



On account of its trailing habit it is as easily protected in the Northern States as strawberries. It will stand drouth, hot sun, and the scorching winds of the Southwest as its roots penetrate very deep, it seems perfectly at home in those countries with so many families, who have failed to grow strawberries; to them I would say, if your garden will grow weeds, it will grow Austin's Improved Dewberries. Flowers, carefully packed as we send them, carry for two or three days' journey by express.

Please state time flowers are wanted, to prevent possible mistakes either early or late. Give us an idea of what you desire—the quantity, quality and limit in value—that we may study your special wants.

To give us ample time, by ordering early, will be to your advantage. If we cannot supply fully three-fourths of your order, we reply at once by mail, or if notice is short, by telegraph at your expense.

Flowers for Funerals.

In ordering funeral flowers on short notice, please bear in mind it will be to your advantage to give us as much time as possible; the more time we have, the more care we can bestow on the work.

We give the two extremes in prices, both the highest and the lowest, as they vary according to the size. quality and scarcity of flowers, time and labor required to arrange the work, etc.



Please bear in mind that the prices in the following list include pre-payment of postage by us on all seeds offered, by the Packet, Ounce, Quarter-Pound, Pound, Pint or Quart, unless otherwise noted. Thus you have only to send us the catalogue price, and we GUARANTEE safe delivery by mail, postage prepaid. If the seeds are to be sent by express, at the buyer's expense, deduct eight cents for a pound, eight cents for a pint, and fifteen cents for a quart. Half pounds supplied at pound rates; half bushels at bushel rates.

PACKET SEED DISCOUNTS.

This does not refer to seeds offered by weight or measure, but to seeds in Packets only; nor does it refer to potatoes, onion sets or bulbs.

For 25 cents you may select six 5 cent packages of Vegetable or Flower Seeds.

ASPARAGUS.

Spargel, GER. Asperge, FR. Esparragos, Sp.

One ounce will sow 40 feet of drill, 15 lbs. to the acre.

Sow in March or April, in rows one foot apart, and keep clean by frequent hoeing. When two years old, transplant into permanent beds, which should be well and deeply manured, and trenched to the depth of eighteen inches.



ONIONS.

Zwiebel, Ger. Ognon, Fr. Cebolla, Sp.
One ounce for one hundred feet of drill; six pounds for one acre.

For sets, sow the seed as early as possible in the spring, very thickly in drills. As soon as the tops die off in summer, remove them to a dry, airy place, and early in the following spring replant by placing the sets in shallow drills 12 inches apart, and about 4 inches apart in the drills; the Onions by this process are obtained of a large size early in the season. They may also be grown to full size during first season by sowing thinly in drills one foot apart, and about ¼ inch deep, in March or early in April, in strong land, well manured, and thinning them out to stand 3 or 4 inches apart in the drills, keeping them well hoed and freed from weeds. They delight in a strong, rich, deep, loamy soil, and succeed well if grown successive years on the same ground.

Seed can be sown in August and September, in drills wide enough apart to admit of working; when the plants have grown of sufficient size to be fit for table use, thin out to 4 inches apart to secure a crop of large Onions. 




