TO OUR PATRONS

This is our ninth year in the nursery business, are very thankful for patronage in the past and will try to merit your future orders. We rejoice that so large a percent of our customers continue from year to year to send us their orders.

Our supply of apple trees this spring is not near so large as in years past, owing to the scarcity and extremely high price of seedlings for two years past. This condition seems to prevail throughout the country. All nursery stock is scarce and generally high. We regret we are unable to fill large orders for commercial plantings this season, but will likely have sufficient to go round for those wanting to plant family orchards. We have a very nice block of one year trees that will make fine well branched two year olds by fall and hope to be able to fill some large orders from these at that time, but the supply of these also is limited.

We are preparing to line out our usual amount of grafts this spring, so that by the fall of 1922, the Lord willing, we will be back to normal and will then be prepared to supply the local demand of commercial orchardists.

3. As to quality our stock is First Class, a Certificate of Nursery Inspection will be sent with each order.
4. Terms Cash before shipment unless by special agreement otherwise.
5. We do not guarantee stock sent by Freight to arrive in good condition. Where sent by Express or Parcel Post, we will make adjustments for stock received in poor condition provided you notify us at once.
6. We do not Prepay Freight or Express charges but bill up and deliver to the Express or Freight station free of charge. All orders well packed.

APPLE TREES

We are grading our trees this year by Caliper (diameter) instead of height, they are calipered at the collar or near the top of the ground. Trees ½ and under 5-8 inch will run about 3 ½ feet oigh.

- Apple- 2yr. well branched 11-16 up each 50c.
- " 2yr. well branched 5-8 to 11-16 each 40c.
- " 2yr. well branched 1-2 to 5-8 each 35c.
- " 2yr. Forked and Whips 3-8 to 1-2 each 25c.

By Parcel Post 2c. per tree extra for 3-8, 3c. for 1-2, 5c. for 5-8.

APPLE TREES

SUMMER

BENONI An excellent early apple, medium size, flesh yellow, tender, pleasant subacid, core small. Tree vigorous, highest quality. July and August.

EARLY HARVEST Medium to large, pale yellow, fine flavor, an excellent variety. Tree a good grower and good bearer. First of July.

YELLOW TRANSPARENT Fruit of good size, skin clear white, turning to pale yellow, flavor acid and very good, bears young, Tree an upright grower and abundant bearer First of July.

LATE SUMMER

FAGALY'S CHOICE As large as Gano and very similar in shape and color to that variety, flavor almost as fine as Grimes Golden, an annual and abundant bearer, tree hardy and good grower, much better than M-Blush. August.

WEALTHY Fruit of large size, red streaked with white: quality good, one of the most valuable apples grown, young bearer. Aug. and Sept.

MAIDEN'S BLUSH Medium size, flat, quite smooth and fair, pale yellow with red cheek, slightly acid flavor, good grower and good bearer, August and September.

GOLDEN SWEET Rather large, golden yellow, very sweet, excellent quality, strong grower and good bearer. August.

SUMMER RAMBO Very large, resembling in color, flavor and shape the Fall Rambo. Tree vigorous and good bearer. August.

AUTUMN

FALL PIPPIN (Pound Pippin) Fruit large, roundish, generally a little flattened, stem long, skin smooth, yellowish green, becoming a fine yellow with often a tinge of brown blush on one side, very tender and mellow, rich. October to December.

PATERSON'S SWEET Fruit medium, roundish, oblate, yellow, mostly covered and splashed with dark rich red, flesh white, tender, juicy, pleasant. September to October.

RAMBO Yellowish, streaked with dull red, mild, tender and good, fine grower and productive, Last of September and October.

WINTER

BALDWIN Medium to large, deep bright red, crisp, subacid, good flavor, vigorous and productive, one of the best and most popular winter apples, December to April.

BELLFLOWER Large yellow with blush cheek, very tender, juicy, subacid, in use all winter, very valuable. Tree a moderate grower and good bearer.

BEN DAVIS A large handsome striped apple of fair quality, tree very hardy, vigorous and productive, a late keeper.

DELICIOUS Fruit large, nearly covered with brilliant dark red, flesh fine grained, crisp and melting, juicy with a delightful aroma of highest quality, a splendid keeper and shipper, tree a good grower and annual bearer. December to March.

GANO Form conical, good size and smooth, deep red shaded to mahogany on sunny side, very attractive, flesh pale yellow, fine grained, tender, pleasant, subacid, a good keeper and shipper, tree vigorous and healthy. an annual and heavy cropper. January to April.

