Reference is made to teletype message transmitted by the Buffalo Office May 7, 1936, requesting forthwith tracing of a wifle found in the possession of Marpis, and further described as a Savage lever action model \$909, calibre 250-2000, and serial mumber 304401, shipped by the Savage Arms Company, Ution, New York, April 19, 1926 to Habitll-Hunter, Pittsburgh, succeeded by the J. A. Williams Company.

LEGOY L. WILLIAMS. President, J. A. Williams Company, wholesale hardware dealers, 401 Amberson Street, formerly located at 115-7th Street, Pittsburgh, stated that in the year 1932 his company absorbed, by purchase, all of the merchandise, and took over the records of the Habill-Hanter Company, wholesale hardware dealers, 35-39 Terminal Way, Pittsburgh, and had destroyed all records of the latter company except ledger accounts, and had retained no descriptive records of firearms neither had they maintained a register of firearms subsequently sold, and may have been included in the purchase of mentioned merchandise.

ROBERT F. NURTER, Precident of the firm of Hukill-Hunter, telephonically communicated with, at his home, 37 South Buclid Avenue, Believue, Pitteburgh, confirmed the information of Mr. Williams with reference to the sale of merchandise and turn over of records of the Hukill-Hunter Company, with the additional advice that his company, wholesale distributors of firearms, kept no register in the receipt or disposition of same, and was doubtful whether in the sale of merchandise to the Williams Company, any Savage or other rifles were included.



Mr. Tracy ..... With reference to the apprehension of Karpis at New Orleans, .... I telephoned the Oklahoma City Office and instructed that especial attention be given to the plant near Harry Campbell's home at Tulsa, Oklahoma during the next few days. I pointed out that as soon as the news of Karpis' capture gets out, Campbell will probably start running, and he is likely to come into his home at Tulsa, in which event we want to be prepared. I was assured that this matter would be taken care of. I telephoned SAC MacFarland at the Cleveland Office with reference to the Campbell angle of this matter, and told him that they should concentrate on every possibility we have with regard to Campbell at once, since as soon as he hears the news about the apprehension of Karpis, he will probably start c:1 to run and run fast, and we want to get him as he goes out of there if possible. Mr. MacFarland said he would get all of his men on their toes in this situation, and see that everything is done to get Campbell if possible. Time -Mr. MacFarland telephoned me back, and said they have a lead on the three machine guns which were used in the Garrettsville train robbery by the subjects of this case, and he was wondering if they should go ahead and take the guns. I told him that if these guns can be taken without any publicity, it should be done, and the guns taken up the office and held for a few days until the Garrettsville case breaks. He said that the guns are being held by the brother of Fred Hunter, taken into custody in New Orleans with Karpis, and are unregistered. MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

BREMER KIDNAPING CASE

The following is a resume of the situation at New Orleans today: Hunter has made several signed statements concerning the move ments of Karpis and himself, but he denies any knowledge of Campbell's present location, adding that he would not inform the Bureau if he knew where Campbell was. Hunter has admitted knowledge of Karpis' identity, and a statement has been obtained from him which will be sufficient for prosecution upon harboring charges. Hunter has indicated his willingness to enter a plea of guilty to those charges.

A secret complaint has been filed in New Orleans today against Hunter, charging harboring, and the warrant has been placed in the hands of SAC Magee for service. We will hold Hunter as long as is necessary before serving the warrant and arraigning him. The United States Attorney has agreed to a bond of \$200,000 on Hunter.

Agent McIntire is questioning Connie Morris, correct name Hamm. who was taken into custody with Hunter and Karpi's, and expects to obtain some information from her, it being noted that at the time of a telephonic conversation with McIntire he advised he was obtaining details concerning a visit to the Soldstein woman's hotel of two individuals described as "Ray" and Tommy", and who we are attempting to identify. The questioning of Connie Morris is being expedited as much as possible in an effort to release her today. It may be noted that she was sick this morning and we could not question her.

I endeavored to get in touch with Mr. Waldrop. However, he sent a messenger down for his release, and upon ascertaining that Mr. Carroll could not be reached, Mr. Morgan of the night desk Mniversal News Service) was furnished with the release.

Judge Heffernan stated that he had been on the Bench in Youngstown, Ohio for six years and that he recalled Zetzer having appeared before him at one time or another. It was Judge Heffernan's present recollection that Zetzer was a small-time criminal with a mechanical quirk and that if investigation was conducted in Youngstown, information would be developed indicating that Zetzer is probably the contact of a number of criminals. I thanked Judge Heffernan for his courtesy in affording the Bureau the benefit of his views. has been apprehended, it is not known whether the office of origin desires the New York Office to attempt to watch the activities of BUCKHALTER and LUCIANO through the Police Department as possible contacts for subject CAMPBELL.

