
Just a few lines to tell you for myself what every patriotic and law-abiding American citizen must feel in regard to the capture of Karpis.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I am in receipt of your letter of April 30th requesting information as to my rank and duties both prior and subsequent to my attendance at the FBI Police Training School.

As you know, this is a small Department with but twenty-two men, and naturally since I was already a Lieutenant there could be no promotion. My duties before attendance were of a supervisory nature and still are. But my salary when compared to police salaries paid elsewhere is very good, and I am well satisfied.

Because of our size, it is impractical to conduct a full-time training school, yet I am working on an outline of study for regular staff meetings which is the nearest approach to a training school we can have. However, the men are interested and I think it will be very valuable. We are starting a Police Library, and we hope to make it a fine one.

Again I want to thank you for the opportunity you gave me to attend the training school, and for your kindly interest in all of us. On the way home, several of us on the train were talking and were all struck by the fact that of all the police officials in the country, you were the first and only real leader behind whom we could all rally.

And I want to congratulate the FBI for its capture of Alvin Karpis. Also for your remark to newspaper men that Public Enemy Number One is politics.

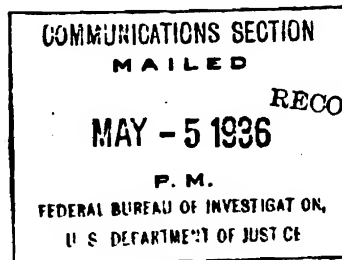

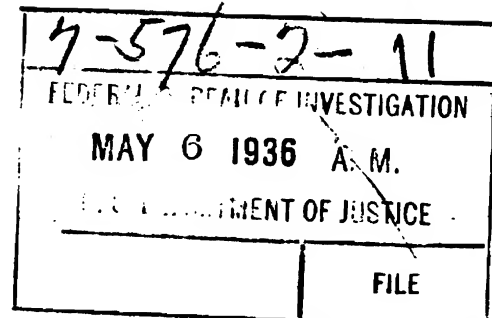

Even among fellow criminals, Alvin Karpis was known as a thoroughly bad egg. The underworld dubbed him "Old Creepy" because in any gathering of the criminal clans he spread nervousness and fear. His finger itched when it was wrapped around a trigger, and murder was only part of the day's work.

A Lithuanian from the back alleys and rat holes of West Side Chicago, he graduated from small time burglary to the top ranks of crime when he formed an alliance with the notorious Barker gang which worked out of St. Paul, then the poison spot of the United States. "Ma" Barker, the Fury who dominated in the councils, made a "pet" of Karpis: his courage was cold, his nerve like steel, his daring beyond question, his love of shooting officers of the law a passion, his instinct for crime amounted to genius—all these vicious traits endeared him to the sinister matron of violence.

Burglary, bank robbery, kidnapping and murder are listed on Karpis's record. The Department of Justice, empowered with new writs from anti-criminal legislation passed by the Congress in the last three years, broke up the Barker gang, sending the members to death or the penitentiary for long stretches.

But Karpis remained elusive. For three years the Bureau of Investigation has been following him, tracing every lead, running down every clue. Once he was surrounded in a small hotel in Atlantic City but shot his way to safety. Rumors placed him in the Middle West, in Oklahoma, and a short while ago in Massachusetts.

On Friday night the G-men caught up with him in New Orleans. With flawless technique, he was taken alive, despite predictions that only a bullet could stop him. Public Enemy No. One now has a rendezvous with his fate.

To the FBI, all praise and credit! Infinite patience and dogged determination have won. Every honest man felt that sooner or later the G-men would capture Karpis, dead or alive. The underworld has learned by this time that Uncle Sam cannot be beaten: he gets his man.

End of the Road

Ebullient Mr. Zioncheck, member of Congress and lawyer in private life, objected a few days ago to Federal expenditure on the Department of Justice's Bureau of Criminal Investigation. More sensible House colleagues promptly approved the budget for that department. To prove the point, J. Edgar Hoover's deadly G-men roped in Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. One, in New Orleans Friday. That particular public menace, facing numerous charges from murder

to bank robbery, is on his way to death or life imprisonment.

With the capture of Karpis the Government has broken up a group responsible for heavy loss in life and property. But for the Hoover force, it is safe to say that finis could not be written on that costly record. The limitations on State law enforcement at its best and the all too frequent inefficiency of localized public protection, have failed and are still failing to put a stop to the activities of such criminals as Karpis. In the long run, the criminal usually comes to the end of his rope; crime does not pay and has never paid, but it can and does cost the peaceable public while it is going on.

The comparative rapidity with which the Federal force is overtaking and finishing up with criminals of the Karpis type is striking. Under the fugitive-from-justice rule involving State borders, the criminal places himself in Federal jeopardy as soon as he quits the State where he has actually committed his crime.

The criminal investigation force under J. Edgar Hoover has proved its value and has given a rich return on every dollar of investment Congress has put into it.

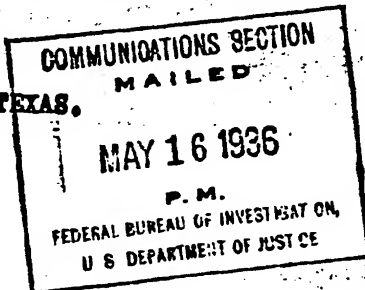

Other Public Enemies

Killer Karpis, public enemy No. 1, having been taken alive without a shot, William Mahan, the Weyerhauser kidnaper, assumes the uneasy crown as his successor.

The Karpis capture sheds new luster on the Justice Department's capable agents, known as the G-men. One after another the big shots of America's gangdom have crumpled under their unrelenting drive. Seldom has this country seen such efficiency as J. Edgar Hoover's Federal policemen are displaying.

This sensational record for crime detection only emphasizes more glaringly the weaknesses in our law-enforcement system that make much of their work futile. We refer particularly to our medieval reformatories and prisons where young men are schooled in crime, to the misuse of the "unwalled prisons" or probation and parole, to the social sinkholes where lawlessness spawns.

Karpis was an alumnus of both a high school and college of crime. At 16 he was sentenced to 10 years in a reformatory for stealing auto tires. There he is said to have learned safe-cracking and other arts of his craft. In Kansas State Penitentiary he was tutored by one of the criminal sons of "Ma" Kate Barker, specialists in robbery, kidnapping and murder.

