## CHRISTMAS HYACINTHS

We personally tested these out the past winter and found that, with a little care and attention, it was an easy matter to get this strain in flower for Christmas and New Year's.
The bulbs are harvested earlier than the other sorts and cured under special conditions. We have selected in our list only the sorts that produce large spikes, which will give satisfaction. If you have a store trade of Hyacinths, not alone these will prove a novelty, but also a money-maker. The bulbs are about as large as first-size named Hyacinths and will produce large flower spikes. They should be potted as soon as received and brought indoors as soon as the crown of the bulb shows well above the pot. When the bud is well developed they should be brought into gentle heat.

## CULTURAL NOTE ON PAEONIES

Autumn is one of the best times for planting. The soil should be well enriched with well-rotted manure. The roots should be set about 3 feet apart in rows, the latter 4 feet apart, to enable them to be cultivated with horse machines. The crowns should not be set more than 4 inches below the top of the soll; deeper planting may mean fewer flowers, sometimes none Cultivate ther freely, Drior mean ewer flowers, sometimes inone
to and after the fowering season. In the spring, as soon as the ground can be worked, plow or work in a heavy coating of wellrotted manure.

FUMIGATING: See that the windows and doors are closed. Fill the spirit lamp half full with wood spirit, and light. Place the wire frame over the lamp. Measure the required quantity of the componud into the pan which should not be filled over the rim (the measure supplied contains one ounce.) and place same on the wire frame over the lamp. Leave the house at once and do not enter again for at least two hours. The lamp will die out shortly after the "NICOTICIDE" has evaporated. We recommend that the house should be fumigated the last thing in the evening and not entered again until the following morning. If house has steam heat the pipes may be painted or use ordinary engineer's oiling can with spout and handle, having hole in spout equal to ordinary knitting needle. Run small stream on steam pipe when full of steam producing heavy fumigation. Fumigate (or spray) whenever bugs show themselves. A few bugs if left alone multiply so rapidly they soon do great damage.

SPRAYING: One ounce to 10 or 15 gallons of water is generally effective, if sprayed often at first each time from a different direction. Spray is better with addition of soap, one ounce to two gallons. The spray should be repeated at intervals to kill the young as they hatch out.

When spraying or fumigating for Mealy Bug or Spider we recommend that NICOTICIDE be applied more freely and in stronger solutions. which also will be essential in cases where plants have been extraordinarily infected by insects.

## SOME HINTS AS TO USE

The following are extracts from letters from Florists.
"In a house of roses $200 \times 30$, 14 feet high, I found that six lamps, six ounces of the NICOTICIDE were sufficient to effectually destroy the green fly.
"In my carnation house I found four lamps quite sufficient and all that was necessary in the same size house. "One application is sufficient to get a house clean of aphis, red spider, etc., and two applications destroyed every mealy bug."
"The four ounce can killed all the green fly in two houses, each $20 \times 100$ feet, the first time I fumigated with the compound."
"First application kills all aphis, second all mealy bug and red spider. I have mixed plants-ferns, palms, roses-NICOTICIDE hurts nothing but insects, but it puts them to sleep that knows no awakening."
"It is better not to wait until the THRIP attacks the buds. They certainly must be in the house before the buds show and that is the time to kill them. ## FUMIGATING

## FOR GREEN FLY OR APHIS.

In most cases one ounce will be sufficient for 4,000 cubic feet and when the house is quite tight even a smaller quantity is frequently found sufficient. If all plants infected with aphis are collected at one end of the house, one fumigator placed in a central position amongst them will readily destroy these bugs.

## RED SPIDER AND MEALY BUG.

Use full strength, one ounce every 2,000 cubic féet, distributing fumigators evenly.

Atmosphere and soil should both be moist, and it is better to fumigate on a cloudy day or night, always avoiding sunshine during operation.

## TO MEASURE THE HOUSE.

Multiply the length in feet by the breadth in feet, then multiply the result by the average height in feet: the result is the number of cubic feet. To ascertain the average height, add the height from floor to ridge pole to height from floor to gutter, and divide by two.

In conclusion use great care in treating easily injured plants or flowers as adiantums, violets, etc. Two applications may be made at diminished strength instead of one.
