



Foreword

The gladiolus is growing in popularity, and many amateurs who grew only a few dozen formerly, now grow them by the hundred. No late summer flower is so well adapted to so many uses. As a cut flower it is outstanding and unequalled. If cut when first buds open, the later buds open up from day to day for a week or more and by planting them at intervals of a few weeks from the time of the first planting until June the first, in the latitude of central Ohio, one may have them from middle of July until October frosts. Anyone able to grow cabbage or potatoes can grow them, and they require no more attention in their care storage in the winter than potatoes. It would be vain for me to enlarge on their virtues, seeing them at their best in the showroom or better yet in the field, is almost sure to make enthusiastic glad fans. I only wish that everyone of you could visit my place in blooming time and enjoy them with me.

Cash to accompany orders, please; or a deposit of 25% of list price will hold order for spring shipment, balance due March 20, or can send C. O. D. if preferred.



I am under the impression that the experienced planter prefers to select his own gladiolus from the catalogue, rather than buy a collection made by the vender, where one often buys some he does not want in order to get some he does want. To such I would say make your selection from my catalogue, and I will surprise you with extras in liberal count if the order is sufficient to warrant same. For those wanting a lot of blooms at low cost I offer:

Collection A

Culture and Care of Gladioli

Gladioli will do well in any good garden soil. Like other plants, the better the soil and culture, the better will be the results. Plant in April or May owing to the latitude; or a safe rule is when the ground is in good condition to work and warm enough to induce growth.

Be sure to select an open sunny location, for they delight in full sunshine. Also avoid planting near the walls of a building or where roots of trees or shrubs absorb the moisture and fertility; this is sometimes far beyond the limits of their branches.

If for hand cultivation plant rows fifteen to eighteen inches apart and for horse culture from two and one half to three feet apart and place the corms from four to six inches apart in the rows, covering them from four to five inches deep. Cultivate frequently.
