




To obtain best results Lawn Grass Seed should be sown as soon as the ground can be prepared in early Spring. It may also be sown in the Fall with good results. One quart will sow 15 x 15 feet (225 square feet). For making new Lawns, sow 6 Bushels to the acre. For renovating old lawns, use half the quantity.

Lawn

A perfect and enduring lawn, one of velvety appearance with closely interwoven, firm, deep and elastic turf, is only created by sowing a composition of the various kinds of grass seeds suited to the conditions and the climate. Several varieties are needed, that the lawn may be evergreen during all seasons and the seeds lawn may be produced quickly, but because the kinds of grasses suitable for perfect lawns are fine-leaved and should take entire possession of the ground promptly, thus checking the development of weeds, the seeds of which are in all soils. Good, rich deeply worked soil, either of a friable texture or thoroughly drained, is as necessary for the production of a perfect lawn as for garden crops. Early and frequent mowing and rolling, as well as the liberal application of water, which should be applied in the early morning, or late afternoon during dry seasons, is one of the secrets of maintaining beautiful green turf from early Spring to late Fall.

Burnett's "Shady Place" Mixture

When a lawn is much shaded, either in whole or in part, the shaded portions should be sown with Burnett's "Shady Place" Lawn Grass Mixture, which is a combination of fine, dwarf-growing evergreen varieties, which, in their wild or natural state, are to be found growing in the woods or other sheltered or shady places. Under or in the immediate neighborhood of large trees fertilizers should be applied liberally and frequently, for the trees absorb the fertilizer and impoverish the ground. Ground much shaded is very frequently sour, and if the drainage is defective it is apt to be covered with moss. In such cases an application of lime or wood ashes raked in will sweeten the soil, but the moss should be first removed with a sharp steel-toothed rake. The Terrace mixture which we offer is composed of deep-rooting grasses which, if once established, will hold the soil and prevent washing, and we advise liberal fertilizing and seeding so that the grasses may be quickly established. 
Use about $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. to the square yard, distributing the powder over the grass as evenly as possible. The next step is to immediately apply the water to wash in the powder.

Plenty of water should be used, especially during dry weather, as worms are then deeper in the soil.

The use of this worm killer, will diminish labor considerably, as far less brushing and rolling will be required to maintain an even, clean surface on the grass.

NOTE:-One of our golf customers reports that the best results were obtained by applying the powder after rains, as the worms are then nearer the surface, and less water is required to wash in the powder.



ASPARAGUS ROOTS

Can be planted either in Spring or Fall.

To make a permanent Asparagus bed, the ground should be trenched deeply and well drained. The trench should be filled up with drained. The trench should be filled up with a rich compost of well rotted manure and loam. Set roots 12 inches apart in the rows, allowing 2 to 3 feet between rows, spreading out and separating the roots carefully so that the crown will be covered with about 6 inches of soil. In November, when the stalks have been cleared away, give the bed a good top-dressing. In early spring a liberal application of agricultural salt will be beneficial. be beneficial.







Raising Flowers from Seed

One of the most fascinating and economical ways of making a flower garden, Aid for the is in raising the plants from seed. One sees far too many of those summer gardens of Cannas, Geraniums, Salvias, Coleus, etc., that are more or less characteristic of the order telephoned to the florist round the corner, to "come and Amateur. fix up the garden"; very effective in their way, but their similarity and frequency are monotonous, and what is more, such gardens are expensive. A few packages of well chosen annual seeds costing but a few cents, give far more enjoyment in the raising, and a much more useful and interesting variety of flowers.

Flowers that can be raised from seed for Garden use are divided into 6 classes, viz:-

Hardy Annuals. Seeds sown outdoors where they are to bloom; they die after the first year.

Half Hardy Annuals. Those that are sown under glass in the early Spring and transplanted outdoors in April and May.

Hardy Biennials. Seeds sown outdoors and bloom the next year; some bloom the first year if sown early.

Seed sown on year under glass and planted outdoors the following Spring. Half Hardy Biennials.

Hardy Perennials. Seeds sown outdoors one year, bloom the next and each succeeding year without protection.

Half Hardy Perennials. These bloom from seed the second year, but need indoor winter protection thereafter.

HARDY AND HALF HARDY ANNUALS

These are of two kinds, those that can be transplanted into their flowering quarters, and those that are spaced by "thinning"; the latter of course have to be sown, where they are intended to bloom, and have usually a single or "rat-tail" root; most all those that have fibrous roots can be transplanted from one place to another. We must leave it to the reader's experience to ascertain these differences, an initial loss or two will help materially, and should not discourage a true garden lover.

