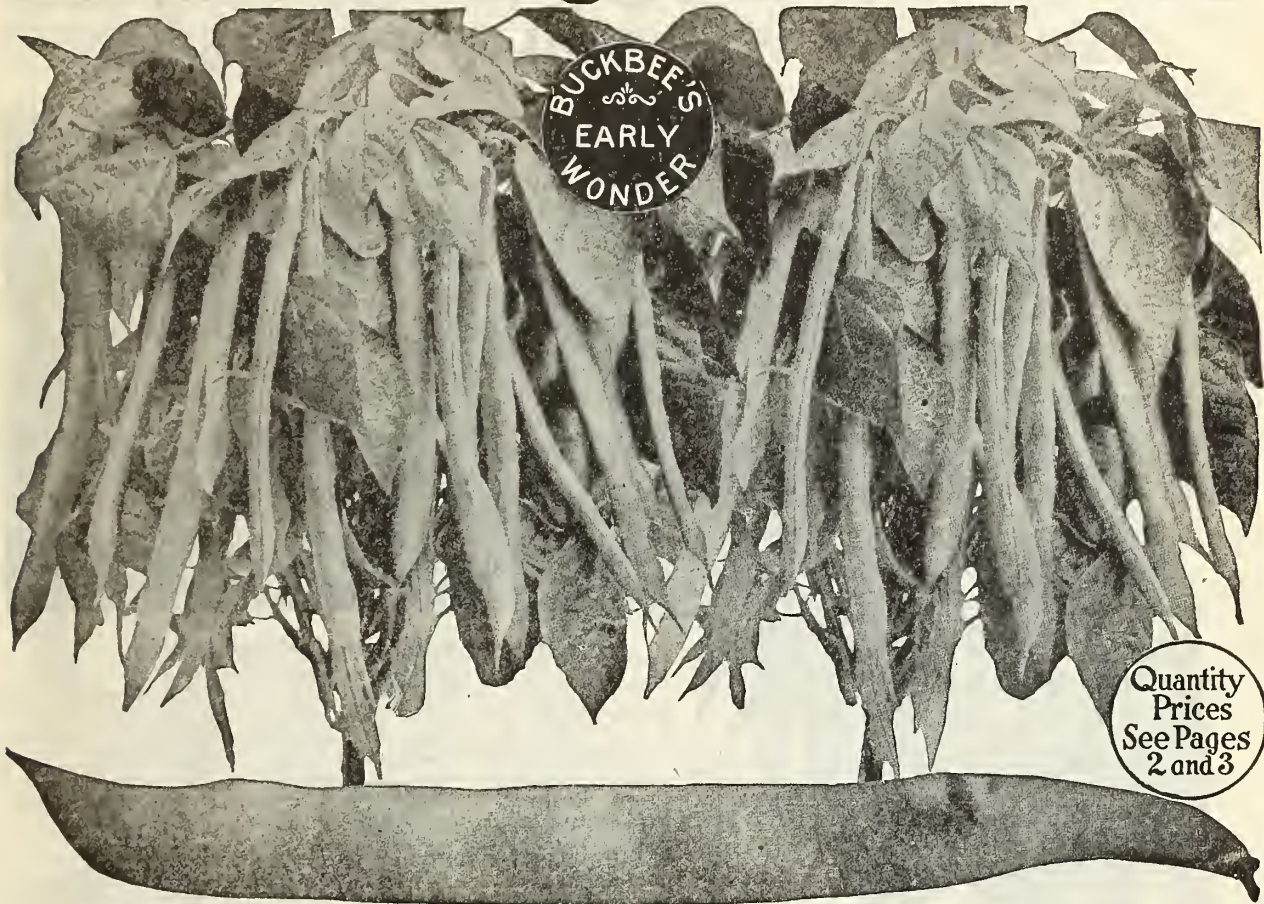

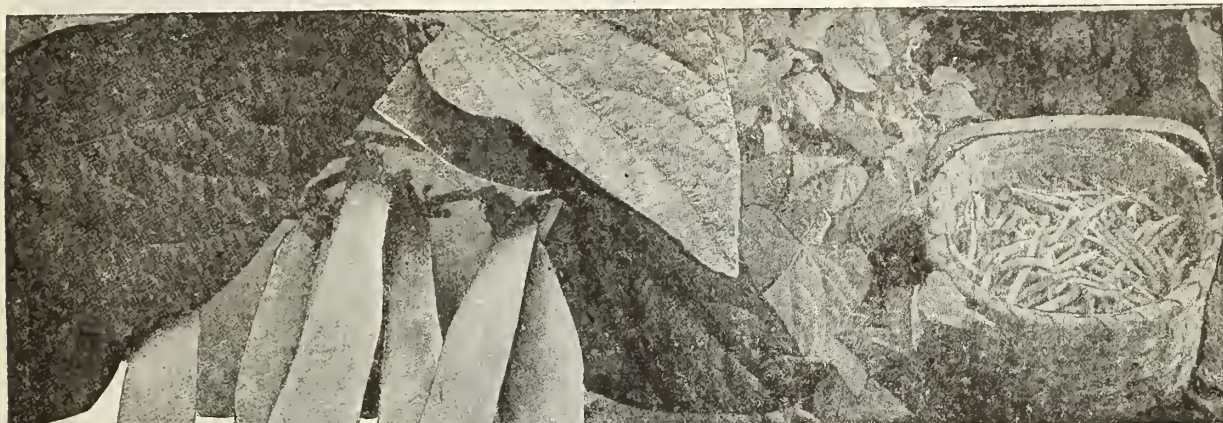

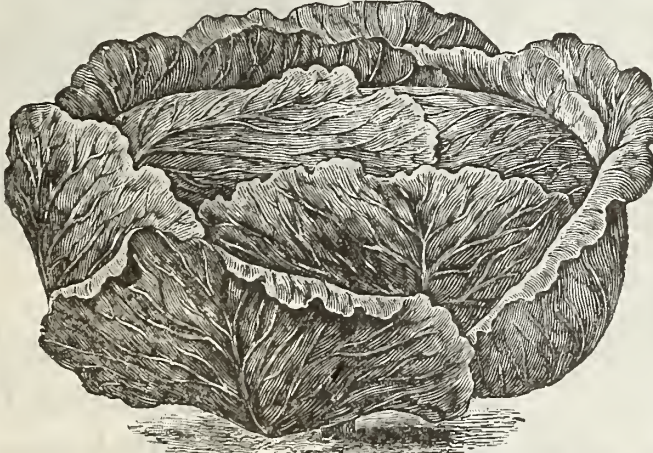

Cultivate the same as Cabbage. It will not stand frost and for Winter use it should be stored in a cool, frost-proof cellar.

For some time French gardeners have been exporting their produce to this country, but it is easily grown, can be made a very profitable crop here and American gardeners are now taking it up more generally.

Witloof is used principally during winter, furnishing a delightful salad when other fresh vegetables are not available, and is becoming very popular.

The seed is sown in May or June in the open ground in drills 12 to 18 inches apart, and the plants thinned out to 3 inches apart. The plants form long parsnip-shaped roots and these should be lifted in fall, the top foliage cut off 1½ inches above the neck and the lower ends shortened, making the roots of a uniform length of about 8 inches; then they are stored in soil in a cool place until wanted for growing on.

Witloof may be grown indoors in a cellar or shed where a temperature of about 60 degrees can be maintained. Use a frame or box at least 18 inches deep; fill about 10 inches high with loose soil mixed if possible with some leaf-mould, then set in the roots upright 2 inches apart each way and so that the crown is just covered. The empty room in the bed can now be filled with light soil or sand. Keep the bed dark by covering with an old carpet or boards and water if necessary; the soil should be kept fairly moist, but never soggy.

