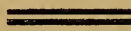

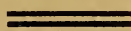

## PEAR

**BARTLETT.**— The standard pear, very productive; fruit large and good quality. September.

**CLAPP'S FAVORITE.**— Tree hardy and a good bearer; fruit of fine texture; color, a pale yellow. Aug.-Sept.

**DUCHESS.**— Fruit large, rich and juicy. Tree, a strong grower. Oct.-Nov.

**KIEFFER** — Tree is hardy and an extra strong grower, a popular market variety Oct.-Nov.

**SECKEL.**— Fruit, small but rich and excellent flavor; tree is quite productive. Sept -October

## PLUM

**ABUNDANCE.**— Fruit is large: color, yellow. Tree a good grower and strong bearer. August

**BURBANK.**— Good market variety. Tree is hardy and very productive. Color is a deep red. August

**BRADSHAW** — Large sized fruit, deep red color. Good for market. Aug.

**LOMBARD.**— One of the best market varieties. Fruit is violet red, medium size and fine flavor. August.

**WICKSON.**— A strong favorite, very productive. Fruit is extra large with a fine flavor. Color, red. September

**SHROPSHIRE DAMSON** — Medium size, deep purple color. Fine for preserves Heavy bearer. October.

## CHERRY

**EY. RICHMOND** — Well known as a prolific bearer. Fruit is medium size and dark red color. June

**MAY DUKE** — Large red fruit, rich and juicy. June

**MONTMORENCY** — Fruit is large and a rich red color. Closely follows the Early Richmond. June-July

**BLK. TARTARIAN** — Productive bearer. Fruit is large, color black. Flesh is rich and juicy. June - July

## QUINCE

**ORANGE** — Fruit of a bright yellow color, and of fine flavor. The most popular variety and considered the standard. October

**CHAMPION** — Strong and steady bearer. Fruit is fair sized, and a good keeper.

# APPLES

## SUMMER VARIETIES.

RED ASTRACHAN — Fruit is large and of fine flavor. Tree is a strong and vigorous grower. August.

SWEET BOUGH.— A strong grower Fruit is tender and juicy, and of a pale yellow color. Aug.

YELLOW TRANSPARENT.— A popular early variety, and considered one of the best. Color, nearly white. Fruit, a fine flavor. July-Aug.

## AUTUMN VARIETIES.

DUCHESS.— Large fruit, with red and yellow streaks. Very productive. Well known as a Market variety Sept.

Maiden Blush.— Fruit yellow, with a red cheek. A fine eating apple. A good grower and productive. Sept.-Oct.

## WINTER VARIETIES.

BALDWIN.— An old, standard variety. Fine for market. Dec. to March.

GANO.— An improved Ben Davis. Extra late variety. Fruit, a deep crimson. Tree is very productive, and a steady bearer. Jan. to April.

R. I. Greening.— A standard, yellowish-green apple. An old, reliable variety. March-April.

GRIMES GOLDEN.— One of the best, perhaps The Best, of the yellow apples. Tree is a productive bearer. Fruit of rich flavor, sub-acid. Jan.-April.

HUBBARDSON.— An old favorite. Large, red striped fruit, with a fine flavor Nov. to May.

JONATHAN.— One of our favorites. Fruit, medium to large size. Color, deep crimson. Flesh, white and of excellent flavor. Good for either market or home use. Nov.-April.

KING.— A productive bearer. Fruit is large, with red and yellow stripes, a fine eating apple. Nov. to May.

McIntosh Red.— A well known, market variety. Fruit, deep red color and of a medium size. Nov.-Apr.

NORTHERN SPY.— The standard of quality. None better.

SNOW.— A favorite on account of its white flesh and rich flavor. Color is a deep red. Nov. to Jan.

STARK.— Noted for its keeping qualities. Color, green with red streaks. Tree a strong grower. Jan.-May.



## APPLE. - - Continued.

STEELE'S RED.— A rich, red apple. Combines the qualities of the Baldwin and Spy. One of the best red varieties for a commercial orchard. Nov. to May.

TOLMAN SWEET.— Fruit, medium size. Color, yellow with red cheek. Nov.-April.