Mr. E. J. Connelley, by teletype from Chicago dated April 24, 1936, requested the New York Office to ascertain at the American Kennel Club what Scotch terrier dogs had been sold by JAMES O'REILLEY, Sheriff, Toledo, Chio, during the past year. Mr. P. B. RICE, Secretary of the American Kennel Club, 221 4th Avenue, New York City, after searching through the records of the Club, advised that the records reflect that JAMES O'REILLEY did not have any dogs registered in his name in 1935, and that there is no record of JAMES O'REILLEY having sold any dogs during 1935; that in 1936, O'REILLEY purchased ten dogs and had them registered; that all of these dogs were female Scotch fox terriers and docker spaniels. There is no record at the Club of O'REILLEY'S having sold any dogs during 1936. A summary of the above information as secured from Mr. RICE was furnished to Mr. Connelley at Cleveland, Ohio, by telegram on April 25, 1936.

On April 9, 1936, an individual communicated telephonically with Miss R. Krische, switchboard operator in the New York Office, and advised that if the Bureau desired to apprehend subject KARPIS, he would be at the Republican Club, 281 Grand Street, New York City, at 6 P.M. on that date. Agent remained in the vicinity of 281 Grand Street, New York City, from approximately 5:45 P.M. until 6:45 P.M. on April 9, 1936, but did not see anyone who resembled KARPIS. It might be mentioned here that 281 Grand Street is located in a Jewish section of the city and is a five story building. On the first floor are located LETTIERI BROS., Dealers in Bedspreads, Linens and Draperies. On the second floor is located the Lincoln League Regular Republican Club. The three upper floors of this building appear to be vacant.

The weather was rather warm on this date, and the large window on the second floor occupied by the Republican Club was open, so that the activities in the clubroom could be observed by any person standing across the street and looking into the clubroom. It appeared that the club was having a meeting on that night, and agent observed various members of the club going in and none of them resembled subject KARPIS. It also appeared that the meeting was a regular meeting of the club, and no undue activity was noticed. Agent did not deem it advisable to interview any members of the club on this occasion, due to the fact that at the time the various political clubs in New York City were getting publicity because

the clubrooms were alleged to be used by women as gambling places, and after the women had lost large sums of money, they were forced into prostitution in order to get money to pay their gambling debts. It is thought that the person furnishing the information over the telephone with regard to KARPIS was either trying to scare the members of the club by having some Federal officer make inquiry at the club or trying to place the Bureau in an embarrassing position.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

CHICAGO OFFICE. The New York Office wishes to be advised as to whether it is desired that the New York Office cover the lead set out in the report of Special Agent B. L. Damron, Little Rock, Ark., dated April 19, 1936, with reference to investigation concerning the identity of Mr. H. G. PERRY, 71 Fifth Avenue, New York City. It is noted that PERRY is supposed to have made a trip by plane from Little Rock to New York City on September 21, 1935.

The New York Office is in receipt of a letter from the Chicago Office, dated May 1, 1936, requesting that a hail cover be placed on the mail of Mr. and Mrs. JOHN POST, 1375 East 18th Street, Brooklyn, N. Y. and to conduct appropriate investigation in regard to their activities. Due to the apprehension of KARPIS, the New York Office wishes to be advised if this investigation should be conducted.

### - PENDING

ADDENDUM:

Since the dictation of this report, information has been received of the apprehension of subject CAMPBELL. The New York Office is presently having the records of the American Kennel Club checked, as requested by teletype from the Cleveland Office dated May 1, 1936, for names and addresses of persons in Toledo, Ohio, owning Scotch terriers. This investigation will be completed in the very near future. The New York file in this case will be reviewed in order to ascertain if there are any outstanding leads presently in the New York Office territory other than those mentioned above.

The investigation pertaining to the location of WILLIAM ELMERILEAR is carried by the New York Office under the title of "WILLIAM ELMER MEAD with aliases,"
1.0.1354, Endeavor to Locate", New York file 62-5690, and investigation pertaining to Mead is kept separate and apart from investigation as to the other subjects of the BREKID case.





RE: Presentation of Bremer Case over National Broadcasting Company.

With reference to the above, Er. Suydam telephoned and stated that the matter of continuity has been under discussion; that the Mational Broadcasting Company is dubious about going ahead with this presentation due to the fast that Karpis has not been brought to trial; that they think a trial by radio may be prejudicial. I told ir. Suydan that I would not collaborate in this metter unless they obtained someone who is experienced in handling the Bromer case. Kr. Suydam stated that he understood that Mr. Courtney Rylsy/Cooper was working on the matter in New York City and I stated that Mr. Cooper was not working on the matter; that Mr. Lundell had asked Mr. Cooper for persission to use his book, Ten Thousand Public Enemies, which was granted. I explained to Mr. Suydam the difficulty which would be experienced by a continuity writer who was not familiar with the GASO.

I told ar. Suydam that the American Bar Association properly oritized the Lindbergh case. I stated that in the Bremer case, Earpis has not been tried as yet and to go on the air and tell the story of Karpis' guilt may bring criticism by the American Ber Association upon the Attorney Ceneral. I further stated that I thought the Attorney General should decide whether or not this should be done. I further stated that since Karpis has been captured, I thought the publicity should be brought to a close and our time devoted to more important matters,

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: BREMER KIDNAPING CASE

I called SAC Magee at New Orleans asking about the teletype... summary which he was going to send in last night concerning the developments down there. He stated he thought he had furnished the Bureau with information concerning the developments there and that he was "all in" and had to get some sleep. I requested that a teletype be sent in immediately, furnishing all developments since yesterday morning. I also requested that a teletype be sent in this afternoon furnishing today's developments.