It was after he was paroled, however, that he made his reputation. Facing a four-year sentence in 1931 for burglary, he was paroled by a kindly, but misguided, Oklahoma judge. A month later he had committed a murder and was well along on his career as bank robber, kidnaper and killer.

Karpis, it happened, was not a child of the American city slums, but most of his fraternity are—and with them he fraternized. No program of crime suppression will succeed that does not deal with the things that go with extreme poverty — malnourishment, illiteracy, child neglect, the hovels and tenements that millions of families must call homes. It is an amazing paradox that the Federal arm may reach unhindered into states and cities, there to detect and capture criminals; but when this same Federal arm seeks to improve those social conditions in states and cities that grow the seeds of crime it is estopped by the courts as an unconstitutional invasion of states' rights.

The Capture

Of Alvin Karpis

The G-men have scored again in their fight on crime. Alvin Karpis, the most-sought criminal in the country, has been captured, and without the firing of a shot, though he is said to have boasted that he "wouldn't be taken alive." So perfectly planned and executed was the federal agents' descent upon Karpis, under the personal direction of J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Department of Investigation, Karpis did not have a chance to make a show of resistance.

Karpis, wanted in connection with two sensational kidnappings, a mail train robbery and the slaying of a Missouri sheriff, was the last on the list of the more notorious criminals who were the special objects of the G-men's activities in the last two or three years. Now he and one of his men, Fred Hunter, have been overtaken by the same relentless forces who have put an end to the criminal careers of John Dillinger, "Pretty Boy" Floyd, "Baby Face" Nelson and scores of other criminals.

There is not now remaining at large a single criminal of such notoriety as Dillinger, Floyd, Nelson or Karpis. But of course there are always criminals to be captured, and it is announced that now William Mahan has moved to the top of the federal agents' "wanted" list.

The capture of Karpis comes with special timeliness in view of the criticism which was recently directed against the federal agents in Congress. A few representatives and senators sought to make a considerable reduction in the appropriation for the federal agents, and in their arguments they belittled the accomplishments of the G-men. The great majority in Congress are aware, however, as the American public is aware, of the great good that the federal agents have done, and the full appropriation was voted. The capture of Karpis, coming just at this time, is a vindication of the judgment of those members of Congress who stood up for the G-men.

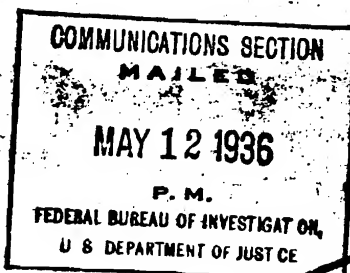

Dear Mr. Hoover: -

The sudden death of [REDACTED] took me to Washington on the following day.

I suppose that, my interest in fingerprints began as a result of my early association with these persons, and many other Cornell friends in the Cosmos Club. At any rate, I did experimental work with finger and palm impressions, made at that time on paper smoked over burning camphor, and fixed afterward with a solution of thin varnish.

Much water has flowed under the Brooklyn Bridge since then, and the first fingerprint officially made in a file in September 1902, was indirectly the result of these studies in Washington.

After my necessary tasks had been accomplished, I went with my Cornell room-mate of 1880 [REDACTED] a lawyer for forty years in the U.S. Patent Office, to call upon you in the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I was sorry to find that you were not in your office, but, thanks to the kindness of Mr. C. E. Kleinkauf, who I believe, is one of your Secretaries, my friend and I were shown every possible courtesy. We were put in charge of Mr. Aaron Kohn and Mr. H. C. Douglas. We ultimately wound up in the Pistol Range. I did not learn the name of the gentleman in charge of that department, and will be glad if you will send it to me. He did some excellent target practice, and was kind enough to let me try his Colt 38. I am not familiar with sawed-off shot guns or "Tommy Guns", but I did find his Colt an old friend. Some twenty-five years ago, when I was the Surgeon-Major of the 13th Regiment Coast Artillery, I made a score of thirteen bulls eyes out of fifteen shots, on the standard target, at a distance of seventy-five yards. I fear my hand is not as steady as it once was, but I did hit the target with every shot; much to my surprise.

I was much interested in the machine - which is a marvel - for automatically separating the enormous number of "one over one" cards.

Then my own fingerprints were taken on one of your standard Record Cards with the colorless ink on properly sensitized paper. In order that my personal card may be complete, I am enclosing a photograph recently taken at my desk.

I have visited Police Headquarters in Christiania, Stockholm, St. Petersburg, Moscow, Warsaw, Munich, Dresden, Berlin, Paris, Glasgow and New Scotland Yard. Never before, have I seen any thing in this line approaching your own offices in Washington. The lighting, the arrangement, the equipment and the quiet efficiency of the entire staff whom I saw, and with whom I had in personal contact, is far superior to any which I have seen elsewhere. will ultimately come, and as I hope in the not distant future, when universal finger-printing will be established in our own country, as it is in the Argentine. You have been the moving spirit in this Department of such National importance, and I offer you my sincere congratulations.

To the four gentlemen whose names I have mentioned or referred to, I would like to send a copy of my little book on: "The Evolution of Dactyloscopy in the United States". I will appreciate it if you will send me their names, so that I may be sure of spelling them correctly.

The lecture which I recently gave before a social group, aroused considerable attention. If you care to send me one of your Ink Pads, and one of the Fingered Clips for holding the card on the table; from time to time I will be glad to take fingerprints in my office and forward them to you, to add to your enormous and rapidly growing file of non-criminal Personal Identification Records.

Recent newspaper accounts of the capture of a gangster named Karpis, in New Orleans, would seem to indicate that, you should add another feather of unusual size, to your cap.

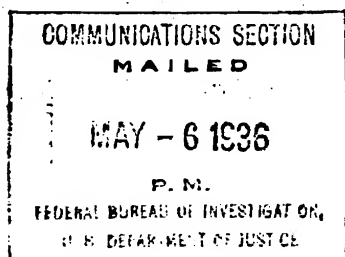

Killer Led 33 Gunmen In Rampage Over U.S.

Gang's Toll Shows 10 Killed; 15 in Prison;
7 Awaiting Trial; 1 Fugitive; 11
Murders to Be Answered

By Walter Biscup

CRIME'S cancer—Alvin Karpis—has been removed.

