In the became the consort of notorious gangsters — most of whom are now dead or in prison, she recalled sadly today.

It was as a companion to the Barker-Karpis gang—one of them, Volney Davis, she called "my boy friend"—that she stayed out of prison for three years after her last escape in 1932.

Also, it was her testimony in sub-

Also, it was her testimony in sub-sequent trials involving those gang-sters which helped her to freedom.

Federal authorities recommended her for parole, saying she aided in "breaking up a gang."
In one of the three trials at which the law called upon her inside knowledge of "big time" crime, she herself was a defendant. That was when she was accused of complicity in the 1935 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, Several of her companions were Several of her companions were convicted, but the charge against her was dismissed.

"I never took part in their doings, I just lived with them," she told reporters today.

Her husband. Jack Murray, drew an identical 25-year term for the same crime of which she was con-

victed-robbing a Hansas City grocery clerk in 1925.

That's when she became known as "the kissing bandit."

"This grocery clerk testified that after we robbed him I asked him to kiss me," she related.


"We didn't even commit that robbery. It's the only one I was ever accused of. But I've been the "kissing bandit" ever since."


She blames that "bum conviction" for "the rest of my troubles."

"It made me bliter and probably caused me to do things I did after-ward."

Jack Murray, released on sick pa-role in 1935, died later. Her "bey friend," Volney Davis, is doing life in Alcatraz for the Bremer kidnaping.



The writer has received a letter from Mr. Early Spencer, a witness in the Bremer kidnaping case - harboring angle during the trial of the Hot Springs city police officers at Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1938.

In this letter he has asked Government protection for Oscar Picuse. Mr. Muse was a very valuable witness during the trial of this case and at one time lived in the house with Mr. Spencer. Mr. Muse, during the time he was on the witness stand, gave very damaging evidence against Herbert "Dutch" Akers. However, prior to the departure of Mr. Muse and Mr. Spencer from Little Rock to their home in Missouri immediately after the trial had come to a close, they received some rather veiled and subtle threats that led them to believe that if they did not get out of town in a hurry they might be subjected to physical harm.

The writer talked to Inspector Connelley about this at the time and arrangements were made with Mr. Earl Spencer to correspond with the Little Rock Office immediately if during the course of their trip home they were molested in any way. Shortly thereafter Mr. Spencer arrived in Brashear, Missouri, and a letter was received from him stating he and Mr. Muse had arrived safely.

Mr. Spencer now states it is necessary for Mr. Muse to return to Hot Springs, Arkansas, for his health, and knowing Hot Springs as he does, both he and Mr. Muse are afraid that something might happen to Mr. Muse if he returns to that city.

Both Mr. Spencer and Mr. Muse deoperated 100 per cent with Bureau Agents during the gathering of the evidence for the harboring trial and both of them, at the time, indicated to Bureau Agents that they would be mone than willing to testify as Government witnesses providing the Government would see to it that no harm would come to them as a result of their testisary. The Agents working on this case let it be known through various channels that witnesses subpoenaed for testimony in this case by the U. S. Government would be protected from physical violence if at all possible. It is, of course, realized the Bureau will be unable to comply with the request of Mr. Muse at this time in the manner in which he indicates in his letter. However, in view of his previous cooperation and excellent testimony rendered in the trial of this case, an appropriate letter has been written to Mr. Muse and Mr. Spencer reflecting the Bureau's position at this time. These letters are attached for approval.



On the morning of July 25, 1939, Agent was in U. S. District Court at Kansas City, Kansas, where the motion, filed by McDONALD on July 22, 1939, for a court order directing issuance of a subpoena duces tecum for Director HOOVER and Dr. D. E. SINGLE-TON and a subpoena ad testificandum for Mr. HOOVER and Special Agent in Charge SAMUEL H. McKEE - came up for hearing. The Government was represented by Assistant U. S. Attorney HOMER DAVIS. The Petitioner was not represented by counsel. Prior to the above. hearing, Mr. DAVIS telephonically contacted Attorney W. H. McCANISH, Kansas City, Kansas, who was supplied to be representing McDONALD at the hearing and Mr. McCANISH informed Mr. DAVIS that he was not McDONALD'S attorney of record in this case, and that he knew nothing about the motion to order subpoenss for the above named Federal officials. He also stated that unless he was paid a fee in this matter, he did not intend to represent McDONALD at the hearing which is scheduled for July 28, 1939.

At the proceeding before Judge HOPKINS on July 25, 1939, Mr. DAVIS informed the Court of the information he had received from Mr. McCANISH, whereupon the Court appointed Attorney JOHN F. RHODES, Kansas City, Missouri to represent McDONALD at the hearing on July 28, 1959 provided McCARISH did not appear. The Court, at the July 25th hearing declined to issue a subpoena duces tecum for Dr. SINCLETON and subpoens ad testificandum for Mr. HOOVER and Special Agent in Charge McKEE, The Court, however, signed a writ of habeas Corpus directing the Warden of the Leavenworth Prison to produce McDONALD in Federal Court at Kansas City, Kansas at 10:00 a.m. on July 28, 1939. The Court stated that at that time. McDONALD would be interrogated and requested to point outwhat specific records he desired Mr. HOOVER and Dr. SINGLETON to preduce; further, to point out just what specific testimony he wanted Director HOOVER and Mr. MCKEE to give. It is pointed out that after the Court is advised of the specific information desired by the Petitioner, the Government then intends to move that the Petitioner's request be over-ruled, on the grounds that same is not competent " in a habeas corpus proceeding.

To date, no order has been issued by Judge HOPKINS directing Mr. HOOVER or any other official of the Bureau to appear at Kansas City, Kansas at the hearing on July 28, 1939, with any official

records, or to give testimony. The United States Attorney's Office at Topeka, Kansas is of the epinion that no such order will be issued, inasmuch as this is a civil proceeding, and the Court cannot compel the attendance of any witness over 100 miles distant, at a proceeding of this kind.

Sheriff JULIUS SETTERT of Vilas County edvised that he has not heard of CASSIUS McDONALD being in the vicinity of KAGLE RIVER and advised that in the event he had been there no one would know about it as there are hundreds of resorts in the vicinity of KAGLE RIVER and it would be very easy for a person to spend several months at one of these places without his identity being learned.

It is suggested that in the event the Kansas City Field Division desires further investigation be conducted at KAQLE RIVER, WISCONSIN, a photograph of Subject be furnished to the Milwaukee Field Division along with more detailed information as to where Subject might be located.

Inrough the cooperation of NR. L. J. PATRICK, who is Superintendent of the Fex Creek Post Office Substation, Detroit, Agent talked with mailman RARRY LACY, who for years has been the mailman carrying mail on the route which covers 15800 Lakeview Court, Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan.

MR. LACY related that up to the time Subject was released from prison MR3. CASSIUD KoDOHALD lived alone in her home at 15800 Lakeview Court and that the only other person in the house during that period was the colored houseman. MR. LACY stated that since Subject's release from prison he has constantly been at the Grosse Fointe Park home and MR. LACY states that he is sure that McDOMALD has not been away from the house since that time for more than a day or so at any particular time as he is of the opinion that he has seen Amject at the home more or less constantly.

