nesses began with apparently a three-day trial in prospect.



Transmitted herewith will be found copy of the report of pecial agant 7. K. McKee, deted at Cleveland, Chio, Cotober 20, 1955, which contains a question and answer statement made by John Brock relative to his associations with Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, and others.

This statement reflects that Brock was contacted at Tules, Oklahoms, on several occasions and that the intermediary between him and the fugitives in every instance was learne "Burnhand"... weedy, formerly of Tules, Oklahoms, and who is now thought to be operating a gambling establishment in or around Dalles, Texas. It is indicated that Karpis and Dampbell were harbored on several escasions at a farm located about half way between Tules and Sepulpa, Oklahoms, the farm being owned and operated by a men who also owned a number of greyhound dogs. It is also indicated that both Karpis and Campbell were probably harbored during the summer of 1935 at a place in the southern part of Oklahoms, which was obtained for them by Kendy. Indications are that Dovey Kendy, the wife of "Burnhead" Kendy, was instrumental to some extent in adding these two fugitives.

It is desired that you undertake an immediate investigation of the situation is end around Tulse, Oklahome, which embled the funitives, Entris and Jampbell, to obtain harbor and assistance, and in this connection it is suggested that an early interview with George "Burrhead" Keady, as well as with his wife, would be beneficial.

Reference is made to teletype from the Bureau to this office, and teletype from the Jacksonville office to the Bureau of this date concerning the results of the trial of William Elmer-mead at Jacksonville, Florida.

Inquiries at the Office of the United States Marshal at Jacksonville disclosed that Mead was delivered to the United States Penitentiary at Atlanta, Georgia, on October 17, 1936; also that no detainers were filed with the Marshal here prior to Mead's transfer to Atlanta. Assistant United States Attorney William A. Paisley advised that during Mead's incarceration in Jacksonville awaiting trial on the Mail Fraud charge, a request was received from the United States Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois that a detainer be filed against Mead's release in the event of an unsuccessful prosecution of him in Federal Court at Jacksonville. It was learned that the charge pending in the Northern District of Illinois related to Income Tax evasion. It was also learned that a Fugitive complaint was filed accordingly at Jacksonville, Florida, by the United States Attorney but that same was not executed in view of the successful prosecution of Mead at this point.

Under date of October 26, 1936, a letter was directed to the Bureau advising as to the results of the trial of William Klmer Mead at Jacksonville. It appears that this communication had not been received in the Bureau prior to the forwarding of the teletype to this Very truly yours,

has been issued under the provisions of any law of the United States. It was alleged that defendants harbored one, Alvin Karpovich, alias Alvin Karpis, for whom a warrant had been issued January 22, 1975, by the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota for the arrest of Alvin Karpovich, which warrant was issued on an indictment found by the Federal Grand Jury of the District of Minnesota, charging Alvin Karpis unlawfully conspired with other persons to kidnap and transport in interstate commerce and hold for \$200,000 ransom one, Edward J. Bremer. Ten overt acts are alleged which are as follows:

- 1. On or about January 22, 1935 defendants Fred Hunter and Harry Campbell met Alvin Karpovich at Warren, Ohio.
- 2. On or about January 30, 1935, the defendants met Alvin Karpovich at Warren, Ohio.
- 3. On or about April 2, 1936, the defendant Hunter drove Karpovich into the City of New Orleans, Louisiana in Hunter's 1936 Ford Coupe.
- 4. On or about April 3, 1936, defendant Hunter returned to New Orleans with Alvin Karpovich.
- 5. On or about April 3, 1936, defendant Hunter, using the alias H. J. Eing, sold Evans Motor Co., of Louisiana, Inc., 1936 Ford Coupe.
- 6. Defendant Hunter, on or about April 9, 1936, at Fernwood-By-The-Sea, located between Biloxi and Gulfport, Mississippi, accompanied Alvin Karpovich and registered at said tourist camp.
- 7. On or about April 10, 1936, defendent Hunter, using the clias Edward O'Hara, rented an apartment at 3343 Canal Street, New Orleans, Louisians.
- 8. On or about April 14, 1936, defendant Hunter accompanied Karpovich to the garage of the Quality Motors Co., Inc., 1625 Canal Street, New Orleans, Louisiana.
- 9. On or about April 27, 1936, defendant Hunter permitted Alvin Karpovich to use the apartment at 3343 Canal Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, as an asylum to come and go as he saw fit, eluding arrest by Federal authorities on the warrant aforesaid.
- 10. On or about May 1, 1936, defendant Hunter permitted Alvin Karpovich to use his apartment, 3343 Canal Street, New Orleans, Louisiana.

The records reflect that on May 27, 1936, Hunter was arraigned, entered a plea of guilty, and was sentenced to serve two years in such an institution as may be designated by the Attorney General of the United States. Warrant was issued on the sentence.



There are no mitigating circumstances in connection with this offense, convict Hunter knowing full well the dangerous and desperate character of the person he was concealing from arrest. In fact, convict Hunter admitted his intention to participate with Karpis in a crime some time after the date on which he was arrested for the purpose of replenishing their funds. It is also alleged convict Hunter participated with Alvin Karpis and others in the robbery of mail from a train carrying United States Mail at Garrettsville, Chio, on 🎊 November 7, 1935, which offense is the subject of an investigation by the ... Postal Inspection Service.

Fred John Hunter was born October 13, 1899 at Warren, (Trumbull County) Ohio. He has been married and separated; is a citizen of the United States. He has a handicap in speech as he stutters badly when excited and stutters over long words. He is also reported to be suffering a tubercular condition. Hunter served from January 31, 1921 until August 3, 1921, in the United States Army being assigned to 91, Aero Squadron, Mather Field, California, as a Private. He was honorably discharged from the Air Service Detachment August 3, 1921 - Air because of reduction in the Army. His character in the Army was noted as excellent.

The father of this convict, George Hunter, is presently seventy-two years of age, and is employed as a blacksmith and boilermaker at Leavittaburg, Ohio. The mother of the convict died in 1910, and the father was unable to rear the children properly. There were five sons and one daughter in the family, one of whom, in addition to convict Fred Hunter, is reported serving a long sentence in the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia, this being William Hunter. Other members of the family have been engaged in law violations, including such crimes as burglary.

Convict Hunter claims to be a welder, gambler, and salesman for gambling peraphernalia by occupation. He has been a devotee of cock fighting and has kept several game cocks for that purpose. He has also been a card dealer in gambling

FAMOUS GAMEN ACT IN CUBA

Extend Arm of Justice to Habana.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation of the U. S., assigned to the Department of Justice of Washington, has a group of men, specialists in criminal investigations, who, to differentiate them from the members of the secret service, are given the name "G-Yen", that is, Government Men, thus differentiating them from the different corps of municipal and state police.

These men are the ones who with their chief, Mr. John Edgar Hoover, are waging the intense fight on the North American gangsters and kidnappers.

The same Hoover, in person, was the one who, without a single revolver shot, captured the terrible gangster Alvin Karnis. In the International Conference of Chiefs of American Police, held a short while ago, Hoover declared that he had been at the place where Karpis was, not for personal courage nor for an exhibition of audacity, but for scientific observations of the technical experts who advised him and without whom it would never have been possible to arrive at the proper whereabouts of the terrible bandit.

By the opportune information published extensively by "El Pais", it was known that the same Karpis as well as other notorious gangsters of the neighboring republic have been in Habana carrying on their operations and investigations. One proof of this has been the widly publicised case of Kr. Cassius ElacDonald, who introduced into Cuba the marked bank notes from a kidnepping, and who was considered as a "gentleman" by many in this city and suspected by others for the ostentatious life that he led. This last caused the Minister of Interior to start an investigation.

At this time the pertfolio of Interior was held by Dr. Raul de Cardenas, who relied on the descreet and delicate work of Dr. Israel Castillanes, Pirector of the National Eureau of Investigation, who in a few days gave a complete and detailed report concerning the true personality of Cassius NacDonald, showing him as he really was: a man with a title of engineer, protected by politicians of ill repute residing in the city of Chicago, and with a judicial record in different states of the American union.

Opportunely it was known that Dr. Cardenas surprised and discouraged the persons who were interested by the mentioned criminal and that the Cuban authorities were certain with regard to the first suspicions.

At the same time, and attracted by the case, several American "G-Men" disemarked in Cuba. From these same columns, it was known that the members of this institution and of other Services of the United States visited the Secretary of the Interior.

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Now then, we have never been able to determine exactly when they came nor for what they came; but it is unquestionable that the "G-Men" acted in Cuba with the same efficiency as in the United States. In cooperation with whom did these men work in our country?

This is a question whose answer we shall give our readers very soon.

MEMORANDUM FOR ME. POXNORTE

Res Unknown Subjects: Mrs. Albert H. Crosby VictiminSPA.

As an indication of lack of cooperation, I refer to the report of Special Agent E. N. Notesteen, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated October 5, 1936, in connection with the above entitled metter, together with a personal and confidential letter deted October 6, 1986, received from Special Agent in Charge Stein of the same office.

The St. Paul office was salvised by J. R. Murphy and George Sommers of the Claim Department, Travelers Insurance Company that they had received a telephone call from Melvin J. Passolt, Chief of the State Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, indicating an indirect approach for the purpose of instituting a Buy-Back arrangement for the return of the jewelry stolen. Passolt indicated that if \$2,500.00 were made available he believed the loot could be returned. The facts concerning this approach on the part of Passolt were discussed by Mr. Stein with United States Attorney George Fullivan at St. Peul, who indicated his desire to push the prosecutive action regarding any activity on the part of outsiders perticipating in a Buy-back transaction, adding that even though no definite evidence was disclosed the stolen property was ever transported outside of the state, he, Mr. Sullivan is of the opinion that the Federal Grand Jury has the right to subpoens Passolt and Frank Sommers to learn whether they have knowledge of any such transportation and that it is Mr. Bullivan's belief that if they are so susmoned, information can be developed as to who may have been responsible for the theft and who may be holding the well-yet the present time. As Mr. Stein indicates, such action, that is, bringing Passolt and Sommers before the Federal Grand Jury, may at least show these individuals in their true light as little more than extortionists.

Mr. Stein, in referring to Melvin Pessolt, stated that the Bureau will recall he enjoys a very poor reputation as a law enforcement officer, and further that he testified as to the good character of the bootleg place operated by Herry Seayer during prohibition, the above testimony having been given in the most recent Bremer trial, when Sawyer was a defendant.

