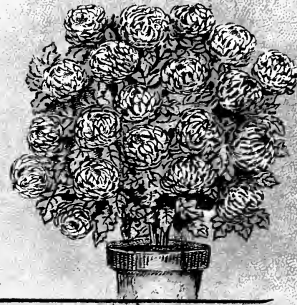

Brussels Spouts

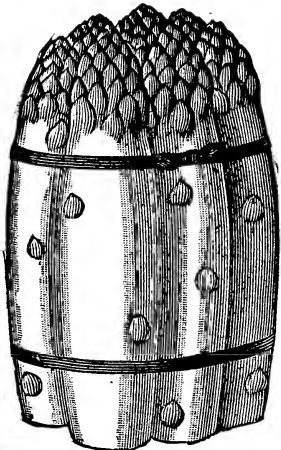
Brussels Spouts are very largely grown in the South, as high as 250,000 barrels being shipped in a single season from Norfolk, Va. In the North, however, they are not extensively grown, but should be.

IMPROVED PARIS MARKET. The stem, which usually grows from 20 inches to 2 feet in height, is covered with "miniature cabbages," which may be boiled like cabbage or cooked in cream like cauliflower. They are by all means the most delicious and delicate flavored of the cabbage family. On this variety the heads grow very closely and its quality is the finest. 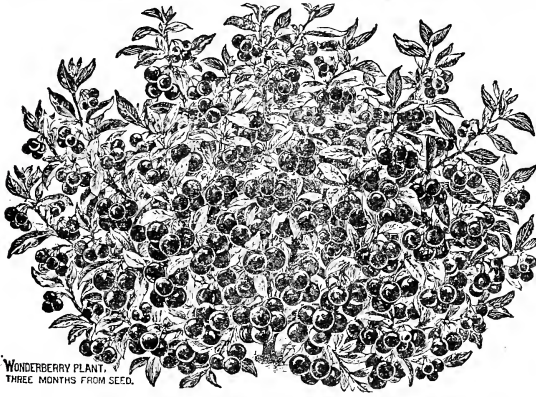

Alfalfa can be sown from Spring until Fall, but in the North, the seedling should not be made later than August 15th. Sow at the rate of about 15 pounds per acre, either alone or with a nurse crop of 2 to 3 pecks of Barley. The soil should be in good condition, well drained, and reasonably free of weeds; it is always well to disk and harrow the ground repeatedly before sowing, in order to destroy as many weeds as possible. The soil must not be sour and should contain lime, and unless alfalfa or sweet clover has been grown on it before, it should be inoculated and the cheapest way to do this, is by scattering about 100 pounds of old alfalfa or sweet clover soil per acre, over it.

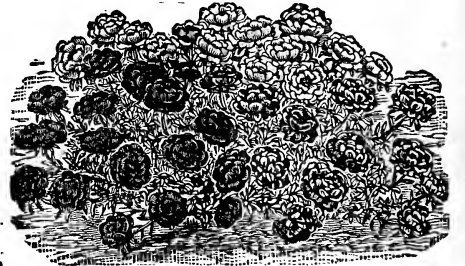

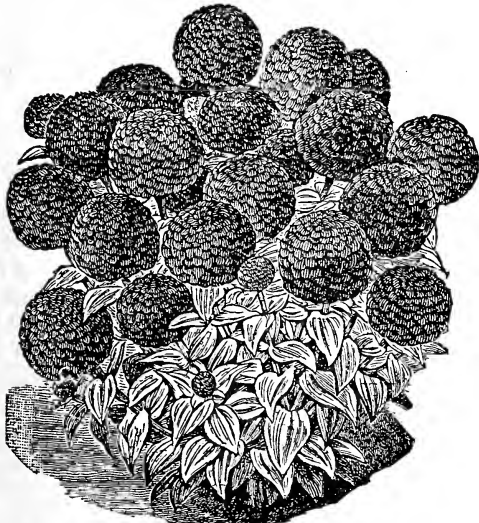

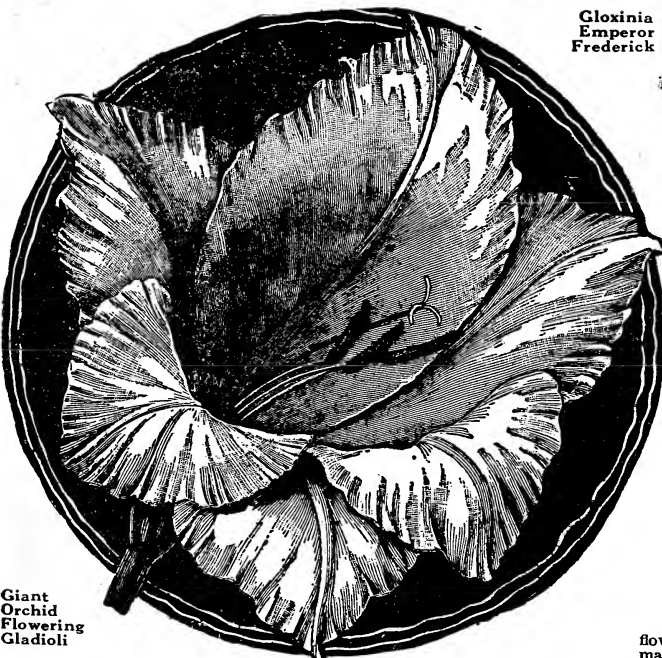

TANGO FLOWER, OR FRAGRANCE OF THE SOUTH.

This exquisite flower is found on the high table lands or Mesas of Central Mexico and Peru. Its pure and chaste sweetness, delightful and subtle fragrance, are indescribable. The señoritas twine these starry blossoms in their dusky tresses, and adorn their corsage with them for the dance. The bulbs can be planted as soon as danger of frost is over, and will bloom in four to six weeks. The smallest bulb will bloom. Each bulb as it grows in the ground will form bulblets, each of which sends up a flower stalk, thus keeping up one mass of bloom from early summer till frost cuts them down. The flowers

appear from ten to twenty to each stalk, are snowy white, star-like, petals thick, like wax, filling their surroundings with the fragrance they exhale. If the stalk is cut when the first flowers open and placed in water the flowers will increase in size and whiteness and keep for ten days to two weeks. The stems are tall and stiff, withstanding high winds and all sorts of weather, but must be lifted when frost sets in and stored the same as *Gladstoli*.

Your garden will not be complete without this starry beauty. These bulbs will also bloom in pots in the house.
