 1935, and were unable to find any cash sale of any Ford car not personally known to Rhodes. Rhodes examined the photograph of Fred Hunter and stated that the individual shown in that photograph appeared to be familiar to him, but he did not recall in what connection. A check was later made of the cash sales for November, 1935, and it was ascertained that one H. J. King purchased a blue 1936 Ford Deluxe 5-W-Coupe, motor #2407875, order #2380, paying in cash \$705.80, discount of \$52.00 being made for cash. In addition to the regular equipment there were installed a lock on the glove compartment in the dash and a rear view mirror on the Sun visor on the right hand side; that 1935 Texas license #A-64-116 was placed on this car. Upon an examination of the records of this sale Mr. Rhodes then recalled that the individual whose photograph was previously shown him was the party who purchased the above Ford Coupe; that he gave his address as the Princess Louise Hotel, Corpus Christi, Texas; that this party had to wait 10 days for the motor company to secure this particular compe that Hunter desired from Houston, Texase

He Le Krueger, Manager of the Roy Murray Motors, Inc., also identified photograph of Fred Hunter as the party who purchased the above mentioned coupe on November 26, 1935; that he and Rhodes both recalled that Runter was accompanied by a woman who was pretty and expensively-dressed and that they came to the office of the motor company, they believed, in a taxicab and that they were not accompanied by anyone else; that King or Hunter stated that he was selling marble machines, slot machines and other gambling apparatus in Corpus Christi; that during the time he was waiting for the arrival of the coupe he stated he was going to Port Aramsas. to do a little fishing; that he was going to take a vacation for a short time; that when he paid cash for the Ford Coupe he had a large roll of bills from which he counted out the \$705,80. Mr. Rhodes noticed that when they received the Ford Coupe that they loaded in some very expensive baggage, Gladstone bags, hat boxes, etce, and he recalls having seen Bunter and this woman in Corpus Christi the following day after they had received the care_ Heither Mr. Rhodes nor Mr. Krueger was able to identify the photograph of Connicatorris as being the women who accompanied Runter at the time he purchased the Ferd Coupe. Mr. Rhodes stated that on one occasion he telephoned Hunter at the Princess Louise Hotel and found that he was registered there and advised him that it would take approximately ten days to receive the Ford Coupe from Houston, Texase

Agents were advised by Mr. J. E. Rhodes that he had received a telegram from some motor company either in New Orleans or Lake Charles, La. relative to whether or not Ford Coupe, bearing motor #2407873 had been sold to H. J. King and

whether or not it had been paid for in full or had any liens or mortgages against it. Mr. Rhodes recalled that upon the receipt of this telegram that it laid around the office several days, but that it was answered by typing the reply to the message on the original and sending it back to the telegraph company; that he thought that this telegram was received sometime in March, 1956.

Through the efforts of Mr. J. E. Rhodes both the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies checked their records to secure the original telegram. The writer went to the Postal Telegraph Company, Corpus Christi, Texas, and interviewed S. W. Gibson, Maneger, and he advised that he had two of his employees checking the records and Agent suggested that they check the records about the first of April, 1936, which was done, and telegram was secured relative to the purchase of Ford Coupe by H. J. King, copy of which was secured from Mr. Gibson and is set forth as follows:

New Orleans, Inc. March 31, 1936

Roy Murray Motors Inc., (Wait for answer)

Advise if Ford Coupe motor No. 2407875 sold to He J. King "paid in full or if there are any liens or mortgages against same wire answer collect via Postal Telegraph.

A copy of the reply to the above telegram was also secured, it having been typewritten on the bottom of the original telegram, and same is set forth as follows:

The above information was transmitted to SAC Jones at San Antonio, Texwho immediately telephoned same to SAC L. J. Connelley at New Orleans, La.

Agent interviewed Leslie Greer, Clerk at the Princess Louise Hotele Corpus Christi, Texas. Check of the records at the hotel disclosed that Mr. and Mrs. H. J. King registered there from San Antonio, Texas, arriving at 4:45 P.M. November 16, 1935, and were assigned to room #420, registration card being #6682, and checked out sometime in the afternoon on November 27, 1935. This registration card was secured and photostatic copies of same were made at this Bureau office. The records at the hotel disclose that there were no long distance telephone calls made from the hotel by H. J. King; that there were four local calls at 5¢ each on November 25th and three local calls on November 27th; that no record was kept as to the numbers called by this party. Clerk Greer was positive in identifying the photograph of Fred Hunter as being the party who registered as H. J. King at the Princess Louise Hotel on the date above stated. Mr. Greer was unable to recall whether or not these parties had any visitors during that time as he did not recall how they came to the hotel or by what means they left the hotel when they checked out. He was unable to identify the photograph of Connie Morris as being the woman who was there with Hunter.

