Should error occur, we will replace with true stock or refund amount paid. There is one fact about Peonies that should be brought forcibly to the attention of all purchasers of Peony roots. That is, it takes fully three years from the time the root is planted before the Peony becomes adequately established to enable it to produce normal flowers. We do not pretend to come to final conclusions regarding them until they have bloomed the third year from planting.

### TIME TO BUY PEONIES

#### DURING THE FALL SEASON

The proper time to buy and plant Peonies is from September 1st until the ground freezes up.

The varieties in this list are ready in September, October and November. Let us book your order now. Orders filed in strict rotation. We can al-ways supply standard varieties of Peonies at lower price in the fall than in the spring.

If you wish Peonies for immediate delivery, spring, 1918, write us for our wholesale list, which gives varieties we can supply with prices. Can usually deliver up to April 1st; after that time we book your order for fall delivery.

### SIZE OF ROOTS

We grade our roots as follows:

- 1st Size, Divided Roots-This is a root divided until it has from two to five eyes. This is the size we always plant and we recommend this for general planting, both as to the desirability of its low cost and the results obtained.
- 2d Size, One-Year Roots-This is a 1st size divided root of two to five eyes planted and grown for one year, then dug and sold you as it comes from the ground.
- 3d Size, Two-Year Roots—This is the 2d size left in the ground one year longer and sold you as it comes from the soil.
  4th Size, Three-Year Roots—This is the 3d size left in the ground one year longer and sold you as it
- comes from the soil.

At the prices quoted in this list we send divisions with from two to five eyes.

For one-year roots add one-half to price for divisions.
