The initial cost of seeds is trifling, in comparison to the crop-yield, if the stock purchased is seeured from a reliable source. Again the Bean crop is a failure—in some varieties total. An early frost, followed by a nearly continual rainfall during the harvest season, rendered many of the fields inaccessible. The same report applies to the Gradus as well as the Laxtonian type of Peas. Some Sugar Corns have also proven very disappointing, especially our celebrated "Noll's New Early," which is a complete failure. We regret this very much as this variety has many staunch friends among market gardeners and it will be a hard one to do without temporarily. Most varieties of Onion are also very short in deliveries,—in fact, in some cases the yield in seed is practically nothing.

Conditions on the European Continent have not improved the outlook by any means. With many of the employees of the seed farms called to arms, the planting, and later the harvesting of the crops has been a very difficult task, and with very indifferent weather, as well. Beets, Radish, Celery, Spinach and Turnip have been the principal sufferers, but we have been fortunate to secure what we consider under the circumstances pretty liberal quantities on our foreign contracts and have kept our figures as low as possible for those who prefer high-grade seeds.

To those to whom we are unknown, but into whose hands our Market Gardeners' Catalogue may go for the first time, we only ask for a trial order to prove the superiority of our seeds. We do our very utmost to sell only the best grade of goods, and have many testimonials to show that our efforts have not been in vain.

Immediately a shipment is received, germination tests are made and later at our trial grounds, Elmora, N. J., all the different parcels of seeds are tried out as to the purity of the stocks and we take every known precaution to have our seeds above suspicion and of the highest vitality.

Our firm is controlled by men who have been in the seed trade all their lives, and they are ably assisted by an efficient corps of clerks.