GRIMES GOLDEN An apple of the highest quality, medium to large, golden yellow, good grower and productive, November to March.

HUBBARDSTON NONESUCH Large, striped yellow and red, tender, juicy and fine, good bearer, November to April.

JONATHAN A high quality apple, medium, roundish, skin yellow nearly covered with dark red, tree slender and spreading. November to April.

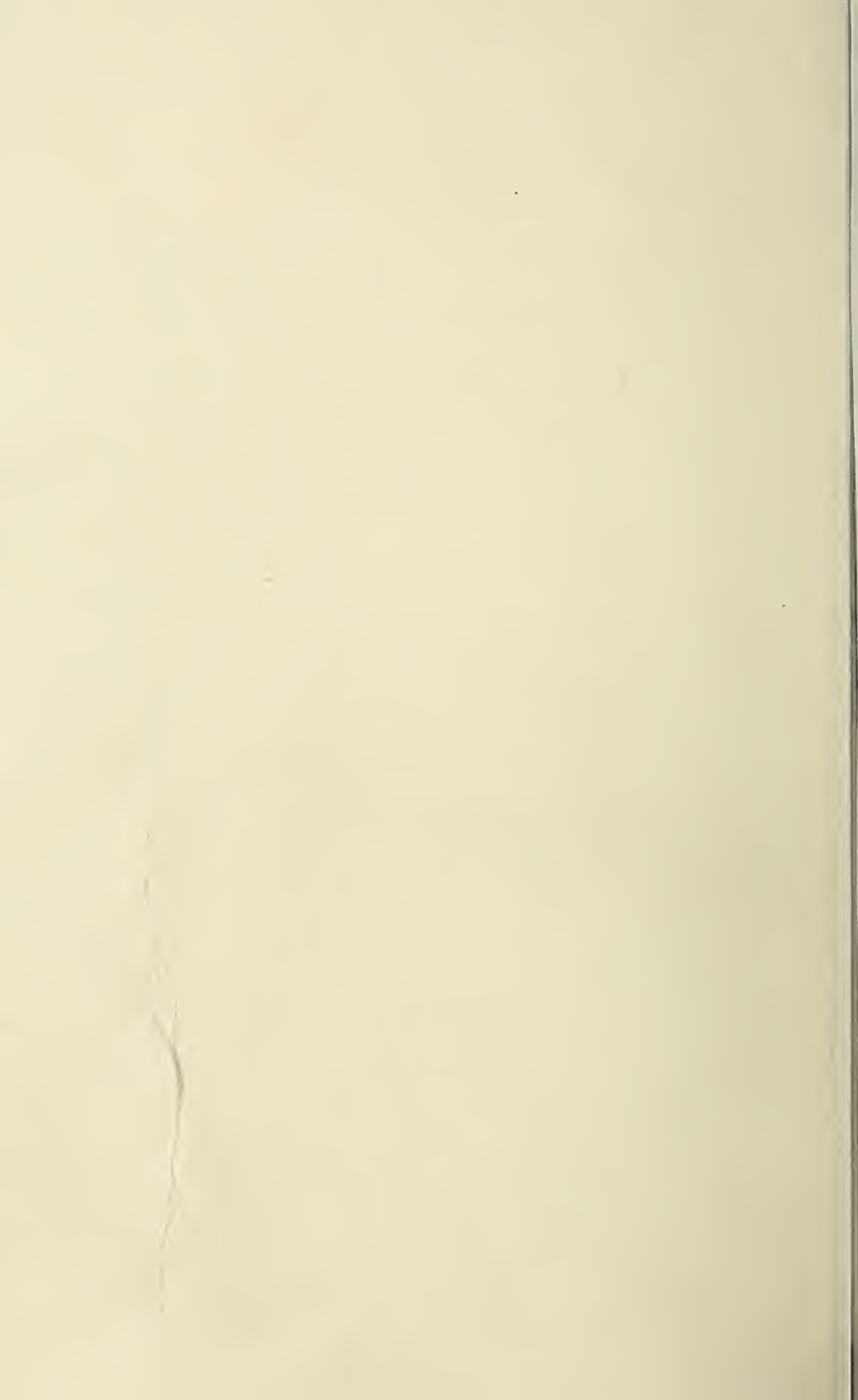
MAMMOTH BLACK TWIG Large, dark red, hardy and productive, strong grower and splendid keeper, fine grained, resembles Baldwin, but much larger and darker red. A splendid apple.