A plague to law enforcement during the last six years, this diseased killer, extortionist and bandit led a merciless group of homicidists through the nation, leaving in his fearful wake the victims of 11 murders and pocketing \$1,079,200 in blood money!

These proceeds came from lawless enterprises as far flung as the state boundaries which the mob crossed with impunity.

The Karpis gang unhesitatingly plied its cruel activities in city as well as hamlet; in day and night; with craftiness and foolhardiness; against the strong as well as the weak.

It had only one motivating power—the warped brain of the 27-year-old menace who murdered because he found it convenient and who robbed because he was a born criminal.

Karpis, whose cruelty ranged from calmly sticking an ice pick through a victim's heart to clubbing a wanton woman who begged for the price of her shame, had long lived on borrowed time.

He saw duplicity and loyalty in his ranks and he also saw its decimation by bullets and prison sentences.

His own momentum kept him hopping from crime to crime; state to state and hide-out to hide-out. He knew all the angles and all the answers except the most trite one—that he could not evade the retributive law which was as exacting as the destiny he blindly followed.

The ominous shadow of this lethal crew crept into every section of the country and menaced the security of

scores of banks. The tremendous maze of the Karpis criminal activities so firmly woven into the fabric of today's mid and southwestern social order will probably never be untangled.

Desperate Mob.

During a recent visit to Tulsa J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the federal bureau of investigation, department of justice, who led the government officers when they apprehended Karpis in New Orleans, said this:

"The Karpis mob is undoubtedly the shrewdest, most desperate gang of outlaws within recent years."

His appraisal was not based on snap judgment. At the time he had a dossier of the gang's activities and it had violated every human law and every moral law.

Hoover, as every other officer, had vividly etched in his own mind the picture of Karpis—the man America's underworld named "Creepy"—the man whose character had been cast in the mold of manevolence.

At various times the mob had a personnel of 34 criminals who were finished specialists in the field of lawlessness.

Ranged Far.

The gang at some time or other had operated in Tulsa, Chicago, Okmulgee, Oklahoma City, Hutchinson, Kan., Topeka, Kan., Lebo, Kan., Herington, Kan., St. Paul, Atlantic City, Philadelphia, West Plains, Mo., West St. Paul.

Webster, Wis., Claremore, Cleveland, Ohio, Allentown, Pa., Pittsburgh, Chester, Pa., Detroit, Dayton, Ohio, Kansas City, Mo., Muskogee, Casper, Wyo., Porter, Okla., Pawhuska, Coffeyville, Kan., Pampa, Texas, McClintockville, Pa., Kemp City, Texas, Ranger, Texas, Long Beach, Cal., Neosho, Mo., Sapulpa, Wichita, Kan., Oklawaha, Fla., Minneapolis, Evanston, Ill., and New Orleans.

What sort of a man or character was able to wield a gang of marauders into such a compact group that it could steal more than one million dollars?

Patriots will point with pride and view with alarm that Karpis was of foreign extraction. This point of nativity is unimportant, however, since the Karpis ranks were filled with willing members who were not foreign-born.

Joseph Karpavicz, who apparently has no criminal record, is the father of the notorious and until Friday the nation's public enemy No. 1.

Karpavicz and his wife left their Lithuanian farm and immigrated to Canada in the late eighties. Shortly after the turn of the century they moved to Kansas, and settled near Topeka. Karpavicz changed his name to Karpis as a matter of convenience.

A boy was born to the Karpis family in 1908. They named him Raymond Alvin Karpis. The lad's boyhood was no better and no worse than that of his Topeka playmate. Of interest is the fact that the notorious killer was once a marble champion in Topeka.

Before his seventeenth birthday, Karpis took his first faltering step along the highroad of crime. He was caught in a Jackson county, Kan., burglary and was sent to the Hutchinson, Kan., reformatory February 25, 1926. He escaped soon after.

The family then separated.

Joseph Karpis and his wife moved to Chicago and lived at 3010 Addison street. One sister, Mrs. A. E. Grooms, lived at 1234 Monroe street in Topeka. Another sister, Mrs. P. T. Newbold, lived at 108 North Francisco street in Chicago.

During the next three years young Karpis lived the life of a typical underworld "punk" who hovered at the fringe of various midwestern and southwestern mobs. Before he had attained his legal majority he definitely selected a life of crime.

He came to Tulsa early in 1931 and drifted to the West Tulsa boarding house operated by Mrs. Kate (Ma) Barker, an old crone who had already nurtured four sons into criminal careers. Ma Barker found Karpis a willing disciple who accepted her encouragement and advice. He and Fred Barker became accomplices in a series of burglaries and robberies here.

On May 23, 1931, Tulsa police received a tip that a group of outlaws was hiding at an apartment at 6 East Haskell street. The house was raided but the suspects escaped in

the ensuing gun battle. They abandoned their automobile. Officers found several bullet holes in the car had been plugged with putty.

Karpis Convicted.

A week later Karpis and Barker were arrested at Okmulgee and charged with the burglary of a Henryetta jewelry store. The evidence against Barker was insufficient so he was released but placed in custody at Claremore. He escaped from the Claremore jail soon after.

Karpis was convicted of the burglary and received a four-year sentence in Okmulgee county district court. After serving a year of this term in the state prison at McAlester he was given a parole. From that day until the time of his arrest Karpis was never in custody.

Karpis, Ma Barker, Fred Barker and Arthur (Doc) Barker then established their headquarters at St. Paul. Karpis became ambitious and felt irked at the dictatorial command which Ma Barker maintained over their operations.

Karpis had already tired of looting village banks. He was ready for the "big-time" crime. Frank Nash, later killed in the Kansas City union station massacre, met Karpis and Fred Barker in St. Paul and gave them the necessary contacts which enabled them to establish a working connection with Jimmy Keating and Tom Holden, two major bank robbers who had recently moved from Chicago after severing their relationship with the Al Capone interests.

From then on, Karpis took the lead and his gang spread terror through the midwest with their robberies, kidnappings, burglaries and murders.

Evidence shows that on several occasions the Karpis mob had interlocking interests with the John Dillinger and Touhy gangs and often exchanged members who were better suited for the crimes at hand.

During 1933, 1934 and 1935 the Karpis mob actually hit its stride. Officers would occasionally pick off some minor member and this eventually led to the arrest of more important workers in the mob. As the gang's strength increased, dissatisfaction reared up in its councils.