The blanched heads are the edible portion of the plant and they are ready to use as soon as they show above the sand, which should be in 2 or 3 weeks.

Witloof may also be grown outdoors in trenches 16 to 18 inches deep, filled the same way as indoor beds, and to obtain a quick growth the trenches can be covered with fresh manure 1½ to 2 feet deep.

The heads are oblong and very solid, they blanch ivory white and are often quite large, equal to a compact Cos Lettuce. When lifting cut whole head with small portion of the roots attached to it to hold the leaves together. 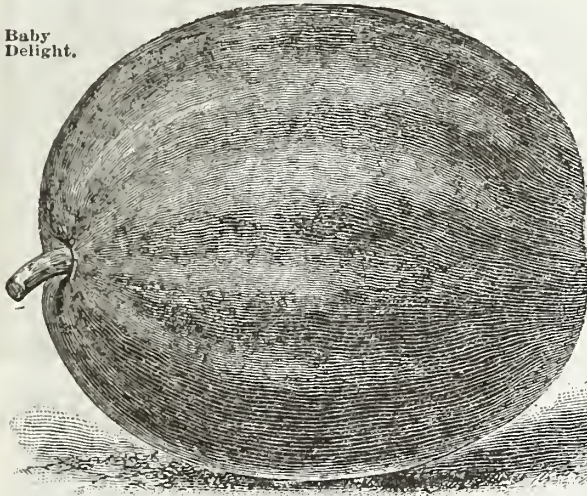


New Golden Cassaba Melon.

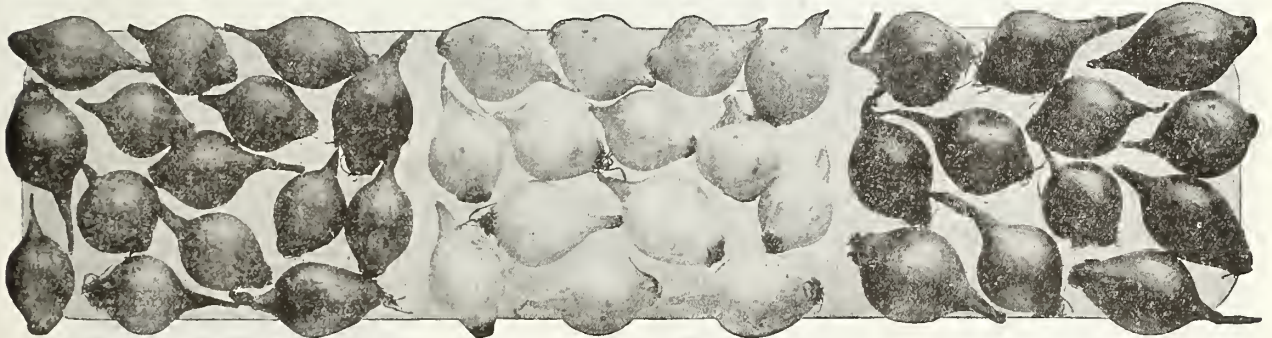


Early White Welsh.

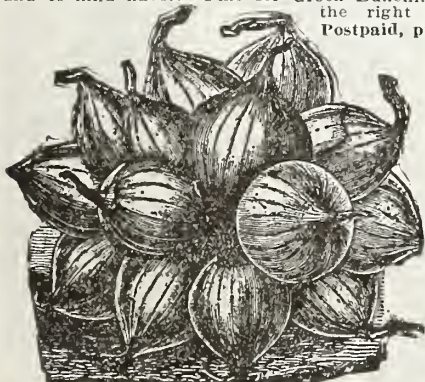

PEANUTS

Peanuts have always been an important farm crop in this country; millions of acres have been planted with them in the southern states, but now that their great value for producing oil and oil-cake is being better realized, a much larger acreage will be grown with them. Last year about a hundred million bushels of Peanuts have been ground up by oil mills for oil and oil-cake, while three years ago none had been used. A ton of Peanuts in pods produces 80 gallons of sweet oil and also 750 pounds of feeding cake. This oil and cake are superior to that from cotton seed. Peanut oil is fully equal to olive oil and Peanut meal makes hard hog-flesh. The Spanish Peanut containing a larger percentage of oil than the other kinds, is mostly wanted by the oil mills who now pay a higher price for a bushel of them than for cotton seed. In the South, especially on a sandy land, Peanuts will supplant cotton as a money crop, being more profitable. The cultivation of this crop is also every year extending farther north, and on suitable soil in the northern states Peanuts will make a profitable crop for stock feed where Indian Corn thrives and with a season of only four months free from frost.

Peanuts are also valuable for dry-land farming, owing to their ability to withstand dry weather. Peanuts are soil builders and renovators. The tops make fine hay, relished by all stock, while the roots furnish rich food for both man and stock. A medium light sandy or loamy soil is the best for Peanuts; they have yielded in a dry season on land too poor for corn a ton of excellent dry forage and from 50 to 60 bushels of nuts per acre.

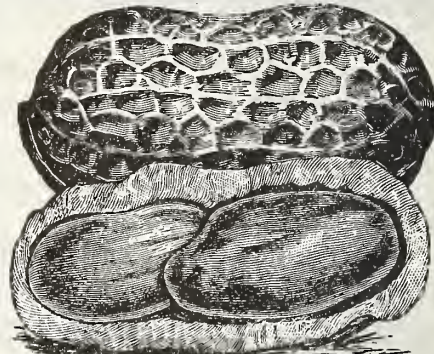
Plant in rows 2½ to 3 feet apart and 6 to 8 inches apart in the rows. The Spanish Peanuts are planted either shelled or in pods, using 1½ peck of shelled or 2 bushels in pods per acre. The pods may also be broken in 2 parts, soaked in water and then planted at once. The other varieties are mostly planted shelled at the rate of ½ bushel per acre. Planting must not be done until the weather is warm. Cultivate until they begin to form pods. When they mature pull them up, turning the roots to the sun. In bright weather they will be cured in 24 hours. They must be pulled before frost.

SPANISH PEANUT

The earliest variety grown; maturing in about 100 days; in some parts of the South two crops are raised in a year. Plants upright, with abundant and heavy foliage; the pods cluster at their base. Pods are small but well filled with nuts of sweeter and finer flavor than the larger sorts. The yield is on an average from 50 to 60 bushels of nuts and a ton of hay per acre, but frequently 100 bushels of nuts have been harvested. Can be cultivated with the plow. Because of its earliness, easy cultivation and great productiveness it is the best variety for farm use, for fattening hogs and other stock. In harvesting, the nuts hang to the vine and tops and nuts are fed together as a complete hay and grain ration. 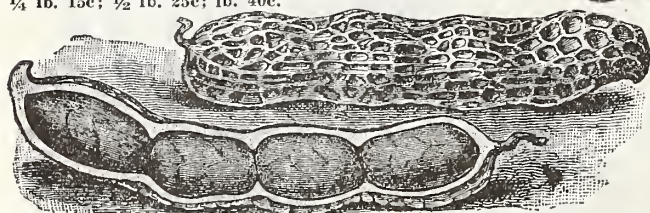

