All parcels of seeds, bulbs and plants over 8 ozs., and sundries over 4 ozs. in weight come under these rates. Any shipment of these less than 8 ozs . at the rate of 1 c . for each 2 ozs., except sundries, which are at the rate of 1 c . for each oz.
In compiling this Catalog we have endeavored to give the shipping weights on most sundries, where their nature, size and weight permits their being sent by parcel post. Liquids and poisons are excluded from the mails. Plants and bulbs in aggregate lots (where not otherwise mentioned) in half dozen or less, reguire postage to the amount of 20 per cent. of their value. Over six and up to one dozen or more, where plants and bulbs are of a nature and weight, to permit parcel post shipment, allow for postage in the amount of 15 per cent. of their value. If you remit more than is necessary for postage we will refund the remainder to you.
Plants by Parcel Post is very unsatisfactory and uncertain, the service is full of delays, and frequently when plants sent by this method arrive at their destination they are dearl; we earnestly suggest to our customers the sending of plants by express (which rates are very reasonable now). We are then abie to gnarantee safe arrival, and invariably give larger and better plants.
PARCEL POST SHIPMENTS AT OUR EXPENSE AS FOLLOWS
We pay postage charges on all orders for vegetable and flower seeds. provided the order calls for packets, ounces. quarter-pounds and pounds (pints and quarts of beans, corn, peas and mixed grass seeds, are not included), or such other seeds where mention is made in catalog. Not in a time that anyone can recall have conditions in the Serel Trade been as they are today. The Season 1917 closed with practically no supplies of 1 egretable Sireds left over. During that year the growers who produce seeds for us phanted a much larger acreage than ever before; every one connected in any way with agricultural pursuits put forth extra efforts to have bumper crops, but only to be disappointed, in many instalers.

Unfavorable weather at planting time, followed by either too much rain or not enough coupled with labor scarcity, has finally resulted in the shortest crop of Vegetable Seeds in almost every item produced in the United States.

Added to this already serious condition, the seed-producing centres of Europe are not able to make their usual deliveries to us, on account of restricted acreage planted (due to labor shortage), aud on account of the European governments' system of conserving for home needs much, and in most cases all, of the seed harvest.
We regret this condition, but it is beyond our control, and for this reason all prices on Vegetable Seeds are offered subject to change without notice

Spinach can also be grown successfully under hot bed sash during the early winter and spring months.

## SQUASH

## CHICORY OR WITLOOF

This delicious vegetable is becoming more popular each year. The roots are easily produced from seed, sown in May or June. They are taken up and wintered over, heeled in soil, or otherwise cared for in a frost-proof cellar, as one would care for Turnips, Carrots or similar crops. It is used only as a winter vegetable, the top part only being edible. While best results are obtained from planting the roots under a bench in the greenhouse, nevertheless a light, dry, warm portion of a cellar will scrve the same purpose. In either case a bed of rich garden soil, about i2 inches deep, and in a size to accommodate whatever number of plants it is desired to force at one time. They should be placed about 6 inches apart each way. The top growth remains intact, as the illustration shows and may be cut any time after they have about 5 inches growth, before the heads begin to expand Roots should be set in the soil the same depth as they were originally in the garden. A continuous supply of this delicious winter vegetable can be had from December Ist to April Ist. A cold frame makes also an ideal place for forcing them in the late winter or early spring months. Care should be
 taken, when grown indoors, to water occasionally, as conditions may demand. As one crop is used up, another shonld be planted, to secure a contiruous supply. It is better, of course, if two beds are at one's disposal.

## COW PEAS

Note: Occasionally some people order Cow Peas, thinking they are the same as Canadian Field Peas and sow them early and in consequence they do not germinate, as they do not stand cold, and the innocent seedsman is blamed for what is not his fault. There is a wide difference between Cow Peas and Canadian Peas, the latter which are offered in the opposite column.

The short-growing varieties are best for turning under as green manure, while the trailing sorts are desirable for hay. Cattle, sheep or hogs can be turned into a field of them and they will eat it off greedily and the stubble can be plowed under. In the latitude of Phila., sow from May ist to July Ist, 2 bushels per acre broadcast, or I bushel per acre in drills. For a large crop sow the seed as late as possible and not too thick.

Black. One of popular varieties extensively grown. It is very prolific and matures early. It is of upright growth, consequently preferred for ploughing under or for grazing stock.

#### Abstract

Our flower seeds have a reputation for their superior quality and for the excellent results obtained by sowing them. It is our constant endeavor to supply only such varieties and strains that will give the best of satisfaction.

Throughout the following pages of Flower Seeds the different varieties are designated as Annuals, Biennials, Perennials, etc., and for the benefit of those who are not familiar with these terms, we wish to make the following brief explanation:

Annuals. These grow and bloom, mature their seed and then die in the same year, such as Asters, Balsams, Poppies, Sweet Peas, Morning Glories, etc., some of which may be sown in the house from March to May, or outdoors after danger from frost is over.

