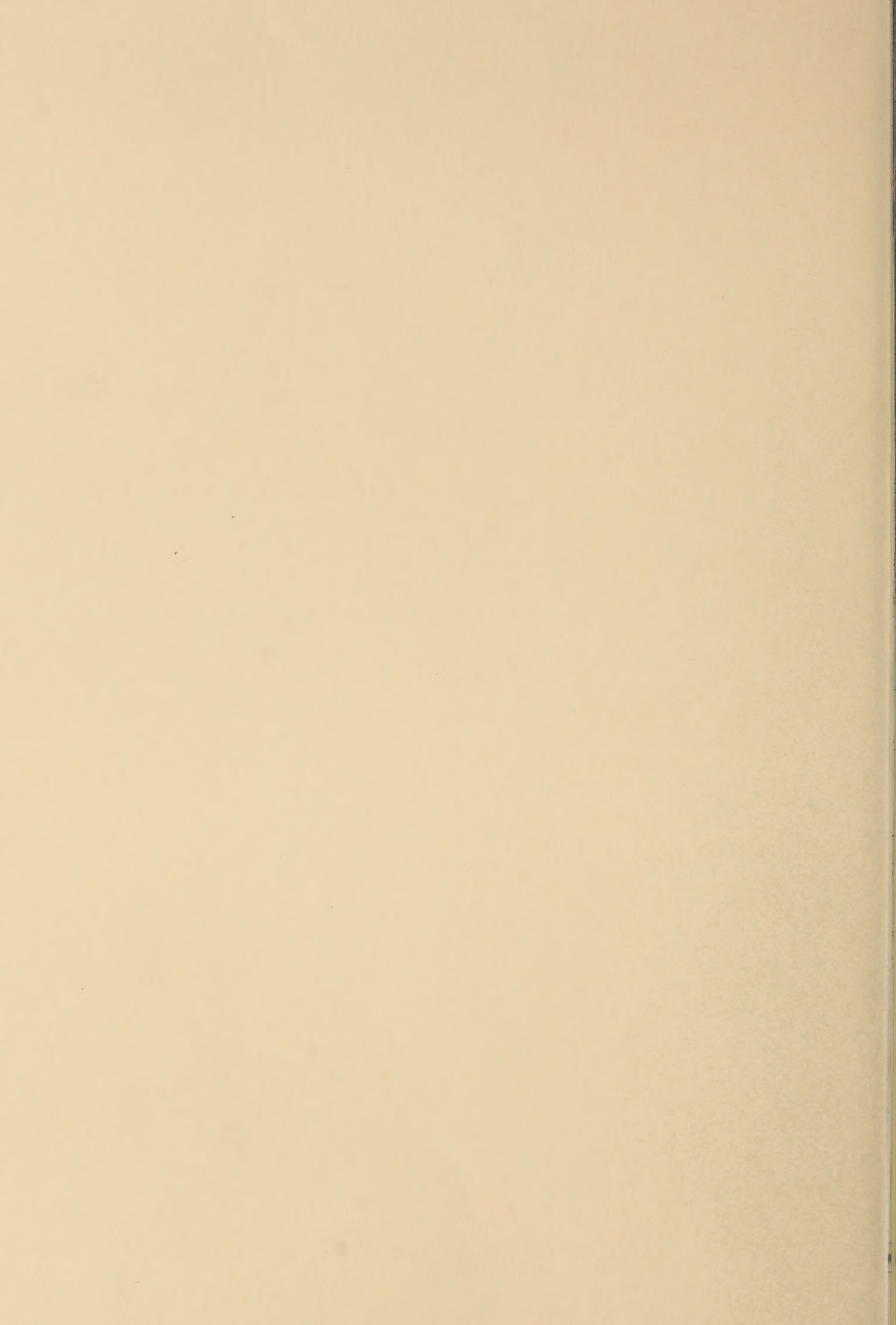

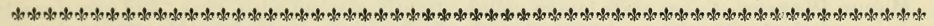

TO THE TRADE:

In presenting our annual trade list for 1898, we desire to thank our customers for their very liberal patronage and are respectfully soliciting a continuance of the same.

