

In preparing this catalogue we have taken great care to list only those varieties of Gladioli that we know to be worthy of your attention. To be sure, what others may say regarding this or that variety must be considered. The best test, however, is: "How do they grow in your own garden?"

Great care should be taken in selecting rare and expensive bulbs so that you will not be disappointed. Often the most expensive bulbs do not bring forth more pleasing flowers than are grown from bulbs of moderate price.

On account of its good keeping qualities the Gladi-

olus surpasses all other flowers for cutting purposes. Cut the spikes when the first buds open and place them in vases in the house. Change the water daily, remove the withered portions, cut an inch or so from the stem and every bud will open one by one to the very top. A vase of blooms may be kept fresh and beautiful for a week or more.

If you have never grown "FARNSWORTH'S GLADIOLUS BULBS" you have missed something that would have given you real pleasure. Our bulbs are grown on light, sandy loam, where there is plenty of moisture to produce bulbs of unusual blooming power. We have a modern storehouse and equipment so that our bulbs are stored at just the right temperature to adapt them for forcing as well as outdoor planting.



CULTURAL DIRECTIONS

The Gladiolus is a flower of easy culture and does well in any soil, but should be planted in full exposure to the sun. Bulbs should be planted from 4 to 6 inches deep, and 3 to 4 inches apart. They may be set out as soon as the frost is out of the ground, and until about June 1st.

The more the soil is worked and fertilized the better the result will be. If stable manure is to be used, it should be spaded in in the Fall previous to Spring planting. Good results are obtained from the use of commercial fertilizer applied at

the time of planting.

Unless the soil is very light and sandy, or the season is abnormally dry, good results should be forthcoming without watering. If watering is done, it should be in the evenings only, and the ground should be thoroughly drenched.

When cutting the flowers, care must be taken not to lift, or disturb the bulbs. Cut the flowers as soon as the first bud has entirely opened; leaving at least four leaves on the stem of the plant to

help mature the bulb.

Bulbs may be dug as soon as the foliage begins to turn brown, or after a frost has stopped the growth. Cut the stems off close to the bulb, and place them where they will have plenty of air to dry, preferably in a shady place. When thoroughly dry the old bulb and roots may be removed easily. Store in a cool, dry place where they will be safe from frost.

ORDERING

To give entire satisfaction, let us suggest early ordering. The stock of choice varieties is often limited, and cheaper varieties are in great demand.

Prices quoted are for clean, mature stock of sufficient size to produce good blooms. It is not always the large bulbs that produce the best flowers. Some varieties even produce the best flowers from small bulbs.

Every effort is made to keep the stock true to name. Any bulbs not proving satisfactory in this respect will be replaced free of charge. For the prices quoted, bulbs will be shipped PREPAID PARCEL POST to all points in the U. S. A. and CANADA. One-half dozen furnished at the dozen rate.

Orders for less than one dollar cannot be accepted.

Remittance should be sent with orders, or before shipment is made.

Prices will be furnished on application to customers desiring to purchase large quantities, planting stock, or bulblets of any of the varieties listed.

AMERICAN GLADIOLUS SOCIETY


