

IRISES

Irises are frequently referred to as the "Rainbow Flowers," because of their wide range of color. As delicate in form and in color harmony as the orchid, they are, however, quite easily grown and are perfect; hardy.

They require a dry, sunny location, where the soil is at all times well drained. A wet soil will cause the root to decay, as will standing water in the winter. Plant them with the rhizome hardy covered and the rootlets.

them with the rhizome barely covered and the rootlets well spread out, then firm the earth well around them. If the soil is dry when planting, put water in the hole crench but do not water again until growth has started. Never allow manure to come into contact with the rhizome; if a fertilizer is required, crushed limestone, hardwood ashes or bone meal in small quantities may be stirred in around the roots, at the same time being careful not to touch the leaves with it. Drought after the blooming season is beneficial as that is the dormant season when transplantings can be made most successfully.

Irises can be transplanted with success in our climate

at any time of the year when the soil is not frozen, providing the leaves are cut back and we will ship accordingly, although we prefer to ship in July and August when

most of our own transplanting is being done.
