Please be advised that Special Agent E. J.
Wynn today in talking with United States Attorney E. B.
Freed, Cleveland, Ohio, about the harboring prosecution again called his attention to the fact that the Statute of Limitations would begin to operate as of May 4, 1937, which fact has also been brought to the attention of the Bureau in previous correspondence.

Mr. Freed states that it was his intention to proceed to Washington. D. C., sometime during the week of April 11th and confer with the Special Assistants there who are handling the harboring prosecution. He further advised that he has been considering seeking an indictment against the various persons in the Northern District of Ohio who harbored members of the Barker-Karpis gang as Accessories after the Fact to the kidnaping of victim Bremer, as well as indictments charging such individuals with conspiracy to harbor. He indicated that after a brief review of authorities he arrived at the conclusion that such could be done but that he planned reviewing the authorities on Accessories further before making a final determination.

Dear Sir:

Confirming my teletype of this date, please be advised that Joseph Roscoe and Fred Funter in the United States District Court, Eastern Division, Northern District of Ohio, Cleveland, Ohio, before Federal Judge Paul Jones today entered pleas of guilty to the charges against them in the indictment charging participation in the Carrettsville, Ohio, mail train robbery. Hunter was sentenced to serve twenty-five years and Joseph Roscoe seven and one-half years.

John Brock and John Zetzer have previously entered pleas of guilty; however, sentence as to them has been deferred to an unset date in the future.

United States Attorney E. B. Freed, Cleveland, Ohio, advised Special Agent E. J. Wynn that the attorney for Joseph Roscoe agreed to counsel Roscoe to 'finger' Benson Groves for the Post Office Inspectors.

Mr. Freed also stated that Karpis' sister has been in communication with him, insisting that Alvin Karpis be returned to Cleveland, Ohio, to stand trial in connection with the indictment in the Carrettsville mail train robbery and that her communications are being referred by him to the Office of the Attorney General.

STATEGENT OF SPECIAL AGENT E.J. WYNN RE TREATMENT OF JOSEPH ROSCOE AT MIAMI FIELD DIVISION

Cleveland, Ohio April 7, 1937

I, E.J. WYNN, Special Agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, desire to state that I arrived at Liami, Florida, on the morning of January 26, 1937, from Cleveland, Ohio, pursuant to Bureau instructions, to assist in the interrogation of Joseph Roscoe at the Miami Field Division. With Special Agent S.K. McKee, I interrogated Joseph Roscoe in an office in the Liami Field Division, beginning at 9:30 AM. Roscoe responded to questions freely and voluntarily and after several hours of this type of interview, was asked if he had any reluctance to subscribing to a written statement to which he responded that all the facts furnished by him were true and that he would willingly sign a statement containing the true facts. Accordingly, a stenographer was called in and in the presence of Joseph Roscoe and Special Agent S.K. McKee, I dictated to the stenographer those facts furnished by Roscoe, frequently asking Roscoe questions in order to clarify certain points. Time out was taken in order to obtain lunch, and Roscoe was asked what he desired and he stated that a ham sandwich and buttermilk would suffice. One of the agents in the office went out and obtained this order for Roscoe, and at the same time secured sandwiches and lunch for the stenographer, Special Agent S.K. McLee and myself. After lunch the dictation continued, and in order to expedite the preparation of the statement, the stenographer who first came in was relieved by another young lady stenographer, so that she could type up that portion of the statement dictated to her. It might be well to state at this point that some portions of the statement were dictated by Agent McKee, in the presence of Roscoe and me. Dictation continued until about 3:30 PM.

The complete statement was typed by about 4:30 Ri and given to Joseph Roscoe to read, which he did, stating that all the facts were true and in the presence of Agent Lickee and me signed same.

Roscoe was turned over to the United States Marshal at Miami, Florida, at 5:50 PM on January 26, 1937. The following day Agent McKee and I delivered certain personal belongings of Roscoe to the office of the United States Marshal, Miami, Florida, at which time I again saw Roscoe and greeted him, but had no further contact with him at that time or since.

Special Agent McKee and I brought Joseph Roscoe from the detention room in the Mami Field Division to the office therein in which he was questioned, on January 26, 1937, which afforded me an opportunity to observe the detention room in which he was held. I observed a cot therein, with a pillow and a sheet and blanket on same, and in this room recall observing several magazines, newspapers, a package of chewing tobacco and a cuspidor. I saw no handcuffs, chains or leg irons of any sort at any time.

During the time I questioned Joseph Roscoe, as outlined above, he at no time made any complaint as to any mistreatment, but on the contrary, I recall specifically that he stated that he had been well treated.



I desire to advise that in accordance with the telephonic request of Mr. Kenneth McIntire of the Bureau, the files in this office have been checked. It has not been possible to determine from either the Brekid file or administrative files of Agents Hurt and Campbell the exact dates they checked into the El Commodore Hotel or the rooms they occupied at that Hotel. The date on which they checked out of the El Commodore Hotel likewise is not available in the Chicago files.

All of the rough draft memorandums submitted by these Agents from Miami, Florida, have been withdrawn from the files and are being forwarded herewith, together with a list showing those memorandums that are being so forwarded. Photostatic copies of all these memorandums have been prepared and are retained in the Chicago files and the Bureau may therefore retain the originals.

