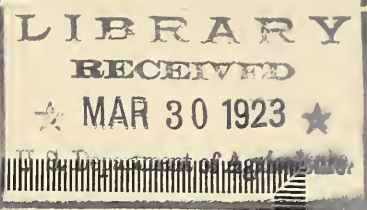

HARDY VINES

Be sure to plant Vines in good soil. Most of the failure with Vines are due to the poor quality of the soil near the foundation of house or porch. They will quickly repay for the trouble of renewing the soil.

- Ampelopsis.** Of all the Vines listed here, with the exception of *Euonymus radicans*, the *Ampelopsis* are the only species that will climb on a perpendicular surface without the support of wires or stakes.
- A. quinquefolia.** Virginia Creeper. Very useful for covering up rough wall spaces and unsightly, stony spots. Foliage takes on beautiful Fall colors. Strong, two-year-old plants, 50c; dozen-rate, 45c.
- A. q. Engelmanni.** A variety of the preceding, with deep green, glossy foliage.

ROSES

We offer strong, two-year-old plants in varieties of tried hardiness,—only those which we can recommend as generally satisfactory in this vicinity.

Order early. It is often impossible to fill late orders for particular varieties. Send your order as early as possible;—today, rather than tomorrow.

A rich, well drained soil is required for Roses. A fairly moist location is better than a dry one.

Rose bushes should be set deeply. Bury the base of the branches three to four inches below the surface. Most failures with Roses are due to shallow planting. Dig a planting hole deep enough for the roots to be set in a natural position. Keep soil moist until new growth appears. Thereafter, add water in dry seasons.

In your order please state, if, in case we are sold out of any of the varieties wanted, we may substitute varieties that resemble closely those ordered.