MR. LACT stated that he delivers mail at the house between ten and eleven each morning and he usually meets CADSIUS MeDURALD in the yard around that time. MR. LACY further stated that there are no other eccupants in the house except MR. and MRS. MeDURALD and the colored housemen and that the only car he has seen around the house is an old car which MRS. MeDURALD has been driving for some time.

not have any definite work to which he reports regularly each day.

He stated that the family are very peculiar and that one peculiarity which he noticed in particular is that neither lit. Nor MIS. McDONALD will ever accept any registered mail; that MRS. McDONALD followed this practice during the time IR. McDONALD was in prison and that since his release in. LACY has had at least one registered letter which he attempted to deliver to MR. McDONALD but which MR. McDONALD definitely refused to accept, and it was returned to the sender.

in Wisconsin and that he remembers that one of the letters is from a company in Rhinelander, Visconsin. MR. LACY stated he would keep track of the mail and advise this office through his superior as to the source of the mail being delivered to MR. McD:MALD, as he thought that undoubtedly mail would be coming through from the two above mentioned veneer companies. Up to the present time, however, since this interview MR. LACY has not delivered my mail from these two concerns.

On September 23, 1940, however, MR. PATRICK, Superintendent of the Pox Creek Station, reported that on that day MR. LACY delivered to CASSIUS MODONALD an air mail letter which had the return address *ILLIAK J. WESTOW, Rechester, Minnesota.

Mr. L. J. PATRICK determined by searching his records that an October 25, 1940, the CASSIUS McDONALDS left a change of address with the Fox Creek Station, giving Box 27, Watersmoot, Kichigen, as their new address.

For the information of interested office, the United States Attorney's office at Topeka, Kansas is appealing the habeas corpus decision rendered by the Federal District Court in Kansas and it is expected that this appeal will be heard in the Circuit Court of Appeals at Danver, Colorado on or about January 1, 1941.

The Bureau has requested that periodic checks be made in a discreet manner to determine the whomeabouts and actions of CASSIUS McDONALD during the period of his release.







"No. 6248 - one count. Kidnapping William Hamm, Jr., transporting him in interstate commerce to Bensenville, Illinois and holding him for ransom-never arraigned-stricken from calendar until further order of the Court on April 6, 1937.

*No. 6249 - one count. Conspiracy to kidnap William Hamm, Jr., transport in interstate commerce to Bensenville, Illinois and hold for ransom-never arraigned--case stricken from calendar until further order of the Court on April 6, 1937.

MR. GIBLIN further advised that these indictments were returned in these cases on the following dates:

No. 6095 and No. 60% on January 22, 1935

No. 6174 on September 27, 1935

No. 6248 and No. 6249 on April 22, 1936

No. 6257 on June 11, 1936

MR. GIBLIN, at the conclusion of this letter, requested the advice of the Attorney General with respect to the position the office of the United States Attorney in St. Paul should take concerning the request of ALVIN KARPIS for trial on the pending indictments.

A copy of MR. GIBLIN'S letter mentioned above was forwarded to the St. Paul Field Office on March 24th, 1941, together with a request that an agent of the St. Paul Field Office interview MR. THOMAS J. NEWMAN, Attorney of St. Paul, Minnesota, to determine whether MR. NEWMAN was in fact employed by KARPIS or by someone representing KARPIS during the 1936 trial in instant case, and to determine whether or not NEWMAN has had any indication from KARPIS that he intends to seek a writ of habeas corpus.

On April 14th, 1911, reporting agent interviewed MR. THOMAS J. NEWMAN, 8 East 14th Street, St. Paul, Minnesota, Telephone Number Garfield 1309, who advised that he was sole attorney for ALVIN KARPIS and for CHARLES J. FITZGERALD during the entire trial of both these individuals at St. Paul, Minnesota, in 1936; that ARCHIE CAREY, a Minneapolis attorney, suggested MEMMAN'S name to KARPIS at the time the latter was seeking to engage an attorney for instant trial, and that KARPIS then engaged MEMMAN directly. MR. MEMMAN stated that KARPIS had originally sought to have MR. CAREY represent him, but that MR. CAREY, who was representing one or more defendants in the same case, felt that the interests of his first client might conflict with that of KARPIS, and therefore suggested MR. NEWMAN. KARPIS in turn suggested to CHARLES J. FITZGERALD that he too engage MR. NEWMAN as defense counsele

MR. NEWMAN advised that about one year ago he received

a letter from KARPIS at Alcatraz to the effect that KARPIS wanted him to discuss with the United States Attorney in St. Paul, Minnesota, the possibility of having the indictments remaining against KARPIS at St. Paul dismissed, and that if these were not dismissed KARPIS would "come to St. Paul" and make a motion to have them dismissed. MR. NEWMAN stated that he then spoke to LINUS HAMMOND, Assistant United States Attorney at St. Paul, Minnesota, who suggested that no action be taken at that time and that NEWMAN see MR. HAMMOND again at a later date concerning it.

MR. NEMMAN stated it was his recollection that he did not communicate with KARPIS at all following the above conversation with MR. HAMMOND, and he further stated that he received no further letters from KARPIS in this connection. He advised that he did not know that KARPIS is presently contemplating a motion to have these indictments against him dismissed, or that KARPIS intends to seek a writ of habeas corpuse

By additional letter dated April 9th, 1941, MR. JAMES J. GIBLIN, Assistant United States Attorney in St. Paul, Minnesota, requested the St. Paul Field Division to determine whether or not MR. THOMAS J. MEMMAN actually appeared in court with ALVIN KARPIS when the latter was arraigned on June 23rd, 1936 and entered a plea of not guilty; on July 14th, 1936 when KARPIS changed his plea of guilty and sentence was deferred; and on July 27th, 1936 when KARPIS was sentenced to serve the remainder of his natural life in a Federal penitentiary.

Reporting agent telephonically recontacted MR. THOMAS J. NEWNAN, who advised that he did appear in court with KARPIS on these occasions and that he was KARPIS! sole attorney throughout the entire proceedings against him in connection with instant matter.



According to this informant an allegation has been made that Farmer's sister is presently buying a chicken farm near LaGrange, Illinois, and that the United States Congressman from that district, who was formerly State's Attorney in DuPage County, Illiflois, is going to take appropriate steps to effect a successful parole for Elmer Farmer. The basis for the application for parole will be the poor health of Elmer Farmer, as well as the fact that he has a chicken farm to retire to.

This informant states that \$5,000.00 is the price that is being asked by the United States Congressman for the part he is to play. This informant also advised that it is his recollection Farmer is now eligible for an application for parole.


Please refer to my previous memorandum of May 23, 1939, advising you of the receipt of information to the effect that a United States Congressman from Illinois had allegedly received \$1,000.00 for the use of his influence in having Elmer Farmer, who was convicted in the Bremer kidnaping case, transferred from the Alcatras Penitentiary to some other penal institution.

Information has now been received that the sum of \$3,000.00 is the price being asked by the Congressman for his efforts in securing a parole for Farmer. The basis for the parole application will be the poor health of Farmer and the fact that he may retire to live on a chicken farm owned by his sister near La Grange, Illinois.

I would like to express my personal view that Farmer is the type of individual who should not be paroled or transferred to another institution. In the kidnaping of William A. Hawn, &r., which occurred on June 15, 1933, at St. Faul, Minnesota, you will recall that Farmer appeared on several occasions at the hideout in Bensonville, Illinois. While Mr. Hamm was being held here, Farmer delivered food and beer to the hideout for the use of Alvin Karpis and his associates, who were guarding Hamm. In the subsequent kidnaping of Edward George Bremer, Farmer arranged for the house in which Bremer was held prisoner at Bensonville, Illinois, during the ranson negotiations. Farmer is supposed to have received \$1,000.00 for his services in the Bremer case.

