

GREEN GLOBE—This perennial is grown for the flower heads, which are cooked very much like Asparagus. The plants may be started under glass early in the Spring and transplanted in May. Packet, 15c.



ASPARAGUS

BUSH BEANS

Beans may be grown in any well-prepared garden soil and may be planted as soon as the ground has become slightly warm or when the maples are in leaf. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA AS A GARDEN FERTILIZER

There is such a growing demand among amateur gardeners for this chemical, that we are prompted to offer a word as to its proper use, as disaster may follow an overdose or foliage may be burnt by wrong method of application.

Sulphate of Ammonia in commercial form has the appearance of a grayish salt, is soluble in water and is very rich in nitrogen. The effect on vegetation is to accelerate new growth, hence valuable on such crops and plants as are valued for their green foliage.

When used for shrubs, a teaspoonful may be spread on the soil around the plant. For the lawn, mix two pounds with a bucket full of loam, this should be spread over an area 20 by 25 feet. For house plants and the garden a solution may be made by adding a heaping teaspoonful to a gallon of water, stirring thoroughly. Sprinkle the solution on the soil around plants. One gallon of solution should be used on at least ten plants. If fertilizer should come in contact with foliage, a spraying of clear water should be given immediately. May be used dry in the preparation of soil at the rate of one ounce to the square yard or 100 pounds to the acre.





HARDY PLANTS SHOULD BE MULCHED IN THE FALL

Much better results will be obtained from perennial flowers if they are properly mulched as winter sets in. The use of some fluffy material like Shredded Cow Manure or Granulated Peat Moss will prevent heaving by frost, and hasten the formation of buds in the spring. When the ground warms up the mulch may be worked into the soil as a fertilizer. Phlox, Hollyhocks, Peonies and Roses respond well to a winter mulch.

PERENNIAL AND BIENNIAL FLOWER SEEDS

The hardy flowers may be grown from seed and most of them will bloom the first season from seed if planted early in the spring. A box in a sunny window will do for many of the seedlings, those who are blessed with hot-beds or cold frames can do work on a larger scale. For fall sowing, August is the best time for planting perennial seed of most varieties. The novice and the old-time gardener will find helpful suggestions in the Burpee leaflet, "Perennials from Seed." Free on request.

PEONIES

Fall is considered the best time for planting Peonies, but if spring-time finds you in the notion to start a bed of Peonies, our advice would be to plant them and let them have the benefit of six more months in which to establish themselves. The ground should be prepared to a depth of 18 to 24 inches. Sheep manure and bone meal are excellent fertilizers. American Peony Society ratings are given below, also the names of originators.

Peonies are seldom at their best until about the second or third year after planting. If plants fail to bloom after good care, the trouble may usually be traced to lack of sun or to improper depth of planting. Transplanting in the garden should be done in early fall before new root-growth begins, placing the crown just two inches below the surface. Remember that Peonies are gross feeders, and you will be amply rewarded for liberal use of fertilizer thoroughly incorporated with the soil.