Escaped Fatal Fight.

Ma Barker finally decided to sever her ties and moved to Oklawaha, Fla. She took Freddie Barker with her. This upset Karpis, who had considered Barker his most invaluable aid. Harry Campbell, a proficient burglar, who once operated in Tulsa, was high in the ranks of the mob then. He argued that Barker's help could not be dispensed with.

Karpis and Campbell decided to make the trip to Florida and ask Barker to rejoin them. They failed in this, bought a new automobile at Miami and left.

The next day, January 16, 1935, department of justice agents stormed the Barker home and after a furious gun battle which lasted an hour, captured the establishment.

Barker and his mother were both dead—each had been hit eight times. Ma Barker, who began her mature life as a street corner psalm singer in Kansas City, Mo., ended it with a bloody machine gun clutched against her ample bosom.

If Karpis and Campbell had postponed their trip by 12 hours they also would have been killed. This uncanny luck has been the most important factor in enabling the two

to avoid arrest for so long.

Karpis, Campbell and their female camp followers, Dolores Delaney and Winona Burdette, moved to Atlantic City. A patrolman's suspicions prompted officers to raid their rooms.

Karpis and Campbell, clad in underwear, escaped amidst a fusillade of machine gun bullets and gas bombs. With customary chivalry they left their molls behind. Both were arrested.

Dolores Delaney, 19 years old, two weeks later, on February, 1935, gave birth to a boy in a Philadelphia hospital. She proudly said Karpis was the father of the baby. The nation's crime scourge was too busy dodging death and arrest to send a layette to his son.

Hundreds of unverified stories were circulated regarding Karpis' movements. By this time his status as a public enemy apparently warranted the customary legends which attach themselves to figures in the spotlight.

became voluble during his doped-out revelries. The mob wanted to kill him. It was agreeable to Karpis. Miller was put on the spot on the outskirts of Detroit. Officers found the bullet-riddled body trussed with wire. An ice pick had been impaled through Miller's heart. It was Karpis' gesture of scorn to a man who had already been murdered.

Then there was Dr. Joseph F. Moran of Chicago. He served a malpractice term in the Joliet, Ill., prison seven years ago and afterwards attached himself to Chicago's underworld.

Karpis and Campbell decided to have their fingerprints obliterated in March, 1934. They commissioned Moran to do the job and paid him \$1,000. They remained in bed for 11 days in a Chicago north side hideout. Moran knew that the cut finger tips would heal in time and the prints would never change. Neither Karpis nor Campbell knew it.

Moran then made Miller's mistake. When in his cups he boasted of the fact that Karpis and Campbell were chumps to pay him \$1,000 for a futile operation. Calling Karpis a chump was equivalent to signing a death warrant. This Moran did.

He was "taken for a ride" and incidentally was the first person to be "taken for a ride" in a motorboat. The mob killed him in a boat and dumped his weighted body into Lake Michigan.

Last November 32 a Karpis echo was heard in district court when Mrs. Dorothy Slayman Karpis divorced him. She said she met him in a Tulsa night club in 1931 and married him after he told her he was a jewelry salesman. He deserted her that winter and she has never seen him since.

Karpis has twice appeared before courts.

No impression was made on him. He is as unimpressed before the tribunal of his conscience.

He will probably remain that way—whether the remainder of his life is spent in Alcatraz prison or whether he marches to the gallows.

Officers Near Karpis.

G-men, sifting truth from rumor, act from fiction, were slowly closing in on Karpis. The net was being inevitably drawn closer.

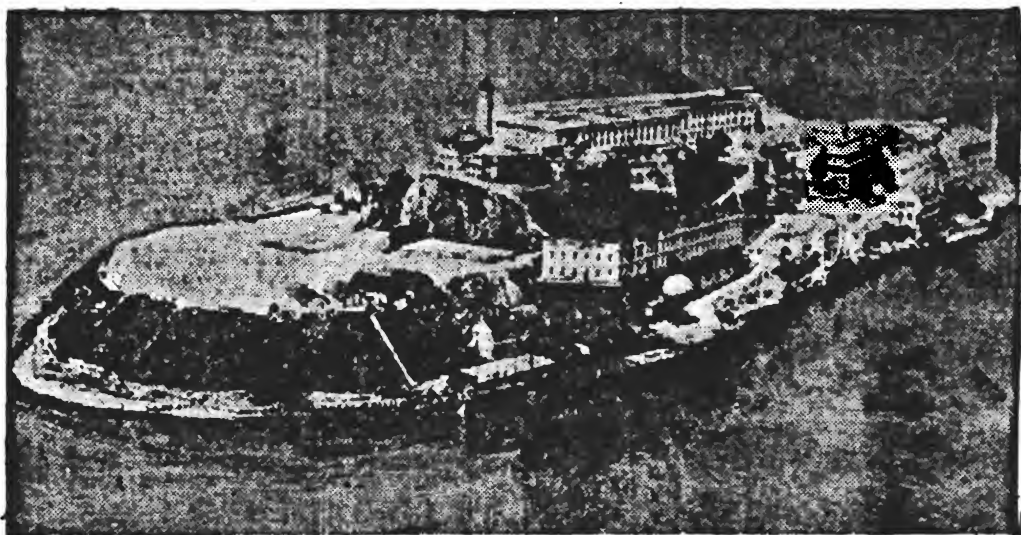
Intimate details of Karpis were whispered in various hideouts. Three stand out in strong relief because they accurately typify the career of this arch criminal.

When a Chicago prostitute asked Karpis for the pittance she said was her due, he whipped out his pistol and clubbed her into insensibility. He reached in her stocking top and took her small roll of bills. In his pockets he then had more than \$20,000 in "hot money."

Associates of Frank Nash contacted Karpis to obtain the services of a proficient killer for use in the Kansas City station when they planned to liberate Nash who was being taken to Leavenworth, Kan., prison. Karpis furnished Verne Miller, the former South Dakota sheriff, who turned bandit and killer. Miller did his share in the station slaughtering.

Miller made his mistake when he

EXPERT MAN-HUNTERS

THE long, crooked trail has practically ended for ALVIN KARPIS. Gratification over the capture of one of the last and worst of the gangsters who were so dangerously active and so plentiful a few years ago, must be mingled with approval for the federal agents. The gangster and his associates, knowing of other captures and slayings and knowing how determined the officers were to make the capture of the biggest rat still moving around, were very careful. Under all the circumstances, it is remarkable that the federal agents were able to move across the country on a call from New Orleans and to accomplish the job without bloodshed! It is remarkable there was not a "leak" somewhere.