He further states that it will be recalled his Chief (775); () Investigator, Frank Sommers, was at one time bead of the local Secret Service office. Sommers also was indicted in St. Paul at one time in connection with a mail robbery which indictment was later dismissed. Sommers also served as Chief of Police of St. Paul and for awhile operated a private detective agency. His reputation is of the poorest and it is commonly rusored that he is the contect in the State Bureau of Criminal Apprehension for all major criminals.
Incidentally, the above mentioned report indicates that it is the opinion of the representatives of the insurance company that Frank Sommers is involved in this case, in view of his previous doubtful reputation and that Passolt is merely fronting for Sommers, and that wither Pesselt or Sommers, or both, have definite knowledge of the party making negotiations for the thief. As the report indicetes, the insurance company is satisfing further contect with Hr. Passolt, at which time the St. Paul office is to be advised and such further steps taken as may be desmed advisable according to the arrangement suggested for the final negotiation.

empanied by a short, dark complexioned, alenderly built young men, and the names of "bhorty" and Freddie sound familiar in report to this men, visited adith Barry's house. I had dates with this short men I have described and with Willie and I recell that "Dod" purchased the services of "Feaches." willie and "had" remains tower might, but the short fellow fill not stay. From a group of photomaphs I have selected the photograph of Fred Burker, \$9836, and can state that this men looks superhat similar to the short man I have described, elthough I cannot positively identify this shortownsh. I recell that this man had the fingers of one is a bin wood, and illie to the thirt this was had burned the firster.

The following afternoon illie and "and" paid with Barry 125.00 a piece for the services of "leaches" and myself in accompanying these men to the Casino Club on turnit atreet in Joint slace, Ohio, where we drank for a couple of hours. I don't recall that Bort or Ted Angus was there that day. We returned to Edith's house about six in the evening.

"Before we left that afternoon Willie mentioned that he had broken a date to play solf with Deptain Timiney of the Toledo Polico Department at nine o'clock that morning, because he was too intexicated to get up at that time. I understood they were to play on the golf course located across from the Desino Club. "Sonny" and "Ded" took part in this conversation.

"form time shortly after this date another men once to dith Derry's rouse, and I stared overmisht with him for which I received 20.00, helf of which I paid to adith Derry. This a notes known to me as "Jou." I have identified the photograph of Dr. Joseph & Moran as being the likeness of this men "Doo." I have likewise selected and Tentified the photograph of Japes J. Biland as a young wen known to me as Jimmy. "Doo" told me that he was an uncle of Jimmy. To my best recollection Jimmy was also in the party on the above-mentioned night when I first met the men I pertially identified as being Fred Berker.

"I see "Doc" at least three occasions therefter at Edith Berry's house. I recall that Edith Berry, "Doc", Frank "Greenie" Greenwald, who operates the Frivate Cab Company, and myself attended the Casino Club on the might of a grand reopening, celebrating the redecorating of the club. I think this was in May 1934. Jimy was also at the club that might, but was a 1 in our party, and I believe that both Ted and dert Annus were there, but we did not appear with those. Detectives John Modertly and Art arown of the hootlux squad were also sitting at a table, but Edith told me not to "rap" to them. That saws might I had an aroument with Charlie "synther, and was compelled to keep that out. The out of the formulation which I did, returning to dith serry's house.

"One might Frenk Greenweld celled at Edith's place with two young men, both quite intoxicated, and Greenic came upstains and told me not to recognize him in front of these two men. I don't know why he said this. I did not g t a good look at one of the men who left shortly thereafter, and the other man was known to me at Buff or Buck. I have selected and identified the photograph of Herry Compbell as being identical with Buff, and this man is now known to me to be Harry Jampbell. I entertained him that night before I left for home. I understood that later that night after I left, Edith obtained the sawiess of a cell girl named Suth Farrison for Campbell, who stayed overnight.

TI recoll that all of the men I have mentioned above she visited. Bith Born's house in the spring and summer of 1974 a ert namey fromly, and bought trinks for the eight trans and for diff Brany. With told us that these men were symblers from Claveland, Chio.

"Throughout the time that I was employed at Edith
Berry's house, she invariably called one of Greenie's cabe
for all of the business from her house. Greenie and Edith
were quite friendly, and to my knowledge on at legat one
occasion they were sexually intimate with each other. From
the conversation of the above-mentioned men who visited Edith's
place in the sugger of 1924, and from Edith's conversation, I
unicrated that they and she were quite friendly with both
Ted and Bert Angus.

"The last time I saw the men whom I have identified as being Dr. Joseph i. Moran, he was at Edith Berry's house and quite intexicated, and he told me about a fishing trip he intended to take to a log ambin fishing emap up morth. I do not know what he, pened to him, but I do know that he owed me 100 and owel wdith 790, which made her quite peaced. She called up Ted Angus and inquired of him who would take erro of this bill. She afterwards told me that Ted Angus

had passed off her question jokingly remerking that Dod had gone on hir last roundup. Thereafter whenever mention was made of "Doo" by edith or the maid, Margaret, and subscipently by Karin and Carlottle, when they returned as will be mantioned hereafter, they would lead about see and "The Last moundape"

"I did not see Campbell, Karpis, or any of the men mentioned above thereafter during the full of 1934.

"/bout one o'clock one morning during the month of Jenuary 1905, I was in my room on the second floor of Edith Berry's house when someone man the front doorbell. I am almost positive that Margaret, the colored maid, answered the door and then onlied Edith. A few minutes later Edith came apateirs and erranged the front right bedroom window shades to cover up the windows. The was Collowed upstairs by two men whom I redognized of that time, and whom I already have identified as being Alvin Karpis and Berry Campbell. They were corrying a small shiny leather kit which looked similar to a physician's hit. Buth of ther linked imparts and were un haven. I recall that they were not fully clothed for winter in that they did not here to not to be overert, now were they were ties, and to my best recollection they did not have hote. After they entered this bedroom where Edith war, the door was shut end the restined with them for some time. I did not speek to then that might, but they bounds drinks for the house including "Leacher", fith and myself, which were a myed by the mail. Margaret. Then I got off of mork at 4:00 A. M. I went home. I do not know who brought these men there this might.

The maxt might when I reported for work et 7:00 i. M., Campbell and Kurpis were still occupying the bedroom they occupied the previous might. That might Harry Campbell purchased my services, and meither Earpis, Campbell, nor sdith explained to me their reason for their presence in the house. They remained for approximately ten days, staying almost cometantly in the room they were ensupying, the door of which was kept looked what suyone was visiting the house. They are all their smalls at the Lause. Marginet, the mail, and myself woulf ordinarily take the meals upstains and Edith would supervice the serving. On one occasion welter according the solored house man, gave Karpis a hairout in the kitchen, and I noticed afterwards the presence of the service I appear promise lly

all my time thore, stiin, and it times actually cookin, made for them, and spent each might with Harry Campbell, and with adith spent the days trying to keep them amused. For my above I received approximately (150.70, of which a portion represent a 50% of the manay he paid for my services (the other 50% going to mith Barry), and in addition tips of as much as \$5.00 and 110.00 which he ossesionally gove me. To my knowledge Maryis did not purchase the services of a sirl during this period, and I understood that he had a veneral disease.

"Also during this period I recall overhering conversetions at different times between Karpis, Edith and "Feaches" concerning mutual ecquaintences. The mane of "Charkey" was mentioned as a man residing in Cleveland, Ohio, and all three apported to be acquainted with a man bearing this name. "Perches" and Edith mentioned that some years previously they had visited in 61 velond and they knew a young men mened "Charkey" and that this individual was sequeinted with Ardell Quian who ran a house of proctitution. The result of this convermation wes that Mdith, "Perches", and Farris concluded that they same vil equalites with the same man whom they referred to as fur prove-I did not over'merr will that was said during these convergations. but I do know that a day or two later during the efternoon a green Orchem sedan, being a 4-door model and appearing to be nex, pulled up in front of Edith's house. A mon entered the house an" was taken by Edith to the bedroom escapied by Enopis and Campbell. Fdite colled me into the room and I there are Marpis, Campbell, Adith, and a third man. wdith maked we if I could drive the car which was parked outside, and when I stated I sould, she then asked me if I would park sharkey's eer, in agein referring to it. I have selected a photograph of John F. "Sharkey" Gorman, and I identify it as being a likeness of the man who was in the room with Edith, Karpis and Campbell on that day. Rither Karpis or Campbell told me to park the sur mear the Jarvis Apertments on 14th Street. Sharkey gave me the keys, and I parked the ear as directed, efter which I returned the keys to Sherkey and toll him exactly where I had porked his our. I recall that thereof remined in the room for about an hour conversing with Karpis and Campbell, and be then left. He returned alone at night a day or two later. whortly before this time "reaches" had fallen on the ice and had broken her arist, and I recall that "Charker" rendined overnight with Tacholos' on the above mentions willt. I cannot red 11 seeing bir leave the following days on the occeasion of this visit "oberkey" telked with Lernie and

Composit in the front bedroom, and experted to be estelly friendly with Karpis. To my best recollection it was only a day or two later that Charkey again visited Edith Barry's house, and on this occasion he was accompanied by a youn; men whose name I later learned was Profile. I have selected and identified a photograph of Fred liuntur as being the likeness of the men known to me as Freddie. Shirkey and Freddie immediately went up to the front bedroom where they engaged in conversation with Kerpis, Campbell, and Edith. Sharkey left that some night, and as I recall Freddie remained evernight with "Feaches." I do not remember seeing him leeve the mext day, but I do recall that somewhere betreen seven and mine P. M. an evening or two leter Karpis and Campbell left Edith's place. I recall that upon leaving Edith and I said goodbye to them in the parlor dewastairs while they were writing for someone to call for them. While we were stending in this room, someone serie to the front door and Edith animored the bell after pulling the portions seroes the parlor entrence. For this resson I did not see this person, nor did I herr any conversation which might indicate who this person was. I know them and a or proced in front. They left almost immediately with this unknown person who had colled for them. I recall that while they were sciting for this indivitual to call, Campbell and Farpis stated that they would return within fl days, and Enrols was joshing Edith about the possibility of her losing one of her wirls when Campbell returned. He was referring to the close friendship between myeals and Campbell, and the possibility of me going with him.

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"puring the period mentioned above when Karpis and Campbell were steying at Edith Berry's house, I recall that they both spoke of a person mamed Gooley, of expecting him to eall at the house, of him actually visiting the house, and of my seeing him there with Karpis and Campbell, but I cannot remember the circumstances surrounding his visit, nor can I now recall what he looks like.

"Also during the above period frequent mention was made by Kirpis, Campboll, and Edith of Unenie, who operated the privite Cab Go pan, and he called at the house on several occusions in rusposes to tale, home call: from Miss Derry, she having called at the requests of Eurpis and Campboll who wanted to get in touch with Joe of the 42nd Street Cafe. I later largued from Thith Emery that Joe who operated the 44nd Etreet Infe was the humbant of Jamey Broadway. I recall that unsente had difficulty in getting in touch with Joe, and he returned on several occasions stating that he had been unable to find Joe at the case. I do recall that on one occasion after Urdenie was directed by Frith to get in touch with Joe, that this man called lies Harry's house and visited with karpin, Jampbell, and adith in the bedroom. I did not see him, but when Margaret, the maid, answered the door, Edith called from upstries and Margaret told her that it was Joe, and Slith invited him by name to come to the second floor after she shut the door to my room. He remained in the bedroom with Earpis and Jampbell from one half hour to an hour, and than left.

