END OF THE TRAIL

A COMFORTING characteristic of the Department of Justice, from the point of view of decent citizenship, is that it has a long memory and plenty of patience. Alvin Karpis was wanted and hunted for nearly three years before the Federal men found him in New Orleans.

This was the last but one of the kidnappers of 1933, when ten major crimes of this character aroused the Nation to realization of the underworld's arrogance and dangerous defiance of the law's authority. Thomas H. Robinson is still at large, but probably a nervous man.

The unsavory history of the man called "Public Enemy No. 1" shows how he earned his contemptible title. From little crimes he went to bigger ones, encouraged by paroles and suspended sentences and all kinds of police inefficiency and court leniency. The climax of his career was a kidnapping, the end of his trail is a prison and an "airtight" case which may keep him there a long time or send him to the chair for murder.

Karpis belonged in jail a long time ago, where he could not menace the peace and safety of society. He has been captured at last, and will probably be convicted by the untiring efforts of an organization which has no illusions about criminals. Most of them are dangerous, many of them are incurable. Their offenses can be checked by fear of capture and certainty of punishment. This is the theory of Mr. J. Edgar Hoover and his G-men, and its soundness is proved by the record.

KARPIS CAUGHT

A few weeks ago congressmen were talking about curtailing the appropriations to the department of justice for operating the "G-men" division. Doubtless the capture of ALVIN KARPIS, latest "Public Enemy No. 1," will mark the end of such attempted wasteful economy. For it is only thru the efficiency of the federal authorities in tracking down the "big shot" desperadoes whose exploits are a text book in crime for less accomplished criminals, that the march of crime can be halted.

KARPIS, whose name was originally KARPAVICZ, was himself wanted for two important kidnappings and a miscellaneous assortment of crimes, such as his shooting his way out of Atlantic City last year. Taking him into custody eliminated a first-rate menace.

But even more important than the arrest of KARPIS itself is the lesson it constitutes. Here's another warning that crime does not pay and that unless you go straight the "G-men" will eventually get you. It was not long ago that public enemies were mocking the police as they jumped state lines to elude local authorities. But the department of justice investigators are apparently ubiquitous. With amazing regularity they have been arresting "Public Enemies No. 1" and making room for a new czar of crime, himself to be brought to terms with the passing of a few months. This sort of police work is the best deterrent to crime yet tried. To curtail the activities of the "G-men" would be the most foolish of economies. Such a saving would be tantamount to notifying the arch criminal in whose arrest the federal authorities specialize that the price has been taken off their heads. Economy at such a price would be frivolous. In fact, any move to reduce the cost of government should be directed at the scores of federal agencies that are performing no noticeable work. The "G-men" are earning every dollar placed at their disposal.

CRIME

"Old Creepy"

On a late autumn day in 1934 the naked, bullet-riddled body of George ("Baby Face") Nelson was dumped in a ditch near Chicago after a gun battle in which two agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation were also killed (TIME, Dec. 12, 1934). Shortly thereafter a surly, uncommunicative underworldling known to his few intimates as "Old Creepy" discovered that, by courtesy of the Press, he had in-

herited Nelson's title of Public Enemy No. 1. By last week the Bureau of Investigation, which has vainly trailed Public Enemy Alvin Karpis for two years, acknowledged that his nickname was no misnomer by slapping a \$25,000 price on his head. Only the lives of Nelson and the late John Dillinger had been worth such public rewards to the Federal Government.

In the melodramatic year 1933, spindly Alvin Karpis joined forces in St. Paul with Kate ("Ma") Barker and her sons Fred and Arthur. In little more than a year the Karpis-Barker gang became the nation's most formidable criminal outfit, made nearly \$500,000 by robbing banks, kidnapping such folk as St. Paul's Brewer William Hamm and Barker Edward George Bremer. Then police and G-Men began weeding the gang out. "Ma" and Fred Barker and another mobster died under Federal guns. Six other Barker-Karpis hoodlums and accomplices were put behind bars, seven more were under indictment in St. Paul last week for the Hamm snatching. Only Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, companion of Karpis in the Bremer kidnapping, remained at large.