Biennials. These grow from seed sown during mid-summer, flowering the second year, after which they die; many of the varieties bloom the first season if sown early. In this class we have Pansies, English Daisies, Campanula Medium, Dianthus, etc.

Perennials. Those which live from year to year, such as Aquilegia, Delphinium, Foxgloves, etc. Seed may be sown outdoors from June to September and transplanted late in fall into their permanent quarters, and protected during winter with a light litter of straw or leaves. The hardy perennials not usually needing any protection after the first winter; the half-hardy perennials require protection during the winter, and the tender perennials during the winter require greenhouse protection.

# MICHELL'S SUPERB DAHLIAS 

Our list tbis season has again been thorougbly revised, many of the older varieties of Dahlias have been omitted and superseded by others that are much superior, in fact, our offering contains many sorts not fouud elsewhere in this country. Wbere plants are offered these will be ready early in May, during which montb they may be set out. althougb tbey are planted witb great success all during June and July, and will give splendid results. The natural season for the Dablia to be at its best is during September and October; in fact, effort to get superior blooms before that time should not be attempted. Dablias like cool, moist nights which do not exist in July and August. To get large flowers the plants sbould be disbudded during June and July, while tbe August buds sbould be allowed to develop one on a stem. Don't fertilize Dahlias much until the bloom begins to develop.

While Dablias will sometimes succeed even under adverse conditions, it will amply repay you with larger and better flowers, if you follow the following instructions. Tbere is no plant that more highly appreciates good treatment.

Spade or plow the ground to a deptb of about 8 inches. As a fertilizer use either well-rotted Stable Manure or, better still, Sbeep Manure, which should be well mixed with the soil. When the soil is properly prepared, dig a bole, 6 inches deep, in whicb to plant the Dahlias. Tbe bulbs should be laid down flat and covered to depth of 4 inches. Every Dahlia should have from $21 / 2$ to 3 feet space and at least 4 feet between the rows.

As soon as the plants are a foot above the ground, they should be tied to the stake. The best material for this purpose is Raffia or Raffia tape

Keep the ground well cultivated and free from weeds. A frequent stirring of the surface is very beneficial. An application of Sheep Manure and Bone Meal about every two weeks will be of greatest benefit.
Never leave more than one or two stalks in a hill. You will have better plants and larger flowers if you will allow only one sprout to grow.

If plants are set out, practically the same treatmeut applies, but the planting should better be delayed until the latter part of May. Plants produce, as a rule, less leaf growth and more flowers.

After the frost has killed tbe foliage, lift the clumps with a spade or fork and allow them to dry in the sun for about $1 / 2$ day. They should then be stored in a cool cellar, but free from frost. Cover tbe clumps with peat or soil, to keep the air from them and thus prevent them from shriveling up during winter.
ABOUT DAHLIA PLANTS. It happens sometimes tbat tbere is an unusually large demand for certain varieties, and our stock of these as a consequence becomes exhausted; in sucb instances we will send out strong plauts after May 1st, after which time most all Dahlia orders are filled with plants.

Note. This season we have reduced considerably our list of varieties of dahlias; each season tbere are new sorts added, and unless revised carefully the number of dahlias to choose from, we

This class of Hydrangeas is the one which is seen planted so extensively at the North Atlantic seashore and inland resorts. They seem to do especially well in these localities. It bas been the general opinion that the plant is not hardy, but iu many places it is not afforded even the sligbtest protection, although we recommend tbat care be taken, especially the first few years after planting, and especially so with tbe French sorts, to protect them over winter with a covering of manure or other suitable litter, and also to wrap the plants in burlap, straw or even paper will do, as this will proteet tbe flower buds. which are often injured in severe winters, althougb the plants otherwise do not suffer. If winter protection is used, same should not be removed until all danger of frost is over, otherwise the tender shoots are nipped in the cold nights of early spring, and few flowers are tbe result. Tbese varieties of Hydrangea often change their colors; for instance, pink varieties will sometimes turn out blue. This, however, is infrequent, but when the type is fixed it usually remains so. If, however, it is desired to change pink Hydrangea blue and the latter pink, this can be usually accomplished by incorporating into the soil a few handfuls
 of soot or iron filings. If this is not obtainable, lump alum broken into small pieces and incorporated into tbe soil, about $1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$. to each plaut, will usually produce the same results. Tbis class of Hydrangeas is best planted around verandas for fine effects. They can also be set in tubs for wall. coping or lawn decoration. If used in the latter way tbe plants should be taken in in the winter to a frost-proof eellar and occasionally given some water. Hydrangeas in the summertime should be watered liberally every day when there is no rain. Applications of Cow Manure. Sheep Manure or Bone Meal will greatly increase the flowering qualities.

All loose petaled bulbs should be planted on their side instead of upright. In fact, this could apply to all of them.