"I feel certain that on another occasion during the time Kerpis and Campbell were staying at Edith's house during the above period, Joe Broadway whom I mow know to be Jee Loscoe, visited the house, as upon returning there one night I saw him late model Buick coupe perked scross the street from the house. I know that he was in the house at that time, because Edith directed Unrecet, the maid, to let Joe out when he was randy to leave. I connect recall ever beging seen this man, however.


Thore than il deva ela med after Estyle and Compbell left before we exala saw them. Both edith and I were worried about their safety. Some few days after the day of their expected errival, and quite late in the evening, someone entered the house, they being let in by Edith. Chortly tiererfter idith called for me, and after I went into the kitchen I was surprised to find both Larpis and Sampbell there. Both were grimy, unshaven and apperently were worn out. I do not know how they got to Edith's house, nor do I know where they ceme from. They purchased a few drinks, and both of them then retired for the sight in the front bedroom. I an fairly cortain that they remained only two or three days, and I cannot recember any visitors they had at the house at that time, nor sen I recall the circumstances of their leaving the house. It seems to me that they might have left on this occision without a ying goodbys to me. This must have been some time around threh 1, 1950.

"whout three works after they departed on this secund occasion, Kerpin and Campbell again returned to Edith's house in the evening. when they entered the house Campbell was quite intuxies tod, and they mentioned they bed on a defect on the way in. Ker, is was quite weavel about it, incomed despited in the Fig. 1 to be a criving while intexicated, and I gettered

he hid killed somebody while he was at the wheel, and that this was the second time Deribell hid killed someone while driving, within a short period of time. They told me that the demand our was perked outside, and inquired whether I knew p place to store it for the night. I told them I did, and at their suggestion I drove the ear and placed it in the lymin D. Arnold garage at 10th and Adams streets, Toledo. I recell that the der was most difficult to making because the steering apparatus was damaged. I returned to the house and spent the night with Harry Sampbell. Edith and Karpis talked for a long time in the front bedroom.

"On the following day Edith, Marpiz, and Compbell were talking with me, and asked whether I knew a Ford agency where I sould purchase a new sar, imding in the damaged one, and where immediate delivery sould be made on a new ear. I sugmented the Lyman D. Armold Company, and at their direction went there and obtained an entimete value of the trade-in value of the damaged dar, and the sort of a new word of the same type. The damaged car was a 1935 model Ford soupe, standard, black in solor. They told me to be certain that the new ear was black. I returned to the house and gave them the estimated doct of a new car.

"ift r derk that evening Compbell told me that he desired me to provide him to mert a friend who was registered at the Lorraine Hotel water the same of T. F. Evens. After leaving Edith's house we stooped at a pay station telephone where at Campbell's surrestion I called Mr. Evens at the Lorraine Hotel, end made an engarement to most him within a few minutes me r the side entrance of the hotel, which we did. It was quite derk in that vicinity, and the three of us walked around the block. Campbell and this men walked together and telked in a low tone. I did not overher their conversation, nor was I introduced to this man, and because of the darkness I did not get a good look et him. I recall that he was quite tall and slenderly built. Campbell and I returned to Edith's house where we spent the night. He told me d this time that I was to meet this men the following morning, and to go with him to purchase the med enry that this man would have the papers to the ol or r which the registered under the name of Charles Miller of .earl Street, Cleveland, white. I his upon instructions of Larry Campbell previously told the seleman at the arnold agency that I had wrecked the old car which was to be traded in, and was waiting the return of my husband to obtain fry, Mr. the papers to the cor be one A completed surabuse of tid non cer.



"The following morning of the surgestion of Berry Cambell I selled the Lorreine Rotel and apoke with the man known to me as ur. Evens, and not him shortly thereafter in front of the hotal. I have selected from a group of photographs a photograph of John Brock, and identify it as being the likewess of them a known to me as T. F. Synns. Se went to the Lymna D. Arnold Sales Agency, and purebased a new 1975 model ford coupe, avans having the papers to the damaged Ford coups that was traded in. Zvens paid the spleamen \$400 cash which Harry Campbell gave me before I left the house. I drove him in the new ear to Edith Barry's house. He went upstairs and went into the front bedroom where Karpis, Campbell, and 201th already were. I recall that he stayed there for two to three hours that afternoom, and I believe that Edith served lunch to the three men in the front bedroom. I do not recall seeing this man leave the house.

"About this period of time Idith Berry was particularly interested in the wolfers of Kerpis. Che appeared to be infatuated with him, and speat practically all of her time in his commany in trying to keep him satisfied. She prepared delicacies and special foods which he perticularly liked, and regardless of what he desired she would provide it for him if she was abla. To my boot recollection a girl mamed Maxine obtained employment in Edith's bouse around this time. Karpis and Campbell wore no longer as contious as at first, and moved freely about the entire house, and practically took over the household. Around this time they began esting their meals in the kitchen with Edith and the other girls, including myself, but would dash upstairs to their room when anyone rang the doorbell. Edith turned away most of her sustaners, and as a result the money obtained from Karpis and Compbell was practically the entire income at Edith Berry's bouse.

"Campbell and I took a liking to each other, and he suggested that I go away with him which I agreed to do. When Edith learned of this she became enraged, stating that before she would let Campbell take me away she would have to tell Joe (Joe Holcoe) exactly who I was, indicating that Campbell would have to tell Joe what he intended to do with me, and would have to inform Joe that my husband had at one time testified against some members of the Lieoveli gang. I gathered from what Edith said that she desired to first find out whether Joe (Joe Hoscoe) would think it advirable for Campbell to take up with me before we last her house, and she said that Joe would be at the house that night, and they would talk it over with him. Campbell and myself were upstairs, and I was pecking my things preparing to leave with him when someone

celled at the front door. Shortly afterward idith e-me epetatre and told desposed to acce describing an Joe was there. Ommpbell went downsteirs and joined Jos, Karpis and Edith in the diming room where I sould been their voices in convercation, elthough I could not everyour what they said. Margaret, the said, served the drinks. They respined downstring salking for about as hour, and Joe accompenied by Kerpis then left together. As I recell Karpis took with his a Gladstone bag. Then Compbell came upstairs I asked him what Joe had said about my going with Campbell, and he told me that he forgot to ask Joe about it. A niege of Kdith Barry was at the house that might, and remained upstairs when the discussion was had in the dining room. Inter the same evening Edith and her miece, Rose, left my automobile for Chienco, Illinois. I don't know the reason for this trip being made by Edith. After Edith and her siece left, Campbell and myself and Yarr not were the only ones left in the house, and Campbell and myself proceeded to become theroughly intoxicated.

*34ith and her niece returned late the following day, and she stited this they had driven all that day and the previous mintt. This was around the first whee of april 1975. A device two after Ferula laft, Campbell also left the house. Tithing for days both Karpie and Jemphall returned to Whith's place separately. They remained a day or two et this time, and them left together one morning, each carrying a suitcess. He also had what appeared to be a gun which was wrapped in wrapping paper. Reither Campbell mar Emple told me where they were coinc, nor when they would be brok, although I unterstood that I would see Campbell in

about six weeks.

*During the above period before Karpio and Campbell left Edith Barry's house, they kept a Tomy subprchine gun on the floor under the bed in their bedroom. I likewise at times heard metal sounds which I believed were sounds secongarying the eleaning of guns, and also smelled oil in the bethroom after herring there sounds. During the time that Campbell was at the house he invertably corried under his bolt a heavy revolver which he kept 10. ded. He never made may effort to concent this gun when he ser in the prescass of Zait) or any of the girls in the bouse.

"Also during this last period when Kerpis and Ommpbell were etering of milities homes I recall that "Sharkey" called at the boung lite one night and remained a couple of home, en I drove with him to cherry street to direct bis box to not to

Clevelend on the route which passes over the high level bridge. I am likewise cert in that fred Hunter visited the house about this time, and remined over night with "leaches." I rought a man who: I am certain was fred Tun'er came to the house in an old mosal two-door rickety Ford meden which and parked on Canton Avenue near the county jail. Then Karyia beard where the cor was parked, he suggested that I go with this man whom I believe was fred Hunter, and park the car near the Jarvic Apertments, which we did. I rought that Campbell was also in Edith's house that evening, and all three of the above mentioned men stayed overnight. Around this time Freddie must have made another visit to Edith's house, b. cause I know that he went to bed with Wayine one might.

FI think that it was about the first week in April 1978, and shile Marpis and Compbell wors staying at Raith's house that thexine, contrary to orders, went into With's room and took out a Detective Story Pagazine which she reed and put aside. I picked it up and read an erticle which contained on the first thee migisture of en oil field end en outline of s wolf, this article relating the experiences of the Barker end of the crimes conditted to her rise, Arin Bergi , Isiry composit, and other members of this comp. There were elso photographs of Alvin Kerpis, Berry Campbell, ent Tynone Burdette, end mention wer made that these men were writed for kidn ping by the Governsent and also were wented for other erises. I recall likewise that under the hategreph of your Burdetts, it was stated that she was the sweetheart of Harry Campbell and was presently serving a sentence in prison at Milan, Michigan. I did not say enything to anyboly at that time about reading this article, and Mexine did not mention to me that she had read it. This was my first knowledge of the fact that "bonny" and "Buff" were identical with Alvin Karyis and Harry Compbell, although prior to this time due to the suspicious actions of these men and of Edith Barry, and those persons who made friendly calls upon Gampbell and Aerpis, it was evident to me that they were "hot."

nabout this time I was having demontic tribble and had decided to obtain a divorse. Edith suggested that I go to petroit, Michigan, and she telephoned Plorence Newman at Letroit and obtained a job for me at the house of prostitution operated by this woman. Edith Barry was anxious for me to love Tolado, a cause she did not writing harbon to ended tribble of the house, or have his large of the men visitors of his been staying there. For the dry that Earpic and Campbell left Edith Berry's house with their baggage, I found in my bedroom the photograph of Mynone Burdette which I had previously seen in the above described Petective Magazine. I didn't say smything about it at that time, but when Edith, Rose, and I want to Detroit I showed this photograph to Edith while we were esting lunch at the Book-Cadillec Hotel, and she said, Mow, you know why I didn't want you to get mived up with Buff. I gave this photograph to her at that time.