Almer Farmer is a former saloon operator and by his cen admission supervised a number of slot machines being operated in taverns and hotels in and near the city of Bensonville. He also operated gambling tables and a race track booking agency in the rear of a hotel cured by his mother in that city, and during prohibition engaged in bootlegging activities. His criminal recordificals that in February, 1918, he was received at the Illinois State Penitentiary to serve a one to twenty year sentence on a charge of burglary and was discharged on parole during March, 1922. Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 2, 1936, regarding the destruction of wanted circulars in the above entitled cases. A review of the San Antonio Field Division files in these cases reflects that there is still a large number of photographs of the different individuals implicated in this case together with several lists of the serial numbers taken from the ransom money used in these cases remaining in the bulky exhibit drawer. Also in the KARPIS case we still have a number of the maps and "Standard Short Range Targets" taken from the Karpis car at the time of its inspection, together with an empty clip from one of the guns used by the KARPIS mob and a broken padlock. RECORDED

Due to the fact that the investigation denterning most investigation of the individuals involved has been completed these photographs, lists of ransom note numbers, maps, targets, etc. are no longerso of any value to the San Antonio Field Division. It is felt, that, inasmuch as the Bureau has made displays of the materials taken from these notorious criminals, the maps, targets, gun clip and broken padlock might be desired by the Bureau for addition to these displays. However, unless advised to the contrary these materials will be destroyed on July 30, 1941. Care will be taken to see that the photographs of any individuals concerning whom investigation is still being conducted are not destroyed.

Rapids Office has developed informants in the vicinity of Cassius M.

NoDonald's home. NaDonald has indicated to them that he is leaving for Nashington either Monday or Tuesday of next Seek, July 7th or 8th.

Nr. NoFarlin stated their informants have been unable to ascertain the means of travel McDonald will use to come to Nashington and he desired to know whether the Bureau considered the case of sufficient importance to keep McDonald under surveillance. Mr. NoFarlin stated there is only road McDonald could use to leave his home and that there is a tavern on the side of the road where the Agents could watch for McDonald to leave. McDonald has several guests presently at his home and may travel to Washington with one of them.

SAU Brontley called from Kansas City with reserence to the Casetus McDenald matter stating that following his conversation with you he talked with lesistant United States Attorney Thomas Honer Davis at Topoka, Kaneas who is handling the ease in the Circuit Court. Ar. Davis stated that there are no new developments except that today he received from McDonald's counsel in Kansas City, Missouri a petition for a re-hearing of the case in the Circuit Court of Appeals at Lenver. Mr. Davis forwarded the petition up to the Circuit Court in Denver without filing any pleadings in behalf of the government. Mr. Davis advised Mr. Brantley that it is quetomary in such cases that the Court will consider the patition within a week or ten days and stated that he, Mr. Davis, is almost certain that the Court will deny the petition and that thereafter the Circuit Court in all probability will issue some process for the return of McDonald to Federal oustody. Mr. Lavis advised Mr. Brantley that pending a decision on the petition he will take no action. I told Mr. Brantley I would give you this information. I called SAC Brantley in Kansas City regarding the Cassius McDonald matter. In answer to my query Mr. Brantley stated he had read the opinion of the Circuit Court of Appeals. I called his attention to the last paragraph of the opinion in which they say the judgment is reversed and cause remanded with instructions to the trial court to direct the return of the petitioner to the custody of the warden. I told Mr. Brantley Judge Holtzoff in the Department has indicated that if it hasn't already been done, we may be able to expedite the sending down of the mandate from the Circuit Court to the District Court, which will enable the District Court to issue an order for the return of McDonald to the custody of the warden.

Mr. Brantley stated he would call Assistant United States Attorney Thomas Homer Davis at Topeka, Kansas, who is handling the case in the Circuit Court of Appeals to ascertain the present status of the matter and will call me back.

I informed Mr. Brantley about McDonald's contemplated trip to Washington and pointed out that it will save us considerable trouble if McDonald can be returned to Federal custody before he is able to make the trip.

I called the Grand Rapids Office and talked with Special Agent L. E. Murphy with reference to my conversation with SAC McFarlin on July 5th relative the contemplated trip to Washington of Cassius M. McDonald and the plan to keep him under surveillance when he makes the trip. Agent Murphy stated two Agents are presently watching the roads which McDonald will have to use when he leaves. He stated the Agents called in last night and McDonald had not left at that time. I told Agent Murphy we want to be very sure that the surveillance is established and maintained until McDonald reaches Washington and that he should so advise SAC McFarlin in order that the necessary steps may be taken. I told Agent Murphy to have SAC McFarlin call me upon his return to the office.

11:25 A.M.

SAC McFarlin called at which time I again called to his attention the importance of keeping McDonald under surveillance. I instructed that he make the necessary arrangements with the offices along the route that McDonald takes to take over the surveillance when he reaches that territory. I told Mr. McFarlin that the Washington Field Office would take over the surveillance when McDonald reaches Washington. Mr. McFarlin advised that McDonald took two of his guests to the train this morning but returned to his home himself. Mr. McFarlin stated another informant is going to see McDonald today. Mr. McFarlin is putting another Agent and another automobile on this and will advise us of developments.

Sire

On March 6, 1935, Matthew Gleason was indicted for violation of Section 246, Title 18. The facts briefly are as follows:

On March 6, 1935, the grand jury in Chicago returned the above indictment charging Matthew Gleason with harboring and concealing, on February 6 and 7, 1935, at Aurora, Illinois, an individual named Volney Davis, in order to prevent his apprehension by the police officers.

Gourt in Minnesota on a charge of kidnapping and holding for ransom one Edward Bremer, and a warrant was issued for his apprehension and arrest.

The indictment above contained two counts, the first charging harboring, and the second charging the concealment of Davis, and alleges that Gleason had knowledge of the above indictment and warrant for the arrest of Davis. The indictment referred to in Minnesota was returned on January 22, 1935, and charged Davis, together with Alvin Karpis and others, with kidnapping George Bremer, in violation of Section 408a, Title 18.

On February 6, 1935, Davis was arrested by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Kansas City, Missouri, and while being transported from Kansas City to Chicago escaped from the agents on February 6, 1935, at about 7:30 p.m. This was in the vicinity of Yorkville, Illinois, and after his escape, Davis went to the home of Mat Gleason in Aurora, Illinois. From an investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, it is evident that several people were in Mat Gleason's house at the time, namely, Mrs. Rockers Mr. and Mrs. John Sampson. Davis arrived at the house at






approximately 8:00 p.m. Davis had known Gleason several years before but Gleason knew him only as "Whitey." Gleason at that time operated a handbook establishment in Aurora. Davis remained in the house until about 8:00 p.m. on the evening of February 7, 1935.