In connection with these memorandums, attention is directed to the memorandum dated Miami, Florida, dated November 21, 1934, in which these Agents advised they were stopping at the LaSalle Hotel, indicating that they had previous to the 21st checked out of the El Commodore Hotel. There is an undated note being forwarded herewith. which was stamped "Received at Chicago, November 29, 1934," indicating that the address of these Agents was then 236 North East 28th Street, Miami, Florida, Apartment 11, and another memorandum dated Miami, Florida, November 25, 1934, giving their address as the LaSalle Hotel, Miami Beach, Florida.

Considerable difficulty was encountered in endeavoring to secure photographs of Alvin Karpis' child inasmuch as his mother seriously objected to permitting such photographs to be taken AP in lambar advised that in January of 1937 they had forwarded four photographs

On March 28, 1937 Russell Frank Thompson with aliases was interviewed at the Chicago, Field Division regarding his sale of machine guns to members of the Capone syndicate.

During this interview Thompson was questioned as to his activities in the past two years, and in particular regarding his arrest in connection with a shooting in DeKalb County, Illinois. Thompson advised that this shooting was brought about by his discovery that his wife from whom he has since obtained a divorce, had been associating with another man, and that he had attempted to gain access to his mother-in-law's home at Kirkland, Illinois and during the discussion which followed he had drawn a revolver and fired a number of shots, one of which had inflicted a wound on his mother-inlaw's hand; that subsequently he was placed under arrest and charged on seven counts with assault with a deadly weapon; that his father had paid \$1,000.00 to the States Attorney of DeKalb County, Latham Cassel, to prevent Thompson from serving a term in the penitentiary; that subsequently six of the counts were nolle prossed and Thompson was allowed to enter a plea of guilty on the 7th count and had been sentenced to serve only six months at Vandalia State Farm, Vandalia, Illinois.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent E.J. Eynn dated at Cleveland, Ohio, March 5, 1937.

While being questioned by an agent of this Division in connection with another case, ARCHIE INEGLEMAN, A U.S. Northeastern Penitentiary #4022, volunteered information to the effect that he had attempted to contact an agent of the Bureau approximately six weeks ago for the purpose of furnishing information concerning the whereabouts of EDDIE STAMAN, but that a letter which he directed to Special Agent Fred Ames of the Fittsburgh Division had been disapproved by the prison officials and returned to him. NECLYMAN stated that he attempted to write to Agent Ames rather than direct to the Bureau or the Philedelphia Division because he had previously cooperated with Ames in connection with instant case.

According to NIGLEMAN, he received information approximately six weeks ago that EDDIE SHAMAN and two other men wore in the vicinity of his (Negleman's)home near Webster, Pa., looking for two machine guns which had been hidden nearby in 1934 or 1935, and that SEAMAN wanted information from Negleman as to the exact location of the guns. NEGLEMAN stated that SEAMAN participated in the Garrettsville Mail Robbery and that, as he thought the Bureau would be interested in locating SEAMAN, he stalled the messenger off and tried to get word to Agent Ames so that he could collect the reward for furnishing information concerning Seaman's whereabouts. NEGLEMAN was then eaked if he know BENSON MEROVES alies Uncle Ben, and he replied that he knew Groves very well and that GROVES was one of the two men with SEAMAN, the name of the third party being unknown to NEGLEMAN.

NEGLEPAN advised that he and EDDIE SEALAN were formerly very good friends and that, after the Butler mail truck job in 1934 or 1935, HARRY CAMPBELL and EDDIT SEAMAN had two machine guns and six clips which were hidden near NEOLEMAN'S home. MEGLEMAN lives about one mile from Webster, Pennsylvania, which is just across the river from Donora, Pennsylvania, and he advised that EDDIR SEAFAN, BENSON CROVES, and a third man spent four or five days within a half mile of his home approximately six weeks ago. SEAMAN sent word to NEGLEMAN for the exact location of the two machine guns and, according to MCOLEMAN, this message was brought to him by one ROBERT JONES, subject of Philadelphia file entitled "ROBERT JONES: SMUCCLING INTO FEDERAL PRISONS" - Philadelphia file #62-1228, in which case NEGLEMAN is the principal informant. After being unsuccessful in contacting Agent Ames NEGLEMAN claims that he sent word to SEAMAN that he could not get the information to him and that he (NEGLELAN) would see him (SEAMAN) when he (NEGLEMAN) was released from the penitentiary.

Efforts were made to ascertain from the records of the mail room at the penitentiary if NEOLHYAN had actually attempted to write Agent Ames but no record is maintained of mail which has been disapproved.

According to NECLEMAN. SEAMAN has a sister who resides at 507 Rowland Avenue, Canton, Ohio. He also stated that he knew Turk Brennan and that Turk Brennan's father, in 1935, lived with a daughter in Alliance, this time, BRENNAN'S father hung around DARRY JONES' bar. The new prop Inn. at Canton, Ohio, quite a bit. NEGLEMAN then advised that a post Office Inspector questioned him at the Northeastern Penitentiary approximately four or five days ago and that this Inspector had told him that the post office Inspectors. knew that RDDIE SEAMAN had participated in the Garretteville mail robbery but that the FBI did not know this and that, furthermore, the Post Office Inspectors had not furnished this information to the FBI. According to NEGLEMAN, he did not furnish the Post Office Inspector any information whatsoever about EDDIE SEAMAN and BENSON CROVES being in the vicinity of Webster, Fennsylvania, about six weeks ago, N.OLEMAN explaining that the Inspector had interviewed him in the presence of prison officials and other prisoners who were in the main visiting room at the time.

