Some previous cultivation, or at least a thorough turning over should be given, A clayey loam is the best foundation for a good lawn. Let the surface be graded to the level wanted in all parts and well rolled-a light raking following this will prepare for the seed sowing, which should be done as early in the spring as the ground can be worked, provided the ground hasnot already been prepared in the fall. The very best time, the ground being in order, is about April ist. Three to four bushels per acre should be shown. the lat ter amount is best, for the young plants are but small young plants are butsmall, and if thick, cover the ground better and make a smoother and more even turf. Mowing should be done at least once a week in favorablegrowing weather, and even in dry weather it should be cut twice a month. Do not allow the clippings to remain on the ground, ex- cept they are very short.

Among other uses to which I have put the new material, Iadoo, is for forcing strawherries in pots, and the results were all that could be desired. The plants fruited abundantly, the fruit was large, the color splendid. and the flavor expuisite in all the varieties experimented with.

On different sorts of edible plants, such as tomatoes, egg plant, etc., which, earthed up with Jadoo Fibre, have given remarkable results both in production and in quality.

For the germination of fine delicate seeds, as well as cuttings and layers, Jadoo fined and pulverized in the hand, has shown itself altogether marvelous.

Lastly, and a most important point for our vineyards, this fertilizing Fibre applied to the vine in the same way

## Extract from Report on Jadoo in France.

The potatoes were being dug up while we were there, and the laborers called our special attention to the fact that the potatoes formed only in the Jadoo round the stalk and never in the soil.

In a vineyard where a comparative test of vines with and without Jadoo was made, the vines in Jadoo showed most marked superiority over those in earth. M. de Merona said, "You really have no need- to look at the marks to see where Jadoo begins." M. de Merona also showed us some truly marvelous results with tomatoes grown in Jadoo or rather in soil mixed with Jadoo Fibre.

## On 130 tomato plants he had got at least

 8ooo tomatoes.We also saw some excellent crops of celery, strawberries and especially kale grown in Jadoo Fibre ; the latter were remarkably fine.

We visited the Experimental Field at Avenson on the Barren Landes soil. This soll is considered absolutely useless for growing anything in, but after being cleared and ploughed up, it has, with the aid of a very small quantity of Jadoo Fibre, grown a really splendid crop of potatoes, a very good crop of beet-root (both ordinary beet-root and sugar beet) and an exceedingly good crop of young grape-vines.
