If the customer does not accept the goods on these terms, they can be returned at once and no sale has been made. No responsible seedsman can give a warranty.

## PLEASE ORDER EARLY

We shall greatly $\varepsilon$ ppreciate it if our customers will adopt our suggestion to send us their orders for seeds, plants, bulbs, etc., during January and February. Shipment need not be made until you want the goods.

## PACKING CHARGES

This new high yielding pedigreed rust resistant Asparagus is the result of 13 years of careful scientific breeding by the Bureau of Plant Industry.

The shoots are usually dark green with a rich purple tinge, with a clean straight growth and of the finest market type, with a tight pointed bud and not branching out until well beyond the market height.

The shoots are very large on the average and the high branching habit of this strain makes it possible to cut unbranched shoots with good tight buds as much as two feet long. The branches of the mature shoots after they grow up are much less spreading than those of ordinary asparagus. Other strains should not be mixed in with Washington Asparagus and sold as the new stock, neither should the grower lose the advantage to be gained by selling the new kind separately under its own name.

## LETTUCE, New York or Wonderful

This variety is also referred to as Los Angeles Lettuce, because it is shipped in such large quantities from that district to the Philadelphia and other Eastern markets; from one growing point and shipping station alone during one winter over 70 carloads were shipped to New York City. This is the lettuce that has for the past few years been in great demand, especially during the late winter and early spring months; its gigantic heads when the outer leaves are removed are almost white, very solid and as it grows in California apparently is without any trace of bitter taste. We have experimented with several varieties to determine definitely what this California variety was and found it to be as above offered. It does best in the latitude of Philadelphia as an early spring and a late autumn crop; while not quite as fine as it grows in California it is, nevertheless, lettuce which deserves greater recognition than it has heretofore received. ## ONION, Michell's White Bermuda

Many people who garden like to sow onion seed that will produce a full-sized onion the first season. They should be well cultivated during the growing period, and when the seed heads appear the plant should be bent over to develop the bulb. Melon Muscade (Fr.); Melone (Ger.); Popone Melone (Ital.) One ounce will plant about 50 hills; 2 to 3 lbs . are required for an acre.



While these do best to reach their greatest perfection in a light sandy loam, any good well-prepared garden soil suits them. ## OKRA OR GUMBO

Gombo (Fr.); Ocher (Ger.); Ocra (ltal.) One oz. will plant a row about 100 feet long; 2 lbs , required for 3000-foot row.
The seed is sown in rows, thickly, like peas (in ground that is rich), after the frost and cold have disappeared, the rows, 3 feet apart; when about 6 inches high the plants should be thinned out to stand 6 inches apart in the row. Throughout the following pages of Flower Seeds the different varieties are designated as Annuals, Biennials, Perennials, etc., and for the benefit of those who are not familiar with these terms, we wish to make the following brief explanation:

Annuals. These grow and bloom, mature their seed and then die in the same year, such as Asters, Balsams, Poppies, Sweet Peas, Morning Glories, etc., some of which may be sown in the house from March to May, or outdoors after danger from frost is over.

Biennials. These grow from seed sown during mid-summer, flowering the second year, after which they die; many of the varieties bloom the first season if sown early. In this class we have Pansies, English Daisies, Campanula Medium, Dianthus, etc.

Perennials. Those which live from year to year, such as Aquilegia, Delphinium, Foxglove, etc. Seed may be sown outdoors from June to September and transplanted late in fall into their permanent quarters, and protected during winter with a light litter of straw or leaves. The hardy perennials not usually needing any protection after the first winter; the half-hardy perennials require protection during the winter, and the tender perennials during the winter require greenhouse protection.

[^9]Our list this season has again been thoroughly revised. Many of the older varieties of Dahlias have been omitted and superseded by others that are much superior. The natural season for the Dahlia to be at its best is during September and October; in fact, effort to get superior blooms, before that time should not be attempted. To get large flowers, the plants should be disbudded up to August 1st.

Spade or plow the ground to a depth of about 10 inches. As a fertilizer, use either well-rotted stable manure, or, better still, sheep manure, which should be well mixed with the soil. When the soil is properly prepared, dig a hole, 6 inches deep, in which to plant the Dahlias. The bulbs should be laid down flat and covered to a depth of 4 inches. Every Dahlia should have from $21 / 2$ to 3 feet space and at least 4 feet between the rows.