Alvin Karpis is a product of Chicago's West Side. His mother did time in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma prisons. After fingerprints found on a gasoline tin con-

nected him with the Bremer—Federal agents got on his trail, nearly missed him in the Ozarks, in Cleveland. For a time he hid in a \$200-per-month villa in Cuba. In the winter of 1934 he and crippled Harry Campbell shot their way out of a police trap in Atlantic City hotel, leaving Karpis' pregnant woman and another girl behind. Seven months later he threatened the life of the Bureau of Investigation's Director John Edgar Hoover in a letter mailed from Dayton, Ohio. Last August he spent three days at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., watching the horse races, fled from a nearby farmhouse six hours before Federal agents got there. Then he vanished.

Same day the Karpis-Campbell rewards were announced, Director Hoover received proof that not all Senators regard him and his work as does Tennessee's Kenneth Douglas McRellor, who as chairman of a Senate Appropriations subcommittee recently lopped \$225,000 off the Bureau's 1937 appropriation increase recommended by a House committee, accused Director Hoover of "running wild" (TIME, April 27). Up in the Senate last week rose speaker after speaker to praise the Bureau of Investigation's work, insist that the \$225,000 be put back in the appropriation bill. "I would not revive, by any act or vote of mine," cried Democratic Leader Joseph Taylor Robinson, Ark. vis., "one hope in the house of a gangster by withholding the means that are necessary to pursue him around this earth, to the very gates of Hell."

The Senate restored the \$225,000.

Public Enemies do Not Deserve Mercy

THE smooth, precise manner in which the efficient J. Edgar Hoover and his men trapped the criminal, Karpis, in New Orleans is enough to make citizens glow with pride over the effectiveness of their federal bureau of investigation.

Nothing is more comforting than the knowledge, supported by visible performance, that one department of government is dedicated to the protection of the citizen, his home and his property.

And nothing is more disconcerting than the knowledge, supported by the records, that, at the same time, other departments of government are handling their public trust in such loose fashion as to endanger the safety of the citizen, his home and his property.

A disgraceful, sentiment-guided clemency system that blankets the United States is responsible for a crime condition that challenges the people of America.

There was absolutely no excuse for crime-warped Alvin Karpis to run loose up and down the nation at the head of a mob that murdered police officers and made big-time profits out of burglary, bank robbery and kidnaping. For Alvin Karpis showed his criminal tendency when he was a lanky lad of 16 under arrest in Topeka, Kan., for petty theft. He was sent to the state reformatory, from which he escaped. After a year of liberty he was rearrested and returned to the reformatory. He was transferred to the state penitentiary after knives were found in his possession. While in prison he and another hoodlum plotted a jewel robbery to be staged in Henryetta, Okla.

The record of Karpis should have been enough to keep him in prison. But he was paroled. The robbery at Henryetta was carried out. Karpis was caught but his companion was not. Karpis was sentenced to serve four years in Oklahoma's state prison. But he did not do this time. After three months in the Okmulgee county jail he was paroled by the trial judge. This known prison breaker and convicted thief was turned loose to prey upon the people who were contributing regularly to the support of prisons and courts and who had a right to feel they were being protected from dangerous criminals.

In the federal bureau of investigation at Washington there is a single fingerprint section devoted to the worst 12,600 of the nation's public enemies. The records show that more than 3,500 of these desperate men and women have at some time felt the angelic mercy of parole or probation or pardon or some form of sob sister clemency.

Congratulations to Mr. Hoover for at last cornering Bad-man Karpis, who never should have been at large. Condemnation to those who granted Karpis liberty and wished him god-speed after he revealed his criminal bent so clearly. And this warning to everybody: Unless restrictions are drawn more tightly around clemency, you or some member of your family or your home or your property soon may be the victim of a criminal out on parole.