MEGLEMAN also advised that BENSON CROVES slept in his barn for a month at one time, but would furnish no definite information in this regard. NYCLEMAN is of the opinion that KDDIK SEAMAN and BENSON CROVES are now together and







that he, MECLEMAN, could locate them within ten days if he could get out of the penitentiary. M.GL.MAN does not know LOU LIVINGSTON.

For your information, ARCHIE NEGLEMAN has previously furnished information concerning instant case. His present sentence expires on April 6, 1937, but due to an unpeid fine of \$1,500. he is being detained at the Hortheastern Penitentiary until May 7, 1937, when he will be released. He states that he is penniless and that he intends to go straight upon being discharged from the penitentiary. He admitted that his sole purpose in furnishing the information contained hereinbefore was to secure a reward in the event one had been offered for KDDIE SEAMAN'S arrest. NYGLEMAN stated that he would guarantee to locate EDDIE SEAMAN and BERSON CROVES within ten days if the Bureau would assist him in getting out of the penitentiary prior to May 7, 1937. It was, of course, explained to MEOLEGIA that the commutation of a sentence or the granting of a parole was not within the jurisdiction of the Bureau and that no promises could be made in this regard.

No additional information could be obtained from NEGLEMAN and I am furnishing the above for your information and for whatever investigative value same may warrant.

Westberry, SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: Oklawaha, Florida, made conflicting statements concerning identity of individuals who were observed by them to visit at the Carson Bradford home, Oklawaha, during time Barker-Karpis gang were there. Woodbury, however, identified photograph of Duke Randall as individual who visited the Bradford home thrice, inquiring for the Blackburns end on one occasion having left a note for them with Woodbury instructing him to have Blackburn telephone him at El Comodoro Hotel, Miami. Woodbury insists Joe dams visited only once, accompanied by an individual whose identity %oodbury could not recall. Mrs. Westberry unable to identify photographs of Adams and Aandall and claimed her observations were not close enough to enable her to identify any one. She likewise expressed her unwillingness to identify persons she had observed and denied statements made in previous interview. Original telephone toll tickets of the Florida Telephone Corporation for November, 1934, have been destroyed, and B. E. Wettstein, bookkeeper, Florida Telephone Corporation, Leesburg, Florida, is competent to testify to destruction of company records. The investigation reported herein relates to additional information requested by the Bureau in connection with the prosecution of Joseph H. Adams and Henry "Duke" Randall.

DETAILS: AT OKLAWAHA, FLORIDA:

In compliance with the request in Bureau letter dated March 25. 1936, Willie Woodbury was re-interviewed on March 27, 1936, at Oklawaha, Florida. On this occasion Woodbury stated that on one occasion, the date not recalled, Joe Adams, accompanied by an individual whose identity Woodbury claimed not to know, came to the Bradford home in a Ford V-8 Compe. Adams inquired for the Elackburns and Woodbury claims that he informed Adams that they were not at home; that they had gone fishing. Prior to this time, Woodbury claims that he had never seen Adams nor had any one of the Barker-Karpis gang mentioned the name of Adems to him. However, he claims that he asked the man who was driving the car if "he was Mr. Adams" and the individual replied that he was. Woodbury was questioned as to why he asked if the individual was Adams and he replied that he had heard of Mr. Adams through Mr. Bradford who had told Woodbury that Adams was a good sport. However. he denied that he was told by any one that a visit by Adams was expected and claims that he "just guessed it was Mr. Adams". When informed by Woodbury that the Blackburns were not at home, Adams is said to have left in the Ford V-8 coupe and the individual who accompanied him there remained. When shown a number of photographs of the fugitives and suspects in this matter. Willie Woodbury identified the photograph of Volney avis as resembling the individual who accompanied Adams. He was questioned as towhether the individual resembled the photograph of Karpis and replied that he did not. In this connection reference is made to the report of Special Agent John Madala, Chicago, Illinois, dated February 6, 1936, on page 22, of which Dolores Deleney, in her signed statement, has indicated that Joe Adams drove Alvin Karpis to Oklawaha to visit with Fred Barker, mother Barker Harry Campbell and Wynona Burdette, since, at that time Karpis did not have a car of his own, and Karpis returned the following day to Miami, accompanied by Fred Barker and Harry Campbell and that Karpis later told Dolores that Adams did not stay overnight at Oklawaha, but returned to Miami shortly after he arrived at Oklawaha. In view of the statement of Dolores Delaney and the statement of Willie Woodbury concerning the visit of A dams it is







quite obvious that it was Karpis who accompanied Adams to Oklawaha on that occasion. However, persistent questioning of Woodbury failed to determine that fact. When questioned as to whether he had any conversation with the individual, Woodbury replied that he did not; that Adams did not introduce the man to him; made no comment concerning his remaining at the Bradford home and gave no indication whatever as to why the individual was to stay there. Later that evening, according to Woodbury, Fred Barker and Harry Campbell returned and the individual remained with them overnight apparently since, Woodbury claims, he left the next morning with Fred Barker and Campbell in their car and Woodbury did not see him again.

