Asparagus

Can be started by sowing the seeds or setting out roots. A bed once properly made and planted, will last for years. Seeds are sown as early in the Spring as garden can be made. Plants can be raised easily from seed. When roots are one to two years old, set them 12 inches apart. The rows should be 8 to 10 inches deep, with width of 6 to 8 inches at the bottom. After spreading out roots, cover crowns with 3 inches of soil. With the growth of the shoots gradually fill in with earth until level with surface. Cultivate carefully during the season. An ounce will plant 50 ft. of row; and produce about 200 plants; 4 to 5 pounds to the acre.

Help the vines to start twining around the poles from right to left. One pound will plant 75 to 100 hills; 20 to 32 pounds to an acre. (Note: Plant Lima Beans with the "eyes" of the seed downward).



Carrots

Sow the seed thinly in shallow rows early in the spring. Make three or more sowings of the early varieties a month apart, to afford a succession of tender roots.

When plants are well started, thin out the small early sorts to three inches apart in the row, and large late varieties from five to six inches. They should be sown in deep, rich soil, deeply worked and receive constant cultivation during growth to insure smooth, straight roots. 



Cauliflower

Requires very rich soil, cool seasons, and abundance of moisture. Grown same as cabbage either as a spring crop or for late fall.

Late in May or during early June preparations are made for the main crop in the fall. Seeds are sown in rows, 18 inches apart, covered ¼ inch. Should a little beetle with yellow-striped wings, visit the patch, fight him at once by spraying or dusting Arsenate of Lead or Pyrox. The richer the soil the more they grow. The soil should be warm to insure quick germination. The surface should be mellow so the little plants won't break their necks trying to push through a crust. The seed bed should be firm and moist underneath to give the roots a good place to work and produce rapid growth. Then plant good seed, preferably inoculated and not too deep, and you are practically sure of success.

Other details are more matters of choice or convenience than essentials of success. The beans may be drilled in rows 28 to 22 inches apart and cultivated, or drilled solid or sown broadcast. It will require 25 to 40 pounds of seed per acre if drilled in rows and 60 to 90 pounds if broadcasted. The best time to plant is May 15th to June 15th after the soil warms up good and corn planting is out of the way.