"On laster Sundry, 1975, I evrived in Toledo, Ohio, eround one or two in the morning, and went to Edith's house in one of Greenie's onbs. Edith see the only person there that might bosides the maid, Margaret, and I dyed eggs and prepared several Faster beskets for friends of mine. Edith told me at this that "Lonny" was in the house asleep, but I did not see him. The abtuined an old mater basket from the attic, and she but ribbons on it, and decorated it with little early bundles and colored master agas for her "Conny." I intended to stay evernight at the house, but Mith suggested that I stay at a botol. I left the house shortly afterwards, and returned to Detroit the following aft races.

"Around the first part of June 1975, I received a latter et Detroit, Michigan from Edith in which abe stated that she bee not seen my friend, mosning Harry Campbell, but that she had something for me which she would keep until I returned to Toledo. Stortly thereafter I visited idith Herry at ber house. Alvin Kerpis was there and the three of us set in the kitchen and drank bear. At this time Edith gave me \$50.00 which she said Campbell had left with her for me, to help pey the cost of my divorce proceedings. Karpie and I drank considerable beer, and he saked me whether I desired to see ommoball, and I told him yes. So thereafter west upstairs, and enortly afterward about two hours later Composil arrived there. Karpis and Jampbell and myself drank beer until about ten e'clock, and we then went upstairs. Campbell did mot appoint to be as friendly with me on he ununity with accred to be ill et ewet, and he arried he could not reusin overmint: but hid to leave to Reet size friends. Compboll laft Edith's place about milnight, Karpis and Edith remained by t'emerives in the front betroom. I remained overnight, and the fello in dry returned to betroit, Michigan.



"Ehortly after karpis sems to milth's house on . this occasion I was in my room one night when two men galled. I heard Edith address them as Joe and Ben. They talked with Kerpie in the front bedroom for about an hour or so. Edith me in and out of the room at this time and was serving them drinks. Then they left I did not see them go. Thereefter during the following days while Karpis was at Edith's place, he continually remined in the house. Edith told me after Ben bed gone that this men had just gotton out of the fatire, morning penitentiary; that he was practically pennilese; that he had left all of his bolonmines with some woman before roing to the penitentiary, and since his release had been unable to locate them; that she had told him that he should have left the clothes with her, and she would have taken good care of them. Thereafter Ben called at the bouse shout three more times during the ensuing two weeks. He was always alone on these occasions and generally spoke privately with Edith Berry. On one of these occasions I entertained him in my bedroom.

Taround this same period at Edith's suggestion we went to the dund street Cafe, being drives by Greenie in a Frivate sab on at least two operations that I recall. The man known to me as been me at these times in the find atreet Cafe, and Edith talked confidentially with him. Bout the middle of becember 1975, I have up my job at little regretatione, entity we not returned since that time, nor have I sucket with here. I am no longer engaged in the practice of promittation, and have since remarked my former husband, Charles Meren.

"I recell that on one occasion after I returned to mith Barry's house from Detroit, Michigan in the musmer of 1925, and when it had been some time since Alvin Kerpihed visited there, Mith Barry compleined in referring to Enryls and Jampbell, that they did not appreciate what she hed done for them; that she had provided them a place to stay at a time when mobody else would have them; that she bid closed down her business and turned her sustomers sway, and had put herself out in a number of ways for them; that they had told her of a place where they had stayed where they had to pay a large amount of money in advence for shelter because they were so "hot"; that at this place they got little to est and were always hungry, and she here men-\$1 med to me how she had pure's sed good food and had cooked for them. In this connestion reference is made to the question and answer statement of John Brook which is set out in the report of special Agent S. K. VcKes, dated at Clavelani, Ohio, Ostober 20, 1936, in which Brock states that during the latter part of March 1935, he stayed overnight with "Fraches" at Edith Barry's house. Lou Foole could not wecall that Brock ever stayed overnight there, mor sould she remember whether be ever had a date with "leaches" or any of the girls. It is to be noted that John Brock has an aggravated case of syphillis, and it is probable that Maith Berry was making reference to Brock when she surrested to "feeches" in her letter that ale undergo " redical excination.

She stated that after this visit O'Neil made frequent long distance telephone calls to Edith Farry; that "Tip" O'Beil is a good frien" of Ardell winn from Cle cland.

Low Fools was questioned whether she was acqueinted with or ever herd the mames of Art Hebebrand, phicry Fatton, Tony towards, "Theta" Talbot, a private detection who was supposed to provide forgio and desphall with conflication incorporation, and of the name of the Traverd Club, but are was unable to provide any information in this respect. Low claimed not to be personally asquainted with Captain George Timiney and Sheriff Jim O'heilly, and has no information which might indicate that these officers ever availed that selves of the prostitutes at Fdith Barry's house. She also desied that she ever hand that Earpis and Campbell and members of their gang were able to remain in Toledo on account of eartigation within the Toledo Police Department. She at ted that the only time she ever hand Captain Timiney's name mentioned by any of the boys, and when fillie Earrison accounted that he had broken a golf englament with Ciminey, on the occasion mentioned in her signed at terent. Low everted that she never hand Whith Berry or anyone also mention that Campbell was in association with Chariff O'heilly during the latter part of 1975 and foreignt of 1976, and she has no information that usually indicate that the arith mass campbell's true identity.

In conclusion Low stated that she at one time cought hith Berry in a compromising position with Alvin Karpis, and it is her impression that the relationship between there two was considerably more than jut a business proposition.

It has been indicated in previous reports that Jerry Mensiker was infatuated with Jimmis Silson in the summer of 1934, while she was an entertainer at the Little Sasino Club.

In ensur to a request of the Cleveland office, the Kenses City office adviced that Hiss Measiker was unknown at the above-mentic ed eddress in Kenses City, Wiscouri.

The Messiker, sister-in-lex of Jerry Messiker, 2039

Berden / Verus, Tolodo, was again contacted for the purpose of containing the true eddress of Jerry. Was, Messiker stated she had just received a letter from Jerry, and Jerry at the present time is residing at the Trake Hote, 9th and Vine Streets, Cincinnati, Chio, where she is entertaining at the Nour-Four Club; that she did not know just had long Jerry will be in Jincinnati, but believes it will be for just a short time, in view of the fact that Jerry stated in her letter one was guing to Layton, Chio, soon, where she intended staying for some time. Has, Messiker stated she does not know what Jerry's address will be in Dayton, Chic, or Detroit, Michigan.

In view of the fact that it could not be accertained just how long Jerry Messiker would be in Cincinnati, or her future address, the Cleveland office was furnished telephonically the eddress of Jerry Messiker in order that the Cincinnati office might be requested to interview her immediately.

Upon interview she ateted essentially the some information as was given in her first interview, and continued to deny that she knew of Campbell's true identity. However, on this occusion she informed that shortly before the marriage of Campbell and Gertie Billster, she hed occasion to visit the Mooraw rouming house, where she wet Campbell for the first time. She informed that Clere MoJraw, Gentie and Campbell were present, and Glera McGras introduced Gampbell to her as Bob Brown, her scasin. In the evening of May 29, 1905, Chara Molrow, Sertie, and demoball visited Goulet's Grill, she informed, at which time Gazyboll was introduced to Fred Coulet as Bob Willow. Author Goulet explained that she discussed this discrepancy with partie, who informed her that the night before her marriage, six in 1 found Com, bell's driver's license with the name of Charles Miller therein, and tempheli told he that this wer his true nemo. Eather streed that efter considering this fact, she now believes that Clara Motrew was endeavoring to hid abmething, but had no proof of

Then questioned as to whather or not he ever made a statement to inlice officer Clint Knudel to the effect that it was not safe for an officer to be in the Casino Club, Lawson atted he might have made such a statement in view of his opinion of the Casino Club, but he has no independent recollection of making such a statement.

He was questioned as to the identity of the deputy shariff, whom knudel stated be, Lawson, mentioned was in the Casino Club when they went there in answer to the radio call. He stated, however, that he does not recall having seen a deputy shariff at the Casino Club on this occasion.

On October 22, 1936, Folice Officer Frenk Mahr was interviewed at his home, 4318 Belmar Street, Toledo. He gave, in effect, the same information furnished by Officer C. M. Lawson, set out above. he further street that there were quite a number of people in the Casino Club on this occasion, and they were all will drawed and did not have the appearance of her flum; that he did not know the identity of any of these people. he stated he

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knows Ted and sort angus by sight, but he did not see them in the Jasino Glub on this occasion, although they may have been there as the place was crowded. Mahr stated he does not recall the date on which they answered the call, but it was during the early wonths of 1974, and this was the only official call he has ever made at the Jusico Club, and he has never visited that alub on other than official business.

It will be noted above that Officer Lawson stated that his partner, Frank Mahr, would no doubt be able to furnish more detailed information with reference to this matter, in view of the fact that Mahr did all the talking because Mahr had been in the Toledo Folice Department since 1921. Upon being informed in this regard, Wahr stated that he did not do the talking on this occasion, but officials of the Casino Glub did their talking to Lawson.

Make stated that as soon as it was learned that the fire alarm was false, due to the automobile accident teving broker off a fire box, which sert in the alarm, he and his partner, Lawson, informed (fficer Best they would report themselves back in service and allow Bost and his partner to handle the accident investigation. Reference is made to the letter from this office, dated May 10, 1936, enclosing a memorandum prepared by Special Agents E. J. Mynn, C. E. Smith and J. L. Madala, relative to vice conditions and police corruption existing in this district. The following facts, supplementing the above, are firmished formy your information concerning conditions existing in the City of Cleveland, Ohio, and suburbs:

The information given below was obtained through the investigation being conducted relative to the harboring case wherein telephone taps on the telephones of Nate eisenberg, slot-machine recketeer, and Ardell uinn, notorious madam, provided excellent sources for these facts, and also interviews with verious members of the Police Department and employees of the Hervard Club, which Club is located in Newburgh Heights, a suburb of Cleveland, Ohio, and the recent activities of Public Safety Director Eliothess, that have been obtained through the press, tend to corroborate the circumstances already known to the Bureau.

With reference to the report of Special Agent R. J. Abbaticchio, Jr., dated June 24, 1936, at Omaha, Nebraska, wherein an interview is recited with Mrs. Gladys) hawyer relative to her arrest, along with raula Harmon and Wynona Burdette, on September 5, 1934, at Cleveland, Ohio. In this interview Mrs. Sawyer stated that during her incarceration in the City Jail on this occasion, some policewoman or matron made a proposition to her that for \$500.00 she would release these three women from jail; that this proposition was prefaced by an inquiry as to whether or not she was acquainted with Shimmy Fatton. As a result of this interview, all of the policewomen and matrons that were employed during 1934 have been interviewed and also an extensive investigation has been conducted at the Police Department relative to this incident and also the fact

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that a telephone call was placed, allegedly, thru the Police Department, to the Harvard Club after the arrest of these women, which resulted in the notification of the subjects in this case and their subsequent flight from Cleveland, thus avoiding apprehension at this time.