WAGNER.— A well known red apple. Flesh firm and of good flavor. Dec.-May.

WEALTHY.— Productive bearer, extensively planted. Fruit is large and of good quality. Color, red. Nov.-Feb.

WINESAP.— Extensively grown. A red apple, medium size and good flavor. Dec.-April.

WINTER BANANA.— One of the popular varieties. Fruit is yellow with a red cheek. Nov.-Jan.

## CRAB APPLE

HYSLOP.— The standard Crab -apple. Fruit, a deep red and of good size. Tree is a strong bearer. October.

## PEACH

ELBERTA.— The standard market variety. Good grower and bearer. Fruit is large and showy. Sept.

GOLD DROP.— A favorite canning peach. Fruit, juicy and sweet. Tree is a prolific bearer. Last of Sept.

ENGLES MAMMOTH.— Tree is productive. Fruit, of a yellow color. Sept.

NEW PROLIFIC.— Strong and vigorous grower, productive. Color, yellow. Sept

EARLY CRAWFORD.— Fruit yellow, large size and nice flavor. Early Sept

LATE CRAWFORD.— Similiar to the former, but later. Late Sept.

KALAMAZOO.— Strong grower and heavy bearer; fruit, large and of fine flavor. Color, a rich yellow. Early Sept.

HILL'S CHILI.— Fruit, medium size. Tree, hardy and a good bearer. Late Sept

LEMON FREE.— Very good bearer; fruit, lemon color and excellent quality. September.

SMOCK.— Good market variety. Fruit is large; color, yellow with a red cheek.

SALWAY.— One of the best late varieties, a good bearer. Fruit, large and fine flavored. October

TRIUMPH.— Strong grower, productive. Fruit, large and juicy. Quality good.

CHAMPION.— ( White ) — One of the best white peaches. Extra large size. White with a red cheek, juicy and rich flavor. Tree, strong grower, hardy. August

# GOOSEBERRY

DOWNING — Greenish - white berry of large size. Bush is very hardy and productive. Very good market variety.

HOUGHTON — An old favorite. Bush is large with slender branches. Fruit is medium size and bright red color.

RED JACKET — Large red berry of fine quality. Bush is a good grower and a strong bearer.

# CURRANT

LONDON MARKET — The standard Currant. Plants are vigorous and very productive. Fine for market and home use.

VICTORIA — Fruit, medium size and excellent quality. Color, a bright red.

WHITE GRAPE — Productive bearer: plants, low and spreading. Yellowish - white berry of large size.

BLK. CHAMPION — The standard black Currant. Plants are strong growers and productive

# RASPBERRY

GREGG — Berry, good size and fine flavor; color, deep purple. Productive.

KANSAS — The hardiest black - cap. Good strong grower and heavy bearer. We recommend this variety.

CUTHBERT — Fruit large; color, a deep red. One of the very best for market and garden.

LOWDEN — Vigorous grower; large red fruit of superior flavor. Productive and one of the best shippers. Medium to late season.

# STRAWBERRY

DUNLAP — The standard early variety. Fruit, a bright red color. Good keeper and shipper.

BRANDYWINE — Another good berry for market purposes. Ripens late.

MARSHALL — A very early variety. Berries large, good color and quality.

MICHAEL'S EARLY — Berries medium size and bright red color. A prolific bearer.

# GRAPE

CONCORD — An old standard of fine growing habits. Fruit is large and grows in good sized bunches. Color is a deep purple, nearly black.

WORDEN — An early black grape. Prolific and hardy. Ripens before the Concord.

NIAGARA — The standard White grape. A fine market variety.

DELAWARE — One of the best Red varieties. Fruit has a thin skin, quality is excellent. Soil must be kept rich for best results.

NOTICE — When trees or plants are received from the Nursery, they should be unpacked as soon as possible; then if you are not ready to plant, plow or dig a trench in the ground and heel in the stock. Spread out the roots and pack the earth firmly around them, covering to a depth of about four inches. It is also well to dampen the roots before heeling in.

Care, in the handling and setting of Plants, is a very important factor in Successful Growing.