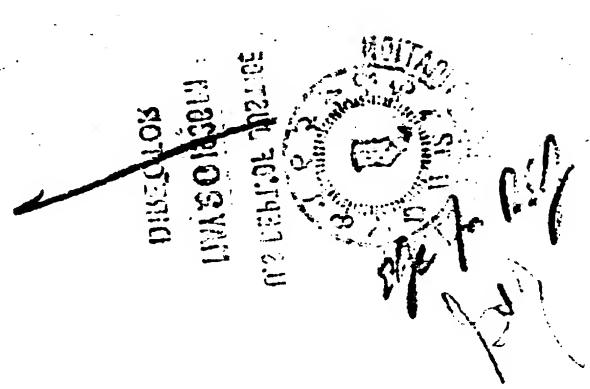
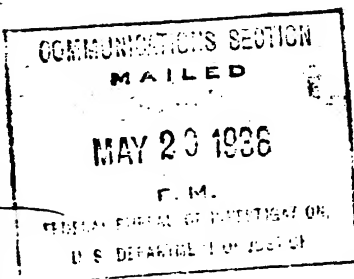

G-MEN SCORE AGAIN

CHALK up another victory for J. Edgar Hoover and his band of G-men, with the capture of Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, at New Orleans. Not a shot was fired, so complete was the surprise that the killer, caught off guard, raised his hands in the air and surrendered without a struggle. So ends the crime career of the man wanted for murder and the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer, St. Paul banker.

Born in Chicago, this son of doting parents, started on his crime career ten years ago. His first prison sentence was to the state industrial reformatory at Hutchinson Kan., for ten years for burglary. He escaped on March 9, 1929. On March 25, 1930, after a little more than a year at liberty, he was returned to the reformatory after having been arrested two days before by Kansas City, Mo., police on safe-blowing and auto theft charges.

On May 19, 1930, Karpis was transferred to the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing to serve out the balance of his ten-year burglary sentence. He was released on May 31, 1931, and 11 days later was picked up by Tulsa, Okla., police on another burglary charge for which he was wanted by the police of Okmulgee, Okla. He was given a four-year sentence for that crime on September 11, 1931, and immediately placed on parole by the court.

It was immediately after this parole that Karpis started on his really big crime career. Associating himself with Frank Nash, Francis Keating, Thomas Holden, Vernon Miller, "Doc" Fred and Kate Barker and others, he took part in numerous bank robberies in the middle west. This was the beginning of the Karpis-Barker outlaw band that terrorized Kansas, Missouri and adjacent states for three or four years.

The first murder charge placed against Karpis was for the slaying of Sheriff C. R. Kelley at West Plains, Mo., in December, 1931.

After the G-men got on his trail, Karpis and others of the Karpis-Barker gang blazed a trail over the eastern half of the United States. One after another of the band were killed or taken into custody until only he and one or two lieutenants were left at large.

Last year, after Fred and "Ma" Barker had been shot to death in a Florida hide-out, Karpis was trailed to Atlantic City, where he shot his way out of a trap the federal agents had laid for him. The G-men had been hot on his trail ever since, but it was only when the New Orleans tip was picked up that they were able to capture him.

Once again the long arm of the law, through the agency of a highly efficient federal force of G-men, has reached out and brought to a close the crime career of a public enemy. In reading the record of his ten years of crime, however, one cannot help but notice that a friendly parole board turned this man loose on the public. His career up to that time certainly did not warrant a parole. Burglaries, escape from prison, auto theft and safe blowing charges certainly should not entitle a man to immediate parole.

Such procedure, however, is being duplicated throughout the country today and makes crime prevention and detention work exceedingly difficult. When criminals are turned loose on the public as fast as they are put into prisons we cannot blame law enforcement agencies for becoming discouraged in their work. The blame rests with the parole boards, politicians and shyster lawyers.

The public can thank Hoover and his force of G-men for bringing another criminal to justice. They can also rest assured the net of evidence the federal men have collected against Karpis will keep him from bothering the public again.

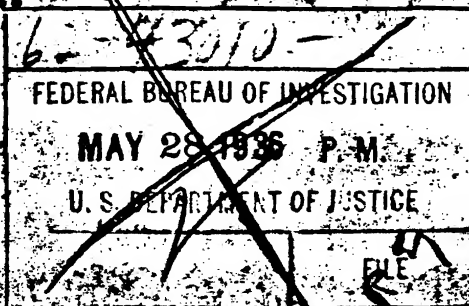
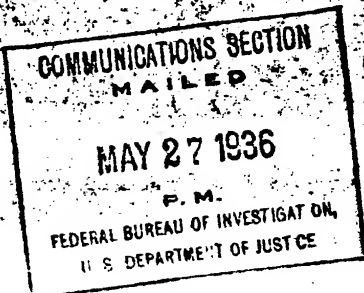

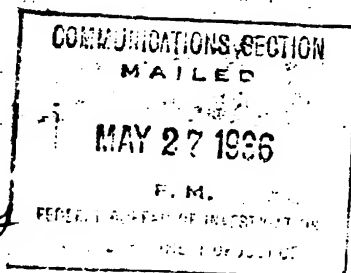

ANOTHER TRIUMPH

The federal bureau of investigations, headed by J. Edgar Hoover, has scored another signal triumph, and one in which the entire nation rejoices, in the capture of Alvin Karpis, at New Orleans.