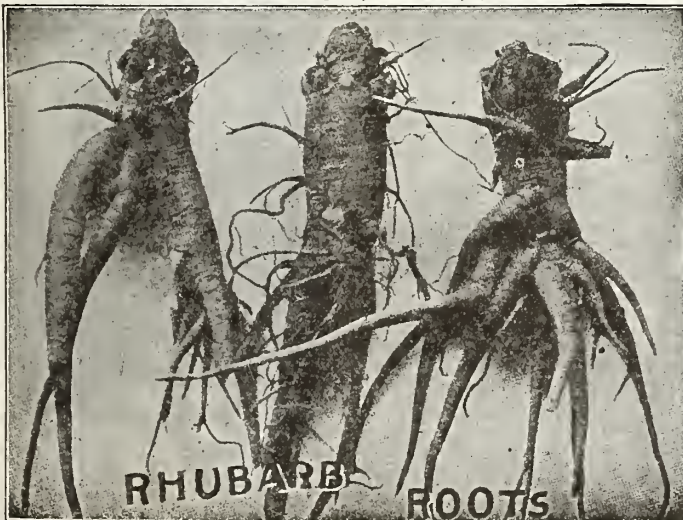

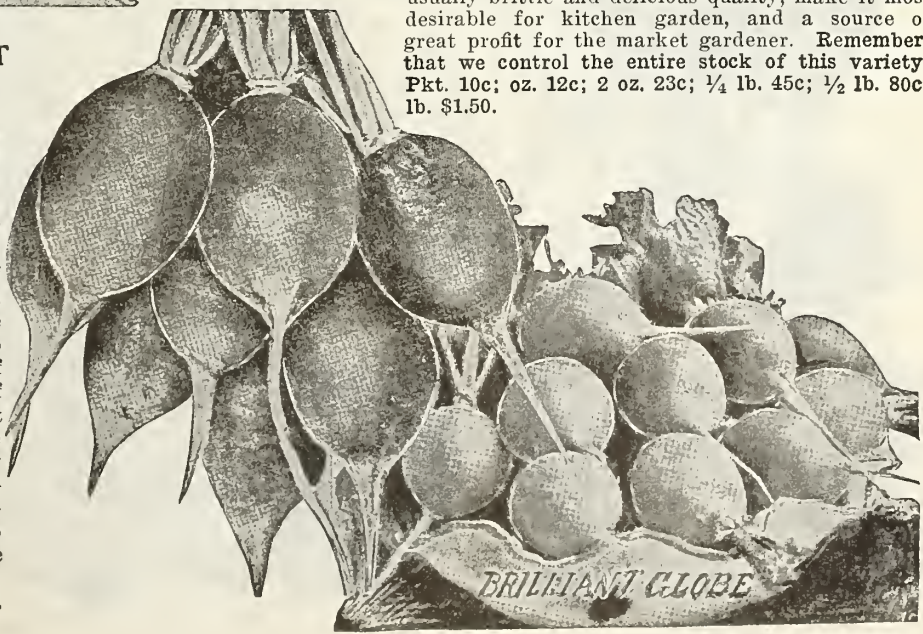

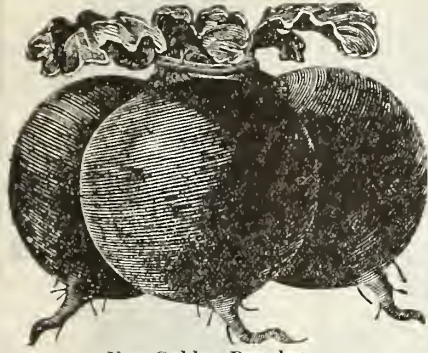

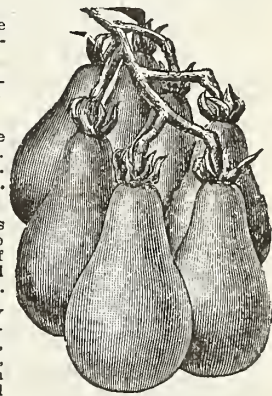

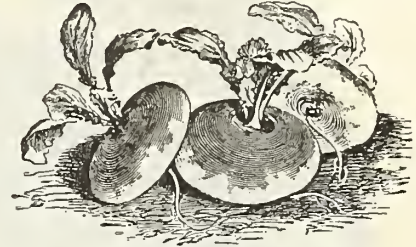

You know what the difference in profit will be if your crop is matured and marketed before the general crop from home-grown plants is matured.

To get the advantage of these frost-proof Cabbage Plants they must be planted a month or six weeks earlier than you would plant home-grown plants.

Soy or Soja Beans

Soy Beans are fast becoming a leading crop in all states of the Union. They can be grown as far north as corn and are always a sure, safe and profitable crop.

Soy Beans grow erect, branching out in 4 to 6 stems near the ground, which attain the height of 2 to 3 feet. The branches are thickly covered with leaves and pods from the ground to the top. On a single plant often as many as 200 pods have been counted, which contain from 3 to 4 beans.

They are more drought and heat-resistant than alfalfa, grow on all soils, even on sandy and acid ones where clover fails. Growing erect, they can be easily cultivated and harvested.

Soy Beans are mostly grown for grain. This grain is equal in feeding value to oil meal and contains $3\frac{1}{2}$ times as much protein and fat as Corn or Oats.

Soy Bean hay is richer in protein than alfalfa and twice as nourishing as millet hay. Soys are largely used as a catch crop and can be sown as late as July.

As a soiling crop, Soy Beans are also quite valuable, but being very rich, they are best mixed with Fodder Corn, Millet or Sorghum. Soy Beans make a splendid hog pasture that can be used 6 to 8 weeks after seeding.

For Ensilage, Soy Beans are mostly used in combination with Corn or Japanese Millet, which makes the best of all ensilages, containing all the elements necessary for a completely balanced food for milch cows and is greedily eaten by all stock. Corn and Soy Beans for ensilage are mostly grown separately, but if sown together, at the rate of one-third beans and two-thirds corn, they also give splendid results. When Corn and Beans are grown together in the same rows there will always be a gain of from one to two tons of silage per acre over corn grown alone.

The sowing of Soy Beans in corn when intended for hogging down can be especially recommended; it has been a great success everywhere. In a trial at the Iowa Station, pigs hogging down Corn and Soy Beans gained 20 per cent more than those pastured on corn alone.

Soys are used with great profit as soil renovators, and are especially valuable on sandy soils. When the entire crop is plowed under they will add to the soil such a quantity of nitrogen alone which, in the form of commercial fertilizer, is worth over \$18.00 per acre. This is twice as much as a crop of Cowpeas or Clover will furnish. Soys will produce a crop without inoculation, but inoculated plants produce larger crops. It always pays to inoculate. We offer artificial soil inoculation for Soys on page 94.

Sow the seed about corn-planting time when the ground is thoroughly warm, in rows 18 to 30 inches apart and 2 to 3 inches apart in the rows. From one-third to $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel per acre. Cultivate two or three times, but never after the pods are dry.

Sow in drills $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart, using from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel per acre. The more seed is planted the more bulk, more stalks and leaves but the less grain will be harvested. About 20 pounds of seed is a good quantity to sow in the cornbelt; sown that thickly the plants will not get larger than a man's thumb, look like a mass of leaves, have a high feeding value and are eaten without waste.

