**Alexander Emslie.** (Alex. Dickson, 1918.) H.T. Large, globe-shaped flowers, ruby color turning to deep velvety crimson. \$2.50 each.

**Alfred W. Melersh.** (Wm. Paul, 1918.) H.T. Salmon-yellow flowers, shading to rose-amber in center. \$2.50 each.

**Ariadne.** (Wm. Paul, 1918.) H.T. Moderate size flowers of bright crimson, shading to yellow in center. \$2.50 each.

**Benedicte Seguin.** (Pernet-Ducher, 1918.) H.T. Vigorous grower of erect branching habit, large apricot buds, flowers turning to coppery orange. Very good variety. \$2.50 each.

**Captain F. Bald.** (A. Dickson & Sons, 1919.) H.T. A continuous bloomer; very fragrant. One of the best dark red Roses, being velvety black sheened scarlet-crimson. \$2.50 each.

**Franklin.** (Pernet-Ducher, 1919.) H.T. One of the best varieties for bedding and cutting. Flowers salmon color shaded with yellowish salmon. \$2.50 each.

- F. J. Grootendorst.** (Grootendorst, 1919.) Rug. Small double bright red flowers produced in clusters from June until frost, edges of petals fringed like a carnation; foliage similar to Rosa Rugosa. \$1.50 ea.
- Helen Chamberlain.** (Easlea, 1918.) H.T. Creamy white shading to orange-yellow in center. Large, full flowers. \$2.50 each.
- John Davidson.** (McGredy & Son, 1919.) H.T. A continuous bloomer having a sweet fragrance. Deep rich crimson shaded velvety crimson. \$2.50 each.
- Louis Baldwin.** (McGredy & Son, 1919.) H.T. Form of Lady Hillingdon. Rich orange color with soft apricot shading over petals. Abundant bloomer. \$2.50 each.

- Mrs. C. V. Haworth.** (A. Dickson & Son, 1919.) H.T. Flowers produced in great profusion. Color difficult to describe, being a lovely combination of orange, pink and yellow. Dark foliage; very beautiful Rose. \$2.50 each.
- Mrs. C. W. Dunbar Buller.** (A. Dickson & Sons, 1919.) H.T. Earl of Warwick type. Rosy white color, veined warm, clear rosy deep carmine with lemon base. Edge is silvery white when open. Very hardy. \$2.50 each.

- Mrs. Henry Morse.** (McGredy & Son, 1919.) H.T. An ideal bedding and pot rose; very good rose of vigorous habit; blooms are long and shapely, of a lovely pink shaded salmon, deeper at base, with distinct tea scent. \$2.50 each.

- The Queen Alexandra Rose.** (S. McGredy & Son, 1918.) H.T. Very attractive Rose, color being vermillion, shaded old gold. \$2.50 each.
- †**W. F. Dreer.\*** (Howard & Smith, 1920.) H.T. One of the best new roses obtainable. Soft silvery shell-pink flowers with base of golden yellow. Very profuse bloomer. \$2.50 each.
