

Thirty-four years ago, five boys (brothers) from central New York, started in North Florida on a few acres, under the name of GRIFING BROTHERS; the operations extending from Florida to South Texas. Where a study of local conditions has been closely watched, we have obtained and disseminated information of great value which is contained in the following Service Bulletins, a few of which are now available:

Several years ago, State inspection regulations interrupted exchange stock between branches. TERMS OF SALE.

Unless some special contract agreement to the contrary exists, it must be understood by purchaser that the terms named in this list govern all wholesale business with us. OUR RESPONSIBILITY extends only to persons purchasing direct from us, nurserymen and tree agents selling upon their own responsibility.

Prices named herein abridge and cancel all previous lists, are subject to change without notice, and apply only to orders regularly accepted by us. They are net and not subject to any discount except as stated under Cash Discounts.

We accept all orders upon condition that they shall be void should any injury befall the stock from digging, frost, hail, storm, fire, strikes, flood, insect pests, infections, quarantine regulations, or other causés beyond our control, any of which causes might prevent shipment thereof. We disclaim any liability if unable to fill any order for any of these causes ,or on account of previous sale.

OUR LIABILITY.

If any nursery stock, etc., proves untrue to description under which it is sold, seller shall be liable to the original purchaser only, but to no greater extent or amount than the purchase price paid for such nursery stock, etc., and the seller, except for the aforesaid agreed liability, and in respect to such purchased nursery stock, etc., gives no warranty, express or implied, as to description, quality, productiveness or any other matter. If goods are not accepted under these conditions, they must be returned immediately upon receipt, and money will be refunded. All claims for errors must be made upon receipt of goods.

PACKING CHARGES.

Boxes, crates or burlap coverings will be charged for as near cost as possible for local freight and express shipments.

CARLOAD SHIPMENTS.

Bulk carload shipments, no extra charges for packing or packing material used.

RESERVE ORDERS.

Orders for any considerable quantity of stock, booked for future delivery must be accompanied by a deposit of 25 per cent of the amount of order, to insure us in reserving the stock.

RAILROADS IN TEXAS

(Give a Special Balled Tree Rate.)

After perfecting the "Balled and Burlapped" method of handling Evergreen Trees and Shrubs and Palms, we confronted an objection—heavy freight charges. To overcome this, we worked constantly to get a freight rate which would enable us to handle trees "Balled and Burlapped," thereby saving the regular nursery stock rates. (Apparently paying high freight on dirt.) Texas railroads granted a special Balled and Burlapped rate on nursery stock, which is now in effect and which can be found, as follows:

See A. C. Fonda's Agents, Texas Lines Tariff No. 2-E, page 62, Item No. 185. Article reads as follows:

"Nursery stock, i. e., Trees, (Fruit, Shade, Ornamental and others) balled (lifted from nursery row in a ball intact, of the earth in which they originally grew, the ball containing roots, encased in burlap carefully and securely sewed or tied; tops of trees drawn together and securely wrapped to a stiff support):

"In less than carloads, Fourth Class.

"In carloads, minimum weight 24,000 pounds, Class C."

INSPECTION CERTIFICATE.

Our nurseries are inspected several times annually by qualified State Inspectors, and copy of Certificate of Inspection issued by the State Department will accompany each shipment.

DESCRIPTION OF VARIETIES.

When description of varieties is desired, please refer to our current Retail Catalog.

TERMS OF PAYMENT.

Our terms are cash or satisfactory reference before shipment is made.

Where credit is extended, terms are 30 days from date of invoice. All past due accounts draw 8 per cent interest. If more than 30 days requested, arrangements should be made and note (trade acceptance) be made drawing 8 per cent interest from date of invoice.

CASH WITH ORDER.

Where cash is sent with order you may deduct 5 per cent of the total amount of order.

TEN DAYS DISCOUNT.

We allow 2 per cent discount if remittance is received at our office ten days after date of invoice.

SHIPMENTS.

Please give plain and explicit directions as to route and manner in which you wish goods shipped—by freight or express and allow plenty of time. When no instructions are given, we shall ship as we think best, but without assuming any responsibility.

The risk and transportation charges are to be borne by purchaser.

CLAIMS.

For shortage or errors, claims should be made immediately upon receipt of goods.

PROMPT DELIVERY.

We use every care to secure prompt delivery, but we are not liable for delays or damage in transit. Our responsibility in this respect ends upon delivery in good order to transportation company, but we will gladly render all the aid we can in case claim becomes necessary.

PACKING OF AGENTS' OR CLUB ORDERS.

When requested, we will carefully pack up such orders, billing them out according to your instructions. For ticing up, billing out, labeling and marking stock into individual orders, we charge ten cents per order. If you desire the roots of each individual order burlaped separately, we charge ten cents per order for this.

RATES.

Of the same variety and grade, 5 at 10, 50 at 100 rates and 500 at 1,000 rates.




BALLING AND BURLAPPING.

After years of experience in growing and handling hardy and semi-hardy nursery grown Evergreen Trees and Palms, we have settled upon what we believe to be the best methods. We are now offering to the trade the result of these methods and are growing them on soil best adapted for balling and burlapping.

Many Evergreen Fruit and Ornamental Trees which produce a good supply of fibrous roots can be taken up with a ball of earth in which they grow. Our success in this NEW DEPARTURE is one of the most important advances in the handling of trees and shrubs. The effect is immediate. You do not have to wait for the plants to develop new heads. Your customers can see the matured tree as soon as planted. INSTRUCT YOUR CUSTOMER not to remove the burlap, and handle the ball carefully, not allowing the dirt to crumble in the burlap.

EVERGREEN FRUIT OR SHADE TREES, PALMS AND SHRUBS.

Evergreen trees, palms or shrubs should be used extensively along the Gulf Coast of Texas and Louisiana.

When ordered BALLED AND BURLAPPED they can be handled by having only a little of the top growth removed.

There is a big saving in ordering these balled trees in car lots. An assortment of BALLED TREES and PALMS could easily make up a minimum carload. Balled trees can be kept for months by being stored in a partly shaded place, the balls covered with sawdust, shavings, cinders or dirt, and the tops sprinkled occasionally. Every nurseryman should have a stock of balled trees on hand during planting season.






