Sow the seeds in drills about 1 inch deep, and the rows about 1 foot apart. Keep the soll mellow and free from weeds during the summer, and in the fall or succeeding spring the plants shous should be narrow, so as to permit of cutting to the center. Before winter cover the transplanted beds with about 4 inches of manure. Salt is an excellent manure for Asparagus. Sow a little on the surface in the spring and it will keep down the weeds. The young tops may be cut for the table the second summer, but not rery freely until the third.

In latitudes where the thermometer never ndicates 20 deg . below the freezing point, the early varleties of Cabbage may be sown if the open border, but in colder climates they must be sown in a hot-bed, about the middle of January or the first of February, and planted ut in March or April, in a rich. deep, loaming soll, in rows 2 feet apart and 18 inches in the row. The late varleties are usually sown in the early part of May, and plants set out in July, in rows 3 feet apart and 2 feet in the rows. In transplanting they must be set in other ground ap to the first leaf, no matter how long the tems may

## CELERY.

One Ounce for 2,000 Plants.
Sow the seed theflrst of March or first of April. By rolling or pressing in the seed the result will be more satisfactory than when only covered. Cut the tops off once or twice to make them dwarf and stocky. They may be planted out as late as the middle of August, but the best is about the middle of June to the first of July. In setting, prepare broad, shallow trenches, about six inches deep and four feet apart, in which plants should be set six inches apart. When nearly full grown they should be "handled," which is done by one man gathering the leave together, while a second draws the earth about the plant to one-third its height, taking care that none of the earth falls between the leaves, as it would be likely to cause them to rust or rot, repeating the process every few days until only the tops of the leaves e visible.

For a round bed 7 feet in diameter it will take 19 plants.
For a round bed 10 feet in dlameter it will take 37 plants.
For a round bed 13 feet in diameter it will take 61 plants;

THE PALACE OF LIBERAL ARTS is one of the fifteen great exhibit buildings of the World's Fair at St. Louis in 1904. It covers 9 acres, being 525 by 750 feet. In this building will be held the dedication ceremonies, April 30, 1903, the great Saengerfest of the North American Saengerbund, in June, 1903, and the International Press Congress, in September, 1903.


PALACE OF ELECTRICITY is in the shape of a keystone, its shortest facade to the southwest. i25 by an average of 600 feet, and covers 7 acres. It is the largest building ever devoted to a lectrical machinery and appliances.