Three years ago the criminal tide was running high. There seemed to be little prospect of subduing the kidnapers, murderers and bank robbers, all of whom had many protectors and many advantages. The formidable protection of gangsters has been effectually broken down. Kidnaping has been made so hazardous that it is rarely attempted now. Crime of the smaller sorts may be on the increase, but the major crimes, wherever and whenever they come within the purview of the G-men, are usually solved. It is not, of course, done by superhuman cunning or by luck or magic; it is done through the use of common sense, enormous industry and the use of scientific methods. It costs a great deal of money, but the country is highly pleased; it is spending which brings results. Had this country remained the criminals' bonanza it appeared to be in 1933, it would probably have reached anarchy by this time. The modern man-hunters of the better type are doing admirable work for all of us. The capture of Karpis was a particularly fine and important piece of work.

It is now announced that the last of the O'MALLEY gang is in captivity, and that the kidnaping cases are all practically finished, except for the inevitable capture of ALVIN KARPIS. New York police succeeded in dragging the king of gangsters, LUCIANO, out of his protected area in Arkansas to New York for trial. It seems that the sob-sisters and infantile statesmen and bull-headed governors are not doing so well with their sloppy aid to gangsters these days.

Failure of pee-wee attempts to cripple the G-men force must be a severe disappointment to gangsters and their congressional sympathizers.

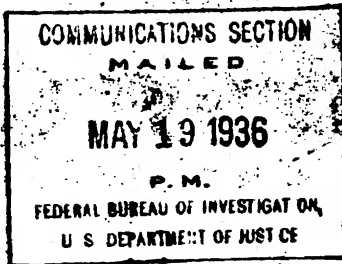

Public Enemies do Not Deserve Mercy

THE smooth, precise manner in which the efficient J. Edgar Hoover and his men trapped the criminal, Karpis, in New Orleans is enough to make citizens glow with pride over the effectiveness of their federal bureau of investigation.

Nothing is more comforting than the knowledge, supported by visible performance, that one department of government is dedicated to the protection of the citizen, his home and his property.

And nothing is more discomfoting than the knowledge, supported by the records, that, at the same time, other departments of government are handling their public trust in such loose fashion as to endanger the safety of the citizen, his home and his property.

A disgraceful, sentiment-guided clemency system that blankets the United States is responsible for a crime condition that challenges the people of America.

There was absolutely no excuse for crime-warped Alvin Karpis to run loose up and down the nation at the head of a mob that murdered police officers and made big-time profits out of burglary, bank robbery and kidnaping. For Alvin Karpis showed his criminal tendency when he was a lanky lad of 16 under arrest in Topeka, Kan., for petty theft. He was sent to the state reformatory, from which he escaped. After a year of liberty he was rearrested and returned to the reformatory. He was transferred to the state penitentiary after knives were found in his possession. While in prison he and another hoodlum plotted a jewel robbery to be staged in Henryetta, Okla.

The record of Karpis should have been enough to keep him in prison. But he was paroled. The robbery at Henryetta was carried out. Karpis was caught but his companion was not. Karpis was sentenced to serve four years in Oklahoma's state prison. But he did not do this time. After three months in the Okmulgee county jail he was paroled by the trial judge. This known prison breaker and convicted thief was turned loose to prey upon the people who were contributing regularly to the support of prisons and courts and who had a right to feel they were being protected from dangerous criminals.

In the federal bureau of investigation at Washington there is a single fingerprint section devoted to the worst 12,600 of the nation's public enemies. The records show that more than 3,500 of these desperate men and women have at some time felt the angelic mercy of parole or probation or pardon or some form of sob sister clemency.

Congratulations to Mr. Hoover for at last cornering Bad-man Karpis, who never should have been at large. Condemnation to those who granted Karpis liberty and wished him god-speed after he revealed his criminal bent so clearly. And this warning to everybody: Unless restrictions are drawn more tightly around clemency, you or some member of your family or your home or your property soon may be the victim of a criminal out on parole.

I hope these enclosures will be of some assistance to you.

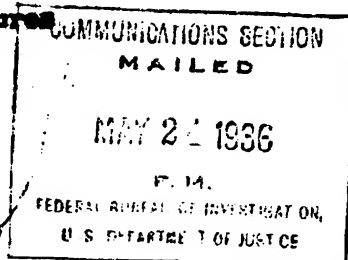

ALVIN KARPIS—"Old Creepy" to the underworld—yields his rank as Public Enemy No. 1 to a successor, as yet unnamed. Karpis' capture by federal agents in New Orleans marks another important victory for the "G-men" and increases the public's confidence in that branch of the national government.

Criminals like Karpis have revealed the impotence of local authority. The underworld knows no state boundaries. A dangerous gangster can move faster than state or local police. If they kill or capture him, luck is on their side, and their work is more a matter of circumstance than of well-organized effort. A man of Karpis' caliber has the odds on his side unless a nation-wide manhunt can be organized against him. That is what Director J. Edgar Hoover of the department of justice bureau of investigation did, and it was certain to bring results sooner or later.

Another decade of the federal agents' work should bring this country nearer the example of England, where the certainty of arrest and punishment leave no hope for the criminal.

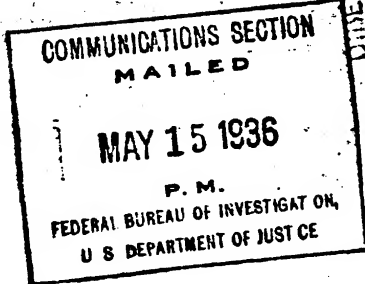

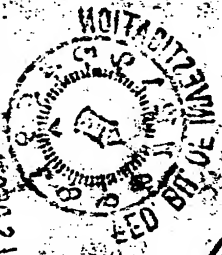

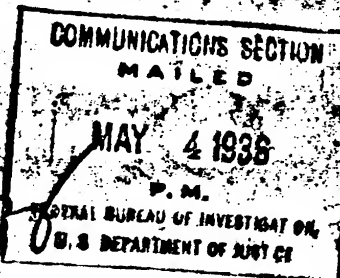

KARPIS

THESE terrible public enemies who are built up to heroic proportions by publicity prove weak cowards often when trapped with the odds against them. They are daring when they have the drop on unarmed victims but they regard their own lives very highly when the guns are aimed at them. They may be clever at avoiding detection and capture, the law may be slow in tracing them, but eventually it catches up.

