

Little or no protection is needed in winter, and for the small amount of labor necessary to prune and care for them, no flower will yield a larger dividend in pleasure. The South should be the land of roses, and it is our desire to make Montgomery headquarters for the distribution of the best varieties in the country.


HOW TO GROW ROSES IN THE GARDEN

Preparation of the Ground.—Roses will grow in any fertile well-drained ground, but they respond quickly to liberal cultivation, producing a more vigorous growth, more flowers and a better quality when so treated. The ground should be dug to a depth of 18 inches, incorporating with the soil a liberal amount of well decayed manure, preferably cow manure, but if this is not readily procurable, our Pure Ground Bone applied at the rate of five pounds to the square yard makes a good substitute.

When, Where and How to Plant.—The best time to plant pot grown roses is from March 1st to June 1st, or that is after there is any chance of a freeze and before the hot weather begins. Always select an open, sunny position. Roses will not do as well in the shade. In planting, set the plants just a little deeper than they were before being taken up. Firm the soil well around the plants.

Mrs. George Shawyer—A bright peach pink, strong grower, and very free blooming; one of the finest new roses of recent years.



Mrs. Herbert Stevens—Long pointed bud, white in color, shading to peach at center. One of the best garden roses.