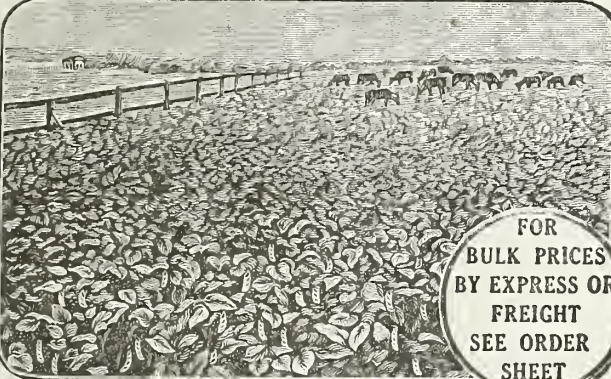

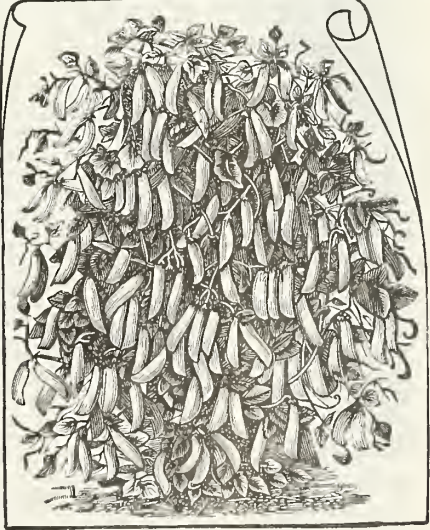

For the northern states there is no crop of greater value than Field Peas. They can be grown under most any condition of soil or climate and yield a profitable crop no matter for what purpose it is grown for pasture, soilage, hay, grain or fertilizer.

Field Peas make their best growth when the weather is cool and the earlier they are seeded the better they will do. When sown in March or April they will be ready for cutting the latter part of June, coming before any good nutritious feed suitable for soiling or hay.

Field Peas are sown alone at the rate of 3 bushels per acre, but the most satisfactory way has been found to be, if sown with oats, about a bushel of peas to a bushel of oats per acre.

When clover or grasses are frozen out or are liable to fall on account of dry weather, then peas and oats will furnish the quickest returns of any forage plants and in feeding value are equal to clover hay. The feeding may commence as soon as the oats are headed out and the peas are in bloom. When the grain reaches the dough state the crop has attained its maximum

feeding value, and if wanted for hay it should be cut at that time. Peas and oats make also a most profitable crop when grown for grain and yield from 60 to 70 bushels of seed per acre. Threshed together, they can easily be separated; but if ground together make a very nutritious food for milch cows, horses, etc. For hogs, sheep and poultry they need not be ground. Peas and oats make also a splendid pasture for cattle, sheep, and especially for hogs. As soon as the peas are fully developed the stock can be turned in. The best way of seeding Peas and Oats is to plow the peas under not more than 4 inches deep; then sow the oats in the usual way.

A valuable grain closely related to wheat; the kernels, however, are tightly enclosed in the hulls and adhere to it when threshed. It should receive the attention of all farmers, as good crops of it can be grown under almost all conditions of soil and climate, although it is like Macaroni Wheat, especially adapted to dry regions and localities with hot, dry Summers; withstands drought where barley fails entirely. It is also never affected by excessive rains. Spelts is a staple crop in all parts of the West, Northwest and Southwest, but it can also be profitably grown in all sections of the corn belt. Wonderful crops have been grown of it under adverse conditions, and record yields of 75 to 100 bushels of grain and 3 to 5 tons of straw have often been reported from the western states. It thrives on poor land, stony ground, in forest regions, on the prairies; it is quite hardy and should be sown as soon as the land can be worked. It has quite stiff straw, stands up well on ground where oats and barley lodge. It neither rusts nor blights. Oats and spelts ripen about the same time and are often sown together for horse feed. Spelts makes a well-balanced feed for horses, cattle or hogs; they all like and thrive on it. To horses it can be fed with the hulls on, the same as oats. When cut when the grain is past the middle milk stage, it will make straw-hay of excellent quality.

This Winter Spelts has the same characteristics as Spring Spelts. As the name indicates, this variety is without beards, and also has much larger heads and is much more productive in suitable climates than the Spring variety. It thrives best on dry prairie regions with hot Summers, where it has given excellent results; but it is also considerably resistant to the effects of wet weather in humid climates. It is not affected by rust like most other grains. In this country it is only used for feeding purposes and it should be used with the hulls; it is equal to oats in intrinsic food value. Where Spelts is fed with the hull, less hay is needed than if other grain were fed, as the hull takes the place of the hay, making it a complete food. The preparation of the land for seeding and the subsequent management of the Winter Emmer crops are practically the same as required for Winter Rye or Wheat. It can be sown in Spring a little later than other Spring grain and a crop harvested the same season; on that account it is much used as a catch crop, especially where the winter grain has been killed out. There is an increasing demand for this variety; it is a very profitable farm crop to grow anywhere, and farmers are finding out its value. It does not grow quite as tall as Winter Rye, but usually yields as well and the grain is of fine quality. On good ground the yield is never less than 40 bushels per acre. Winter Rye is one of the most valuable grain crops for all sections of the country, and it can be depended upon more than any other to produce a good paying crop everywhere and every year. It is more hardy than wheat, seldom winter kills, is suited to cold climates, and succeeds well everywhere in the South.

SOIL—It can be grown on a great variety of soils, does best on fertile ground, but is of the greatest value for light and poor soils, where it will give fair crops when other cereals fail.

The straw of Rye is more slender and grows taller than wheat, but owing to its extreme rigidity it does not lodge easily. Rye starts to grow much earlier in Spring than Winter Wheat, and ripens a week earlier. It is troubled very little by insects and diseases as it is too near maturity when insects and such diseases as blight, rust, etc., appear. Another great advantage of the Rye is that it aids in the control of many of our dangerous weeds, such as Wild Oats, Mustard, etc., as the grain will mature before the weeds, which will have no opportunity to mature their seeds before harvesting.

Winter Rye is an excellent cover crop for orchards; it prevents the leaching in case of fall or spring rains; it will also prevent the blowing of light, sandy soils.

Rye can be sown in the South from July to November 15th; in the North it is best to sow up to the 15th of September. If sown early, it is used for fall pasture.

Winter Rye is the best plant for **GREEN MANURING** on poor soils where Clover will not grow.

Rye is one of the best **NURSE CROPS**, as it has but very few leaves in Spring, hence the young clover plants get more sunlight and air than they will get with any other cereal, and, besides, Rye is the earliest grain crop and will be out of the way quite early.

Winter Rye is the earliest crop that can be used for **SOILING**, it furnishes a large amount of green feed. The best time to cut it for soiling is between the time of heading and the beginning of the formation of the grain. For the purpose of soiling, however, it is best sown with Sand Vetches at the rate of 40 to 50 pounds of Vetches and one-half bushel of Rye.

THE STRAW of the Rye is a very valuable part of the crop; it is used for bedding stock, for packing nursery goods, in the manufacture of coarse brown paper and, if carefully threshed, it sells at high prices to harness makers for collar making.

Rye is little used for stock feed; yet, in combination with oats or barley, it makes good feed for horses and hogs, but it should not be fed to milch cows, as it will give a blitzy flavor to the butter. Sow at the rate of 1 1/2 bushels to an acre.

