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LIST 22-E ROSES

This list is devoted entirely to budded roses, mainly on Manetti. List of roses on own roots will be sent later. This is for the trade only and all prices are strictly net. Packing charged for at cost. Advance bookings are always "subject to crop" but field counts have been discounted liberally to keep on the safe side.

NOVELTIES. I believe this list includes the most comprehensive assortment of novelties ever offered in this country;—In field grown stock anyway. As an indication of their relative newness I have given the year of introduction. It should be remembered that European Novelties cannot possibly be imported and propagated here in less than two years, hence a European rose of 1919, for instance, is really only one year old here.

QUANTITIES. Novelties listed at \$1.00 or more may be ordered singly if desired, but I cannot book less than 5 of any variety listed at 75c or less. You will notice some of the Novelties "Sold singly only." This shows that there are only a few plants available and I wish to sell them one at a time this season to get a wider distribution and thus give as many as possible a chance to test them. Next season all these sorts will be in better supply.

DON'T DELAY. My object in getting out this list is to give all customers an equal chance to secure their stock, particularly those sorts that are invariably unobtainable later in the season. So please act promptly. "Do it now."

*CLIMBING LOUISE CATHERINE BRESLAU—Pern. (Imported 1920)

A true climbing sport of a variety that has won its way to the very top rank. Flowers are identical with the bush variety, coral overlaid with orange. It is easy to predict a great future for this novelty.

SOUVENIR DE CLAUDIUS PERNET—Pern. (Pernet-Ducher 1920)

Winner of the Bagatelle Gold Medal for 1920. A magnificent variety on the order of Constance or Golden Emblem but with large, elongated and beautifully formed buds. Flowers are very double. Color is clear, brilliant yellow. Grows vigorously and blooms continuously. (On account of very limited supply I shall have to limit each customer to one plant only.)

QUEEN ALEXANDRA—H. T. (McGredy 1918)

While classed as a H. T. it probably has Pernetiana blood. Coloring is entirely unique and striking; faces of petals are deepest vermilion but with a conspicuous deep orange base; reverses are deeply shaded old gold. An entirely new color combination and about the most striking thing to date. Free bloomer and fragrant.

ASPIRANT MARCEL ROUYER—H. T. (Pernet-Ducher, 1919)

Apricot with reddish center, shaded salmon on outer petals. Vigorous and erect. Long buds.

CAPT. GEORGES DESSIRIER—H. T. (Pernet-Ducher, 1919)

Velvety red shaded fiery crimson. Vigorous spreading growth. Flowers large, full, globular.

CHAMELEON—H. T. (A Dickson, 1918)

"Its gorgeous colorings are almost impossible to describe. Pure flame, edged cerise. Beautiful cedar green foliage, delicately perfumed." (Sold singly only.)

CRUSADER—H. T. (Montgomery, 1920)

Crimson red, brighter in center. Buds large and open perfectly. Flowers large, full, double, borne single on long strong stem. Vigorous upright grower.

GEORGES CLEMENCEAU—Pern. (Leveque, 1919)

Bright orange shaded carmine. Color unique, splendid and effective. Very vigorous and free bloomer. Is either a sport or seedling of Mme. Ed. Harriot.

GLOW WORM—Pern. (Easlea, 1919)

Single or nearly so. Scarlet suffused coppery orange. On the order of Isobel but coloring more intense, often as brilliant as Austrian Copper. Abundant and continuous bloomer. Flowers large.

IRISH AFTERGLOW—H. T. (A Dickson, 1918)

Single. Sport of Irish Fireflame. Bud deep tangerine passing to crushed strawberry in open flower. Vigorous grower and free bloomer. (Sold singly only.)

JOSEPH BAUD—Pern. (Gillot, 1919)

Superb bud colored orange and carmine. Flower very large, full, golden yellow shaded orange. Growth vigorous and spreading. (Sold singly only.)

LA CHAMPAGNE—H. T. (Barbier, 1919)

Outer petals rosy peach with orange yellow base; center buff and apricot. Long firm bud opening to a large flower with large petals.