MILAN An old and popular variety, medium size. Tree is thrifty and very productive, thin skin and small core, yellowish green streaked with red. November to March.

MO. PIPPIN Medium, rich red with darker red stripes, very handsome and of fair quality, inclined to overbear, a very young and annual bearer, Tree immune to blight, January to 1st of May.

NOTHERN SPY Large, conical shape, with sunny side nearly covered with purplish red, fine quality, subacid, tree a strong upright grower and forms a very compact head, should be kept open by pruning; it is long coming into bearing. November to March.

ROME BEAUTY Large, yellow ground shaded with bright red, flesh yellowish, tender, juicy, subacid, highest quality, tree a moderate grower and splendid bearer, December to March.



STAYMAN'S WINESAP A seedling of the wine-sap but larger and better quality than that apple and tree a better grower, dark red, very productive, December to May.

WINTER PIPPIN Large roundish, clear pale yellow, with deeper yellow or slightly blushed on sunny side, subacid, fine grained fine flavor, tree an excellent grower. December to April.

WINE SAP Medium size, dark red, subacid, excellent: tree a moderate grower and abundant bearer, A favorite for home or market. December to May.

YORK IMPERIAL Large size, irregular shape, skin greenish yellow streaked with red, coarse grained, fair quality, tree a rapid grower, January to April.

WINTER BANANA Fruit large, flesh pale yellow, firm, crisp tender, subacid, skin clear pale yellow with wonderful pinkish red blush, tree vigorous and hardy, December to April.

Peach Trees

1 yr. tops, 2 yr. roots 7-16 to 9-16 each 35c

CARMAN Very large, shape oblong, color pale yellow, covered mostly with a deep blush. Flesh quite juicy and tender with a fine flavor; free stone, July.

CHAMPION Large white peach with red cheek, flavor delicious sweet, rich and juicy, very hardy and productive, one of the best: free stone. August.

CHAIR'S CHOICE Large roundish tapering to apex: pale yellow with some blush, flesh yellow, quite acid and red at pit. A good commercial peach, October, (Free)

CRAWFORD'S EARLY Large yellow peach of good quality, tree vigorous and very productive. Free, First of September.

CRAWFORD'S LATE Fruit of large size, yellow and dull red cheek, one of the finest late sorts, free stone, Last of September.

CROSBY Tree low, spreading willow habit of growth, fruit buds hardy, medium size, rich orange yellow, pit small, good, free Middle of September.

ELBERTA Large, yellow with red cheek, flesh yellow, firm, juicy, exceedingly prolific and sure bearer, free stone. Plant as many Elbertas as all others, Middle of September.

FITZGERALD Fruit large, brilliant color, light yellow mingled with red, small pit, flesh deep yellow. Best quality, free, Last of August.

HONEST JOHN Medium to large, yellow, flesh yellow, of good quality, tree vigorous and productive, free. First of September.

MAYFLOWER It is a week earlier than Sneed, Color red all over, being the only early peach that is well colored. A strong thrifty grower, inclined to overbear. should always be thinned, Half cling.

NIAGARA New York variety, ripening just after Elberta, large, beautiful and luscious, bearing annually very heavy crops, Free stone.

OLD MIXON FREE Large, pale yellow with deep red cheek, one of the best. September.

SALWAY Fruit large, roundish, deep yellow, brownish red cheek, flesh yellow juicy and good, free stone, October.

STUMP "FREE" Medium to large, roundish-oval, creamy white, with bright red cheek, and abundant bloom. Very good, Last of September.

WHEATLAND Large golden yellow, flesh yellow, juicy, sweet and fine quality. September.

WONDERFUL Very large, color rich golden yellow, fine and good, Remarkable keeper. Tree wonderfully productive, free, October.

WHITE HEATH CLING The most satisfactory cling stone known, very large, creamy white with delicate blush, juicy and tender, October.

Pear Trees

2 yr. 1-2 to 5-8 Branched each 60c.

BARTLETT (Standard and dwarf) large size often with a beautiful blush next the sun, buttery very juicy and highly flavored. Tree a strong grower bearing abundantly, very popular. Last of August to 1st of September.

CLAPP'S FAVORITE (Standard) A fine large pear, resembling the Bartlett but without its musky flavor, pale lemon yellow, with brown dots, fine texture, melting and fine. August to September.