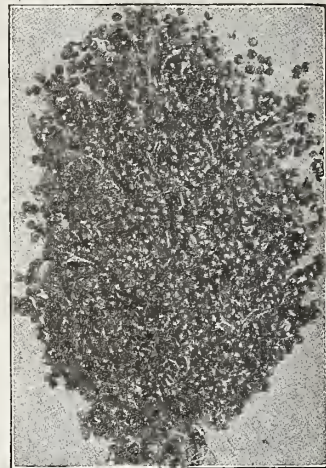

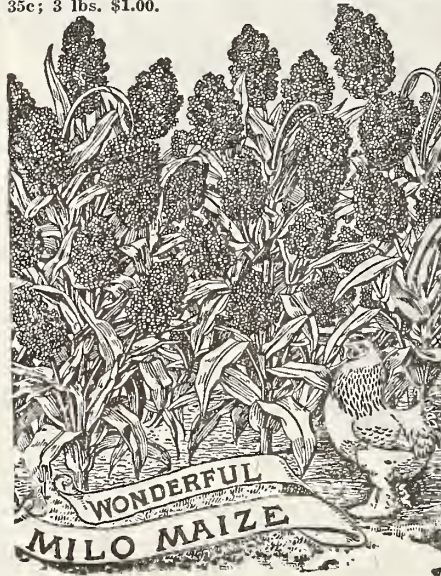

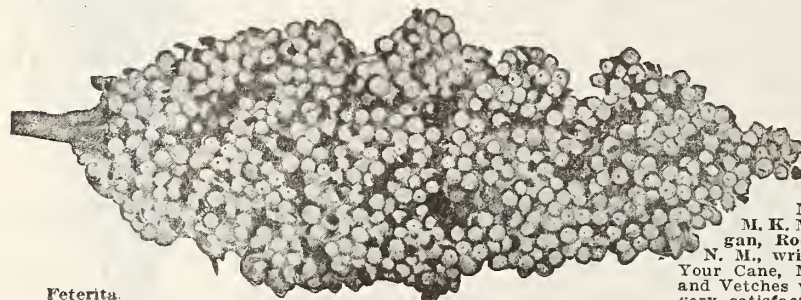

The grain is softer and larger than that of Milo and Kaffir and in feeding value is equal to either of them. Feterita is an excellent drouth resistor; it yields from 50 to 80 bushels of grain per acre. It stands erect, branches out from the root, matures 25 days earlier than Kaffir, ripening in about 85 days. Often used as catch crop to follow Winter Wheat or early Oats in the South. Sugar Cane or Sweet Sorghum

Sugar Cane can be profitably grown in all portions of the United States where corn is grown, and it is more drought resistant than corn. It remains fresh and green through periods of drought that ruin corn, and even if checked in growth by drought, it will entirely recover and make a crop when favorable conditions again prevail. Sugar Cane not only possesses high value in producing syrup, but as an addition to the daily ration for stock, either as silage, hay or green fodder, it is invaluable.

As a **soiling crop** it has a very high value. Milch cows are exceptionally fond of Sugar Cane, and it is excellent for milk production. It furnishes an enormous quantity of succulent food, outyielding corn for forage, and it is fed with much less waste. At the Iowa Agricultural College 29 tons were harvested per acre.

The silage of Sugar Cane has practically the same feeding value as that of Corn and Kafir, but Sugar Cane generally produces a much larger crop than those varieties and is the most profitable crop to grow for silage. For hay, sow broadcast or in drills at the rate of 50 to 100 lbs.; for silage and forage, sow in drills $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart, using 12 to 15 lbs., and for syrup, use 6 to 8 lbs. per acre. The seed should be sown about 10 days later than corn. Cut for hay when grain is in the milk and for silage and syrup when in the dough stage.

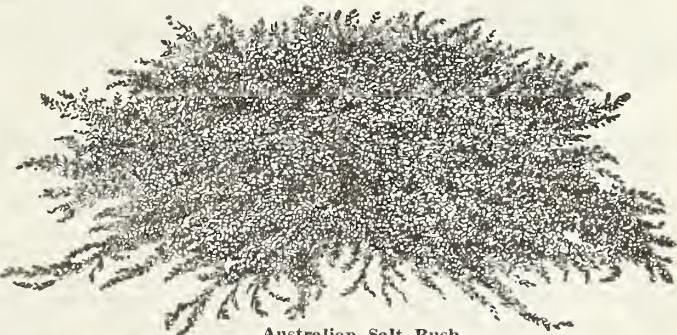

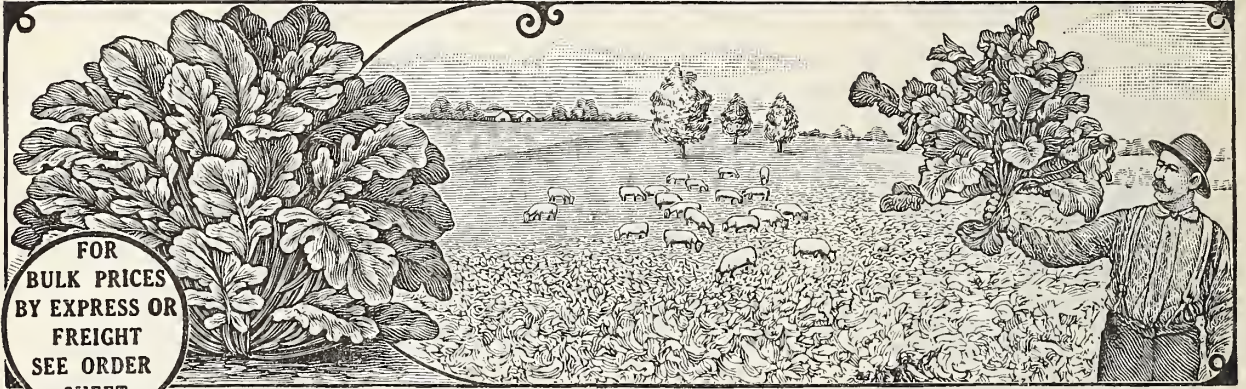

It is indispensable for raising sheep and hogs and is much relished by all stock.

Rape belongs to the Cabbage family; grows 2 to 3 feet high and is never troubled by insects.

Rape is best adapted to cool and moist climates, but has also successfully been grown in warm and dry sections.

Rape does well on most any kind of soil, especially if rich in vegetable matter, as it is a gross feeder. Land that produces a good crop of corn and wheat is suitable for Rape.

In the northern states Rape is sown from April to August, and in the South from August to October.

Four to five pounds of seed are used per acre if sown broadcast, and 2 to 3 pounds if sown in drills 24 to 28 inches apart to allow cultivation. It may be sown alone in Fall after the

grain has been harvested, or it may be sown in the Spring in the Winter or Spring grain, when this is 2 to 3 inches high, at the rate of 2 lbs. per acre. With a good stand of Rape in the stubble sheep can be turned in in about 3 weeks after the grain is cut. It also is sown in the corn at the last cultivation. Three to four cultivations should be given until the plants have spread too much to prevent further passage.

When the crop is cut it is best to follow with a cultivator; this will cause the stems to send out new shoots more rapidly.

Rape is usually ready for use in about 2 months from sowing the seed; it is used as a soiling crop in many places, but its chief use is for pasture and especially for hogs and sheep. Its fattening properties are twice as good as clover.

At the Michigan experiment station 128 lambs were pastured for 8 weeks on 15 acres of Rape sown in July, and showed a gain of 2,890 lbs., or at a rate of 3 lbs. per lamb each week.

There is no danger to hogs from bloating, but cattle and sheep may suffer seriously if sufficient care is not taken. When on Rape they should at all times have access to salt.

Rape must not be fed any more after it has been frozen.

