## ABOUT LAWNS AND LAWN GRASS SEED Formation of Lawns from Seed

There is nothing more attractive than a well-kept lawn.
The ground should be thoroughly drained and well prepared. The soil ought not to be too rich, as a rapid growth is not wanted in the grasses of a lawn; but the surface should be as much alike in quality as possible and thoroughly pulverized. After sowing, the ground should be rolled if possible, in order to press the seed firmly into the soil, and ten days or so thereafter a light application of Johnson's Lawn Fertilizers will serve to stimulate the growth of the young grasses. The proper time to sow grass seed depends, of course, upon latitude. In the central and eastern states from March 15 th to the middle of May is the best time; but in favorable seasons the sowing may be done up to July 1st. Seed may also be sown in the fall, from the latter part of August to the end of October or later, depending upon the weather. The sowing should be done when the ground is moist, or before an expected rain, and a subsequent rolling is always advisable. As to weeds in newly-made lawns, it may not be generally known that many weed seeds actually lie dormant in the ground for six or seven years and will germinate and make their appearance when the soil is turned up. The annual wild grasses, such as crab grass or summer grass, must be pulled up by the roots before they ripen their seed in the fall.