Karpis, the latest holder of the title of "Public Enemy No. 1," is under indictment for two kidnappings and other major crimes, and recently rewards for his capture had been raised to the total of \$7,000. He is the last of the original Karpis-Barker gang, seven members of which are dead and the rest captured.

So efficient was the work of the G-men in this instance that Karpis and his companions were completely surrounded before any of them had opportunity to draw a gun. It is gratifying that the capture was thus effected without loss of life or the firing of a single shot. Mr. Hoover personally led his squad of officers on this occasion and to him and his associates the country owes a debt of gratitude for this remarkably well executed stroke.

The event heightens the admiration and esteem with which the people of the United States have come to regard this bureau and the officers operating through it, whose notable accomplishments of the last few years in rounding up the notorious gangster leaders and criminals of the country are too well known to require review.

The newspapers indicate that your Bureau has again added to its laurels by the inexorable manner in which major criminals are being rounded up. This is indeed a fine thing for the morale of all progressive law enforcement bodies, and I wish to congratulate you for your leadership.

An additional shipment of 15,000 of your fingerprint cards has been received, making a total of 50,000 cards you have sent us.

There is also enclosed a brief summary of the drive which we had to prepare to take care of numerous requests for information.

THE FINGERPRINT CAMPAIGN IN BERKELEY
Short summary of organization etc.

As early as 1917, attempts were made in California to legislate universal fingerprinting. The failure to pass such legislation is attributed to the active opposition of several groups which stood to lose some of their profits by such legislation. There were other groups who opposed it through sheer inertia and through a mistaken impression that it might deprive them of some constitutional liberties; but the active, persistent opposition comes from those whose pocketbooks would be touched by universal registration. The Communists, of course, oppose anything that would tend to unify society, as they make their greatest gains among disorganized people. Strangely enough, the one group that stands to profit most by universal fingerprinting has consistently opposed it....that is union labor. We find in Berkeley that as individuals, many union men are for it, and express themselves by recording their fingerprints and having their family fingerprinted. It appears that those who make the most furor against it in the unions have no argument other than the "blacklist" which is theoretically possible through fingerprints. Union labor apparently does not realize that the thing for which it has fought hardest in recent years - social security and similar legislation - is absolutely unworkable without fingerprints. The hopeless confusion of social security legislation when there are hundreds of thousands of workers throughout the country with identical names is at once apparent. There is also Communist opposition within the unions. Communism also fights anything that would unify or make labor more contented.

The sum total of the above opposition and indifference has been sufficient to drown out any small voice raised in favor of universal fingerprinting. The recent results of the 18th Amendment are too green in our memories to permit us to forget that unpopular legislation cannot be enforced.

Realizing the need for popular support, educational work was undertaken in Berkeley as early as 1930. Service clubs were sold on fingerprinting and, as the years went by, these clubs were sold again and again on the subject. Gradually some of the Parent Teacher and other groups were converted, and so the campaign of education went slowly forward. During a six-year period, less than 2,000 civilian fingerprints were taken in Berkeley.

It was not until the Fall of 1935 that persons in Berkeley interested in the movement felt there was a reasonable prospect of an intensive voluntary fingerprint campaign succeeding, and it was not until late in January, 1936, that plans were finally worked out.

Dr. George Oulton, a dentist, is the person in Berkeley most responsible for carrying through with this program. As a citizen, Dr. Oulton long ago realized the tremendous advantages to be derived from universal fingerprinting. Most of these advantages had little to do with police work and directly profited the private citizen. Unfortunately, fingerprints are indelibly linked with crime and criminals in the minds of most people and, also unfortunately, police and other law enforcement agencies are usually the only ones who know anything about fingerprint work.