Magee stated that Agent McIntire had not arrived yet. I advised that he was due there at 7:40 on an Eastern Airlines plane, and requested that he check to see what had happened to delay him. هربه

Magee stated Hunter is still being questioned, and that three statements had been obtained from him, which are being sent to the Bureau via air mail at noon today. These statements contain information concerning Hunter's travels with Karpis, and admit that Hunter knew who Karpis was. They also contain information concerning Connix Morris and the Coldstein woman. I advised that we do not desire the United States Attorney to get copies of these statements, and he stated they would be maintained in the personal and confidential file of the New Orleans Office. Magee stated a complaint charging Hunter with harboring Karpis would be filed today and that the United States Attorney will turn the warrant over to him, Magee, to hold as long as we want to.

I advised that we are very anxious to let the woman Connie Morris go, but that I did want McIntire to question her, and again requested that he check to see when he would arrive.

11:25 A.M. - Mr. Magee called and advised that Mr. McIntire had arrived at the airport at 9:35 and that it will take an hour for him to come in from the airport. I requested that he have McIntire call me after he has talked to Connie Morris, letting me know what he thinks of releasing RECORDED & INDEXED 576-

Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, at Cleveland, Ohio, telephoned the writer and advised that he had conferred with the Director with relation to those individuals who should be permitted to interview Subject Hunter at the Federal Jail. Mr. Connelley informed that no local police or state officers from any state should be permitted to interview Hunter as he was a federal prisoner. He advised that no state or police officer should be permitted to be present when the Post Office Inspectors interviewed Hunter.

Mr. Connelley advised that no shyster lawyer should be permitted to go in through the guise of representing Subject Hunter and secure information which might be sold to the newspapers.

Mr. Connelley advised that Special Agent W. L. Buchanan was to be present at all times when Post Office Inspectors interviewed Subject Hunter. He advised that the writer, accompanied by Agent Buchanan, should interview the Superintendent of the Federal Jail and request that only Post Office Inspectors be permitted to interview or confer with Subject Fred-Munter, and that at all times Agent Buchanen must be present. Mr. Connelley advised that the writer was to inform Mr. Amrine, the Superintendent of the Federal Jail, that Bureau representatives would not encroach upon his functions as custodian of Hunter while he, Mr. Amrine, was operating this federal institution.

Mr. Connelley instructed that this matter was to be presented to Mr. Amrine in the nature of an order and not a request, and that if any difficulty arose over this arrangement, that the Bureau was to be informed immediately.

Agent Buchanan accompanied the writer and a conference was had with Mr. Amrine, Superintendent of the Federal Jail, who was presented the subject matter in the form prescribed by Mr. Connelley. Mr. Amrine appeared very cooperative, and will inform the New Orleans Bureau Office when the Post Office Inspectors put in their appearance at the Federal Jail to interview Hunter. Agent Buchanan is in readiness to proceed to the Federal Jail and be present at any and all interviews had by Postal Inspectors only with Hunter.

Mr. Amrine advised that under his rules and regulations, no attorneys are permitted to interview prisoners unless request comes from the individual GATION

event any attorney endeavors to question Hunter. He advised that he would not deny Hunter the privilege of an attorney if he desired one, but would carefully arrange to notify the New Orleans Bureau Office prior to any actual interview.

The writer telephonically advised Mr. Connelley, and advised the Bureau by teletype, of a telephone call emanating from Topeka, Kansas, inquiring for one J. F. Cordrey, a Post Office Inspector. The call came to the New Orleans Bureau Office and, upon inquiry, it developed that it came from a J. W. Anderson, a Kansas State Highway Officer. Mr. Connelley informed the writer that under no circumstances is J. W. Anderson or other city or state officers to be permitted to interview Subject Hunter.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

SAM COKER -RE: BREKID.

Sam Coker is an Oklahoma outlaw, having first come to the attention of law enforcement officials in 1924 when he was sentenced to serve thirty years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, on the charge of bank robbery. He was paroled from that institution on January 11, 1931, was later returned for having violated his parole, and on February 24, 1931 escaped from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary. He has, therefore, been considered a desperate and dangerous character. He was thereafter apprehended and returned to the State Penitentiary, where he was finally paroled during September, 1935.

Coker first came to the attention of this Bureau soon after he was paroled from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary during September, 1935. At that time information was received to the effect that he leagued himself with Harry Campbell, and that he, Campbell and others were planning offenses within the State of Oklahoma which would probably come within the jurisdiction of this Bureau.

Coker's home is at Nowata, Oklahoma. He is 42 years of age and his occupation is that of a cook. He has been a close associate of George H. (Burrhead) eady, a Tulsa gambler and harborer of criminals. Keady has come to the attention of this Bureau on numerous occasions, and he has been investigated for violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act.