Stranger of the first the second

In a previous interview with Woodbury on March 18, 1936, as indicated on pages two and three of the report of Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons, Jacksonville, Florida, dated March 24, 1936, Willie Woodbury stated that the individual who accompanied Adams on his visit to Oklawaha remained overnight, leaving the following morning. He returned some several days later, driving a Ford V-8 Coupe, and inquired for the Blackburns. When informed that they were away this individual left a note with Woodbury to be delivered on their return, and he described the individual as he had done in a previous interview.

When interviewed on this last occasion, Woodbury stated that the individual who accompanied Adams did not return after his first visit and claims that it was not he who left the note with woodbury heretofore mentioned. He likewise denied that when he inquired concerning the identity of Adams that Adams made any comment beyond admitting his identity and Woodbury further denied that Adams had told Woodbury that Adams had rented the Bradford place to Blackburn, although Woodbury, in a previous interview as indicated on page 63 of the report of Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, Illinois, dated February 3, 1935, stated that Adams did admit having rented the Bradford place to Blackburn. Woodbury claimed that he did not remember making that statement.

Concerning the visit of Adams at Oklawaha, accompanied by Karpis, and a subsequent visit by "some fellows" who left a note with Woodbury to deliver to Mr. Blackburn, alleged to have been signed by Joe Adams and informing the gang at Oklawaha that they had better get out since the place was hat, as indicated on page 37 of the report of Special Agent John L. Madela, Chicago, Illinois, dated February 6, 1936, in the signed statement of Wynona Burdette, Woodbury was further questioned in an effort to determine the circumstances of the delivery of the note and the identity of the individual who left it. It will also be recalled that in her statement, Wynona Burdette claims that on the occasion when Adams visited Oklawaha, he remained for several hours "talking with the boys".



Woodbury stated that about a month after the Barkers had moved into the Bradford home an individual who he how positively identifies as Duke Randall, from the photograph exhibited to him, came to the Bradford home and inquiredfor the Blackburns. On this occasion, according to Woodbury, Randell was driving a Ford V-8 Coupe of dark color with yellow wheels, but Woodbury did not know what license the car bore. Randall arrived sometime in the afternoon and Woodbury was of the opinion that it was on Sunday, although he could offer no substantiating facts for that opinion. However, when Woodbury advised Randall that the Blackburns were away on a trip for several days, Randall asked where they were and when Woodbury expected that they would return. He claims that he replied that he did not know. Randall then got out of the car end walked about the premises for some time and ultimately asked Woodbury to get some oranges for him. Woodbury claims that he put several oranges into a croaker sack and, at Randall's direction, placed the sack of oranges in the back of the Ford Coups. Goodbury claimed that the Ford Coupe did not have a rumble seat as he recalled having placed the oranges on the floor after having lifted the hood in the back. After the oranges were placed in the car, Randall left and did not leave any message or instructions with Woodbury. Randall returned the following day, or perhaps two days later, and again inquired for the Blackburns and Woodbury informed him that they were still away and Randall is said to have left without making any comment whatever.

Randall returned on a subsequent occasion and Woodbury was unable to recall the length of time that elapsed from his last visit, but said it must have been several days later, He was driving the same Ford V-8 Coupe and on this occasion did not inquire for the Blackburns, but left a note with Woodbury instructing him to deliver it to Mr. Blackburn when he returned and also told Woodbury to Have Mr. Blackburn "telephone him at the El Comodoro Hotel in Miami as soon as he got back". After leaving the note and giving Woodbury the instructions, Randall is said to have left and Woodbury claims that he did not see him again. After having received the note. Woodbury claims that he took it into the house, placed it under a lamp on the living-room table and that evening Kate Barker and Wynona Burdette, who had also been away for several days, returned. Woodbury claims that he gave the note to "the old lady" (Kate Barker) since she and Wynona were the first of the gang to return and later that evening Fred Barker and Campbell returned. Woodbury denied that he had been questioned concerning the note by any one. He claims that he informed Kate Barker, when he delivered the note to her "That a man had left it that afternoon" and she made no comment.



Reference is here made to the statement of Wynona Burdette appearing on page 37 of the report of Special Agent John L. Madala, Chicago, Illinois, dated February 6, 1936, in which she states that after the note had been read they called Woodbury and had him describe the man who delivered the note, and his description of those individuals answered to that of Joe Adams and Duke Randalle

Woodbury was questioned concerning this and denied that Wynona Burdette, Fred Barker, Harry Campbell or Kate Barker had asked him to describe the individual who left the note and he insisted that none of the gang had at any time questioned him in any manner concerning the incident. He likewise denied as he did in the previous interview that the individual who left the note was accompanied by Joe Adams or any one else, insisting that on the three occasions when Randall visited Oklawaha he was unaccompanied.