Mr. Walter roster, Manager and owner of the Princess Louise Hotel. Corpus Christia nor Ms wife, Mrs. Walter Toster, could recall the H. J. King or the woman who accompanied him and were unable to identify photographs of either as being any individuals who stopped at the hotel.

It will be noted in the writer's report dated March 51, 1936, that Fred Hunter and his woman Ruth/Human alias Connie Morris arrived in San Antonio, Texas, November 12, 1935, stayed four days with Ruth Human's sister, Mrs. Glen F. Kirkpatrick, and departed, destination not known. There is no doubt that Hunter and Ruth Hamm went to Corpus Christi, Texas, as they arrived at the Princess Louise Hotel at 4:45 P.M. on November 16, 1935.

A comparison was made of the signature of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. King on the registration card at the Princess Hotel with the registration cards previously secured from Grande Courts, Corpus Christi, Texas, reflecting the registrations of Mr. and Mrs. H. King, and H. King and wife, of Beaumont, Texas, and they are no doubt identical. These registrations were set out in reference report of Agent J. C. White, San Autonio, Texas, dated April 25, 1956. At this time Fred Hunter stopped at Grande Courts at Corpus Christi, Texas, from December 51, 1935, to January 5, 1936, and again on January 6, 1936, to January 7, 1936. Further examination of the registrations at Grande Courts, Corpus Christi, Texas, as set out in writer's reference report, of E. R. Woods and L. Woods from Route 6, Paris, Texas, disclosed that this party was in Corpus Christi, Texas, stopping at Grande Courts on December 19th to December 20th, 1935, and again on December 51st, 1955, to January 11th, 1956; that during his latter 6607 at Grande Courts he shanged from apartment #72 to #71 on January 5, 1956. The signatures on these registration cards are no doubt those of subject Karpise Photostatic copies of the registrations at the Princess Louise Hotel and Grande Courts at Corpus Christi, Texas, will be furnished herewith to the Bureau, Cincinnati, Chicago, New Orleans, Dallas and Little Rock offices. It is noted in the registration of E. Woods and E. R. Woods from December 19 to December 20, 1955, and again on December 51, 1955, and January 5, 1956, that he was alone at these times and there is no doubt that the attraction at Corpus Christi for subject Karpis at that time was probably to see Juanita or Winifred Chapman, as this woman was employed as a telephone operator in Corpus Christi up until about the latter part of January, 1956.

A check was made at the Plaza, Nucces and Princess Louise Hotels and Grande Courts, Corpus Christi, from Hovember, 1955, to date for anyone registering under the known aliases of Hunter and subject Karpis, and was unable to find any other registrations only as set out above of these parties having stopped in Corpus Christi, Texas. Also the garages at these hotels and other public garages were checked as to the storage of a marcon colored Buick Sedan belonging to Karpis and was unable to find that this automobile had been stored at these places.

In checking at the Reed Motor Company, Buick Dealers at Corpus Christi, Texas, it was ascertained from W. A. Chastain, Service Manager, that on January 51, 1956, a C. O. Sullivan had a 1956-41-Buick Sedan serviced at the Reed Motor Company; that the car was washed, lubricated, oil changed and given a 1500 mile inspection; that the party stated the windshield leaked and the water sloshed up on the right hand side of the floor; that this party claimed that he had recently purchased the ear in Houston and that he wanted a paid receipt for this work; that the total bill for this car was \$7.80. Mr. Chastain was unable to identify the photograph of Fred Hunter as being the party who brought this gutemobile into the Reed Motor Company's garage. Mr. Chastain described this individual as follows:

Age, 35 years
Height, 5 feet 6 or 7 inches
Weight, 140 pounds
Hair, brown
Eyes 7
Build, medium
Well dressed

Mr. Chastain stated that this individual brought the car into the garage and returned after it as it was not delivered to anyone outside the garage. Mr. Chastain further stated that the notation made on their work sheet "56-41" indicates the year and the "41" indicates the model and he states positively that this car would not bear motor #65052198; that a car bearing such a motor number would be indicated on the work sheet as a "61"; that as he recalls this car it was a blue car with a small red stripe around the body; that he is positive that he could not be mistaken as to the kind of car that was serviced at the garage.