The Bureau undertook an investigation looking to the location of Sam Coker in view of the fact that it was shown that he was associated with Milton Lett, who was a known contact for Harry O Campbell. It is strongly believed that it was Milton Lett who arranged for the contact between Wyong Burdette and Harry Campbell at Ponca City, Oklahoma during the fall of 1934, after Wyona Burdette had been released by the Chicago Office.

Investigation conducted by the Post Office Inspectors and also by this Bureau disclosed that there was strong reason for believing that Sam Coker participated in the Garrettsville mail robbery which occurred on November 7, 1935.

Inquiry made at Tulsa, Oklahoma showed that Coker left Tulsa a few days before the robbery, and stated to certain of his friends that he was going east to participate in a mail robbery. It has been shown, however, that prior and subsequent to the robbery for a period of twenty-three days Coker had been confined in the Mercy Hospital at Toledo, Ohio for treatment for gonorrheal rheumatism. John Brock was used to substitute for Coker in this robbery.

A copy of Coker's criminal record is attached hereto.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR MR. MCMAHON.

In re: United States v. Joseph H. Adams and Henry Randall.

I am enclosing here with a copy of a letter received by me today upon my return to the City in reference to the above styled cause from Mr. Bart A. Riley, Esq., Attorney for the defendants therein. The principal burden of this communication is that the defendants will file a motion for continuance, apparently upon the grounds; first, that they wish to take depositions, and are not responsible for the delay in so taking; second, that one of counsel for defendant Adams is Congressman J. Mark Wilcox, who will be engaged during that time in his official duties; third, the situation in the District due to the impeachment of Judge Ritter; and fourth, the serious illness of Mrs. Adams.

It will be recalled that the indictment in this cause was secured in the early part of February, 1935, and that the case was set down for trial during the April Term. When I went to Mismi and examined into the evidence, I came to the conclusion that additional evidence would have to be obtained in order to show knowledge upon the part of defendants charged with harboring; that the person harbored was in fact, Alvin Karpis, and that he was wanted in St. Paul under an indictment, charging him with kidnaping, and that the evidence as to defendant Casius H McDonald was strong enough to sustain, in my judgment, his conviction for conspiracy to kidnap in St. Paul, but inadequate to sustain a conviction for harboring and conspiracy to harbor in Florida. In order that the Department might have time in which to present this matter to the United States Attorney atSt. Paul and secure a new indictment, naming McDonald upon authority granted by Assistant Attorney General Keenan, I moved for continuance to the September Term of court, which was granted by the court at the Government's request.

September, defendant Joseph H. Adams was subposneed by the Government to te w before the Grand Jury in St. Paul, in reference to McDonald, cison. A new indictment was returned in St. Paul, and the case Weaver and originally : set for trial in December or the latter part of November

RECORDED & INDEXED Su sequently, the case in Miami was set for trial for November 17th We then received a communication from Mr. Sullivan, the United States Attorney at St. Paul, asking us to continue the Miami case in order to permit the sub-poena of witnesses from Cuba as well as defendant Adams for the crist of 936 McDonald, et al. in St. Paul. I telephoned Mr. Gramling, the Assistant United States Attorney in Miami, relative to this continuance and Judge Ritter indjcated that he would not grant it. I then telephoned Judge Ritter, read him MAY 28 1936 FILE

portions of the letter received from St. Paul and requested again a continuance, which he granted to the April Term of court, 1936.

Defendant Adams and other witnesses from Florida and Cuba went to St. Paul and testified for the Government in the successful prosecutions of McDonald, et al. there in January of this year.

Due to the impeachment proceedings against Judge Ritter, this case was finally set for trial a short time ago for May 25th, at which time Judge Ackerman will hold court in Mismi. Inasmuch as the Department was considering the sufficiency of the evidence against Nathaniel H. Heller, the delay in the taking of depositions in Cuba was due/womewhat to our reluctance to take same until we had finally determined whether or not we should continue the prosecution against defendant Heller. Of course, we finally determined to nol pros as to said defendant.

On April 16, 1936, I forwarded to the United States Attorney at Miami, a list of some sixty witnesses which were determined to be essential witnesses by reason of the summary report of the Bureau of Investigation herein. We have been advised by Mr. Gramling, the Assistant United States Attorney, that the following witnesses have not yet been located:

- Harry Heller (no relation of N. H. Heller).
   L. W. Thomas and Wife.

- Gregory I Dodomo.
   Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Gray.

The total number of subpoences served according to advise just received from Mr. Gramling numbers thirty-six. Many of those as yet have not been served, and upon which no return has yet been made are essential and necessary witnesses.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas are the owners of the property located in Mismi, rented through defendant Joseph H. Adams for Alvin Karpis and Delores DeLaney who, at that time, were going under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Green.

Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Gray were both employees of the El Commodoro Hotel during the time the various members of the Karpis gang were there, and witness L. E. Gray was the first person to whom the Agent showed pictures of Karpis at the hotel and asked his assistance in locating him, and was the person who conveyed such information in the early morning hours of January 17, 1935, to the father-in-law of defendant Adams.