One G. A. Barnhart in Aurora was approached by Gleason on February 7 about noon and Gleason attempted to sell him a diamond ring for \$60. Gleason at that time, according to the statements made by Barnhart, said that the ring belonged to a federal prisoner who had escaped from federal agents at Yorkville the preceding day. Barnhart notified the agents and a short time thereafter Gleason was arrested. Gleason in his statement stated that he had known Volney Davis for about a year, under the name of Whitey, and that he was not advised of Davis's escape from federal officers until he read of the incident in a newspaper about one o'clock on the afternoon of February 7. He admitted, of course, that Davis remained in his house from 8:00 o'clock on February 6 to the evening of February 7.

A letter was addressed to the Department by former United States Attorney Michael L. Igoe on April 50, 1936, requesting authority to dismiss this indictment. At the time the Department refused to authorise the dismissal of this indictment. The case, however, was not prosecuted during Mr. Igoe's administration, nor was it prosecuted during the administration of my predecessor, Mr. William J. Campbell. In reviewing the facts as submitted, I am of the opinion that there is not sufficient evidence to warrant a successful prosecution, and I therefore request authority to dismiss the indictment.

Mr. BECRISH advised that to his knowledge the only one by the name of KAYE in the building was a MARIE KAYE who is employed by the Ohio Match Company, room 511, but that this Miss KAYE has been employed by them as a bookkeeper for quite a long period of time.

He advised that there was no male in the building by the name of KAYE unless he might be a sublessee in the building and he had not been advised of the sublessee in any office.

Mr. BEGRISH stated that there was an individual who had an office in the building sometime back by the name of HYAMS who had been investigated by the New York City Police Department but that this individual was put out of the building in April 1941.

Mr. BEGRISH checked his files as to the name of KAYE with negative results. He contacted JOHN GLOSE, elevator starter who has been so employed for the past 11 years and he, GLOSE, advised that the only person by the name of KAYE in the building was the MARIE KAYE above mentioned. Mr. BEGRISH telephonically contacted Miss FINKWATER of the Associated Hospital Service Group whose main office is located in the building at 370 Lexington Avenue in the attempt to see if S. KAYE had taken out insurance with this group and Miss FINKWATER advised that her file did not contain the name of KAYE for any male individual in the building.

At the Grand Central Post Office, Bostal Carriers BENJAMIN WOLK and FRED JOHANNES were contacted and they advised that the only individual known to them by the name of KAYE at 370 Lexington Avenue were Miss KAY of the Croft Steel Company and Miss KAYE of the Ohio Match Company.

The above information was telephonically transmitted to Special Agent K. M. Priper of the Washington Field Office by Special Agent C. A. Hardison on July 23, 1941.

McDONALD and possibly his wife, were planning to come to Washington, D. C., in the near future. Mr. TANM advised that a twenty-four hour surveillance of these persons was desired in the event they came to Washington as during the interim of McDONALD's confinement to prison, Mrs. McDONALD had come here on several occasions and surveilled the Director's home. He continued that McDONALD had only recently been released from prison and as the sound mental state of both these persons was questionable, pointed out that it was desirable to maintain a surveillance of them constantly, in order to insure that they did not make any attempt on the Director's life.

On July 13, 1941, a teletype was received from the Chicago Field Division, which advised that Subject CASSIUS McDONALD, in the Brekid Case, had lost his appeal in the Circuit Court on his recent conviction, and had applied for a Writ of Certiorari to the United States Supreme Court. It stated that if this were denied, Subject would be taken into custody and that the Bureau had instructed that a twenty-four hour surveillance be maintained. It continued that the Subject was aware of the surveillance; that he was traveling with his wife, EDITH, in their 1934 black Packard sedan, and that surveillance carried on from Michigan to Chicago, had been interrupted. This teletype requested that the Washington Field Office cruise the various highways leading into Washington, in an effort to pick up the Subject's trail.

Acting upon the information contained in this teletype, Special Agents KEAY and GOODMIN assumed a spot on U. S. Highway No. 240, North of the East and West Highway out of Chevy Chase, Maryland. Special Agents HECKERMAN and RUTHERFORD assumed a spot on Highway No. 182, at Silver Spring, Maryland. Special Agents GROVES and SWEMSON maintained a position on Highway No. 1, at College Park, Maryland, and Special Agents HILL and ORTON maintained a position on Highway No. 7, at Arlington, Virginia. Stop Notices were placed at the Willard Hotel, inasmuch as it was known that the Subject's wife had stayed here upon previous visits to Washington, D. C., and Special Agents BLAIR and McCONNEL maintained a surveillance in the vicinity of the Director's residence.

The above surveillances were maintained until approximately 12:30 A. M. on the morning of July 14, 1941, with no indications being received that the Subject and his wife used any of the highways in question or made efforts to approach the Director's neighborhood.

At 11:00 A. M., on July 14, 1941, Inspector AL ROSEN, of the Bureau, requested that the above surveillance on highways be assumed and Special Agents BLAIR and McCOINEL contacted the following Hotels, to ascertain whether Subject and his wife had registered:

In checking at the Willard Hotel, Agents BLAIR and McCONNEL ascertained that Mr. and Mrs. C. M. McDONALD of Michigan, had registered at the Willard Hotel between midnight and 7:00 A. H. on the morning of July 14, 1941, and that they were ultimately assigned to Room 544 at that Hotel. A surveillance was immediately instituted and at the same time, a check was made at the Capitol Garage, where the Willard Hotel automobiles are stored, and at the Washington Garage, to ascertain if the Subject's car was stored in either of those places. The results of this check were negative. Assistant Manager JACK LYNCH, of the Millard Motel, when the Stop Notice was pointed out to him, explained that the reason the night force of the Willard Hotel had not immediately notified the Washington Field Office of the registration of McDONAID and his wife was because that force had not been told by the day force of the requested Stop Notice, and that it had not been definitely ascertained that the C. M. Mc-DONAID was identical with Subject McDONALD in this case. The information stated above was telephonically communicated to Mr. LEE PENNINGTON, of the Bureau, at 2:00 P. M., on July 14, and all Field Offices attempting to locate the whereabouts of McDONALD were advised by teletype that the Subject had been located in Washington, D. C.

While a twenty-four hour surveillance was being conducted at the Willard Hotel, the results of which will be set out in this report, a surveillance was also being maintained in the vicinity of the Director's home from 7:00 P. M. on July 13, 1941, through July 19, 1941, at which time the physical surveillance in the Director's neighborhood was discontinued, acting upon instructions from Mr. E. A. TANM, of the Bureau. It should be noted that this surveillance was very discreetly maintained during the entire period referred to above.

The physical surveillance of McDONALD and his wife was commenced at approximately 1:00 P. M. on July 14, 1941. No activities on their part were noted until 6:40 P. M., at which time the Subject and his wife approached the desk of the lobby and left the following message:

"We will be at Wisconsin 5309 and are expecting an important phone call before 7:30 P. M."

Following the leaving of this message, the couple proceeded East on Pennsylvania Avenue to E Street, where they entered O'Donnell's Cafe, 1207 E Street, N. W., where they were observed to sit at a table and order a meal.

At 7:35 P. M., Subject and his wife left O'Donnell's on foot and proceeded West on E Street, where, on 13th Street, they entered Diamond Cab No. 151, and proceeded in this cab to a District Grocery Store, located on the corner of Western Avenue and Westway Place. Here McDONALD and the cab driver made inquiry, apparently regarding some address, and then proceeded to 4904 Bayard Boulevard, where McDONALD and his wife entered. It has been ascertained that this is the address of Congressman GEORGE D. O'BRIEN, whose telephone number is Wisconsin 5309. Subjects had entered this residence at 8:00 P. M., and remained there until 10:25 P. M., at which time they proceeded by cab to the Hotel Willard, arriving there at 10:55 P. M., where they immediately proceeded to their room.

