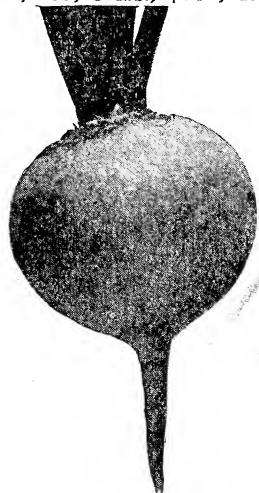

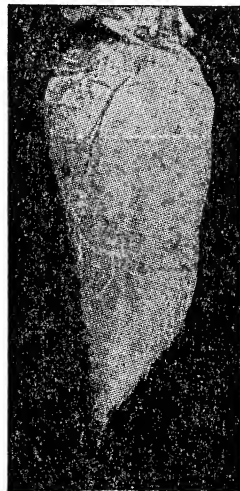

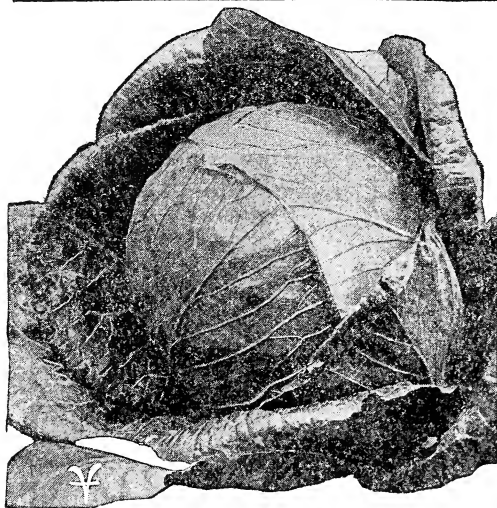

CAULIFLOWER

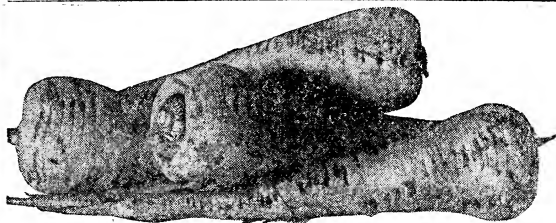

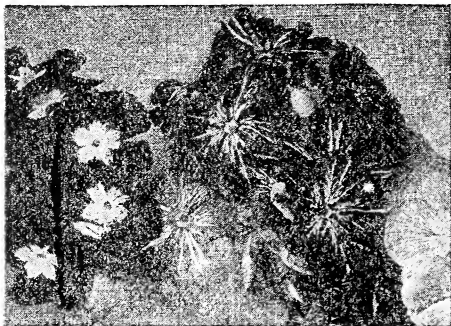

Perennial Border

They are easily raised from seed, being sowed in the spring or early summer. They should be sown in seed beds and transplanted either once or twice, preferably twice. It is necessary to keep the seed beds pretty moist but not saturated and to protect the seedlings from the hot rays of the sun. Perennials will give you a great deal of satisfaction and those who love flowers would rather grow them from seed than to buy the plants. However, for the setting out of an entirely new garden we would recommend the use of plants so as to get a more rapid start the first year.

ADONIS

When received, wet the roots but not the tops, and heel in some moist, shady spot. When ready to plant make a thin mud in a pail or tub, dip roots in or keep in until

planted. Absolutely prevent the drying of the roots. Firm ground well as planted, and keep well cultivated. Seedlings should be lined out about 6 inches apart in a row in the garden and given good culture for about three years before setting in their permanent place. For windbreak plant 8 to 12 feet apart each way, so as to alternate if two rows.

BURLAPPING WITH A BALL OF EARTH. When requested we will burlap each individual tree as dug with earth adhering. 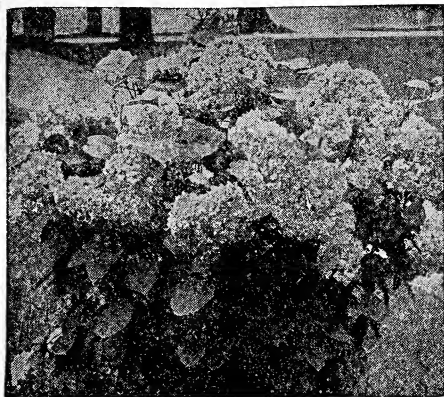

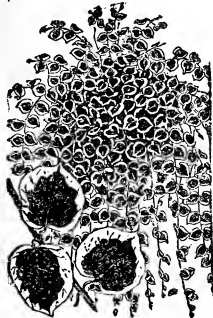

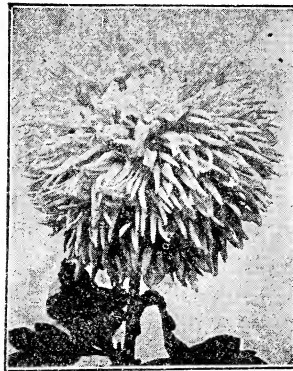

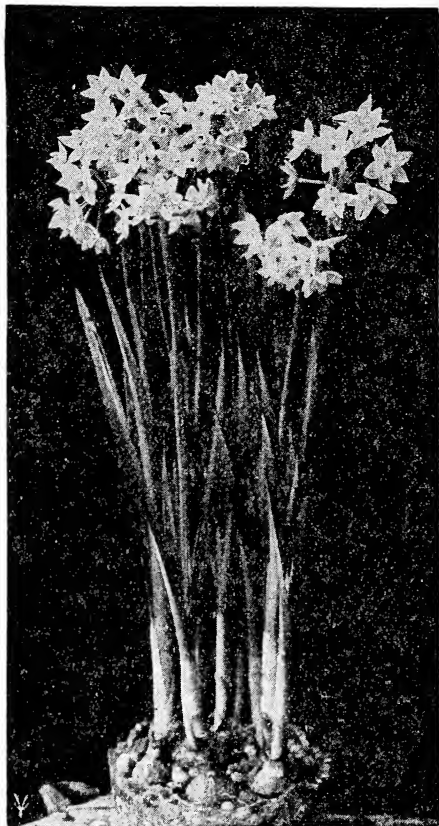

ACACIA LOPANTHA

Beautiful, half-hardy trees or shrubs with finely lacinated foliage and long racemes of small yellow flowers. In the North they can be used as conservatory plants only, but are perfectly hardy for the southern states. Before planting, soak seeds in hot water until they swell. The hard, shiny black seeds, either alone or combined with beads, make lovely necklaces. For this purpose they must be soaked in hot water (near boiling) until they swell. They should be strung as they swell and become soft. If all do not swell at once, keep the rest soaking in the hot water. After drying, the seeds go back to their natural size and color.