Because of the conflicting statements of Woodbury and the expressed unwillingness of Mrs. A. T. Westberry of Oklawaha to identify photographs of suspects in this matter, as will be hereinafter reported, Woodbury was questioned as to whether he had been intimidated in any manner or questioned by any one other than Agents of the Bureau in this matter. He denied that he had. It should be noted, however, that in his first interview with Agents of the Bureau, Woodbury claimed that on two occasions a young man. speaking with a foreign accent, and driving a Ford V-8 Coupe left a message for Blackburn to call him at the MI Comodoro Ectel. In a second interview. Woodbury indicated that an individual who accompanied Adams in a Ford V-8 Coupe to Oklawaha, and who he has been unable to identify, remained there overnight; returned on one or two subsequent occasions and left a note for the Blackburns which Woodbury delivered to Kate Barker. On the occasion of the interview herein reported Woodbury claims that the individual who left the note and who instructed Woodbury to have Blackburn call him at the Kl Comodoro Hotel is Duke Randall and Woodbury denies that he ever observed Duke Randall in company of Joe Adems or with any one else on his visits to Oklawaha. Although Woodbury unhesitatingly identified photographs of Joe Adams, Duke Randall, Fred and Doc Barker, Harry Campbell, Wynone Burdette. Kate Barker and Volney Davis, he was unable to identify the photographs of Karpis and insisted that the individual who accompanied Adams on the occasion of his visit to Oklawaha was unknown to him and he described that individual again as he had previously.

Mrs. A. T. Westberry, Oklawaha, Florida, stated that she recalls having been previously interviewed by agents of the Bureau, but claimed she did not recall the nature of the interview since she was so confused at the time as a result of the shooting. However, Mrs. Westberry was questioned concerning the visit to the Bradford home of an individual on an occasion while the Blackburns were away and who had Willie Woodbury place a box of fruit in the rear of his car, particularly in an effort to determine whether she could identify the photograph of Duke Randall as resembling the visitor



On the occasion of this interview, Mrs. Westberry stated she is a seamstress and spends most of the daylight hours at her sewing machine which is located at her front room window and from which she had an unobstructed view of the Bradford estate. She admitted that she had occasion to observe people going in and out of the Bradford premises and that she observed several people on numerous occasions to visit there. However, she stated that inasmuch as she had no particular reason for observing the tenants of their visitors, her observations were casual, yet in the nature of curiosity, because she frequently wondered why so many people were visiting there. She admitted that she has heard of Joe Adams; that he often visited the Bradford home and on one occasion he was pointed out to her by Mr. ABradford when Adams was visting there for several days which was long before the Blackburns moved there. On that occasion she claims that she Adams from a distancek in a bathing suit, but did not observe him closely and "wouldn't know him if she saw him again". The photograph of Adams was exhibited to Mrs. Westberry and she stated that she could not identify it as resembling Adams; adding that "it might be Mr. Adams or it might not be for all I know".

Concerning the visit of Duke Randall, Mrs. Westberry stated that one afternoon, shortly after the Blackburns had moved into the Bradford home, an individual came there in a car and she saw Willie Woodbury place some fruit in the back of the car. She claims that she thought at the time that the people who were to eat that fruit would become ill, because it was frozen fruit since all the fruit in that vicinity had been frozen. After the individual left she claims that she saw Willie Woodbury and remarked to him: "I feel sorry for those people eating frozen fruit" and she claims that Woodbury replied that he was "putting the fruit in Mr. Adams' car". However, immediately after making that statement, Mrs. Westberry remarked that she might be mistaken as to what Willie Woodbury said and stated that if Willie denied making the statement, "then Willie is right". The photograph of Duke Randall was exhibited to Mrs. Westberry and she stated that she could not identify it as a likeness of any one she had observed about the Bradford premises and she further claimed that she could not identify it as resembling the individual who was in the car at the time Woodbury placed the fruit in ...



the car. At this point Mrs. Westberry stated: "I have thought that if I could identify any one I would turn my back, because they are still at large". When questioned as to what she meant by that statement, Mrs. Westberry replied that there was enough shooting around her place last year; that some of the gang have not been caught and she was not going to take any chance identifying any one with the prospect of being shot. Mrs. Westberry was questioned as to whether she has been intimidated or threatened in any manner and as to whether she has been approached by any one other than Bureau Agents concerning this matter and she replied that she has not, but would offer no further explanation for her attitude.

In an effort to refresh her recollection concerning the statements she made in the previous interview, particularly concerning the visit of the man who obtained the fruit from Woodbury, Mrs. Westberry was asked whether she recalled having stated that she observed a man driving what she took to be a Ford Coupe in front of the Bradford home and that Willie Woodbury placed a box of oranges and grapefruit in the rear of his car; that she had never noticed this man about the place except on that one occasion; that he was neatly dressed; was of fair complexion and a blonde and wore a grey overcoat and a light grey hat. In response, Mrs. Westberry denied having made such statements, claiming that all she saw was a man in a car and that woodbury put some oranges in the car. In this same connection, Mrs. Westberry denied that she knew the make of car the man was driving, that he was a bonde, of fair complexion and that he wore a grey overcoat and hat. She stated that she is not acquainted with the various makes of automobiles and does not know whether the individual was driving a Ford or what make the car was, all she recalls is that it was a dark-colored car. She stated that she could not determine the complexion of the man, the color of his hair and whether he had an overcoat and hat from where she was sitting at her front window. When questioned as to whether she recalled the dress of the man, Mrs. Westberry replied that she does not; that he might have had a hat on add he might not have; that if he wore an overcoat she does not remember it. Subsequent to the interview with Mrs. Westberry, Agent again talked with Willie Woodbury concerning the incident of the first visit of Duke Randall when he placed the fruit in the car and particularly as to his conversation with Mrs. Westberry thereafter. Woodbury stated that he recalls having talked with Mrs. Westberry on that occasion, but claimed he did not remember the nature of the conversation. When asked if Mrs. Westberry made any remark about the frozen condition of the fruit, Woodbury replied that she did say something about the fruit being frozen and that it would "make the people sick". When questioned as to his response, Woodbury claims that he does not recall having commented. When asked if he replied that he was putting the fruit in Mr. Adams' car, Woodbury denied