It was ascertained that while the Subjects were at the O'BRIEN residence, they placed a long-distance phone call, which was charged to the Willard Hotel, for J. RHODES, Lee Summit, Missouri, No. 11M3.

Subjects remained in their room for sometime and a typewriter could be heard working very energetically. This continued until 1:45 A. N. At 2:40 A. M., on July 15, 1941, Subject and his wife left their room and went down the elevator, inquired of the bellboy where they could purchase postage stamps, and left the lobby, carrying a letter. They re-entered the Hotel at approximately 3:20 A. N., and proceeded to their room, where they remained for the night.

On this date, in addition to the long-distance call mentioned above, Subjects had placed a telephone call to National 3120, which is the United States Capitol, and to Wisconsin 5309, listed to O'BRIEN. At 9:15 A. H., on July 15, 1941, it was ascertained that Mrs. McDONALD held a conversation with a woman with a name resembling "O'BRIEN", in which the woman said, "My husband didn't come home last night. To save your husband the bother I thought I would call you. He will probably be home today". Mrs. McDONALD replied, "All right, we'll call you first. We got our letter off last night".

While the McDONALDS were spending the night of July 14, 1941, at the Hotel, it was ascertained from the bell-boy who checked them in that they had come in a taxi cab, and that their luggage bore baggage tags which seemed to indicate that they had arrived by train, and an appropriate stop was placed with the Willard on mail, wires and telephone calls.

At 9:00 A. M., on July 15, 1941, this surveillance was continued by Special Agents KEAY and GROVES. It should be noted that Room 502, across from the McDONALDS' room, was secured for the night of July 14, 1941. This was later changed to Room 545, so that a very close surveillance could be maintained on the activities of McDONALD and his wife.

At 10:05 A. M., July 15, 1941, a party with a name resembling "LAYTON" advised Mrs. McDONALD as follows: 'The Congressman is not back. He did not get back last night. I called his home and will call you when he gets in". The woman "LAYTON" told McDONALD that there was no need for them to come to the office until 10:30. The McDONALDS replied that they had to get dressed and get breakfast and did not know what plans they had for the day, but that probably they would be down later and see her. They said there was nothing to do but stand by until the Congressman returned.

The McDONALDS remained in their room until about 4:00 P. M., when McDONALD went out, had something to eat, took a short walk, and returned to the room. At about 7:30 P. M., he talked to a woman in the home of Congressman O'BRIEN, asking if her husband was back yet, to which the reply was negative. McDONALD made personal inquiries concerning the children and said that he had done nothing today, but go out for a walk, adding that lack of a car prevented him from coming to see her. McDONALD further stated that he would see the Congressman at 10:30 the next morning, if he arrived and would have his Secretary call him tomorrow. He further stated that his wife had worked late getting off the letter previously referred to in this report.

At 8:30 P. M., McDONALD and his wife left the room and proceeded to a restaurant on F Street, where they ate after which they took a walk and ended up at Federal Square, across from the Willard, where they looked over the various defense exhibits, returning to their room about 10:00 P. II.

Special Agents McCONNEL and BLAIR continued the surveillance at 10:40 P. M., on July 15, Agent GOODWIN relieving BLAIR at 11:30 P. M. on that date. It was observed that at 9:15 A. M. on July 16, 1941, the Subjects left the Hotel through the North entrance, entering onto F and 14th Street, proceeding North on 14th Street to New York Avenue, then reversing their direction and returning South on 14th Street.

At 9:20 A. M., Mrs. McDONALD left her husband and entered Julius Garfinckel's Department Store.

Agent GOODWIN maintained the surveillance of Mrs. McDONALD, noting that she entered Liggett's Drug Store, 14th and F, N. W., and then proceeded back to the Willard Hotel, where she entered her room.

McDONAID meanwhile proceeded South on 14th Street, thence West on Pennsylvania Avenue, into Childs Restaurant, where he ordered a meal.

The surveillance from 9:30 A. M. on July 16, was continued by Agents KEAY and GROVES. During this period, Subject and his wife had breakfast and proceeded, presumably to the Old House Office Building, after which they went to the Capitol Building. It was difficult to maintain a close watch of them, because of the change in surveilling Agents.

During July 16, 1941, Special Agents CORRIGAN and O'CONNOR continued the surveillance, assisted by Special Agent HILL. It was observed that at 4:15 P. M., Subject and his wife left the Capitol Building, and proceeded by taxicab to the Willard Hotel, at which time they went to their room. At 8:44 P. M., they proceeded from the Hotel to the Lotus Restaurant, 727 - 14th Street, N. W., which they left at 11:05 P. M., returning to the Hotel and retiring at 11:20 P. M.

On July 17, 1941, this surveillance was conducted by Special Agents SAUX, HILL and McCONNEL. Subjects left the Hotel at 11:20 A. M., and entered Childs Cafeteria next to the Willard Hotel. They returned to the Willard Hotel at 12:05 P. M., and CASSIUS McDONALD waited in the lobby while Mrs. McDONALD went to her room. She re-joined her husband at 12:10 P. M., and they proceeded by cab to the Old House Office Building. After remaining in this building for sometime, they returned to the Hotel, at approximately 3:30 P.M. After leaving the room briefly in the late afternoon, they left again at 7:40 P. M., proceeding on foot to the S. & W. Cafeteria, on G Street and 15th Street. Following their meal,

they entered the Capitol Theatre, and left at 11:45 P. M., proceeding on foot to the Benjamin Franklin Post Office, at 12th and Pennsylvania Avenue, where they were observed writing at one of the desks in the lobby. At 12:07 A. M., they re-entered their room, and retired for the night.

It was ascertained that Mrs. McDONALD had cashed a check in the Hotel, in the amount of \$100, on July 17, 1941, drawn on the Commercial Bank of Stanbough, Michigan, which was apparently printed for the Beatons Lake Forest Products, which name was printed on the check. Subjects had received no mail or telegrams to this date.

Surveillance on July 18, 1941, was conducted by Special Agents HILL, HECKERMAN and O'COMNOR. At 9:29 A. M., the Subjects proceeded to Childs Restaurant next to the Willard Hotel, where they are breakfast, and then proceeded by cab to the Old House Office Building, arriving at 10:03 A. M. At 1:50 P. M., the Subjects left this Building and proceeded by cab to the Hotel, where they entered their room. At 5:40 P. M., they re-entered the Childs Restaurant, leaving this at 6:55 P. M., and proceeding by cab to the Earle Theatre. They left the Earle Theatre at 9:45 P. M., and proceeded on foot to the Defense Exhibit across the street from the Willard Hotel. At 10:20 P. M., they proceeded to their room and retired at 11:20 P. M.

It was ascertained that at 2:35 P. M., on this date, Mrs. McDONALD contacted the Senate Office Building, where she conversed with Miss DOYLE, apparently the Secretary of Senator VANDENBERG. The substance of this conversation was to the effect that Mrs. McDONALD was to have contacted the office for an appointment with VANDENBERG, and it was impossible to make arrangements for Mr. and Mrs. McDONALD to visit or contact the Senator on Saturday, July 19, or at any time during the week-end, as the Senator was going out of town. Miss DOYLE asked Mrs. McDONALD how long they would be in town, and was given an indefinite answer, Mrs. McDONALD stating that she would again try to contact the Senator sometime on July 21. Miss DOYLE said she would try to make arrangements for the contact on Monday.