In an interview with Mildred H. Wilcox, policewoman, she stated that she has been employed as a policewoman for the past six years and that prior to this time she worked as a detective for the Folger Detective Agency, the Sterling & Welch Company, and the Highee Company, but that since she has been in the Cleveland Police Department she has done less detective work than ever before. She continued by stating that the Woman's Bureau of this Police Department, at the present time, is merely a clearing house for relief agencies that were too lazy and inefficient to do their own work. Ers. Wilcox stated that it was common knowledge that Superintendent HazelX.itt, of the Woman's Bureau, is a sexual pervert, as were several other policewomen; that it is also common knowledge, in the Police Department, that policewoman Mary Fletcher and policewoman Smith, who is colored, are "sweethearts" and on one occasion the police made a raid on the Heat wave, a night club for both white and colored people, and both Miss Fletcher and Miss Smith were at this club with colored escorts. She stated that, as a result of finding these policewomen in this club, the raid was not consumated as the police could not arrest some of the people and allow Kiss Fletcher and Miss Smith and their colored escorts to leave unmolested. She stated that the escort of Miss Fletcher was a well known negro hoodlum.

According to kms. Wilcox, and several other women in the Women's Bureau, Kolly Bartelheim, matron, is known to assist immates in securing attorneys and will either call for them or on occasions will allow them to call for attorneys and bondsmen.

It should be noted here that during the interview with Gladys Sawyer, she also stated that on the morning following her arrest, an attorney, who was later ascertained to be Edward Stanton, former county prosecuting attorney, contacted her at the City Jail and stated that he had been sent there at the request of Shimmy Patton to "do what he could for these women". It should also be stated here that during the interview with Eildred H. Wilcox,

policewoman, she stated that Stanton was at the Jail and in conference with these women on the night of the same day of the arrest. however, Stanton stated on interview that on the morning following the arrest of the women, when he came to his office, he received a note stating that he should go to the City Jail and that this call was taken for him on the night previous by an unknown party; that shortly after he arrived at his office, he received an anonymous telephone call from some woman reiterating the same He absolutely denies that he was at the Jail on the night in question. This is shown as it has heretofore been reported that Molly Bartelheim booked these women and is in the habit of calling out for inmates for counsel, which is strictly against the rules of the Jail and the Police Department. It is thought that this attorney was called by Bartelheim and only tends to show existing practices in the momen's Eureau of this Police Department.

Another situation which may or may not be coincidental, is the fact that during the investigation by Special Agent C. E. Smith at the Police Department relative to the arrest of these three women, the book recording the arrests from March 1934 to October 1934, in which was recorded the arrests of persons who were arrested during the period in question, could not be found until subsequent contact with Chief of Police Matowitz resulted in assigning Sergeant Bartunek, jailor, to search for this missing book. The search resulted in finding this book in the Women's Bureau under a telephone stand, however, a perusal of this book disclosed that there was no information contained therein that was not known to this Bureau. This is shown merely to show a careless and unsystematic practice in this Women's Bureau.

In an interview with Walter Walker, Police Officer No. 1059, who is at present assigned to the office of the Director of Public Safety Eliot Ness, he informed Agents S. K. McKee and C. E. Smith of further information relative to the unofficial conduct on the part of Molly Bartelheim, matron. He also reiterated the information supplied by Mildred H. Wilcox, policewoman, to the effect that this matron allows prisoners to call out from the Jail for an attorney or a bondsman and also calls for them. He also stated that on occasions when he has arrested certain prostitutes in the City, that on the way to the Jail they would inquire as to whether or not Molly Bartelheim was on duty, inferring that they would be allowed certain privileges by Bartelheim that they would not receive from the other matrons.

When Walker was questioned as to whom the Mayfield Road Lob, a gang of racketeers that rule the slot-machine and policy racket in Cleveland, paid graft or protection, he stated that he could not be positive of this out that he did know that Captain hash of the Garfield Heights olice Department used to meet Johnnie Delarco regularly at a candy store just across the city line and in Garfield Heights. He stated that Delarco is one of the principal figures in the above mentioned mob.

With respect to the vice and gambling situation in Cleveland, Walker stated that although he does not know of any payments by operators of houses of prostitution to police officers, he realizes that such places could not operate as openly as they do without some sort of "pay-off". He related that in 1933 and 1934, he was assigned to the vice, liquor and gambling squad; that this was during the regime of the late Layor Farry L. Davis. He stated that while on duty with this squad none of his superior officers ever said enything relative to leaving the houses of prostitution alone, but that no action was ever taken with respect to these places as there was, more or less, a "grape-vine" understanding that these places should not be molested. He also stated that it is his understanding that there are several socalled high class houses of prostitution in the city which operate through virtue of political connections, probably through contributions to campaign funds. He stated that there is a notorious house of prostitution now operating at 2000 Superior Ave., which is about two blocks from the Police Station, and is being run by Clara Thomas; that the building in which this place is operated is owned by Edwin D. Barry, former Director of Public Safety, and who is now running for Sheriff of Cuyahoga County; that the son of the present Sheriff, John Sulzmann, is known to hang out at this place.

As an example of the integrity of police officers to function in certain instances because of political corruption, Walker cited an example that occurred in 1934, when he accompanied Captain John Wolf on a raid on a gambling establishment, known as the Argonne Club, at 722 Superior Ave. He stated that he and Captain Wolf entered the place and he immediately seized some racing forms; that the proprietor, a man known as Kimmer, asked Captain Wolf what he meant by coming into his place and that Wolf informed him that he intended to raid same. Zimmer then asked Wolf if he was interested in holding his job. Walker stated that Wolf paled, ordered him, Walker, to return the racing forms and

that they then left the place without taking any action as to the gambling business which was being operated at this establishment.

Upon being asked relative to whether or not Lieutenant Barney Folf was a "straight" police officer, Walker cited an incident that, while not committing himself in this regard, intimated that Tolf was not straight and stated that he had seen Wolf with an unusually large roll of bills that undoubtedly was in excess of his salary as a lieutenant.

Walker stated that on the night of January 10, 1936, when Director Ness conducted the raid on the Harvard Club in Newberg Heights, that Ness went to the Sheriff's Office and asked for assistance but that he was told that the local authorities of Newberg Heights had made no complaint and that due to this fact no aid could be offered. He also stated that he is of the opinion that the Harvard Club operates under paid protection to the Nayor and Marshal of Newberg Heights, stating that this fact is corroborated by the fact that the Mayor receives a salary of \$600.00 per year and is apparently in no other business from which he would derive any other income, yet he resides in a nice home and takes trips to Florida in the winter.

The above is substantiated by the results of an interview had with Frank tak, City Marshal, by Inspector E. J. connelley and Special Archt S. K. McHee. Itak denied at this interview that he had any knowledge of the existence of the Harvard Club or any similar gambling establishment in his jurisdiction. This is without doubt a falsity due to the fact that such is known to the majority of the citizens in the vicinity of Cleveland, and the Harvard Club and the address of same has been publicized in the Cleveland newspapers on numerous occasions. He also stated that he had never heard of Art Hebebrand, Shimmy Patton or "Toots" Talbot, but said he may have heard the name of Shorty Conway. Conway is presently "fronting" at the Harvard Club for Hebebrand and Patton, along with Talbot.

In connection with the possible payment of graft in gambling, Walker stated that Councilman DeMaioribus and Finkle are closely connected with the Mayfield Road Mob, and no doubt, receive graft from this outfit. He also stated that, in his opinion, the policy racket could not be operated in the negro section of this City unless Councilmen Payme and Bundy, colored, had their fingers in the pay-off in some way.

Walker stated that in addition to Police Captains L. J. Harwood and Louis J. Cadek, who have recently been suspended,

and convicted, respectively, for receiving graft, that Captains John Volf, Thomas G. Duffy, Emmett J. Potts, John Fleming, Lieutenant John Leman and Deputy Inspector Edwin Burns were at that time under investigation by Director Ness and that in the very near future, charges would be placed against Wolf and Burns. This was later done as will be shown later in this letter.

In an interview with Dorothy Taylor, prostitute and former madame, who at the time of the interview was working at a house operated by Alice kedd, alias Alice Knapp, a colored madame, at 1268 Scovill Ave. Dorothy Taylor stated that during 1932, she was operating a house of prostitution and that during the time that she operated this house, she actually paid off, in money, graft to the following police officers:

Captain Burns
Sergeant McWilliams
Captain Cadek
Detectives Watts and Dietrick

As has been stated above, Cadek has been discharged and Captain Burns is under investigation by Director Ness.

In the numerous interviews held with the present and former employees of the Harvard Club, Newberg Heights, Ohio, information has been supplied that there is probably a "pay-off" in this place although no definite information has been developed that will make this assumption positive, however, some circumstances are hereafter related that tend to corroborate this fact.

In the interview with George Arnold Talbot, alias "Toots" Talbot, one of the managers of the Harvard Club, Talbot stated, in answers to inquiries as to this alleged pay-off, that he knew that a "fix" existed in Newberg Heights and stated that this fix was with the Mayor and the City Marshal, but he claimed not to know any of the details of this pay-off. He also stated that there was an arrangement made with the Sheriff and his Chief Deputy Albers but he does not know the details. He stated that whenever any trouble arises, he either calls Art Hebebrand or Shimmy Patton and either of these men handle the situation.

On September 2, 1936, there appeared in the Gleveland Plain Dealer, an editorial which substantiates the above information relative to the local officers in the village of Newberg Heights, Ohio. This is a short editorial that bears a very strong insinuation that the Harvard Club is operating in Newberg Heights

to the knowledge of the Mayor and City Marshal. This editorial states that some woman went to the Mayor, Jerry Sticha, and complained that her husband was at that time in the Harvard Club and had lost several hundred dollars; that she requested that the town officials do something towards the cessation of this gambling establishment. Continuing, it relates how, regardless of the insistance and persuasion of this woman, the Mayor informed her that he could do nothing as Frank Ptak, the City Marshal, could not be located. This entire article intimated that the mayor and marshal were being paid off and therefore ignored the complaint of this complainant.

The statement of Talbot relative to the Sheriff's office being "fixed" is, of course, substantiated by their refusal to assist Director Ness in his raid on January 10, 1936.

With reference to the Mayfield Road Gang, which has heretofore been mentioned, it has been ascertained that Nate Weisenberg, one of the present owners of the Mayfair Casino Might Club, is "fronting" for this gang in their slot machine activities. From malter malker, policeman who has been mentioned before, it was acertained that at one time the slot-machine racket was controlled by Nate Weisenberg and Al Woyner; that about three years ago, the Mayfield Road Mob "muscled in" on this racket. He stated that Weisenberg quietly acquiesced but that Joyner refused to listen to the proposition and shortly thereafter his body was found in a quick-lime grave. This is mentioned to show the set-up relative to Nate Weisenberg and the significance of the following information.

