


TUCKER FRANQUETTE WALNUT.

This walnut is propagated from walnut trees found on Union Avenue, south of Bakersfield, and is budded and grafted on native California black roots.

ORIGIN OF TREES.

The Union Avenue trees come from trees imported direct from France, and are 21 years old.

FROM THE REGULAR STRAIN FRANQUETTE

Almost all the Franquette walnuts in the west come from Gillett's importation of walnuts in 1871.

This strain has been excellent for quality, but short on quantity. In fact, the Franquette has come to be the standard of walnuts, and brings the highest price of any walnut on the market.

The standard price of the Franquette is 20 cents per pound wholesale. The Union Avenue trees were imported by John Rock, and is a little smoother and do not taper to the apex, as much as the regular strain Franquette.

The Union Avenue trees are bearing as much as 400 pounds of nuts per year, and seldom fall under 200 pounds. Two hundred pounds is a heavy crop for any tree. The averae crop of walnuts at this age is forty pounds. Forty pounds is a paying crop; in fact, will pay ten per cent on \$1000 per acre land. When it comes to bearing 200, 300 or over 400 pounds per tree, a walnut grove of this kind is better than a gold mine or an oil well.

WELL ADAPTED TO THE HOT INTERIOR CLIMATE.

The Union Avenue trees are model specimens of tree growth and beauty. The trees are of an upright growth, branches thick, and foliage heavy.

These trees show fewer sunburned nuts than trees in Southern California.

Our young trees show uncommon vigor. We are growing trees sixteen feet in one season, from the bud on two-year-old stumps. We can show trees with any one in any land.

NO BLIGHT OR FROST.

The Franquette is a native of a country where it snows. It puts out in the spring from six weeks to two months later than the ordinary walnuts, and matures as early in the fall, thus putting it out of all danger of frost.

Blight is spread by water, and as it seldom rains or fogs after this walnut puts out in the spring, we probably never will be bothered with the blight.

YOUNG TREES BEARING.

It is an uncommon thing for a five-year-old Franquette to bear even a few nuts. The extraordinary bearing qualities of the Tucker Franquette is holding good in the young trees. We had a number of three-year-old trees to bear this year. We have only two four-year-old trees. One of these trees bore 105 nuts, the other one 302 nuts.

This walnut is making a showing equal to any walnut in any land, and is to make Kern county famous.
