

Fall planting of Fruit trees are usually best, and at this season the nurseryman has more time to fill orders and ship trees and plants. SMALL TREES.

Small well rooted one year old trees are usually best to plant, as they are more certain to live and will in a few years outgrow and be more thrifty than larger or older trees. The young orchard on my place was planted by Clay and Edward Lankford when they were 12 and 14 years old. They selected small well rooted one year-old trees; the land was well prepared before planting. This orchard has always been thrifty, and is as pretty as a picture to-day. I have wondered many times why men, who are grown and intelligent, will make a failure in planting an orchard, when boys only twelve and fourteen years old can be crowned with success in orchard planting.