During the period that this office maintained a telephone tap on the residence telephone of Weisenberg, it was ascertained that Nate Weisenberg is assisted in his racket by Pony Boy Mienzimmer, another well known racketeer; that on one occasion, Mrs. Weisenzimmer called Mrs. Weisenberg and related a story relative to an automobile containing four men that had been to her home making inquiries concerning the whereabouts of her husband; that she was anxious over the welfare of her husband as she suspected these men of being gangsters. She gave Mrs. Weisenberg the license number of their automobile with the request that Mrs. Weisenberg contact "Tony" and ascertain the owner thereof. She also requested that she endeavor to have "Tony" obtain a mistol for her husband for his protection. Subsequent

to this conversation, Mrs. Weisenberg called Tony Page, an officer on the Cleveland Police force and relayed the above to him. He appeared to be very cooperative and willing to be of assistance to these racketeers in obtaining the gun and ascertaining the listing on the above mentioned license number. Page resides at 14026 Castalia Avenue.

Nate Weisenberg was also allegedly contacted by former Inspector of Detectives Cornelius Cody, who is at present in charge of the safety division of the Cleveland Trust Company. Subsequent to the time that Special Agent R. T. Noonan of this office made inquiries at the Cleveland Trust Company relative to Weisenberg, Cody telephoned the Weisenberg residence and asked for Nate, stating that he had some information for him. Cody was in the Cleveland Police Department for a long number of years prior to October or November of 1935.

During a considerable period of time, a telephone tap was maintained by this office on the telephone of Ardell Quinn, notorious medame of a house of prostitution located at 1916 East 84th Street in this city. During this period numerous telephone calls were received by the Quinn woman from police officers and due to their potential importance, these calls are being quoted verbatum as reflected in the telephone tap log:

"On August 17, 1936, Ardell Quinn called from her residence to Fairmount 6298, which is the telephone number of the residence of Emmett J. Potts, 2114 Lamberton Road. Potts is the superintendent of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Cleveland Police Department. The following is the above call verbatum:

"At 7:48 P.M. Ardell called Fairmount 6296.

Man's voice

Yeah

Ardell

How are you? You know that party we were talking

to the other night?

Man Yeah

Ardell

Tell him to watch out. They got something on him. That big-shot down town is watching him veryclose.

Man Alright, I'll tell him. Goodbye.

"On August 19, 1936, Ardell called the 11th Precinct and talked to Sergeant Walton Fife, at which time the following conversation ensued: At 9:45 A. M. Ardell called Precinct number 11:

Ardell

Let me speak to Sergeant Fife.

Fife Ardell Hello

Hello Sergeant. This is your Cousin.

THO? Fife Your Cousin Ardell rife Oh, Dizzy? No, your cousin, COUSIN. Ardell Fife Oh, yes. Say, I'm sorry that I was not at home last night. Ardell Well, that's alright. Fife I won't be in town this morning, but why don't Ardell you come out and bring Dolly sishop with you? Fife Bishop is fixing to leave the office and can't come. Well, you come on out anyway. Ardell kight away? rife Ardell Yeah. rife OK.

"On September 9, 1936, Ardell made the following call:

At 4:30 r. M., Ardell called MAIn 1234 and asked for Captain Aufmuth.

Aufmuth Hello.

Ardell Hello, this is your cousin. Can you come over

tonight?

Aufmuth res, I can come over tonight. Be over tonight

cousin.

"On September 11, 1936, some man, evidently a police officer, called Ardell and told her to lay low and to lay off for a while as the police are getting tough; that Savage (probably Captain John E. Cavage) was out and gave him her name and stated that she was on the list for next week's raids. He stated that "Macrarland and all of the big guys are out", and they are at present busy on Cornell street and are going to clean up all the places. Immediately after this call, Ardell called the following:

"At 7:00 r. M., Ardell called Clearwater 2324. (This telephone is listed to Captain John Fleming, 3711 Melburn Avenue.) Ardell talked to some woman and after a personal chat she asked if John or Izzy was there; upon being informed neither was present, she asked if he (name not designated) had a private telephone as she wanted to talk to him about something. She then told this woman to call him and ask him to call her back on Garfield 4780 and for him to call on some phone over which he could talk freely.

"At 8:04 P. M., Ardell received the following call:

In on Garfield 4780.

"Immediately after the above conversation, Ardell called the 11th Precinct and asked for Sergeant Farrell and was told that he was not in and would be on duty at seven in the morning.

"At 3:30 P.M., the following day, Ardell called the 11th Precinct and was told that this was Sergeant Harrell's day off. At 9:50 A.M., September 13, 1936, Ardell called the 11th Precinct at which time she talked to Sergeant Harrell, and made arrangements for him to come to her house at 3:30 P. M. on this date. He agreed to come to her house and she stated that she had something that she wented to talk to him about.

*On September 26, 1936, Ardell called the 11th Precinct and asked to speak to Sergeant Fife. This was subsequent to the time when Gertrude Currier voluntarily accompanied Agents to the Cleveland Bureau Office and was questioned. She did not return to Ardell's house and several calls were made in an endeavor to locate her. The following call was made at 1:10 P.M.:

Sergeant Fife Hello, Sergeent Fife speaking. Sergeant, this is your cousin. I wanted to Ardell talk to you about something. I have a girl friend who went to the beauty parlor yesterday and Fife (breaking in) I'll come over and talk to you. Ardell Can you come over now? Fife No, not now. I'll be over about 2:30. Ardell Alright. I wanted to go to the hospital some time this afternoon to see my sister.

"At 3:15 P.M. on this same date Sergeant Fife made the following call from Ardell's house:

Operator Police Exchange. Fife Inspector Carey, please (After ringing the Inspector's office) He's Operator down at the Lieutenant's office right now. Fife Connect me with him, please. Carey Hello. Say, I'm over at your cousin's house now. One Fife of her girl friends left here yesterday morning to go get her hair fixed and hasn't come back yet. On account of her connections out here she may not have given her right name, or may be efraid to call out here. Her name is

Cypsy Currier. She lives there - you know. She was dressed in a gingham dress, had a fur neckpiece, about 26 to 27 years old, fair complexion, brown eyes, brown hair, bobbed. Go up to the women's place and see if she's up there, will you? She may not have given her true name because of that connection, just call Gypsy in there and see if she answers. Call me back on GArfield 9241.

"At 3:30 P.M. Inspector Carey called Ardell's:

Man answered the phone

Hello

Carey

Hello, how are you? Nothing here. Only two girls and one of them is colored and the other is held on a traffic charge.

Ardell (taking the Phone) Hello, how are you?

Carey

I looked in the records too. Nothing

there.

Ardell Carey Ardell Well, I'm worried about her.
Maybe she's with her sweetheart.
No, she wouldn't do that without

letting me know.

Carey

Well, tell that boy out there to find her for you, he's good at that. One of

the best.

"After the raid on Ardell's place and her arrest, Joe Ganim made several calls to various parties relative to the bond for Ardell. He called the U. S. Commissioner at 8:29 P. M., or some man called for him and asked if they could make the bond for Ardell that night. The commissioner stated that he did not want the bond brought to his house, but that he would have the bond ready at about 8:20 or 8:25 in the morning and would fix it then.

"Irmediately after the above call, a man by the name of Mike Cosser (phonetic) called Dwight E. Williems, Deputy U. S. Karshal, at his residence:

Dwight Williams

Hello

like

Dwight, this is Like. That's postponed until 8:25 in the morning. I just talked to him - he said he couldn't make it tonight. Where will I meet you?

I guess I'll have to get out early then.

Williams

I guess I'll have to get out early then. I'll call the jail and make arrangements

to have her ready, etc. I'll have her at Nicola's office.

Make it on time. He said he couldn't do

Williams

Mike

Make it on time. He said he couldn't do it tonight on account of some court duties. I have another group to bring over at 9:39 so I'll get her first.

"The above calls have been listed to show the exact police connections that Ardell Quinn has in the city of Cleveland, and also the possible connection with the Deputy U. S. Marshal named above."

Ardell Quinn has operated a notorious house of prostfution in the same location at 1916 East 84th Street, Cleveland, Ohio, for the past seventeen years and during such period of operation she has been absolutely unmolested by the local police or sheriff's office. A general survey of the vice conditions in the city of Cleveland, which was prepared by the American Social Evgiene Association during the years 1928, 1930 and 1932, disclosed that numerous houses of the same type as the one operated by Ardell Quinn have also operated in the city of Cleveland, and are still in existence and have apparently been operating without being molested by the police or sheriff's office in this territory.

The three vice surveys mentioned above were obtained by this office through Mr. Howard W. Green of the Cleveland Health Clinic, 1900 Euclid Avenue, who, during interview relative to the above-mentioned surveys, stated that at the completion of each of the above surveys the information contained therein, together with copies of same were furnished to the Chief of Folice of the city of Cleveland, but to date no action has been taken relative to these conditions by the local police, with the possible exception of a few sporadic raids on houses of prostitution during election period and when new police chiefs assumed office. A perusal of these surveys disclosed that instead of the conditions improving from year to year they apparently became more aggravated.

In brief the Mayfield Road Gang, as heretofore mentioned, is composed of an Italian element, which resides in the vicinity of Mayfield Road and 124th Street in the city of Cleveland, which territory is generally conceded to be the center for illicit liquor as manufactured in and around the city of Cleveland during prohibition. Members of this gang, shortly after prohibition went into effect, obtained control of the corn sugar trade in this territory and at that time the rorelli brothers were considered the leaders, until the Lonerdo brothers, through the killing of six of the Prorelli brothers, took over the control of the corn sugar trade.

Nearing the end of prohibition, or shortly after prohibition, the Mayfield Road Gang became known as a group of muscle men, forcing themselves in illegitimate rackets in the city of Cleveland, such as slot machines, gambling, and vice, demanding a percentage of the profits under the threats of bodily harm to those engaged in such rackets.

Very little is actually known as to the identity of the persons comprising this gang, but at the present time it is the consensus of opinion that the longrdo brothers, Sam Salupa, Chuck and Al Pollizzi, and Johnny Angersola, more commonly known as Johnny King, and his two brothers, Charley (Chuck) and Tony ingersola are the more notorious members of this gang.

With reference to the above named individuals, Chuck and Al Pollizzi are presently part owners of the Thomas Club, a gambling establishment located on McCracken Road on the outskirts of Cleveland, Ohio, and Johnny Angersola, alias Johnny King, and his two brothers are the lieutenants of Mickey/McBride, operator of the Zone Cab Company, and the Teleflash, a system of radio broadcast of immediate racing results.

Tith further reference to the above-mentioned Thomas Club, information was obtained from a confidential source that the following are the absolute owners of this gambling establishment: Sam Yucker, Morris Dolitz, Louis Rothkopf, Marty J. O'Boyle, Cherles (Chuck) follizzi, Albert rollizzi, John angersole, and Harry lotter. Although it is generally thought in the city of Cleveland that Alkie and Gameboy Miller are the owners of this club, it was ascertained from the same source from whom the above information was obtained, that these two individuals merely "front" for the above listed owners of this club.