Witness Gregory I. Codomo was the room mate of defendant Duke Randall, and will testify relative to defendant Randall's conduct in reference to the car used by Harry Campbell as well as other important testimony.

Witness Harry Heller worked at the Bowery Casino at Miami Beach, and is the person who took a telephone call from Atlantic City on January 20, 1935, asking him to tell defendant Randell: "Atlantic City has shot it out, received telegram, beat it, " and that he gave such message to

defendant Randall, and that defendant Randall had his girl friend use the telephone in the Bowery-Casino to 'phone Atlantic City to verify such information.

I have not yet had time to check thoroughly the list of witnesses whose subpoenss no return has yet been made, but hesitate to force this case to trial with the above named witnesses absent. Upon each occasion, I have advised the Bureau of Investigation immediately upon receiving word from Miami that such witnesses had not been found, and they assured me that they are making an investigation to ascertain the whereabouts of the various witnesses named. Judge Ackerman is to be in Miami on the 18th of May, and in all probability, these motions mentioned in the letter accompanying this memorandum will be filed at that time. I call your attention to the fact that my absence from the City has delayed the response to this communication. I believe that I should reply to it not later than tomorrow.

It is my opinion, that under the circumstances, the Government, having two continuances charged to it already and with essential witnesses not yet found, might place itself in an embarrassing position by refusing to agree to a continuance upon motion of the defendants.

If I do not receive instructions from you to the contrary, I shall agree to the continuance and so advise the attorney for the defendants by noon tomorrow, May 9th.

Dear Mr. Barlow:

Re: United States v. Joseph H. Adams and Hendry Randall.

I read in the morning paper of the capture of Alvin Karpis. Mr. Hoover and his associates deserve much praise for the wonderful detective work that must have been necessary in order to apprehend this man.

In the same article I read that Delores Delaney and Winona Burdette are to be subpoensed here for the Adams trial. I would like to have positive assurance that they will be here, else it is my intention to take their depositions in person. I also wish to take the deposition of the reporter in Washington who put the announcement in the paper some time ago that the case against Adams would be dismissed. This is in addition to the testimony I wish to take in Cuba.

I explained to you once before that I have authority to support my contention that if two of the agents went to Havana, Cuba, and were guilty of misconduct in the apprehension of Heller, and those same agents obtained statements from Randall and Adams, that I could introduce my Havana testimony in order to effect the credibility of such agents.

The time to take these depositions is drawing short, and in regard to those I have to take in Cuba, it may be necessary for me to obtain an order for dedimus potestatem. In that event, I am confronted with the fact that we have no District Judge here, which would cause a delay of about a week before I could get an appointment in Jacksonville or Tampa to dispose of this matter.

I am still working on my plea in bar and believe I have cases to sustain the granting of such plea.

And again, J. Mark Wilcox will assist me in the trial. He is busy in Congress at the present time, and will be a little busy the latter part of this month in making speeches throughout this District seeking re-election.

Under our state law, when a case is called and a petition to take testimony of absent witnesses is filed, a continuance must be granted; the granting or refusal thereof is not optional with the judge. See

A STATE OF THE PARTY OF THE PAR

Section 8390, Compiled General Laws of Florida, 1927, and Newton v. State, 21 Fla. 53; Clements v. State, 51 Fla. 6, 40 So. 432. In the Newton case our Supreme Court said:

"This section gives to the court no discretion in the matter of issuing a commission to take testimony."

In the Clements case, the court said:

"Under this section, the application for a commission to take the testimony of absent witnesses should generally be made to the court by the defendant when he is arraigned, and upon a proper compliance with all the requirements of said statute, the court has no authority to refuse such commission."

I therefore believe that if I filed a motion for a continuance on May 25th, it would be granted. I believe the court would hold, in view of the fact that the Government has obtained continuances of this case, that the Defendant would be entitled to at least one continuance.

Another disagreeable situation down here is the fact that we have no resident United States District Judge and we have no positive way of knowing what judge will sit, nor when he will sit to hear criminal cases. It is a great inconvenience to the Bar, and to me especially in this case. There are so many preliminary matters which could be disposed of forthwith if we had a permanent judge down here who, upon the application of the defendant to dispose of pending matters, would not be in a position to say "I do not care to hear these motions because I do not know whether or not I will try the case, and I would much prefer to have the motions disposed of by the Judge who tries the case." In this connection the court reporter told me that he is sending you a copy of the proceedings before Judge Long when you were here recently. I imagine you would like them for your file because, if need be, I wish to attach these proceedings to my motion for a continuance.

I am writing you at length on this matter because I don't want to inconvenience youand the Government witnesses in a trip down here on May 25th when there would be a strong likelihood that the case would be postponed. I also believe that by reason of the capture of Karpis, your department as well as Mr. Hoover's department, will be very busy obtaining an expeditious trial and disposition of the Karpis cases in St. Paul. And many of the witnesses in the Adams matter here will probably be essential witnesses in St. Paul, -- I have reference to the Government agents.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Holland, and suggest that you authorize him to enter into a stipulation with me to postpone the Adams case to some future date, preferably in September or October, at which time we should have a new resident District Judge. If you will agree to such a continuance of the trial, I shall be pleased to dispose

#### HARRY R. COOK

Harry R. Cook lives at Etowah, Tennessee, and has known Joe Adams three or four years.