that he had made such statement. When questioned as to whether he had ever put fruit in a car for Mr. Adams, Woodbury replied that he had not and insisted that he did not put any fruit in the car on the occasion when Adams visited the Bradford home as heretofore mentioned and which, he insists, is the only time, to his knowledge, that Adams visited there.

Mrs. Rhoda Motley (nee Mann), formerly employed as a waitress at the Oklawaha Inn., but now living at Oklawaha, where she is keeping house was questioned in an effort to determine whether she recalled the incident of the telephone call made by Fred Barker from the Cklawaha Inn to Jos Adams at the El Comodoro Hotel, Miami, Morida, on November 30, 1934, Mrs. Motley replied that she does; that she recalls having remarked at the time that the conversation, which was about a water bill, seemed so ridiculous inasmuch as the long distance telephone charges would cost more than the water bill. As near as she could recall, the call was placed sometime in the afternoon, between the lunch and dinner hours. When the photographs of the individuals involved in this matter were exhibited to Mrs. Notley, she readily identified the photograph of Fred Barker as the party who made the telephone call in question.

AT OCALA, FIORIDA:

In an effort to locate the original telephone toll ticket covering the call to Joe Adams, Miami, Florida, from T.C. Blackburn (Fred Barker) Oklawaha Inn., Telephone Numer 1411 (not 1441), Oklawaha, Florida, on November 30, 1934, appropriate inquiry was made of Otto Wettstein, III, Manager, Florida Telephone Corporation, Ocala, Florida. Mr. Wettstein stated that the original telephone toll tickets, if available, are filed with the general offices of that company which are located at Leesburg, Florida. Without the original toll ticket, Mr. Wettstein stated that it would be impossible to determine the identity of the operator who received the call from Oklawaha.

AT LEESBURG, FLORIDA:

Through inquiry of B. E. Nottstein, bookkeeper, Florida, Telephone Corporation, Leesburg, Florida, it was ascertained after he had searched the records of that office, that the records, prior to February, 1935, have been destroyed. In this connection he stated that he, as bookkeeper, is custodian of the records and as such is competent to testify to the destruction of the company records at the expiration of each twelve month period.

It was likewise ascertained from Mr. Wettstein that the Florida Telephone Corporation was organized in 1932, and incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida as a public utilities corporation; the original charter of the corporation is in possession of Otto Wettstein, Jr., Florida Telephone Corporation, Orlando, Florida, who is President and General Manager of the Corporation.

With reference to the destruction of the original Western Union telegram dated at Ocala, Florida, November 28, 1934, addressed to the Exotic Gardens, Incorporated, Miami, Florida, over the signature of Henry Krueger, Florist, Ocala, instructing the delivery of chrysanthemums in the amount of \$6.00 to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Adams, El Comodoro Hotel, Miami, Florida, as mentioned in the report of Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons, Jacksonville. Florida, dated March 24, 1936, further inquiry was made of F. D. Farquhar, Manager, Western Union Telegraph Company, Ocala, Florida, concerning the identity of the individual competent to testify to the destruction of that message. Mr. Farquhar stated that in his capacity of Manager of the local office he is competent to testify to the destruction of the original message in question; that he personally destroys all original messages at the end of each twelve month period by burning and that each six months he submits to the Superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Atlanta, Gorgia, a certificate, advising of the destruction of all original telegrams for the six month period past. Therefore, the certificate which he forwarded to Atlanta on January 1, 1936, attests to the destruction of all original telegrams in the Ocala office of the Western Union Telegraph Company for a six month period prior thereto and which includes the month of November, 1934.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. B. Donaldson:

AT MIAMI, FLORIDA:

Concerning the address of several witnesses who may be used at the forthcoming trial of this matter agent ascertained that Arthur/Sander-cock and T. C. Covell are presently employed as day and night clerk respectively at the El Comodoro Hotel in Miami, Mr. Covell resides at 730 Pennsylvania Avenue, Miami Beach. George Wilson who was in charge of the dining room at the El Comodoro left here last April and was last heard of as residing at some unknown address in New York City. It would appear that he left here somewhat quietly and that the closing up of his accounts, etc.,



was not altogether satisfactory to the management of the El Comodoro. Gladys Fahrion still resides in Miami at 711 S. W. 5th Avenue, and is employed at the Colonial Towers Hotel. Mr. L. E. Gray and his wife Agnes did not return to Miami this year. Mr. Gray has advised that they could be located at anytime through inquiry of his father, Mr. J. H. Gray at Statesville, N. C.