Early Sowing. Boxes, pans or pots with good drainage, filled with a rich sandy loam (preferably passed beforehand through a ¼ inch sieve) form the necessary materials in this operation. Seed may be sown in rows or broadcast. See that each variety is labelled and separated from its neighbors by narrow wooden slats. Large seeds should be covered by twice their size; small seeds that are no larger than dust should be sown on the surface and pressed in with a flat board or the bottom of a pot. Water thoroughly with a very fine spray, or, immerse the receptacle in water for a few minutes. Place in a light airy window, cold frame or greenhouse and cover each box or pot with glass. This retains the sun's heat on the soil and aids germination. On very warm days, the glass should be raised a ¼ of an inch at one end and newspaper placed over all. Watch carefully day by day, and water only when soil is dry. Over wa'ering rots the seed. When seedlings have made their second true leaves, transplant, 2 to 3 inches apart, into boxes or pans, and plant outdoors in May.

BIENNIALS

These are treated in the same manner as the preceding, but are sown in June or July and kept under glass for the first winter.

Sowing Outdoors Ground should be thoroughly spaded up, enriched with rotten stable manure or commercial fertilizer, and thoroughly pulverized. Sow the seed in rows or broadcast, according to the prearranged plan of bed or border. Cover with about half an inch of fine soil and level off the surface. Thin out when 4 or 5 inches high, to the required distance apart, which varies from 4 inches to one foot, according to the height of the plant at maturity.

HARDY PERENNIALS

Now generally known as "Old fashioned Flowers" are the best value one can put into a garden. When once established, the plants thrive and bloom each year without further trouble or care than a light winter covering of litter, provided the soil is sufficiently rich, well drained, and suitable to the particular plants chosen. Public taste is gradually reverting to the old ideas of a garden. Straight lined beds and regularly planted rows are giving way to irregular lines, bold masses of color and gracefully curved borders. A well-planted perennial border is one of the prettiest sights imaginable, and always affords a splendid gathering of flowers for indoor decoration from April till October.

Seed Sowing

Seed should be sown in June or July, either in the open ground, on the shady side of a house or fence, or in boxes placed out doors away from the sun's same rules for sowing as recommended for Annuals. In transplanting, some of the most vigorous growers may be moved direct to the Hardy Border, while others need one shift to other boxes and later planted out. A light protection of leaves, litter or evergreen branches should be placed over them after one or two good frosty nights. The last plantings in the border should be completed by October 15th, to allow them to get a growing hold before severe frost.


How to Grow Good Sweet Peas

BY A PROFESSIONAL


WEET PEAS are and always have been one of the great floral specialties of Burnett Brothers. Every year our lists of varieties are revised to include the best type of each color, new varieties continually supplanting those of less merit as demostrated in field trials. "Sweet Peas are one of the most fascinating flowers of all garden annuals, but unfortunately there are many who find difficulty in getting the best out of them. As climbing vines for screens, trellises, arbors, or individual columns tastefully trained in the annual flower border, they make a wonderful showing, and the cut blooms, with their long wiry stems, delicate fragrance, and great variety of fascinating shades, have a grace and individuality for table decoration that no other flower quite equals. They are well worth the little extra trouble and pains it takes to grow them properly."

SOWING Sweet Peas may be sown in pots (about a dozen seeds in a 6" pot) in hot bed or greenhouse in February, or out of doors as early in the spring as the softening of the earth permits. The early indoor sowing is always preferable, because these plants set out in April or May give flowers at least six weeks earlier than the out-door sowing. The entire clumps can be planted from the pots in unbroken balls and trained in pyramidal or columnar form, or carefully planted in rows, 6" to a foot between the plants. Columns or rows of separate colors are usually more effective than mixed plantings, though the latter are fine for cutting.

THE GROUND that is to receive the seeds or transplanted seedlings needs special preparation. Whether in rows or clumps, trenches and holes 15" or 18" wide and of similar depth must be opened. Place a layer of stones, garden rakings or other rubble in the bottom, over this place from 6 to 9 inches of rotten cow or stable manure; this still leaves about 6 inches to be filled to top of cut, which should contain good garden loam, through which has been mixed a 116th portion of slaked lime. Having filled with this compost, make a concave surface to form side ridges 3 inches higher than the center. Then sow seeds two inches deep and rather thinly along the center of the concavity; or transplant your seedlings 6" or 1 ft. apart. Thin out the seedlings where they appear to come too thickly. Watch for the sparrows as the seedlings break through (they are very fond of the young tender shoots of all legumes) protect with netting, if necessary.

TRAINING the plants is a matter of taste and purpose. They will cling to anything around which they can entwine their tentacles. They will readily climb on a wire or iron fence or wooden lattice work. Dried tree branches

ttice work. Dried tree branches form a good support though perhaps not so artistic looking as one may wish. For columnar form, place 4 or 6 perpendicular wooden or bamboo canes 6 ft. high around the clump, attach with tied crosspieces at top; around and between the canes pass and tie tarred twine at intervals of 4 or 6 inches, so as to form a circular cage for the plants as they grow upwards. WATERING ETC. Sweet Peas must have abundance of water, and the rows or groups should be deluged every day during

must have abundance of water, and the rows or groups should be deluged every day during the warm summer months. It is essential to pick the blooms regularly to prevent seeding as the latter is detrimental to the size and quantity of the later blooms. Watch for Aphis or green fly and spray with X-L-ALL or Black Leaf 40 at first signs of these pests."