It was further ascertained that Mrs. McDONALD had contacted Miss NATHAN, the Secretary to Representative O'BRIEN (and presumably the "LAYTON" referred to carlier in this report). Miss NATHAN told Mrs. McDONALD that she had been ill and therefore was not down at the office to see her when she arrived. Mrs. McDONALD stated that she had seen the Congressman for only a few moments and that nothing new had developed. She advised Miss NATHAN that she and her husband were going to stay over and Miss NATHAN replied that she would see them Monday.

The Subjects were heard planning to attend a local movie, and it was learned that neither had received any letters or telegrams during the day.

Surveillance on July 19, 1941, was conducted by Special Agents CLEMENTS, HECKERMAN and BLAIR. At 10:20 P.M., on this date, McDONALD and his wife proceeded to the Childs Restaurant next door to the Willard Hotel, had breakfast and then re-entered the Hotel. They remained here but a few minutes, and then proceeded on foot to the Park at the corner of Constitution Avenue and 15th, N. W. Here, they read a newspaper and engaged in discussion, finally proceeding on foot to the Washington Monument. They took the customary tourist trip through this Monument, and then proceeded on foot down the mall to the Lincoln Memorial. After spending some time at the Lincoln Memorial, they proceeded on foot to the Millard Hotel, which they entered about 1:10 P. M., after having eaten lunch in a Drug Store. At 2:40 P. H., Mrs. McDONALD left the Hotel alone and made a shopping tour on foot of various stores in down-town Washington. She returned to the Hotel about 5:00 P. M. No further activity on the part of McDONALD or his wife was observed at this period.

Surveillance on July 20, 1941, was conducted by Agents HILL, HEID and McCONNEL. At 11:00 A. M., Subject and his wife proceeded from the Hotel to the Childs Restaurant next door, and had breakfast. Following breakfast, they returned to the Hotel and checked the Church Directory, after which they proceeded on foot to St. Patrick's Church, at the corner of 10th and G Streets, arriving about

noon. The McDONALDS left the Church at 1:00 P. M., and returned to the Hotel, where they stayed until 3:50 P. H. At 3:50 P. M., they entered the Childs Restaurant, previously referred to, but came out immediately and proceeded to the Park at 15th and Constitution Avenue, where they occupied a bench. The Subjects then entered an Alexandriabound bus, proceeding to Alexandria, after which they reentered a bus which returned to Washington via the Lirport and Memorial Bridge, to 12th and Pennsylvania Avenue. At 5:00 P. M., they entered O'Donnell's Restaurant at 12th and E Streets; leaving the Restaurant at 6:00 P. H., the Subjects proceeded on foot up 13th to G Street, to 14th Street, to Thomas Circle, where they arrived at 6:25 P.M., after having window-shopped enroute. From Thomas Circle, they proceeded on foot to 16th Street and thence to Lafayette Park, where they occupied a bench for twenty minutes. They then proceeded on foot to a Drug Store at the corner of Pennsylvania and 15th Street, remained in this about fifteen minutes, and thence returned to the Willard Hotel at 7:50 P. M. At about 8:15 P. M., they left the Hotel, proceeding on foot to a park bench at the corner of 15th Street and E Street. A sudden rain came up and the McDONALDS walked on foot to the Drug Store at 14th and Pennsylvania Avenue, and then proceeded back to the Hotel, entering their room. At approximately 8:30 P. II., Subjects entered the lobby and conversed until 10:05 P. M., after which they walked around the block window-shopping, and returned to the Hotel about 10:30 P. M.

During this twenty-four hour period, the Subjects received no external communications or messages and had made no arrangements with the management indicating that they might depart.

Surveillance on July 21, 1941, was maintained by Special Agents CORRIGAN, HALLand O'CONNOR. At 11:05 A. M., the Subject and his wife went to the Cashier's desk at the Willard Hotel, where they paid a \$40.64 balance on their Hotel bill and informed the Cashier that they were intending to remain at the Hotel indefinitely. They thence entered the Childs Restaurant next door to the Willard, which they left at 11:30 A. M., walking East to the Department of Justice

Building. It was ascertained from one of the elevator operators that they had asked for Room 25 . Agent O'COMNOR conferred with Special Agent VAN LANDINGHAM in Mr. ROSEN's office, and he was informed that the Subject and his wife most likely went to the office of Mr. LYONS, Departmental Attorney, in Room 2515. At 12:50 P. M., the McDOMALDS proceeded on foot from the Justice Building to the New House Office Building, where it was ascertained from the Guard on duty that they entered Room 1227, the room of LOUIS C. RABAUT, Congressman from Michigan. At 1:50 P.M., they left this office and proceeded to Room 1416, in the Old House Office Building, which is assigned to Congressman GEORGE D. O'BRIEN. At 1:45 P. H., they proceeded by cab to the Willard and returned to their room. At 6:20 P. M., McDONAID entered the lobby and read a paper until 6:50 P. H., when Mrs. McDONAID entered and sat with him until 7:15 P. M., at which time they walked to the S. & W. Cafeteria, 15th and G Streets, remaining until 7:45 P. M. They then proceeded on foot to Nedick's Orange Juice Stand at 15th and New York Avenue, where they remained until 9:45 P. M., conversing with a gentleman bearing the following description:

They walked with this man to the Washington Hotel, where he left them and they returned to their room at 9:50 P. M.

It was ascertained that the Subjects had received no mail or telegrams during this twenty-feur hour period. However, an individual by the name of FARRELL left a call for the Subjects at 7:00 P. M. on July 21, but did not leave any phone number or address.

Surveillance on July 22, 1941 was conducted by Special Agents McCONNEL, HECKERNAN and CLEMENTS.

The Subjects had left a call for 8:00 A. M. on July 22. At 8:25 A. H., they proceeded to Childs Restaurant and had breakfast, after which they took a cab to the New House Office Building, and entered the office of LOUIS C. RABAUT, Room 1227. The McDONALDS remained in RABAUT's office until 10:20 A. H., when they proceeded to the office of O'BRIEN in the New House Office Building. After remaining fifty minutes, they entered the Capitol Building, where they had lunch in the House of Representatives Dining Room, with an unidentified woman, dressed in a dark blue dress. A more adequate description of this party could not be obtained without endangering the discreetness of this surveillance. At 2:30 P. M., the McDONALDS left the Dining Room and walked through the Capitol, finally proceeding on foot to the Botanical Gardens on the Mall. They remained here a short time and then proceeded on foot to the Millard Hotel, where they arrived at approximately 4:15 P. M. At this time, it was ascertained that a call was made to the Subject's room from Room 427, of the Willard Hotel, occupied by a Mr. S. KAYE, 370 Lexington Avenue, New York City, at 3:30 P. M. It was learned that KAYE is an Attorney from New York, who is in Washington as a Legal Counsel for a radio and newspaper committee. The information concerning KAYE was telephonically furnished to Mr. ROSEN of the Bureau, and at his request, telephonic contact was had with Special Agent ELMER EMRICH, of the New York Office, requesting that KAYE's identity be ascertained. On July 23, 1941, the New York Office telephonically advised that 370 Lexington Avenue was a large office building, with approximately one-hundred tenants, and that inquiry had been made through the Building Superintendent, the Insurance Company and building employees, with negative results. It was further stated that inquiry had been made through the Post Office, and that the New York Telephone Directory listed more than twenty individuals named S. KAYE.