These are sometimes grown in pots for indoor blooming, in which case they are handled much like the Bermuda Easter Lily. We recommend, however, they should be grown exchasively ontatoors.

In winter all lilies should have a protection of long manure, loosely thrown over the bed.

The color is rather hard to describe, but, quoting the originator's own words, he called it Scarlet-Red, with a blending of bright shrimp pink with a coppery red reflex and golden yellow petal tips. The buds can best be described as orange vermillion red, blending into golden yellow. The color combination is really new, and we do not really think that it is approached by any other variety. The flowers, when fully opened, measure about $11 / 4$ inches in diameter. They are borne in clusters and produced in wonderful freedom, and, as the French name indicates, they appear like "Glistening Stars." The plant is equally satisfactory, if set out as an individual specimen, but is far more attractive when several plants are masseri together or planted in beds. It is absolutely hardy, strong and a vigorous grower, and quite fragrant. No other variety equals it for rose bowls or miniature vases. There is only a limited stock of the variety in this country that we know of, being divided between another large rose grower and ourselves. For that reason we recommend to all who want a strictly high-class miniature rose for outdoor planting that they give this variety a trial.

PLEASE NOTE.-Our list has again been revised, and we believe will be found to contain most of the popular sorts. We have included in our offer the sorts usually procured from Europe and as this catalog was made up were hopeful of receiving them as usual. This season we have arranged our list in strict alphabetical order, believing it will be more easy to locate any variety we offer.

We have placed a letter adjoining each sort to denote its class. T indicates Tea Variety; HT indicates Hybrid Tea Variety ; HP indicates Hybrid Perpetual.

## SPECIAL DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING AND CARING FOR ROSES

Open a good space in the soil and spread out roots; never cramp them into a small hole. Do not let manure come in contact with roots, but place it underneath and a layer of soil on top. If the rose is a bush plant, set it so deep that only branches are visible above the ground and never the main stem, but too deep is as bad as too shallow; 2 to 4 inches of the lower branches may be under the surface, but no more. If the plant is a budded or grafted rose, be sure that the bud or graft is fully 3 inches brlow the surface. Pruue in spring, only, when life is just apparent and remove what might appear to be surplus wood. The strongest growth should be cut back to within six inches above the ground, the weaker growth to, 4 inches. All soil above the roots should be well pressed down. Feed your roses with "Ground Bone" and "Pulverized Sheep Manure." Mulch the ground during summer with cow manure or with Peat Moss. As winter approaches draw soil 6 to 8 inches high around the stem. this avoids winter killing, especially the HT and T varieties, then cover with loug manure or similar litter.

EARLY FLOWERING VARIETIES. In front of varieties of this class we have prefixed the letter ( $E$ ), and probably should state here that these are not dependably hady in our climate. even thongh protected when left outcoors in the winter.

Those who are not yet accuaintef with this type of Chrysanthemm, on seeing them for the first time, will realize at one their woudrous heauty and free-flowering duatities. Although they are principally cultivated as an ontdoor plant. they respond wonderfully when grown inside.

They are chiefly conspienons by the fact that some varieties commence to bloom as early as August and continue in flower until cut down by severe frost. The bloms of most kinds measure as much as $31 / 2$ to 4 inches across, and if disbudded form handsome specimen hlooms on long stems, admirahly adapted for decorative purposes. We predict that when these become better known they will entirely snpersede the smatter type of hardy "mums" now in general use.

SUGGESTION.-While generally conceded to he hardy, we recommend a slight protection of long straw mannre over the roots of all hardy Chrysanthemums diring the winter months, or, hetter yet, after they have finished blooming cut the plants down, lift them and place in a cool cellar (light and airy) or in a cool frame and set out in the spring.

Aaron. Bronze Scarlet with bright yellow centre; single.

Delphinium, "King of Delphiniums"
On account of the important part Hardy Larkspurs play in perennial plantings, it occurred to us that a brief treatise on their culture, which follows, might be of assistance to our customers. The plants can be set out in the spring when the ground has opened permanently. Pot-grown specimens can be successfully planted from then on up until the first of November In view of the wonderful display that Larkspurs make, it is worth while to exercise care in locating a most suitable position and in the preparation of the ground. Latter should have a good natural drainage. Never use animal manure in planting Delphinium, unless it has been incorporated in the soil a year before planting. Pure bonemeal is the best fertilizer in promoting growth. Apply with it also some wood ashes; the latter will assist in holding in check earth grubs, which at times attack the roots and crowns of the plant. In order to keep Larkspurs in bloom continuously during the summer, cut the old flower stems off, after they have faded, and new shoots will produce flower heads successfully. To get the best out of hardy Larkspur in the way of flowers, feed them occasionally during the growing season with an application of ground bone A slight covering of long straw or leaves over the crowns of the plants during winter will prove a great benefit.