Sunflower

Sunflower seed makes a splendid food for all farm animals; it is relished by horses and cattle, fattens sheep and swine, but it is especially valuable as a food for fowl and is the best egg producing food known. 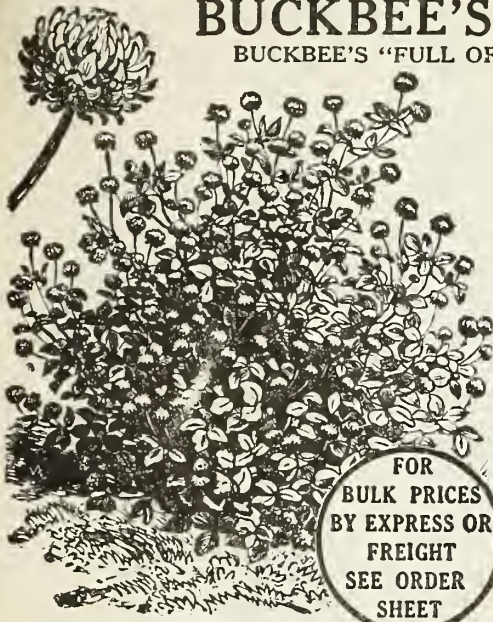

Alsike or Swedish Clover

Alsike seems to be especially adapted for the Northern States; it is a perennial clover and lives longer than Medium Red; it is also more hardy, in fact, it is the hardiest of all clovers; it does not heave out of the ground in Winter and the severest cold does not injure it and it resists the extremes of drought and wet. 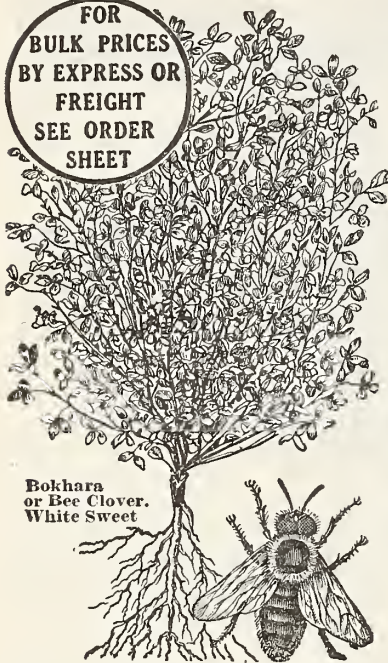

White Bokhara, Sweet or Bee Clover (Melilotus Alba)

A Money-Making Crop for All Sections of the Country. Valuable for Soilage, Pasture, Hay, as a Honey Plant, and Especially as a Fertilizer. Of the different varieties of Sweet Clover the white flowering is the most important one and the one mostly grown. It is biennial; if not allowed to reseed, it will die out the second year. It requires a thoroughly compact seed bed; we recommend disked stubble ground for it with a mellow surface an inch deep; cover the seed not more than 1/2 inch. It is sown in Spring or Fall, alone, or with a nurse crop, using 15 pounds of hulled seed per acre. To succeed with Sweet Clover the ground must contain lime and must be inoculated; the bacteria being the same for Alfalfa and Sweet Clover, old soil of one will inoculate the field of the other variety. We can furnish Alfalfa soil, see page 105, and also Edwards' Legume Bacteria for the inoculation of Sweet Clover, see page 94.

There is no other legume which furnishes as much pasturage; when 5 or 6 inches tall the cattle could be turned on it; it affords green food from early Spring until late Fall, always throwing out fresh growth as fast as eaten off; it should not be allowed to grow tall, as it will then get hard and woody. It has been used especially successfully in pasturing sheep and hogs. For a permanent pasture it is much sown with Bromus Inermis, using about 10 lbs. of each per acre.

Sweet clover yields one good crop of hay the first year and two the second year. It should be cut for hay before it comes into full bloom and about a foot high, otherwise the plants may be killed. The hay is cured the same as clover.

Stock not accustomed to Sweet Clover do not eat it readily at first, but soon acquire a taste for it and prefer it then to all other plants. It gives the milk and butter a delicious flavor and in feeding value it is about equal to Alfalfa. Cattle and sheep may fill up on it to the highest pitch but will never bloat.

As the name indicates, it has a special adaptation for sandy soils; it succeeds well on light soils too poor for clovers, cowpeas, etc., but will give bigger crops on richer land.

Although fair crops have been obtained without inoculation, it is my experience that inoculated soil produces surer and bigger yields. I can furnish Nitrogen inoculation for Vetch, see page 94.

Sand Vetch is of great value for pasture and hay, and the fodder, either green or dried, is much relished by all stock; it is very rich, nutritious, containing even more protein than Alfalfa. It is cut for hay when pods are forming; the average yield of hay is from 3 1/2 to 4 tons per acre.

Sand Vetch is, however, mostly grown and is of the greatest value as a fertilizer; it is the best legume for enriching soils of low fertility, the total value of a crop of Sand Vetch, if plowed under is estimated by the Department of Agriculture to be equivalent of \$16.00 to \$45.00 worth of commercial fertilizer per acre; or twice as much as crop of clover.

Sand Vetch is the best cover crop for orchards which we have. Sand Vetch is sown in Spring and in Fall; in the northern states not later than the middle of August; in the corn belt not after middle of September, but later farther south. It grows best in cool weather. If sown before July 1st it generally freezes out, but if sown later it lives over Winter, goes to seed in June, then dies.

Sown early in Spring alone or with a nurse crop of barley or oats, it furnishes good Summer and fall pasture. The best returns, however, are obtained of this plant when sown in the fall and it may be sown alone, or in the corn or cotton at the last cultivation or with winter rye as a nurse crop. Seeded in the fall, it will come on early in spring, and will yield a bountiful crop of hay or splendid pasture till June; or can be plowed under about May 10th in the north, when it will be a mass of green stalks and leaves—about all that can be turned under with a plow.

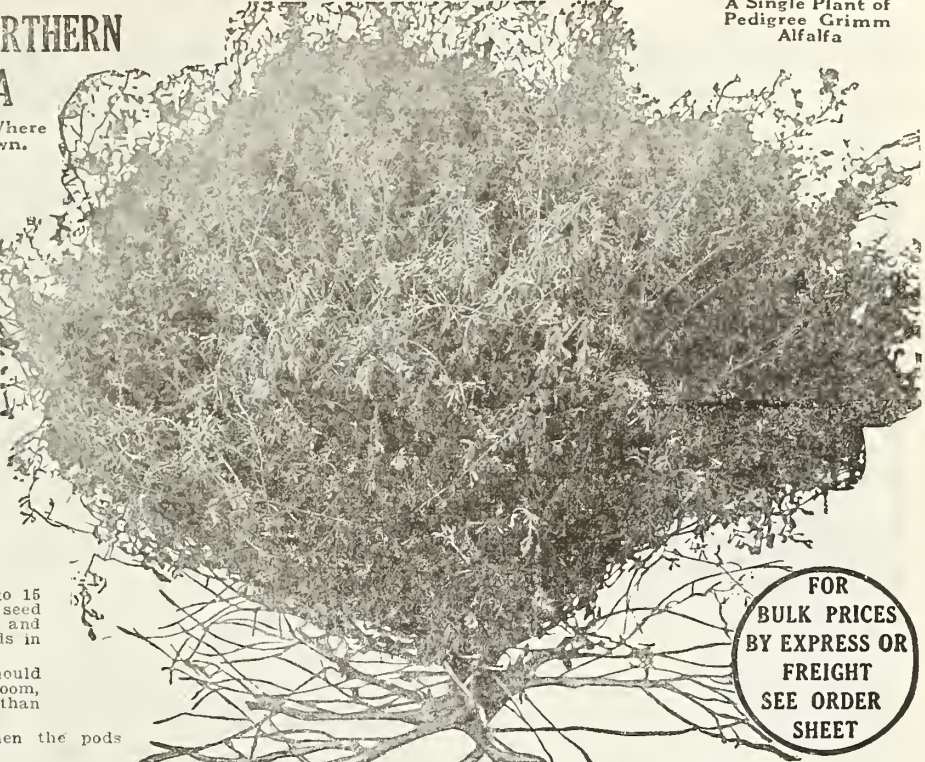

Timothy

Timothy is the most popular and most important of all hay grasses and is adapted to a wider range of conditions than any other variety of grass. It is one of the most certain grasses to grow, and without doubt is the hardiest of all our grasses; no other kind will stand the extremes of heat and cold better than this one; no other variety equals it in average yields, excels it in feeding value.