While the Subjects were in their room from 4:15 P. M. until 7:30 P. M., on July 22, 1941, their conversation was of a personal nature, not pertinent to this investigation. At 7:30 P. M., they proceeded on foot to the S. & W. Cafeteria, had dinner, walked to the Defense Display across from the Willard Hotel, and finally returned to their room



at 9:10 P. M. Mrs. McDONALD was heard to use the typewriter and subsequently read the letter to Mr. McDONALD, the only audible sentence of which was "I have been here in Washington ten days and expect to be here another week at least". The addressee of this letter is not known. It was also observed at this time that Mr. McDONALD commented upon the appointment of Senator LUMPKIN to the position formerly occupied by Senator BYRNES of Georgia. At 9:40 P. M., the Subject's walked to the United States Post Office Building, mailed a letter, and returned to their room at 9:55 P. M., and conversation thereafter concerned O'Donnell's Farmhouse, located on the Marlboro Pike, and apparently an eating place. Mrs. McDONALD read the newspaper to Mr. McDONALD, including an editorial concerning the FBI in the District of Columbia. No other activities were observed as the McDONALD's had retired for the night.

Surveillance on July 23, 1941, was conducted by Agents HILL, HELD and MOLLOY. At 9:10 A. M., Subjects had breakfast at Childs Restaurant, after which they proceeded by cab to the Old House Office Building, entering the office of O'BRIEN, at 10:05 A. M. From here, Subject and his wife proceeded to the Capitol Building, which they entered at 11:45 A. M. After killing time in the Capitol, they proceeded to the Willard Hotel, which they entered at 3:55 P. M. At 7:40 P. M., the McDONAIDS proceeded to the S. & W. Cafeteria, had dinner and emerged at 8:10 P. M. They strolled around in the vicinity of 14th and G, finally going to the Defense Exhibit across the street from the Willard Hotel, and after walking around the block, retired to their room at 9:25 P. M. It was ascertained that during this period, the Subjects were in receipt of no messages.

On July 24, 1941, surveillance was maintained by Agents HALL, O'CONNOR and CLEMENTS. At 10:30 A. M., the Mc-DONALDS proceeded from the Hotel to Childs Restaurant, and had breakfast. They then proceeded on foot to the Old House Office Building, entering it at 11:45 A. M., and proceeding to Representative O'BRIEN's office. At 4:50 P. M., they returned to the Willard Hotel by cab. At the desk, they were given a letter from the Desk Clerk, which they reread several times before proceeding to their room. They appeared deeply concerned over



the contents of this letter and in arriving at their room, contacted Congressman O'BRIEN, advising him that they had just received a very important letter from Kansas City, and that the writer had suggested that McDONALD contact O'BRIEN. McDONALD stated that if O'BRIEN intended to be in his office, he would immediately proceed there by cab. At 5:05 P. M., the Subjectsproceeded by cab to O'BRIEN's office, where they remained until 5:40 P. M., returning by cab to the Willard. On arriving in their room, it was ascertained that McDONALD conversed with Captain JOHN F. RHODES, whose office is located at 2500 Fidelity Building, Kansas City, Missouri. RHODES inquired of McDONALD, as to whether he had been able to get someone to sign his bond, to which McDONALD replied that he did not know. RHODES also made inquiry concerning a piece of property, inquiring as to who had made the appraisal of same. McDONALD advised that he would write a letter to RHODES, mailing it that night, which would give full information. It appeared that RHODES was a surety on McDONALD's bond and was insisting on a second real estate surety. During the course of this conversation, the name of Associate Justice BLACK was mentioned.

Immediately following this conversation, Mrs. Mc-DONALD typed a letter to Captain RHODES, in which she described a piece of property as having an estimated value of \$55,000. This figure was arrived at from an appraisal made in 1937 and after taking into consideration the increased value of timber on the property, the fact that some timber had been removed and the fact that about one mile of the property fronted on a lake and had recently increased in value. At 7:15 P. M., the Subjects proceeded to the Post Office and mailed this letter, thence proceeded to the S. & W. Cafeteria. At 8:05 P. H., the Subjects entered Loew's Capitol Theatre, and returned to the Hotel at 11:10 P. M.

Surveillance on July 25, 1941, was conducted by Agents BLAIR, HECKERMAN and CORRIGAN. At 9:42 A. M., McDONALD entered the lobby, where he was joined at 10:00 A. M. by !irs. McDONALD, and they both proceeded to the Childs Restaurant, for breakfast. They then proceeded by cab to the Post Office Building, where they mailed a letter, continuing in the same taxi to the Old House Office Building, where they entered the

office of Congressman O'BRIEN. At 1:10 P. M., the McDONALDS. walked through the Capitol grounds and then returned by cab to the Willard Hotel, arriving at 2:00 P. M. They remained in their room until 6:10 P. M., at which time they mailed another letter at the Post Office Building, and then proceeded on foot to the S. & W. Cafeteria, where they ate dinner. At 7:15 P. M., they proceeded to the Defense Exhibit, across from the Willard, remaining until 9:15 P. M., after which they proceeded to Neddick's and drank some orange juice. At 9:50 P.M., they entered their room and engaged in no further activity. During this period, the Subjects received no mail or phone calls.

Surveillance on July 26, 1941, was conducted by Agents MOLLOY, REAMY and HILL. McDONALD and his wife left the Hotel at 10:15 A. M., had breakfast at Childs Restaurant, and then proceeded to the Old House Office Building, where they remained until 12:25 P.M. They left there and proceeded to the National Museum, entering at 12:50 P. M., and returning to the Willard at 2:00 P. M., after which they went to their room. Mrs. McDONALD shopped from 4:15 P. M. to 4:50 P. M., while McDONALD remained in the room. At 6:15 P. M., the Mc-DONALDS had dinner at the S. & W. Cafeteria, and returned to the Hotel at 7:45 P. M. At 8:05 P. M., they watched a street dance for service men, returning to the Hotel at 11:30 P. M. It was ascertained that Subject and his wife conversed with a man concerning the work that Mr. LOUIS WABAUT was doing for them in their case. RABAUT remarked that a Mr. LYONS had planned to study the case, as he considered it very interesting and that it was his opinion that the case would be brought up before the Judiciary Committee and that this Committee desired further investigation in view of the circumstances. This man further stated that they were interested primarily in seeing that justice was dealt on the matter.

Sources at the Hotel revealed that the McDONALDS were planning to leave Washington on the 27th or 28th of July, intending to return to Grand Rapids, Michigan. Subject and his wife were known to have made remarks, the substance of which was to the effect that they had seen many politicians in Washington and had put on a big act for them. It was

learned that JOHN F. RHODES of Kansas City had unsuccessfully attempted to contact the McDONALDS and that the Subject had extended his credit with the Hotel by another \$100. Subject also received a Special Delivery letter on July 27, 1941, the substance of which dealt with his bond.

