


Sow all your grain, such as Rye, Oats and Wheat in September and Oc-tober; even November plantings do well. Cover and pasture crops such as Crimson Clover, Vetch, Burr Clover should be sown in September and through October. Don't put it off. Alfalfa, Red Clover, Alsike, Timothy, Red Top and other grasses do best when sown in the fall. All prices are for immediate acceptance and subject to market changes, F. O. B. Elizabeth City. However, we will protect these prices as long as we are able to do so. If you order any seeds by parcel post be sure to include money for postage. 