LA SOMME—Pern. (Barbier, 1919)

Bud round, orange red and deep copper. Flower large, formed like Testout and superbly colored, deep coral red shaded copper and passing to bright salmon. (Sold singly only.)

LOUISE BALDWIN—H. T. (McGredy, 1919)

Rich orange shaded soft apricot over the entire petal. Flowers extraordinarily long and pointed.

- LOUISE CRINER**—H. T. (Chambard, 1919)
Flower snow white sometimes with creamy center. Long stems and long buds. Few thorns, always in bloom. Fine for cutting. (Sold singly only.)
- LULU**—H. T. (Easlea, 1919)
Orange, salmon and pink. Has longest buds yet produced surpassing even Mrs. Alfred Tate. Free and continuous bloomer.
- *MERMAID**—Hyb. Bracteata X Tea (Paul, 1918)
A single climbing rose, with large sulphur yellow flowers having conspicuous deep amber stems. Foliage deep bronzy green and will probably be evergreen in this climate. Flowers have a tea fragrance. This rose is attracting great attention in Europe as it is a new cross of great merit. Gold Medal, N. R. S.
- MISS LOLITA ARMOUR**—Pern. (Howard & Smith, 1919)
Chrome yellow at base shading to burnt orange and copper. Passes to shrimp pink and copper with age. Flowers very large and full with strong fragrance. Vigorous grower and abundant bloomer. Won the Bagatelle Gold Medal in 1921.
- MME. RAYMOND POINCARÉ**—H. T. (Gravereaux, 1919)
Bright nasturtium yellow at center, salmon at edges. Grows vigorously and blooms freely. (Sold singly only.)
- MRS. C. W. DUNBAR-BULLER**—H. T. (A Dickson, 1919)
Deep rosy carmine with lemon base, opening to rose madder, reflex of petals rosy cerise. Flowers large, full and well formed.
- MRS. RAMON DE ESCOFET**—Pern. (Easlea, 1919)
Intense flame crimson. Buds and flowers very large. Somewhat resembles Geo. C. Waud, but is larger. Growth vigorous.

- CHRISTINE**—H. T. (McGredy, 1918)
Deepest golden yellow, perfectly formed with petals of great substance. Delightfully fragrant. McGredy, who also introduced Golden Emblem the year previous, asserted that "this variety is beyond question the finest rose of its color ever raised."
- EDEL**—H. T. (McGredy, 1919)
Pure white with faintest ivory shading at base. Flowers large, double and well built. Sweet fragrance. Very vigorous and a free bloomer.
- ELEGANTE**—H. T. (Pernet-Ducher, 1918)
Long sulphur-yellow bud, opening to a large, full flower of creamy yellow. Strong spreading growth; very floriferous.
- EUREKA**—H. T. (Cottage Gardens Co., 1922)
Bright rose pink. The color is unusually brilliant and clear and is well held in the open flowers which are of good size, beautifully formed both in bud and when open. Bush is of erect growth and throws long, straight strong stems making it excellent for cutting. Remarkably free bloomer. Was originated by E. G. Hill and is a seedling of Ophelia crossed by an unnamed seedling. Has been thoroughly tested as a garden variety and may be a good force.
- (NOTE—The introduction of this variety was held back for two years until a large stock of field grown, budded plants could be worked up. This is the reason for such a comparatively low introductory price for a very high class novelty.)
- FRANK W. DUNLOP**—H. T. (Dunlop, 1920)
Deep, bright rose-pink. Bud very large, long-pointed. Flower very large, full with high center. Strong fragrance. Stems long and strong. Profuse bloomer.
- JEAN RAMEAU**—H. P. Bourbon (Darclanne, 1918)
Long full tender pink bud. Flower iridescent rose. Very hardy.
- KOOTENAY**—H. T. (A Dickson, 1917)
Beautiful soft primrose. Flowers large, globular and borne in great profusion. An improved Kaiserin.
- LAMIA**—H. T. (Easlea, 1918)
Intense reddish orange. Has beautiful buds opening into lovely medium sized flowers. Reddish bush foliage. Vigorous grower.
- MISS STEWART CLARKE**—H. T. (A Dickson, 1916)
Golden yellow. Bears a profusion of medium size globular flowers of very attractive color.
- MRS. HUGH DICKSON**—H. T. (H. Dickson, 1915)
Deep cream, tinted orange and apricot. A very beautiful color combination.
- MRS. S. K. RINDGE**—Pern. (Howard & Smith, 1919)
Deep golden yellow. Becomes suffused with soft pink with age instead of fading. Bud large, long-pointed, stained cadmium red. Flowers very large, cupped, semi-double, fragrant. Very vigorous and free blooming.
- MURIEL DICKSON**—Pern. (A Dickson, 1915)
Color is still unmatched. Cherry red completely overlaid with a lustrous orange or coppery sheen. The open flowers are very large. Difficult to propagate so will probably always be scarce.
- SEVERINE**—Pern. (Pernet-Ducher, 1918)
Coral red passing to shrimp red when fully expanded. Particularly attractive as bud is opening. Strong erect grower.
- WHITE OPHELIA**—H. T. (Hill, 1921)
A white sport of Ophelia. Has a slight pink tinge in center disappearing as flower opens. Closely resembles parent in other respects.
- WM. F. DREER**—H. T. (Howard & Smith, 1920)
Soft silvery shell pink, base of petals golden yellow. In spring and fall the latter color usually suffuses the entire flower. The softness of all the color tones produces a charming effect. Profuse bloomer. Foliage very light green.