One important phase of the educational program has been to point out the fact that it is NOT THE POLICE who want these fingerprints; it is to the INDIVIDUAL BENEFIT of everyone that this be done. But to become effective, it must be done by everyone. There can be no shirkers; no objectors whose objections are valid.

The police are best fitted in many instances to set up the machinery for taking fingerprints, but IT IS NOT THEIR CAMPAIGN. In fact, there are some police departments actively opposed to civilian fingerprinting because of the work involved in its inception. In such cases, it is the intimate business of every honest citizen to see that this program is carried forward.

In Berkeley, it was perhaps erroneously felt that the police department should appear in the picture as little as possible. Therefore, the campaign was regularly approved by the City Council, Mayor and City Manager, and conducted on the basis of a city-wide campaign.

To stimulate interest and to lay out organization work for civic groups, an organization meeting was held February 3, 1936 under the auspices of the Mayor. Invitations were mailed to over 400 presidents and secretaries of lodges, service clubs and other organizations. Approximately 300 responded. The following organization was set up to SELL FINGERPRINTING:

1. General Chairman.
2. Committee on printed publicity (other than newspaper). To arrange for printed publicity such as newspaper ads, posters, signboards, stickers, shopping news, etc.
3. Newspaper publicity. News coordination handled by one reporter for all newspapers to avoid duplication and scoops. Reasonably uniform publicity was secured.
4. Radio, theatre and miscellaneous publicity committee. To arrange radio broadcasts, skits and plays, publicity at theatres; newsreels; radio trucks and other miscellaneous publicity.
5. Speakers Committee. To arrange speakers groups to be available on call and develop proper speakers' material. Arrange contacts with all local organizations and get speakers before them.
6. Churches and affiliated groups. To plan suitable church cooperation and publicity.
7. Committee on Schools, P.T.A. and Dad's Clubs. To plan and arrange distribution of desirable publicity and to arrange for printing within the schools.
8. Committee on Statistics and Progress. To plan and arrange a suitable system of daily progress reports during the drive, including thermometers in public locations, etc.
9. University of California Committee - a separate program for this institution.

Inasmuch as all of the people serving on the above committees were busy people, the secretary of the police department acted as coordinator for their activities and aided them as much as possible.

The actual taking of the fingerprints was done under the direction of the police department, under the following plan:

1. One officer responsible for the procurement of supplies and handling of clerical assistance.
2. One officer assigned to distribution of supplies, personnel and equipment. Under this officer were several other men, such as
 - A. Supply man.
 - B. Personnel man.
 - C. Evening man, etc.
 as the needs arose. Stations at times exceeded 50.

Personnel to take fingerprints was secured from the following sources:

1. Police
2. Firemen
3. Boy and Girl Scouts
4. American Legion
5. Other volunteers and miscellaneous sources. Lack of foresight concerning the amount of work involved caused us to overlook the value of a WPA project for fingerprinting.
6. Some merchants were interested enough to supply their own personnel for the work.

3. The police secretary acted as coordinator for both police and civilian groups; making engagements for printing etc., and in general acting as the executive secretary of the entire movement.

When the drive got into full swing, there were both indoor and outdoor stations; plus field units of Boy Scouts and Legionnaires canvassing homes, plus mobile units to go on call to homes, factories or other locations to take prints of groups of people. Fingerprint stations were set up in firehouses, schools, theaters, banks, library, city hall, department stores, clubs, drug stores, restaurants, etc. Many stations, in fact the most productive, were set up outdoors. Our fingerprint equipment consisted of 75 complete kits and more could have been used to advantage on occasions.

Two cards were taken, one for the Department of Justice, and one for our own files.

In the high school, the recreation teachers were instructed in fingerprinting. They in turn instructed their leader pupils who in turn fingerprinted over 2200 of this group. In the junior high schools the physical education teachers and counselors did the job. In the elementary schools, the cards were left at the schools, required data was filled in and when 100 or more were ready, a fingerprint squad was sent to the schools. Excellent cooperation was given by the school department. Over 9000 youngsters were printed with a minimum of effort.