It luxuriates on clay and moist soil and is unsurpassed on peat, but it does not root as deeply and is not considered, therefore, as much an improver of soils as many other grasses; consequently it should not be sown on land deficient in humus or on soils of light, sandy nature. It flowers in July and should be cut when in full bloom, as if left until later the hay becomes hard and coarse. The hay is very nourishing and can be preserved for a long time; it is greedily eaten by all cattle and horses are especially fond of it. On average soils it is frequently sown along with Mammoth Clover, and on lower soils generally with Alsike; these two clovers mature with the Timothy. The practice of sowing the common Red Clover with Timothy is not advisable, as they do not ripen together and either one or the other must be cut at a stage which will not give the best results. For pasture, Timothy cannot be well recommended. If sown alone its growth is not thrifty enough and close pasturing is very injurious to it. 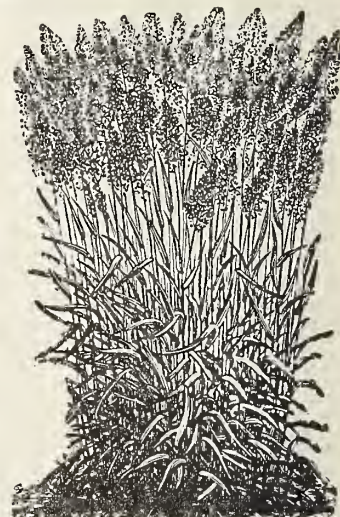

Meadow Fescue or English Blue Grass

One of the most valuable grasses for all parts of the country. Drought and frost resistant. Furnishing an abundance of pasturage from early Spring till late Fall.

Meadow Fescue is well suited to a wide range of soils, does well on loamy clay, and gravelly soils and thrives on heavy black loam, strong and low lying soils, but it is not adapted to light sandy soils.

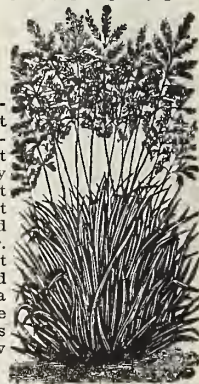

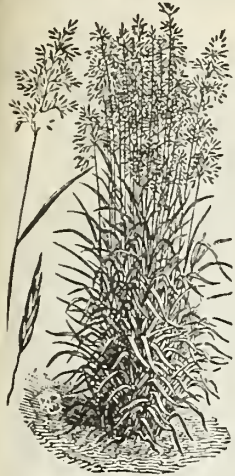
BROMUS INERMIS

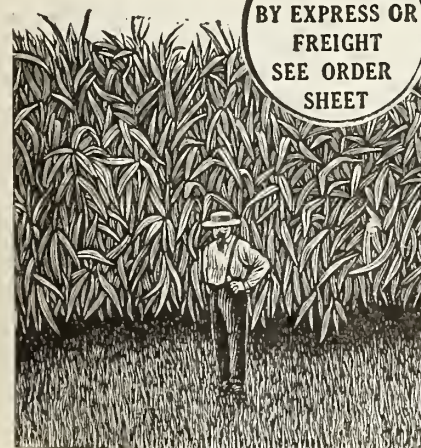

SUDAN GRASS

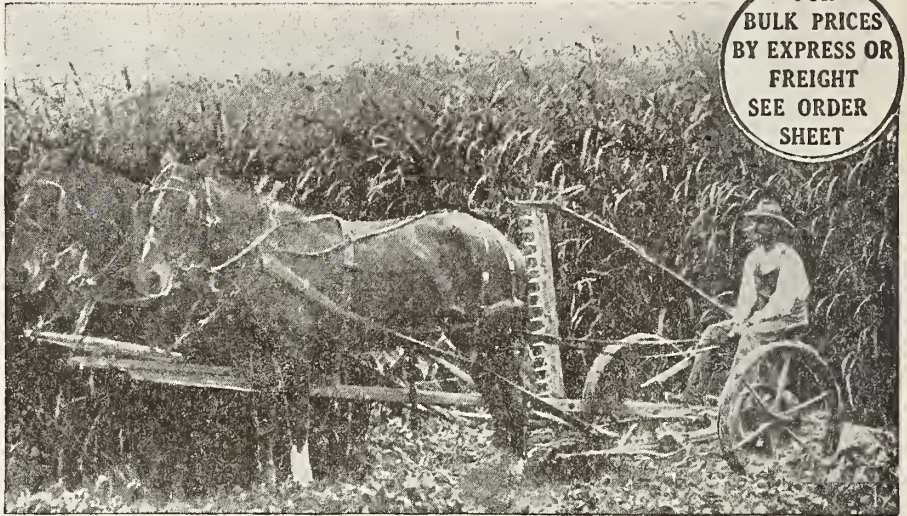
Sudan Grass is introduced by the United States Department of Agriculture and is the most important forage plant ever introduced by this Department. It has now been thoroughly tested, has given most satisfactory results in most states of the Union, and is destined to become one of the standard summer grass and forage crops.

It belongs to the Sorghum family and in general appearance is very much like Johnson Grass, but differs from it in that it is entirely free from the persistent underground root system, which makes a Johnson Grass sod so difficult to eradicate. Sudan Grass being an annual and having fibrous roots similar to Millet or Oats, is as easily controlled and eradicated at the close of the growing season as those varieties, and will never become a weed.

It is a tall growing annual grass which when planted in rows and cultivated on fairly rich soil attains a height of 8 to 10 feet, and sown broadcast or drilled in thickly it will grow 3 to 5 feet high. The stems are erect, unbranched and very fine, the largest stalks not more than 1/4 inch thick and are covered with abundance of broad linear leaves. Where the plants are scattered, they stool abundantly, as many as 100 stalks coming from a single root.

Sudan Grass is not particular about the soil. It does best on rich clay loam, but on sandy and poor soils the yields are not so very large. This grass will be of the greatest value to the Central States, and especially to parts of Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado, which are deficient in rainfall. The dry regions have no other satisfactory hay crop, and Sudan Grass will therefore be of immense value there. It is fully as drought-resisting as any other Sorghum plant, and can be relied upon to produce a crop of hay with very little rainfall. It requires but a short growing season, is ready to be cut for hay in about 70 to 75 days, and matures seed in 100 days from planting. This short growing season makes it of the greatest value as a catch crop for almost every state in the Union, and in course of time it will no doubt largely supersede the Millets for that purpose, as Sudan Grass furnishes two cuts to their one and forage of a much higher feeding value.

Sudan Grass will stand light frosts, but like all other Sorghums it has a preference for a warm growing season, and for best results should not be planted until the soil has become warm in Spring. It can be sown at any time in Summer 70 to 75 days ahead of the frost. It is sown in rows from 18 to 24 inches apart and cultivated; sown this way it takes 3 to 10 lbs. per acre. On good soil, where there is plenty of moisture, it is

also sown broadcast or drilled in, and then 10 to 25 pounds of seed are required per acre.

Sudan Grass is easy to cut with a mower and cures readily. When wanted for seed it is harvested with an ordinary grain binder. Used for hay, it is cut when fully headed out. An early cutting is especially advisable when more cuttings per season are expected. After cutting it resumes its growth promptly, and in about 40 to 45 days another cutting is ready. In Texas it has been cut four times, but farther North only two or three cuttings may be expected.