As soon as the plants are a foot above the ground they should be tied to a stake. Keep the ground well cultivated and free from weeds. Never leave more than one shoot to a plant if you want to grow exhibition flowers. You will have better plants and larger flowers.

About Dahlia Plants. It happens sometimes that there is an unusually large demand for certain varieties, and our stock of roots becomes exhausted. In such instances we will send out strong plants after May 1st, after which time most all Dahlia orders for plants are filled, these give equally as good results as tubers or roots.

The Roses we are offering are all strong 2 -year old field grown plants that were dug last Fall and potted into 5 -inch and 6 -inch pots. They were then stored in cold greenhouses where they will start into growth naturally this Spring and by planting time they will be in prime condition. Roses thrive best in an open sunny position and they should be planted away from all trees and shrubs so that the roots will have the full benefit of the nourishment in the soil. Roses are gross feeders and consequently require a rich soil. Select a well drained position where the soil is good and dig in a liberal amount of well decomposed stable manure thoroughly mixing it with the soil. For best results the beds should be made from 4 to 5 feet wide, planting the Hybrid Teas 18 inches apart and the stronger growing Hybrid Perpetuals 2 feet apart, planting all about 8 inches or 10 inches from the edge of the beds. The pot grown plants we send out arrive with a ball of earth around the roots, this ball should not be disturbed but should be thoroughly wet when planted. Budded Roses should be planted so that the bud is about 2 inches below the surface of the ground, firm the soil well around the roots and give a thorough watering. Throughout the Summer, the surface of the bed should be frequently cultivated. The Roses we send out require no further pruning, but are ready to be planted when received; instructions for pruning the following seasons will be found under the heading of the different classes. The best method of protecting Roses for the Winter in this locality is to draw up a mound of soil around the base of the plant to a height of 8 or 10 inches, thereby protecting the buds at the base of the plants from the alternate freezing and thawing, which is so injurious. In addition to this a covering of strawy manure, evergreen boughs or corn stalks is very beneficial. When Roses are growing freely they are less liable to insect pests or fungous diseases than if they are starved or otherwise neglected. A weekly application of Bordeaux Arsenate of Lead Mixture will keep the plants free of almost all insect pests as well as fungous diseases, but if mildew should appear in spite of this periodical spraying use Sulphide of Potassium at the rate of one half ounce to one gallon of water. Green fly or aphis are easily kept in check by tobacco dust or spraying with any nicotine solution.

Pure bone-meal is the best fertilizer in promoting growth; apply with it also some wood ashes; the latter will assist in holding in check earth grubs, which at times attack the roots and crowns of the plant. In order to keep Larkspurs in bloom continuously during the summer, cut the old flower stems off, after they have faded, and new shoots will produce flower heads in succession. To get the best out of hardy Larkspurs in the way of flowers, feed them occasionally during the growing season with an application of ground bone. A slight covering of long straw or leaves over the crowns of the plants during winter will prove a great benefit.

Unlike a fence, which needs painting, repainting, etc., and then never looks well, this hedge is no further expense after planted, and it adds dignity and charm to any home, and increases the value of real estate. ## HYDRANGEA HORTENSIS

This class of Hydrangeas is planted extensively at many of the Atlantic seashore resorts and while it is perfectly hardy there it is not reliably hardy inland, even in the latitude of Philadelphia, unless planted at the side of a porch or building where it has some protection from the winter sun. Outside of these favored locations we recommend tub culture as the most satisfactory.

They should be left outside as late in the fall as possible, care being taken, however, to avoid sharp frosts which would injure the buds.

They should then be removed to a cool, light cellar where they will have a temperature of about 40 degrees and given only enough water to keep the roots from drying up and the branches from shriveling. The plants should be brought out in the early spring and well watered; provision should be made, however, to protect them from late frosts.

In some soils these will flower blue naturally and in other soils the flowers will be pink.

If you wish to have blue flowers when they naturally come pink this may be attained by incorporating with each bushel of soil one-half pound of lump alum broken into small pieces.
