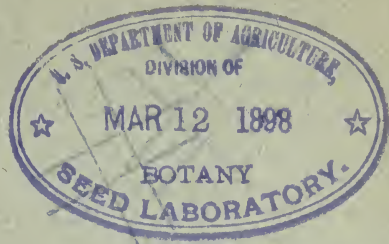


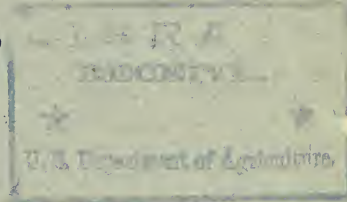

No charge is made for packing and shipping, except on freight orders below \$5 in value, when we charge 50 cents for cartage.

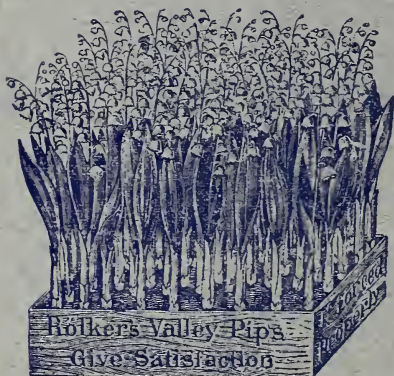

Terms.

Net Cash in Thirty Days from date of shipment, to approved accounts, payable in New York funds. Accounts not settled by the end of the month in which they fall due are subject to our sight draft, without further notice, *adding 25 cents* for exchange on New York.


Ten per cent Discount to the Trade on all orders above **One Dollar** accompanied by cash; the same discount on approved accounts paid within ten days from date of invoice, except where prices are marked **Net**. Remittances are first applied to overdue accounts before being entitled to the cash discount.

All C. O. D. shipments are net, *no discount* allowed, and we shall send no C. O. D. shipments unless a sufficient cash deposit accompanies the order to cover express charges both ways. *All unknown correspondents* must furnish satisfactory references, or send cash with each order.

Postage will be charged at the rate of one cent for every two ounces. **Buyers assume mail risk**, but are advised to instruct us to register packages, at an extra cost of eight cents per package, which enables the tracing if lost. Our responsibility ends with the mailing of the package.

No warranty, express or implied, *in any respect, is assumed by us, and we will not be held in any way responsible for the crop. Purchasers not agreeing to accept seeds with this understanding must return them at once*, as the failure of seeds to germinate may result from causes that the utmost care of the most experienced growers cannot control. NOVELTIES FOR 1898.

CALLIOPSIS, "TOM THUMB," CRIMSON KING.

This new and improved variety will be found a very suitable bedding annual, being a most striking and showy plant. The height is about 6 to 7 inches. Very compact and massive bloomer, forming a perfect little bush, covered with rich, dark crimson flowers. It should be sown in heat, February 28 or March 1, and pricked out into pots or boxes, kept in coldframes in order to keep the plants dwarf and sturdy, and planted out in May.

CANDYTUFT, "GIANT HYACINTH-FLOWERED WHITE."

This is a grand improvement on "Empress," with enormous spikes of bloom which measure as much as 7 inches in length and 7 inches in circumference, with 120 to 140 florets to a spike. A bed of this was greatly admired by all who saw it in bloom last summer. It is a striking plant, either for beds, as single specimens, for pots, or as a cut-flower.

GENERAL LIST OF FLOWER SEEDS BY WEIGHT.

To avoid delay, we request you to write your name very plainly, and always, no matter how often you write us, to give your Post Office, County, State and Street in full.

We invariably charge postage extra, one cent per two ounces, or 8 cents per pound, and 8 cents per package for registering. Buyers assume mailing risks; express is the safer way to send goods. Special prepaid rates on seeds and bulbs are the same as mail rates, *limiting* only the *cost of any single package to 10 cents.*

We charge less than one-quarter ounce of any variety at packet rates, less than one-quarter pound at ounce rates, except when otherwise stated.

No seed sold by weight for less than 10 cents. Each item will be invoiced in round amounts of fives and tens, not in fractions thereof.

Our trade packets contain liberal quantities. Half trade packets we do not put up.