Alvin Karpis, kidnaper, alleged murderer and bandit, declared he would never be taken alive. He was—in New Orleans without firing a shot. Suddenly faced by J. Edgar Hoover, and his federal department of justice agents, Karpis meekly surrendered.

Flown to St. Paul, Minn., he shivers in the cold, he hides his face from the camera, he cravenly cracks up under questioning and confesses the \$300,000 ransom kidnappings of Edward G. Bremer, banker, and William Hamm, brewer. Characterized as America's most desperate criminal, he turned out to be very tame indeed.

When Karpis saw the game was up, he may have been moved by thoughts of the late Mr. Dillinger, who was shot in his tracks. It may be suspected that the G-men were rather sorry

that Karpis did not make some attempt to flee or fight as that would have provided the excuse for prompt execution. That is one certain method of ending American criminals. Karpis had served other sentences, been released by the foolish law. Now he faces a couple of life terms but, as he knows, while there is life there is always possibility of release.

Miami is gratified at his capture, although it does deprive us of one of our winter visitors, who liked this climate and fishing. But we can get along very well without such customers and their women. Congratulations go to the officers responsible.

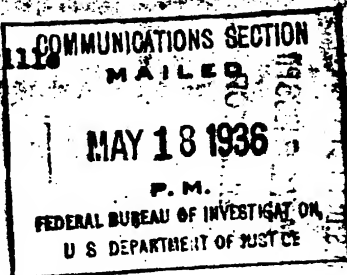

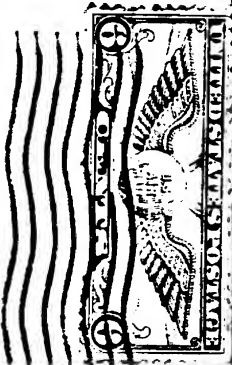

G-MEN AND THEIR SUCCESS

Sometimes we wonder just how the high and mighty senator from Tennessee, who recently criticized in rather harsh words the leader of the G-men—the department of justice, J. Edgar Hoover, and his workers—and suggested disarming them, now that in three quick swoops in widely separated sections of the nation those same G-men have knocked off three of four "wanted kidnapers" of number one infamy in the United States. And in two of those instances, the very leader of the G-men, Mr. Hoover himself, took the lead in the arrests.

Here is the recent record:

Arrest of Alvin Karpis, the man who wrote Hoover a letter threatening him, who directed at least two major kidnappings, who is charged with murder, robbery, extortion and other crimes against the law of the land, who blasted his way in his B. V. D.'s with blazing guns from a police trap in Atlantic City last year and who is the recognized leader of one of the worst gangs of hoodlums in the nation was taken without a struggle in New Orleans last week by the G-men, led by their chief.

Harry Campbell, companion of Karpis in the shooting at Atlantic City, and his companion and accomplice in numerous crimes and kidnappings, was taken yesterday in Toledo by G-men, again led by their chief. There was only a "little resistance" to arrest.

William Mahan, brains behind the horrible kidnaping of the little Weyerhaeuser lad in Tacoma, was arrested in San Francisco yesterday. On his person was found several thousands of dollars of the \$200,000 ransom paid by the lad's family for his safe return.

Now there remains the half-drafted Thomas H. Robinson, wanted in the kidnaping, sometime ago, in Tennessee of Mrs. Berry Stoll, who was returned to her home af-

ter the payment of a huge ransom. Robinson, said to be travelling about the nation, a hunted fugitive figure in woman's clothing, afraid of his very shadow, will soon be taken, you may be sure of that, for the G-men have him marked for their very own.

Since the G-men began their drive against criminals sometime ago, the theme song for public enemies might well be "going down the valley one by one," only sometimes they are going two by two.

Among those wiped out, or put out of circulation have been such figures as Machine Gun Kelly, John Dillinger, Baby Face Nelson, Gene Verne, George Hamilton, Harry Van Metter, Ma Baker and her devil's spawn of a son, and many others.

Among other works of the good for the law and order of this nation, that the G-men's success is bringing about is the fright that is being inspired in the minds of those who might like to be termed public enemies, or public rats, as the G-man chief would have them called. The psychological effect is beginning to be felt.

For instance, a news story from New Orleans, states that yesterday, Alfred (Red) Raina, arrived there from New York and surrendered to the United States marshall because he was frightened at the way the G-men have been tracking down criminals. He had been sought since last November as a member of one of the largest dope smuggling rings ever uncovered in the southern crescent city.

"I'm glad its over," he was quoted as saying, "I knew you'd get me sooner or later."

And now its been nearly a year since the last major kidnaping in the United States. Truly, the G-men are performing a great work of good.

And another thing—one that makes the G-men different from the Royal Northwest Mounted of Canada, they not only get their man, but they usually get their women too.

Yeah, we imagine the senator from Tennessee must feel rather like a plugged dime.

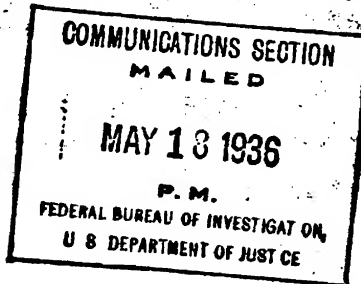

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I hope that you may soon have Robinson, Mahan, Campbell and others of the most sought after public enemies.



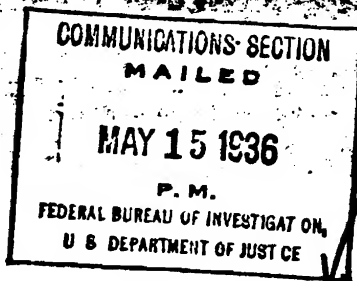

My dear Mr. Hoover:

I am a young man seventeen years of age and I am in my freshman year at Brooklyn College. Your group's method of working has incited my American blood to a feverish temperature and recently with your capture of Alvin Karpis and his aide, you surpassed all bounds. I know that my congratulations to you would seem as mountains beneath the celestial bodies as compared to the thanks that these whole United States render to you.