At the time this car was serviced it was during the time that subject Karpis and Informant Hall were at Corpus Christi, Texas, on January 29, 1956, to February 1, 1956.

Due to the fact that the Dallas office advised this office by telephone that Lawton Grayson, brother of Grace Goldstein, was reported to be either in Corpus Christi, Texas, or Beeville, Texas, probably around the eil fields in that vicinity, Agents made a check at the Post Office at Corpus Christi, Texas, and ascertained that L. W. Grayson had received his mail at Corpus Christi, Texain Box 1521 and that they had received a forwarding order on September 25, 1955,

to forward the mail of Lo We Grayson to Pe Co Box 156, Texarkana, Texas.

It was ascertained by Agents through We Re Harrell, Assistant
Postmaster at Beeville, Texas, that an Le We Grayson did receive mail through
the Beeville Post Office about a year ago; that this individual was supposed
to be a roughneck or driller around the oil fields at Beeville, Texas; that
he left no forwarding order for his mail; that Je Be Grayson who is also a
roughneck around the oil fields left a forwarding order on February 25, 1936,
for his mail to be forwarded to Freer, Texase

Due to the fact that it was reported that subject Karpis had possibly left the marcon colored Buick Sedan in Corpus Christi, Texas, Agents also endeavored to locate Lawton Grayson as it was thought that possibly Karpis left this Buick Sedan with him instead of storing it in a public garage.

A check was made at Sen Antonio, Texas, by Special Agent J. M. McInerney of the Buick Agencies as to whether or not a Buick car was sold to subject Karpis here in San Antonio and their records failed to reflect that a maroon colored Buick Sedan had been sold to Karpis in San Antonio, or that such a sedan had been serviced here for him.

Reference is made to report of Agent B. L. Demron, Little Rock, Arke, dated 4/19/36, relative to the identity of Mrs. P. W. Horgrove now residing at 2332 Central Ave., Hot Springs, Arke, who was receiving mail from 3286 Canor Avenue, San Antonio. It was ascertained by Special Agent F. J. Lackey that there is no Canor Avenue or street in San Antonio, nor is there any street of similar name; that there are few streets in San Antonio that bear numbers as high as 3200, and these streets are the principal streets.

Mrs. P. N. Hargrove, wife of Perry Newton Hargrove.

These records bear a notation "Mary" in parenthesis indicating that Mrs. Hargrove's
given name is Mary. No information is given

various residence addresses of the Hargroves, walch are as follows:

1955 816 Trenton Avenue

1955 621 E. Euclid Street

The address 630g K. Commerce Street has been for years a third class hotel and is used exclusively as a house of prostitution. A check of the records of the San Antonio Police Department developed that a woman by the name of Jackie Hargrove was arrested at 630g K. Commerce Street on 11/7/29 by Officers Vogler and Jackson of the Vice Squad, for vagrancy and commercial prostitution, case \$2495. No disposition was given, nor was any description except that she was white and 25 years old at that time. These records do not indicate any other arrest under the names of Horgrove or Mrs. P. N., Mary, or Jackie Hargrove. Jackie Hargrove was not fingerprinted or photographed, but Perry Newton Hargrove

has been both fingerprinted and photographed, if it should later become design able to identify him for any purposes

Reference is made to report of Special Agent B. L. Damron, Little Rock, Arke, 4/16/36, pages 24, 25 and 26 of which contain telephone calls from the Hatterie Hotel, Little Rock, Ark. to Memphis, Tenn., 7-9210 and 7-9211, being pay stations in the Grahem Apartments of which Laura Edmiston is housekeeper. This woman stated that she had a daughter named Mrs. Hargrove, no 🤼 initials given, who resided in San Antonio. It is highly probable that the Mrs. P. N. Horgrove at 2352 Central Ave., Hot Springs, Ark, is identical with Mrs. P. N. Hargrove who formerly was at San Antonio, and that this woman is the daughter of Laure Eduiston of the Graham Apartments, Memphis, Tenne, and that it was this woman who talked from the Hatterie Hotel to the pay stations in the Graham Apartments at Memphis, Tenne

Agent White made a personal check at Grande Courts Tourist Comp at San Antonio, Texas, from January 1, 1935, to the present date for anyone registering under the names of Bell, Grayson, King, Sallivan and Woods and it was found that on Hovember 29, 1935, that an E. Woods and wife from Paris, Texas, stopped there one night and checked out on November 50, 1955. Exemination was made of registration card #5232 and it was found that the signature thereon is identical with the signature of E. Woods who registered at Grande Courts in Corpus Christi, Texas, on the dates set out in the body of this report. The management at Grande Courts does not recall these individuals or how they were traveling as there was no automobile license number inserted on the registration card. This registration card will be secured at a later date and photostated for whatever use it may be in this case.