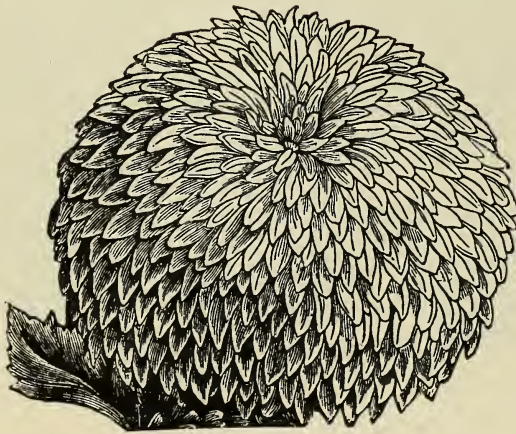

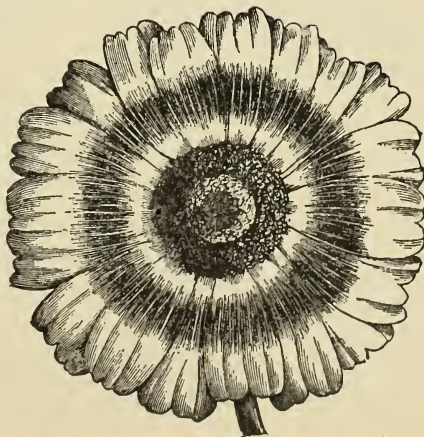

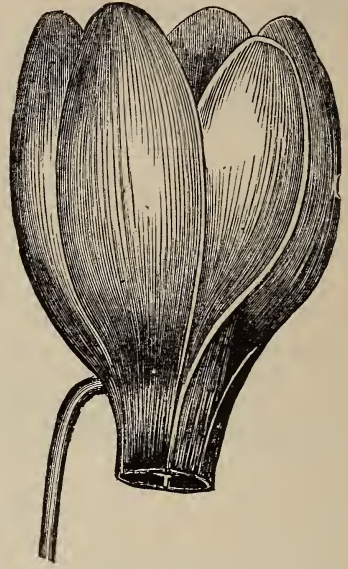

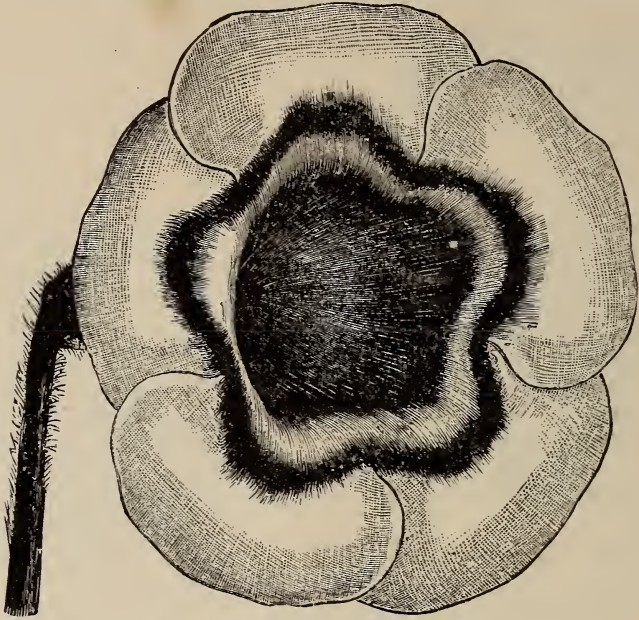

FUMIGATION.

There are various ways in which the Extract may be applied, but the following method is probably as simple and effective as any:—

For a house 100 x 25 feet, place in the walk, four deep metal pans, each containing a solution of about $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of the Extract and an equal amount of hot water, thoroughly mixed, then insert into each pan a piece of heavy iron brought to a red heat, sufficiently large to vaporize the contents of the pan. FOR SPRAYING PURPOSES.

Dilute as follows:—with warm water.

1 to 25 for Scale on Palms.

1 to 50 “ Green Fly.

● 1 to 40 “ Mealy Bug or Red Spider.

Dipping will be found in all cases more efficacious than spraying.

Florists must use their own judgment in applying to different plants and dilute according to the hardihood of the subject treated.

The above are only general suggestions.

Directions for Use on Animals.

"As a Sheep Dip."

Use one gallon of the Extract to fifty gallons of water. Soft water heated to about 100° is best. The sheep should be dipped into the solution and allowed to remain from two to three minutes. As a safeguard, a second application should be made in about ten days.