Now that I have rendered my thanks, I would like to ask of you whether a four year college training is necessary before I can have any chance of getting into your ballistics division. I have never had any chance to take up ballistics itself, although I have done some rifle (.22) shooting along with a little revolver practice. I did this shooting at the 102 Engineers' Armory under the supervision of Lieutenant H. C. Cohen. While shooting, I noticed all the spiral grooves that ran the length of the bore. Thus began my interest in ballistics. I obtained a book from the Peters Ammunition Company on "Visible Ballistics", and read it straight through. The subject is one of fascinating content.

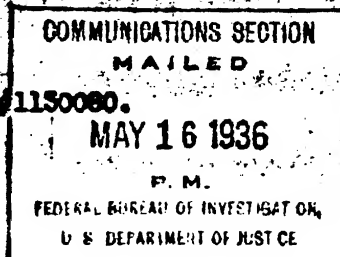

The Capture Of Alvin Karpis

The G-men have scored again in their fight on crime. Alvin Karpis, the most-sought criminal in the country, has been captured, and without the firing of a shot, though he is said to have boasted that he "wouldn't be taken alive." So perfectly planned and executed was the federal agents' descent upon Karpis, under the personal direction of J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Department of Investigation, Karpis did not have a chance to make a show of resistance.

Karpis, wanted in connection with two sensational kidnappings, a mail train robbery and the slaying of a Missouri sheriff, was the last on the list of the more notorious criminals who were the special objects of the G-men's activities in the last two or three years. Now he and one of his men, Fred Hunter, have been overtaken by the same relentless forces who have put an end to the criminal careers of John Dillinger, "Pretty Boy" Floyd, "Baby Face" Nelson and scores of other criminals.

There is not now remaining at large a single criminal of such notoriety as Dillinger, Floyd, Nelson or Karpis. But of course there are always criminals to be captured, and it is announced that now William Mahan has moved to the top of the federal agents' "wanted" list.

The capture of Karpis comes with special timeliness in view of the criticism which was recently directed against the federal agents in Congress. A few representatives and senators sought to make a considerable reduction in the appropriation for the federal agents, and in their arguments they belittled the accomplishments of the G-men. The great majority in Congress are aware, however, as the American public is aware, of the great good that the federal agents have done, and the full appropriation was voted. The capture of Karpis, coming just at this time, is a vindication of the judgment of those members of Congress who stood up for the G-men.

Alvin Karpis may or may not have been Public Enemy No. 1—the G-Men say he wasn't so far as they're concerned—but he is unquestionably a thoroughly dangerous crook. His arrest by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, is another feather in the much befeathered cap of that remarkable organization.

It also is gratifying to note that the arrest was accomplished without the firing of a shot, so thorough and secret had been the preparations of the federal agents. In fact so quiet had the whole affair been kept that officials of the bureau in Washington got their first information that an arrest had been planned from the men on the scene in New Orleans.

Quite aside from its spectacular elimination of a series of dangerous criminals, the Federal Bureau, under Mr. Hoover's direction, has been instrumental in restoring public confidence in the strength and length of Uncle Sam's traditionally long arm.

It is clear that more and more an aroused public opinion, acting through police departments of many sorts, has crime on the run in this country. Professional crime of the Dillinger-Hamilton-Nelson-Karpis school is becoming too risky. Men and women of the underworld have come to dread and fear this remorselessly efficient machine which has been built in Washington for their destruction. That is a good frame of mind to maintain.

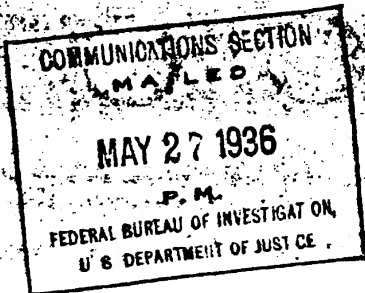

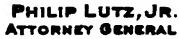

COLLUSION of politicians with underworld leaders has been back of much crime and racketeering throughout the country. When notorious criminals have been arrested, these influences often contrive to make conviction difficult. Subversive elements derive encouragement from the pinhead mentality betrayed by a number of congressmen.

Paul Mallon, in the column which appears in The Star, quotes J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, as saying that politics was really public enemy No. 1 in the secret service's fight on crime. Mr. Mallon also asserted that some congressmen had been criticizing the G-men for shooting down notorious gangsters. That attitude was said to have been responsible for the unusual care taken to capture Karpis, Mahan and Campbell, the most dangerous trio at large, without firing a shot.

It is the fundamental code of all law enforcement agencies, of course, that fire must be withheld except in defense of an officer's life. The public will not share the squeamishness of certain Washington politicians, however, over direct action methods of G-men in arresting more desperate criminals, who often shoot down their victims without compunction.

The country has become so incensed over the crime wave of recent years that it is more inclined to indorse vigilante methods in dealing with organized mobs of kidnapers and bandits. Speedy and efficient justice, reflected in the recent Barrett trial and execution in Marion county, soon would rid the country of terrorist bands.

Political influence and the aid of disreputable criminal lawyers in league with the underworld, make conviction difficult. Shooting on the spot, of course, is too good for the major criminals. If they escape the chair, they should spend life at hard labor, with none of the coddling in which sentimental reformers indulge.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Before anything else, I want to assure you that this letter requires no reply. You have just about enough on your busy hands without being obliged to correspond with an old woman who is taking a new lease of life because of activities such as yours. When I wrote congratulating you in relation to the Karpis capture, you were personally on the spot rounding up the remainder of the gangsters and you certainly bagged the game you were seeking. However, you do not need me to tell you that your success and the landing of the Graf Zeppelin Von Hindenburg are the outstanding thrills of the moment. This is not my sole reason for the second letter; the actuating circumstance being as follows:

As you are well aware, Great-Britain has her Scotland Yard and, judging from several items of fact and fiction, it functions most ably. So far, so good. My idea is that although your department is designated very definitely and properly, but when I think of the efficacious results you have attained, I believe we should have an established, permanent, national organization that will go down in history just as Scotland Yard has done in the British Isles. Nor do I desire to be a copy cat, but as this country is the dumping ground for the worst type of criminals from all quarters of the globe, it requires supermen, super-activities and should be supported to the last ditch. What I am driving at so clumsily, is born of a remark I read and which was attributed to you: It was concerning the interference and kindrance of politics in attaining best results. I am only one citizen, and I know, all too well, that politics can put the brakes on the most emergent situations, but it is my fervent desire to do my bit towards spreading the propaganda and making it an issue just as soon as possible. I have been granted honorary membership in this and that society, club et cetera, but what do any of them do towards strengthening a great organization such as yours? I nearly lost my standing a short time ago when some of the women of a symposium were praising the British methods of crime investigation and capture. That was before your magnificent bag of the Karpis bunch. I replied to the dame that while I had no adverse criticism to make in the case of Scotland Yard, that we must remember that one of our large states could put England in its vest pocket, while here the breadth of the United States alone was approximately four thousand miles. This, I added, must be scoured by our own crime investigators and that if that body had one fractional part of the support accorded Scotland Yard, it would be able to function to such a degree that crimesters would soon learn that their hideouts were not crime-proof by any means. Then, right on the back of this argument, along you come with the season's most sensational capture, and the end is not yet. While the cinema is most outlandish in its presentations, still it is making people - especially youth - crime-prevention minded. G-Men versus G-Men is the outstanding feature of such plays, i.e. Gun-Men versus Government-Men.

I happen to be one of those orthodox Americans who are strongly averse to aliens flocking to this country and bringing all the criminal tendencies with them. I shall use what little ability I may have in making this crime prevention an issue in my efforts to influence all and sundry who come under my notice. It is too long a story to tell, and you know it by heart anyway, but I am convinced that most intelligent persons who have no axes to grind, will agree that one of the most important phases of American life, happiness and security is bound up in the solid establishment with adequate appropriation - of your Bureau and that appointments should be effected without the least interference of any political faction.

As I said, I am old and may not be here very long, but if there is one privilege I earnestly desire, it is to live long enough to see this department function without hindrance. You have not only my good will, but my thanks and appreciation in your magnificent efforts. Please do not think I am trying to underrate Scotland Yard, but we have "The makin's" as the boys say, right here in this country, and I refer especially to you and your well-drilled staff.

An Inexorable Purge

The capture of Alvin Karpis is properly regarded as a notable victory for law enforcement. This Middle Western hoodlum is accused of virtually every offense for which criminals are customarily hunted down in the United States. For two years he spread terror through many States. When such a public enemy is quietly surrounded and captured without a struggle there is good reason to shower congratulations upon J. Edgar Hoover and his Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Fully to appreciate the significance of the work this Federal agency is doing, however, a long perspective is essential. Karpis and Hunter are only two of many criminals that have been lodged behind prison bars or shot down by the G-men during the

last two years. Dillinger, Nelson, the Barker mob and many others engaged in the gruesome business of murder, kidnaping and robbery have paid the penalty of ruthless crime. Some other gangsters of the same ilk remain to be dealt with, but the records of the F. B. I. to date leave almost no doubt that the law will catch up with them.

It is the certainty that these marked men will meet an appropriate doom that is important. One dramatic capture is only an incident. But a systematic and intelligent campaign against interstate rackets, which makes the downfall of every outlaw in this category a virtual certainty, is an effective blow at the heart of organized crime. To interrupt that work by denying the F. B. I. sufficient men and equipment, as one Senator recently proposed to do, would be the greatest service that anyone could render to the mobs of the underworld.

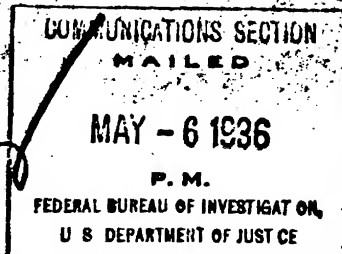

FINGERPRINTS TRAP KARPIS

Efficiency of the methods of the Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice, was spectacularly demonstrated last night in the arrest at New Orleans of Alvin Karpis, known over the country as Public Enemy No. 1. J. Edgar Hoover, head of the bureau, led the Federal agents in the roundup of Karpis and two companions, who, Mr. Hoover said, had been shadowed for two months by his agents.

Fingerprints by Karpis were found on a gasoline can and flashlight dropped by the Bremer kidnaping mob. This coup by the Bureau of Investigation adds justification to Mr. Hoover's initiation of a fingerprinting department in his bureau. Criminals will find it increasingly difficult to escape from the long arm of the law, especially when they break Federal statutes, for the fingerprint records kept at Washington are, at the moment, the most complete of their kind in the world.

Federal men, however, are merely at the beginning of their work along this line. They have several million fingerprints on file, but they expect to get millions more. Any citizen can be fingerprinted and have the record placed in the extensive files. These records are not necessarily for the detection of crime. They are invaluable also in cases of disappearances or in accidents, when persons may be rendered unconscious and there may be no means of establishing identification.

Many citizens already have availed themselves of the opportunity to have their fingerprints on file. It is Mr. Hoover's hope that many more will follow suit.

The Bureau of Investigation merits high praise for its work in trapping Karpis and his pals. They are the kind of men that Mr. Hoover refers to as "rats". Criminals face great odds when they pit their skill against the resources and scientific methods employed by the Bureau of Investigation under the direction of Mr. Hoover.

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Karpis Yellow? Of Course

Mr. Hoover, head of "G-Men", says Karpis "went yellow" when guns were trained on him, in fact, we quote Mr. Hoover verbatim: "He (Karpis) was so damned scared he couldn't talk. Karpis shook all over, his voice, his hands, and his knees. He is a dirty, yellow rat."

That need surprise no one. The kind of man that will shoot down defenseless men, when he holds the gun, is naturally "yellow." It takes a broad streak of yellowness to murder an unarmed man.

Karpis, who boasted that he would "never be taken alive" was taken with the greatest of ease, when he saw guns, pointed the wrong way. He almost wept with fear, when he found himself chained to the seat of the airplane that carried him from New Orleans north.

Criminals are naturally cowards except the most brutish of them, that first get themselves "coked up" and then fight, not with their own, but with cocaine courage.

The fact that they are cowards makes them sell each other out. Five thousand dollars bought the life of Dillinger. It is more than probable, whether the Government thinks it wise to say so or not, that another cash bribe brought in Karpis.

It is an excellent suggestion that the Government keep, always standing, bribes of five thousand dollars for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anybody guilty of murder, or any serious crime, for instance, bank or mail robbery.

With such rewards constantly standing, criminals would be gathered in, on an extensive scale and the Government would save money.