Some time in November or early December, 1934, Cook was visited by Adams at Atowah. Adams asked Cook to get some Tennessee license plates for a Buick car-Adams gave the name of the party on a piece of paper for whom the plates were to be purchased—Cook does not remember the name and the paper was destroyed. Adams asked Cook to get the plates and send then to Miami, Florida. Adams stated that the plates were for some fellows who were running whiskey between the North and the South. At this time Cook stated, "Joe, that will get me in trouble; that isn't right". Adams replied, "Well, will you get me the plates".

Adams gave Cook approximately \$5.00 and Cook thinks the plates cost \$3.00.

Shortly after the above conversation with Adams, Frank Jennings was going to Athens, Tennessee, and Cook asked him to get theplates, giving him a piece of paper with the name on it for whom he was to get the plates.

Jennings brought the plates back to Cook on thesame day and Cook mailed the plates by United States mail in about two days. Cook used a card with the hotel address on it that had been given him by Adams.

Some time after Christmas, as a result of a telephone call from a gas station, Cook went to the station there and met two men, one a thin-faced fellow (will probably identify Randall).

The thin-faced fellow (Randall) said "Do you know Joe Adams?" Gook replied, "Yes". Randall then said "Joe Adams is a good friend of mine", and Gook said, "Adams is a good friend of mine". Randall asked, "Didn't you buy some license plates for Adams?" and Cook told Randall that he had.

As Randall was getting into the car he handed Cook some paper money and Cook told him, "You don't owe me anything". Randall replied, "I can make more money than that in five minutes". Randall and his companion left

the filling station in a hurry.

Cook kept the \$50.00 which comprised of two \$20.00 and one \$10.00 bills and took it to the bank to find out if it was any good.

Randall stated to Cook that he had come to Atlanta by airplane, and had driven from Atlanta over middy roads.

In 1934 Jennings lived at Etowah, Tennessee, and had known Harry R. Cook for several years.

Some time in November or December, 1934, Cook asked Jennings to get some plates for him while in Athense Cook gave Jennings a piece of paper with the description of the car and the name of the party for whom Jennings was to get the plates.

Jennings went to Athens, got the plates at the County Clerk's Office, and late in the afternoon came back to browsh with the plates and gave them to Cook.

#### ROY ARP

Roy Arp. liws in Etowah and works for Harry Cook at a service station.

Some time before the 1st of January or the last part of December, 1934, about 8:30 p.m., two fellows drove into Harry Cook's service station in a U-Drive-It ear. The shorter of the two fellows (Randall) asked Arp if Harry Cook was at the station, and Arp informed him that Cook was at the show. Randall told Arp to call Cook on the 'phone and tell Cook that he, (Randall) wanted to see him, and for Cook to come over right away. Randall told Arp that hehad come all the way from Mismi to see Cook and it was important.

Arp called Cook at the theatre and Cook eame over and had a conversation with Randall and the other fellow, but Arp was not present.

#### WILLIAM MILTON JOHNSON

William Wilton Johnson was employed at the Electronic Eloted as a bell boy during the fell of 1934.

He will identify thepictures of Kate Barker, Harry Campbell, Alvin Karpis, Wynona Burdette, Dolores Delaney, and Fred Burker, as persons he saw at various times in the Eleomodoro Hotel during the fall of 1934.

He will identify the following persons as the ones he saw on several occasions in their rooms at the Elcomodoro Hotel when he waited on them: Kate Barker, Herry Campbell, Alvin Karpis, Wynona Burdette, Dolores Dedancy, and Fred Barker.

#### L. B. GRAY!

L. E. Gray began work at the kleomodoro Hotel as assistant manager, November 5, 1934.

In the middle part of November, Agents Campbd 1 and Hurt came to the Elcomodoro Hotel and talked to Gray about a 1934 Ford coupe which was being used by Eandell. Gray then told Adams about the agents inquiring about the car and Adams stated that they were probably investigating Rendell because of some labor difficulty; that Eandell had been some sort of a guard with respect to some labor troubles.

Gray will testify that the 1934 Ford coupe used by Randall was occasionally used by Adams.

After several members of the gang had been in the hotel for a while, Gray spoke to Adams and asked him, "Who are thesepeople that are in the four rooms? (He was referring to the gang, meaning Kate Barker, Fred Barker, Bolton, and Green). They acted peculiar, they never appear in the lobby in the day-time--when they would come in the lobby, they got off the elevator and went out through the side entrance-they were their hats drawn over their eyes in the lobby". Adams replied that they were used sutomobile dealers.