Surveillance during July 27, 1941, was conducted by agents HALL, STROM and CLEMENTS. At 11:00 A. M., McDONALD entered the lobby, where he was joined by his wife at 11:10 A. M., and they then proceeded to Childs Restaurant for breakfast. At 11:35 A. M., they attended Church services at St. Patrick's Church, returning to the Willard at 1:00 P. H. McDONALD remained in the lobby while his wife ascended to their room, rejoining him at 1:15 P. M. At about 1:45 P. M., Subjects returned to their room, and entered a conversation regarding whether or not they should proceed to Detroit or Chicago by train. McDON/LD stated that if they went to Detroit, it would be necessary for them to double back to Chicago to pick up their car. He also made several statements regarding the possible purchase of a car. At 2:00 P. H., McDONALD descended to the lobby, where he sat until 3:15 P. M., returning to his room. After discussing various trains, the McDONALDS left their room at 4:00 P. M., proceeded to the S. & W. Cafeteria, and on finding that it was closed, returned to Childs Restaurant to eat. At 4:55 P. M., the McDONALDS walked to the Greyhound Bus Station at 12th and New York Avenue, and inquired concerning buses to Chicago, Detroit and Flint, particularly in regard to a bus leaving at 3:15 P. M., and proceeding by way of the Pennsylvania Turnpike to Chicago. At 5:35 P. M., Subjects returned to the Hotel and loitered in the lobby until 6:30 P. M. At 7:50 P. M., they crossed the street to the National Defense Exhibit returning to their room at 9:00 P. M., and retiring at 11:00 P. M. They left a call for 8:00 A. M. on July 28, 1941.

Surveillance on July 28, 1941, was conducted by Agents CORRIGAN, HECKERMAN and O'COMMOR. At 9:40 A. H., the McDONALDS proceeded to Childs Restaurant and had breakfast. They then boarded a cab and went to the office of Congressman LOUIS C. RABAUT. At 11:10 A. M., they crossed the street to the Old House Office Building, and entered the office of

Representative O'BRIEN, returning by cab to the Willard Hotel at 12:15 P. M. After remaining in their room, they entered Whelan's Drug Store across from the Willard Hotel, at 2:10 P. M., returning to their room at 3:00 P. M., and staying until 6:15 P. M. At 6:55 P. M., the Subjects had dinner at the S. & W. Cafeteria, and thence proceeded to the Defense Exhibit, remaining until 10:15 P. M. After having a drink at a local Drug Store, they retired at 11:45 P.M., leaving a call for 8:00 P. M., on July 29, 1941. It was ascertained that the Subjects were contacted by Mrs. MARKER WILLEBRANDT, with offices in the Shoreham Building, as a result of which they delayed their departure for another day.

Surveillance on July 29, 1941, was conducted by Special Agents McCONNEL, HILL, and MOLLOY. Mrs. McDONALD left the Hotel at 10:10 A. M., and had breakfast, joining Mr. McDONALD at the Hotel at 11:30 A. M., and remaining in the room with him until 12:40 P. H. At this time, they proceeded to the Credit Manager's desk, paid their bill, and checked out. They then had lunch at the S. & W. Cafeteria, after having requested the management to pick up their baggage at 2:00 P. II. At 2:25 P. II., they returned to the Hotel, picked up their baggage and proceeded to the Greyhound Bus Terminal, at 12th and New York Avenue, where McDONALD purchased two tickets for Grand Rapids, Michigan, via Greyhound Bus. They remained in the Bus Terminal until 3:00 P. M., at which time they boarded Express Bus No. 1137, known as the Potonac Express which is routed to Pittsburgh by way of the Pennsylvania Turnpike. The bus left the City at 3:20 P. II., and surveillance on the trip to Pittsburgh was maintained by Agents HILL and McCONNEL. The bus arrived at Pittsburgh at 11:40 P. Minere surveillance was taken over by Agents MATTHEWS and DANAMAY, of the Pittsburgh Office.

Conversations of McDONALD and his wife on the bus trip to Pittsburgh are not deemed relevant and are not being included in this report.

lir. AL ROSEN, of the Bureau, was advised of the departure of the McDONALDS from the District, and he advised that telephonic communication should be had with the Pitts-burgh Division, in order that this surveillance could be

maintained. Full facts of this matter, including physical descriptions of both Subjects, was transmitted telephonically to Special Agent D. DeLILLO of the Pittsburgh Field Division, who advised that he was familiar with the background of this case, inasmuch as these parties had passed through Pittsburgh on their way East.

On August 4, 1941, Special Agent GRILL, of the Bureau, advised the Washington Field Office, that on July 25, 1941, an order was entered in the Circuit Court of Appeals, giving Subject fifteen days to file a \$10,000 bond and that if he filed this bond, the stay of the mandate would extend another fifteen days. Consequently, McDONALD has a total period of thirty days from July 25, 1941, within which time he can file for a Writ of Certiorari with the United States Supreme Court. Mr. GRILLE suggested that a discreet inquiry be made of the Clerk of the Supreme Court, so that this office could be advised promptly in the event Subject files for a Writ of Certiorari. He requested that this matter be handled most discreetly, so that there would be no possibility of any publicity being given to the fact that the Federal Bureau of Investigation is conducting any investigation relative to this matter. Mr. GRILLE further requested that any additional information concerning McDONALD's attempted contacts with Senator VANDENBERG should be forwarded to the Bureau, but no additional information has been disclosed during this surveillance.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent N. A. TAYLOR.

It was ascertained from the files of this case at the United States Supreme Court that no further action has been taken in the matter. Contact was had with E. P. CULLINAN, Assistant Clerk, who stated that it was not possible for him to assume the responsibility of following the case from day to day and notify the Washington Field Office, because of the large volume of work, which right cause him to overlook the filing of the petition. He suggested that frequent contact be had with Assistant Clerk CARL D. ZIMERIAN or Deputy Clerk H. B. WILLEY,



in order to determine as soon as possible when this paper would be filed. Accordingly, arrangements have been made to frequently contact these people, to learn when the paper in question is filed, and this will be done until approximately September 1, 1941, when the thirty days has expired.

Following the departure of the McDONALDS from the Willard Hotel, it was ascertained that they received the following telegram at 10:58 P. M. on July 30, 1941, from Marenisco, Michigan:

"Job will be completed, weather permitting, Friday night. Will forward final scale at that time. Need money badly. Please wire me \$400 immediately.

The above entitled case has been carried as pending in the Cincinnati Office for a good many months, since the office of origin in the case was changed to the Cincinnati Office. The change was made for administrative purposes in view of the fact that Assistant Director E. J. CONNELLEY was at that time Special Agent in Charge of the Cincinnati Office and was in direct charge of the entire investigation.

There are no leads pending in the Cincinnati District and indictments are outstanding in St. Paul, as outlined in the report of Special Agent BLAKE G. KENEALLY, St. Paul, Minn., dated April 14, 1941. Other investigation pending in connection with this case relates to CASSIUS MoDONALD, who was released from the Penitentiary on a writ of habeas corpus and is presently at liberty pending a final determination of a ruling on the writ granted to CASSIUS by the lower Court.

The only subject not apprehended in connection with this case is Dr. JOSEPH P. MORAN and it is indicated in the file that MORAN no doubt was murdered by other subjects in this case at Toledo, Ohio, this information being furnished by EDMA MURRAY and VOLNEY PAVIS, who furnished reliable information concerning the investigation of this case.