Further interviews have been conducted with the several colored bell boys who are to be witnesses in this case. Very little additional information of evidentiary value seems to be forthcoming from them aside from that previously obtained and set forth in the reports of Special Agent John H. Hanson.

Fred Anton lives at 1755 N. W. 5th Court (upstairs) Miami, and at the present time is employed as bell boy at the El Comodoro having commended such employment on December 26, 1934. His badge is #4. He advises he cannot recognize any of the photos of the Karpis-Barker mob that stayed at the El Comodoro and if he served them in any capacity he cannot recall the details thereof. He informs that radios are not installed in the rooms of this hotel as a part of the regular equipment, but he believes a few of the guests have private radios in their rooms. As to where they were obtained he does not know, however, there is a small radio store close by the hotel.

Henry Debro lives at room 225 in the Mary Elizabeth Hotel located at 642 N. W. 2nd Avenue in Miami. Debro is still employed as a bell boy at the El Comodoro. He has previously identified photos of all the members of this mob who stopped at this hotel as being persons he observed about the lobby and on various occasions rendered them room service such as carrying up, food, coca colas, laundry, papers, etc. He seems to have no specific recollection as regards papers delivered to the room occupied by Harry Campbell and Wynona Burdette. It is possible he carried Chicago or other out of town papers to them but, if so, some one of the other bell boys must have gone out and purchased same. Debro states he does not believe Mr. Adams ever gave him any papers or orders to get papers to take to any of these people. His orders would be received from the bell captain or from the desk clerk on duty. Out of town papers when requested by guests are generally obtained by sending a boy to a paper stand located near the First National Bank several blocks from the Hotel. This witness has no information about a radio being placed in Karpis' room.

Andrew L. Smith, room 202, same address as Henry Debro, is still a bell boy at the El Comodoro and his badge remains No. 5. It occurs to Agent that this boy will not make an outstanding witness to say the least as he seems to be an extremely slow thinker, and just a little dense in addition to having a slight stammer. This witness has only been able to




identify photos of Kate and Fred Barker to whose room he redalls making service calls to take food, ice water, etc. He has no recollection whatever of serving the other members of this mob and recalls nothing about taking up newspapers either local or out of town papers. Neither does he recall anything about a radio being delivered to the room of Karpis. Likewise advises he has never taken a radio to any room and otherwise has no knowledge of guests being furnished with radios. Any calls or orders given him to serve these people came in the usual manner, i.e. through the bell captain or from the clerk on duty and not from Mr. Adams.

Carl Pitts, 911 N. W. 3rd Avenue, Miami, is now employed as bell boy at the Edgewater Beach Hotel on Miami Beach. He was bell boy No. 2, at the El Comodoro during the period of interest to this case and for several years prior thereto. He has identified from photos the members of this mob and states he rendered them usual room service from time to time. However, he seems unable to recall in any great detail such instances. As regards newspapers he informed that possibly he did carry some to the various rooms although he could not say that any of such papers were other than local publications. Pitts says he never received any orders from Mr. Adams to go to the rooms of these people or otherwise serve them. He does not know of the radio in the room occupied by Karpis and also says he cannot recall that the hotel at any time supplied a radio for a guest.

أشرابك والمحارب المعطوماتين بمتعطوم والمعارف T. C. Covell, night clerk at the present time at the El Comodoro resides at the Mayfair Court Apartments, 730 Pennsylvania Avenue, Mismi Beach. As shown in previous reports he was not so employed at the time this mob lived at the El Comodoro although he had a room there and several months prior thereto had been employed as a clerk. He was interviewed March 28. 1936 at his apartment. He states that he cannot supply much direct information about the matter at hand but is willing to cooperate with the Government. Concerning the matter of radios being furnished guests he reports that while the hotel has no radios, yet on a few occasions to his knowledge they have secured one on special request. He called attention to the fact that a small radio store operates nearby the hotel and occasionally a guest will secure for himself a radio from this store on a rental basis and use it in his room. Covell has no firsthand information about Adams getting the radio from Mrs. Gray and sending it to Karpis' room.

James Grant, bell boy at this time at the Kl Comodoro Hotel and now residing at 541 N. W. 2nd Avenue, Miami, was again interviewed and gave the following statement:

"Miami, Fla. Mar. 29, 1935.



During the last three months of 1934 I was employed as head bellman at the El Comodoro Hotel in Miami, Fla. During the month of December, 1934, I was ordered to take a radio to room 405. My first knowledge that this radio was to be delivered to this room came from one of the bell boys then on duty. I do not recall which boy told me this, neither do I know who gave him such order or instructions. I had Milton Johnson assist me and we got the radio out of the hotel check room. It is my thought that the radio belonged to Mr. L. E. Tray one of the hotel clerks. On going to room #405 to deliver the radio I saw a woman, who was pregnant, and a medium sized slender built man. I only saw the man from a side view. However, from photographs shown me I can identify the picture of Alvin Karpis as being a likeness of the man I saw in room 405.

I do not recall having taken or sent any papers to rooms occupied by any of the people associated with the man and woman who got the radio which was a cabinet model.

On a few occasions I have taken a radio to a guests room but in such instances the guest owned the radio or had otherwise arranged for it himself outside. Sometimes we take the lobby radio to a guests room on instructions from the office.

I have read the above statement which is written on two pages, before signing same and it is true.