It might also be noted that Angelo Marotto, alias Dago Angelo, is the operator of the numbers racket, known as the Mast Chance", which is operated in the city of Cleveland.

Since the beginning of 1936, Eliot Ness, Director of Public Safety of the City of Cleveland, has been investigating the personnel of the Police Department and has accomplished much in the way of indictments of high police officials. He has also discharged and transferred many of the policemen and made changes in the Police Department as a whole and such changes have been placed before the public through the press. The following information was obtained from the Cleveland Plain Dealer relative to the activities of Director Ness:

On May 27, 1936, there appeared an article that related that Captain Louis J. Cadek, of the Cleveland Police Department, was tried, and convicted on four counts in an indictment charging him with accepting bribes; sentence was withheld pending a hearing on a motion for a new trial. On May 30, 1936, this motion was denied and Cadek was centenced to serve from 2 to 20 years in the Ohio State Penitentiary. On this same date an appeal was noted by Cadek and same is still pending.

On May 30, 1936, there appeared an article reciting that Councilmen Anton Vehoves of the 32nd Tard, had sent a written request to Director Ness that his ward be cleaned up of vice and gambling. In a statement to the press he stated that he sent this request to Ness due to the fact that had he given same to the police of the local precinct, nothing would have been done about it.

On June 7, 1936, there appeared an article relating that Captain Michael J. Harwood was relieved of duty from the 14th precinct due to the fact that Director Ness had led a raid on a bookie joint in this precinct and ascertained that this place was operating to the knowledge of Captain Harwood and Harwood's son rented these quarters to this joint and was probably a part owner in this business. It was also stated that both Harwoods frequented this place.

On June 18, 1936, an article carried the incident of the discharge of Captain Cadek as an outgrowth of his conviction on the charge of bribery.

On July 10, 1936, there appeared an article wherein it was related that Captain Harwood's brother had filed suit against him charging that Captain Harwood had, through a spurious will, swindled the other heirs out of \$30,000.00 from the estates of their deceased aunt.

On July 22, 1936, Captain Adolph Lebanan was relieved of duty due to the fact that he appeared at the office of the Chief of Folice in a drunken state. On this same date, there appeared an article that Ness raided a bookie joint in the 8th precinct and found that this joint had been operating openly and to the knowledge of the police officials in this precinct.

On July 23, 1936, Deputy Folice Inspector Timothy J. Costello, was requested to make an explanation of the above and to explain why his three sons were employed by and working with Tomy McGinty, a notorious racketeer and gambler. These sons are allegedly working at the Sainbridge Race Track.

On August 25, 1936, Operating Director William E. Edwards of the Cleveland Association for Criminal Justice, published the results of his investigation of the "BOND RACKET" in the city of Cleveland. This article named the following judges and county officials:

Chief Justice Burt W. Griffin
Judge Joseph W. Ackerman
Judge Jacob Stacel
Judge Julius M. Zovachy
Former Judge George S. Tenesey
Deputy Clerk Lillian M. McGinty

These officials were severely criticized in connection with the professional bondsmen and the following remark was made relative to them: "carelessness, sloppiness, inaccuracy, ignorance and partiality." This article carried incidents of practices of the above description. Edwards stated that "The people must do something about this situation." Edwards stated that he had evidence of perjury against ten professional bondsmen, names not given, and cited the county officials and stated that "of \$318,973.00 bonds forfeited since 1929, the county auditor's office records show only \$50.00 had been collected."

On September 2, 1936, there appeared an article stating that the entire personnel of the 15th precinct had been transferred and had been replaced by a "hand-picked" group of policemen. This transfer was made due to the fact that several of the citizens of this precinct had reported to Ness that uniformed officers were going through the neighborhood warning the people that Ness was making an undercover investigation in this community and that they should not give any information to Ness or his investigators. Director Ness is quoted as saying, "My investigation shows that there has been police collusion in the 15th precinct over a number of years and that condition has resulted in the residents losing all confidence in police generally."

On October 5, 1936, there appeared an article in the Clevelend Press that stated that preparatory to turning over to the county prosecutor a report charging various members of the Police Department with bribery, collusion and graft, Director Ness discharged eight more members from the force, viz:

Deputy Inspector Edwin C. Burns
Lieutenant John H. Nebe
Lieutenant Thomas J. Brady
Sergeant James rice
Sergeant Harry B. Hiller
Patrolman Clerence H. Alberts
Fatrolman John Shoemaker
Fatrolman Gaylord Stotts.

It should also be stated here that the Grand Jury is still in session and that additional evidence is being offered by the 66 witnesses that are testifying before this body relative to bribery and graft, during the period of prohibition, and at present, in the Cleveland Police Department.

The above brief, of the information at hand at this time is furnished for your information relative to the conditions in Cleveland, Ohio, and suburbs, concerning police collusion and corruption.

plexion, light. The gun was listed as a .45 calibre Colt; factory # C-175221. The purchase price was \$36.75, and the application was dated at Tulsa, Oklahoma on August 17, 1935, bearing the signature Boy Eckles and witnessed by H.A.G. (Harry Goldstein). This is a carbon copy of the original, which, according to the ordinance, is to be furnished to the Police Department.

At the Tulse Police Department, Gene Bewley, in charge of records, made a search for the original of this sale. The original could not be located in the Police Department files, and there is no corresponding index card which is customarily filled out at the Police Department and filed by number. Mr. Bewley said he was of the opinion Goldstein had failed to furnish the Police Department with the original of this application.

At 418 North Cheyenne, Mrs. Millie L. Phillips, who lives at that address, stated she did not know any Roy Eckles and, so far as she knew, no such person had ever lived at that address.

Directory records for 1935 and 1936 show that one LeRoy Eckles lived at 1409 South Delaware Place. He is listed as the proprietor of Roy's Automotive Machine Shop at 115 South Denver. Inquiry made at this machine shop revealed Mr. Eckles had sold this business on July 15, 1936, and that he is presently employed by the Norris Manufacturing Company, which manufactures oil well equipment and maintains a large machine shop.

Mr. Eckles was contacted at the Norris Manufacturing Company and said he had not purchased this gun nor any other gun at any time from Harry Goldstein. Agent had a faint memory that the name of Roy Eckles had been previously mentioned in some connection with the instant case during certain phases of the investigation made at Tulsa, and therefore questioned Mr. Eckles relative to his connection with any of the persons involved in this case, which brought forth the information that Harry Sherrill, who was closely associated for a long time with Edith Campbell, sister of Harry Campbell, when paroled from the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, in the latter part of 1935, had been paroled to Mr. Eckles. Eckles state: he did not know the Campbell family nor any of the principals in this case, but that after Harry Sherrill was paroled to him and began to go with Edith Campbell, he, Eckles, was approached at one time by George Stewart, deceased, former police officer, and requested to have Sherrill do all possible to learn the whereabouts of Harry Compbell. Mr. Eckles stated he discussed this with Sherrill and Sherrill promised to ascertain any information possible from Edith Campbell as to the whereabouts of her brother, and that he reported back to Mr. Eckles several times that evidently the Campbell family did not know where Harry was located.

LeRoy Eckles is the father of a 17 year old boy also named LeRoy Eckles, who is the subject of a recent investigation in the Oklahoma City office under a violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act.

Officers Lian Moss and George Terrill of the Tulse Police Department informed Agent that LeRoy Eckles bears a good reputation and has never been known to be associated with the underworld around Tulsa.

The physical description of LeRoy Eckles is as follows:

Age 37 years
Height 5' 6"
Weight 180 lbs.
Hair Dark brown tinged with grey.
Ryes Grey.

It will be noted this description does not tally with the description on the duplicate application for the purchase of weapons.

Mr. Eckles furnished agent three specimens of his signature, and the duplicate application for purchase of weapons, together with these known specimens of the handwriting of LeRoy Eckles are being furnished to the Bureau for comparison.

It should be called to the attention of all interested offices that this Agent made a previous investigation in tracing a gun in connection with this case, which was sold by Harry Goldstein, in which transaction Goldstein failed to take the fingerprints of the purchaser, whose identity could not be learned.

Couch and started to drive to Allentown, Pa. Dr. Hunsicker took the following route: through Philedelphia: In the Baltimore Pike to 52nd Street, crossed 52nd Street to Belmont Avenue, to City Line, crossed Lincoln Drive to McCallum Street; left on McCallum Street to its intersection with U.S. Route 309, and thence out Route 309, which is the main route from Philadelphia to Allentown, Pa.

Dr. Hunsicker recalls distinctly that he left the Windemere Apts. at approximately 10.30 on Sunday evening, January 20, 1935, because of the fact it was cold and snowing and he realized that it would probably take him longer than usual to drive to Allentown, which journey usually requires $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours to complete.

Dr. Hunsicker drove out U.S. Route 309 from Sellersville, Pa., and just outside of Sellersville where Highway #563 crosses Route 309 at right angles he noticed a car parked on Route 563 to his right as he passed this intersection, with the head-lights of this car shining towards him. As he continued on Route 309 he noticed the head-lights of this car turning into Route 309 behind him and after continuing on for a few hundred yards he heard the insistent blowing of an automobile form, apporently on the car following him. He stated that in view of the slippery condition of the road due to the heavy snow he involuntarily rulled off to the side of the road and stopped with the idea of allowing the car to go on ahead for safety reasons and that before he realized it this car had stopped alongside and slightly ahead of him, at which time one of the two persons in same jumped from the car and approached him with a gun in his hand. This person jumped into his (Dr. Hunsicker's) car, pointed the gun at him, told him to keep quiet and to follow the car which had stopped alongside of him. Dr. Hunsicker realized that he was in trouble and immediately acquiesced to the demands of this person. He followed the hold-up car for about two or three minutes, going directly North on Route 309, after which time they turned over Route 309 to the right and proceeded down a winding country road for a short distance; that they finally stopped and the driver of the hold-up car abandoned the car and got into his (Dr. Hunsicker's) car, placing himself in the front seat. The first man had gotten into the rear seat of Dr. Hunsicker's car. In obedience to the commands of these persons, Dr. Hunsicker turned his car around, proceeded back to Route 309, turning left on Route 309 back towards Philadelphia and at the intersection of Route 563 with 309 turned right into Route 563 going in the direction in which the hold-up car was originally facing on Route 563.

