ROSES

THE Roses offered here are two-years-old, budded stock. The Continuously Flowering varieties should be cut down after planting to a few inches above the ground. Plant all Roses so deep that the base of the branches sets below the surface. Step the soil down firmly and leave a depression around the plants. Soak them thoroughly after planting and apply water from time to time, sufficient to keep the soil moist. Keep the surface loose.

Planting spaces for Roses should be prepared deeply. See that there is thorough drainage underneath.

Order your Roses at the earliest possible time. It is often very difficult, if not impossible, to obtain particular varieties late in the season. Order now, before stocks are depleted.

A FEW OF THE BEST CONTINUOUSLY FLOWERING ROSES

Betty. This Rose is appreciated so much for its lovely, long, pointed buds of coppery pink. The flowers when open are a pale buff-pink, rather loose. The plant grows vigorously and produces long flower stems. 90¢

British Queen. Faint pink buds, opening white. The flowers are well-shaped and fragrant. The plant is of low, branching growth. 90¢.

Chas. K. Douglas. Large, loosely shaped flowers of an intense crimson-scarlet. The color does not fade. Long, pointed buds. \$1.00.

Dutchess of Wellington. Perhaps the most generally satisfactory yellow Rose. It grows vigorously and blooms freely. The buds are coppery orange and open clear saffron yellow. Very fragrant. 90¢.

George C. Waud. A large, very double Rose of a striking, warm red color. A strong grower. Best in early summer and early fall. 90¢.

Golden Emblem. A wonderful, intensely yellow Rose, large and well filled, well-formed. Strong, glossy foliage. \$1.00.

Gruss an Teplitz A tall-growing Rose, excellent for bedding, but best not interplanted with other varieties. Clusters of rather small, warm crimson flowers. Very free-flowering. 90¢.

Hermosa. An old-fashioned China-or Bengal Rose. Sprays of lovely soft pink flowers of medium size. 90¢.

Jonkheer J. L. Mock. A good, solid Rose, of vigorous growth. The flowers are carmine-pink. The outer petals are curled outward, showing the silvery pink of the petals' inner surface against the deeper pink of the outside. 90¢.

Kaiserin Augusta Victoria. An old-fashioned Rose, but unsurpassed in the quality and exquisite shape of its flowers. Creamy-white buds, opening white with a faint tint of yellow. Not a particularly strong grower, but worth planting. 90¢.

Killarney Queen. The best of the Killarney varieties, particularly free from mildew. Pink. 90¢.

Killarney, Double White. A good, pure white Rose, not very full, but very beautiful before it opens entirely. 90¢.

Lady Alice Stanley. Large, well-filled flowers, freely produced. Inside of petals pale pink, the outside coral-rose. Strong foliage. Free-blooming and robust. An excellent, dependable variety. 90¢.

Lady Ashtown. A good garden Rose, with well-filled, pink flowers, which are good when full-blown or in bud. Very free-flowering and of vigorous growth. 90¢.

Lady Ursula. A strong growing Rose, producing a profusion of light pink flowers which are shaded yellowish at the base of the petals. Its strong growth makes it desirable for massing in beds; less so for interplanting with other kinds. 90¢.

La France. An old favorite, still in favor for its beautiful shape and fragrance. The flowers are bright pink,

showing silvery pink on the reversed edges of the outer petals. 90¢.

Los Angeles. Brilliantly colored flowers of salmon, shaded with yellow. 90¢.

Maman Cochet. Of the older favorites this Rose is one of the finest. The quality and shape of this and the white Maman Cochet have never been surpassed. Every flower is perfect. Carmine pink, blending into light yellow toward the center. It would be hard to find a better Rose either for bedding or cutting than the pink or white Maman Cochet. They are Tea-Roses, and, although amongst the hardiest of this class, should be planted in somewhat sheltered places. 90¢.

Maman Cochet, White. Shaped like the preceding, but practically white, with the outer petals tinged carmine. Both varieties of Maman Cochet are of low, somewhat spreading growth. 90¢.

Mme. Abel Chatenay. An old favorite. Light pink flowers, shaded with salmon, rather small, but well-formed. 90¢.

Mme. Caroline Testout. One of the best of the older varieties and still loved by all Rose fanciers. Large, satiny pink flowers in which the inner petals form a globe, around which the outer petals are more loosely arranged. A dependable bloomer and fragrant. 90¢.

Mme. Ed. Herriot (Daily Mail). Beautiful buds of coral red and orange, opening to semi-double flowers of the same color. 90¢.

Miss Cynthia Forde. Large, double flowers of clear pink, well-shaped. A dependable variety for bedding or cutting. 90¢.

Miss Lolita Armour. One of the finest colors amongst the newer Roses. Large, double flowers of creamy copper. The flowers resemble the old fashioned Gloire de Dijon and have the same fine fragrance. The beauty of the Rose is in its color, which is striking. It is not so well-shaped and the plant is not as vigorous as it might be. \$1.00.

Mrs. Aaron Ward. A popular and fine yellow Rose, rather small, but well filled and shaped. The buds are golden buff, opening deep yellow. A very satisfactory Rose for cutting and bedding, of dwarf habit. 90¢.

Mrs. A. R. Waddell. Beautiful, long buds of yellowish copper, opening into nearly single, cup-shaped flowers of bronze pink. Free flowering and of strong growth. 90¢.

Ophelia. A free-flowering, dependable garden Rose, with well-filled and well-shaped flowers of pale yellow and pale flesh tints. 90¢.

Ophelia, Golden. Like the preceding, but with deeper yellow in the center of the flower. 90¢.