Our terms are—strictly cash with the order. Our prices are as low as good stock can be grown for, and we cannot afford the risk and expense of credits. Please send money by draft or post-office money order, made payable at Colma, Cal. No plants sent C. O. D. unless one-fourth of the amount is sent with the order.

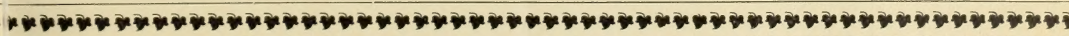
Orders for rooted cuttings of carnations or chrysanthemums for a future date are allowed five per cent. discount, provided one-fourth the amount is sent with the order, though the order must be sent not less than sixty days prior to the date of shipment.

No charge will be made for packing.

We exercise the greatest care to have all plants true to name, and to fill orders correctly. Should errors occur please notify us at once, and we will make such corrections as will be satisfactory.

After delivery to forwarders in good condition, all goods travel at customer's risk, and complaints will not be entertained unless made promptly upon receipt of goods.

We warrant all cuttings that are grown and sold by us, to be in healthy growing condition and free from any disease whatever, but we do not warrant any cuttings to remain free of disease after they have passed from our care, nor do we assume any responsibility whatever regarding the purchaser's success in cultivating the plants.



CARNATIONS.



OUR CUTTINGS are rooted cool and taken from plants that were not forced in excessive heat. Prices quoted are for rooted cuttings. Plants from flats or 2½-inch pots, \$1.00 for 100 extra. Prices quoted do not include transportation charges. If shipment is desired by mail, or prepaid express, add ten cents per 100 for cuttings, and twenty-five cents per 100 for plants.

NOVELTIES OF 1897.

- C. A. Dana**—Delicate shell pink; vigorous grower, erect habit, large flowers on stiff stem; flower a good keeper.
- Captain King**—Variegated, white and pink; extra long and stiff stems, free bloomers, very fragrant; good shipper.
- Flora Hill**—The finest white variety up to date; the flower is of enormous size, stem long and stiff, calyx good, free blooming, good keeper. \$1.00 per 12; \$8.00 per 100; \$75.00 per 1000.
- Harrison's White**—Sport of Wm. Scott; flowers of same size and build.
- Joseph Jefferson**—Deep pink, very large and showy flowers on long, stiff stems; color resembling Tidalwave, but much larger flower.
- Lily Dean**—A very large, bold, handsome flower, pure white, ground with very delicate margin, and pencilling of clear pink, making it exceedingly beautiful and attractive; free blooming; strong, vigorous grower. \$1.00 per 12; \$8.00 per 100.
- Maud Dean**—Delicate blush white, gradually deepening to center, making it the most distinctly beautiful flower ever sent out; well built flowers, good stiff stem, free blooming, good keeper. \$1.00 per 12; \$8.00 per 100; \$75.00 per 1000.
- Mayor Pingree**—Color, clear lemon yellow; lightly marked with pink, and occasionally splashed with white. A very strong, robust grower, continuous bloomer and not a cropper. Blooms measure 2½ to 3 inches and over in diameter. Stems very stiff and from 18 to 30 inches long. Excellent keeper. A fine yellow variety. \$1.50 per 12; \$10.00 per 100; \$80.00 per 1000.
- Mrs. Chas. H. Duhme**—Color, lovely delicate pink; large flower with good calyx on strong, stiff stem, constant bloomer.
- Mrs. Geo. M. Bradt**—Color, clear white; heavily edged, and striped with bright scarlet, giving it a very bright and cheerful appearance; strong stem; habit, strong and vigorous. \$1.50 per 12; \$8.00 per 100; \$75.00 per 1000.
- Mrs. McBurney**—Color, clear salmon; bloom, camellia shaped; pedals, thick and waxlike; flowers very large; strong, stiff stem, good calyx, free bloomer.
- Morello**—Scarlet crimson, with maroon shadings; large flower, long, stiff stem.
- Victor**—Sport of Daybreak; color, bright salmon pink; strong stem, large flower, free bloomer.
- W. D. Sloane**—The flowers are large, good substance, born on very long, stiff stems. Color, a beautiful cerise.
- John H. Siever's Seedlings of 1897**—We have given these new strain of carnations a trial, and watched the varieties, how they behaved with other growers. We cannot advise anybody to plant them in quantity for cut flower purposes, as they are not free blooming enough, but we can recommend them as fine fancy varieties for the retail trade. STANDARD VARIETIES