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Dr. Hursicker stated that for some time they continued over back country roads and he received that they finally drove into Allentown, Fe., where they turned west ming over a number of bumpy roads, crossing a number of railroads and going up over sharp rises. They continued driving in a Westerly direction, mainly over back roads, although Dr. Hunsicker believes they were following closely the route of the William Penn Highway and the kidnappers stopped at various times to consult a road map or directions which they had placed in the rear of his car. He stated that during the entire trip other than numerous stops for gasoline they stopped only two other times, one of these being in the Western pert of Pennsylvania where they stopped to obtain a drink of water from a spring along the road on a highway which he believes to be Route 986 or some similar route.

Dr. Hunsicker informed that the first stop was made early in the morning of January 21, 1935, at which time they stopped to put the automobile radio in working condition, they having apparently kicked the plug connection from the radio upon entering the car.

Shortly after the start of the trip Dr. Hunsicker informed his captors that he realized he was in great trouble and for that reason he requested that they not carry out any conversation during the trip which might necessite te their killing him in order to keep him from disclosing any information which would subsequently be harmful to them should be disclose same.

During the entire trip Dr. Hunsicker's captors conversed very little and at no time during the trip/they indicate their real identities to him or the reason for their having kidnapped him. He stated that as he recal's they did at certain times during the trip call each other by certain names but that possibly due to his highly nervous condition and the length of time elapsing since this kidnaping he does not recall the names his captors used. He stated he was never at any time bound or gagged other than when he was released and bound up at Guilford Center, Ohio. The trip continued on through the early morning of January 21st and into the afternoon and Dr. Hunsicker realized they were continually traveling in a generally Westward direction, although they followed mainly back and winding dirt roads, and he stated that in the afternoon he recalled having seen highway markers pointing to Butler and New Castle, Pa., indicating they were in the vicinity of Pittsburgh, Pa.

Just prior to crossing the Pennsylvania-Ohio State Line, they traveled on a back road apparently parallel to this State line, going back and forth in a Northerly and Southerly direction several times before they finally turned left over a bumpy dirt road, which led them into the State of Ohio, and Dr. Hunsicker recalls having seen an Ohio at the Line marker as they passed across.

Immediately after crossing the Ohio State Line, they traveled over a short bumpy road and thence over a brick road through a number of small residential towns.

Dr. Hunsicker informed further that just prior to going over into Ohio his captors debated as whether they should take him from Pennsylvania into Ohio, they apparently being familiar with the Kidnaping Law, which makes it a violation to transport a kidnapped person in interstate commerce and they were apparently looking for a country school house or some similar place in which to abandon him.

Dr. Hunsicker noted that about 1:00 or 1:30 P.M. on Jenuary 21st his captors turned on the automobile radio and were apparently "fishing" for some particular program and that at about 1:30 P.K. they tuned into a hill-billy program for which program they had apparently been looking particularly. When questioned as to what station this program came over or any identifying data pertaining to same, Dr. Hunsicker stated he was unable to inform as to the station over which this program came but that he remembered it was a hill-billy program and that the reople broadcasting were reciting about pine trees and there being safety in the pines and that it was clear ahead. Being unable to make much sense out of Dr. Hunsicker's explanation of this radio program he was closely questioned about this and he reiterated this information, stating it was his honest belief that this program was being broadcasted solely for the benefit of his captors in an effort to give them information to the effect that it was clear ahead and that they should seek safety in the pines. He stated very definitely that it appeared to him that his captors were trying to locate this one particular program inasmuch as shortly after the conclusion of same they turned the radio off. He stated that in addition to the particular broadcast described above they also recited on this program the poem entitled "The Shooting of Dan McGrew," or some similar piece.

It appeared to Dr. Hunsicker that his captors were unfamiliar with the roads in the Eastern part of Pennsylvania but seemed to become more familiar with the roads as they traveled West, particularly in Ohio, where they did very little consulting of their road map. He stated particularly in Eastern and Central parts of Pennsylvania they would run past roads and then turn and run back on same. According to Dr. Hunsicker it was about dusk of January 21st when they crossed the Pennsylvania-Ohio State Line, and a few hours after this Dr. Hunsicker recalls passing through Akron, Ohio, which was the last main town they passed through prior to stopping at Guilford Centre shortly before 9:00 P.X. on the evening of January 21, 1935. The car was driven through a

small settlement which Dr. Hunsicker later learned to be Guilford Centra, Obio, and his certors noted the building later identified as the Guilford Centre Grange Hall, which was apparently vacunt at that time. They drove past this hall which was on the left, stopped a short distance away, turned around, came back, drove in and around to the rear of the building where they made a cursory examination of same and then broke a window and together with himself entered the building. He was taken to the basement of same where he was bound with his own pajamas, a belt, the ownership of which he does not know, and a piece of rope, which they apparently got from the rear of his car although he does not recall having any rope in sems. He stated that as he recalls it they gagged him at his own request as he (Dr. Hunsicker) realized that he was in very dangerous hands and wanted to impress upon his captors the fact that he would not make any immediate attempt to escape or at least would be secure until they had sufficient time to make their escape. He stated he believed it was approximately 9:00 F.M. when he was trussed up at Guilford Centre. He stated that after his captors left he heard the automobile start up but that he made no attempt to free himself for a few moments, thinking possibly that one of his captors might have remained behind to see if he made an immediate attempt to free himself. Shortly thereafter he did manage to free himself from his bonds which he stated were bound very loosely and he then left the building and walked down the road stopping at the first farm-house where he made inquiry for a telephone and learned that he would find one at the next farm-house; that he immediately went there and called up the Chief of Police; that he was subsequently removed to the hospital at Wadsworth, Ohio, where about 4:00 A.M. he was aroused from sleep and interviewed by an agent of this Bureau, the results of which interview are set out in the Larson report of reference.

Dr. Hunsicker expressed surprise that he had not been re-contacted by an agent of this Bureau prior to this time, stating that he realizes at the time he was interviewed at Wadsworth he was in an exhausted and nerwous condition and because of this had probably not given a coherent story of his kidnaping and subsequent flight at the hands of his captors into Ohio. He was questioned as to whether he could identify photographs of Kerpis and Campbell, at which time he removed from his desk copies of the wanted notices, which were printed by this Bureau of Karpis and Campbell and stated that he now realizes from subsequent events that his captors were these persons but that at the time of his kidnaping he took pains to keep his eyes away from his captors at all times in accordance with their demands and although he

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did at times catch a glimpse of their profiles he was unable at the time of his kidnaping to definitely identify photographs of subjects as his kidnappers.

He was also diplomatically questioned as to the time at which he was kidnapped as indicated in the Larson report of reference and he informed that he did not recall having stated to the interviewing agent that it was as a matter of fact 8:00 A.M., January 21st, when he was kidnapped and that he would have no reason for doing same. He stated that the approx. time of his actual kidnaping was shortly prior to midnight of January 20, 1935, of which time he was absolutely certain in view of the fact that he had left Lensdowne, Pa., at 10:30 P.M., January 20th; that the total trip from Lansdowne to Allentown, Fa., usually consumed an hour and a half but on this particular night due to the condition of the roads and falling snow he was required to drive slower than usual and in addition to this he had been delayed for a few moments in Philadelphia, Pe., having been stopped by a treffic officer because of faulty head-lights and he, therefore, estimated that it was shortly prior to midnight or approx. midnight at the time le was first held up by Karpis and Campbell.

It will also be noted that the directions in which marpis and Campbell drove after getting into Dr. Hunsicker's car on Routes 300 and 563 respectively are at variance with the information contained in the Larson reference report. However, Dr. Hunsicker stated that the information previously in possession of the Bureau was incorrect in the premises and that they actually turned left into 309 back towards Philadelphia, and thence right into 563 as shown herein.

It will be noted from the Sharp report of reference that subject's car in which they fled from Atlantic City, N.J.,was apparently abandoned at the point where it was found at Quakertown, Pa., at approximately 12:30 A.M., January 21, 1935, inasmuch as the attention of James Lark, who resides near the point where this car was abandoned was attracted by the barking of his dog at about 12:30 or 1:00 A.M. this date, and his daughter, Juanita, from her bedroom at approximately 12:30 A.M., January 21st, saw the lights of a car pull into the lane and then go out.

Reference to a Pennsylvania road map reveals that the vicinity described by Dr. Hunsicker as being that in which he was kidnapped and forced to follow his kidnappers' car is in the approximate location of where subjects' car was found abandoned. Dr. Hunsicker was questioned as to whether he heard any barking dogs at the time subjects abandoned their car end commandeered his and he stated he did not recall any barking dogs although it was entirely possible that he did not hear same due to the nervous tension under which he was working.

Dr. Hunsicker was positive that the time of his kidnaping was approximately 12:00 Midnight of January 20, 1935.

Dr. Hunsicker was unable to supply any information of value in addition to that hereinbefore set out in this report, stating he possibly could have shortly subsequent to his kidnaping and after his return to Allentown supplied additional information but that same had now slipped his recollection due to the time elapsing since the kidnaping.



The letter written by Alvin Earpis to Dolores Delaney on May 10, 1936, was transmitted to the Bureau by the St. Paul Office with a cover letter dated May 11, 1936, which was received in the Bureau on May 13, 1936. A copy of this letter was also forwarded to the bureau with a cover letter from the Detroit Office dated May 15, 1936, this letter being received in the Bureau on May 13, 1936. The original letter written by Karpis was, of course, delivered to Dolores Delaney.

A copy of the letter written by Dolores Delangy to Alvin Karpis dated only "Mm", 1936" was transmitted to the Bureau by the Detroit Office with a cover letter dated May 11, 1936, which was received in the Bureau on May 13, 1936.

No copy of the letter written by Dolores Delaner to Alvin Karpis was made by the St. Paul Office when the letter was received there since the St. Paul Office knew that copies of all Dolores Delaney's correspondence were being obtained through the Detroit Office.

For your information, Dolores Delaney was received at Milan, Michigan, on March 29, 1935, and in April, 1935, the Detroit Office perfected arrangements with the Milan Reformatory officials whereby the Bureau was furnished with copies of all of the incoming and outgoing correspondence of Dolores Delancy, and we had been receiving this correspondence for a period of more than a year when instant voccisens were obtained.

Bronson, and all of which relate to packages of tailored shirts meiled by the Thomas Shirt Company of Columbus, Ohio, to subjects in this file at the Harvard Club, Newburgh Heights, Ohio, under date of July 6, 1934.

It is requested that the signatures appearing on these receipts be compared by the Technical Laboratory with the known handwriting specimens of Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker, as well as other members of the Berker-Karpis gang, in order to determine whether the peckages in question were obtained at the post office by any of these individuals. Attention is called to the fact that Karpis, during the year 1934, had a Ford coupe automobile registered under the alias of Bronson, and it is believed that copies of papers relating to this car and bearing the name Bronson in writing are contained in the Bureau files in this matter.

It will be appreciated if this examination is expedited inesmuch as the information is desired in connection with the harboring cases at Toledo and Cleveland, Ohio, and the facts as to these situations are to be presented to a Grand Jury in the near future.

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