William Milton Johnson, at present a bell boy at the El Comodoro Hotel and now residing at 376 N. W. 10th Street, Miami, supplied the following statement:

"Mismi, Fla. Mar. 29, 1936.

I, William Milton Johnson, hereby make the following statement freely and voluntarily to R. B. Donaldson, known to me as a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Dept. of Justice. No threats or promises of any kind have been made to me to cause me to give this statement.

Referring to my employment as bell boy at the El Comodoro Hotel during the latter part of year 1934 and my previous identification of photos of various members of the Barker-Karpis gang, I can offer the following details. I recall during the month of December 1934 or thereabouts that while on duty I helped James Grant, then head bellman, take a radio to room 405 where I saw a woman who was pregnant and a man who had on dark glasses. He was a tall, thin man and I only got a side glance at him. I do not know who arranged to send this radio up. I don't recall having carried up a radio to any other guests about this time unless it was their own property.

As regards newspapers being delivered to these people I may have delivered some but as to the details of same I cannot say whether they would be local or out of town papers.

When I decided to return from Ocklawaha, Fla. where employed by Fred and Kate Barker in Nov. 1934, Fred Barker gave ma a \$10.00 bill and asked me to mail him papers. I don't know what papers he asked me to send. It seems to me it was a Chicago or St. Louis paper. He wrote the name down on a piece of paper. Fred told me at first to find out about his paper as he had left word at the office of the El Comodoro Hotel to have it sent. On inquiry of the clerk or someone else on duty upon my return to Miami I could not find out about the paper so I went ahead and sent them myself and wrote a letter to Fred about it. I purchased such papers at various stands and at times when I could not get out would ask some of the other boys to get one for me.

I have read this statement which is written on two sheets before signing same and it is true.

Through inquiry of officials of the Postal Telegraph Company, Miami, it was determined that the telegram forwarded by Adams to Randall at the Jacksonville Airport, Dec. 31, 1934, which message was signed "Joe" and was as follows: "Use own judgement the quickest way", has been destroyed in accordance with the practice to destroy messages after 12 months. Mr. L. T. Williams, Revenue Accountant, Postal Telegraph Co., Miami, is the proper person to testify as to its destruction.

Mr. Palmer Rosemond, Deputy Clerk, U. S. District Court, Miami, has in his custody the \$1000.00 bill bearing serial number F 00017095 A.

The additional investigation reguested is receiving attention and a further report will be submitted as soon as possible.

UNDEVELOPED LEAD:

THE ATLANTA OFFICE at Atlanta, Georgia, is requested to interview the appropriate official of the Western Union Telegraph Company in an effort to ascertain the identity, official position and address of the employee of that company who is competent to introduce the certificate of destruction of original telegrams of the Ocala, Florida, office, for the month of November, 1934, such certificate having been forwarded to the Atlanta office of that company on or about January 1, 1936.

Will testify that on April 8, 1936, at Toledo, Ohio, he interviewed EDITH BARRY, 524 Southard Street, with reference to the following named individuals:

> CHARLES J. FITZGERALD WILLIAM J. HARRISON ALVINOKARPIS -HARRY CAMPBELL DR. JOSEPH P. MORAN

That she stated that during the summer of 1934 a man she partially identified from photograph as being CHARLES J. FITZGERALD, whom she stated had an injured leg, a men she partially identified as WILLIAM J. HARRISON, and another man she partially identified from photograph as being DR. JOSEFH P. MORAN, frequented her place and spent money freely with the girl prostitutes, who were at her house at that time; that she could not recall whether or not any person had vouched for them, or sent them to her. place; that these three men came to her place on numerous occasions.

That also in the summer of 1934 ALVIN KARPIS and HARRY CAMPBELL, whom she partially identified from photographs, also came there on one or two occasions; that after the summer of 1934 she did not see KARPIS and CAMPBELL until about January, 1935, when they again came to her place and remained for several days; that she did not know their true identities at that time.

That in the summer of 1935, possibly June or July, she purchased the book by Courtney Riley Cooper, "Ten Thousand Public Enemies" and on page 240 of this book noted a picture of ALVIN KARPIS and also a copy of Identification Order #1218, upon which appears a picture of ALVIN KARPIS, Kansas State

Fenitentiary #1539; that upon seeing these photographs in the book, "Ten Thousand Public Enemies", she recognized MARPIS as being the man who had been to her house during the summer of 1934, and again about January of 1935.

That thereafter, about the middle of August, 1935, KARPIS returned to her place and remained for several days; that she recognized him at this time as being the man whose picture she had seen in the book, "Ten Thousand Public Enemies", but that she was either afraid or powerless to cause him to leave; that after remaining several days at her house, where he occupied a front bedroom, next to her bedroom, he departed.

That thereafter in the fall of 1935 KARFIS again returned to her house alone and remained overnight; that she was the only one in the house at that time.

(Inspector E.J. Connelley told EDITH BARRY on the occasions of his interview with her that if she furnished the Federal Bureau of Investigation with information as to the definite location of KARPIS and CAMPBELL, a definite recommendation would be made to the U.S. Attorney that she not be prosecuted for harboring KARPIS and CAMPBELL. Special Agent E.J. Wynn was present at this interrogation and will corroborate the fact that she furnished the information to Inspector E.J. Connelley.)