RED

- Corsair**—Scarlet, large flowers, born on stiff strong stems; very free blooming. 50 cents per 12; \$3 per 100; \$20 per 1000.
- Jubilee**—Color, intense scarlet of the richest shade. One of the largest flowers among red; stems very stiff, average 18 inches in height. In order to succeed with this variety, it has to be planted early in heavy soil. 75 cents per 12; \$5 per 100; \$40 per 1000.
- Portia**—50 cents per 12; \$1.50 per 100; \$10 per 1000.
- Meteor**—Crimson. 50 cents per 12; \$3.00 per 100; \$25 per 1000.

PINK

- Wm. Scott**—The leading pink Carnation. 50 cents per 12; \$1.50 per 100; \$10 per 1000.
- Triumph**—Pure pink, strong, vigorous, healthy grower, producing large blooms $2\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, on heavy stiff stems 2 feet and more in length; splendid calyx, very full flower of fine form; prolific bloomer. 75 cents per 12; \$4 per 100; \$30 per 1000.
- Daybreak**—This old variety is still the best of the light pink varieties. 50 cents per 12; \$3 per 100; \$25 per 1000.
- Della Fox**—Color, clear salmon pink, deeper shade than Daybreak. A large flower on strong stiff stems, 20 to 30 inches in length, which hold the flowers erect; an exceptionally prolific bloomer. 50 cents per 12; \$3 per 100; \$25 per 1000.
- Magnet**—Color, bright crimson pink similar to American Beauty rose. Flowers of immense size, born on strong stems; very prolific bloomer, produces very few cuttings. This variety brings the highest price in the San Francisco market. \$1.50 per 12; \$10 per 100; \$80 per 1000.

WHITE

- Alaska**—Color, snowwhite. A clean, vigorous, healthy grower, and decidedly a prolific bloomer. Erect, wiry and self-sustaining plant. Flowers good size and very good form. 50 cents per 12; \$1.50 per 100; \$10 per 1000.
- Lizzie McGowan**—50 cents per 12; \$1.50 per 100; \$10 per 1000.

VARIEGATED AND YELLOW.

- Minnie Cook**—Color, clear white, variegated pink, flowers $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches, born on long stiff stems, strong calyx, very compact grower and free blooming, if planted early. 50 cents per 12; \$2 per 100; \$15 per 1000.
- El Dorado**—Best paying yellow variety, light clear yellow, edged with narrow band of light pink, a vigorous, very healthy grower, very free bloomer, producing blooms on extra long erect stems. This variety will be free of rust, if grown under glass through summer. If grown outside, this variety is liable to get rust, which, however, will disappear under proper treatment in the greenhouse. 50 cents per 12; \$2 per 100; \$15 per 1000.
- Kitty Clover**—Light yellow, striped red and white, large flowers born on strong stiff stems. 50 cents per 12; \$2 per 100; \$15 per 1000.
- Eulalie**—Color, light yellow, penciled with light pink, very free blooming, long stiff stems. large flowers; a fine fancy variety. 50 cents per 12; \$3 per 100; \$25 per 1000.
- Princess Bonnie**—Color, light pink, marked and penciled with a darker shade, large well formed flowers, born on stiff, strong stems, 2 to 3 feet in length, good bloomer; one of the best fancy varieties. 75 cents per 12; \$4 per 100; \$30 per 1000.