ADDENDUM:

Since the preparation of this report a telegram has been received from the Cleveland office advising that the marcon Buick automobile of Karpis was stored in a private garage at Corpus Christi, Texe Agents of the San Antonio office are now in Corpus Christi, Texas, checking this angle and will thoroughly search the car and process it for fingerprints,



In reply to your radiogram of this date asking when a detailed report will be submitted with reference to aimleak" from an employee in this building on April 24th upon which date a detail of agents from this office went to a nearby National Guard range for target practice and newspapers carried a story to the effect that they were engaged upon a hunt in this state for Alvia D Karpis, please be advised that you were advised in my teletype of the 24th ultimo this matter was taken up with Post Office Inspector in Charge John J. Breslin here, in view of the fact that it was assumed that the improper information came from someone in the post office and Mr. Breslin has advised that the matter is receiving the attention of his office at the present time.

Mr. Breslin advised that some months ago during his investigation of the Rettich case a newspaper representative made an inquiry of his office as to whether or not Mr. Breslin had gone to Warwick, Rhode Island to conduct an investigation into the Rettich matter. On that date Mr. Breslin got into an automobile, bearing Rhode Island plates, in the basement of this building opposite the mail loading platform and in view of the fact that agents in this office left from the same place on the 24th he thought there was a possibility there was someone on the platform who may have given out the information in both instances. In view of this he has obtained a list of the employees supposed to have been on duty in that section on both dates and is using a confidential informant to endeavor to obtain the information for him rather than to openly interview those persons. This effice has also contacted an informant in the post office and it is expected that a report will be forthcoming about the middle of the coming week.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Suydam telephoned and stated that a short while ago the National Broadcasting Company made the necessary arrangements to broadcast the events surrounding the apprehension of Karpis, at such time as he was actually apprehended. He stated that he called the NBC last night and told them what had happened and they now want to know if it will be possible for Mr. Hoover to speak for one minute over the network on Saturday night.

I advised Mr. Suydam that it was my understanding that the material would be prepared by the officials of the MBC and sub- MSINGATION mitted to the Bureau for review and approval, but that to date the material had not been submitted and that, of course, no word could be given to him until you had been communicated with. After talking with you, I advised Mr. Suydam that you could not under any consideration go on the air tonight inasmuch as you would be flying.

He then stated that he had received word that the MBC had postponed the broadcast of this event until Tuesday from 9:30 to 10:00 P. M. (Eastern Standard Time) and that the officials of the NBC had called him several times during the day and they are now afraid that the officials of the columbia Broadcasting Company might secure your approval to broadcast over their network first and stated that the officials of the MBC had requested him to see if arrangements could be made for you not to appear on the Columbia network prior to going on the MBC hook-up.

Mr. Suydam stated that he advised the officials of the NBC that, of course, you had not approved going on the air and this point was thoroughly understood by all. He called back later and stated that the officials of the NBC wanted to send a man down to Washington tomorrow with their manuscript which they desired to have reviewed and approved. I advised Mr. Suydam that no one would be here tomorrow who would be able to review this material, pointing out to him that the only one qualified to do this work was Mr. Tolson and he was absent from the city. Mr. Suydam stated that in view of all the circumstances, they would undoubtedly have to wait until Monday.



Dear Sir:

I am transmitting herewith specimens of subject Fred Hunter's handwriting, obtained at the New Orleans Bureau office on May 6, 1936, in accordance with Section 23 of the Manual of Instructions.

The specimens are contained on five separate pages, which are numbered in the order they were written by Hunter, that is, specimens 1 to 5, inclusive. Each page carries the clause, "freely and voluntarily given" and is subscribed by Hunter. The Agents who dictated the contents and who witnessed the actual writing, as well as his signature, have subscribed their names as witnesses on the reverse side of the specimens. Specimens 1 to 4 inclusive were dictated by Special Agent R. L. Tollett. Specimen number 5 was dictated by Special Agent L. I. Bownan.

Specimen number 1 was written by subject Hunter in long hand on unruled tablet paper by use of paper and pencil. Specimen number 2 was written in longhand by Hunter on unruled tablet paper in ink. Speeimen number 3 was written in long hand by Hunter on ruled Bureau tablet paper in pencil. Specimen number 4 was written by Hunter in long hand on ruled Bureau tablet paper in ink. Specimen number 5 was written in both long hand and hand print on unruled tablet paper in pencil.