### L. E. GRAY (Cont'd)

After Adams was questioned by the Bureau Agents in January, 1935, he was asked by Gray about the gang being used car dealers. Adams stated at this time that he hadn't told Gray the truth when he said that they were used car dealers; that the gang were a bunch of gamblers from Gleveland and had fled to Miami because they feared their lives-Adams stated that he had promised not to tell they were in the hotd. (This conversation with Adams was held by Gray on a trip to Palm Beach and was in response to Gray telling Adams about Knight telling him, Gray, that the gang was a bunch of gamblers from Cleveland).

'Gray identified the pictures of the following persons as having been registered at the Elcomodoro Hotel during the period of November until the middle of January, 1935: Wynona Hurdetto, Harry Campbell, Fred Barker, Villiam J. Harrison, Alvin Karpis, Kate Barker, and Dolores Delaney.

Gray will testify that the usual practice at the Elcomodoro Botel, when guests left money for safe-keeping, was to have the guests put the money in an envelope and the envelope was sealed in their presence and a receipt issued to the guests, and the guest signed the envelope. When the guest desired to procure the money, he would present his receipt and be handed the envelope with the money—in the event part of themoney was put back in safe-keeping, a new envelope would be provided and the same procedurefollowed.

About the middle of November, Dolores Delaney and Nathaniel Heller registered into the Elcomodoro Hotel. At this time Gray lent his Oldsmobile Sedan to Eathaniel Heller. Heller at that time stated that he wished to use the car to drive Dolores Delaney around the city to look for an apartment or some furniture for an apartment.

On one occasion Gray mentioned Heller to Adems at which timeAdems stated that he knew Heller very well.
On the second visit of Heller to the Elcomacdoro Hotel, during the early part of December, 1934, while Heller was in the hotel, he and Adems were together a great deal.

#### L. E. GRIX (Cont'd)

These people (the gang) usually stayed in their rooms during the day time, and most of their meals were served in their rooms.

After the gang were registered into the Elcomodoro Hotel, whenever they wanted anything, they called for Mr. Adams—when the gang first came into the hotel Adams changed the rates from what Gray had set them and after that those rates were followed.

#### MRS. L. E. ORAY:

Hrs. L. E. Gray was employed as telephone operator at the Elcomodoro Hotel from November 15, 1934, to March 15, 1935—she also did work behind the desk.

Krs. Gray will identify thepictures of the following as being members of the gang who resided at the hotel at times during theperiod from November, 1934, until January, 1935; Fred Barker, Kate Barker, Delores Delaney, Harry Campbell, and Alvin Karpis.

Adams borrowed krs. Gray's radio some time in December, 1934, and had it sent to Room No. 405. Adams stated that he wanted the radio for a friend of his who was sick.

ltrs. Gray states that some time in December, 1934, a party called, asking for Mrs. Green, and that shewas informed there was no one registered by that name—thereafter Adams told Mrs. Gray that this party had called and had asked for Mrs. Green and had been told that there was no one registered there by that name. Adams stated that Mrs. Green was in Room 405 and that her name should be placed in the telephone rack as a guest of the hotel.

Approximately during December, 1934, two persons who were members of the gang registered at the Elcomodoro Hotel by Mrs. Gray. She gave them commercial rates of £2.00 per day--a few moments afterwards Mr. Adams was checking the rack showing the names of the guests registered, which also showed their rates, and he asked who had registered these two men. Mrs. Gray informed him that she had, whereupon Adams stated that they were

#### MRS. L. E. GRAY (Cont'd)

not traveling men and were not entitled to a commercial rate-immediately after these two men registered they called Room 405.

In the early part of December, 1954, while Mrs. Gray was on the switchboard, a call came from Room 405 for Mr. Adams, and Mrs. Gray connected the party with Adams on his sphone in his office. About fifteen or twenty minutes later, Adams called from Room 405 and asked Mrs. Gray to have the bell boy send up a bottle of wine to Room 405.

Most of the members of the gang generally called on the telephone for Adams. On several occasions, after members of the gang called for Adams, he would call shortly down to the office from their rooms.

During the times Dolores Delaney was registered at the Elcomodoro Hotel, Ers. Gray saw her go into Adams' private office frequently. Sometimes she would stay a few minutes and on several occasions, Delaney stayed in Adams' office as long as an hour.

#### MRS. MARY GOODIAN

Mrs. Mary Goodman was living in Hiami Beach from October, 1934, until about the middle of April, 1935.

She became acquainted with Duke Randall shortly after the holidays in 1934, and went out with him on a few occasions.

On Sunday night, Jamuary 20, 1935, Duke Randall and Kary Goodman stopped at the Bowery, a night club on Miami Beach. Heller, cashier, whom Mary Goodman had known for some time, told Duke Randall, in her presence, that there had been a phone call for him. Duke Randall asked Mary Goodman if she would make a phone call to Atlantic City, New Jersey, to a Mr. Morley at the Morley Cigar Store and ask him if anything had heppened there.

Mary Goodman went to a hotel near the Bowery Club, placed a call by telephone to Mr. Morley, and asked him if anything had happened there. She told him she was a friend of Duke Randall. Morley told her that there had been a shooting at a hotel and that two men got away and that two women were being held by the Department of Justice.