- ANNIE CRAWFORD** (H. P.) Salmon pink. Resembles Mrs. John Laing but is more vigorous and has larger flowers.
- BLUSHING BRIDE** (H. T.) Clear white with faint blush over center. Flowers very large and beautifully formed.
- CHERRY PAGE** (H. T.) Brilliant cerise pink with golden yellow base. Semi-double. Color unique.
- CIRCE** (H. T.) Flesh white shaded carmine, base of petals deep yellow. Large and full.
- *CLI. GEN. MACARTHUR** (H. T.) Fiery red. Flowers identical with bush variety.
- *COLCESTRIA** (H. T.) Satin rose fading to silver pink. Unusually fragrant. Very free blooming.
- C. V. HAWORTH** (H. T.) Intense dark scarlet shaded crimson. Well formed, fragrant and free blooming.
- CRIMSON CHATENAY** (H. T.) Beautiful bright crimson. Very fragrant.
- EDWARD BOHANE** (H. T.) Velvety crimson shaded orange scarlet. Flowers very large, fragrant.
- E. GODFREY BROWN** (H. T.) Deep reddish crimson, high center, sweetly scented.
- FLORENCE SPAULL** (H. T.) Deep rose pink, reflexed petals, particularly sweet scented.
- GERMAINE ROSSIAUD** (H. T.) Carmine tinted buds opening to yellow flowers which pass to white with salmon center.
- GOLDEN EMBLEM** (Pern.) Rich golden yellow. Flowers colored like Rayon d' Or and Constance. Rapidly attaining great popularity. Stock scarce.
- GOLDEN SPRAY** (H. T.) Deep yellow buds opening to large single flowers. Not a climber but has long arching shoots forming attractive sprays.
- H. D. M. BARTON** (H. T.) Deep rich velvety crimson.
- HENRIETTA** (H. T.) Orange crimson becoming soft coral salmon as flowers open. Large, few petals, deliciously perfumed. Color is unique, striking and attractive.

- HON. MRS. R. C. GROSVENOR (H. T.) Porcelain flesh with orange yellow center. Particularly good in the fall.
- JOANNA BRIDGE (H. T.) Straw yellow shaded strawberry. Flowers semi-double.

- *LEMON PILLAR (Hyb. Nois) Pale lemon buds opening lemon-white. Flowers large. Good climber.