FLEMISH BEAUTY (Standard) Large, beautiful, juicy, melting, rich and fine, strong grower, and good bearer, hardy everywhere. September and October.

KIEFER'S HYBRID (Standard) Tree a remarkable grower, fruit large, rich and good quality, best when picked at maturity and ripened in the house or shed. October and November.

WORDEN SECKLE (Standard and Dwarf) A seedling of Seckle equal in quality and much larger, color yellow with light red on sunny side. Tree hardy and enormous bearer. Sept.

SWEET CHERRIES

BLACK TARTARIAN Very large purplish black half tender, juicy, rich, excellent flavor. Tree a vigorous grower and productive. Last of June or July.

GOV. WOOD Large light yellow with red cheek, juicy and sweet, is largely planted. Late in June.

SOUR CHERRIES

DYEHOUSE A very early and abundant bearer, ripens a week earlier than Early Richmond, of better quality and quite as productive.

EARLY RICHMOND Medium size, dark red, melting, and good, does not rot on the tree and can be left without picking longer than most other varieties, a young and abundant bearer. 10th, of June.

MAY DUKE Large, red, juicy and rich, an old excellent variety, good grower and bearer. Middle of June.

MONTMORENCY A beautiful large red cherry, much larger than Early Richmond and ten days later, a variety of great value. More money has been made with it than any other variety. June.

Plum Trees

2 yr. 1 2 to 5-8 in. Branched each 70c.

BRADSHAW Fruit very large, dark violet red, flesh yellowish green, juicy and pleasant, tree vigorous erect and productive. Middle of August.

GERMAN PRUNE A large, long oval variety, much esteemed for drying, color dark purple, of very agreeable flavor. September.

GREEN GAGE Medium size, considered the standard of excellence, Tree a moderate grower. Middle of August.

LOMBARD Large, round, oval, violet red, late bloomer and annual bearer, tree vigorous and productive, of highest quality. First of Sept.

MOORE'S ARTIC Size medium, skin purplish black, flesh greenish yellow, juicy, sweet and pleasant flavor, an annual bearer, tree vigorous, an early and abundant bearer. Last of August, and September.

SHIPPER'S PRIDE Fruit is very large size, it being no uncommon occurrence to find specimens measuring two inches in diameter each way, nearly round, a half cling, beautiful dark purple color, a good shipper, keeping a long time in excellent condition.

SHROPSHIRE DAMSON A universal favorite, enormously productive, fruit of good size. Tree a vigorous grower, very free from attacks of Courculio, highly recommended for home and market, an annual bearer, long season, September and October.

CHAMPION Fruit very large, fair and handsome, a young and abundant bearer, greenish yellow in color, one of the best. October.

KANSAS Plant a strong grower, very hardy and prolific, fine quality it is beyond question a variety of great value,

ST. REGIS Everbearing, earliest of all red raspberries, begins to ripen the middle of June and fruiting on old canes until late in August, when berries begin to ripen on the young canes and continues to produce berries until late in Oct.

SENATOR DUNLAP Mid-season, greatest all around berry ever introduced, rampant runner, should be restricted in its production of plant, Fruit good size, bright red, glossy, splendid keeper and shipper, excellent quality.

SUPERB (EVERBEARING) an excellent variety, considered by some to be the best ever bearing kind, large size, very attractive in form and color, and a great bearer. excellent.

DELAWARE One of the finest grapes. bunches small, compact, shouldered, berries rather small, light red, exceedingly sweet, hardy and productive. Middle of August.

IVES SEEDLING Medium size berries, thick tough skin, color black, good and reliable, highly prized as a wine grape. September.

CONCORD (Black) The old reliable variety, succeeds over a great extent of country, one of the best. Middle of August.

MOORE'S EARLY (Black) Bunch and berry large quality better than Concord and twenty days earlier.

NIAGARA This white grape is known as one of the very best, very fine quality. hardy and prolific, is largely planted. Late in August

POCKLINGTON Is a seedling of the Concord fruit a bright golden yellow, clear, juicy and sweet to the center, bunches very large, sometimes shouldered, berries round, very large and thickly set. First of September.

WORDEN (Black) A seedling of the Concord which it greatly resembles in appearance and flavor, but berries are larger and better. Ten days earlier than Concord.

WOODRUFF RED This very large and handsome red grape is also a seedling of Concord. Vine a very strong grower, free from disease and very hardy, bunch large, shouldered, berry very aige and does not drop from the stem.