#### MRS. MARY GOODMAN, Cont'd

After the telephone call, Kary Goodman told Duke Randall what Morley had said, and Duke Randall said, "Oh, my God, I met some people and gave them a note to a hotel in Atlantic City".

Randall did not say any more at this time until the newspaper boy came in and Randall saw his name in the newspaper. Duke Randall then said that it must be the people he had given the note to.

#### HARRY HIJLER

Harry Hd ler has known Duke Randall for about four years. (having met him in Atlantic City).

During the latter part of 1934, and the early part of 1935, Heller was employed as publicity man for the Bowery Casino, Kiami Beach.

About 11:30 p.m., January 20, 1935, Heller was at the Bowery Casino. About that time Duke Randall and Mary Goodman came into the Casino.

Heller had a conversation with Duke Randall at this time. Heller told Randall that at about 7:30 that evening there had been a telephone call to the Bowery Casine, and a man had asked if there was anyone there who could take a message for Duke Randall and that he, Heller, replied that he would take the message. The man then said, "Tell Duke that your message was intercepted and Atlantic City has shot it out. Beat it?" Heller told Randall that the same party making this call called back twice and inquired of Heller whether or not he had given Randall a message. At this time, Randall only said, "Ch, yeah". A few moments later, Duke Randall asked Heller who made the call, and Heller replied that the man making the call said that Duke would know who called.

#### A. R. KARSHMAN

A. R. Mershman, during the latter part of 1934 and during January, 1935, was employed as clork at the Tamiami Hotel.

On the morning of January 17, 1935, around 9:00 0 clock, Marshman went to the Florida National Bank, changed a \$1000.00 bill, returned to the hotel, and gave the change to Duke Randall—the change consisted of twenty \$50.00 bills.

#### ARNOLD HUTCHISON

Arnold Rutchison was employed as bell boy at the Tamiami Hotel During January, 1935.

On the morning of Jamuary 17, 1935, approximately 9:00 a.m., Duke Randall told Hutchison to get two bags out of the check room and put them in Randall's black Ford coups which was parked on the Second Avenue entrance.

Hutchison got the two bags and took them out to Randall's car and put them in the rumble seat.

As Hutchison left the check room with the two bags he saw Dolores Delaney and the other girl get off the elevator. Dolores Delaney and the other girl came out of the hotel and got into Duke Randall's car. Duke Randall drove the two girls away in the Ford coupe.

#### GEORGE WESSILLS

George Wessells was employed as Cashier of the Eleomodoro --Restaurant beginning in October, 1934.

Wessells recalls seeing Nathaniel Heller in the Elcomodoro Hotel on two occasions—one time about November, the other about December, 1934—one one occasion Heller came into the restaurant with Dolores Delaney. (Wessells remembers Dolores Delaney because she was expecting a child at the time she was at therestaurant.)

Wessells remembers that they frequently sent food up to Rooms 1004, 1005, 404, and 405, during the time the gang was at the hotel there.

Around the early part of Hovember, 1934, Wessells met Duke Randall when Randall same into the restaurant and saw him there on various occasions.

Some time around the early part of January, 1935, Duke Randall spoke to Wessells about solling to Wessells a 1934 black-colored Ford coupewhich Wessells had seen Duke Handall drive on previous occasions.

Randall stated to Wessells that he wanted to sell the 1934 Ford coupe, whereupon Wessels questioned Randall as to whether or not Randall owned the car-at that time Randall showed his registration certificate for the Ford to Mr. Wessells. Wessells then stated that he would be interested in buying the car about February 1st, whereupon Randall stated, "You don't want the car, it is hot". Randall then told Wessells that the car had been brought to Mismi by someone from Chicago or Akron. Wessells tried to question Randall about the car but Randall would say nothing further.

Some time during the fdl of 1934 Wessells asked Adams who these people were (referring to the Karpis gang) and Adams replied that they were night club operators from Chicago.

Wessells will identify pictures of the following whom he saw at the bloomodoro Hotel: Dolores Delsney, Fred Barker, Kate Barker, Harry Campbell, and Wynona Burdette.

#### M. L. MULLANE

M. L. Mullane will testify that she is Clerk of the United States District Court, St. Paul, Minn.

She will identify and introduce in evidence indictment returned May 4, 1934, at St. Paul, Minn., against /lvin Karpis, Arthur Barker, and Russell Gibson.

This witness will identify and introduce in evidence original bonch warrant issued for the arrest of Alvin Karpis on May 4, 1934.

#### MERLE H. ROLPE

This witness will testify he managed the Rolfe Armored Car Service in 1934 and 1935, and that he was acquainted with Duke Randall—Randall having worked for him as a guard during the latter part of the year 1934 and early 1935. Rolfe employed Randall at the request of Adams.

He will state that on Jamuary 18, 1935, Randall came to his office, bringing an automatic rifle; that Randall told witness that it was one of threein Miami and offered to sell it to Rolfe for \$150.00.

The gun was discharged accidently while Randall was showing the same to Rolfe. Rolfe told Randall he six would not buy the gun but Randall left it with him.