As publicity aids, in addition to a steady stream of newspaper publicity, advertisers were induced to place slogans for fingerprinting in their ads; stickers: "We are 100% fingerprinted" were placed in over 200 store windows after they had been printed. A similar sticker: "We have been fingerprinted" was distributed for use in homes or on windshields. A black hand with the legend: "Universal fingerprinting-- means money in your pocket" was hung on hundreds of cash registers, with a notation where to find the nearest fingerprint station. Signs, "5% off on purchases of \$1.00 or over upon presentation of Berkeley fingerprint identification card" appeared in hundreds of stores. Booklets "Why Fingerprinting?" setting forth reasons in favor of the movement were distributed in the amount of 20,000 copies. Five major newsreel companies took pictures of the campaign and distributed them nationally. 50,000 small personal identification cards were purchased for free distribution to those who had prints taken. Talks were given in theatres, before all types of gatherings, over the radio etc. etc.

The result? At the time this is written, the campaign has not been under way three months. There are approximately 36,000 civilian prints on file and the increase is about 4500 per week. At 50,000 prints, or well over half of our population, we intend to drop the campaign, but we are not sure the public will let us quit at that point.

The cost for the entire campaign to the City of Berkeley will be somewhat above \$1500.

Our experience has been: DON'T GO TOO FAST! As long as people are in doubt, they will oppose. There have been some very fine people in this area who kept on opposing fingerprint because they honestly doubted any good could come from it. Naturally, just as soon as they were sold on the subject, they became ardent boosters, but they did not become sold overnight. They could not become stampeded. Many of our factory groups were suspicious of the program at first. The workmen thought it was a scheme of the bosses, and the bosses were not too sure what the police had in mind. Eventually, employers and employees cooperated heartily, but it took time.

The program is extremely desirable, but it should be undertaken only with the full knowledge that it is a big job and one that should be carefully and thoughtfully approached.

Your letter, in which you extend your congratulations upon the apprehension of several outstanding fugitives, was received by me on May 14, 1936.

I want you to know that I deeply appreciate your thought in writing me and am gratified that this Bureau has your confidence and support.

In regard to your inquiry as to the ways in which a citizen can help in law enforcement, it is my belief that if every citizen, when called upon to serve on a jury, would so serve, and, when called upon to testify in criminal cases would fearlessly take the stand, such support would definitely aid law enforcement. I believe that our citizens should follow criminal cases and bring to bear whatever pressure they can in order to see that long delays in trials are eliminated and that when the criminal is given a penitentiary sentence he actually serves this sentence. In this connection, I found the newspaper article which you enclosed concerning the parole of Jack Hines, sentenced in 1932 to serve thirty years and released four years later, particularly significant. I believe our citizens should actually sponsor all youth movements of a character-building nature since, as you know, at the present time more crimes are being committed by young men and women between the ages of 19 to 21 than at any other age.

As of possible interest to you, I am enclosing a copy of the publication entitled "The Selection and Training of Personnel" recently released by this Bureau.

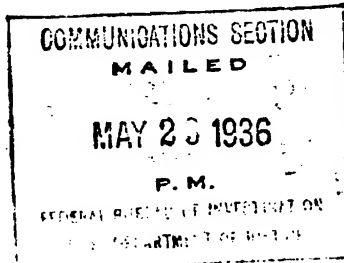

End of the Road

Ebullient Mr. Zioncheck, member of Congress and lawyer in private life, objected a few days ago to Federal expenditure on the Department of Justice's Bureau of Criminal Investigation. More sensible House colleagues promptly approved the budget for that department. To prove the point, J. Edgar Hoover's deadly G-men roped in Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. One, in New Orleans Friday. That particular public menace, facing numerous charges from murder to bank robbery, is on his way to death or life imprisonment.

With the capture of Karpis the Government has broken up a group responsible for heavy loss in life and property. But for the Hoover force, it is safe to say that finis could not be written on that costly record. The limitations on State law enforcement at its best and the all too frequent inefficiency of localized public protection, have failed and are still failing to put a stop to the activities of such criminals as Karpis. In the long run, the criminal usually comes to the end of his rope; crime does not pay and has never paid, but it can and does cost the peaceable public while it is going on.

The comparative rapidity with which the Federal force is overtaking and finishing up with criminals of the Karpis type is striking. Under the fugitive-from-justice rule involving State borders, the criminal places himself in Federal jeopardy as soon as he quits the State where he has actually committed his crime.

The criminal investigation force under J. Edgar Hoover has proved its value and has given a rich return on every dollar of investment Congress has put into it.