Sudan makes a very nutritious and palatable hay which is relished by cattle, horses and other farm stock. In feeding value the hay is second only to Alfalfa and far better than Millet. The yields vary a great deal, but from five to eight tons of cured hay have been harvested per acre on dry land and a good deal more under irrigation. The yield of seed is, on dry land, from 500 to 1,000 pounds, but on irrigated land as much as 2,550 pounds have been grown per acre.

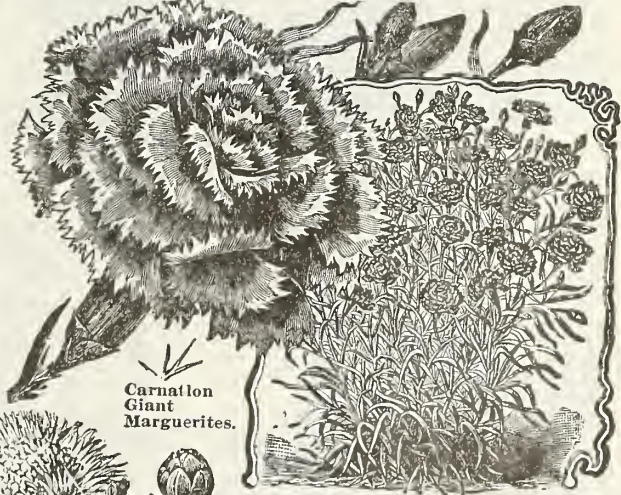

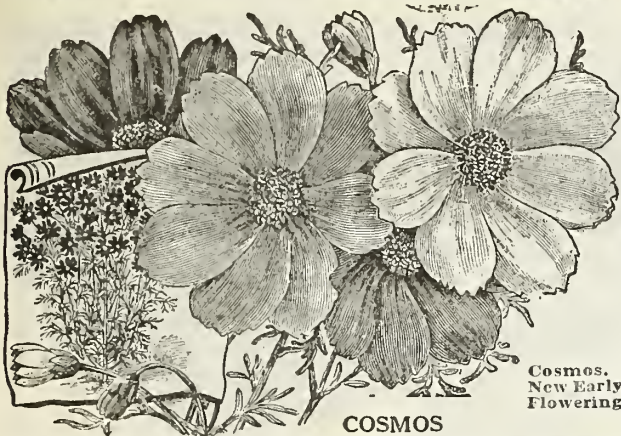

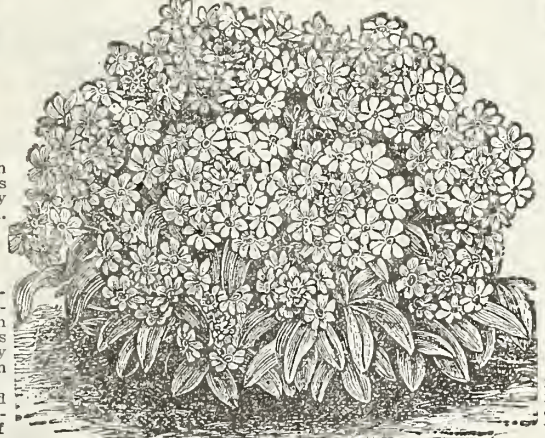

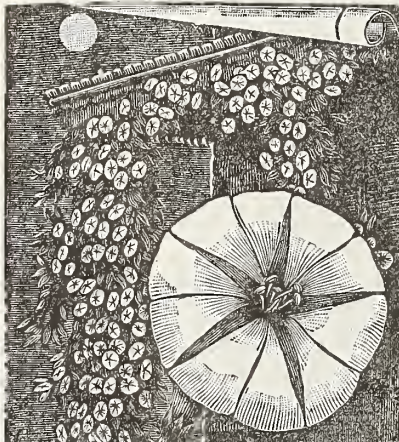

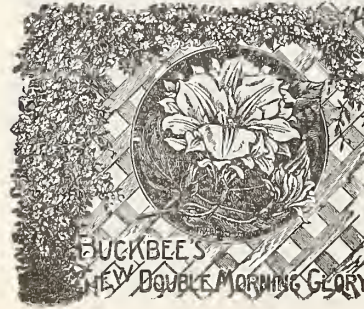

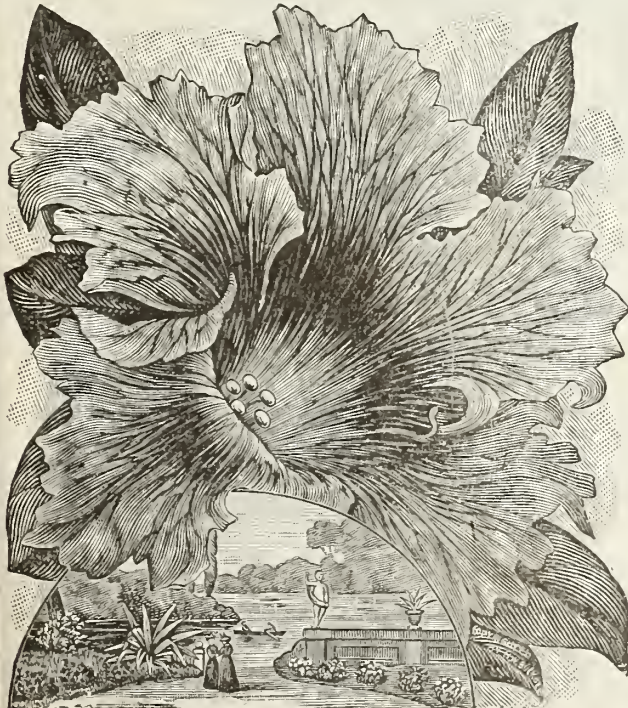

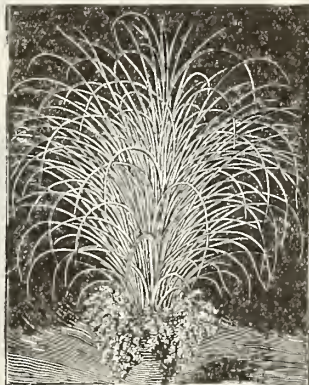

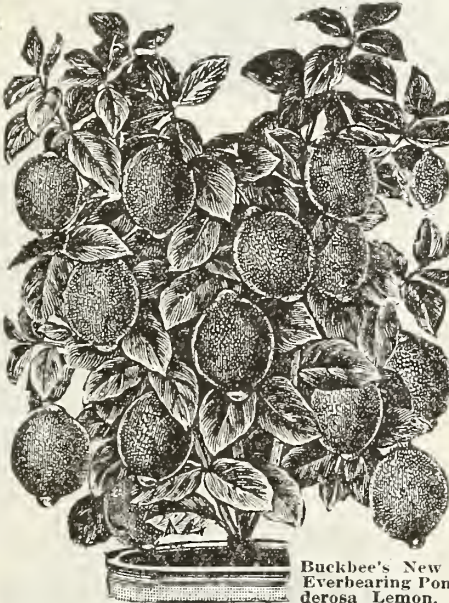

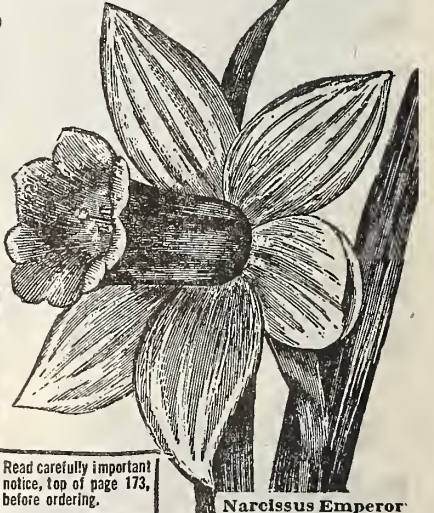
