

Order Sheets and Addressed Envelopes.

We send Order Sheets and Envelopes with each Price List, and it greatly facilitates matters if customers will use same in sending orders. When out of them please ask for more. Kindly write any correspondence not directly connected with the order, on a separate sheet.

Order Early.

It will be a great advantage, both to customers and ourselves, if orders are sent in as early as possible. Please be particular to give Name, Full Address, and Shipping Directions.

Cash with Order.

Customers will please remit when ordering. We are frequently asked to send small lots where cash is not sent with order. Keeping account of such items entails upon us a good deal of labor, and after all is no real convenience to our friends

No Risk in Remitting.

We are responsible for the safe receipt of remittances in any of the following ways: Post Office Order, Express Order, Bank Draft or Check, Registered Letter, or Cash by Express.

On Receipt of Order.

When your order reaches us it is immediately inspected, and shipment made at once. If not, we advise you promptly.

Packing and Shipping.

We make no charge for Bags, Boxes, Packing or Hauling to Freight or Express Offices. Columbus is a fine Shipping point, having Seventeen (17) Railroads and all the Express Companies. We advise customers who live at places where there is an Express Office to have lots of from one to ten pounds sent by EXPRESS PREPAID, rather than by mail. The cost is the same (8 cents per pound) but Express is quickest and surest. This rate (8 cents per pound) applies to the most distant Express Office in the United States.

Large Orders.

Any Market Gardener, Institution or individual wishing seeds in large quantities, is requested to mail us a list of wants and we will promptly return it with the very lowest prices marked. A letter of inquiry may save you dollars if you want to buy in quantities.

Seeds by Mail.

OUR PRICES are based on customers paying transportation charges. When Packets, Ounces, and Quarter-pounds are wanted by Mail we pay the postage. When larger lots, such as Pounds or Quarts are wanted by mail or express, prepaid, customers must remit &c. per pound and 15c. per quart extra. When not ordered by mail or express, prepaid as above described, we ship by express or freight at buyers' expense. We supply half-pound at pound rates, half-peck at peck rates, and half-bushel at bushel rates.

While we exercise great care to have all seeds, bulbs and plants pure and reliable, we do not give any warranty, express or implied. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these terms and conditions, they must be returned at once, and the money that has been paid for the same will be returned. We cannot afford knowingly to sell seeds doubtful as to vitality or purity. We test our seeds before sending out, and should they prove defective in germination or purity when properly planted and cultivated, we will refil the order free or refund the price paid.

ONCE again we have to offer to the public, a real good new Tomato; and one that is quite distinct in several important points, from all other varieties sent out by us in former years.

Livingston's Hummer is round as a ball, smooth as an apple, a good variety for forcing, also very prolific, and has the least indenture about the stem end of any Tomato with which we are familiar (see illustration); hence there is no waste whatever in preparing the fruits for use. The color of the fruit is a bright-scarlet (not purple), and very attractive. The flesh is a rich crimson-scarlet, and of the very finest quality. In size, not so large as Livingston's Stone, but a most excellent variety nevertheless for canners' use, as a large per-centage of the fruits can be put into the can whole; and being quite an early Tomato, is especially desirable also for canners' use in those latitudes where the crop must be produced in a short period of time.









Pure White, Large Sized, Trumpet-Shaped, Exquisitely Fragrant. Splendid Garden Lily

A beautiful new variety from one of the Philippine Islands, which promises to be a rival to the Bermuda Easter Lily in size, shape, and exquisite fragrance, and it may also prove sufficiently hardy for the climate of Ohio, and further South, with little or no protection. They do splendidly in green-houses as we grew a few the past season. They have been brought into bloom in eight weeks. They grow from two to three feet in height, and produce one to three large blooms to the stem. The trumpet-shaped flowers are seven to twelve inches long, and four to seven inches across the trumpet. The stems are thin and wiry; foliage narrow—almost grass-like, but graceful and drooping. They are entirely distinct from all other sorts; are found only on one of the Philippine Islands, and in no other place in the world. Planted out April 15 to May 1st, and up to June 1st, they bloom in July and August, and the bulbs are ripened by October. Every flower lover should have this newest of all the Lilies.

BLACK VALENTINE BUSH BEAN.

A ROUND, GREEN-PODDED VARIETY.

This fine snap-bean possesses all the merits of the favorite Red Valentine, and in addition has other desirable qualities; the plants are of compact but vigorous growth, very hardy, with a capacity for resisting unfavorable weather and disease, thus specially adapting this variety for very early as well as for very late planting; in fact, it is most reliable and satisfactory for sowing in succession at any season, being thrifty and enormously productive even under adverse conditions. HODSON "GREEN-POD" BUSH BEAN. (AN ENORMOUS YIELDING, ENTIRELY)

Our attention was first drawn to this splendid variety, by the fact that it was entirely unaffected by anthracnose, rust, or blight; when other sorts, growing under the same conditions, were seriously injured. It is an exceptionally strong and robust grower, many of the bushes measuring two to two and one-half feet in height, and the same in breadth; it is an enormous yielder, often producing 50 to 60 pods to the plant, and withstanding adverse weather conditions to a remarkable degree. The roots run very deep in the ground, and the foliage continues fresh and vigorous when many other kinds wilt from heat and drought. Notwithstanding an exceedingly unfavorable season, one grower who planted five quarts of seed last spring produced 135 one-bushel baskets of fine marketable pods, all of which sold at \$1.00 to \$1.25 per basket. Hodson Green-Pod is a late variety, coming to maturity a little later than Refugee, or Thousand to One; hence it does not compete in the markets with the very large number of earlier green-podded sorts. Its table quality is first class, and if picked young the pods are entirely stringless; it is an excellent shipper and cannot fail to become exceedingly popular in the South. 

MUSHROOMS.

Mushrooms can be grown in any dark room or cellar where the temperature is kept at 50 to 70 degrees. From some old pasture, procure good rich soil and store it away. To every bushel of this add two bushels of fresh horse manure. Of this well-mixed compound prepare a bed, say four feet wide. Put down a thin layer and pound it down hard, and so on until the bed is twelve to eighteen inches thick. It soon becomes pretty hot, but let the heat recede until it is only 85 to 90 degrees. Then make holes, say a foot apart, and put in the Spawn, two or three pieces as large as a walnut to each hole. Cover the holes and press the soil down solid and smooth. Let the bed remain in this condition about twelve days; then cover the bed with two inches of fresh loam, and over this put four or five inches of hay or straw, and the work is done. If the temperature is right, in six or eight weeks you may expect Mushrooms. The beds will continue bearing from twenty to thirty days. After the first crop is gathered, spread over the bed an inch of fresh soil, moisten with warm water, and cover with hay as before. One pound of Spawn for a bed 2x6 feet.