Subject Hunter stated to the interviewing Agents that he never wrote anything, not even a letter, when he was in the penitentiary. He explained that he got someone else to write for him whenever possible. He stated that the specimens furnished amounted to more than he had written in years. He further stated that he learned to write in the public schools in Warren, Chio, where he attended school through the eigth grade.

Subject Hunter prepared the specimens while seated at an ordinary office desk. It was first suggested to him that he write some material in letter form. His demeanor from the beginning was somewhat belligerent and hostile, and he gave the impression that he was being harrassed. He wrote slowly and deliberately in what appeared to be a cramped style, especially when using the fountain pen. The specimens were obtained under some persuasion, as he had been interrogated thoroughly for a period of time by Special Agents endeavoring to secure statements relative the instant case.

Alvin Karpis, so-called public enemy No. 1 who was captured by federal agents at New Orieans last Friday, lived for a considerable time during recent weeks in a Lake Dallas camp, it was reported here Monday morning.

Denton police, it was said, have

Denton police, it was said, have established the fact that Karpis was staying there, with Blackie Doyle, David Sherman and Harry Campbell during the period when the robbery of the Dorden Milk Company, the Progress Drug Company and other establishments in this vicinity, occurred

Frank Blak?, head of the local bureau of the department of justice, discredited the reports, however, and denied that Karpis was at the camp. The bureau, according to Blake, knew Karpis to be elsewhere during this period.

Persons living in the vicinity of Lake Dallas, it was sail, have identified victures of the four outlaws as being those of the occupants of a camp between Denton and Lake Dallas.

Doyle and Sherman and Spike Lane recently arrested here, with two women companions, in connection with the Borden and Progress robberies. Denton police were told that when news of this arrest reached Karpis and Campbell they left the camp with a woman com-

panion.

Karpis and Campbell, it was said, never accompanied the others on any of their robberies in this vicinity.

It was said that federal men traced Karpis, Campbell and the woman as far as Minden, La., and then into New Orleans.

Residents in the vicinity of the camp said the men fished much of the time, but that from time to time three of them would disappear for several hours. Reports of robberies in Dallas or Fort Worth usually followed these sorties, it was said.

DENY RUMORS KARPIS LIVED NEAR DALLAS

Vague rumors that Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, and his desperado companion, Harry Campbell, had lived in a fishing shack near Lake Dallas for several weeks before the former's capture in New Orleans four days ago, were branded baseless by Dallas detectives Monday.

four days ago, were branded baseless by Dallas detectives Monday.

Police Chief Bob Jones, former G-man, said he was positive Karpis or Campbell had never been within 100 miles of Dallas. Detective Inspector Will Fritz, who led members of his homicide aquad in the capture of Blackie Doyle and Dave Sherman, potorious Middle Western bad man, recently, definitely denied the rumors.

"Karpis and Campbell have never been near Dallas," Fritz said. "The people in and near Denton are apparently confusing and Karpis and Campbell with Doyle and Sherman. We know positively that Doyle and Sherman made frequent trips to Lake Dallas to fish, but they never lived there. Doyle and Sherman have been identified by Denton citizens, but no pictures of Karpis and Campbell have been identified."

Fritz further explained that Doyle and Sherman were petty thieves compared to Karpis. Even though Doyle and Sherman were connected with two reasonably large robberies here, they also had been reduced to prowling parked autos, Fritz said.

"Karpis and Campbell have never had anything to do with Doyle and Sherman," Fritz said. "I doubt if the four are even acquainted, except my reputations."







He stated that Shipman claimed to have located a claim in the vicinity of Sand Creek; that Shipman was at Liberty during the Spring or Summer of the year 1935 or 1934; that he is unable to remember which; and that Shipman never mentioned having seen any gangsters around Liberty at that time; that during the fishing and hunting seasons, a great many people visit the vicinity of Liberty, but that when Shipman was there, there were no visitors with the exception of possibly one other man; that it would be impossible for any gangsters to hide out in the vicinity of Liberty and that their presence would be known to him if anyone was visiting in that vicinity; that he has resided at Liberty since 1931, and that no one stays at Liberty during the Wintertime except him and whoever he might have living with him.

Mr. McKenney identified the photograph of Subject Alvin Karpis as having been seen by him 2 or 3 years ago at the Harvey Madanaugh Ranch 8 miles south of Liberty, Colorado, but he was not able to identify the photographs of other Subjects shown to him.
